



We are delighted to congratulate John & Gill Holden on the birth of Francesca, born on 1st May.

FROM THE RECTOR

It is sometimes said that a person's religion is entirely his own concern. It involves his relationship with God - something which is very intimate and personal to each one of us. We come to Church to worship God and we feel that it doesn't really matter where we worship - in our own parish, or the next parish, or in a city Church. As long as we worship God, that is the main thing.

This attitude indicates what can be a basic misunderstanding of the whole state of our relationship with God. So it is of great importance that we come to understand fully what the Church is all about.

Basically, to be a Christian means to be a member of Christ's Body - a sharer of His life. Because we share His life, we are able to journey with Him. So far, so good. The mistake we make is to think that that's the full story. Christ is not only our way to the Father. He is the Father's way to the world.

To share His life means to share this two-fold task of His. Christ came for the life of the world. He comes for the life of the world now. We are at His right hand; the way He chooses to be present here and now, in this place, at this time.

In the Church, we depend on one another for our development in Christ. So often we imagine that love of neighbour is merely a consequence, a by-product of our Christianity. It lies at the very heart of it.

Love is what we owe to one another. But this love must be shown in many different ways according to our different talents and opportunities. Just as in one body there are many different organs each contributing to the wellbeing of the rest, so too in the Church. You need the priest, for example, to preach God's word to you, and administer the Sacraments, to comfort the lonely and strengthen the weak. But the priest needs you. He needs your help and encouragement, and especially the witness of your unselfish love in your family lives.

So remember your contribution is unique and unreplaceable. YOU ARE IMPORTANT.

The Rector was preaching about the relationship between "Fact and Faith". "That you are sitting in front of me in church is fact", he said. "That I am speaking to you from the pulpit is fact. But it is only faith that makes me believe that any of you are listening".

TARGET IN SIGHT

With a downwardly revised R.O.C.(roof, organ, clock) target of £16,565, leaving just £2,800 to be raised in the five months of the fund-raising campaign still to run, success seems assured. Harbury Parochial Church Council was told on May 3 of significant recent additions, including £1,600 specifically for the clock from Harbury Parish Council, £555 from the PCC's Warwick Market stall, and a remarkable £570 in a single day (April 23) from the coffee morning and lunch together with a collection from the wedding in the afternoon. Early starts are planned for automation of the church clock and restoration of the organ. Cost of work to the organ will be £10,336 instead of the original £20,000 estimate.

Representatives from all Christian bodies are to be invited to a special meeting to set up a Corporate Parish Prayer Group. Alternatives for consideration are either a central group or a network of smaller groups. Discussion of the prayer group plan produced the idea of holding an holding an Open Day in church to give all church groups the opportunity to explain their purpose and activities, and to welcome new members.



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
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A letter to parishes from the Bishop of Warwick looks at the challenge resulting from the Church Commissioners' loss of assets, which means that their contribution to the diocese will end totally next year. Consequently eight parochial and non-parochial ministry posts are to be cut under a deployment plan "which will recognise the vital role of clergy as enablers and leaders". In future, says the Bishop, Christians must themselves fund today's Church. He believes that an extra £1.00 a week from everyone on electoral rolls throughout the diocese would meet parish, diocesan and wider church needs. The PCC's finance cttee is to meet urgently to analyse the parish situation and prepare for a special full-council meeting on the subject. The monthly R.O.C. lunches may now continue after September to raise money for general church expenses if a new organiser can be found; also consideration is to be given to the idea of a regular monthly coffee morning for the church.

Sally and John Stringer and Duncan House are to be co-opted members of the PCC.

The AGM was held on the 18th may in the V.Hall. The meeting was attended by villagers (it would have been nice to see a few more there!) and the District Cllrs.

The usual annual repairs of the V.Hall were presented the only matter arising being the provision of a gate

THE HARBURY AND LADBROKE CHURCH MEN'S SOCIETY

The Soc. met on 5th May to hear a talk given by Fr. Roy Brown entitled "Pathway to the Priesthood". The title, he said, originated following a question asked by a young boy which was, "How were you made a vicar?" He answered that at the age of 13 to 14 he had an awareness of his christian feelings and a little over 20 years later he decided to give up his good job in industry and follow a nagging intuition to try to go into the priesthood. His first problem was to talk over his feeling with his family, but they were expecting this to happen anyhow, and they knew it was only a matter of time; therefore he had their complete support.

As a prospective candidate for ordination, his vicar

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sent him to the diocesan director of ordinance where questions needed to be answered about the candidate's qualifications including his ability to work with people etc. and his ability to maintain his family financially.

He was then seen by the Bishops Chaplins before being recommended for the next stage of selection and this was before the ACCM (Advisory Council for Church Ministry) After satisfying this council by answering their searching questions, he was then recommended for a two year training course where he was assessed throughout this period. HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING FOR APRIL

The Council is in the unusual position of having an embarassment of riches. No sooner has it decided upon the disposal of its £10,000 windfall for the Pound Sewer Easement (and there are now only four individual householders who have not agreed to regularise their connections from the previous development) then another £4875 windfall lands on its lap.

Beverley Walsh (for Hopscotch) handed over the money, a grant from the Foundation for Sports and the Arts which was specifically donated to pay for the Multiplay Unit (the Adventure Climbing Frame). A plaque to this effect has been erected on the equipment.

Beverley was quick to ask for a meeting with the Parish Council to decide what new equipment the money should be spent on but there will no doubt be other organisations with a shopping list to show the Parish Council!

Herebergh Morris for instance have a good case. They once again approached the Council for help in entertaining their continental visitors and once again a decision was deferred.

The organisers of the Playscheme need financial assistance and are awaiting the Parish Council's pleasure.

The OAPs stoically sit out each meeting to hear how their concessionary travel is to be organised. Midland Red has at last responded to the Parish Councils Voucher Scheme idea.

The Village Hall, recipients of largess from the first tranche have agreed a land swop of a 12 ft strip on their eastern boundary for a similar amount of Parish Council land on their southern boundary to enable the Council to regularise the entrance to the Play Area.

Steve Norman is proceeding with the construction of the Bus Shelter in Deppers Bridge and brought to the Council's attention the installation of hard-standing at one of the properties in the hamlet. This would be reported to the Enforcement Officer.

Stratford District had granted permission for pruning of the Yew Tree at Fairview Vicarage Lane, the construction of a retaining wall round the garden of Byways Mill Street and an extension to 3 Binswood End (with conditions).

The Parish Council registered no objection to an extension to the Gasgoynes house in Vicarage Lane, a Conservatory redevelopment at Byways Mill Street, the renewal of permission for a Fisherman's Club at the Quarries and the replacement of the house at 10 South Parade with a bungalow.

They ojected to Mr Carter's plans for yet another development at Harbury Hall on the grounds of access, sewage capacity, backland and over development. They had second thoughts about their lack of criticism of plans for a two storey extension at 36 South Parade in view of neighbours objections.

District Councillor James Turner reported that Stratford District had 5,000 properties with no proper heating system. He supported elderly residents of the Vicarage Lane maisonettes in their campaign for gas central heating, and although it would take some time action was "in the pipeline".

Clir Beverley Walsh reported that there were several pales missing from the Cemetery Fence and asked the Parish Council to arrange for repairs as she was no carpenter.

PARISH COUNCIL ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The AGM of the Parish Council was held in the Tom Hauley Room on the 12th May. It was, as usual attended by the faithful few. Also present were County Clir Mrs. Bidwell, Liberal Democrat Andrew Cooley and the guest speaker, Mr. Andrew Cook from Warwickshire County Council.

With the aid of slides, Mr. Cook showed various traffic calming schemes used within the County. Visual methods such as zig-zag lines are a help but physical methods are more effective. These consist of road narrowing at vulnerable areas, pedestrian bollards in the middle of the road and the now infamous "humps". Not only do these methods have to be effective but also aesthetically pleasing. The speed table outside the Jephson Gardens is a good example of this. Another factor is the height and width of the "hump". Vehicles need to be slowed down without causing damage and also emergency vehicles cannot be impeded. Pedestrians also have to be considered when stepping off the pavement.

These measures cost money and Mr. Cook explained the County policy of targeting funds towards high accident spots and villages are not on the whole a high priority. Harbury has had only 3 reported accidents in the last 3 years of which speeding was not a factor.

The Chairman's Annual Report was presented by Cllr Wilson and various working party reports were also presented and open to questions.

One issue that was raised was the County review. Cllr Collett reported that since the elections all has gone very quiet.

Education and the shrinking budget were mentioned by Cllr Thompson. Cllr Collett replied that the closure and amalgamation of schools is still going on with firm proposals being heard on 27th May at the Shire Hall.

HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

To close our season of talks, Ron Hill told us how to create a wild flower garden. Mr. Hill, in his work as a landscape gardener, and in his capacity as Chairman of Warwickshire Wildlife Trust for many years has gained a wide knowledge of British wild flowers and their habitats. A successful wild flower area in a garden must re-create these natural conditions, and with beautiful slides Mr. Hill gave us many ideas.

Since many of our native plants are dying out, gardens can help to preserve them. However, we were firmly told never to take any plants grown from seed back to the wild, as many seed companies use imported seed. Plants are most easily raised from seed sown into seed trays in November, as majority need a cold dormant period. In Spring the seed trays can be given a little more warmth for germination.

To attract bees and butterflies, choose flat, open flowers, and grow plants which produce berries for the birds.

On Tuesday, 7th June we shall visit Hazelby House, near Newbury to see the 5 acre garden. The coach will leave Village Hall at 9.15am, and we have about 10 spare seats. Anyone interested, ring Pat Smith 612650.

JUNE IN THE GARDEN

In the first week clear out early flowering nonperennials (wallflowers etc.) clean and feed beds and plant out hardened bedding plants. The best time to divide and plant bearded Iris is at the end of the month.

Prune early flowering shrubs, as they cease blooming. Divide Spring flowering perennials and cut back early flowering ones hard, to give a second flush. Train and tie in climbing wall plants regularly from now on and regularly secure fast growing Sweet Peas.

Take cuttings from Pinks, placing non-flowering shoots in pots of sandy compost covered with a plastic bag.

Give indoor plants an outdoor holiday in a sheltered, shady spot. Late in the month sow biennials, Wallflowers, Sweet William, etc., for next year.

Plant out Tomatoes, Marrows, ridge Cucumbers and Sweetcorn and transplant Brassicas and Leeks as ready. Sow maincrop Carrot and Beetroot for storing. Make a final sowing of French Beans and dwarf early Peas for September, successional sowings of Lettuce, also summer Spinach in partial shade.

Keep the hoe going to control weeds and a sharp watch

for pests and fungal disease and arrest at an early stage. Watch carefully the ventilation and watering in the greenhouse.

Above all make time to sit in the garden and enjoy it and the birds and butterflies and other creatures who hopefully are enjoying it too!
