


FROM THE RECTOR

Getting Away - All of us need to get away from the busyness of life from time to time in order to find rest and quietness. Often it is only when we step aside from our daily routine and are alone that we can evaluate ourselves and get a true perspective. Then we can draw closer to God. Often Jesus would withdraw for a time of prayer and solitude, especially before some important decision.

In the early Church too, some individuals like St. Anthony withdrew, following the example of Elijah and spent time in the loneliness of the desert in order to discover their true selves and to find God. The desert can be a very hostile and unfriendly place, but it does provide the necessary solitude.

Many people have come to value retreats and quiet days for the same reason; not because they are means of avoiding the pressures of daily life, but because they provide a breathing space, time to reflect and time to renew their spiritual energies so that they can go back refreshed and better able to cope with those pressures. At a time of increasing tensions and complexity when we are always so busy, it is important for everyone to withdraw for a time. Even if we are not able to join an organised retreat, at least we can spend some time occasionally when we are alone and quiet. Summer holidays can provide the opportunity for spiritual refreshment as well as physical and mental relaxation. It may be possible when we are away, or even if we are spending time off at home, to have a little more time to give to ourselves and to God.

Our service was about Sharing. Mrs. Guy told us how a little boy gave his lunch to Jesus, who shared it with all the people who had come to

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
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hear him talk.

Thirty parishioners and the Rector met in the Tom Hauley Room on 14th April for the Church's Annual General Meeting. As well as the place to formally elect church officers for the coming year, it was also an opportunity to express thanks to those people who regularly keep things going, whether up front or behind the scenes.

Ruth Dodds and Jeff Bedford were re-elected as Church Wardens and thanked warmly for all their work. Sheila Carr was elected Secretary to the PCC, Liz McBride as Treasurer and Frank Bunting as Auditor. Tony Stubbs and Tony Brunton continue to represent us at the Deanery Synod. Others who were also elected to serve on the PCC were: John Algar, Beryl Checkley, Keith and Sue Dormer, Isobel Grimes, Ken Hughes, Patricia Harrison, Brian and Lesley Jones, Anne and John Moore, John and Sally Stringer, Peter Towell and Harry Windsor.

The Treasurer's report showed healthy finances with income up by 17.7% on last year. Giving to the church had increased and over the year various fund raising events brought money into the *general repair fund*, e.g. the Saturday lunches brought in almost £1,100. A wide variety of donations were made to many Christian-based and local organisations.

Moya Waterman reported 95 parish residents on the electoral roll. Rev. Roy Brown noted that this last year has seen the introduction of the Sunday School which is, to a degree, integrated into the morning service and is being successfully run by a team of volunteers on a rota basis. Thoughts and meetings about *mission* led to the decision to investigate the possible use of the Alpha course at All Saints' and an open meeting on this is planned for next month. The younger end of our fellowship is thriving, with an average of 16-18 toddlers and their Mums regularly taking part in the monthly Toddlers' Service. The Rector thanked his wife Pam for enabling him to do his work: *She feeds me, waters me, then kicks me out!*. Charles Catt thanked Roy for his leadership over the last busy 12 months, for both his hard work and unfailing cheerfulness.

LADBROKE PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

District Councillor Bob Stevens joined all Parish Councillors and one member of the public for the meeting in the Village Hall on Wednesday, 17th April.

The proposal to site a gate at the lower end of Windmill Lane is still satisfactorily proceeding through the necessary legal requirements.

The Council had received the formal report from the Planning Inspectorate concerning the development of housing in Hedges Field. The issues raised by the Parish and District Councils had been taken into consideration, but nevertheless approval was granted for the erection of 15 houses, including 4 units of social housing, subject to many conditions, which should conserve the rural character of the village and protect the environment for those residents most affected by the development. The Developers have access and are now able to start clearing the site. Building, which includes digging trenches, cannot commence until many conditions have been met. These include detailed plans for landscaping, access roads and a noise barrier on the site boundary with The Garage. Any villager with cause for concern should contact Parish Clerk, Elsa Greenway who will inform the Planning Officer.

In a letter to Councillor Peter West, Mr. Sockett of Warwickshird County Council suggested a temporary solution to improve drainage a the lower end of Windmill Lane, but it was recognised that a full review would be needed after completion of the development.

D.C. Bob Stevens informed the Council that the jurisdiction for the proposed landfill site at Fenny Compton was under Warwickshir County Council and that a letter strongly rejecting the proposal will b sent from Stratford District Council, following the receipt of 60 letter of objection from residents in the surrounding villages. There was no reported crime in Ladbroke in the last month. The distribution of the Neighbourhood Watch information appears to have been sporadic and as yet no new volunteers have come forward as co-ordinators.

There was no objection to the pruning of the yew trees bordering the road at the Old Rectory.

Money, in the form of grants, is available from the District Council for village schemes - storage at the Village Hall springs to mind - or for special applications. Bob gave the example of good sports people.

Finally, don't forget: The Annual General Village Meeting, to be held on Wednesday 15th May in the Village Hall at 8pm.

Representatives of Severn Trent and Offwat will be present to talk about the problems of water supply to Ladbroke, past, present and future and to answer questions. Do come and support this annual village occasion and hear the reports from all of the village's organisations.

HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING - MARCH

Pc Boulstridge reported several burglaries and thefts from vehicles. He will monitor speeds at Temple End and deal with parking on pavements and congestion at the School's entrance in Mill Street.

The County told Deppers it might be considered for traffic calming after their present trial is complete in about two years' time. Meanwhile, there is to be a weight limit on Deppers BRIDGE and the PC is pondering the best diversion route.

This could have impact on the potential traffic increase if the Landfill Site at Fenny Compton was approved with more HGVs on the B4452 and into Harbury.

The Parish Council did not object to plans for extensions to 10 The Beeches, garages at Sharmer Fields House and a porch and roof at Summerfield Lodge. They had lodged their objections to a new detached house to the rear of Harbury Hall.

Help will again be needed at Chesterton Windmill Open Days on 14th & 15th September and we will begin planting the Sentinel Oaks in November.

HARBURY-BORN PROFESSOR DIES

The parents of a Harbury-born First World War baby were told by a specialist that their son would never be able to lead a normal life and was probably retarded. That child who overcame severe handicaps to become a university professor at the age of 30 and went on to win national recognition as a modern economist, has died at the age of 80.

Professor Edward Victor Morgan was born on October 27, 1915, at Northcote, Deppers Bridge, subsequently the home of Joan Clarke's parents and where beekeeper John Home now lives.

His distinguished career as an academic was the more remarkable for an albino who could only read with difficulty in short bursts, holding the text a few inches from the powerful spectacles perched on his nose. After the specialist's shattering prognosis his mother, who had been a teacher, undertook his education at home until he was old enough to go to Warwick School.

From Warwick he went to Sidney Sussex College, Cambridge and then as a graduate to his first teaching post at University College, Swansea, where in 1945, he became professor in the Economics department, subsequently occupying Economics chairs at Manchester in 1966 and Reading from 1974 to 1981.

Described by many contemporaries as ahead of his time, he showed great courage in a penetrating essay "Money in Theory", by challenging the rejection of monetary policy by the Radcliffe Committee set up in 1957 by the then Chancellor of the Exchequer, Peter Thorneycroft. He lived to see his approach vindicated during the Margaret Thatcher administration! His prolific writings ranged widely over financial institutions and were renowned for a sure theoretical grasp, independent analysis and fearless conclusions.

He was twice married and had two children.

HARBURY LANDSCAPE PROJECT

On Saturday 17th February, Harbury Parish Council, with the support of Harbury Society, held a public meeting in the Village Hall on the above subject. The purpose was to explain the background to the project, its progress and current status; but most importantly to obtain the views, suggestions, criticisms and ideas of the parish at large.

Despite the rival attractions of shopping crowds, rugger on the telly and the vice president's lunch at Harbury Rugby Club, the Village Hall was much with over 50 interested residents.

arish Council Chairman thanked everyone for attending and

explained that the project was the result of a widespread desire to visually enhance the parish and at the same time strive to make Harbury & Deppers Bridge a cleaner, safer and more pleasant place in which to live. From this desire the Landscape Audit had been undertaken by Harbury Society. Stratford District Council were also beginning to promote Agenda 21. This is a local initiative to create a sustainable quality of life for everyone as we approach the millenium.

Harbury Society's Secretary reiterated these points, explaining the thrust behind the Landscape Audit and that areas such as traffic, rubbish collection, litter, dog fouling and light spillage had also been at the forefront of concerns.

John Woodward explained that as well as research, discussion and planning, some action had already taken place.

- Spring Bulbs had been planted in 9 locations in the village and are currently looking attractive;
- The long awaited planting of the recreation ground has completed its first phase with over 500 trees, shrubs and hedging plants at a cost of only £62 to the Parish!
- The never intended clear stemming of the pound lime trees has not been carried out;

The meeting progressed by forming into 7 syndicate groups, who were asked to consider the following:

What should be done

-for Clubs / Societies / Associations / Group; -in your neighbourhood / street / road; -throughout the Village / Deppers Bridge / Parish; -in / around the Village Hall; -around the Village Centre / Church / Public places. -in the Recreation Ground / Playing fields / Open spaces. to promote community involvement and encourage participation and pride.

As a result there were over 190 individual comments on 60+ definitive headings. For brevity and clarity these headings have been grouped under Landscape or Environment and listed in ranking order. Rushing simply being measured by frequency of written remarks.

Overall response was very positive with the answer to Question 3, perhaps the most encouraging.

The meeting closed with the Chairman thanking everyone for their enthusiastic support and he promised to report back via the Harbury & Ladbroke News and the Annual Parish meeting.

Thanks were also expressed to Pat Woodward and Mary Shelley fo providing tea, coffee, cake and biscuits, during the afternoon.

So, where do we go from here? The next step will be the Annual Paris meeting on 16th May in the Village Hall. At this meeting, David Barber Environmental Co-ordinator for Local Agenda 21, will outline the aim of Stratford District Council's Programme for assisting and encouragin communities to improve their environment and quality of life. The speaker for our last talk *Bulbs through the year* came all the way up from the West Country and it was well worth the journey. There were slides of many plants, some unusual, all very interesting and I don't think tulips or daffodils were mentioned until the end, when Mr. Ireland-Jones answered a few questions.

The Society has been asked to walk the MacMillion Mile on the Bank Holiday Monday 6th May, starting at Temple House 10.30am and to make it even more interesting, Mr. Catt will be identifying wild flowers during the walk.

Anybody who has booked to go on the outings in June and has not yet paid, please bring it to the next and last meeting and talk in this session (The next series of talks re-starts in October.) The all day outing £3.50, lunch if required, will be from £1.95 to £3 extra. The evening outing charge is £2.

The Social cum Plant Sale Evening on the 14th May is nearly here, please bring your plants and after the sale we will eat. Should anyone like to help with the food, please see Pat or me at the next meeting.

This brings me nicely to the next meeting (on Tuesday 7th May) when the talk will be In an Apothecary's Garden, given by Mrs. Smith.

GARDENING NOTES

May is the month of growth, but it is a confusing time weatherwise, with the second week on average, being one of the driest and sunniest of t year. Harden off tender plants, but do not plant them out before the of the month. If you are tempted to push ahead keep some horticultur. Check to hand for protection if frost is forecast. Plant up hanging bask in as large a basket as you can manage. Line the basket with so



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polythene to help keep in moisture. Be generous with the plants for an effective show.

Sow beans in pots and plant out brassicas and leeks. Watch for early potato shoots coming through and earth up to protect from frost. Buy and place codling moth traps in apple trees to prevent maggoty fruit. Cut back pulmonarias to encourage new foliage. Trim winter heathers and deadhead bulbs as they fade. Prune lavenders, sage, santolina and other grey leaved plants. Lay turf for a quick lawn but keep off it for a couple of weeks.

Take soft wood cuttings from hardy plants eg. delphiniums. Cut off 3" long new shoots and put them into a pot of mixed compost and sand. Water, then cover with a polythene bag and keep in a light, but not sunny place. Fuchsias, hebes, potentillas and philadelphus are easy shrubs to try too.

At the end of the month clear out the Spring flower displays and put in the Summer plants. Be sure to keep them well watered.

Finally, a quote from A.P. Herbert. Greenfly, it's difficult to see why God, who made the rose, made thee.

Plant of the Month: Lily of the Valley

A hardy herbaceous perennial, which dies away completely in the winter will push up leaves from the creeping rootstock in April. Inside a curled leaf is the flower stem bearing up to 20 small white, very fragrant little bells. These may form red berries for a second season of interest in the Autumn.

In Sussex lived St. Leonard, a dragon fighting champion of the people. Legend has it that Lilies of the Valley grow wild wherever his blood was spilt. They were cultivated in gardens as a remedy for nervous complaints, headaches, constipation dropsy and gout, but now they are known to be poisonous. However, as a cut flower even a small bunch will scent a room.

Plant them in partial shade in any soil containing plenty of compost and they will form a clump in a year or two.

Excess Traffic Progress Report

Just to let you know that Councillors Messrs. Pat Collet, Andrew Cooley, Bill Middleton and myself represented our village at the first joint District & County Transportation Panel - and the increasing local traffic from the M40 exits and to the Ufton tip, were both discussed.

A promise was obtained that County Council transport officers would talk directly with our Parish Council to examine traffic calming on the two 'B' roads to Harbury and through Deppers Bridge. I successfully asked for the panel to get a progress report to us at our next panel meeting in May. Hopefully I will be there to press your concerns! I certainly don't want to see us get local road improvements just as a "planning gain" from any new business or residential estate between Harbury and Bishops.

We now have two additional pressures here unfortunately - extension of the Ufton Landfill and a new tip proposed at Fenny Compton for Birmingham's Incinerator Ash - and I will be speaking against both these developments, etc. at Stratford on 15th April - in view of the local traffic blight that would result.

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

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
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
