What about the group in Harbury?

The Crusader group in the village has been running for some years. Children are welcome from the age of 4 years upwards and for most of the time, work in similar age groups. We meet in the Tom Hauley Room (beside the church) and spill over into the village hall. Starting time is 10.30am on Sunday mornings including half terms but the leaders and helpers have a rest during the long holidays! The first Sunday of each month is given over to the Family Service. The group is run by a small band of leaders backed up by a number of helpers. We are always on the look out for more leaders and helpers so that we can extend our work. The committment can be as great or small as each individual desires

What do we do?

Using all sorts of methods we try to bring the bible alive and show the relevance of the Christian message to life today. The young children enjoy a set pattern while the older ones demand variety! We encourage fun games, drama and crafts - there's nothing stuffy about us.

But I am not an Anglican

Neither are some of us! Some of our leaders and helpers are drawn from other denominations. Crusaders is an independent, non-denominational group and the Harbury group is a church-linked group, not the All Saints Sunday School, which means we retain our independence whilst receiving support and encouragement from the church here in the village.

We are frequently away from the Village on Sundays

This does not matter at all. We are just delighted to see the children when they are able to come.



Playscheme 1993

Looking back at this summers Playscheme, we organizers felt the two weeks were a complete contrast. The first week, with builders occupying the ladies toilets, poor weather (a trip cancelled because of the rain for the first time I can remember) and not a lot of adult help, we were depressed. The second week, with better weather, fewer builders and many more adult helpers, we actually started to enjoy ourselves.

In the two weeks the Playscheme was running nearly 1000 children passed through the doors - on average 93 a day. 155 were registered and there were a good many younger visitors there with their Mums. The children used up 40 tubes of glue and 5 litres of paste, painted 763 plaster models and were provided with 66 different craft activities, and playdough, cooking, competitions and various sports daily. They drank 20 litres of orange squash and ate (probably) far too many sweets and buiscuits. We hope that in looking back they feel they had a good time.

We would like to thank everyone who helped - those who gave time, money and materials. Those who drove, cooked, cut and painted for us, and those who came and spent a morning with us. I think they had more fun than they thought they would - I hope so. Certainly some came back for more.

On the last day I asked how many of the children were aged 12. About a dozen hands waved, "You", I told them, "were born the year Jean and I 'did' our first Playscheme. My sons cannot remember summers without a Playscheme (excepting last year). This year Anna, who had been a Harbury Playschemer in the early years, joined us as an adult helper. 1891 Census

From the school's copy of the 1891 Census comes further snippets which we hope may be of interest.

Families were often quite large though of course the Census only records those still living at home and does not include those yet to be born! The Ceneys in Binswood End had 6 children aged between 18 and 1. The Overtons had two year gaps between seven of theirs. At Fields Farm there were 6 children, though there were 2 servants to help cope. The Wilkins family also had 6 in Ivy Lane, George Askew's six even found room for a lodger. Edwin Thornicroft and his wife Mary had seven, and Bob hadn't even been born.

There were three records of severe disability. Joseph and Harriet Turner of Binswood End had a paralysed daughter Harriet aged 14. John Downes is recorded as a hawker, a type of salesman, even though he was blind. Henry Blackwell of Mill Street, widower, looked after his 39 year old deaf and dumb daughter Eliza.

The Census, as today, recorded all those in the house on a certain night. One would hope that Walter Green's household was not permanent, as it contained not only mother in law, but father in law and his wife's older sister.

The vast majority are Harbury born and bred, with only rare "immigrants" from Birmingham, London and even Ireland. Some lived to a good age, like Mary Smith of Mill Street, aged 95 who received Parish Relief. Much preferable to being sent to Southam Workhouse. The Nicksons of Farm Street looked after another old lady called Elizabeth Whately who was 93.

Forest of Dean




Darren Newbery at lunchtime

September in the Garden

At the end of this month watch out for frosts and before they occur bring in pot grown Chrysanthemums and lift tender Pelargoniums, Begonias and Fuchsias. Order fruit trees, Roses, Shrubs and Herbaceous plants for placements and new plantings.

Complete bulb planting (but still not Tulips, other than dwarf species types). start bulbs in bowls, for Winter flowering in the house, late in the month, and

put in a cool dark place.

Clear Summer bedding plants and rough fork flower beds. Mark and lable

Perrenials which will later die down completely.

Rake over lawns and overseed thin patches, a high phosphate feed will be helpful - If conditions are suitable new lawns can be sown. Cut dying leaves and stems from Water Lilies and other pond plants. Keep the water topped up



and free of fallen leaves. As leaf fall increases cover the pond with netting but be sure to leave access space for frogs which can otherwise become disasterously tangled up.

Plant out Spring cabbage and watch all brassicas for caterpillars and Aphids. Continue to feed Tomatoes with high potash fertiliser and keep Celery well

watered.

Harves Sweetcorn when "Silks" have withered and while grains are still 'milky'. Lift Onions and Potatoes when tops have died down and late in the month start lifting and storing mature Carrots and Beetroot.
