

FROM THE RECTOR

And the third day He rose again. The Resurrection is the most staggering event in human history. A man died - He was buried - He rose again from the dead - historical fact!

Hard to believe? The disciples first refused to believe, then something happened. They may have seen an empty tomb, but more important than that, they met the risen Lord. It was not only their minds that were changed - but their lives.

A retired barrister once set out to write a book disproving the Resurrection, but God caught him at his work. After carefully sifting the evidence, he wrote a book acknowledging the Resurrection. There isn't time or space to go into the evidence, but three main points emerge:

- 1. The change in the disciples from eleven frightened and bewildered men, to men preaching Christ Risen in the streets;
- 2. The existence of the Church which has survived all the ups and downs of human endeavour and persecution a Church not in the hands of men and women, but in the hands of Christ, alive, directing, guiding, sustaining;
- 3. The Resurrection is not a belief added on to the Christian faith, it is the faith, the Gospel.

What does the Resurrection mean for us? On the Cross, God fought evil and won. The love of God now is stronger than all the powers of evil, even though the opposite could appear to be true. The Resurrection gives us the assurance of God's love.

It also demonstrates the power of God - power which is available to us for our daily living, through prayer and reception of the sacrament of Holy Communion. Finally, because Christ burst the bonds of death and conquered it, He gives us the promise of eternal life. A life of depth and quality rather than distance.

SOUND PROGRESS

Good news for those members of the congregation at All Saints who are now at the age when hearing sometimes tends to become less acute, came from the Parochial Church Council meeting on 25th July. Promising progress towards improving the sound system in church was reported, together with some estimated prices. Opinion generally inclined towards provision for the first time of a hearing-aid loop with a roving microphone in addition to the essential upgrading of the existing amplification system. More detailed inquiries are to be made and costings obtained for an early recommendation to the PCC from the fabric committee.

There was also encouraging news about the re-introduction of children's ministry. The Rector and his steering committee have held meeting with the Diocesan Youth Officer, the Revd. Martin Green, and subsequently ordered sample children's teaching packs from the Scripture Union and the Church Pastoral Aid Society. Volunteer helpers now total a healthy 16, which means that each will be required only once every four weeks. The launch date is provisionally set for the first Sunday in October, and the PCC has approved a start-up budget with an upper limit of £200.

A teaching mission for PCC members, hopefully with assistance from Captain Leslie Tennant of the Church Army, was urged by the Rector as a fundamental first-step before embarking on a full-scale parish mission. This led to a discussion about the 10-week Alpha course, which explores Christianity and is endorsed by the Bishop of Coventry. Eventually a team of four, consisting of Vanda Ball, Tony Stubbs, Tony Brunton and John Eld, was appointed to explore Alpha and alternative courses. And there is now the prospect that a Corporate Prayer Group will come into being in September, regularly seeking guidance on the way ahead for the Church in Harbury.

From Southam Deanery it was reported that Synod is looking at the idea of geographical parish groupings for mutual support at a time of great change in the Anglican Church, and in particular at times of interregnum. The current proposal is to group Harbury with Ladbroke, Ufton and Bishops Itchington.

Efforts continue to find successors for Liz and Mike McBride to organise this year's parish bonfire and those in future years. Harbury Football Club is said to be prepared to provide a number of stewards.

Solicitor Peter Rollason is to be the speaker at the harvest supper on Saturday 30th September. Peter, with Moyra and the children, are again resident in Harbury, this time at Old Well Cottage, Farm Street. Welcome home!

THE RINGING SOUNDS OF LADBROKE

As a fairly recent recruit and now addict of Ladbroke Bell Tower, I now appreciate what skills are needed and the difficulties encountered in controlling a huge bell, such that it rings even roughly in the appropriate place. As with many crafts, the experienced ringers make it look effortlessly easy. Believe me it is not! Bear in mind that the combined weight of the Ladbroke bells is around 2 tons.

I also now have an understanding of the ringing sounds I have been passively hearing for years and wondered if others may be interested?

The first sounds, which the Village will hear as practice starts are gentle rings rapidly becoming faster and faster as the bells are rung up from their safe, hanging positions, getting gradually higher and higher until they stand upside down ready to execute a full circle at each ring.

Sometimes you will hear three bells being rung up followed by the other two a few moments later. This indicates that some of us were late for practice!

From this position the familiar 12345 123 etc. known as *rounds* start each period of ringing. Sometimes the Tower Captain (either Steve or Jennifer) call for two bells to *change places*, so that you will hear a new harmony repeated e.g. 13245 13245 etc. However, if you hear two bells changing randomly, then inside the tower a ringer, often me, is frantically trying to control the bell and get it back in the right place again. At the end of each period of ringing, at the call *stand*, the bells are balanced in their upright positions. When you hear all of the bells stop except one, which continues to ring alone, you may imagine an embarrassed ringer trying to find just the right point of balance to the murmured reassurances of the waiting ringers.

Occasionally you will hear a musical joke as the fourth bell jumps ahead of the second, causing them to ring 14235 which sound like *Pop Goes the Weasel*, if you use your imagination just a bit.

Apart from these problems at practices for learners like me, the changes that are so professionally rung have wonderful names like Bob Minimus, Single Court and Grandsire, where each bell changes to a different place to a set pattern. Changes on three bells only mean that only three capable ringers are available and they are ringing the Ladbroke Surprise, composed by Harry Reeves for such a purpose.

At the end of the practice session or just before the church service, the bells are rung down to their hanging positions, which also allows the hammers of the clock to strike against them all week. The affect of this is that they speed up as they are swinging in a gradually reduced arc. This is a physical phenomenon and not, as it feels when you are hurrying late for church, that even the bells are chiding you for your tardiness.

This brief article is written with apologies to any campanologist who shudders at my lay explanation of the most wonderful art, science and music and with thanks to my tolerant mentors and fellow bell ringers: Steve, Don, Jennifer, Emma, Rachel, Phillipa and the latest recruit Melanie.

LADBROKE PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Two items only were discussed at an additional meeting held by Ladbroke Parish Council on Wednesday 2nd August. The meeting was primarily called to discuss the proposal that the Parish Council should act as the Holding Trustees of the Charity known as the Village Hall.

Peter Derrick and Stan Greenway outlined the reasons for the need to regularise the charity status of the Village Hall and explained why it was desirable for the Parish Council to act as the Holding or Custodian Trustee. It was explained that the Holding Trustee's principle function was to keep the legal charity document in a safe place, namely the Bank. In the unlikely event of the winding-up of the Village Hall, the Holding Trustee would be required to ensure that the legal requirements of the Charity Commission were carried out satisfactorily, before the document was released.

This was agreed after a short discussion. I volunteered to represent the Parish Council on the Village Hall Management Committee for the current period.

Councillor Marion Grainger brought details of the Concessionary Fares Scheme, 1995/96 to the attention of the Parish Council. The District Council is providing a concessionary fare token scheme, valued at £6, for use as cash on public transport e.g. buses, trains and participating licensed taxis.

Men over 65, women over 60 and some registered disabled persons, who are permanent residents in the area of Stratford District Council are

eligible, subject to proof of residence and disability.

Application forms will be available in October, from Marion for those living at Ladbroke Hall and from Elsa Greenway for the remainder of the village.

LADBROKE VILLAGE HALL

History Display - 16/17th September - 10am-5pm

In 1945, John Spencer was Lord of Hodnell Manor and his cousin William of Radbourne Manor:

In 1595, Elizabeth I was on the throne, Shakespeare busy writing his sonnets and Robert Catesby so deep in debt that he was considering selling his heavily mortgaged Manor of Ladbroke to his brother-in-law;

In 1695, the Civil War had come and gone, the new manor house had come and the old one gone and William Palmer was quietly buying out the freeholders of Ladbroke to increase his empire;

In 1795, at the Court Leet and Court Baron, the common complaint was unsociable behaviour and the poor state of the roads, footpaths, stiles and ditches.

In 1895, Victorian Ladbroke was solely employed in agriculture and its associated trades;


In 1995, the Manors are in the hands of many and not the few; Elizabeth II is on the throne; the Courts have gone in name only, for in a different form the Parish Council and Neighbourhood Watch are still trying to contain the same social problems; village maintenance and agriculture are no longer the hub of employment, but are barely spokes in the wheel!

Want to know more!! Then visit the exhibition in the Village Hall over the weekend and look at the maps, census records, photographs and artefacts and visit the church, which will be open over the weekend. There is also a small display from Southam History Group. Entrance £1, children free. Proceeds to go towards the Village Hall maintenance.

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


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

HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING - JULY

To which the Gasmen cometh - thrice on the night, when the high pressure main blew, but of course, there's no gas in the Village Hall or the Council meeting!

In Ken Stephenson's absence, Vice-Chairman Steve Norman heard: the Youth Club had found a possible leader; SDC would run a Planning workshop for Harbury; the County asked for a nominee for their Area Panel (a position so prestigious, that councillors were falling over one another to volunteer). Voting was postponed until candidate Ken's return.

Cllr. Hunt thanked Mrs. Waddell and her helpers for the success of the bus ticket issue. The updated bus timetables were in the Library and volunteers were needed to act as local Transport Co-ordinators.

The County had planned an Accident Reduction Scheme at the Fosse/Middle Road junction with curved warning arrows on the carriageway and better signing to deter overtaking on the Fosse near the junction.

Severn Trent had almost completed the water mains improvements, but would water quality improve, Cllr. Hunt asked? Pressure would remain the same, but as the pipes were new and clean, the flow should be greater, Steve explained.

Designation of new Village Greens would be considered. Drainage work at the playing fields was complete. Slabs, football posts, basketball equipment would be put in and posts and chains at the end of the car park. Playing golf was dangerous and should be prohibited by the Byelaws.

The newly installed Barbecues might not be covered for Public Liability. John Hunt demanded a written answer from the insurers about the position. If they declined cover, the PC had to remove the items or seek an alternative insurer, lest the liability fall on the council and individual members

SDC granted an extension at 53 Mill St., but refused permission for two detached houses behind Harbury House. The PC's applications for their Design Awards were acknowledged. They explained they had decided not to enforce planning conditions on the Binswood End resident, who used reconstituted stone on his extension. John Hunt was annoyed that people could ignore planning conditions with impunity. Cllr. Cooley emphasised that the Parish Council could help by reporting infringements quickly before building was finished.

The Parish Council objected to Mr. Sammons plans for a single storey extension at 26 Ivy Lane (in the conservation area which), with permission already granted, would mean development of most of the original plot.

Keith Thompson and Phil Holtom thought Lighthorne's sodium lighting too urban. Bill Tranter suggested that the PC celebrate the Millennium by installing new decorative cast iron lamp standards with energy efficient lights. Harbury had 117 columns. The present steel ones are £600-700 each, so it would be a very ambitious project.

Eighteen existing lights needed attention and eleven of them would have

to be replaced. The total cost was £6,600. A blackspot in Farm Street needed a light and Pineham Avenue residents asked for another. The Clerk would get up-to-date costings. John Woodward asked for a light spillage-free village with downlights incorporated in the repairs and improvements.

We didn't win the Best Kept Village. John Woodward thought daffodils would have helped. Sharon said they'd have been dead by the time the judges visited! The Harbury Society invited Councillors to the Landscape Audit Presentation on 26th September in the Tom Hauley Room at 7.30pm.

We arrived well in time for our 7-9pm booking at the port somewhat relaxed by the cider. Anyway, we danced in three different places and attracted large and very appreciative crowds. We finally got to eat and drink in the performer's restaurant at 10pm and decided that it would be difficult to top this event.

Friday, Douarnenez

A very hot day and we decided to burn the children on the beach. We arrived in Douarnenez at 5.30pm at a beautiful harbour and looked in vain for some shade. Our first dancing spot was for half an hour to a small but very appreciative audience, and then we were whisked away to a hotel and treated to an excellent meal and far too much free wine. A memorable way to finish and we were taken to the local Mairie for speeches, gifts and drinks with representative of the town council. Our wonderful hosts Jean-Yves and Annick finally took us to an excellent Crepe restaurant near the coast where we planned future morris tours of Brittany, and Mike Putnam went off to climb a local crag.

We cannot thank Jean-Yves and Annick enough for all the contacts and support they gave us. We met many local people and visited beautiful towns and villages. We hope to return to Brittany in the future.

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

Calling all space travellers

For readers who have recently returned from Planet Zogg, it may come as startling news, that recent cuts in Warwickshire's education budget are putting a huge strain on Harbury School. For those of us who haven't been star-trekking this year, it will, unfortunately, come as no shock at all.

A cloud of gloom and despondency descended over the financial future of the school - and its much-feared consequences in terms of staff losses, class sizes, etc. They say that every cloud has a silver lining, but it seemed impossible to find one in this scenario. So, instead of wasting time looking for one, a group of parents of children at the school came up with their own. Hence the launch of Harbury Village's:

SILVER LINING SCHEME

The scheme is designed to encourage people to use the village shops more, and as a result of the increase in business, retailers participating in the scheme will make donations to the school funds.

A Silver Lining Scheme card has been designed, on which people can keep a tally of their purchases, validated by a shop stamp. A monthly target spending figure will be set for each shop. 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
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

GARDENING NOTES

As I write this the gardens are looking dried and brown, and many plants are suffering from the drought. Remember the pictures of the desert springing to life again once there is rain and we can be certain our gardens will also recover. There are jobs we can do even without rain though and one is to continue deadheading flowers to prolong the season as long as possible.

Lift gladioli when the leaves begin to wither, although for the last few years I have left them in and they have come through the winter. Plant Spring bulbs, especially daffodils this month. Once summer displays in containers fade they can be replanted with small evergreens, winter heathers and miniature bulbs.

Autumn tints on shrubs will soon be putting on a brilliant show. Make a note of the ones which do well here, but before buying, make sure they have another season of interest too. Berberis thunbergii and Cotinus are two to look out for. When we get some rain this is a good time to plant new trees and shrubs whilst the soil is still warm. Research has shown that the addition of fertilisers and organic matter is not necessary. It is important to keep an area of 2' around the plant clear of other vegetation. Mulching with black polythene or old carpet has also been shown to be beneficial

Ripened onions can be stored in old tights with a knot between each onion. Hang them somewhere cool.

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
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
