


Advertising people are always working out new ways of 'reaching people'. Schemes are devised in order to catch people's attention and entice them towards some new product. And it works, sometimes people change the habits of a lifetime under the influence of a clever advertising campaign. People who believe in Christ are also concerned about reaching others. If you believe and value that belief, you will want to hand it on to those you love. You will also be anxious to share that belief with as many people as possible. But there is one thing that must always be remembered, it is Jesus who reaches people through us. Spreading the Gospel means living it so wholeheartedly that the good news that Jesus lives in you becomes good news for others. Jesus actually reaches out and touches others because you have allowed him to be alive in you. What we do is important, but what we allow God to do is infinitely more important. #### HARBURY & LADBROKE CHURCH Men's SOCIETY

The Society met on 6th October, for the first meeting of the 1994/95 period to hear a most interesting talk given by Mr. Ray Cooper entitled: The Mines Rescue Service. Ray was a miner, then a Mine's Safety Officer. A very dangerous job. He began his talk explaining how the seams were formed from trees in swamps millions of years ago that had become carbonised plant tissue and then formed into coal.

He then explained how coal was initially retrieved by digging individual shafts expanded out at the bottom. These were known as Bell Shaft Pits. Since then, shafts dug in mines have been dug out in twos or fours to form a ventilation circuit, allowing fresh air to be blown in and foul air to be driven out. To explain how the air flow is controlled, Ray drew diagrams. He told us how different gases can be identified and dealt with. In 1911 Henry Fluce developed a respirator that could be worn by a rescue worker and this too was explained in detail, with the aid of drawings.

Subsequent to this, air locks were added to the respirators and they became known as Air Selected Flow Type providing oxygen to the wearers whenever the body required it.

A Davy lamp was dismantled in order to explain its operation, showing how the flame is protected by a double gauze from coming into contact with firedamp, the miner's name for an explosive mixture of methane gas and air.

Ray concluded by saying, Mine Rescue Workers must have at least two years experience working underground before volunteering as a rescue worker. Volunteers must be tough, with a fitness second to none, as they are tested to their absolute limits dealing with unusual situations.

They must keep themselves, their equipment and station in tip top condition ar all times. Their equipment and training is continually under examination.

Davy Lamps are split down and inspected after every shift. This was an distributed that prompted many questions and was thoroughly enjoyed by



There was a meeting of Ladbroke Parish Council on Wednesday 21st October. The new road name signs were now in place, and would no doubt prove a great help for all those puzzled motorists, I frequently see peering at the Ladbroke History Map, outside the pub. Our local Police Constable commented that they would be a great help to the emergency services as well.

It was thought that the unsafe barnwall opposite School Lane, would need further demolition to make it safe, but that for Conservation reasons it would have to be rebuilt eventually.

The new 30 m.p.h. speed limit throughout the confines of the village should be in place by Christmas. The 20 m.p.h. signs on the dangerous bend would remain until they need replacing.

P.C. Andy Went reported that there had been yet another burglary at the "Bell Inn", all suspicious incidents should be reported to the Police as well as to your Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator.

#### HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Planning, planning and more planning this month attracted a room full of South Parade/Vicarage Lane residents anxious to have their say about the Bryant application for 37 houses at Sonas Mor.

Under Chairman, Ed Wilson's skilful direction the following points emerged:opposition to development of the site would fail (it had been identified in the
Local Plan as an area for some of the 9,000 new homes Stratford District had
been instructed to provide); however the Local Plan specified a "significant
proportion of low-cost homes here and only four were offered; access was a
legitimate concern as was the low water pressure; residents themselves
should complain about loss of privacy and press for adequate fencing and
planting, supported by the PC; designs were unsuitable and suburban, did not
specify the affordable homes would be for rent, nor integrate them with the
other houses, which would be built first.

The Council secured an extension to the consultation and as always would try to get the best for Harbury as a whole. It agreed to support the provision of low-cost homes at Hillside Farm subject to clarification and assurances that rents would be kept within £52-56 a week.

It expressed dissatisfaction with enforcement procedures at the Old Forge where revised plans had been submitted only after work was completed. Enforcement was delayed at Deppers Bridge where the Post Office had been unable to deliver the Notice to Mr Heath. Stratford Officers would visit No. 2 Farley Avenue in case Planning Permission was required. The PC would monitor Bretherens Farm developments.

Steve Norman costed work on the Recreation Grounds to pave and fence the access to the Play Area, repair the kick-about tarmac, and provide an aerial runway.

All roads into the village will be on the Gritting list this winter. No decision was reached on removing the Tip direction signs at Beggars Lane.

The VAT man has refused to reimburse the tax element of the Village Hall roof payments but the shower work should not be affected as this is funded by a Parish Council grant. John Hunt has examined Audit Commission guidelines and reported that Harbury was doing just about everything by the book and could give itself "a big tick".

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
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#### K. ZONE



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
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#### HARBURY SUPPORT GROUP FOR MYTON HOSPICE

#### VILLAGE HALL HEDGE PLANTING

There have been several references in recent months in 'The News' about exchanges of land and hedge planting schemes around the Village Hall. In case it is not entirely clear what all this is about may I explain before the work begins.

The exchange of land has been brought about by the need for the Village Hall Management Committee to give up a strip of land at the playground side of the Hall in exchange for the Parish Council owned strip at the rear of the Hall. This will provide more convenient and safer access to the new children's playground and also provide a longer mustering area in the event of a fire at the Hall.

These changes will, at last, mean that the dilapidated chain link fence can be removed. It is, however, incumbent on both the Council and the Management Committee to maintain a physical boundary delineating the two

ownership's. This will be provided in the form of a hedge on the two new-boundaries.

The British Trust for Conservation Volunteers is offering its expertise and assistance in planting the boundary hedge. The Trust has suggested, for visual and wildlife reasons, a hedge of mixed species including hawthorn, blackthorn, field maple, hazel, holly, Guelder and dog rose.

This work is an ideal way to involve local volunteers and is eligible for Rural Action Grant aid. The volunteers will be fully trained by the Trust Officers.

If you feel like helping with this project in any way such as digging, planting, providing refreshments or recording work photographically, please come along to the Village Hall on 12th, 13th and 19th November and 3rd December. Further information can be obtained from me.

#### **BOSNIA AND CROATIA CHRISTMAS APPEAL**

As you probably saw in the last issue, a Christmas delivery of food and other essentials to displaced children and families in Bosnia and Croatia is being organised in the village, in conjunction with the London Ambulance Service (who organise the lorries etc).

Although the level of fighting has been reduced in the region, there are still thousands of displaced families and children living in refugee camps and

orphanages. Their homes have either been destroyed or are now in areas barred to them and so they live from day to day in miserable conditions hoping that one day they can return to some kind of normality.

Lynne Edwards of the L.A.S. who has been on several lorry convoys told me that several of the orphanages she visits are still partially in ruins whilst they share with the refugee camps an appallingly low level of sanitation and heating. These are people who until recently lived in warm, clean houses in a relatively advanced infrastructure of water, sewerage and other public utilities. It would be nice to think that we can at least make their Christmas a little happier with some nice food and some simple hygiene items that we take for granted in the UK.

### NOVEMBER IN THE GARDEN

Helped by a splendid Indian Summer the Autumn work in most gardens is probably well forwarded, an advantage as this is the big digging and planting month, ideal for planting all deciduous trees and shrubs including fruit and roses.

If planting from containers check that they are really damp before planting.

Late in the month check that the ties and stakes of recently planted trees and shrubs are firm, so that there is no rocking of the base. Movement in upper stems is desirable, so stakes should be short and stout.

Protect newly planted or tender evergreens against cold drying winds with mesh or bubble plastic and with straw or bark around the base.

When digging get the ground intended for sprouts, onions and potatoes completed early - they like firm soil.

The last of the bulbs, tulips, should go in this month, also plant, or replant, Lily of the Valley.

Take hardwood cuttings of Box, Weigela and Winter Jasmine.

Lift stock plants of early Chrysanths and plant under glass. Keep Brassicas clear of dead and faded leaves and remove 'blown' sprout buttons as both encourage pests and diseases.

Check stored fruit and vegetables for any rot.

Begin pruning apples, pears, gooseberries and red currants. Start feeding the birds early in the month, so that they are using the feeders well before any really severe weather. They will repay you by clearing up any garden pests while waiting their turn at the feeders.

Don't forget to clean oil and check over the lawn mower early this year.

There were 5 people who got 19 out of 20 correct, from which one was drawn as the winner. Congratulations to all of them and thanks once again to all the others who took part.

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


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
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


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


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
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
