

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

#### FROM THE RECTOR

The Old Folk can lead the way. Our religion is not one of talk but rather one of example. At the risk of a contradiction, isn't it time that what Jesus 'did' was much more important than anything that He 'said'? Example is perhaps the best method of teaching. If you put a scruffy and ill-spoken teacher in front of a class of children, then very quickly standards of behaviour fall and discipline crumbles. So also in religion. Example is very important indeed; much more than talk. A good reason why children should not be sent to church, but taken.

We believe that as we go through life we learn about God and our destiny. That our human experience is nc hap hazard, but designed to give each one of us the chance to become someone of great value. So where should we look for the best example of Christianity? Among the older folks. People who have seen through the triviality of the world's standards and riches, and who have their eyes firmly fixed on the next stage of their journey through life. The old people are God's best advertisement for heaven.

One of the things that irritates me is the way it is taken for granted that all old people want out of life is what money can buy and that old people have nothing to do but sit quietly to one side and tell I do not tales of long ago. I think differently. believe that old age necessarily brings a second childhood and that we should talk to older people as if they are fools with no dignity. It is often the case that we get from people what we expect from then From older people we should expect, and I am sure we shall receive, a good example of what life is all about; a clear and joyful acceptance of the nearness of God; a desire to leave behind a legacy of goodness and thoughtfulness; and above all a willingness to acknowledge, by attendance at public worship, that there is a Higher Power to whom we must all answer. I ask, therefore, the old people to re-assert their dignity and take up their God-given duty of setting before the rest of us a picture of what life in its fulness can truly be. The young may not listen to the old (I doubt if any of us did), but they cannot help being influenced by their godly example. They can come to God in worship and present them



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
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gifts of wisdom, experience and good example.

Once or twice, whilst roaring with laughter, one or two of our older folk have said: "Ooooh you are rude to us Rector". I have replied: "Cheeky, yes, I have pulled your leg, yes, but rude, no never - because I have too much respect for you for that".

#### JEFF SUCCEEDS JOHN

Glowing tributes were paid to John Moore's outstanding work for Harbury Parish Church at the annual vestry and general meeting on April 17 when his resignation after nine years as warden was accepted with regret. Beryl Checkley, his fellow-warden for six years, who was re-elected, thanked John for his support, praising his dedication and the quality and volume of his contribution to a heavy workload, especially during the interregnum. Unanimously elected to the warden vacancy was Jeff Bedford, a multi-role stalwart of the PCC over several years. Jeff and Lorna and their two daughters moved to Harbury and into instant membership of All Saints' in 1986. Jeff's professional skills as a civil engineer have been invaluable to the fabric committee, and chairman of the social cttee. Jeff is currently president of Southam Rotary Club.

Re-elected at the AGM which followed were Ruth Dodds, secretary; Liz McBride, treasurer; Frank Bunting, auditor; and 16 members of last year's PCC. Peter Pryke and Tony Stubbs continue as Deanery Synod delegates.

Moya Waterman reported an electoral roll strength of 99, having lost one and gained three.

The R.O.C. appeal launched in the autumn is beginning to make an impact, it transpired from the wardens' report presented by Beryl. It has enabled repairs to the roof to be completed, and arrangements are now being made for restoration of the clock and its conversion to automatic winding. The church now has an alarm system following two burglaries, and it is hoped that restoration of the organ can be carried out for about half the original £20,000 estimate. After a slight fall in numbers during the interregnum congregations are again growing, except at evensong for which an appeal for greater support was made.

The Rector, the Revd. Roy Brown, appealed for wide community support for the new form of monthly family service with communion to be introduced on May 15. And he hoped for a large attendance at the Confirmation service to be held in the evening on May 15. It was also intended to rebuild the relationships Harbury had established under the linked parishes' scheme.

In spite of the heavy drain of fabric and fittings repair and maintenance on its limited resources the PCC is determined to continue its traditional outreach role. It is to send a total of £1,000 in amounts ranging from £50 to £200 to the Church Army, CMS, USPG, St. Luke's Hospital for the Clergy, SPCK, Missions to Seamen, Myton Hospice, IPWG, Leamington Christian Mission, and the YMCA. During the year retiring collections raised £250 each for the Church of England Children's Society and the British Legion.

On April 5th, we entertained a group of children from Coventry. At Pineham Farm, Mrs. Orfeur kindly showed us the sheep with their new lambs (as shown in the photograph on the following page) and answered all our questions. We then had games and tea in the Village Hall.

Five members took part in a special I.Y.F. service in Coventry Cathedral on April 16th. Parts of the service will be broadcast in Sept. by the BBC on Songs of Praise.

Our speaker on May 4th will be Mrs. D.Myring on "Light". The evening speaker on May 17th will be Charles Catt with an illustrated talk on wild flowers "Lilies of the Field".

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
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#### LADBROKE PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The April meeting took place on Wed. 20th. There was a lot of discussion about the difficulty in gaining access across the bypass at Windmill Lane. The fence where able bodied pedestrians climb over, has been vandalised and someone has filled in the missing planks in a most Heath Robinson fashion, giving the general appearance of a shanty town. As the well known local celebrity Nellie the Goat is standing guard with horns at the ready for anything that moves, there is little point in trying to go for a peaceful country walk in that direction. I have been writing about this situation for eight years now, and as far as I can see a solution is further away than ever. The Warwickshire County Council Representative is unable to take any further action and is passing the matter on to another department.

A large number of people from Ladbroke would like to be able to walk up Windmill Lane, and enjoy the magnificent views over the local country side. The landowners who could facilitate this endeavour, do not feel at the moment able to oblige in putting a gate in the fence; so unless you are able to climb over stiles, the only alternative for the foreseeable future is to walk along the edge of the Bypass, a hazardous and unpleasant experience, especially for the elderly and for those with children. The PC have discussed this issue every month without fail. It will be kept on the agenda and I will inform you if there is any change in this sad situation.

A Building Control Inspector has been back to examine the leaning barn next to Village Farm and now thinks it is not really safe and he is going to contact Mr. Carroll the owner.

The Council were very dismayed to hear news of both a car and caravan theft in the village.

A site meeting had been held at Manor Farm to look at plans for a barn conversion. No objections were raised, though the access to the site did seem to be a matter of dispute.

Mr. Geoff Timms reported that the footpath volunteers had been out working on the path at Chapel Ascote across New Farm. The District Council have changed contractors for refuse collection, and they will start work in August. Each household will be allotted two sacks. It was felt that village pavements were seriously overgrown in places with dead leaves blocking the paths. It was not known if they should be covered by street cleaning services or if the owners were responsible. The Clerk is to investigate.

The Village Hall Committee has decided to change the ownership status of the Hall and have informed the PC that they hope ownership will pass to the Charity Commission. They hope that a representative from each of the voluntary organisations in the village, will serve on the new committee.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on Wed. 18th May at 7pm. This will be followed by the Annual General Meeting at 8pm. This is the occasion when Ladbroke residents often turn out in force to make their views heard and I hope to see you there.

Could I conclude by saying that I have been writing these reports for fourteen years and would dearly love to be allowed a rest. There must be someone out there who would enjoy attending the monthly meetings at least on an occasional basis, they really can be most entertaining. Ring me!

#### THE HARBURY AND LADBROKE CHURCH MEN'S SOCIETY

The Society met on 7th April and enjoyed a talk on yachting given by Terry Mills. Not only did he talk about the British Services Yacht Club at Kiel, having served in both the army and navy himself, but he gave us a history of the Baltic Area and explained how the natural environment takes care of the marine life. With maps that were displayed, he pointed out various locations including the Island of Anholt, where recently a German Submarine was raised which had been sunk by our aircraft on the last day of the 2nd World War. He pointed out the Great Naval Seaport of Kiel where the first usable submarine was built in 1906.

At Wilhelmshaven he said there stands a wonderful memorial for all sailors who lost their lives during two world wars, each of their ships being recorded by name and silhouette on the walls of the Great – Tower shaped like the bows of a mighty ship.

In 1945 the British Services came to Kiel after the German surrender to clear up a harbour that was 85% demolished. It is here the British Kiel Yacht Club is now, enjoyed by all three services from what were very small beginnings in 1955. It is now the best managed and organised club in the world, through which some 2000 of all ranks regularly take part in some form of adventure training yearly and where some gain advanced qualifications of the Royal Yachting Association.

The Harbury and Ladbroke Church Men's Society will meet again on 5th May to hear a talk given by Fr. Roy Brown, the Rector.

#### HARBURY SOCIETY

Following the AGM Biffa Wastes gave a presentation about Waste Disposal and their plans for the Ufton Hill Farm Landfill Site.

Ufton Hill Farm site began as a limestone quarry with only a thin strip of the stone removed. Peter Mann bought the site and obtained permission to fill the deepest part of the excavation with inert waste and then construction and skip wastes. The site was licensed for domestic, industrial and commercial wastes in 1992 and sold to Biffa. Conditions attached to the Planning Permission ensure that only 185 vehicles a day can be accepted.

There are two major problems associated with landfill, leachate and gas. To overcome these the rubbish has to be contained in cells lined and capped with clay to prevent seepage. This creates a honeycomb effect. When the area has been completely filled it is seeded and returned to agriculture.

Boreholes are constructed, within the site to check the levels of leachate and outside for monitoring purposes. Any gas build up is flared off, or on large sites used to generate electricity.

Planning permission and a Waste Management Licence are required before a landfill site can be set up and new legislation makes a Company responsible for the site for up to thirty years afterwards.

Because Ufton Hill had not previously been operated to modern standards when Biffa took it on they undertook extensive works to prevent methane and leachate migrating. Boreholes were constructed which reach the watertable and these are monitored monthly. Tipping is now on a proper containment basis.

The original tipping area will be returned to grassland, but the extension area (a hill and valley effect created by limestone extraction) now provides seasonal pools colonised by Great Crested Newts and these protected creatures will be rehoused in specially created pools later this summer.

The major concerns of Society members were the level of traffic which passes through the village, the danger on Butt Lane and at Station Road Corner and the mud on the road. Andrew Ives, the Site Manager, explained that Biffa has no control over the routing of the lorries, but he did agree to have the road up to the village swept once a month. He is always available on **614248** to deal with any problems and agreed to organise a visit to the site in the summer for Society members.

The Society wrote to the County Council with a request that lorries be routed away from the village and at the local liaison meeting on April 14th Parish Council Clerk, Alison Hodge was able to announce that traffic would be sent via the Southam Road and Ufton Hill.

Continuing the waste theme, the Society visited Minworth Sewage Works on 26th April and the next meeting will be a **Presentation** on **Recycling by the Chief Environmental Health Officer of Stratford District Council, Mr Alan Savery and the Recycling Officer Mr Dobson.** The talk, in the **Tom Hauley Room at 8pm on Tuesday 24th May** is our Environment Week effort. Do come along and hear what you can do to improve your environment and help Stratford District plan for a sustainable future for us all.

Our next recycling effort will be for the Carnival so please look out all your old crocks for us to sell there.

The Tennis Club (who do a splendid job staffing the refreshments in the Village Hall) have asked me to



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

#### MAY IN THE GARDEN

We have had such constantly difficult gardening weather this spring that I can only begin this months notes with "if conditions are normal" harden off bedding plants, sow annuals for succession and also biennials and perrenials in a seed bed. Polyanthus can be divided and replanted in a shady spot, to increase stock, as can Christmas roses. Keep perrenials well supported as they grow and quard against slugs. Plant out unsprouted Dahlia tubers and Chrysanthemums.

Plant up containers and hanging baskets and give a weekly feed when established. Don't hang baskets until the end of the month, when well settled. Watch out for frosts throughout the month and protect fruit blossom - keep potatoes well earthed up to protect them.

Continue spraying Apples and Gooseberries against mildew and Roses against blackspot.


Thin out Raspberry basal suckers to six inches apart as they grow and tie new Loganberry and Blackberry canes to one side for later training.

Sow for succession Salads, Carrots, Winter Brassicas and, midmonth, Runner and French Beans, either seed or hardened off plants. Make a final sowing of Peas and early variety such as Kelverdon Wonder resists mildew well.

Pinch out the tops of Broad Beans, as soon as the first beans have set, to discourage blackfly.

Towards the middle of the month begin to plant out Brussels Sprouts, Summer Cabbage, Cauliflower and Calabrese. Sow under cloches or set out hardened plants of Marrow, outdoor Cucumbers and Pumpkins.

Clip quick growing hedges, Privet or Lonicera, and deadhead Lilacs.



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

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


