



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

An accomplished singer, Shirley supported the Harbury Singers and performed with them until their disbandment in the mid 70's when she joined the Royal Learnington Bach Choir where she sings today. Wednesday nights have been sacrosanct, RLBC only on that evening!

There was a full turnout of councillors again for the October meeting, held on Wednesday 16.

A representative of the council had been told that the builders intend to make a start on the new housing development in Hedges Field at the end of November.

Councillor Geoff Timms had received letters, thanking him and the volunteers for all their work to maintain the footpaths, from Rachel Barnicoat, the new Community Paths Officer and Mrs. Harris, the Rights of Way Enforcement Officer from Warwick County Council. An offer was made for the Council's Rangers to give assistance clearing dense undergrowth and installing signs.

Councillors Geoff Timms and Carol Northorpe had attended the area meeting of the Warwickshire and West Midlands Association of Local Councils in Warmington Village Hall. Andy Cowan made the potentially dry subject of waste disposal really interesting.

The next meeting will be held on Wednesday 20 November at 7.45pm.

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
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


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LADBROKE VILLAGE HALL

HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING - OCTOBER

The phantom gardener of Crown Street taxed the powers of Parish Chairman Ken Stephenson. Mary Shelley was delegated the task of reprimanding the culprit, but as no-one was sure who left two green bags of garden waste on Pump Green every weekend to fester until the collection the following Friday, it was decided to delegate the problem back to him!

The Parish Council agreed the <u>Netball Club</u> could fence off the court to prevent children damaging it. It seems the Tennis Club too is plagued! Keith Thompson suggested a sign to explain that people should not participate in Rollerblading.

Uncertainty again threatens the Youth Club with both leaders leaving at the end of term

The <u>traffic census</u> has been completed by the 25 volunteers and the data is now being analysed. John Drinkwater was worried about the congestion in Church Street and revived the idea of completing the One Way System. *Kill Your Speed* signs were offered to the Parish and

Deppers Bridge. It was thought that Deppters Bridge would be the best place for them. A can of worms was opened when the Parish Council suggested moving the speed limit signs in Deppers Bridge. The bureaucracy, time and money would make it out of the question, but Warwick County Council will look into changing the warning signs at the junction by the Great Western instead.

Keith Thompson apologised for not having surveyed the blocked gullies, explaining that he was either at work or asleep when it rained!

Once again the Parish is consulted about <u>Policing</u> and once again re-iterates its belief that officers should spend more time on the beat (95% rather than the present 49%). Government plans to give parishes powers to provide Specials was derided. We are being given the privilege of paying for them, said John Hunt. Better get your uniform out again colleagues joshed John Drinkwater.

Planning: Stratford District Council granted tree felling at Old Well Cottage, Farm Street; extensions at 11 Wagstaffe Close and barn conversions at Orchard House and 16 Vicarage Lane. They refused stable conversions at Harbury Hall because of car parking problems and would not allow a Lottery Satellite Dish on the Londis Supermarket. Dave Andrews' Appeal against refusal of permission for another house behind Harbury House will be heard on 1 May 1997.

The Parish Council did not object to extensions at Eastfields Farm; 38 South Parade and Sharmer Farm Cottage, or tree work at 1 Pirie Close and Old Timbers. They suggested one Sycamore needed felling at 35 Binswood End. They asked Stratford District Council to check compliance with previous permissions at Spiers Farm and had no comment on amendments to development beside Old Well Cottage or 9 Vicarage Lane. They objected to a new house behind Brethren's Farm as being out of scale and not sympathetic to the area.

The Parish Council is to tell Bryant Homes it will only take on maintenance of the open space on the new development if it has a twenty year communed sum from them to pay for it. The road will commemorate <u>Tim Percival</u>, as Percival Drive, Place or Pastures, subject to Carol's approval. The Parish Council and Warwick County Council will co-operate on siting of the street lights. There will be three

shared equity and three rented properties on the development for Bromford Corinthian Housing Association. Anyone interested should register with Stratford Housing Department.

The Parish Council will provide the Bryant Homes with a plan for the sites of the <u>Sentinel Oaks</u> and have already specified where their lorries should go, but large vehicles are still coming through the centre of the village.

Ideas from the public for the Millennium included a Village Green, a Bowling Green, Maypole and upgrading of the Village Hall to provide a stage. One tongue-in-cheek idea was to demolish the supermarket and erect a plaque to celebrate the demise of flat roofs! The idea of Millennium Greens would be investigated.

Mary Shelley had made significant progress in organising the Millennium Video and had pledged support from a range of individuals and organisations. She asked the Parish Council to put up £1,000 which would help to lever up other grants, but there was concern about finances. An artistic budget was John Hunt's comment. Mary explained that until the details were finalised and grants applied for, it was difficult to give definite figures but she did want the Parish Council to be involved. Parish Councils are not usually associated with outstanding artistic events John Hunt remarked, but they did agree to donate £1,000.

HARBURY WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

The stall at the Victorian Street Fayre was very successful. Many thanks to all who donated the goodies.

The darts team did not make it to the final, but put up a good show. Well done for getting so far, better luck next time.

Mr. Michael Parker came to speak to us on The Sealed Knot Society assisted by Mr. Jack Reid. Both were dressed in the costume of the period. The Sealed Knot was formed in 1968 by Brigadier Peter Young.

They re-enact battles of the Civil War, which lasted on and off for 30 years in the 17th Century. They were a tatty looking lot with no set uniform and dressed according to the wealth of the commander who hired them.

The sword and pike soldiers were helmet and breast plate. The musketeers were an oily wool hat and wooden bottles of charge on a leather belt across the chest. Both were these over baggy trousers and loose tunics.

The guns were not very accurate and only effective at close range.

Plenty of smoke was produced, as the powder used was the same as for fireworks, so a good smoke screen was formed. There were also cannons.

They were mustered together before a battle which had previously been arranged by their commander with the opponent. The cavalry charge started during the Civil War. The soldiers were quartered with the local populace, who had no choice in the matter and had to feed them too. They had very little money and many plundered to keep going.

Barracks were not introduced until 1820. The Sealed Knot, on the other hand, are far more organised. There are about 5,000 members in Great Britain, plus members from overseas.

A big campsite and field is a must to house all facilities such as canteens, medical services, stalls of all kinds, beer tents, toilets and car parks.

Members have training lectures for all aspects of warfare and horse riding. Horses are hired from riding schools.

Licences for guns and insurance are very important. No man or horse has been killed since the Sealed Knot started. They help people make money for charities. October is the final month for battles - they start again in the Spring.

Mr. Parker says the worst thing is to 'die' in an enactment - depending on the weather. It cannot be fun knee deep in the mud!

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

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

GARDENING NOTES

Leaves are falling rapidly so collect them, put into bin bags and leave to rot into leafmould. Many leaves will take up to 2 years to rot so are ideal to protect semi-hardy plants through winter. Put about 6" of leaves, straw, bark chips or evergreen clippings, secured in place with netting as insulation over the roots. Any evergreens planted this year will need the protection of a windbreak to reduce the evaporation rate from the leaves. Move containers of hardy plants to sheltered spots if possible, otherwise lag pots with any insulating material. The soil in pots is subject to frost from all directions so will freeze solid more rapidly than at ground level. Tie together the leaves of red-hot pokers to protect the crowns.

Plant tulips this month. Other spring bulbs can still be put in, but will flower later than normal. Plant deciduous trees and shrubs before the ground gets too wet or frozen. Cut back tall shrubs by about a third to reduce wind damage. Lop trees which are too large for the garden before 5 November and the village bonfire will benefit. Cut out any dead or crossing branches on apples and pears. If blackcurrants were not pruned at harvest time, cut out 1 in 3 shoots on established bushes.

Lift beetroot, celeriac and some carrots and parsnips. Sow quick maturing carrots in the greenhouse. Cover parsley, chives and mint with cloches for winter picking. Plant garlic. Dig heavy soils, but leave cultivation of light ones until Spring. Organic matter can be added now or later in Winter.

House plants need less water in winter even in warm rooms but keep the air around them humid by grouping plants together on trays of damp gravel. If plants can be kept in a cooler part of the house they will appreciate the rest. Check bowls of bulbs. When the shoots are 1" high bring into the light in a cool room, but with hyacinths wait until the bud


is showing. Plant amaryllis. Feed house azaleas and cyclamen with liquid feed every 2 weeks.

Plant of the month: Cotoneaster

These hardy evergreen and deciduous shrubs are part of the Rose family. The majority come from China and the Himalayas, many being brought to Britain by the plant hunters Robert Fortune and later by Ernest Wilson. The varying habits, sizes and leaf textures means there is at least one type for every garden and all can be pruned to fit a space. The white or pink blooms are not showy but are very popular with bees. In Autumn the deciduous types put on a brilliant show and all have glossy red berries which last well, but finally tempt even the shy migrant birds into the gardens.

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
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
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
