

FROM THE RECTOR

What did Eve say to Adam at three o'clock on the first afternoon of creation? Well, she is supposed to have said: "Adam, we live in a world of great change".

It would be interesting to know when human beings started talking about the way things change. Conversations about the way things have changed are probably as old as conversations about the weather. When we begin to grow old - and we do that at a very early age - we begin to talk about the fact that everything has changed since we were young. But we grow accustomed to change. It would be dull if everything remained the same. We often say we would like to stop the clock and live for ever in some moment of great joy or success. But if we managed to do so we would quickly get bored. We need to change if

we are to grow and mature; we need change if we want to live.


Yet, in a world of change there are some things which remain the same. A recent advertisement reminded us that in a world where everything changes a certain brand of chocolate had remained the same. Fair enough! But there are other deeper things which remain the same no matter what is happening on the surface and it is essential that we find and hold on to these things. Peace means finding that calm place within us which remains calm no matter what storms and waves rage on the surface of our lives. And the things which remain the same are very often the simple things which mean most to us.

The meaning of Christmas never changes. The way we celebrate may change from year to year and age to age. The world in which we celebrate certainly changes all the time. Perhaps the way we feel about Christmas is different each year. But the one thing which does not change is the message; that is the same for all time.

God became man, not a special man or superman, but one of us. He was born of Mary, a baby in need of care; He grew up as a child and young man in need of others. He suffered and He knew what weakness was. He was our brother; He had a heart and time for everyone, especially those who were suffering. He was one of us, our friend and brother. And all the time He was telling us how God loved us. Christmas reminds us of all that. And when we hear the Bethlehem story again we know that God has chosen to be not above and beyond us, but with us.

May that deep peace which only Christ can give, fill your hearts and homes and all those you love. Happy Christmas.

Mrs. José Wilcox of Ladbroke, displaying her flower arrangements at the Craft Fair in Harbury Village Hall

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
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LADBROKE VILLAGE HALL

LADBROKE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING 19th November

Whilst we Councillors worked hard in the Village Hall at the November Parish Council meeting, there seems little of public interest to report this month.

During his police report. Pc Andy Went informed the meeting of one garage break-in resulting in the theft of electrical equipment and vandalism to the traffic lights governing the road works. There was some discussion concerning the presence of the refreshment wagon in the lay by. This is not causing any problems on the actual highway so it is of concern to the Environmental Health Department only.

Andy concurred with a previously reported account of a motorcycle speeding down the bypass, having witnessed it for himself during the month. We were advised that the body to contact is the Road Safety Traffic Management section of Warwick Constabulary.

Mr. Jackson, Managing Director of Crosby Homes, had replied following the complaints previously put to him. He generally agreed that the problems had been caused by sub-standard workmanship, but at that time still expected the sewage works on the Banbury Road to be finished

"in the next couple of days"! The five lights agreed on the plans for Hedges Close are still to be erected.

Michael Boden-Pritchett had been busy during the month and had much to report regarding the availability of help in funding, for example, to create leaflets describing circular walks leading from Ladbroke.

In his report, County Councillor Bob Stevens brought the meeting up to date with the latest in the fire station debate. Subject to final approval there will be an application to close Tysoe, but to keep Fenny Compton open. A new fire station may be built at Wellesbourne.

The application for the new Tesco's store is to be discussed at the December Dassett Planning meeting.

HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING - NOVEMBER

This month the Parish Council said their official goodbyes to Alison Hodge, but she will be back in January to help the new Clerk ease herself into the job. Alison explained that she had taken on the role of Parish Councils' Officer for the County Association. She thanked Councillors for their support and their praise. She had valued the encouragement they had given her, especially in the early days and she was sure they would give the same help to Lana Long, the new Clerk.

The remainder of the meeting was dominated by Planning Matters and the enticement offered by the District Council for Harbury to undertake a Parish Appraisal. Both the District Councillors and the Officers are pressing us to survey local opinion and they have substantial carrots to dangle.

Not only is there £50,000 worth of Playground Improvement money and trees on offer, the Appraisal Officer also has a substantial budget to progress projects highlighted in appraisals.

The Housing Department wants the Parish to think seriously about where to put affordable housing to meet the needs uncovered in the latest housing survey.

Sharon Hancock pointed out Harbury was concentrating for the moment on its Village Design Statement.

In the spirit of innovation and consultation Keith Thompson suggested that Farm Street residents be asked where they would like the Parish Council to put the new lamp for which they had set aside funding.

Various Councillors were keen for Harbury to take part in the Blue Lias Ring Walks initiative which would mean upgrading paths as well as producing a Footpath's Guide. Harbury Society is already working to upgrade "Cross the Stile" and will be asked if it wants to participate.

Ken Stephenson still clings to the hope we can provide a Police Post in the Wight School for Pc Stuart Bosworth but there are problems about resourcing it and the Beat Bobby cannot guarantee when he will be available there. Most Councillors thought it better that he park centrally and walk about the village, talking to residents as much as he can.

John Woodward would like to renovate the Chapel of Rest in the Burial Grounds and is seeking quotes for the work. The Clerk was concerned that 13 out of 44 allotments will soon be vacant. She has ordered the Oak whips for the Sentinel Oaks, but John Woodward is still waiting for the free crocus bulbs promised last month.

<u>Planning:</u> Stratford District Council agreed tree work at Stonewalls and Sycamore House, Butt Lane. They passed plans for French doors at the Manor; a pitched roof at 1, Mackley Way and the canopy at Mercia House, High Street.

They refused Mr. Trice permission for an Agricultural Worker's Dwelling behind Brethren's Farm and the barn conversion at Westfields Farm was refused on appeal.

The Parish Council objected to plans to convert Harbury Hall Stables and create an opening in the high wall in Hall Lane. They had no comment about plans at 2, Mill Street; 3, Farm Close or a renewal at the Quarries.

They asked Stratford District Council to take enforcement action at Tresco Barn, Vicarage Lane and over the hoardings which appeared overnight at the Co-op supermarket.

Houses on the Hillside Farm development are in the process of being allocated. Ken Stephenson still wants the Parish Council to have an

input but it was explained there is a common Housing and Allocation Policy district wide.



GARDENING NOTES for DECEMBER

Borders and beds now look rather forlorn and other activities seem much more appealing than a soggy garden. However, now is the time to decide whether or not winter plants are making a display or just a token effort. Along with the Christmas shopping, bring home from the garden centre some of the winter flowering plants. Plant them all together, near the front door and you have a cheering sight every time you go in or out.

Fences and walls can be repaired whilst they are clear of plants. Continue to collect fallen leaves and compost them. Clear debris from under roses and fruit trees to help prevent disease but do not add this to the compost heap. Look out for mice as you go round the garden, for they love to dig up crocus bulbs now. Check stored fruit and vegetables too. Recently I found apples and potatoes were being nibbled. Leather gardening gloves had also provided a few meals to a whole family of mice feeding at once, judging by the loss of so many finger ends. I was not very forgiving!

In the greenhouse keep an eye on the overwintering plants. They must be kept on the dry side but if the sun does come out, the temperature under glass quickly rises. Automatic vents are useful if you are out all day, and would be a very acceptable present. Fungal diseases attack pelargoniums in particular so try to arrange plants so that air can move freely around them. Sow seeds of gloxinias and streptocarpus. Look through the seed catalogues and plan next year's displays.

Plant of the month - Arum italicum Pictum

This lovely form of our native. 'Lords and Ladies' is now pushing up glossy, green and cream marbled leaves beside the fading stems of

orange berries. The leaves last all winter through and provide good cut foliage to use with snowdrops and other early flowers. Plant them in almost any soil in a bed with winter interest plants. The unusual pale yellow-green flowers which appear in April consist of a modified leaf shaped like a hood surrounding a yellow spike, but are not the main attraction of the plant. When the flower fades the green berries gradually turn orange to give a second season of interest to the plant which is native to Europe.

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

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
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
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
