

FROM THE RECTOR

Someone once asked Charles Dickens what was the best short story in the English language. His reply was, 'The Prodigal Son'. There is a great appeal in the story of the good-for-nothing son who went back home to his father because there was nowhere else to go. Maybe that is the secret. The prodigal son's conversion is not dramatic. He does not vow that he will never do anything like that again. He doesn't protest that he is now going to be the kind of son that any father would be proud of. He is lost and alone and he goes back home because he has nowhere else to go.

This is a parable of forgiveness and it describes the kind of repentance that is within the reach of all of us. We can read dramatic conversion stories and remain unmoved because we are not great saints or even great sinners. Our life is not marked by great turning points.

We are mostly middle of the road people who are not nearly as good as we might be.

We seek forgiveness not because we can guarantee that we will never sin again, nor because we can promise that everything will be different from now on. We seek forgiveness from God because we have nowhere else to go. We know that with God there is peace and forgiveness in full. And without that we can neither begin to forgive ourselves nor show compassion to our neighbour. We can recognise ourselves in this, the greatest story ever told. We are all on the road back home, at times losing our way and always in danger of straying. But the road back is always open and is never a dead end.

In the words of Julian of Norwich

"As by His courtesy, God forgives our sins when we repent, even so He wills that we should forgive our sins and so give up our senseless worrying and faithless fear".



LADBROKE PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Traditionally the Council has not met in August due to holidays but there was too much to leave until September so a depleted Council with County Councillor Bob Stevens kept things ticking over.

Matters Arising

After last month's disappointing lack of action by various bodies, Elsa reported a 'lovely month.' The culvert on Banbury Road, whilst not mended is fenced and safe; the non illuminated bollards are back in position; the noise barrier between No 7 Hedges Close and The Garage is now constructed to specification; all the lights in Hedges Close are lit except the one at the entrance; a villager has offered to try to mend the bench at his own home; a new 'dangerous bend' sign has replaced the damaged one and another villager couldn't wait for the Highways Agency to cut the grass alongside the main road and did it himself.

Flood report

Data is currently being collected by Stratford District Council following which a report will be compiled hopefully with action to prevent a recurrence.

Planning

The Dassett planning meeting rejected the application for a 6,000 pig rearing unit at Chapel Ascote. Mr Barratt, the applicant now has the option to appeal or to re-apply with more environmental information.

Ladbroke Section

As with other societies, we have had a summer break and return to our monthly meeting on the last Monday of each month. We are now meeting permanently at St. Mary's School, starting on 28th September.

Before then, on the 26th, we are having a history display between 10.00am and 4.00pm in St. James' Church in Southam and I will have a full range of Ladbroke material available, including the Victorian census records and births, marriages and death records, so call in and see us.

A Snippet from Ladbroke

School holidays were not always on such predictable dates and coincided with the farming calendar. Indeed, if the children were not officially on holiday, they took the time off anyway to help with the harvest or other farm activities such as potato picking.

Ladbroke School was no exception and the log books show the children's dependence on agriculture. The boys were absent in July for haymaking and the summer holiday, about 6 weeks, was called the Harvest Holiday and started at the time of the harvest, usually in late August.

In July - 1878 the attendance was already well down and it was well into October before the log book states "was back up to 54 attendance after harvest."

In 1879 the harvest was late to start - September 1st - "Harvest commenced - barley and oats." September 3rd - "Beautiful day - wheat ripening very fast, attendance about 40." September 5th - "Broke for Harvest Holiday six weeks." October 21st - "Re-opened, attendance small." This is in a school with over 60 pupils under 15 years!





David Parsons, the Warwickshire County Cricket Club's Development Officer has been along and was impressed with our set-up.' As part of its intention to develop Cricket in the village, and particularly to encourage more youngsters to play, the Club is aiming to install a permanent (non-turf) wicket, and is bidding for financial assistance from both the Parish and District Councils.



Family life with a disabled child can be stressful. Parents need a break and children themselves benefit from being with a different family and gaining new horizons.

A Scheme called *FAMILY LINK* could 'approve' you as a carer to look after a disabled child for short periods, perhaps one weekend a month. You would be paid, trained and supported. Because only short periods of care are usually needed, the Scheme is a way people can help children and their community, while carrying on with their normal life in terms of work, leisure commitments and holidays.

GARDENING NOTES

In the vegetable plot harvesting is already under way, with shallots and some potatoes in, and beans and tomatoes producing crops to pick every day. So, with an eye to next year sow spring cabbage, swedes and turnips. Now is the time to select a few large marrows which can be ripened and stored for winter use.

Stand the fruit on a brick and expose it to the sun to harden the skin. Buy lilies and other bulbs and plant them so that they establish in warm soil. When planting lilies be sure to give them good drainage by adding sand or gravel in the base of the hole if your soil is not well drained. If you want bulbs in flower for January plant up bowls of hyacinths and narcissus this month. Take cuttings from tender plants which have been growing in containers. Choose shoots which have not flowered, and put several cuttings around one pot. These should make strong young plants which can be potted individually and over wintered indoors

Cyclamen plants which were dried off earlier can be repotted and watered to bring them into growth again. Indoor azaleas can also be fed and brought inside. Continue to water other houseplants but reduce liquid feeds to once a fortnight now and remember to bring in any which have been outside during the summer if the nights begin to get cold.

Cut out raspberry canes which fruited this year, tie in the new canes. Water autumn fruiting varieties and blackberries too. Prune plum and damson trees immediately after harvesting the fruit. Tie grease bands around apple trees this month to catch the wingless female winter

moths as they climb the trunk to lay their eggs higher up the tres. When picking apples inspect them carefully for blemishes as these will soon begin to rot and will harm other fruit near them once they are a store.

Plant of the month - Rudbeckia



Compact and longflowering 'Goldstürm' makes an ideal border plant

These colourful daisy-like flowers provide colour until October and last well as cut flowers. The common name of cone flower describes the cone shaped centre rising above the petals which can be in shades of yellow through to orange. There are annual, biennial and perennial varieties, all hailing from N. America, and varying in height from 1st to 7st. John Tradescant, Keeper of the Royal Garden began to grow them in England in the 17st Century, but it was the Swedish botanist Linnaeus who named them. He was a man with many friends and he commemorated many of them when he named the plants with the names we use today. Rudbeck was a Swedish family with whom he once worked as a tutor. The plants are easy to grow in any fertile soil except waterlogged clay and they are virtually pest free. Sow seeds of the annuals in March and plant them out in May. Sow seeds of the perennial varieties at the same time but grow them on until October, or buy plants now and plant them for flowering next year.




