


FROM THE RECTOR

We are now into the season of Lent and I want you to consider our commitment to attendance and participation at Holy Communion. (Our Worship.) - and I will be using the analogy of the rugby supporter.

The rugby fan is in heaven! His team has just scored the vital try. The Pilkington Cup is theirs. For a brief fantastic moment he is lifted out of his everyday life to magical joyful unity with his team, the other fans, the coach and the club. They are all *in the clouds* together. Even when our enthusiastic fan is back on his daily treadmill, the sight of the club colours or a fellow supporter will rekindle the glow he carries from his experience of being present on that day. Is that how we felt about Communion on Sunday or during the week?

A Gallup poll would surely record a heavily negative response from the replies. No doubt a sizeable number would have also found the question offensive if not sacrilegious - comparing Holy Communion with a rugby match!

Of course in terms of visible actions the two are poles apart. We Christians are not dealing in simply material, wordly activities; we are in the salvation business. Eternal life has more permanent mileage than the Pilkington Cup so we take it more seriously, but this must not blind us to our weak spots. We can learn so much from those around us and one of our weak spots is surely each other when it comes to liturgy and communion in the Lord. For the rugby fan, the other people, the players, fellow supporters and t club are what makes his experience *heaven*. Between us and the Heaver we seek, the fly in the ointment is - people. Imagine having to spereternity with certain fellow parishioners! You can't? Well in understandable or is it?

Consider for a moment, Jesus. He spent his life amongst the sweaty, dust crowd. He drew around him all sorts of people with very differin attitudes and lifestyles and then he fashioned a community based omutual love and commitment. Certainly he had his moments of private personal prayer, but his people - (his Church), was formed like a beautifipiece of jewellery; a variety of stones, settings and cuttings all linked anmade one in a frame of gold - love for each other experienced in their coming together with the Lord.

Our Communion is the vital part of our life of faith precisely because it is where we become one with our Heavenly Father and through His Som Jesus Christ. To try to keep parts of ourselves separate is as foolish as trying to be a rugby fan without talking about it to anyone, watching a match reluctantly and hiding our supporters scarf under our coat. It is much more than foolish because the Communion isn't something we watch as a spectator sport. If we do not play our part fully and become open to each other at Communion we have no business calling ourselves Christians, for we are putting our personal priorities above those of Jesus. And it is no wonder that we fail to find the joy in Christianity that it offers.

We don't have to be simply supporters, we have an invitation to join the team! So let's do so!

PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

There was an important message for Harbury parents from the Parochial Church Council on February 7. Failure to find replacement leaders for Crusaders, which forced the group's disbandment is concentrating minds on the future of the parish church's work among children. A half-day open forum is being planned for the near future, hopefully with input from many sources, especially parents and representatives of the Church Army's 1995 Harbury-Ladbroke mission team. Proposals are certain to include revival of the traditional type of Sunday school for children up to 10, and teaching for older children with a special emphasis on preparation for confirmation.

Members expressed concern and sympathy for the Church Youth Group leader, whose car was damaged by one of a group of interlopers who having been made welcome had subsequently to be barred for disruptive behaviour. Repairs to the car are costing £258. The insurers insisted on involvement of the police who traced the youth. His father has promised to pay the £100 insurance claim excess.

The number of clergy in Southam deanery may have to be reduced by up to a third over the next few years. This was the warning from a workshop on the future of ministry in the deanery which was attended by the Bishop of Warwick and our Archdeacon. A working party is to be set up to plan for the future. Parishes will have the opportunity to influence the drafting of the blueprint, which it is felt will have to provide for greater use of lay ministry. A national anti-pollution transport policy that hiked-up motor fuel tax to an unacceptable level would inconvenience villagers without adequate public transport far more than it would affect people in urban areas where air-pollution is worst. This is what Southam deanery synod has declared in a campaigning motion it has sent to the diocese. It wants the government to seek to achieve air-quality improvement without penalising rural communities.

It was a night of saying *thanks* - again and again. To our own House of Windsor (Harry and Joyce) for spearheading last year's appeal which raised more than £19,000 for restoration of the church roof, organ and clock; to Peter Pryke, now living in rural Shropshire, for many valuable roles, including deanery secretary, captain of bell ringers, and daily winder of the church clock until its recent mechanisation; to Sue and Keith Dormer for devotedly leading Crusaders from inception; and to Ken Hughes for once again master-minding the church Christmas Fair which raised £523 each for Harbury Scouts and the Church Army. Letters of appreciation are to go to Mary Shelley for her inspiration and leadership that produced the Hereburgh Quilt and more than £1,000 for the R.O.C. appeal, and to Neville Ellis for making a wooden case with glass observation door to protect the church clock mechanism, and a display cabinet for the handbells.

THE HARBURY AND LADBROKE CHURCH MEN'S SOCIETY

The Society met on 2nd February to hear a talk given by John Lambert on his visit to Shagarab refugee camp near Khartoum.

John said he had an intuition and a need to go one day to Africa. Being a Church Warden at Claverdon, he had to attend a church meeting where he met a lady who showed him an advert where a person was required to go to Khartoum, the capital of Sudan. He then gave us a brief history of Sudan under the Turks, then the Egyptians and finally the British under General Gordon, the Governor General until independence.

He said the current population is just over 27 million. 80% are Muslims and 10% are Christians and during the Pope's visit to Sudan about 4 million Christians turned out to see him. The Shagarab camp plays host to about 45,000 refugees who fled from various countries in the horn of

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Africa. John who works with Christian Outreach, together with other volunteers and Eritrean staff, who oversee mother and child health care. emergency feeding programmes, community health care and training. Doctors and nurses, as well as occupational therapists, rehabilitate disabled people in the camp. While there, John arranged the building of small mud huts within a walled compound, to house staff as well as providing buildings for refugees who had travelled many many miles and who were in need of urgent medical help from the nurses. Some refugees were so weak when they arrived they died before they could be treated. In temperatures of 120° in the shade a luxury was coconut matting supported on sticks which provided shade, from the sun. At one time, Cholera, Dysentery and Malaria broke out in the camp, Malaria was by far the biggest killer. John himself became seriously ill with Dysentery and fortunately a doctor arrived from another organization and was able to treat him. John told us of the cruel laws of this country. He showed us dried leaves and rocks he brought back with him. He demonstrated how the dress of the Sudanese was more appropriate in temperatures of 120° in the shade. He described a sand storm and a tropical rain storm. It was a most interesting talk and prompted many questions.

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
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at once, giving the impression of movement on the huge screen.

HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING for FEBRUARY

Our Parish Council has changed up into Passionate Protest from last month's moan mode.

Harbury School is looking at losing teachers and classroom helpers, reducing insurance, decorating, and furniture as well as the School Day to save £25,000. Southam Governors (£120,000 down) reckon they can't set a budget and voted to resign!

Alan Howarth pledged support, but wouldn't vote against the *financial* settlement to the PC's absolute disgust! The Ministry suggested the County make savings by reducing surplus school places (where have they been!)

Cllr Sharon Hancock said 23p/week for average Council Tax-payers would cover the shortfall and urged everyone to write supporting the School Governors. She teamed up with John Hunt protesting at CWR closure. Excellent coverage of rural problems would be submerged in BBC West Midlands. Protest they said to Nigel Chapman (!), Director Midland Regional Broadcasting, BBC Pebble Mill, Birmingham.

Cllr Hancock savaged John Woodward who foolishly declared there was no shortage of housing in Harbury: Look at all those for sale! It's homes to RENT we need! she explained. Cllrs are still hazy on the difference between allocated and exceptions sites (where only low-cost homes would be allowed), and were unenthusiastic about the County's offer to safeguard some Pineham Farm land to provide Allotments in case the present ones were developed for affordable housing.

Other Planning News: Stratford granted; extensions at 32 Vicarage Lane and Westbury House; new roof for the Pumping Station in Farley Ave and demolition of a shed at West End Cottage (in the Conservation Area so prior permission is needed).

The conversion at Bull Ring Farm has been withdrawn and the Inspector at the Appeal by John Moore said the retaining wall *damaged* the Conservation Area.

Bryant's Sonas Mor Application was passed with minor amendments, but John Woodward complained that excessive Highways requirement mean a mature hedge will be lost.

The PC told SDC it did not wish to see Dr Wilne's conifer cut as it forms part of a grouping visible from Temple End.

John Drinkwater retired as Planning Chairman in favour of Sharon Hancock, but promised to remain on the committee.

John Woodward's contention that Street Sweeping was inadequate was disproved by figures showing we'd had four sweeps and another that week, but John did have interesting news about ST plans for our water. Not only are they replacing mains, but intend to reverse the flow and pump water from Ladbroke Reservoir eventually rendering the Water Tower redundant.

John Woodward outlined possible improvements to the Playing Fields: Trim-track, drainage, paths, Basketball Court (Youth Club only want a net! said Sharon), Shelter (No!, from everyone).

John Woodward saw Police failure to sell empty village Police Houses as selfish (*they don't want to split money with WCC*) and John Drinkwater agreed that with £6 Million needed they should not sit on their assets!

The Clerk's protests are less passionate but remarkably effective. Remember she saved the Postboxes? Now her teeth are into BT. Stratford told them to desist putting up Telegraph Poles in the Conservation Areas without permission.

HARBURY SOCIETY

There were smiles and tears, laughter and astonishment from the audience watching the Pentabus production Against the Wind.

The action in this one woman play takes place in a splendidly chaotic shed where the widowed Eileen begins to impose her individuality on the half finished projects of her husband.

Only one actor on stage, but it was peopled with dozens: the evil Brummie Caravan Site owner; the son's second wife (from Solihull); policemen; social workers and the silent presence of the deceased George.

A wonderful evening's entertainment, followed an excellent supper produced calmly and efficiently by Celia Barrett and members of the Committee, for an audience lubricated by the alcohol dispensed by John Holden and Neville Ellis.

Our next event is the AGM on 20th March 7.30pm in the Tom Hauley Room followed by Celia' talk on *The Games Children Played* at 8pm.

HARBURY THEATRE GROUP

On February 14th 1895, the curtain went up in St. James' Theatre London, on a play that was to become on of the classics of the British Theatre.

The Importance of Being Earnest was the pinnacle of Oscar Wilde's career; although regarded as his greatest play, it was also his last. During the run of the play, Wilde was sentenced to two years penal servitude with hard labour. After his release, he spent the rest of his life in exile on the Continent, and died without writing any other work of note.

In happier times, Wilde sent the manuscript of his play to Sir George Alexander, the actor/manager of St. James' Theatre, who liked the work, but asked if it could be reduced from four to three acts to allow time for a *Curtain Raiser* (the B movie of the period). This 3 act version became the standard text that was performed over the next half century, leaving the original four act manuscript to be lost and forgotten.

However, in the 1950s a copy of the four act version was discovered that

had been published in Leipzig in 1903. From the German translation it was possible to reconstruct the original English version. The play was broadcast by the BBC in 1954 - the centenary of Wilde's birth. A contemporary dramatic critic commenting on the *lost scene* said: The *fun in the scene that Wilde deleted is better than any living playwright can* do.

Modern productions have tended to be of the 3 act version, mainly I suspect because the text is now out of copyright, and so no performance fee is payable.

So in celebration of the play's centenary, Harbury Theatre Group present the play in its original 4 act glory. It is a tribute to Wilde's genius that the play is as funny and pertinent today as when it was first written.

But more games have been won than lost and the team rally is beginning to gel into what we can call *Happy Harmonious Harbury*. Hooray!



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

HARBURY SURGERY GOES FUNDHOLDING

On the 1st of April, Harbury Surgery will be given a budget to cover costs of patients' treatment at various Hospitals. There will also be a separate budget for the cost of all the drugs prescribed. The Surgery felt it had to join this fundholding scheme as, at the moment, the District Health Authority pays for our Hospital patients and last year they simply ran out of money and stopped performing routine surgery 4 months before the end of the financial year. We hope that the budget we have been given will pay for patient treatment for the full year.

You the patients (clients), will continue to be referred to Hospitals (provider units) by your G.P. (purchaser). We hope that by joining the

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fundholding scheme, waiting times for outpatients and for surgical procedures will be shorter and the disadvantage will outweigh both the administrative burden on the Practice and our political objections to this scheme.

NATURE WATCH

GARDEN NOTES

The past month has truly been February fill dyke, although the mild temperatures have persuaded the plants and birds that Spring is almost here. Do not be tempted into doing any of the jobs which need warmer days, but do begin to feed plants as the new growth begins. Mulch the borders when the soil begins to warm up. This will reduce the germination of annual weeds but perennial ones will still need to be dug out. Water loss by evaporation from the soil surface will be reduced, and low growing leaves and flowers will be kept clean. The mulch will also help to protect plant roots from extreme cold or heat, and so it is very useful around Clematis. It is best to leave 2 or 3" free around the base of plants in case the mulch contains any preservative or pesticide residues.

Watch out for slugs around Delphiniums and Hostas as they emerge. Surround them with a 4" collar cut from a plastic bottle. Slug pellets could be causing the decline in numbers of Hedgehogs and some garden birds, so give other methods of pest control a try.

Buy and plant herbaceous perennials and summer bulbs. Established plants can be divided and the most healthy parts replanted immediately or potted up to give away. Fruit trees and deciduous trees and shrubs should be planted before the end of this month.

Start Dahlias and Chrysanthemums into growth. Sow the summer bedding which need a long growing season. These include African Marigolds, Impatiens, Lobelia, Nicotiana, Petunia and Salvias. Germinate at 15-21°C, and grow on at 7°C. Greenhouse crops to sow are Aubergine, Cucumber, Sweet Pepper and Tomato. These need 21°C to germinate and 13°C to grow on. Chit potatoes and plant onion sets.

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


