



Congratulations to our photographer, Mike Bloxham, who excelled himself this month in taking a superb range of photographs during Carnival Week. It has been difficult to choose a representative selection even though we have included eight pages of photographs.

This month several organisations in the village have benefited from the fund-raising event organised by Paul Winchester. The dance and raffle raised a staggering £3,000 through his hard efforts, and young and old alike in the village will have reason to be grateful for his endeavours.

Many villagers will have observed ongoing construction work at opposite ends of the conservation spectrum. Whilst the demolition of the subsiding garages at Leycester Close and the subsequent landscaping have improved the vista, the same cannot be said for the work in Hall Lane. It is inconceivable that the authorities have given planning permission for the destruction of the wall and the loss of the attractive view of Harbury Hall with the development of a new residence.

The Spirit brings love, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. Galatian Ch. 5 vs 22.

Graces and Gifts

If you go on snapping at each other and tearing each other to pieces, you had better watch or you will destroy the whole community.

Who said that? A frustrated parishioner at a parochial church council meeting? A parish priest trying to sort out the conflicting interests of groups in his parish? No, Saint Paul said it to his converts in Galatia around the year 58 A.D. and that was only twenty years or so after Christ founded the Church!

Human nature, they say, never changes. Even Christ's disciples argued about who was the greatest. And ever since when people have gathered together in Christ's name, there has always been the danger that they would misuse God's gifts and end up at odds with one another.

One of the reasons for this state of affairs is that for most of our lives there is a war going on inside us. One part of us wants us to look after ourselves, take everything that's going, think only of the present. Saint Paul calls this self-indulgence. If this is what makes us tick then we can end up as nasty people. But there is another side of us that persuades us to be kind, gentle, and trustful. Saint Paul calls this the Spirit. The Spirit of God, which is in each one of us touches us and we can become the people God intended us to be.

It was because this side of us needed strengthening that Jesus sent His Spirit into our hearts to make us holy. Guided by God's Spirit we become holy, our human nature is changed by the power of God at work in us. Becoming more like Christ we are more able to witness to Him in the world.

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace.

Where there is hatred, let me sow love;

Where there is injury, pardon;

Where there is discord, union;

Where there is doubt, faith;

Where there is despair, hope;

Where there is darkness, light;

Where there is sadness, joy;

For your mercy and truth's sake.

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
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Mrs. Bedford then told the story of Jesus calming the storm on the Sea of Galilee.




There were 8 entries for the 'beer' race and for the second year running the winners were Steve and Mark Evans with a time of 8 minutes and





The Pre-School - Learning Through Play

The Pre-School is held in the Wight School, behind the Library

With all the debate about resources for the Health Service, you will be pleased to learn that a small hospital opened in the Wight School for a Staffed by energetic receptionists, forever answering the telephone and talking to patients in the waiting room, and keen doctors and nurses, the patients enjoyed a high level of care and attention. Despite using such aids as stethoscopes and thermometers, it rapidly became apparent that this was primarily an accident unit. A useful lifesize picture of a skeleton helped to identify all bones that could possibly be broken and were in need of bandaging. The fragility of bones was quite astonishing. Some patients even broke their legs while lying on the bed having their arms bandaged. At the end they all checked out with the receptionist who decided to give them a present if they had been good, but not if they had wriggled. After that, some beautiful drawings of skeletons were made to act as an aide mémoire at home (you have been warned!) Our gratitude to everyone who helped to make such a realistic waiting room and ward, complete with folding screens, uniforms and a wonderful array of stethoscopes and thermometers. We all had a brilliant time.

Huge thanks to everyone who donated cakes and other goodies and to all the men, women and children who helped with the teas on Carnival Day, not to mention everyone who came and ate them. Thanks to matching support from Barclays Bank, which brings our fundraising this term to a total of almost £1,000 with one more event to go. This is the Pre-School Disco in the Hall of Harbury School on Saturday 14 July from 5 - 6 pm. It is primarily for children aged between 2¾ and 5 and to maintain the atmosphere we have decided not to allow elder siblings (although we do hope they will pass on all tips for groovy dancing). Tickets will be available on the door at £2, which includes as much drink as required, some crisps and a party game.

Finally, we say farewell to the children who are leaving us to start primary school next term. We have really enjoyed having you in the Pre-School and are very proud of all you have accomplished. Mrs. Harris has been to visit the children here and we have taken them down to the school so there is already good sense of the joys that await them when they start. It's always sad to say goodbye to one generation and we have eight children leaving us this term. However, it's exciting to meet the next generation and we have at least another six children waiting to join the group in September. If your child will be three years old by Christmas and you are thinking of sending them to the Pre-School, do call by and talk to Yvette. There are still a few places left on each day although we do expect it to be busy by the New Year.

Harbury Primary School - News

Government funding - No doubt you will have noticed a significant number of changes around the school site. The Government has indeed made more money available to schools but within very precise areas of spending, and much of it only accessible for what is called "capital works". Last year we had the new path laid and some areas paved. We have recently improved the condition of all the children's toilets (ask them what they think) and there is still a little work needed to complete them. This has cost about £8,000 and has been possible through using some of last year's and all of this year's capital funding. In the last few weeks we have used a "seed challenge" award of almost £2,800 (we had to put in a bid for this) to help pay for the new play equipment, paved areas, picnic benches and outside water fountains (not in yet). This was only available if we could find at least 50% of the funding ourselves; and the PTA did just that! All of the work that's been done over the last three years for access for the disabled has come through Government grants after successful bids were made.

Finally, the roof over the junior and admin section of the school will be re-surfaced in the coming months – again through Government grants that had to be bid for. So far there has been little extra for the school to spend on other resources such as books, science equipment, maths resources etc.

Now that the footpath has been completed, can parents and children please <u>not</u> take a short cut across the field but walk round. It seems a long way but we're certain that it won't do anyone any harm - honest!

Staffing September 2001 – Year 2 (Itchen). We have accepted the offer of some extra funding due to the class sizes initiative. This has only been made available for one year to support Y2, as our present year 1 is over 30. This will cause some raised eyebrows but it is the only offer on the table. We felt that this would be an ideal opportunity to give more support to Y2 as it has been for Reception this year.

From the beginning of the next academic year, Itchen class will have two teachers for most of the week. They will be working together and using the classroom and library to give even more input to those children (there are 32 of them). The second teacher will be Miss Julie Heptinstall, a newly qualified teacher who is just completing her post-graduate year at Warwick University.

Security – By the end of the week we should have used all of our allocation of yet another grant (again we had to bid for it) to increase security and safety for children and staff. All of the external doors will have locks on them that can be opened by a key from the outside and by a handle from the inside. These handles are designed with children in mind so that they can easily get out in emergencies etc. The front door will have an electronic lock, which can be opened by key-holders but all visitors will have to ring the bell. The lock will be operated from the bursar's room by electronic switch, if she decides to allow entry!

Padded envelopes – Again, we have a surfeit of these and anyone who would like to come in and have some, please call in and ask. No charge.

Co-operative Bank – Thanks to all those people who use this bank's credit card we have recently received £88.84 as our share of their commission. Many thanks to all 24 of you. If anyone requires further information, please contact school and we'll send out details to you.

Senior Citizens' Outing and the senior Citizens' Outing

Again the Senior Citizens were treated to another pleasurable outing. This year our destination was Poole, basking in glorious sunshine, with a blue sky and a millpond sea. Poole is the second largest natural harbour in the world, with four tides a day as the sea ebbs and flows around the Isle of Wight.

In the Middle Ages it was the country's main port and became popular with smugglers. Many of the early 19th Century settlers in Newfoundland came from Poole and a very lucrative timber trade developed. Its wealth was displayed in the complete rebuilding of the town, as can be witnessed today by the preservation of so many fine Georgian buildings.

One can be acquainted with its more recent colourful history by taking a ferry cruise around the Islands that surround the bay.

Furzey Island, owned by BP (British Petroleum) is the most productive onshore oil well in the UK, pumping out several thousand barrels of 'crude' a day. The only evidence of its presence is the small pumping station near the shore, which replaces the extracted oil with seawater to stabilise the island.

The National Trust owns Brownsea Island with its Henry VIII castle and former home of Robert Baden Powell, founder of the Scout movement. The island is also home to a colony of red squirrels. A chain ferry connects the island with the Sandbanks peninsula on which stands the Haven hotel from which Marconi sent his first radio message.

The Condor catamaran, making its regular run to the Channel Islands, within strict navigation channels, came on to us abeam making an impressive display of its twin hulls, which threw spectacular 'bow waves'. This imposing vessel makes the journey in 2 ½ hours, reaching 44 knots (50mph). Parts of the harbour waters are only eighteen inches deep and the ferry captain assured us that if the boat

sunk we could walk back to Poole! I am indebted to Audrey West for these notes as having no notebook we resorted to the margins of her shopping list – the only paper to hand.

Back on dry land there was time for an ice cream, a look round the pottery and a cup of tea before boarding the coach. A half way stop on the return journey for fish and chips and a pint, if so minded, concluded a most enjoyable day.

Pensioners' Patio

Nature or nurture? Is it all in the genes or is early training the more potent influence? Any watcher of garden birds will have seen parents teaching their offspring the uses of bird table and birdbath. At the moment, a hen sparrow brings her three youngsters regularly for lessons. One certainly includes the information that an appearance of Homo sapiens with a plate of crumbs means: "Get in their quick before those greedy starlings scoff the lot". Soon she'll be leaving them for short intervals to explore on their own; later they'll be ignored except as members of the local flock. The chief blackbird has already gone further — he positively harries his own young family if they dare to encroach on his preserves where food is concerned.

So much for nurture. But the other day a young starling, left to forage on the bird table on its own, disappeared into the roof section for a few seconds. What was it doing, and how? Later investigation showed a strip of wood, normally out of sight, running from side to side, leaving a small space above in the apex of the roof. An enterprising bird could half-flutter, half-scramble on to this platform to glean the insets in the cobwebs above it. Yet never before had I seen any bird perform this manoeuvre, and this was a young, inexperienced bird on its own. It had worked out the connection between the insects and the wood platform.

Another link in the chain was added later that day when the starling family descended en masse. It became evident that the resourceful youngster belonged to the same group as the older bird, which

regularly gets right inside the nut cage. (Others have tried to imitate it but in vain.) The relationship could very well be parent and offspring. In any case, the genes responsible for problem solving seem to have got switched on in both birds — Charles Darwin would have been interested, I'm sure!

A lone wood pigeon comes each day to squat in the birdbath. He sits there, blinking dozily in the way common to pigeons, almost falling asleep. That's all very well, but I wish he wouldn't use it for other purposes – it always needs a good clean-out afterwards. Doing what comes naturally? Or should I blame his mother?

Gardening Notes

The recent rain was welcome to the gardener if not to the tourist. In spite of this, watering is the major task on baskets and containers, even after rain, because the lush growth prevents the raindrops getting through to the soil. Try not to water plants in the borders as this encourages shallow rooting and intolerance to drought – once a week in dry periods is enough. If watering is necessary, do this in the morning rather than the evening, as the slugs and snails enjoy moist soil at night.

The beginning of this month is the best time to take cuttings of your favourite plants. The mild nights and the light days give the ideal conditions for root growth and then for the cuttings to develop. Pinks and carnations are easy to root in sandy compost. They should be big enough by autumn to plant out in the borders, to look good next summer, especially alongside grey leafed plants. Divide bearded irises now they have finished flowering even if you do not want more plants. Lift congested clumps and replant the outer younger stems.

Pick flowers and grasses and herbs for drying on a calm dry day. Try anything you fancy, but delphiniums, achillea and rosebuds are successful if they are dried rapidly. Pick herbs just before they flower for best flavour. Deadhead all plants to keep the blooms coming; lupins and delphiniums can be cut to the ground to give a second flush. Dry off any tulips you have lifted and look for autumn flowering bulbs to plant now.


Shrubs that have flowered can be pruned to keep them tidy and tencourage more flowers next year. Trim hedges and evergreen shrubs Summer prune fruit trees, and thin overcrowded fruit clusters. No cherries if not intended for bird food.

Lift onions and garlic and sow swedes and turnips. Finish planting leeks and wintergreens. Watch out for caterpillars and the tiny sawflegrubs on gooseberries. Blight on potatoes shows as brown leaves with white mould underneath, so keep a lookout for early signs. Remove side shoots on tomatoes and stop the plants when they have made trusses.

Remember your plants will still be growing whilst you are away so plan for their care before you pack your suitcases.

Plant of the month: Gazania

This half hardy perennial was named in honour of Theodore of Gaza who in the early 15th Century translated botanical writings from Greek to Latin and so made them more widely Also known as available. Treasure flower, the bright daisy-like blooms and attractive foliage with a silky sheen will provide brilliant colour until the frosts. First brought here in 1755 from the Cape of Good Hope, the rich gold or orange flowers were popular because



they were generally trouble free and wind resistant.

Their disadvantage is that they do prefer sunny days although they do bloom in dull weather as long as it is warm. Coming from South Africa they do not stand our winter but they can be kept as cutting over winter. Alternatively sow the seeds in January to grow the news hybrid varieties that carry flowers, ranging from gold to pinks and reduced to brighten the front of the border for many weeks.



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
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
