




FROM THE RECTOR

How often have most of us, at one time or another, wondered why there is so much suffering in the world? Perhaps we ourselves have, or are, experiencing deep suffering of body, mind or spirit. Or perhaps we know someone else who is undergoing deep suffering of one sort or another. Our world, which should be so beautiful, is full of tragedy, suffering and agony. Why? we ask ourselves.

It is strange that when we are distressed we turn to the friend who knows what distress is like. We don't quite know why, but there doesn't seem much point in going for deep-down sympathy to those other friends whose paths have always been smooth. When it's our turn to be broken on the wheel we are aware only of the pain of the breaking, which can seem too great to survive.

It is like the moment Jesus faced in the Garden of Gethsemane. With fear He begged to be let off the agony that lay ahead of Him. <u>But</u> He added the words, "Your will be done". He may have used those words with difficulty, but they meant that He accepted and would be ready to use whatever was in store for Him.

That is a moment we all face at some time. In standing still, in the acceptance of the moment in all its loneliness, we can say to our God "for what it's worth - here it is. Take it and use it. Use it for the hungry, the homeless, the lonely. Use it to help me understand, to be less selfcentred and more loving". We may do so through clenched teeth, but one day we will find that all will be well, and we shall know what it is to be whole

LADBROKE PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

A Parish Council meeting was held in the Village Hall on 19th July with Councillor Geoff Timms in the Chair in the absence of Peter Williamson.

There is as yet no more progress to report about the gate at the lower end of Windmill Lane.

P.C. Andy Went reported no criminal activity in the month of June, but there have been some attempted burglaries in July.

The Council approved payments to the Village Hall, East Midlands Electricity and the painting of the village lamp-posts. This will all be paid out of money from the annual precept i.e. finance provided by Stratford District Council against requests from Ladbroke for specific funding.

Following official confirmation that the local inquiry into the appeal by Barclay Homes Plc is to be held on 23rd January 1996 the Council drafted a letter. This reiterated the Council's agreement in principle for the erection of ten homes including four integrated low cost houses, but noted the Council's deep concerns about the effects of increased traffic in Windmill Lane and the need for reinstatement of any grass verges damaged by construction vehicles. Geoff Timms informed us all that he and Alan Gould had managed to erect the fourth of six bridle gates required for people to access bridle path SM 92 from the by-pass at Chapel Ascot to Lower Radbourne.

The Council had officially complained to Severn Trent Water and Offwat about the lack of water and the lack of information at the beginning of the hot spell. No reply has yet been received from Severn Trent.

Finally we began looking forward four and a half years in case there needs to be forward planning for the Millenium Celebrations. Does anyone have any good ideas about this yet?

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held on September 20th at 7.45pm.

The idea of sentinel Oaks for the Millennium has caught the public imagination. Jerry Birkbeck will give a presentation on the Landscape



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
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
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GARDEN WALKABOUT 1995

GARDENING NOTES

August is the month to sit in the garden and admire the results of your work. Look around and make a few notes of what has been a success and what needs altering. This is also the time when many maturing plants set seed. Cut the seed heads when they begin to turn brown and hangs them to dry inside paper bags. In a few days separate the seeds from the debris and store them in labelled envelopes in a sealed container. Whilst the seeds from Fi hybrids may not come true most seeds collected from the garden will give good results. One well known Harbury gardener tells me he has not bought seeds for years and his results are stunning.

Many plants are showing the stress of the dry weather. Powdery mildew and rust are common problems in drought conditions. Remove and burn any affected leaves, keep the plants watered regularly and spray if you must with a fungicide.

Cut mint, chives, oregano and marjoram back to 6" high and there should be enough new growth to last well into the colder weather. Pot up a few of the herbs for the kitchen window sill to give fresh leaves throughout the winter. Many chopped herbs freeze well too.

Cut out fruited canes of raspberries and loganberries and tie in new strong canes.

Take cuttings from tender container plants, and from tender shrubs as insurance against winter losses.
