




#### LADBROKE PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

There was no Parish Council meeting in August. However, councillors convened on 13<sup>th</sup> August specifically to meet Stephanie Ainsworth from Gloucester Housing Association and Kevin Reynolds from Stratford District Council for an update on the situation regarding the social houses.

Money has been paid from Stratford District Council to Gloucester Housing Association for them to proceed. Plans for two 2-bedroomed and two 3-bedroomed semi-detached houses were shown and received with much appreciation. These have to be formally approved at the Dassett planning meeting after which Gloucester Housing Association will instruct builders to erect the houses and they are hoping that they will be completed early next year. They are offering 3 houses to rent and 1 for part ownership.

Kevin Reynolds informed councillors that he would check the names of Ladbroke people who had expressed an interest in renting or part owning one of these properties. They will be contacted to provide up-to-date details of their current status and need, so a list of names will be sent to Gloucester Housing Association who will arrange interviews in the applicants' homes from which the final offers will be made.

Kevin again stressed that priority will be given to applicants who have a link with Ladbroke as well as a housing need.

County Councillor Doody and all District Councillors were there to see (if not hear) Ron Grey co-opted for Deppers Bridge and put on the Properties Sub-Committee.

There were rumblings about the review of fire stations. This will be the seventh threat to Fenny Compton and Tysoe retained firemen who could be abolished to save £95,000 a year. The fire officer, Her Majesty's

Inspectorate, the county's auditors and the citizen's jury all call for closure and conclude that adequate cover is available from elsewhere but the debate goes on.

Campaigners argue that the minimum cover that would remain is not acceptable - an engine arriving within 20 minutes of call out and changes locally mean that there are more risks than before, with the M40, BAD Kineton, Compton Verney and Rover to service. Everyone was urged to attend the public meetings and voice their concerns.

Harbury Society requested that the Parish Council help ensure all broken glass on Manor Road Green was cleared before safety fencing was removed. Tree planting could take place afterwards.

John Woodward demanded and got approval for £1,000 worth of hedge laying at the Playing Fields, but reseeding of the football pitch was deferred. Extra litter and dog bins are ordered for the playing fields. Mary Shelley whispered she wanted the Parish Council to applaud efforts by "the Phipps and Mehra boys" to tidy the hedge behind their houses.

Percival Drive residents are quickly forming into a community and voiced concerns about the number of lights proposed for their estate. Even though the Parish Council negotiated a 50% cut they say there are still too many! The Parish Council agreed to provide a lantern in the Lytchgate if the PCC will pay the running costs. Trees at the Spinney and Queens Close obscure street lights. Litter in the Spinney could be cleared by the volunteers who use the footpath with materials supplied by the District Council.

The County Council announced that parts of the B4451 Station Road will be closed to HGVs from 1-19 September because of resurfacing. District Councillors queried whether the Parish Council wanted Deppers Bridge strengthened. The County Council intended to re-allocate the money. Ron Grey remarked that Deppers Bridge was happy with the loss of the HGVs but would want the bridge repaired - eventually.

The Post Office announced an "uplift" of post boxes in the area! The last collection time is being extended. The Community Health Council (the consumer watchdog) is calling for members for its Health Advisory Panel. Councillor Cooley warned that Tesco wants to build an out of

town superstore at Southam.

Stratford District Council granted permission for the extension at 1, Highfield Cottages, Deppers Bridge; new barns at Model Farm; internal alterations at Hillcrest Cottage, Binswood End and pruning of the weeping willow at 10 Farm Street. The Parish Council was happy to abide by Ruth Rose's recommendations on tree work proposed at the Manor. A landscaping amendment to fell Elm trees on the Farm Street site met with approval.

There was no comment on plans for a garage at 7 Pineham Avenue or the removal of the Londis satellite dish to the rear of the shop. There was great delight that the inspector threw out the Harbury Hall Appeal as an out-of-character back land development.

The Parish Council welcomed the improved mix of house sizes at the Hillside Farm development, but was still concerned that the access at the top of Treens Hill would be dangerous. They wanted the Pumping Station screened, asked for variations in the bricks used and some rendering of walls. They were unhappy that brick walls and picket fences were to be used as boundaries and wanted the new development to be compatible with the low-cost homes being built.

Councillor Drinkwater had discussed the use of the Nursery Schoolroom as a post for Pc Bosworth with the Wight School Trustees and it was agreed to pursue this further. Everyone expressed their pleasure at seeing our beat bobby in conversation with villagers as he walked the streets.

#### HARBURY CRICKET CLUB

Saturday League XI: It has been a very eventful month for the Division 4 side, who have been pressing for promotion all season under inspirational skipper Will Russell. On a very damp and dark Saturday afternoon in the middle of Coventry in mid-August Harbury secured second place in Division 4 and now only await the verdict of the League Committee on promotion. They certainly deserve it, since they have been single-minded in their pursuit of victory. The performances of batsmen and bowlers alike have shown a fierce determination to perform at their very best, and the high standard has been achieved by a group of young players who have been with the Club for several seasons.

Last month on 19 July against Attleborough Reserves the League side won again, though not easily. Will Russell (56), Zak Briggs (50) and Greg Sherrington (18) saw Harbury to 144 for 3, but then collapsed to 165 all out. At 85 for 2 the visitors looked on course to win but Ed Russell took 3 for 1 in 5 overs to finish with 5-33, with Will Russell 2-25 and Gary Haynes 2-20 to give victory by 45 runs. However on 26 July Harbury's promotion chase stumbled when they only managed to draw with bottom of the table Potterton. Potterton pottered to a poor 129 for 7 off 50 overs with Gary Haynes 3-25 and Ed Russell 2-48. Harbury struggled at first but Zak Briggs (24) and brother Seb (31) put them into a winning position on 74. A further collapse was only averted by last pair Gary Haynes and Ian Brearley who batted out seven overs to give Harbury 106 for 9. On 2 August Harbury batted first scoring 211-8 off their 50 overs, with some good batting by Seb Briggs (43), Paul Bennett (41), and Greg Sherrington (23). Coventry Colliery Reserves never showed the capacity to compete and were restricted to 124-4 off 50 overs, to give Harbury a winning draw.

Perhaps the real highlight of the season was on 9 August when Middle Road saw a superb triumph against League leaders Greenmore road, who amassed 234-6 in their 50 overs. Harbury started impressively with a magnificent stand of 138 between Ed Russell who scored his maiden century and stand in skipper Zak Briggs (72\*). They were supported by Paul Bennett (19) and Seb Briggs (22\*) to gain a win by 7 wickets with three overs remaining. Against Ansley 2nds. On 16 August Harbury had a frustrating but winning draw. The Briggs brothers - Seb (37) and Zak (38) - laid a good base and then Ed Russell struck a solid 57 to

allow Harbury to read 200-9. Ansley never attempted a chase and finished on 138-6 with Will Russell 2-64.

Harbury clinched second place in Division 4 with every prospect of promotion when with a much depleted side, they defeated Peugeot on 23 August. Peugeot batted first on a very dry wicket and Harbury's bowlers - Ian Brearley (6-23), Gary Haynes (2-8) and particularly Ed Russell (2-45) tied down Peugeot to get them all out for 90 after 38 overs. After tea the rain came and the pitch became difficult but Harbury, led from the front as usual by Will Russell, reached their target with the loss of only 2 wickets after about 28 overs. John Clifford scored a steady 18, Paul Bennett 31 and Will Russell 32\*.

Sunday Friendly XI: August proved a frustrating month for the Sunday side with two matches lost - Lighthorne quoting harvesting commitments and Meriden washed out by the monsoon. But back on 27 July Harbury managed to keep Shilton to 144 for 8 declared off 41 overs at tea, thanks largely to some steady containment by bowlers Richard Lowe, and John Clifford. Shilton threatened to cut loose, but were victims of some powerful bowling by Ian Lowe (14-2-40-5) who had his third five wicket haul of the season. The other notable performance was wicket keeper Richard Carr with his second 3 catch haul of the season. Harbury opened steadily with Les Sollis (42) and John Clifford (35) but the middle order were unsteady apart from Richard Carr (13). Harbury lost two wickets on 139 in a tense finish but the calming influence of skipper Mike Daniels took Harbury to a two wicket victory on 147 for 8.

In a new fixture on 3 August Harbury started badly against Oxfordshire club, Aynho with 11 for 2, but Ian Lowe (66) and John Clifford (72) batted well against steady bowling. They were followed by Phil Linnett (20) and Ian Jackson (19\*) to take the home side to a healthy 205 for 5 declared after 44 overs. Aynho opened well but ran into difficulties when John Clifford (14-1-73-4) and Ian Lowe (13-2-56-2) came on to bowl. Aynho finished on 178 for 8 after 35 overs, and an entertaining match was drawn. A short lived contest at Harbury for Flecknoe on 17 August. Put in by skipper-for-the-day Gary Lowe they were swiftly put out on a slightly damp wicket for 53. Ian Lowe excelled with 5-9 and Gary Haynes 3-26, with two superb catches by Richard Lowe. Harbury struggled a little but eased to 56-5.

#### **GARDENING NOTES for SEPTEMBER**

September blows soft, 'til the fruit's in the loft

goes the old saying and we hope it proves true this year. Looking to fruit for next year, this is the optimum time for planting strawberry runners, but to avoid virus in your kitchen garden, only use ones from your own plants or from plants guaranteed virus free. Still with thoughts of things to come, buy and plant prepared bulbs this month. Sow seeds of any of the primula family and leave the seed trays where they can get the necessary frost and thaw sequence for germination. Re-seed any worn areas on the lawn. As borders are tidied seeds of hardy annuals such as candytuft, love in the mist and pot marigolds can be sown.

Trim lavender bushes. If you want larger blooms on chrysanthemums remove the side buds to leave one bloom on each stem, but leave the spray types to develop full heads.

Dry onions, shallots and garlic really well so that they keep in store a long time. Any sunny spot under cover will save the rush to take in crops which are drying when rain threatens. Onions can be stored in old tights, with a knot between each bulb, and the netting bags containing fruit from the supermarkets make good storage for shallots. We are frequently urged to recycle items so that is a small contribution one can make. A few late lettuces can still be sown, even in a flower border, and, although they will not make large plants they will give fresh leaves especially if you can cloche them. Begin to tidy borders as plants finish

their display and pot up or take cuttings from the tender varieties which have been growing in containers.

## Plant of the month - Michaelmas Daisy

When John Tradescant began to send plants to Britain from North America in the 17<sup>th</sup> Century, this Aster was amongst them and the original Michaelmas daisy which is still white and grows to 4ft. bears his name. Aster is Greek for star and the individual blooms in their colours of pinks, purples, blues and violet, as well as the original white are this shape. The popular name refers to the Church festival celebrated on 29<sup>th</sup> September and the traditional rent quarter day. During this month the borders are revived by this popular perennial. The flat daisy-like heads, rich in nectar attract butterflies and bees. Grow the plants in any normal soil in full sun, but they do not like dry conditions when buds are forming. Powdery mildew was a problem, especially with the variety Aster novi-belgii, but the many hybrid varieties now available do not suffer from the disfiguring grey powder on the leaves. Plant them any time between October and March, except Aster amellus which must be left until the Spring.




