

A minister invited to preach at a prison regretfully chose as his text: "With the help of my God I will leap over the wall".

FROM THE RECTOR

Brian is nineteen and he is driving his parents mad. Since he left school three years ago he has been unable to get up on time or organise his life in any way. He gives his mother £12 a week. In return she provides cooked meals throughout the day as well as doing all his washing, cleaning and mending.

She complains but fails to do anything about the situation. His father is enraged by his son's laziness and selfish lifestyle. Lazy people are the cause of much unhappiness in others but because sloth is routed in self love they seldom recognise the damage they do. And this is what has happened in Brian's family.

Although Bill, his father, has always worked regularly throughout his married life, he has expected his wife to 'wait' on him. Brian is lazy because his parents are lazy. His father's irritation is caused by seeing his wife treat Brian as she treats him although he doesn't realise it. He has been happy to live for years off her activity and self-sacrifice.

His wife is lazy in that she cannot be bothered to challenge the injustice of the situation. She has mentally 'switched off' and allows both men to become more lazy and selfish rather than face the conflict of taking a stand for the sake of justice.

Sloth comes in many forms. It may be mental or physical but the results are the same. It corrodes, destroying not only ourselves but those around us. And it rebounds on us in an insidious way so that we become increasingly isolated within a bubble of selfish inaction.

It is easy to spot the Brians in our midst but such folk are only the tip of the iceberg. Most of us have dark patches of sloth in our lives which we gloss over and push back into the 'pending' file in our minds. This is especially true in our life of faith. And it can be spiritual death. We envy the late Mother Teresa's of the world and murmur "of cannot" when it comes to ourselves. St. John Chrysostom pointed out many years ago that to say "I cannot" is to accuse God of giving us commands that he has made us incapable of following, which would mean He was an unjust God. He is not, why then is it that we "cannot"? Because we are tepid and lazy. We fail to make the effort for ourselves.

The fact that we have a mother, father or dear one who trusts and serves God faithfully will not save us if we are betrayed by our own inaction. Our Heavenly Father judges us solely by what we have done. It is said that the devil once asked his helpers how best he could conquer the world: Tell them there is no heaven, said one. No, said others, They wouldn't believe you. Another said: Tell them there is no hell. Again the helpers replied: No, they wouldn't believe you. The third suggestion was: Tell them there is no hurry. And we do believe him!

LADBROKE PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Matters Arising: The meeting held in the Village Hall on July 15th began on a disheartening note because of all the delays that are being experienced in trying to get repairs and alterations for the village: the culvert at New House Farm on the A423 was originally reported broken in March 1997; the remedial work in Windmill Lane following the development of Hedges Close has not been attended to despite many promises by Crosby Homes; the noise barrier between No.7 and The Garage is still not built to specification; the non-illuminated bollards have gone missing again, the stream is still obstructed by a fallen tree; some of the lights in Hedges Close still wait to be illuminated and there have been no volunteers to mend the bench in Church Road! Poor Elsa! On behalf of the Council and the village she does work so hard writing letters and ringing the appropriate people, it is really disappointing when her efforts seem in vain. Councillor Bob Stevens for the County and Jim Taylor for the District promised to chase up the apparently offending departments.

Police Matters: Pc Andy Went was unable to join the meeting. It was reported that CDs were stolen from a car during the month of June.

Pig Farm at Chapel Ascote: A lot of letters had already been received in

connection with the proposed pig farm. However, there have been few objections from the consultant bodies, i.e. the County Land Agent; Environment Agency; Environmental Health and Severn Trent. The Highways Agency have expressed concern about the lack of visibility at the entrance. Ladbroke Parish Council will be represented at the Planning meeting.

Footpaths: Ladbroke has now joined the Parish Path's Partnership (P3) scheme and the next step will be to prioritise any work that needs to be done.

County Council Report: A document that proposes five centres of excellence for children with special educational needs is out for consultation until 12th September. This document has been circulated to all schools. Gritting will only take place on A and B roads this winter. The Structure Plan - is out for final consultation for six weeks from September 3rd.

Millennium Green Update: Planning permission has been approved for the change of use of Macklin. The submission for consideration of a grant by the Countryside Commission has been sent off and a decision is expected in August.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Wednesday 19th August at 7.45 in the Village Hall.

HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING - JULY

When District Councillor Booth said that Stratford was looking into boundary charges, the Parish Council agreed that the quarries could become part of Bishops Itchington Parish.

Ken Stephenson received Parish Council agreement to purchase Twinning Signs and the Finance Committee will look at other funding bids in August. It seems that plans to remove the Village Hall railings to form a ceremonial space have been thwarted by the Hall Committee's demand that a replacement boundary hedge is established first. Therefore Ken at last got his wish - the railings will be repainted. Ron Grey warned colleagues "It ain't bust, so don't fix it".

We did not win the County Prize for the Best Kept Village, but came a sort of fourth to Welford, Dunchurch and Ilmington, although the Manor Road Green's tree planting was singled out for praise.

The Parish Council told Neale's Close residents to deal with their children who are playing on the Highways verge and annoying householders. It is a 'neighbour dispute', not a Parish Council matter.

Sharon Hancock was appalled at the thoughtlessness of some parents who insisted on driving their children to Harbury School and even opened the closed School gates and then backed down the Lane whilst other children were trying to enter. She was also worried about visibility at the Middle Road/Fosseway junction and the danger of vehicles overtaking under the railway bridge.

John Woodward reported that the County hoped to sign a voluntary agreement to ensure that Biffa lorries carrying clay for a derelict land site in Stratford would use the official route to the tip.

The District Council has now formally taken over the Churchyard and is paying the PCC £320 to maintain all but the trees and walls. Stratford has awarded the village a grant of £5,000 to upgrade lighting columns to the mock Victorian 'Windsor' style that the Parish Council favours. The District Council will supply Dog Fouling signs for the Percival Drive area, at £2 a time.

Planning: The Parish Council did not object to a replacement garage at 21 Deppers Bridge or an extension at the Old Bakery in Chapel Street. It had received notice that Severn Trent was applying for Outline permission for residential development at the Water Tower and would oppose this vigorously as it is well outside the village boundary. The Committee visited Dennis Warden to explain why his house application was rejected.

John Hunt expressed dismay at the long wait potential purchasers of the Shared Equity homes at Hillside were experiencing in buying the houses. Having suffered delays over the land transfer they now had difficulty getting a mortgage.

The Parish Council agreed to underwrite the Village Design Statement's grant shortfall to enable the booklet to be printed in colour and made available to all households in Harbury.

Deborah Steele (Debbie Cooke as was!) has been appointed Clerk for a probationary six month period. The phone number remains the same 614646.

Would all members donate a Tombola prize, if possible. Please leave

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
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your donation at Childyke, Mill Lane or with any committee member well before the show.

The Harvest Supper will be on Friday September 18th and it is requested that members pay at the September meeting.

The speaker was Mrs. Mary Clegg - Journey on a Troop Ship to New Zealand. Mrs. Clegg spoke about her 13,000 mile journey in 1946. She had married a N.Z. pilot in 1945 and nearly a year later set off with her husband and young baby in a converted cargo ship from Tilbury. He was in charge of his squadron and Mrs. Clegg looked forward to them being together. However, it was not to be, as the thirty women and six babies were segregated. She was allocated a 6ft. sq. cabin to house six women and three babies with home made cradles attached to the bunks. Crying babies were not popular with the childless women. One bathroom was provided for all thirty women. Fresh water was for drinking, so sea water was used for bathing and washing clothes. The nappies were like boards and at one stage the babies had to go without them because they were so sore. Imagine the situation in this small cabin.

As the journey progressed so the weather became hotter, 120°F through the Suez Canal and up to 130-140°F passing through the Equator. For a few weeks they had to sleep on deck in the minimum of clothing, the lucky ones lying under the lifeboats for shade and watching the flying fish at night. When Mrs. Clegg was ill in sickbay her baby was taken to her husband to look after.

They went ashore at Aden, but the poverty shocked them. They crossed the Indian Ocean with no land in sight for almost three weeks which was very boring. It become much colder when they approached Australia as it was winter. They went ashore at Melbourne, fascinated by the bright lights, the luxury goods on sale and above all the chance to eat bread and butter.

Then 6½ weeks from starting out, 650 service men, 30 women and 6 children arrived at the natural harbour of Wellington, New Zealand on a bitterly cold and stormy day. How different the journey would be today!





HARBURY CRICKET CLUB

The promoted League XI has continued to experience difficulty amongst the big boys of Division III, but on June 6th against AEI Rugby (match sponsored by the Shakespeare Inn), Harbury recorded a win. Disaster struck against Bharat Sports on June 20th when Harbury lost by 108 runs. The Rugby side reached 155-10 with Zak Briggs 3-45 and spinner Greg Sherrington 4-30, but then Harbury were skittled out for 47 with only Will Russell (20) putting up any resistance.

On June 27th against Nuneaton Old Eds (sponsored by Old New Inn), Harbury returned to form with an emphatic six wicket win. Excellent bowling by Will Russell (4-33), Ed Russell (3-13) and Gary Haynes (3-12) restricted the opposition to 60. The fielding was excellent with nine catches held including 5 for keeper Seb Briggs. In reply Harbury coasted to 61-4 thanks to Will Russell (22) and Paul Bennett (16).

The July 11th match against Dunchurch Bilton (sponsored by Rollason Miles - Solicitors) was eventually abandoned in heavy rain when Harbury had scored a solid 91-4. Seb Briggs (28), Will Russell (15) and Ed Russell (22*) were among the runs.

Against Greenmore Road on July 18th Harbury lost a very exciting match by only six runs. The star of the game was John Clifford with a faultless 67, after Harbury had lost three early wickets. Earlier Ian Barrett (3-5) and Zak Briggs (4-21) had impressed with the ball.

In the Learnington Midweek League the side led by Greg Sherrington lost to Norton Lindsey on June 3rd. They then defeated Severn Trent in the League Cup to go into the next round, where they faced AP. Harbury accumulated a useful 126-6 with Seb Briggs leading the charge with 30. AP were whipped out for 42 with Greg Sherrington leg spinning a fine 3-7. In a really exciting semi final on 24th July Harbury defeated Samuels (Warwick CC in disguise) by 9 runs.

Earlier in the League against Samuels on June 17th Harbury struggled to 101 all out, with Seb Briggs (19) and Zak Briggs (22), but the opposition raced to 103 for 1. Bottom of the league Lillington were defeated by 55 runs on 7th July. Lillington only achieved 53 all out, in reply to Harbury's 108-7 with Will Russell (29) and Adams (35) leading the charge.

Against a powerful Southam side on July 15th, Harbury were fortunate to restrict the opposition to 142. This seemed an attainable target for six overs with Zak Briggs, Will Russell and Ed Russell among the runs. However their departure was followed by a collapse, and Harbury were all out for 87.

Harbury Sunday XI continued with their run drought for the second week on 31st May Against some lively bowling from visitors, Ettington, Harbury only managed to reach 117 for 9. Although given a good start by John Wilkinson (31) and John Clifford (17), only Phil Linnett (17) and Richard Carr (23*) maintained the momentum and the remainder failed to reach double figures with three ducks. The pitch calmed down after tea and Ettington reached 118-3 to win comfortably. Ian Lowe (2-35) bowled well.

On June 7th against Welford on a rain soaked, lively pitch Harbury were all out for 88 having collapsed from 79 for 4. Only Phil Linnett (39) coped adequately with the situation. Again the pitch dried out after tea and Welford coasted to a comfortable win by 7 wickets with 90-3. Harbury's catching was exceptionally poor. Skipper Mike Daniels returned from Vancouver to watch, and even under the influence of jet lag was not impressed. Rumour has it that at least one player was photographed in the early hours in a Portuguese night-club during the week. An enquiry has been instituted.

On June 28th the Sunday XI managed to finally find a dry day when they

played Stratford Bards. Harbury struggled to get runs at first, but John Clifford(31), Les Sollis (34) and Richard Carr (33) all batted well to take the total to 133 for 8 at tea. Bards eventually reached 137 for 4 with three overs remaining. Harbury's bowling - particularly from Derek Clack (2-35) - and fielding were steady. Keeper Richard Carr took two excellent catches and Malcolm Tanner took a fine catch on the midwicket boundary.

On July 5th Harbury were dismissed for 116 - all clean bowled - with only Gary Lowe (38) giving some opposition. Kineton replied with 119-5 to win by 5 wickets, but John Clifford took 4-24 - also all clean bowled. The match against Lighthorne was a casualty of the English summer, but July 19th proved considerably more lively. After a steady start from openers John Wilkinson (17) and John Clifford (24), Phil Linnett took Harbury to victory with a dashing 51 off 25 balls against Hockley Heath. After 23 overs Harbury had reached 61, but Linnett changed the pace of the game with an on song performance to take Harbury to victory for the loss of only three wickets in the 29th over. Hockley had struggled to 107 all out against good bowling with Ian Lowe, outstanding with 5-25, in 10 overs.

The Club opened their up-graded net facilities recently, with new matting, following a substantial grant from the Brian Johnston Memorial Trust. The nets were originally set up with grant aid from Harbury Parish Council, and Club members have recently added considerably to the concrete area. The Club aim to attempt to develop more youth cricket in the village in the future.

SECOND WORLD WAR MEMORIES - Daphne and Vera Lowry

On July 11th, just as we were closing our garden to visitors, I met two ladies whom I thought were on the Garden Walkabout and said they were still welcome to look around. Imagine my surprise, when they told me it was their first visit to Harbury since they had been evacuated here during the Second World War and that they were here for a long weekend to revive the memories of their time here as children. They introduced themselves as Daphne and Vera and said they would have been known by their maiden name of Lowry.

They were originally evacuated from Dagenham to Norfolk, but due to the increased German bombing in their area, they were sent to Harbury. I asked them if they thought the village had changed and they said the most significant change was that it 'appeared to be much more affluent'. We asked them in for a chat and my wife, Julie, asked if they had seen a copy of Frances Mann's book: 'Keck, Cowpats & Conkers' as she had typed the original draft and remembered Frances had mentioned evacuees. Daphne said she remembered being very friendly with Frances and was overcome by emotion when she discovered Frances had put in her book: "my best new found friends at that time were Daphne Lowry and Pamela Taylor" and "I have often thought about Daphne and Pamela and wondered how their lives panned out". Frances now lives in Australia and it was ironic that she had been over here recently for a visit and had missed seeing Daphne by just 5 days! However, Daphne now has Frances' address and I'm sure a letter is already on its way.

I tried to introduce Daphne and Vera to as many people as I could who

would remember those days and took them to see Celia Barrett who let them look at some of her old photographs. The two girls were 'billeted' with Mr. & Mrs. Bird who were butchers in High Street, the house now occupied by George Purdy and he very kindly asked them in and showed them round the house as it is now.

They joined us on the Sunday afternoon when we had a party for Julie's birthday and everyone was interested to hear their story. They said they had been overwhelmed with the kindness of the people of Harbury and we have asked them to come to see us again and not leave it for so long the next time.

Daphne and Vera both married but, sadly, both are now widowed. As I mentioned above their maiden name was Lowry and if anyone remembers them and would like to get in touch or if anyone has any information or photographs they think they would like to have a copy of, then please ring me on 612265 and I will pass on Daphne's address.

Just in case you haven't a Ginger Biscuit recipe, here is one with acknowledgements to Good Housekeeping.

Ginger Biscuits

85gr (3oz) butter or margarine 55gr (2oz) sugar 2 tablespoons Golden syrup pinch of salt

20gr (7oz) selfraising flour ½ teaspoon mixed spice 1½ teaspoon ground ginger

Heat together fat, sugar and syrup, don't boil. Sieve flour, spices and salt, add to mixture, add little water (if needed), mix to firm dough and cool or leave overnight. Roll very thinly, prick well, use 2½" plain cutter. Bake in medium to hot oven for approximately 15 minutes.

GARDENING NOTES

Warmer weather may decide to visit us this month so keep an eye on containers and hanging baskets. When they dry out they are very difficult to soak through again, although there are some moisture retaining granules now on the market which do help. Rain may not get past the dense growth of plants in containers so do not assume they are all right, feel the soil beneath the plants.

Deadheading of flowering plants will prolong their show, even shrubs such as buddleias will continue to bloom for longer if dead spikes are removed. Prune climbing and rambler roses after the flowers have faded and trim back lavender. Dahlias and chrysanths are favourites for blackfly and earwigs so spray with an insecticide in the evening to avoid harming bees and butterflies.

Plant out broccoli, winter cabbage and leeks and sow spring cabbage and perpetual spinach. Stake tall brassicas and earth up to prevent windrock. Bend down the tops of onions to hasten ripening. Cut down raspberry and loganberry canes when they finish fruiting. Loosely tie in the new growth. Prune black currants by cutting out old fruited wood, the best fruit next year will be on new stems which are maturing now.

Daffodils can be planted this month and look out for some of the smaller bulbs such as scillas. Also thinking of next year sow winter pansies and hardy annuals such as clarkia, godetia and antirrhinums in pots for an early display. Cuttings can be taken from fuchsias and pelargoniums. Choose young shoots about 3" long, cut through just below a leaf joint. They should root within a month and can then be potted individually in 3" pots to overwinter inside. Try propagating heather and shrubs by taking cuttings this month.


Plant of the month - Water Lily

Poets, painters, writers and gardeners have all fallen in love with this flower, although coldness, purity and chastity are the qualities attributed to this beauty. Ancient Greeks even thought it had anti-aphrodisiac properties! The botanical name of Nymphaea may originate from the ancient Egyptian name Nilotpala, which was the royal lotus of the Pharaohs. It was revered because the flower emerged from the water at sunrise and re-entered the water when the sun set behind the Great Pyramid.

There is a written description of the water lily in Britain, as early as 1529, but it was the giant lily from British Guyana which cause a world wide sensation in 1837. Hardly surprising, with leaves up to 6ft. in diameter and a flower with several hundred petals. It was named Victoria Regia to mark the accession of Victoria to the throne. The plant, raised at Kew Gardens, failed to flower. Joseph Paxton, at Chatsworth House in Derbyshire, gave his plant elaborate treatment and conditions and was rewarded with flowers that gained him world wide fame. He subsequently based his design for the Crystal Palace on the structure of the lily leaf.

The wild white or yellow water lily is too vigorous for most gardens, but many hybrid ones of more modest proportions are readily available, from April to September, although they are expensive. Most are hardy and easy but must be in the correct depth of water. They do not like running water, but they do like sun and when established require little attention.
