## WHAT MAKES YOU HAPPY?

St. Luke's Gospel CL6W20-26 - The Beatitudes.

How happy are you who are poor: yours is the Kingdom of God.

Happy you who are hungry now: you shall be satisfied.

Happy you who weep now: you shall laugh.

Happy are you when people hate you, drive you out, abuse you, denounce your name as criminal, on account of the Son of Man. Rejoice when day comes and dance for joy, for then your reward will be great in heaven.

A cynic once said that there are two ways of keeping a person happy: let them have their own way or let them think they are having their own way.

It is true that the desire to do our own thing is very strong in every one of us. But it doesn't always make us happy. Very often it does; it makes us busy and active and leads to a lot of good being done. But going our own way doesn't always bring us happiness. Sometimes it leads to disappointment and failure and we wish we had listened to other people's advice or followed their way instead.

Another difficulty is that often we do not know what we want. We want to be happy but we do not know what will bring happiness into our lives. We have to learn from life and we have to go on learning from life. We need to look at our values. The Beatitudes are a lesson in living for those who want to follow Christ's Way.

Christ, takes some of the most attractive things in life - riches - satisfaction - enjoyment - popularity - and says that if you have these things in abundance then you must beware. Think where they may be leading you.

On the other hand, if you have your share of hardship and suffering, if you don't always get your own way, then you should not be afraid because you may be closer to real and happiness than you imagine.

These are hard words, but they are words of life. They demand great faith. But many people have found that they have the ring of truth. They strike a chord in us because they are spoken out of experience - Christ's own experience. He

knew what he was talking about because he had gone through what he asks us to go through.

The Church and Village Hall have recently been the pivotal points until the advent of the Millennium Green. So from all three we included minutes, Trustee lists, programmes (thanks W.I.), event posters and tickets and associated paraphernalia, including of course the Millennium Eve celebrations.

For the Parish Council in went a full electoral roll, a voting card (Simon wondered where his had gone when he came to vote on Thursday!) and a plastic pig!

There are very few trades actually operating from within the village, but where we could we included business cards and items such as a combine harvester for JMT Engineering, dolls furniture for Fitrite, a screwdriver from The Garage, dried flowers by Josy Wilcox and pressed flowers from Ladbroke's verges by Rosemary Allington.

The boys wanted to include a motorbike as several ride motor-cross and one Speedway, so the girls included model horses, of which the village is surrounded with. We even included a set of rules to play Pokémon.

A mixture of photographs of those involved with the Millennium Green and shots from around the village were enclosed. Other paper work included the estate agent details of houses recently sold, photo birthday cards of the village and a selection of the freebies; Southam Advertiser, Harbury and Ladbroke News, Villager and TV Trader (I wonder what will be watched on TV in 2100 – or even if there will be such a thing as TV?) plus a copy of the "Ladbroke" booklet.

At the short parish Council meeting that preceded the Annual Village meeting, Jeff Todd was elected as Chairman for the forthcoming year and Carol Northorpe continued in the role of Vice Chairman.

## **Planning Matters**

The District Planning Department confirmed the approval for the conservatory at Yew Tree Cottage and also at the Bungalow, Banbury Road.

Village Repairs. Even though the repairs to the footpaths and roads have been agreed, the list will have to be put in priority order to ensure best use of limited

resources. The suggestion for a footpath alongside the main road to Southam is a non starter due to the length involved.

## **Grant to Village Hall**

A cheques for £600.00 to cover the cost of insurance was made out in favour of the Village Hall

All other items were duplicated in the main meeting.

An excellent turnout of villagers were joined by County Councillor Bob Stevens and District Councillors Jim Taylor and Alan Akeister .

## **Matters Arising**

At last year's Annual Meeting it was suggested that the footpath kindly allowed by Malcolm Norgate was no longer needed because of the reduction in traffic. The land has now been given back to Mr Norgate with a letter of thanks.

### Chairman's address

Jeff Todd read out on behalf of Peter Williamson who was on holiday, a summary of the major events of the last year. The majority of these have already been documented in previous editions. However he went on to thank Linda Doyle for the excellent history exhibition held in the village hall last weekend; Rhian Kelsall for her vigilance in checking the cutting of the grass thus allowing the cowslips to flourish; Michael Boden Pritchett, not only for the interesting display he had mounted that evening, but for his work on the footpaths throughout the year. Finally, he thanked his fellow councillors and especially parish clerk Elsa Greenway, without whose conscientious work and lively interpretation of the rules, we would be a much poorer Council.

The Annual accounts were accepted.

### **Reports from the Organisations**

**The Allibone Trust,** Terence Sullivan on behalf of this Parochial charity that looks after the 16 acres of land at the top of Radbourne Lane, reported that the surplus money had been divided between the church and village projects.

**Church and Parochial Church Council.** Canon Roy Brown reported an average of 29 weekly communicants with special services, augmented by the Harbury and Ladbroke Choir, which attracts many more participants.

A generous legacy from Mr and Mrs George Hedge had allowed extensive repairs to be carried out to the roof and to the bells. A millennium gift of St Luke's gospel had been distributed to all households.

A chest and more lately a piano stool had been taken from the church.

**Women's Institute**. Hazel Sharples told us of the successful year enjoyed by members; of the their many interesting talks and visits; a finals place in the short mat bowling competition; the Strawberry Fair (or was it a Fayre?) and the Beetle Drive which is to be repeated on **June 20**<sup>th</sup>. The good state of the Village Hall was also testimony to their work in the shape of new stage and window curtains.

**Village Hall Committee**. Peter Derrick explained that, as a charitable trust, the Village Hall could not raise money for commercial organisations. As most village functions this year had been directed towards the Millennium Green, many Village hall events had been put to that cause but the Millennium Club money enabled the laying of the patio, which is a huge improvement. The next venture will be to improve the roof.

The Village Hall is financially in reasonable shape but more participation is always welcome, particularly young men. (Peter said that, not me!)

**Millennium Green**. David Halsall spoke of the busy period leading up to the Opening Day on May 1<sup>st</sup> which included the TV coverage. John Craven's promise to speak to Bill Giles about the weather obviously worked. An information board has been ordered. Following a tendering exercise, the contract for maintenance has been awarded to Warwickshire County Council ground maintenance team.

**Women's Fellowship**. Betty Winkfield spoke of the sadness at the death of Pearl Edwards, who had been a founder member of the group since 1945. The proceeds of the Lent Lunches had helped in the sponsorship of the boy in Cairo as well as donations to the Gideons, Acorn Children's Hospices and Mozambique.

**Bells**. During the winter the bells had been taken out and sent to the Bell Foundry in Loughborough where a small group of bellringers visited to watch the retuning process. They are now rehung on new headstocks with modern ball bearings which makes them somewhat easier to ring. There is a regular team of 5 ringers for the 5 bells but new members are always welcome to join the Thursday evening practice.

**Friends of Ladbroke Church**. The much enjoyed lunch, tea and supper events had raised money for the beautification of the church. There is to be a special civic service on **June 18<sup>th</sup>**. The children of the village will process from the Village Hall to the church dressed as the saints who brought Christianity to England.

**Children's Church**. Seven families of children regularly celebrate on the third Sunday of the month at 10:30a.m. The group is well led by Jackie Theaker and a highlight from last year was the bread-making session. (I think I'd better join) Many more children joined in the special services where there is a 'tremendous turnout'.

**Report from the County Council.** Bob Stevens congratulated the village on a well organised Millennium event.

<u>Education</u>. The LEA had received an excellent Offsted inspection and Southam School has been awarded college status.

<u>Planning and Transport</u>. The new County Plan insists that development must be sustainable, therefore new homes must be built near towns. Subsidised buses from Southam to Leamington and Banbury now help to eliminate rural transport problems.

The detrunking of the A423 has been delayed because of the bridge repair at Marton.

<u>Social Services</u>. Bob reiterated the well rehearsed problem of the aging population. The published Health Improvement Programme promotes preventative health care.

The new cabinet style of council is working well and speeds up decision making.

Report of the District Council. Jim Taylor said that the efforts carried out by Ladbroke Parish Council were characterised by 'hard work, diligence and attention to detail'. He explained that the successful procedure for ensuring the removal of a fallen tree from the part of the stream owned by an absent landlord had formed a legal precedent. Jim is the chair of the first Area Committee locally and encouraged applications for funding from individual or group projects. He also felt that an application for a capital grant for village hall repairs would be well received.

Alan Akeister introduced himself as a new District Councillor for Southam and 'hopes to get to know Ladbroke residents better'.

**Police Report.** PC's Stewart Bosworth and Tony Saville were made very welcome. They explained that the 68 square miles divided into areas of Long Itchington, Southam and Bishops Itchington and Ladbroke which were previously looked after by individual PC's, were now 1 beat, looked after by themselves. It is hoped that the numbers may be increased next year.

Southam Police Station is manned as follows:

8.00 a.m. - Midnight Weekdays 10.00 a.m. - 2.00 a.m. Fridays and Saturdays 10.00 a.m. - 6.00 p.m. Sundays

The front office is open for civilian enquiries, from 9:00am - 5:00pm on weekdays.

The number of crimes (2200 last year) is fewer than in towns and police do rely on the vigilance of country dwellers. The number to call is 01926 415618. Unfortunately nothing prevented a robbery in Bridge Lane last week.

There was a long discussion regarding Neighbourhood Watch. Francis Badman brought this to Ladbroke 10 years ago but lack of co-ordinators has reduced its effectiveness lately. The police are 'reinventing' it as the Community Alert Programme which is being co-ordinated by Barry Armitage. Again this will only work if people in the community are prepared to be actively involved. Barry can be contacted through the police station.

**Daffodils in the village.** At the end of a short discussion regarding various kinds of flowers in the village, for example crocuses or wild flowers, a vote was taken. The consensus was that things should be left as they are with just the cowslips.

Any Other Business. In connection with flooding, Peter Derrick gave an excellent summary of the specific problems, the proposed solutions and the frustration at the inaction by the agencies involved. Elsa had previously stressed the urgency to the Flood Officer who promised to visit as soon as it was possible which was likely to be summer. Alan Akeister will arrange for the Flood Officer to meet the County Council to specifically discuss the urgency of the situation.

The meeting finished with a vote of thanks to the Parish Council, led by Francis Badman.

# HARBURY ANNUAL PARISH MEETING 2000

<u>Pc Stuart Bosworth</u> gave up his off-duty time to report to the meeting the fall in the detection rate for the Southam area (from 28% to 15%) which has coincided with the reduction in staffing at the station. There were now just two Community Beat officers, backed up by two "reactive" officers. Extra help had to be called in from Kenilworth where Sgnt. Tew was now based.

Cllrs were sympathetic to the problems the force faced but most concerned at the lack of adequate rural policing.

<u>Parish Council Chairman, John Hunt</u> too was concerned by the reduction in policing which meant residents despaired of an "Effective Deterrent" to vandalism and anti-social behaviour.

He said Harbury had been "extra-ordinarily fortunate" to have recruited Jack Heath, Dutch Van Spall, Ann Winchester and Jenny Patrick as Councillors

The development of the Tennis and Netball courts had been subject to careful scrutiny and debate. There now seemed a real prospect of improved road safety measures at Deppers Bridge.

He praised the efforts of the Millennium Video group and those who organised the New Year Celebration. He expressed the Council's delight that John Drinkwater's long and outstanding contribution to the community had been recognised with an MBE and recorded with sadness the recent death of Ralph Gurden and Gwen Watts who had rendered distinguished service to the Parish.

He mentioned Linda Ridgley's comprehensive reports of Parish proceedings but was somewhat dismissive of her persistent suggestions that the residents should be consulted about Council plans, articulating the view that Councillors were elected to decide what needed to be done.



Sharon Hancock, explained the progress of the controversial planning application for the Playing Fields improvements. She regretted the slow progress on removing the BT Aerial but explained that the Village Design Statement had been useful in helping the Council press for improvements to planned developments during the year.

Keith Thompson too referred to the Tennis Courts application and a number of other improvements undertaken during the year; piped water to the Allotments; the planned replacement of the large slide following a presentation from the School Children; PC approval for a skateboarding "half-pipe"; replacement of benches and the high standard of greens maintenance.

#### Dismantling the slide

<u>Ken Stephenson</u> gave a very lengthy report on Lighting; on traffic including the Road-signing review and PC plans to create a One-Way System round the Church; on maintenance; policing; housing; footpaths; the Village Hall; Best Kept Competition and training.

<u>Jack Heath explained</u> that the Precept was being raised in line with inflation giving Band D households a rate rise of £0.15p. Fees for the football pitch and Burial Grounds which had remained the same for three years went up by 8%. The value of Concessionary Travel tickets remained the same.

<u>Dutch Van Spall for Deppers</u> explained the saga of the Bridge works and the subsequent removal of weight restriction and resultant campaign for Traffic Calming. Plans for this were available for viewing at Carol Shuttleworth's house on **8th June** from 7:00-9:00pm for those who had not yet been consulted about them.

Keith Thompson for the Governors complained that the School budget had been cut for 2000-2001 but there was an additional Capital Grant of £6,200. The new Computer suite was installed. The School was twinned with Stoke Primary from Coventry whose pupils visited Harbury and shared lessons.

<u>The Village Hall</u> reported another good year with bookings up, (especially for education,) and hiring income increased by 44%. There was a continuous programme of improvements and the Theatre Group was fund-raising for a portable staging system which all agreed was much needed. <u>Brian Ingram</u> was pleased that representations made at the Warwickshire Rural Community Council AGM on the increase in water rates had brought about a sensible solution.

Retiring Chair of the Twinning Association, Ken Stephenson reported on a highly successful visit to Harbury's twin French village of Samois sur Seine where villagers competed in a Mini Olympics. Ken is succeeded by David Winter.

<u>Cllr John Drinkwater</u> recalled days past when attendance at the Annual Parish Meeting was much higher than the seven residents before him. "People", he said, "should take an interest in how their village is run", and he wanted the Parish Council to do more to attract them to the Annual Meeting.

<u>District Cllr James Turner</u> suggested there should be a guest speaker for next year and refreshments. Linda Ridgley asked the Council to consider undertaking a Parish Appraisal where all the residents were asked what the village needed, so that they felt more "engaged" in the process of local government. The Chairman said "Humph"!

### HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING MAY 2000

This was the Annual Meeting where the succession is fought over, though you'd never have realised. John Hunt was returned as Chairman for a third term with Dutch Van Spall, newcomer from Deppers, voted in as Vice and Chairman-in-Waiting.

A similarly civilised courtly manoeuvre was played out over the One Way System proposed by Cllr Drinkwater. County Highways did not favour the idea, partly because they fear it would speed-up traffic only countenancing it if the public were in full support. John Hunt suggested reversing the flow, but Cllrs were not keen to have the intrusive signs necessary. On top of that there was, the Chair pointed out, the problem of having to consult the public. John Drinkwater withdrew the suggestion with good grace.

There was no such pussyfooting over the level of policing though! There were complaints of vandalism in the Wight School Playground and Constance Drive residents were appalled that the Police were "too busy" to attend to problems on the Recreation Grounds Car Park and complained about the length of time they took even to answer the telephone. Ken Stephenson proposed printing an "Incident Sheet" in the Harbury News for all residents to record anti-social behaviour and return to the PC for transmission to the Police. That, said Dutch Van Spall, should embarrass them.

The Consultation on the Deppers Bridge Traffic Calming is proceeding smoothly and the Parish Council is expected to provide £3,000 towards the works.

Stratford granted permission for a pitched roof at 5 Heber Drive, a garage at 12 Pineham Avenue and the felling of a Leylandii hedge and three fruit trees at Pool Farm. To everyone's great joy, BT was fined £5,000 and costs for erecting the aerial without planning permission. Transco apologised for leaving their barriers on the Old New Inn Green. The Council is to compliment Stratford on its District Design Guide.

The new Play Equipment is being installed; the Noticeboard at the Wight School is to be replaced, but probably not in time for the Best Kept Village Judging; Laings will be told to remove the rubbish they dumped on Ed Wilson's land and take down the signs for Hillside, that still litter the Fosse.

To Mr Powell-Tuck's delight the Percival Drive lights are now shielded (he offered to be responsible for the erection of the Dog Fouling Signs). A lighting upgrade plan was provided for the Councillors but has not been made public. Ken has installed a bollard in Binswood End. (Do look at it as the PC wants the Public to say if they like it).

An acceptable offer has been made for some of the Council's redundant mowers which John Hunt, somewhat tetchily pointed out he had not forgotten – they were being held in reserve - just in case they were ever needed - he insisted.

Ken Stephenson reported on the Twinning Visit where he won a Medal for Boules and Sharon Hancock a Certificate for Wine Drinking! He presented to John Hunt a specially bottled Twinning Red Bordeaux and a Plaque from somewhere in Spain!

# Bus Vouchers for Senior Citizens, Registered Disabled and Handicapped Persons

Bus vouchers will be issued in **July** to the above categories of residents living within the Parish. 'Senior Citizen' means a person of State Pensionable age i.e. 60 and above for a woman and 65 for a man. For 2000 the total value of vouchers to be issued is £15.00 and each voucher is worth 50pence towards Stagecoach Midland Red services, 63, 64 and 65 and Village Taxi-Bus services. There is no time limit on the use of the vouchers, but if you have some left from previous years please use them up before using this year's vouchers.

To obtain the vouchers, please register for the Scheme by getting a form from either the Post-Office or from the Clerk to Council, Deborah Steele at 12 Hillside.

The forms must be completed and returned to one of the above by no later than Monday  $3^{rd}$  July

Vouchers will be issued in the Wagstaffe Room at the Village Hall on **Wednesday 19<sup>th</sup> July** and on **Thursday 20<sup>th</sup> July** between 2.00pm and 3.30pm.

Please note that only in very exceptional circumstances can vouchers be issued to persons who do not register by the due date of 3 July.

In addition to the Parish Council's scheme, Stratford District Council also issue travel tokens to Senior Citizens and Registered Disabled persons. If you have previously applied to the District Council for tokens, it is not necessary to apply again; you should receive £20.00 worth by post during July. If you have **not previously applied, forms are available in the Library or by telephoning** 01789 260 402 or 01789 260 423.

### PARISH PATHS PARTNERSHIP

We have now put together our work plan based on the surveys carried out last year. Our work will initially be aimed at the priorities we have identified throughout the whole parish, followed by paths on the Centenary Way and then to complete the paths where we have already carried out work.

At the end of last year the group undertook the construction of its first stile on the footpath starting at Temple End heading towards Chesterton (SM65). Drawing on the experience of John Buck and muscle of Mike Morris the job went very smoothly. With this success under our belt we decided the group would be able to tackle the majority of outstanding work ourselves and have been provided with a good selection of hand tools by WCC.

It happened that a member of the village had personal knowledge of a hospital in Uganda which could make very good use of their generosity. The result, already, is a new (small) ward specifically for HIV and Aids patients.

So here are two questions:

- 1. \*How would your household respond to the idea of contributing *the equivalent of what you normally spend on an evening out*, to a Third World project to be agreed upon?
- 2. If the idea gets support, are there people in Harbury with personal knowledge of a Third World community with a specific need, which might be helped by such a project?

# **DASSETT SENIORS' FOCUS**

This is the new name of Southam Older Person Forum which was felt to be cumbersome and not reflect the geographical spread that was included in the group. The group covers approximately the same area as the Dassett planning area within Stratford District so the name reflects this. The group is open to all who have at least 50 years experience (of living); reverse ageism!

The last meeting, which are every 2 months or so, was in April. The speaker was Kevin McGovern supported by Andy Stoke, both from Warwickshire County Council transport section. They explained their areas of responsibility: support for public transport; public transport publicity and home to school, including disabled transport. From the point of view of the group it was the first two that were of most interest. The rural transport budget that was introduced a couple of years of ago has been extended to 2004 at the same level. Other points of interest were: there will be a national number for transport enquiries by the end of the year. WCC has its own public service vehicle inspector which covers vehicles and systems, the South Warwickshire rural transport initiative has been approved by the Countryside Agency for £1/4 million over 3 years. When setting up the rural transport initiative the guidelines used were: every community of 50 or more would have at least one bus a week on market days and every community of 500 or more would have a daily bus to the nearest town. WCC are looking to making improvements in the Leamington-Banbury corridor. A fifth Flexibus is being obtained. A new timetable for the area is imminent - new format rather than significant changes in services, timetables available from Shire Hall and the travel centre in Regent Street, Leamington..

Considerable discussion followed and we were able to feed back our concerns over transport into the system that has at least some influence on policy. An example is that although Harbury has a good bus service to Leamington (approximately hourly during the day and several in the evening and on Sundays) it is still very difficult and long winded to get to Warwick Hospital. Publicity for services is not as good as it might be but this was acknowledged and work is ongoing to improve this aspect. Harbury also has weekday services to Coventry and the new A & M service to Stratford.

The next meeting of the group is on **27<sup>th</sup> June** at 10.30am at Victor Hodges House, Little Park, Southam. The speaker will be Janet Bonser, chief officer of South Warwickshire Community Health Council on 'Health Matters!'. I shall be going and if anyone needs further information get in touch with me.

Back to earth though: the clematis Montana, in a near-death stupor for some time after its amputation, now (surprise! surprise!) peeps over the top of the wall to laugh at us as we come up the drive. And why not? Whose idea was it? Conveniently, I can't remember. There's a lovely specimen festooned over the walnut tree just behind us; maybe it'll throw a roving stem across the intervening gap and shoot along the roof of the bungalow. Like human beings, plants need space - and in both cases some need more than others.

# HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

Mr Trinder, the speaker at the last talk on "Grasses & Grasslike" illustrated with the help of slides the many types and uses of grasses. It was warm in the Farley Room and this caused distortion of the slides, which affected the focussing! However, he managed to convey what useful plants can be found in the fast family they comprise. Many make splendid and interesting autumn and winter colour but I could not help thinking that the wind would play havoc with some of the taller varieties.

I think the coach to Angelsea Abbey on **Thursday 8 June** is fully booked, Judy has been very busy and now all we need is a fine day. The coach leaves the Village Hall at 9.00am on the dot, so please be there early (with umbrellas for insurance!)

Will members who intend going on the evening outing to Spring House on **Tuesday 20<sup>th</sup> June**, please meet at the Village Hall at 5:45pm. This should be a very pleasant evening, provided the weather once again plays its part.

The open gardens weekend will soon be here again. Teas will be served in some gardens on the Saturday, in the Farley Room on the Sunday (just in case the weather is wet and cold). There will also be plant and produce stalls, so any excess cuttings or seedlings will be welcome. This event is the Society's main fundraiser, please make it a success by supporting it, as we hope that the weather will do so!

The time for the Village Show is creeping ever nearer, the schedules will soon be available. The Committee has decided that the show (Sat. 9<sup>th</sup> September) will be open to Ladbroke & Deppers W.I. and residents of Ladbroke as well as members of Harbury W.I. and Horticultural Society and residents of Harbury and Deppers Bridge, as before. This they hope will widen the competition and bring in more entries. These last few years the handicraft section has been progressively shrinking, almost to extinction and the judge supplied by the W.I. has been seriously under employed. There is a separate schedule for the children, now available, and this year entries are required by 7<sup>th</sup> July, no later.

One of the classes is for the best Impatiens plant in a max 6" pot. Seedling plants available, also schedules, from Ron Grey on 612515. Should you this year intend to exhibit wines, it is very important to use clear glass bottles, with flanged closures (so that the judge may properly evaluate clarity and colour and does not have to struggle unduly to open the bottles).

#### GARDENING NOTES

With luck, this is the month when the borders are a riot of colour and the perfumes fill the evening air. Is it tempting providence to even write that?! Gardeners are ever optimistic so get out the garden furniture and bring out the tender plants which you have overwintered. Bedding plants can now be put out in safety. There really isn't any advantage in buying them earlier, and when buying look for the ones which are not in bloom, unless you want to be sure of a particular colour. They establish more easily and last longer.

Rock and alpine plants need to be cut back hard after flowering finishes to prevent them straggling. Divide any which have outgrown their space or have grown outwards leaving a bare centre. If you don't need the extra plants pot them up to give away or sell at the Walkabout. Early flowering perennials also need cutting down to within 15cm of the ground, then delphiniums and lupins may bloom again. Deadhead roses, cutting back to a strong bud to encourage more flower shoots to form. This is the best month to take softwood cuttings of shrubs. Take a 10cm soft young shoot, trim it to just below a bud and remove the lower leaves. In a pot of light compost this should root in about 8 weeks.

Hosue plants are now looking forward to a look at the garden, so find them a shady place for the next 4 months but remember to water them. A recent Gardeners Question Time suggested using houseplants as part of a border display. An idea worth trying but not in a very sunny garden.

In the vegetable plot the tender ones which give us the summer harvest, tomatoes, courgettes, sweetcorn and French beans can be planted out. Some of them are pretty enough to go in with the flowers but they do need space and feeding. Herbs are at their peak for flavour so pick them for drying or freezing in ice cubes. I prefer the colour and taste of the frozen ones so any tiny containers are saved for this purpose. It is time to look ahead to winter crops so plant out leeks and the brassicas. Sow turnips and swedes.

### Plant of the month - Helianthemum

Look up the derivation of this name and you find 'helios' the sun, and 'anthos' a flower, from Greek. In old gardening books the common name was Sun rose, but now look in the Royal Horticultural Society Encyclopaedia and the flower is a Rock rose. Which ever common name you call it this 'Rose' looks as sweet although it does not smell like a rose at all! In a dry sunny spot this small hardy evergreen will give weeks of colour. The first ones to be grown here were the yellow and white ones which are native to S. Europe. Now shades of pink and red have been added to the range, with names such as Fire Dragon and Cerise Queen. Although each flower lasts only a few days they are produced in such profusion that the plant is covered in blooms. After about two months the flowering finishes but a trim over often persuades more buds to form in September. They do well on our alkaline soil where it is well drained. Plant them along the front of a sunny border to enjoy the flowers and afterwards the evergreen foliage gives a good ground cover. Replace the plants after 4 or 5 years when they become straggly.
