Mother Teresa was the subject of Mrs Anne Lancaster's talk at our afternoon meeting. It was an interesting and inspiring talk. As a young mother and vicar's wife, Mary Sumner felt that mothers needed help in bringing up their children and she started a small group of mothers in her village who met regularly for prayer and talks. This eventually grew to the world-wide organisation which the Mothers' Union is today. Mary Sumner went on travelling and giving talks until not long before her death at the age of ninety-three.

#### Ladbroke Parish Council Report

The meeting took place on 20th October. The Councillors were reminded t. they must declare any financial or pecuniary interest they might have in an item on the agenda. There had again been no news about a gate access across Windmill lane. The Councillors were asked to start thinking now, about what items of expenditure could be endorsed for the next financial year. For example should the village pay to have the verges cut next summer? Is there a necessity for an additional street light? How much should the grant to the Village Hall be?

The plans for the Old School House had been approved. There was no decision yet about a new house at Barn Farm. The proposed development site at Village Farm field had been designated an early release site by the District Council and it was thought that the Developers would re-submit plans in the near future. Geoff Timms reported that there hadn't been any recent footpath forays, due partly to a shortage of tools. The style at one end of the short footpath next to the garage had been eaten by horses and was to be inspected.

There was some discussion with our local P.C. Perry about the current state of Policing in the Southam Area and the Chairman reported about his recent interview with Superintendent Allsop.

I asked for the poor state of Radbourne Lane and the pavement outside the "Old Rectory", to be itemised on the Agenda next month, which will be held on Wednesday 17th Nov at 7.45pm. K.L.

### Womens' Fellowship

We were very pleased to welcome Margaret Boswell to our meeting.

She has been a Macmillan nurse for eight years. A trainee nurse Liz Comfort, who several of us knew, came with her. Mrs Boswell told us that all Macmillan nurses are Registered General Nurses and if working in the community are experienced District Nurses. They also complete a specialist course which gives them expertise in pain and symptom control, and in the emotional support of cancer patients and their relatives.

Douglas Macmillan set up a Society of Cancer Relief and in 1911 the Cancer Relief Macmillan Fund was founded. Hospices were built and later nurses were trained to take hospice care out into the community. The nurses attend courses regularly and keep in touch with hospitals. G.P's and District Nurses, working with them in caring for their patients. We were all very interested in hearing about Macmillan Nurses and very much admired the dedication these nurses give to people needing help in coming to terms with their illness.

The Christmas Fayre is on November 27th and once again we ask for cakes, marmalade, jam etc. for our stall.

The next meetings is on November 10th at 2.30pm at Betty Malcolm's home, 1 Ladbroke Hall when Gwyn will tell us about her holiday in Singapore. Nancy Stubbs

### Parish Council Meeting for September 1993

Only half the Councillors were present and many items, particularly financial matters were deferred. There was no progress on Low-cost homes, "Ken Stephenson is leading the initiative" the Chairman announced. A solution to the funding of the Village Taxi Bus awaited John Hunt's research. No decision was taken on whether to sponsor the Hereburg Morris trip to Verdun although several Councillors praised the troupe's efforts for Charity.

Similarly they made no decision on spending your council tax on supporting the Church. Parents of 101 Harbury children have written jointly to the council in appreciation of the upgrading work.

Stratford DC has given permission for minor building works at 3 Pineham Avenue, 38 Francis Road, Navron, Hall Lane, 1 The Beeches, 20 Manor Orchard and Manor Stables. They refused the West-Latham's application at 2 Sutcliffe Drive and the Hughes' plans at 9 Church Street.

The Parish Council had no comments on amendments at 16 Binswood End and 11 South Parade, or an extension at 14 Farm Street but objected to an extension at 26 Ivy Lane, parking changes at 8 Dovehouse Lane and plans to convert the Barn at Bretherens Farm because of access difficulties.

John Drinkwater congratulated the Clerk, Alison Hodge on the minutes she prepared of the extra ordinary meeting on the Local Plan.

The new lamps are ordered and reinstatement of the roads following the sewer works are promised. Only two responses have so far been received to the Parish Council's letter to Queens Close residents offering generous terms to regularise the sewer connections there.

### Harbury Society

We only had an audience of twenty or so for the talk on the Sealed Knot but it was excellent. Mick Parker turned up in full uniform complete with boots and floppy hat.

The name Sealed Knot comes from a bungling secret society of Cromwell's day which took its name from the Chain of the Order of the Garter. The army were a scruffy lot. Those who raised a regiment clothed it in what they could get and in any colour they chose which was confusing for everyone concerned. Both armies could and did look the same and Generals caught on the wrong side of battles could ride out of trouble without being challenged. Eventually both sides took to wearing coloured sashes.

Today's Sealed Knot started as a Society of Royalists but they soon realised that they needed someone to fight and so became a society of Cavaliers and Roundheads; the army of the King and the army of Parliament under Lords General and subsidiary Generals.

The individual regiments consist of Pikemen who wear a sword, steel helmet, back and breast plate, dress in simple woollen coat and breeches and carry a 20 foot long pike with a steel tip designed to keep away the cavalry horses.

The Musketeers wear a simple uniform and carry heavy crude matchlock muskets with a 42 inch barrel. (The Longbow had gone out of favour by this time. It was still an efficient weapon of war but it took years to train a bowman and matchlocks were easier to use.)

The Royalist Cavalry in the Sealed Knot tend to wear floppy hats, although this is not the true uniform. It should be steel back and breast plate, helmet, leather (buff) coat and a holstered pistol. Originally the Cavalry did not charge home but rode up, discharged their weapons and rode away. The Artillery used at first by the Society were Crimean cannons borrowed from the Army but now they are generally reproduction cannons of less than two inch bore which are classed as shotguns!

Standard Bearers carry six foot squares of silk, plain for colonels and with a cross of St George for Majors. Although the colours of the standards bore no relation to the coats of the regiment, they were a rallying point for the men.

Seventeenth Century battle communication was very difficult. Once firing started the smoke made it difficult to see what was going on and Generals had to send runners to give orders what were not always obeyed. The Sealed Knot is now using drum calls to help control the troops.

When the battle gets out of control the Sealed Knot call a 'Parlais' and armies regroup for it is important that the action does not move too f ar away from the paying public!

Twenty years ago when it was formed the Sealed Knot comprised of people 18-20 years old who now have families they bring 'Knotting'. Children under 16 can and do take part but only at the beginning and end and not during the battles. Although no-one has ever been killed and there are strict safety regulations and training, people do get injured, for as Mick said it is like 'playing rugby with lethal weapons'.

The casualties are tended on the field by Officers in black tabards with white crosses and treated on site by an Army Doctor who is now an acknowledged expert in minor injuries.

The Sealed Knot helps people raise money for Charity and is itself a Limited Company with Charitable Status. Expenses for a battle are high  $(\pounds 10-\pounds 20,000$  for the horses and gunpowder). With 6,500 members they need very large camp-sites of 20 acres with services, catering and even a Merchant's row of over 100 stalls selling pewterware, pottery, armour, cloth, swords, guns etc, and of course a beer tent.

The Sealed Knot, as well as re-enacting battles, put on smaller scale displays where people can handle weapons, and taste the cooking of the time. This is especially useful for schools 'doing' the Civic War as part of the National Curriculum.

Almost all year the Society is doing something. The previous weekend it was the 350th anniversary of the Battle of Newbury. There are banquets in the winter and training events. The Battle season, as in the real Civil War runs from April to September but last year they did put on Edge Hill Battle in October and it was very muddy and unpleasant.

There were lots of questions for Mr Parker showing just how interested everyone was in the subject and his enthusiastic and humorous delivery. People wanted to know if there were made up battles, how everyone was insured, whether there were commentaries and how one became an officer (You have the best Uniform said Mick) and what he found most difficult (getting enough people to die in the battle and stay dead!).

The Windmill Opening was a great success and the County has sent a letter thanking us for our assistance. Well done everyone. Linda Ridgley

#### Harbury Theatre Group

Our advertisement for the December Pantomime is in this month's Harbury News and as tickets are selling well it is worth buying them early (from Lindops or Theatre Group members).

It is of course a mammoth task to put on any production but because of the additional work required for a Pantomime planning started very early. This is how it's done:

Around July, joint producers John and Sally Stringer decide on a script, one that was both appealing and practical to stage. This in itself is a difficult task. Ali Baba has a speaking cast of 17, members of the Theatre Group and their families were asked to volunteer for parts.

The Village Hall is booked, copyright licence applied for and copies of the script obtained. Following the play reading on September 9th the producers then had to co-opt a set designer, Musical Director, Prompt, Publicity Person, Special Effects Co-ordinator, Caterers, Choreographer, Costume Maker, Sound Engineer, Set makers and Front of House helpers.

With the cast chosen, rehearsals take place every Monday and Thursday for 12 weeks, two hours each session. In between, the actors/actresses have to learn all their lines and where to stand, what to do and how to do it!

With a month to go rehearsals are done without books, the producers start to polish the performance and add the finishing touches. The Musical Director

calls additional rehearsals for the songs: more words to learn! Saturday mornings are spent in the Village Hall making and designing the set.

One week to go and all the last minute hitches are ironed out, the stage is put up and the set fixed together. Lighting is arranged and the sound is tested. Two full rehearsals and two dress rehearsals all in the last two weeks are followed by four performances in three days.

## Nice Play Area But How Do We Get In?

With the support and assistance of Hopscotch the Parish Council has provided a modern Play Area for Harbury's young children, but they still haven't solved the problem of making it 'Dog-proof' - their top priority.

They closed off the South Parade entrance with its safety baffle and have created a temporary opening to the Area through the Village hall fence. There have been complaints that this encourages children to ride straight out across South Parade into Ivy Lane without regard to the traffic. It also increases the disturbance to groups using the rooms at the rear of the Hall whose meetings are disrupted by the passage back and forth of children tramping from the Play Area to the car Park.

The Parish Council now has to decide where to put the official entrance to the Play Area and it has also to make provision for access for the mowing contractor whilst still ensuring that dogs are excluded.

They can not use the path to the allotments because that debouches onto South Parade and a safety barrier there would prevent tractors delivering muck to the Allotments. They have rejected the South Parade entrance and the temporary access through the Village Hall property is obviously not acceptable in the long term.

This only leaves the 'dog-proof' fence on the southern side of the Play Area, but the question here is whether it is realistic to expect the children to walk all that way when they can climb the fences or push through the hedge and let the dreaded dogs in.

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
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

### Horticultural Society.

Now we begin the indoor gardening season, when we listen to ideas and plan for next year. Mr J. Hill talked to us at our September meeting about plants for rock and scree gardens. Many of the slides he showed were of the plants growing wild, so that we could appreciate the conditions we have to provide for many of the alpine plants to flourish. Many grow in fairly poor soil but with an annual supply of rotting leaves and constant moisture.

Water never stands around alpine plants and many have the protection of snow whilst dormant. To imitate these conditions in the garden we must create very free draining beds. Raised beds, troughs or sinks are therefore ideal for many of the alpine plants now on sale.

Our November talk on Sweetpeas by Mr Collier will be preceded by the A.G.M. We have members willing to stand for the committee so don't be afraid to come. Subscriptions, still held at  $\pm 1.00$  per member, are now due. Eight talks, one party, two outings and discounts on seeds at some garden centres makes it outstanding value. Losy to go to a

#### November in the Garden

After last month's heavy rain, and hard frosts many of Octobers jobs are uncompleted, but be careful not to try and get on the ground while it is sti too wet.

When conditions allow November is the best month for planting deciduous trees & shrubs, Roses, Rananculus, Tulips, Bulbous Lilies & Lilies of the

Valley. Old overcrowded beds of the latter can be lifted, cleaned and replanted.

Newly planted conifers & other evergreens and any tender plants & shrubs will benefit from protection from cold winds and hard frosts. Plastic mesh, sacking, or plastic bubble sheeting, secured to stakes, will fill the purpose admirably.

November is also the main month for digging the vegetable patch. Make sure of the early completion of areas where you intend to plant next years onions & Brussel sprouts. They appreciate firm soil. Dress these plots with bone meal. Remove dead & yellowing leaves from all existing brassica plots.

Examine stored potatoes and onions for any decay.

Apple & Pear trees and black and red currants can all be pruned when the leaves have fallen & hard wood cuttings of currants can be taken.

Spike the lawn with a fork to ensure good drainage. A top dressing of equal parts of soil, peat (or peat substitute) & sand is beneficial.

Clean & grease the lawn mower before storing or, even better, fulfil that resolution to have it serviced now, while demand is low.

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
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


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
