


#### FROM THE RECTOR

I read the following in a book written by Mother Teresa of Calcutta. It spoke to me and I would like to share it with you. It is a piece under the heading: Love Begins at Home.

If we listen to Jesus He will tell us what He said before: "Love one another, as I have loved you". Everybody today seems to be in a terrible rush, anxious for greater developments and greater riches and so on, so that children have little time for their parents. Parents have very little time for each other, and in the home begins the disruption of the peace of the world. People who really love each other fully and truly, are the happiest people in the world, and we see that with

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

#### **MOTHERS' UNION**

The Rev. Stephen Knight, the hospital chaplain, was the speaker at our afternoon meeting. He told us how God had healed him after a long illness and how he decided to go into the ministry. We were very interested to hear about his life in the ministry and his work as a chaplain, and hope to invite him again to tell us more about his work.

Since the meeting we've been sorry to hear that he is ill in hospital and hope that he will soon be well again.

Our evening speaker was Mrs. Val Murphy from Solace, (Service of Listening and Comfort Every night), a voluntary group but funded by the South Warwickshire Mental Health Services. She told us about their telephone service for people with stress, anxiety or depression. The volunteers can be contacted by telephone from 7pm to 7am every night and obviously have real concern and sympathy for people in mental distress

Seventeen of us attended the Deanery Festival Service at Bishops Tachbrook, led by the Rev. Roy Large. The theme was love and service and it was an enjoyable occasion.

#### **TODDLERS' SERVICE**

Mrs. Keir started our series on the weather by talking about the wind. We went outside and blew dandelion clocks to spread the seeds. Then we all blew bubbles. Mrs. Keir read a poem about the wind and we talked about the things the wind can do although we can't see it, just as God can do great things although we can't see Him.

We finished with the song: My God is so Big and a prayer. Next month's subject is the sun.

#### THE HARBURY AND LADBROKE CHURCH MEN'S SOCIETY

The Society met on 11th May to hear a talk given by John Eld about his visits to Portugal, Romania and Croatia. The talk was reinforced with slides. John first explained how he became involved with this type of work, which was basically because he felt he was called upon to do good. His wife supported him and gave him her blessing.

One day John met Richard Morton, who was looking for an able person capable of driving a very heavy goods vehicle with another driver to go to Portugal. After 24 hours considering all the problems that loomed, John said yes and found that with his faith these problems seemed to solve themselves. On his journey one of several fuel pipes supplying the engine fractured. His faith again held, as a spare pipe was found on board.

We saw slides of the vehicle, showing the repair being carried out. Further on a tyre on the twin wheeled back axle went down. There were two spare tyres on board, so the tyre was changed.

This took a good deal of time which put them behind schedule, therefore they had to sleep in the lorry in a layby and eat whatever they could find. The replaced tyre later gave trouble forcing them to use their only other spare.

John explained that like earlier problems these were overcome by faith and prayers.

On his journey to Romania he described similar problems, but his prayers were always answered. One problem was that of a particular engine part that failed when he was queueing at a border post. This faulty part could only be repaired by a skilled person. A few lorries behind there was a British lorry being driven by an ex R.E.M.E. soldier, qualified in heavy diesel engine maintenance, who ably executed a repair, enabling John's vehicle, loaded with vital humane supplies, to reach its destination. John spoke of many blessings, as well as the many friendships made with Romanians and particularly of Romanian hospitality.

Crossing borders too, caused difficultiess, because laws change and need to be complied with, such as the axle weights of loaded vehicles. In some cases the roads which had to be used, were often the very worst ones.

John told us of the current situation in Romania, the cost of living, the average monthly income, etc. We also saw slides showing the damage and suffering on the border or battle line between Croatia and Serbia. This was sad. It was a very enlightening talk, which prompted many questions and was much enjoyed by those present.

# REPORT OF THE LADBROKE AGM OF THE PARISH COUNCIL, held on Wednesday 17th May 1995

At the Parish Council meeting, Councillor Peter Williamson was reelected as Chairman and Councillor Timms as Vice-Chairman. The Committee met new District Councillor, Mr. Jim Taylor, who accompanied District Councillor Geraint Morgan.

Planning applications which had been granted, included the erection of 4 loose boxes and associated buildings in the field on the edge of the Bypass and an extension to Woodlands Farm, Windmill Lane. The development of two dwellings from the barns next to Village Farm is to go ahead.

The application by Barclay Homes to build 15 dwellings in Hedges Field is now the subject of a local enquiry. No date has yet been set, but any observation for or against the proposal, may be made to the Department of the Environment, Room 10-04, Tollgate House, Houlton Street, Bristol, BS2 9DJ, quoting reference S92/1274.

Villagers were delighted to learn that we are a stage closer to getting a gate from Windmill Lane across the By-pass. Thanks go to Mrs. Shaw, who has allowed the use of a strip of her land for this purpose. Legal aspects have yet to be instigated.

All households in Ladbroke will by now have received the Village Appraisal Book and Directory update. Funded by the Rural Community Council and the Parish Council, the inspiration has been from Marion Grainger and the editorial committee, headed by Kip Warr

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Wednesday 21st June at 7.45pm.

#### REPORT OF LADBROKE ANNUAL VILLAGE MEETING

The meeting, chaired by Parish Council Chairman, Peter Williamson, followed the Parish Council AGM.

P.C. Andy Went reviewed the level of crime in Ladbroke. We can all sleep reasonably soundly, as there were only three burglaries from dwellings last year. It was explained that the village is divided, for the

purpose of the Neighbourhood Watch, so that responsibility for Windmill Lane and the associated area of Banbury Road falls to Nigel Elkins; Bridge Lane to Kip Warr; Ladbroke Hall to Cyril Spence and the remainder to Francis Badman. Let your N.W. Co-ordinator know if you are going away.

Having demonstrated a healthy balance in the accounts, Parish Clerk Elsa Greenway invited written applications for ideas to enhance the village (she gave the examples of a duck pond or a large flag-pole).

For the Alibone Trust, Terence Sullivan explained how the ecclesiastical and non-ecclesiastical accounts were made up. Income is derived from rent for fields in Radbourne Lane. Monies have been used to fund new steps for the Village Hall and as a gift to the Church.

Geoff Timms and a few stalwarts have been making steady progress opening up the footpaths which are now nearly all equipped with gates and stiles. Bill Veale, a great helper, who has now left the village, will be sadly missed. All that is needed to complete the job is a few more volunteers. Watch the board or ring Geoff for dates.

Perhaps this has improved the access to the church as Father Roy noted the increase in communicants last year, especially at the monthly family service, which is followed by coffee and biscuits. The reports from the W.I., Village Hall committee, Women's Fellowship, Bell-ringers and Friends of Ladbroke Church, echoed similar themes: wonderful fund raising efforts, lots of fun and some work. New members are always welcome and appreciated, especially people new to the village. See your village directory for contact names. As scribe, I am particularly impressed in the number and variety of activities available in our small village.

Under any other business, Alan Gould questioned the reasons for the proposed removal of the Dangerous Bend sign. This prompted a general discussion on road safety in the village.



#### ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

A select audience was present at the Annual Parish Meeting to hear Councillors praise the work and dedication of the past Chairman Ed Wilson.

In his absence, Ken Stephenson read the Chairman's report, which highlighted the achievements of the various sub-Committees and thanked all his colleagues, in particular John Drinkwater, the ex Planning Chairman and Midge Keen of Lighting, who was retiring. Ed stressed that there were two major areas outside the Council's control, which caused concern and frustration - the cuts in funding for schools and the police.

The guest speaker at the APM was Gerry Bailey, Headmaster of Harbury School, who explained the enormous difficulties he, his staff and the Governors laboured under due to the underfunding and uncertainty about their budget. He thanked the Parish Council for their continued support. It boosted morale to know that someone cared.

Local financial management of Schools was excellent in principle, but Government Capping of the County meant there was not enough money. The School now paid for services it once received free, so although initially its allocation had increased, so had its costs.

Warwickshire had a thousand more children to educate this year (costing £1 million) and coupled with inflation and the teachers pay award of 2.7%, this meant more money was needed. Harbury would suffer further financial hardship, because the re-organisation would take away the top class and the more generous funding that went with this age group. This would also increase the number of *surplus* places at the school.

Harbury was judged to have a capacity of 283. 217 were on the roll at present; pupil teacher ratio was 28:1 and by September eight classes would have eight teachers with no extra help to cover.

It was spiritually good to know people care. Rather than fund raise for

the school, people could use their influence, writing to the Minister and their MP and supporting FACE, (Fight Against Cuts in Education), Mr. Bailey suggested.

He went on to explain how the School was working towards opening up its premises and facilities to the community. Maggie Robinson's survey had been a start and provided them with an Action Plan. Young people expressed a desire to play football and now had two thriving and winning youth teams, very well supported by parents. The Swimming Pool was open for lessons to the public, the Youth Club had held arts and music workshops and a range of Adult Education Courses are being developed. Budget difficulties were important, but the children were central to the school. It was an active school becoming better used by the community.

Following a sincere vote of thanks to Mr. Bailey from Keith Thompson, the meeting received reports from the sub-Committee.

The Planning Committee praised the innovation of Area Planning Committees with open meetings, which was bringing decision making closer to the people. Two large developments had been granted at Sonas Mor and Hillside Farm, which whilst they promised some affordable homes would still increase the number of expensive four bedroomed houses in Harbury.

The Properties Committee thanked Hopscotch for the donation of £4,997 towards a replacement for the cabin slide and the £2,600 for equipment for older children. An aerial runway had been installed and the hard-play area repaired. Other improvements were planned including: basket ball stand; junior goalposts; drainage; footpaths and two barbecues. The problem of access to the new children's play area had been solved by a land swop with the Village Hall.

The Highways Working Party continued to be concerned about traffic speed; dangerous accesses, particularly at the Scrapyard on Harbury Lane and parked vehicles. Mr. Ray Carter wanted a lay-by on Binswood End Green, but Councillors were loath to reduce the size of this amenity area.

Councillor John Hunt reported the Parish Council supported several village voluntary organisations: £1,315 to the Harbury News for DTP; £1,600 for the Church Clock; £4,085 towards Village Hall improvements; £120 for the Summer Playscheme; £150 each to the

Rugby and Cricket Clubs and £50 for Hereburgh Morris, as well as the funding of subsidised travel for the elderly.

For the Village Hall, Brian Ingram presented a report detailing what had been achieved and was congratulated by the Council for the sound financial footing which had been created and the continuing improvements being made.

#### HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

John Woodward, as the new boy, is still keen to slay dragons. He wanted more time to consider Planning Applications (but SDC has to determine them in 8 weeks); he spotted reconstituted stone being used in Binswood End, and he had been surveying the street signs for refurbishment.

He is still enthusiastic despite some set-backs and he has a cutting turn of phrase - a complex, killjoy, information sheet on the bureaucratic process for licensing VE Day Celebrations, provoked the declaration that's what the WAR was all about!

Clir. Keen, who is retiring from the PC, was thanked for her dedicated work, particularly on the Lighting sub-committee and her last act was to help colleagues decide to reject sodium lamps as too suburban for Harbury.

Severn Trent's 8 week upgrade of our cast iron water mains is costing £250,000 and may entail closing Chapel St, Ivy Lane and Church Terrace. The County will repair the footways when they finish.

Flushed with success after extracting £10,000 for sewer easements on the Pound, Cllr. Middleton tackled East Midlands Electricity for a Wayleave there, but got slightly less financial reward (42p per 50 metres)! However, they did promise to underground some of the cables.

The Council was excited by Harbury Society's proposals to conduct a Landscape Audit and will join forces with them.

Ken Stephenson's delegation tactics backfired on him. He told Cllr. Hunt to ask the Scouts to help tidy Harbury for the Best Kept Village Competition and John suggested to them they liaise with - guess who - Ken Stephenson!

Plans for the Recreation Grounds have not found favour with all residents. Mrs. Sollis was particularly incensed by suggestions that the Tennis Club might erect a *Hut* on the Fields.

Other plans: SDC gave permission for: a weeping wall at Trice's Farm; a garage for the bungalow in Chapel Street; an extension at 30 Manor Orchard and a tennis court fence at Greenhill Farm.

Pressure from the parish caused District Councillors to ignore the advice of the Planners and refuse permission for flats on Dovehouse Autos' site.

Harbury made no representations on the following: extensions at Paddocks, Fosse way; Harbury Heath & Phoenix Houses; 1 & 9 Vicarage Lane; 14 & 19 Farm Street. They cited highways and environmental reservations to the renewal of Blue Circles plans for the Quarries.

Note: All these items are well documented in the unapproved minutes of the council lodged at the library.

The County continues to encourage the Parish to reserve a portion of Pineham Farm for possible extensions to the Allotments, but the Councillors reiterated their opposition to building affordable homes in Pineham Avenue.

The financial difficulties of the past months have been partly overcome. The Youth Club with serious fund raising and more money from the County, is managing at present with volunteers and a paid part timer and hopes to find a qualified leader in September.

Southam School has received £28,000 from WCC contingency fund and a £20,000 loan, which has averted disaster, Cllr Hunt said, but would still make life difficult. Cllr Hancock took issue with Ken Stephenson's optimistic view of the school's future. Budgets had been cut to the bone and maintenance cut so that great problems were being stored up for the future.

John Hunt made a point of stressing that the 41 OAPs with unredeemed travel vouchers could still use them up to the end of July. He thought the savings (tokens cost £1,200 compared to only £657 spent so far on vouchers) vindicated the changes the Parish had made.

District Cllr Cooley announced that SDC would be introducing an OAPs' travel subsidy soon and might ask the PC to administer it.

#### HARBURY SOCIETY

We have some lovely things for our Second-hand Stall at the Carnival this year and intend to concentrate on Quality not Quantity. So make sure you come along or you will miss the bargains!

No-one will be knocking on your door, but if you do have anything musical, or if you have china or jewellery to donate, you can leave it in my garage at 16 Farm Street, or call me (612792) and I will collect it.

Having received such a good response to our idea of Sentinel Oaks for the Millennium, we are undertaking a Landscape Audit of the village on Sunday 18th June, starting from the Old New Inn Green at 10.30am.

Anyone who is interested in Landscape Enhancement and Environmental Improvement is very welcome to join us and add their views. The Landscape Architect, who is helping us will give a presentation later in the year of how he thinks improvements could be realised.

The Best Kept Village Competition is upon us. It is a good excuse to look again at Harbury and try to clear up a few blackspots. Neville Ellis suggests that if everyone took the trouble to remove the weeds from the edge of their frontage (and NOT spray them off with weed-killer), a vast improvement would result.

We need volunteers to help man Chesterton Windmill for the Open Days on 16 & 17 September again. Anyone who is interested should tell Linda Ridgley, 16 Farm Street, Harbury 612792 and she will find them a task for one of the sessions.

The junior section of the club continues to go from strength to strength, with both juniors (under 13, 14 and 16) and minis (under 8 - 12) enjoying excellent seasons. The minis concluded their season by winning the 6 club Leamington festival, a result not appreciated by the host club!

The major challenge currently facing the senior club is to build on the junior section success - if a high proportion of these younger players work through to the senior club, the future will be rosy.

## MEMORIES OF V.E. DAY

There were a number of street parties to celebrate Victory in Europe Day 1945 of Harbury.

The village was much smaller then. The Mill Street party scene was photographed by the late Mr. Sid Knight, using a box brownie camera. Sid worked in the Co-Op Office alongside Mr. & Mrs. John Honiwell. Mr. Knight was an artistic man, who would make posters for village events, etc.



In the picture sporting a fine beard, is Mr. Toby Burton with his brother Nathan. They lived at Kingston House. The Stonehouse is on the left,

then the Co-Op, Bakery & Shop and at the end of the street, the Dog. Inn.

Among the people in the photo is school teacher Miss May Bird. Toby
Burton owned an old Armstrong Siddeley car with a trailer. He attended local cattle markets and traded in live stock.

Mrs. Knight, now 80 years young, who kindly supplied the negatives, still has her husband's box camera. She recalls that afterwards there was dancing in the street and Mr. Roy Turner provided the music.

Mr. & Mrs. Knight and their children lived in a cottage at the Mill Street - Chapel Street junction, where there used to be a row of cottages, which were demolished around 1961/62.

#### WARTIME MEMORIES

My wife and I were bombed out of Coventry and went to live in Bishops Tachbrook when we were expecting our first child. I was told by the Merchant Service Pool that I might have to go back to sea where I had been for years as there was a terrible shortage of trained seamen, owing to the thousands of ships that had been lost.

I found myself on the *Pool* in London and was sent up to Liverpool to the *Cressington Court* owned by Halden & Philips of London. I was signed on as a Quartermaster and assigned to the wheelhouse with 3 others. We did all the steering and soon discovered that many of the crew had never been to sea before, as they had joined to avoid the services!

We crossed the Atlantic and loaded a huge cargo in Philadelphia and then set off South. We were really meant to put into port at Durban with a stop for fuel at Capetown, but it wasn't to be. At 4am two weeks later, we got hit by two torpedoes and had to abandon ship. One lifeboat got away from what had been a crew of 75. We found that some of the supplies had been pilfered and we only had 8 gallons of water aboard and so for the next 25 days we struggled on by taking turns to row using the Lugsail to catch any breeze there might be. We even caught and filleted a young shark, which kept banging the boat with its tail. We cut the liver

out of it and shared it round, although it was not very palatable, but then we were ready to eat anything.

On the morning of the 25th day at approx. 8am, George Delamare, a man from Guernsey, suddenly cried out: There's a ship over there! Sure enough, a big tanker was slowing down and getting ready to pick up up.

We were overjoyed thinking our troubles were over, But NO! - 12 hours later we were torpedoed again! The Submarine surfaced and opened fire on us, killing more of those who had suffered all this hardship for nothing. We reached dry land shortly at *Port of Spain*.

In Trinidad we were very well looked after. A few weeks later we were sent to New York to await transport home. After some leave I had to leave my wife and little boy, who by this time was growing fast as it was nearly 12 months since I had seen him.

When I got back to the *Pool*, much to my surprise, I was discharged on medical grounds. Needless to add, I was able to watch my family, now 3 boys, grow up into fine young men. When I got home after my wartime experiences, I found that my wife's allowance had been stopped from the date of being shipwrecked till the time I was discovered to be alive.

Open Event. Learnington Cycling and Athletic Club are running an invitation time-trial race for anybody from 12 years old and upwards on 28th June at 7.15pm - distance approx. 4 miles. ## Looking after your children's eyes

A full examination of your child's eyes should be carried out at least once a year as part of the family's routine health care, particularly if other members of the family have eye problems. A full sight examination will provide you with expert advice and a free ongoing service if you return to the same optician.

### **GARDENING NOTES**

Now that the threat of frost has passed, summer bedding and young vegetable plants can be put in. Water well in the trays and fill the planting hole with water too to allow the roots to spread and settle. Hoe regularly to destroy weed seedlings. Deadhead any early flowering perennials to get a second flush and prevent self seeding.

Sow candytuft, clarkia and cornflowers to fill border gaps. Sow next Spring's biennials, e.g. wallflowers and sweet williams.

Give winter flowering house plants a rest in a cool part of the garden. Some shrubs can be propagated from 4-6 inch cuttings of the new growth. For quick results try putting them in a plant pot containing a mixture of compost and sand. Water well, then cover the pot with a plastic bag to keep in the moisture. The roots should grow in about a month. A 50% success rate is good.

Finish cutting asparagus and rhubarb by the end of the month. Cut off runners on strawberry plants unless you want them to replace old plants. Water and feed plants regularly, especially those in containers or newly planted ones. Plants producing crops of fruit or seeds, e.g. peas, need plenty of water after flowering.

Wire coat-hangers can be cut to length with a hook at the top to fit round a stem to make a plant stake.

I lived in Harbury for many years and my friend and one time neighbour keeps your magazines for me. I still read them all through. I read a letter by Mrs. Enefer and I do sympathise with her. On my recent visit, I was so saddened that the *Smithy* had gone. I can still hear the sound of Sid's hammer. We lived right opposite, you see, and my youngest son could often be found there.

So many differences since we were there, Mrs. Treens' little shop just below, and further down Chapel Street, we spent our sweet coupons at Bayliss's, and Mr. Bayliss used to walk round with a tray suspended in front of him selling oranges. Up the Terrace lived Mr. French, *Topper* as he was known, and he delivered newspapers. He had a large tin sign on his house with News of the World on it. I have a snapshot of that. Then Thornicrofts bakery was always ready to cook for us. Bob's grandfather came over for his 1/2 pint of beer on the dot of 10am and at 6pm on the dot, to my uncle's pub, The New Inn, as I shall always remember it, not the silly name it now wears.

A row of cottages stood just down Mill Street, and Frank Fletcher lived in one and cut men's hair. On the corner was Alcocks, the butcher's, Stan Smith next, the shoe mender, and next again Birds another butcher. Opposite them the Co-Op and down the lane the mill. That is a real

landmark of Harbury.

I have snaps taken from the top. I visited Harbury every year as a chilchen went there to live in 1940.

The big school was then opposite the Co-Op coalyard. Messers' shonext, where we spent our pennies on sweets, and I can remembe markets in the Bullring. I was often sent up to the Top Shop by my aunt (who now has the Post Office). Aunty said the cheese from there was the best.

Of course Mrs. Cooper then kept the P/O across the road from Alcocks—Down Binswood End, Mrs. Boynton also had a lovely little shop and in Farm Street there was another Thornicrofts. On towards the Old New Inn, there was a large pond where we could slide when it froze over in winter.

Sadly, so many of these things have gone for ever, but if you print this it may jog a few memories.
