


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

Tickets for Theatre and Supper (£3 extra) must be booked in advance from the Secretary, Linda Ridgley at 16 Farm Street, 612792.





Note: Mr. Curtis wasn't like the Punch & Judy man in Hi De Hi at all!



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
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HARBURY FOLK CLUB

We were told to expect a Christmas Extravaganza of Folk at the Dog Inn. The likely downside was that it was to be presented by the Jug Band. It was doubtful that we could have expected an evening of any musical innovation or talent; tastelessness in plenty, almost certainly if the Jug Band was in any way involved.

But the audience quickly attained the Christmas spirit and thoroughly enjoyed the first half of the evening with fine performances after, of course, a Jug Band start with their **Champagne Charley**. Steve followed with the obligatory Christmas number (or so he says) **Gaudete**, got the audience singing very early on, reducing much of the talking at the back.

Sue sang of her Soldier Coming Home Today (had she told Ian?), whilst Ian tried to tell us that he was Too Old for Morris Dancing and Too Young to Rock and Roll (both written by Sue and Ian). Des avoided singing about dying soldiers, as it was Christmas (as it was) and rendered seasonal numbers about Puddings and Rum.

The final performance from skilled musicians in the first half were from Margaret on her fiddle and Peter on his organ.

The second half started with a further helping of folk singing skills, this time from The Four Snoetjes (Janny, Celia, Ruth and Maureen, our own Small Faces) who sang about St. Nicholas (from Spain!). Next were the Three Wise Men, a rather presumptuous name for Pete B, Doug and Steve, singing an hilarious song from Trunch.

Ron and Jean continued the party spirit with a couple of numbers, Jean personalising her song with aspersion about the Master of Ceremony's cellar! The second half closed with two numbers (that sounded more like three) from the Russian dentists: Fillski and Drillski ... including a masterly rendition with mime of the Les Barker poem - Spot of the Antarctic.

The third half was indeed the part of the evening about which the audience was quite justified in having serious doubts. Was it really going to continue to be an evening of pre-Christmas culture? The idea of regular singers joining with the Jug Band and performing material that is typical of the band was a good one. The eagerness to perform was as surprising as it was foolish. Why did they want to subject themselves to this madness and what would be the lasting effect on their future in folk club circles. Well, of course it was Christmas and a time for laughter and on this occasion, there was less of the more depressing songs that sometimes feature at the Club.

The Jug Band took the stage (for the next 2 hours) and the first to lose his credibility was Ron, singing his very own Strike the Bell Landlord. Steve followed with a tight harmonic rendition of the Schwartzeneggin song. Two numbers from Gilly really did show up the cracks in the Jug. Her sublime White Christmas was followed by Sue's Nobody loves a Fairy When She's Forty (complete with tutu, Doc Martens and wand). Pete B had always had a raging, if somewhat misguided, ambition to accompany the Band. His Christmas wish was granted. With washboard, he joined the three (plus Sue on bones and jug and John B on fiddle) with: The Sheik. Mike's big romantic number: Brother Sylvest, reached further high spots of presentation and co-ordination with the Jug Band.

In an attempt to bring back some element of musical talent to the third half, the Folk Club Choir gave a stunning preview of the carols that they were preparing for the Carol Service. The enthusiastic applause was only surpassed by the appreciation of the congregation at the Church on Christmas Eve. This oasis of calm was shortlived - back came the Jug Band to welcome the star of the evening: none other than Santa Claus.

He gave presents to all the good boys and girls..... Margaret will always cherish her Big Mac and Bob his Y-fronts.

To the utter surprise and amazement of the now dwindling audience, Santa revealed himself by singing his big number: The Pub with no Beer, or crisps, or red wine, or change, or diesel, or feathers on the parrot. The evening ended with everybody singing and playing Christmas in Australia.

DOORSTEP CHARITY COLLECTIONS

Are we being ripped off by bogus doorstep charity collectors?

Recently, whilst visiting a friend, his doorbell rang and because of his incapacity, I answered. At the door was a man who said that he was collecting for the Cancer Campaign for Research into Children. I asked for identification and he produced a piece of card with a small photo, which appeared in the dim light to be a reasonable likeness with an indecipherable name. My friend indicated that he would make a small donation which he passed to me. On handing over the coin, the man thanked me, slipped it into his coat pocket and left.

Thinking this over, I was dissatisfied as to the man's identity and actions. Arriving home, I rang the Police on 812366 (number given for Neighbourhood Watch) and was reporting this when my front door was knocked upon. Answering, I was asked by a fair haired woman in a mustard anorak if I would make a donation in similar terms to the way requested earlier. When I said that I was on the phone to the Police, the woman cried out: *Robin, we have trouble here*, whereupon the man whom I had seen earlier, appeared into the area illuminated by my security light. They then withdrew swiftly into the darkness. The Police said that someone would be sent to investigate.

Upon reflection, it seems to me that this pair have a criminally profitable enterprise going. I usually give to doorstep charity collectors and if others do likewise, I could see this couple going home with a useful haul collected under false colours. Cancer and children are words which would seem to be carefully chosen to produce feelings of guilt if one does not contribute. As a local neighbourhood watch co-ordinator, I have asked for advice, which I might pass on to my neighbours in respect to sorting out the genuine from the fraudulent callers, especially as nowadays nearly everyone who comes has some kind of identification card.

In the meantime, I will not be giving to those calling at my door, unless known to me or the appeal has recognised characteristics. Perhaps other in the village might adopt a similar attitude, thus making this type of fraud unprofitable here?


Since living in Harbury Peter has played cricket for Learnington and still plays indoor cricket in the winter.

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GARDENING NOTES

Snow is forecast, so all we may be able to do in the garden this month will be to admire the winter interest plants, which have been growing away quietly, waiting for their hour of glory. However, weather permitting, check that tree stakes and ties are firm and roots of recently planted shrubs have not been loosened. On cordon apples, cut back side shoots to 1 bud.


In severe frost, protect flower buds on rhododendrons and azaleas with a covering of horticultural fleece. Remember to water winter pansies in containers. If they have made a lot of leaf, rain may not get through.

At the end of the month, place early potatoes in trays in a light, frost free place. Place the end with the most eyes uppermost. Rhubarb can be planted on a mild day. Cover it with manure.

Check houseplants regularly. Some pests love the warmth of the central heating. Feed flowering plants. Bring into the light any bowls of bulbs planted at the end of the year. Plant them out in the garden when they finish flowering. Those Christmas gift plants will be happier on a moist tray of gravel.

Collect cardboard cylinders to use as deep pots for individual seeds such as sweetpeas, which grow long roots.

Plant of the Month: Winter Jasmine. This shrub from China has been brightening our winter days since the 16th century. Jasminum nudiflorum will survive almost anywhere, but needs support. Prune after flowering. It is easy to propagate from Autumn cuttings or by layering in Spring.

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
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


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
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
