#### FROM THE RECTOR

Every one of us is alone at times, but there are two kinds of being alone: loneliness and solitude, and each is quite different from the other. In loneliness we feel cut off from everyone and everything, and it can be a condition of despair. In the 25th Psalm we read, Turn thou to me and be gracious; for I am lonely and afflicted. We have all experienced this kind of feeling at one time or another and sometimes loneliness can be unbearable. Even Jesus knew loneliness as His cry from the Cross shows. My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me? And earlier in the Garden of Gethsemane He felt the need of the support of His disciples and His disappointment at finding them asleep was clearly shown.

Solitude is a self imposed form of being alone. We deliberately withdraw from our surroundings to face our aloneness and somehow to gain strength from it. Sometimes it is needful for us to be alone, sometimes God forces us to be alone. The prophet Jeremiah said: I sit alone, because thy hand was

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upon me. Solitude was essential to Jesus at times, to commune with God, to recharge His batteries as it were. One needs solitude at times to be able to pray and this is one of the benefits of a Quiet Day. Loneliness and solitude have nothing to do with the number of people around us, we can be terribly lonely in a crowd and equally we can withdraw into the innermost recesses of our mind and find solitude. But however lonely we may feel there is one who understands because He knew loneliness too.

#### WINDERS CLOCK-OFF

Scaffolding on the church tower which went up last month signalled the start of essential restoration work which can now be afforded because of the success of the year of R.O.C. appeal events. The damaged fall-pipe is to be renewed, trees growing out of the masonry are to be removed, and the clock face is to be replaced after restoration and mechanisation of the works. This ends 201 years of daily manual clock-winding -- something like 73,360 windings, give or take a few when it has been out of order. Principal clock-winders in the second half of this century have included the late Tom Hauley, Harry Windsor and Peter Pryke. Work is also about to begin on reassembling the restored pipe organ.

In an encouraging report from the Corporate Prayer Group steering committee at the September meeting of the Parochial Church Council, Lesley Jones said it was hoped to start the group on Tuesday November 15. It will meet monthly for approximately 30 minutes, have a simple structure, and will follow the regular Tuesday evening communion service. The intention is that it should encompass all existing groups within the church together with people from other denominations. Its purpose is to cover in prayer the life and witness of the church in Harbury.

Unfortunately so far there has been no response to the appeal made in the summer by the Crusaders for someone to fill the vacancy for a leader. It is hoped that this reminder after the holidays will end the wait for a volunteer.

Leaders Sue and Keith Dormer (Tel: 613254) will explain what is involved. But the good news is that Brian Jones has agreed to take on the administrative work of the Crusaders. The opportunity now being given to children attending Crusaders to join the mainstream of the congregation in church for a blessing during communion was warmly welcomed by the PCC.

The Church Youth Group for the 12 to 16-plus age group has been relaunched as a coffee shop, leader Dorothy Travis reported. It is held every Sunday evening in term time and meets in the Tom Hauley Room from 7.30pm. New members can expect a big welcome.

The Wednesday morning *Grapevine* gathering for coffee in the Tom Hauley Room has now been running for three months and is proving exceedingly popular with older people. The hope is that with children back at school it will attract more young Mums. Men, of course, are equally welcome.

The Church Army is to be invited to lead a mission in Harbury and Ladbroke next year. The idea was welcomed by the PCC, and a sub-committee is to be formed to see the wheels in motion.

Nursery Rhymes will be the theme of this year's Church Christmas Fair, which will be held in the Village Hall on Saturday December 3.

#### HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL - SEPTEMBER

Doom and Gloom said Sharon Hancock reporting closure of the Youth Club through lack of leaders.

No better news from Cllr Thompson. Traffic calming measures near the School were unlikely and cuts to the Highways budget meant footpath improvements had been postponed. Cllrs had been fobbed off again and again. Paths were not so dangerous the elderly preferred to walk in the road.

Cllr Middleton complained the streets were untidy, to be told it was only a problem at harvest. The mechanical sweeper could not clear the straw from under parked cars. One of the hazards of living in a rural community, said Cllr Hunt, who was more worried by parking problems when the Church was in use. A less discrete sign to the Wight School car park would help.

The Mini-recycling centre had been sited at the Village Club, but Harbury missed out on the leaflet explaining the changes to the refuse collection service.

Cllrs were unhappy with the toothlessness of the District's policy on Dog Fouling which only prosecuted as a last resort.

Warwick District Chief Executive's championing of the Unitary Option in the Local Government Reorganisation Review had impressed Cllrs, but nevertheless they chose the Status Quo. WCC's Chief Exec. detailed improvements to services including integrated telephone switchboards and greater accessibility.

Cllr John Hunt recommended the Council give £150 to help the Rugby Club satisfy Fire Regulations. They had a thriving Mini Section and fund raised over £5,500 a year.

It was no surprise to the Council that following the second section of the Allotments competition *Curly* Pratt had been awarded the Cup.

The Parish Council was asked to reaffirm support for low-cost homes at Hillside Farm, but they wanted to see plans first.

Stratford approved Water Sports and a Clubhouse at the Quarries; a new bungalow next to Sussex Cottage with access from Vicarage Lane; changes to Old Well Cottage in Farm Street; a rear extension at 19 The Beeches and a garage at 18 Manor Road.

There was no objection from the PC to 10 cat houses at Lower Westfield's Bungalow, but there was still discontent with the Old Forge Site in Chapel Street.

The hoary old chestnut of the ownership of the Ivy Lane Cherry trees was raised. Everyone was clear that they were not the Parish's and the District denied responsibility, leaving it to the County or the residents themselves!

#### HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Your Council seems sick of change for change's sake, imposed from above. There was nothing wrong with the old refuse collection according to Sharon Hancock. We want more visible policing, said John Drinkwater, not impressed by the Police Charter. A local presence and a bobby in the village, agreed Ken Stephenson.

They wanted no change to local government. Relations with Stratford were good and cost was a compelling factor. We would suffer bigger school classes and fewer police. I don't need any more convincing, said Chairman Ed Wilson.

Sharon Hancock subscribed to the conspiracy theory. It was a plan to erode the power of local government and the people. It would just mean new logos and big offices for a few!

Recent public sector convert Ken Stephenson, worried about the social impact of job losses and Keith Thompson felt quality of service would deteriorate with smaller authorities. All agreed they were part of Harbury and Warwickshire and wanted to remain so

There was a similar reactionary reaction to Post Office privatisation. Cllrs saw cross-subsidy keeping the rural network viable but wanted commercial freedom within public ownership. There was much joy at Royal Mail news of a traditional pillar box for Farm Street.

The Cllrs welcomed Midge Keen in her wheelchair attending her first Council meeting since her accident.

Mr. Heath of Deppers had until 22nd Sept. to remove containers and reinstate his land. Stratford granted an extension at 3 Church Street. The Parish Council made no comment on plans for a mobile home at Model Farm; a two car garage at 18 Manor Road or a detached bungalow next to 11 Constance Drive.

They approved of plans for roof lights and a dormer at the Old Bakery, Chapel Street; suggested a fire door for a rear extension at 19 The Beeches and were concerned about the state of the garage at Old Well Cottage, Farm Street.

Amendments to plans for the old Forge were still causing concern and Clirs wondered if the windows and chimney were in the correct positions.

Ken Stephenson spoke to the District's Dog Warden about fouling and asked the Chief Executive how many people had been prosecuted. Some wag suggested the *Fido* bin had been broken by a St. Bernard cocking its leg!

Bad News: A fatal heart attack happens in Britain every three minutes.

Good News: You can take steps to prevent heart attacks happening to you and your family by:

- 1. Having a balanced diet.
- 2. Daily routine a little more activity.
- 3. Positive attitude will create a sense of well being and identity.

Too much fat in the diet increases the risk of heart disease so do cut down on the intake of fat. Eat more jacket potatoes, beans on toast, chicken, pasta, fish, vegetables, fruit, rice, bread, liver.

A drink, e.g. a pint of beer, or two glasses of wine in a day, should be the maximum not the minimum intake.

A brisk walk, say 20-30 minutes, three times a week will do wonders for your circulation.

Another month, another convoy. The situation in the refugee camps in Croatia and Bosnia, no longer a front page story, is nevertheless worse than ever. Peter Kingsley-Ducane, with the help of the London Ambulance

Service, has been working to alleviate the suffering of the refugees of all the communities month after month. Survival packs from all over England are collected in London and packed into lorries for the long journey overland to Zagreb. This year Harbury school children and their families have provided 28 of these, all of which were handed directly by the aid workers to individual refugee families.

The next major convoy will leave on **December 8th** to arrive before Christmas. Peter needs thousands of survival packs (see below), medical supplies and obsolete medical equipment for this journey. Will anyone help us to give a Christmas gift to the refugees?

We need complete, ready-packed and sealed boxes for the End of November. Families who feel that they cannot afford to fill an entire box might wish to join together with others to do so. A photograph of the family included in the box would add a much appreciated personal touch and a few festive ingredients would help to lighten the mood in the camps. Details of the packs are given below:

Foodstuff
Pasta and pulses
Coffee, tea and dried milk
Dried soups
Biscuits and chocolate
Sugar, salt and pepper
Tinned meat and fish
Tinned/dried veg and fruit
Cooking oil
Flour
Chocolate
Christmas pudding/cake

Boxes should be about the size of a Walkers crisp box, lined with a dustbin bag and as full as possible. Gaps tend to cause breakage. Seal the boxes securely with tape and mark on the outside the pack number (Survival Pack 1 or 2).

Next month we will give more details on how and when the completed boxes will be collected. Meanwhile, we are looking for people to help us organise this. If you would like to do this, please contact:

#### OCTOBER IN THE GARDEN

Tidy beds and borders, making sure they are clear of weeds. Plant out biennials. Plant or move herbaceous perennials during mild periods, when the ground is not waterlogged.

Containers, cleared of Summer Annuals and planted up with Hardy Ivy and Universal Pansies, the shade of the Ivy matched to the flowers, will give you something to enjoy in the darkest months.

Pile gravel snugly round Alpines to prevent them sitting in wet soil.

Pot up Fuchsia and Geranium cuttings and reduce water to Fuchsia bushes, to enforce dormancy. Cut back on watering and stop feeding houseplants, but protect them from the drying blast of central heating by standing in damp gravel.

Keep greenhouses and conservatories well ventilated to avoid grey mould. After the first frost cut down Dahlias, label or lift, storing stem downwards. Lift and dry out Gladioli.

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

Bare rooted ones planted now, will be cheaper than container grown plants bought in the Spring. Sow Winter Lettuce in a frame and plant out Spring Cabbage. Feed Brussels Sprouts and Winter Cabbage and remove yellowing leaves.

Now is the time to take hardwood cuttings of all shrubs, including Roses and Fruit bushes. Store unflawed Apples in wooden fruit or Tomato boxes. Pick all Tomatoes, even green ones, they will ripen on a window sill or wrapped in newspaper.

Keep the pond clear of leaves, give the lawn its final cut and a top dressing of sand and peat, or fine loam.

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
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
