


FROM THE CHURCHWARDENS

As many of you will be aware, Bishop Simon will be retiring from his position as Bishop of the Diocese of Coventry, during the autumn. Over the past seven months Bishop Simon has been undertaking a Missionary Journey round the Diocese visiting all deaneries. He will be in the Southam Deanery between Friday 20th and Tuesday 24th June and we are delighted he will be in Harbury on two occasions. Firstly to attend the Men's Prayer Breakfast on the Saturday morning in the Tom Hauley Room at 7.30am and then on Sunday morning to officiate at a confirmation which will be included as part of the regular 10.30am morning service. Bishop Simon has been a regular visitor to this parish over many years and we are sure we shall have a full attendance both mornings to wish him well and to offer our prayers for a long and fulfilling retirement.

A week earlier than the confirmation service we shall be holding our annual open air service at the recreation grounds, Deppers Bridge, at 3.30pm (Sunday 15th June). This year the service is a little later in the calendar as it is usually held on Rogation Sunday. The music will be provided by the Leamington Spa branch of the Salvation Army and the preacher will be Canon Ken Philips from Priors Marston. A light tea will be provided after the service.

The Parish Breakfast will be held on Sunday 29th June immediately following the 9am service. Please note the time of 9am although it is not a first Sunday in the month.

FROM THE RECTOR

A sacrament is a sign of life - a sign of God's life within you.

Any sign of life is a sign of hope. It points to the future and to new experience. The miracle of life is all around us at this time of the year. And new life is not only in the physically new born. It is often within ourselves; a new friendship or perhaps a growing love. All around us we see signs of life. And it is within these signs that we experience the presence of God. Creation is a constant source of amazement and wonder, both to the layman and the scientist. The mystery of life is a continuing revelation and the more we understand about it the more we realise how little we know.

Our awareness of life and growth does not develop simply because ware told about it. We feel instinctively the mystery of creation, the mystery of love, in a way words cannot express. The touch of a hand, fleeting glance, a certain smile between people in love can speak more eloquently than any words. In the same way, a solitary tear can reveaunspeakable pain or sadness.

All these signs of love and commitment help us to sense the touch of the Creator in our world. But God was not content with that. He sent us an even more eloquent sign: His Son Jesus Christ. In His healing, forgiving and preaching, Christ showed us how close God is to each of us. When He died, Christ left His Church to continue His work of revealing God's closeness to the world. The Church, that is the community of Christ's followers, is a living sign of Christ's continuing presence in the world As Christians our unity with Christ is maintained and strengthened at special moments during which we draw especially close to Christ by recalling his life and actions. At these times we experience the love of our heavenly Father through ordinary human events in life; being born into a family; sharing a meal; being healed and forgiven or making a special commitment to love or to serve in one form or another. Just as a shared glance between lovers is a sign of a total unity which words cannot describe, so the signs we use at such events in our lives as Christians are also a sign of the reality of our total unity with God which words alone cannot describe. We call these special events, Sacraments. A sacrament is a sign, a sign of life - God's life - eternal life.

SUMMONED BY BELLS

The title of the late John Betjeman's verse autobiography makes a fitting headline to this account of the May meeting of the Harbury and Ladbroke Church Men's Society. The promise that Harry Windsor, captain of the Harbury tower and consultant to the Diocesan Guild of

Bell Ringers, would bring along a set of handbells resulted in a above-average attendance. It seems that almost everybody had held long-cherished ambition to have a go on handbells and were determinent to miss the opportunity.

As the Windsor-pattern introduction to handbells for beginners require a rank of eight ringers changing positions end-to-end, somewha reminiscent of old-fashioned army drill movements, we may have looked like 'the awkward squad', but it was all tremendous fun.

Earlier we were treated to an informative and interestingly presented A-to-Z of the manufacture, tuning and ringing of bells from their bronze-age origins to the present day. We learnt that originally they were used for communication purposes. The bells belonged to the community and were housed in church towers only because they were the most suitable places for them and not purposely to summon people to church.

By now it is well known that Harbury is keen to expand its ringing team in readiness for the important contribution bells will make to the millennium celebrations. In the event that Harry was also talent-spotting that night he must, after our performance, have gone home disappointed, though too polite to say so. So it still remains up to the rest of you to rally to the tower captains' millennium call.

A very successful meeting was held in the Village Hall on 2nd May when about 60 people attended and took part in a very enthusiastic discussion about what should happen in Ladbroke to celebrate the millennium. LADBROKE PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Ladbroke Parish Council AGM preceded the Village AGM on 14th May starting at 7pm. The proceedings started with unanimous re-elections of Peter Williamson as Chairman and Peter West as Vice-Chairman.

Windmill Lane

The Council received the very disappointing news from the Divisional Surveyor of Warwick County Council that all efforts to provide a gate across Windmill Lane have failed. The latest scheme to construct a new footpath in the field alongside the road has foundered, as the owner wishes to move the existing footpath and this would incur further expense which the County Council cannot allocate to this scheme.

Water Pumping Station

The windows have now been permanently bricked up following vandalisation, but Severn Trent promised to do their utmost to make it look attractive.

Crime Report

Pc Andy Went gave his annual report to the village meeting. He stressed that rural crime is difficult to detect and as nobody knows the community like the residents, the help of the public is paramount. He again pleaded for more volunteer Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinators and thanked Francis Badman for his work over the years since helping to set up the scheme.

Annual Report of the Chairman of the Parish Council

Peter Williamson reported that 13 Council and 16 Planning meetings had been held over the year. Plans requiring committee approval are sent to the Dassett Area Planning Committee and meetings are held in Southam School library.

The new housing development is now being built. The plans for the social houses are proceeding satisfactorily, but slowly. Those people

who expressed an interest will be receiving application forms from Stratford District Council when the detailed plans from Gloucester Housing Association have received final approval.

The proposed land fill tip at Fenny Compton appears to have been withdrawn, but Peter cautioned us to be vigilant in case of any new threat.

Councillors had attended meetings for the Local Area Committee of Councils and Agenda 21 and the clerk had been on training seminars.

There has been a review of the conservation area in the village which is available from Parish Clerk, Elsa Greenway, for 24 hour loan. Comments should be forwarded as directed in the review.

Peter finally thanked the Council members and particularly Elsa who keeps us all in order and on our toes throughout the year.

Annual Parish Accounts

In presenting the accounts, Elsa explained that the Council is able to precept for monies for direct benefit to the environment or for the inhabitants of the village. The majority of this funding is given to the village hall committee.

Travel tokens to the value of £18 per person are available for disabled persons and those of pensionable age.

Elsa issued an invitation for anyone to phone her regarding holes in the road, faulty street lights etc. She said: that's what I'm there for but I'm sure Stan thinks she's there for a lot more than that.

Alibone Trust - Terence Sullivan

This Trust administers the 16.2 acres in Radbourne Lane and the profits after expenses are divided equally between the church and the village, each receiving £300 in 1996.

The Church and Parochial Church Council

In Fr. Brown's absence, Michael Short confirmed that the numbers of people regularly attending church has risen again this year with, for example, 104 people attending the Easter service. Not only had the W.I. listened to various talks from millinery to accidents but had gone further afield to the Members Suite at Edgbastor Cricket Club, the Bygones Museum at Marton and had hosted the loca W.I.'s Carol Service.

Village Hall - Peter Derrick

Regular subscriptions, particularly by Southam Dog Club for the weeklyhire of the hall has kept the finances healthy in 1996.

The next scheme is to build on a storage area which will free up the stage. Future events are to be the Independence Day Barbeque on Saturday 4th July and probably another dance in the Autumn.

From the questionnaire, 50 people had offered help and the 30 participants at the meeting put forward lots of suggestions which are currently being reviewed.

There had been eight working parties and most of the paths are now in fairly good condition. The grubbing out of the hedges in the fields on the Southam footpath has also destroyed the marker posts. These will be replaced.

Geoff is hoping to produce a booklet of Ladbroke and surrounding district to try and bring in 'circular walks'. He asked for volunteers with artistic flair.

Toddler Club

6 - 10 children attend on Wednesday afternoons during school terms. The organisers are hoping to hold a fund raising evening in September and a big Christmas party for Ladbroke children.

Children's Church - Betty Winkfield

Betty described a happy band of children between the ages of 3 and 10 who join for a simple act of worship between 11am and 12noon on the third Sunday of the month.

Any Other Business

Mif Warr wished to record her dissatisfaction at the lack of integration between the social housing scheme and the main development - to which there were murmurs of agreement.

7.30pm and sundry parish, district and county councillors, the local bobby and about a dozen assorted members of the public are called to order by Councillor Ken Stephenson - Harbury's Annual Parish Meeting is about to begin!

Report from Community Beat Officer

A warm welcome from the Chairman to our new Community Beat Officer, Pc Stuart Bosworth, who lives in Cubbington. He reported on manpower available to cover the area (which is the same as last year). Crime in the Southam area in the last 12 months has increased from 580

incidents to 640 (a worrying trend), with the major increase being irrburglaries and theft, particularly from building sites.

Pc Bosworth expressed sympathy for Councillor Mary Shelley's wish to see bobbies on the beat, but referred to the constraint of manpower.

County Councillor Doody

Another warm welcome from the Chairman to another newcomer to the Annual Parish meeting: Councillor Doody has replaced Councillor Pat Collett as this area's representative. He is on Education and Social Services Committees and his aim is to see more money directed towards education, particularly with a view to cutting class sizes, much to the delight of Councillor Mary Shelley.

Working Party Reports

Amongst the highlights of the year were:

- 1. A planning competition run by Stratford District Council and entered by your Parish Council to try and obtain help with a Village Design Statement;
- 2. Planning approval for housing development at Sonas Mor and Hillside Farm (both of which include some 'low cost' housing);
- 3. Problematic planning applications for Harbury Hall and Brethren's Farm;
- 4. The search for a village caretaker;
- 5. The good working order of the Council's property and equipment;
- 6. Increased contributions from Stratford District Council towards cemetery, playing fields and grass cutting costs from 1997/98;
- 7. The traffic census, results of which were used in support of censuses carried out by the District and County Councils (proposals and the finance to put them into effect are eagerly awaited!);
- 8. The high level of balances held by the Parish Council, with Councillor John Hunt wanting to see a strategy for their reduction (watch reports on future Parish Council meetings to see if this means reductions in your council tax bill or additional spending on new schemes!); and
- 9. Success in securing the removal of the illicit tip at Deppers Bridge.

Report of School Governor

Councillor Keith Thompson is your Parish Council representative as School Governor. In a comprehensive and upbeat report, he referred to




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the departure of Head master Gerry Bailey, the temporary appointment of Peter Algate and the eventual permanent appointment of Paul Milner. Whilst these staff changes were happening, an OFSTED inspection was taking place, following which an action plan and school development plan had to be formulated.

Financial constraints have been as severe as ever and yet despite these difficulties new initiatives have been introduced including a school uniform and the creation of a 7th class. The school now produces a prospectus for the parents of potential pupils and a very professional job it is too. Thanks must go to all those connected with the school.

Village Hall Report

Brian Ingram's report referred to a healthy cash flow and a healthy balance sheet which means that routine maintenance to the building's fabric and fixtures and fittings can be kept up to scratch. A major improvement has been the installation of a public address system.

A feasibility study is underway to see if a case can be made for a Lottery bid for a permanent stage, additional storage facilities and changing accommodation.

It was 9.05pm and a lively and interesting meeting was declared closed. Time for a well-earned pint!

Landscape Audit - Unfortunately the Oak trees we planted in the Autumn have succumbed to the drought. We will replant with container grown trees in November when we also plant trees on the remaining sites.

A Village Design Statement lets us examine Harbury's character and structure and set guidelines for development. We can say what building materials, styles, layout and maybe locations would be acceptable. We can direct change but we are unlikely to be able to stop it entirely.

The Society can have an important role and volunteers are being sought who have skills to offer the team which will progress the scheme. Artists, designers, architects, planners and those with an interest in buildings and landscape are all needed by Sharon Hancock who is co-ordinating the project.

Work will start this Summer and go on into Autumn/Winter. More news soon!

HARBURY CRICKET CLUB

The Saturday League XI captained by Will Russell have had a frustrating start to their season. The pre-League fixtures fell apart and then the first League match (3rd May) was called off when mighty Leamington failed to raise a team. Harbury batting on a sticky wicket took 46 overs to accumulate the runs against bowling which moved in the air and off the pitch. Apart from Ian Lowe, only veterans Les Sollis (21) and Ian Jackson (19) and new youngster Ian Barratt (28) scored runs. Barford never got started against excellent bowling and struggled to 51 all out. Ian Lowe completed his afternoon with the startling figures of 6 for 8 in 13 overs. The Safari Night which we had planned for June has had to be postponed because of a clash of dates and so it will now be arranged for early in September.

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
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
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HARBURY RUGBY CLUB



This year there has been an increase in the entitlement of each applicant from £12 to £15 worth of vouchers and there will be no time limit on the use of the vouchers. Please use them until your stock is exhausted. The Council ask that if you have some blue vouchers from last year's issue please use these up first. Please, please only register if you have a real intention to use them, as any non usage is a waste of parish funds.

Please fill in and return a registration form to any one of the above by **Monday** 7th **July**.

Distribution will take place from the Farley Room in the Village Hall on Monday 21st July from 2pm to 4pm and on Tuesday 22nd July 2-4pm.

Please note no vouchers will be issued to those senior citizens or registered disabled and handicapped (or their recognised guardians) who have not registered.

Stratford District Council also issue bus tokens to senior citizens and registered disabled. These are in addition to Harbury Parish Council's bus vouchers. If you have previously applied to the District Council for these tokens there is no need to re-apply; £18 worth will be posted to you during July. GARDENING NOTES for JUNE

Mist in May, heat in June, brings all things into tune.

So goes the old saying, but as I have failed this year to link the weather to the garden I shall just stay with traditional advice this month.

Early flowering plants can be cut back to within 3 or 4 inches of the ground. This will allow new foliage to grow and sometimes another

flush of flowers, especially if you give them some feed now. At last, bulbs can be tidied up and lifted to store if necessary. Allow them to dry well before storing in brown paper bags in a cool place. The majority of the bulbs will stay where they are and will have put themselves down deep but where you are likely to dig, mark their position.

Prune early flowering shrubs and trim hedges. Remember to deadhead roses and watch for pests so that they can be dealt with before their numbers increase. If you planted any shrubs in the Spring do not allow other plants to grow close to them for a couple of years. Experiments have shown that this is the most effective way of ensuring healthy, vigorous plants.

Plant half hardy annuals and fill gaps by sowing quick developing annuals such as clarkia, candytuft or nigella. All should flower in 8 weeks. Finish planting baskets and containers. Dahlias and greenfly go together, so spray them regularly, but choose a brand which does not kill beneficial insects as well. Check for perennial weeds which can grow undetected in thickly planted borders.

If you do not have a fruit cage, put up small posts for supporting netting to protect soft fruit as it ripens. Small plant pots or film containers nailed to the top of a post makes draping the netting a little easier.

Winter cabbages, sprouts and broccoli can be planted. Put out marrows and outdoor tomatoes. If watering becomes a problem, concentrate on salad crops, leafy greens and plants producing pods, fruits and tubers. It is better to give a really good soaking once a week i.e. 4 gallons per sq. yd. than a little each day as this encourages roots to form near the surface.

Plant of the month - Iris

Iris was the Greek Goddess of the Rainbow and the flowers come in every colour except red. The sword-shaped leaves and soft petalled flowers make these instantly recognised over the whole of the Northern Hemisphere from the Arctic Circle to the Tropic of Cancer. In Britain we can grow many of the 300 species which all like sun but have different soil needs. The main flowering season is this month for the tall bearded iris and the ones which grow in or beside water. Iris were often included in the early flower pictures of Dutch artists of the 15th Century and just as frequently in Japanese art. Royalty took it as their flower but

it also was the symbol of the sky and the heavens. The Pharaohs prized the root as a medicine and orris (iris) root was well known in the Middle Ages. New iris roots should be planted, or replanted, as soon as flowering finishes so July is a good time to get some pieces from a friend. Sit the rhizome on the soil with only the old roots anchoring it in. A sunny site is needed and a feed of garden compost once the plant is established.
