


Our annual collection for the Mission to Deep Sea Fishermen raised a total of £70, a big thank you to all who helped.



FROM THE RECTOR

When you receive this copy of the 'News' we will almost be in the season of Lent.

As you will know Ash Wednesday is the beginning of Lent. Lent is the season when we prepare ourselves to celebrate Easter, and traditionally we prepare in two ways. Through penitence (being contrite and saying sorry to God for our sins) and fasting. We hope that we can know ourselves better and know God better - becoming more faithful disciples. On Ash Wednesday this process starts.

In early times the public penitents began their penance on Ash Wednesday. Not only were ashes sprinkled on their heads, but they were presented with hair skirts and ceremoniously cast out of church. (Hence the expression 'sackcloth and ashes':) They could not return until Maundy Thursday, the day of reconciliation, and were obliged in the meantime to live an austere life in some monastery or other place of retreat.

We all need reminding that we do sin against God and that we must come to him in penitence and say sorry. As a symbol of our penitence we will at Ladbroke's

10.30am Communion and Harbury's 7.30pm Sung Eucharist on Ash Wednesday be following the ancient custom of the church by having the 'Imposition of Ashes'. At the beginning of the services, those who wish may come up to have a cross made on their foreheads with ash (made from the remains of last year's Palm Crosses). Many Christians have found this act a powerful and moving reminder of our sinfulness and also a pledge of God's forgiveness. This seems to me to be a good opportunity to get our Lenten observances off to a good start.

Another Lenten practice is to give something up. This ought to be coupled with positive action. Possibly more regular attendance at services and regular reading of the Bible. With all this in mind let us prepare togehter for the great festival of Easter.

A Prayer for Lent

Almighty God, we pray that through tis season of Lent, by prayer and study and self-discipline, we may penetrate more deeply into the mystery of Christ's sufferings; that following in the way of his cross and passion we may come to share in the glory and triumph of his resurrection; through the same Jesus Christ our Lord.

ROC APPEAL TAKES OFF

A new captain leading the team visibly lifted spirits. On Jan. 18, after a year without a Rector, the Revd. Roy Brown was chairing his first Parochial Church Council at Harbury. The meeting got off to a good start with the news that Gift Day in church on Jan. 1 had boosted to £6,500 the ROC (Roof, Organ, Clock) appeal (target £28,000), and that donations were still rolling in. The appeal committee was heartened by the widespread support it was receiving at all the special events, and in planning the year's money-raising programme. In this promising climate it was decided to make an early start on the work for which ROC was launched, with roof repairs first in the order of priorities, followed by restoration and automation of the clock, and finally the organ.

The 1994 Diocesan levy on Harbury has been fixed at £11,578 which will be slightly cushioned by a rebate of £658 which takes account of the year-long interregnum.

Pressure on the Diocese is being maintained by the Parishes with a request from Southam Deanery Synod for

a clearer indication of how economies can be made to the diocesan budget in the light of the deteriorating financial plan, and urging a review of policy on extra-parochial appointments.

A combined Harbury-Ladbroke Lent course, with its theme of 'Prayer and Spirituality' incorporated into the communion service, was preferred to participation in the Deanery course. It will be on Tuesday evenings and will alternate between the two parishes, beginning at Harbury on February 22nd.

The prospect of a changed format for the monthly family service with the aim of bringing the children into mainline worship was raised, but serious discussion was deferred to the next meeting to afford PCC members the opportunity for considered thought and prayer.

The Rector voiced the PCC's congratulations to Harry Windsor on being awarded the MBE in the New

Year Honours.

The cost of replacing the worn-out parish photocopier is to be explored as a matter of urgency. The slightly reduced profit from the Christmas Fair was attributed to the absence of one or two hitherto popular stalls together with the drop in attendance, possibly due to the switch from the traditional Saturday.

There was good news from bonfire night, with the Scouts and Church sharing equally in a much increased profit of £285, and the announcement that action is being taken to reinstate the site of the bonfire in the playing fields.

Ash Wednesday services on Feb. 16th will be at Ladbroke (10.30am) and Harbury (7.30pm) with imposition of ashes at both.

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

The first Parish Council meeting for 1994 took place on Wed. Jan. 19th, it was a really freezing night, so it wasn't surprising that only one lonely villager came to keep on eye on local deliberations. The fire stations at Fenny Compton and Tysoe had again been reprieved, probably for the next 3-4 years. The policing of our area has been re-organised, our new community policeman is P.C. Bob Stephens whose are includes Napton across to Bishops Itchington and down to Fenny Compton.

Planning-wise two retrospective approvals had been received for Mr. Brian Moore, this leaves one application outstanding. Permission has been granted for a new agricultural dwelling along the lane to Bishops Itchington. The unsafe barn wall opposite school lane had been referred to S.D.C as they were in charge of dangerous structures. Berkeley Homes

have re-submitted plans for 15 houses on the field behind Village Farm, but the Council still felt that this would result in far too much extra traffic in the very narrow Windmill Lane.

Geoff Timms reported that the work of the footpath volunteers was continuing, another stile had been erected in December on the footpath behind Ladbroke Hall. The next project would be on Mr. Smith's farm at Hodnell.

Mrs. Grainger was still very concerned by the poor state of the road for Deppers Bridge, the large water filled pot holes, were to be reported to Stratford District Council.

Severn Trent have again conferred that there can be no increase in development in our area, until 1997 when the new sewerage treatment plant in Southam is designated to be completed.

The next meeting will be held on Wed. 16th Feb. at 7.45pm in the V.Hall - it can't possible be as cold as it was in January, so come along and hear more than the edited highlights!

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING FOR JANUARY

The Spooner classroom may go. Because of the new proposals by the WCC to move children to Secondary school at 11+ instead of 12+, Keith Thompson pointed out the school will face a reduction of staff, income and facilities. These issues will be discussed at a meeting of the LEA at the school on 10th Feb. Full support will be given by the Parish Council.

To everyone's surprise, John Drinkwater agreed with Ken Stephenson that the new policing in the area is an improvement. Southam is to have a Sergeant, more officers and will be open longer. Harbury, Long Itchington and Stockton will be policed by Pc Boulstridge with Pc Perry as backup. Leamington will be the Headquarters but concern was voiced that we still do not have a policeman in the village as Pc Boulstridge lives in Kenilworth.

Ken Stephenson informed the meeting of the closure of the Southam Volunteer Bureau. The office is ceasing to organise local door to door transport for those

in the community who need transport to and from hospital but do not qualify for an ambulance. The office is asking for local support to help overcome the closure.

Mrs. Veasey Walshe had good news on the new sewer project. The STW hope to finish the new plant by April 1996. Application for the low cost housing scheme can now be made in October 1995.

The picnic table in the park will soon be repaired but the slide needs specialist welding. The new bench was moved before the cement had set and will have to be redone. Holes in the tennis court fence are to be repaired but the leaning net post is a job for the Contractor. New fingerpost signs will soon be in place and the unused bench from Butt Lane is now ready for occupation in Vicarage Lane.

The Gas Board have promised to repair all holes, dips and cracks left in the roads by March 31st. New white lining will follow.

The new plans for the proposed houses in Farm Street are still raising questions as the new boundary amendments are upsetting the residents of Manor Orchard. The builders are proposing to install septic tanks which hook up to the main sewer at a later date. This is unlikely to be acceptable.

Stratford DC now has permission to send all its domestic waste to Ufton tip. Increased traffic is causing problems and any lorries seen driving through the village must be noted and reported to Stratford or Biffa.

The old problem of speeding cars in the village has arisen again, did it ever go away? Sharon Hancock would like signs urging drivers to drive with care put up at the roads into the village.

The £10,000 windfall is still intact. Decisions will be made at a further meeting as to which proposals will be accepted. The significant schemes include Village Hall improvements; Church clock restoration; Village landscaping and Desk Top Publishing for Harbury & Ladbroke News.

HARBURY SOCIETY NEWSLETTER FOR JANUARY 1994

John Crossling the Keeper of Geology at the County Museum came, like a missionary, to convert us to the cause of RIGS (Regionally Important Geological Sites).

Geologists already have the equivalent of Grade I Listed Buildings in their Sites of Special Scientific Interest but usually there is only one of each stratigraphic type in the country (there are 15 in Warwicks.). Therefore enthusiasts have been trying to identify second grade sites in each County for local use and to act as replacements should the national SSSI be lost.

Warwickshire now has its own county Geological Group affiliated to the Warwickshire Wildlife Trust and they have identified 40 potential RIGS and have set out to visit and examine them all. It is important that there is access to these sites so that researchers, school children and enthusiasts can visit them.

Many Geological exposures are the result of human action and most of those are holes in the ground. These are very vulnerable to infilling or natural flooding.

Almost the entire range of Geological time is represented in the British Isles and Warwicks. has exposures of most ages (excluding the Ordovician and Silurian, Cretacious and Tertiary). Our county is also an important area for studying the Ice Age Deposits.

Where the exposures are in working quarries the group records what can be seen and tries to reserve the most important exposures on the old faces and arrange that when the quarry is landscaped these are saved and made accessible to the public. Some worked out areas like Corley Rocks, Quarryfield House, and Rail-way Cuttings like Stockingford and even parts of Coventry Ring Road allow important rock faces to be preserved. Occasionally development actually benefits the Geologist. At Gibbet Hill more of the Permian Conglomerate has been exposed to view and similarly at Winderton Road Cutting the Northampton Sands, transitional beds between the Cotswold Limestones and their tropical sea can be seen.

In our immediate area are some of the most spectacular exposures, in the limestone quarries at Southam

lighthorne, Edge Hill and Burton Dassett, and further North near Rugby.

Sugby shows the top of the Blue Lias and Southam the Sottom. Quarrying in Southam has been so extensive that they "have gone through the floor" of the old sea bed of the Lower Lias times into the White Lias or Harbury Stone which forms the junction between the Surassic and Triassic. The White Lias is only a sew metres thick and the best exposures were at Dark ane Quarry in Lighthorne.

At Burton Dassett the hills are made up of the Middle and Upper Lias, and the Northampton sands. At Edge Hill they quarry Brownstone, the ferruginious Ironstone of the Northampton series but further south the Iron Carbonate colours the stone green. It "rusts" on exposure to the same brown as Edge Hill Stone. Further south still are the Chipping Norton limestone and the Sharphill Beds which John is particularly keen to uncover because Stegasaurs were recently discovered in them over the border in Oxfordshire. John wants a Dinosaur for Warwickshire. Plethiosaurs and Icythiosaurs were marine and he says Hon't count!

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

n mild spells tidy pool margins and remove dead or ecaying growth from shallow marginal plants. Cut ack, tidy up or replant herb bed.

'eed Spring Cabbage, sprouting Broccoli and late

cose fertiliser will benefit Strawberries, Raspberries urrants and Gooseberries. Check Raspberry ties and to back newly planted canes to 8", established canes within an inch or two of the top wire.

Sow greenhouse Tomatoes at 20°C (65°F) reducing to 3°C (55°F) when shoots appear. Sow Sweet Peas under plass in deap seed trays or individual pots. Repot overwintered Fuchsia and Geranuim cuttings and pinch out tips.

Prepare Runner Bean and Celery trenches using well cotted manure or compost. Put down cloches or fleece there first seeds will be sown in March.

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
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
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
