




by the welcome sung by the Harbury Primary School Choir, the choice of "Consider Yourself ..." was the perfect introduction to the judging process.

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
From The Rector

AFTERNOON MEETING

We were grateful to Margaret Sweet, our November speaker, for finding time in her very busy life to come and speak to us on Prayer. Margaret is a Prayer and Spirituality Co-ordinator for Mother's Union in the diocese, a Church Reader, and a student of Theology at Oxford. Margaret has experienced the importance of prayer throughout her life, especially at sad or difficult times. A focus for our prayers, such as a flower, a candle or an icon, can give us inspiration. We can send up arrow prayers at any time of the day, but a regular pattern is also important. In Matthew Chapter 7, Jesus said "Ask...., Search.... and Knock".

Margaret finished by reading "Are You Listening" by Nick Fawcett in which he asks God to accept him as he really is, with all his faults; and

in God's imagined answer he says "It's you I want to talk to - not the mask you wear for the world; you as you really are I love you as vou are".

EVENING MEETING

Marian Millington, our speaker in November, felt she was called to become a Prison Visitor in the year 2000. Later, she was asked to become a Quaker Prison chaplain. She works in HMP Brockhill YOL a small women's prison and HMP Blakenhurst, a large men's prison. Marian told us about some of the prisoners she has met; many of whom have suffered all kinds of abuse, and are deeply scarred. Even prisoners on remand can be in prison for many months before the case is heard, and women especially may be very concerned about their children outside. A visitor needs to be able to chat on various subjects, as well as to listen and support when prisoners have problems to share. Many have drug or alcohol problems and Marian is running a group for them.

Prison visiting does have its lighter side and some of Marian's anecdotes were very amusing, but her talk was also very thought provoking.

Ladbroke Parish Council met on Wednesday 19th November at the Village Hall, when the main agenda item was a discussion with David Tiley, the Flood Defence Officer, from Stratford District Council. A drainage survey of Ladbroke is being initiated and Mr Tiley and the Councillors will be walking Lot Brook to identify any problems. We are pleased to see that Warwickshire County Council have started work on the numerous minor road repairs needed throughout the village, and they are also monitoring the heavy lorry traffic along Harbury Lane. Hopefully the work at Old Barn Farm will soon be completed.

There were no objections to the felling and trimming of some trees at Tollgate Cottage, and a further letter has gone to the Planning Inspectorate to strengthen the case of "unsuitable road access" to New Farm Stables in Ladbroke Road for extended use as B1(c) and B8.

Harbury Parish Council

A short meeting was held with a reduced Council and few planning applications. Stratford granted a Holiday Let at Square Close, Middle Road, and a conservatory at 7 Deppers Bridge. The Parish Council had no observation to make on an extension at 4 Butt Lane, tree work at the Manor House, or the replacement of an outside spiral staircase at Harbury House. The Council had written to Stratford about problems with neighbour notification of applications.

Councillor Jenny Patrick will arrange a meeting with Bishops Itchington Parish Council Chairman to decide how we should react to any proposed development at the Quarries; this could be built into the Parish Plan. Councillor Mancell is prioritising the Review Action Plan, and has promised to publish the results in the Harbury and Ladbroke News.

Volunteers have come forward to operate SID (the Speed Indicating Device) which Councillor Booth recommended as a way to illustrate to drivers that they were exceeding the limit.

Councillor Thompson had inspected the Burial Grounds and produced a Safety Audit. He could find no evidence of gravestones having been removed and will arrange for Mike Bloxham to photograph the whole area to provide a baseline the future.

It was decided to ask Colin Sheasby to look at the foliage overhanging the roof of the Chapel in the Burial Grounds. Councillors complained about the bramble that overhangs the corner in Hall Lane's one-way system. There was still no action on the collapsed wall opposite the Pound. The Francis Road/Vicarage Lane footpath was overgrown and needed attention.

Councillors agonised over whether they should attempt to achieve Quality Parish status, which could give them enhanced powers and possibly more funding. They already satisfy many of the criteria and the Clerk is taking the appropriate qualifications. They would need to produce a quarterly newsletter for parishioners and indulge in consultation exercises. After much soul searching, they agreed to consult the Secretary to the Warwickshire Association of Local Councils and in principle – go for it.

The whole Council was thrilled with Harbury's progress in the 'Village of the Year Competition' and full of praise for the way that village groups rallied round at short notice to put on, not one but two, presentations of Harbury life. Everyone was most impressed with the publication produced by Dutch Van Spall to illustrate the depth and

breadth of Harbury's concern for its people, environment and economy. Copies will be available to buy at the Christmas Fayre. Dutch wanted to use 'Village of the Year' as a promotional hook and was keen to get together a group to seek sponsors willing to support village organisations financially.

The Clerk had had no response to the plea for information about residents who would need special care during an emergency. The data protection act prevents Councillors compiling the list from their own knowledge.

Stratford's Dassett Area Committee has an under-spend of £80,000 in its grant pot, but applications must be in by 12th December!

PC Hill warned residents that thieves were about and to report immediately anything suspicious.

Harbury was Warwickshire's nomination for the 'Village of the Year Competition' and the Society made a presentation on our work in the Village

Hall in October along with many others. Unaware they would be filmed as part of the Competition Publicity; a large enthusiastic audience arrived for Stephen Faulk's talk on the Warwickshire Landscape on 25th November. Stephen is Senior Keeper of Natural History at Warwickshire Museum and gave a very clear and wideranging explanation of the Warwickshire Landscape, its underlying geology, natural divisions, the impact of man, and the diversity of wildlife that is still to be found in the Shire. Stephen has been involved in the Biodiversity Audit that has provided a Habitat Survey for Coventry, Solihull and Warwickshire (the old Shire). He made the point that the urban and suburban areas are often richer in wildlife than the farmed countryside. Some "Brownfield" sites which are government's preferred development targets are the richest habitats of Bishop's Bowl Lakes is an amazing site with a very rich flora, many butterflies and even a hobby (a bird of prey), but it is threatened for it has outline planning permission.


Harbury Review



CRIME

We asked people about their experiences of crime, as this was one of the most often mentioned concerns in our preliminary surveys. A hundred and fifty-three people had cause to report crime to the police, but only eighty five got an incident number. This means that only eighty five of the crimes made it to the official statistics.

When we asked what type of crime people had experienced in Harbury in the last twelve nuisance incidents months. top followed bv came drunkenness, vandalism and damage to property. Trespass. theft from cars. intimidation, burglary and shoplifting had been problem. Six people had been robbed and six had suffered personal attack.



Not surprisingly, two hundred and thirteen residents were willing to join Neighbourhood Watch and the details of those who completed the volunteer form were passed to the coordinator.

Local Council Issues

RECYCLING

Thank you to all who responded to the question about recycling plastics and cardboard. It is gratifying that so many of you want to see something done to stop this needless pouring into landfill sites of bulky, recyclable substances.

The bad news is that for sound economic reasons, Stratford District Council is unable to help us for the foreseeable future. The better

news is that we are talking to BIFFA about the possibility of a locally run collection point. The crucial question is "Which recycling company would collect"? If you think you know of a recycling company who might be interested, let us know!

GRANTS

Unusually, there are still funds for capital projects in the coffers of Dassett Area Community grants committee, which must be spent in the current financial year. Typically, grants are for up to 25% of costs for projects that offer benefit to the community. Deadline for applications is Friday 12th December, but anyone interested is urged to contact Lucy Workman at Stratford District Council (01789 267575) as soon as possible.




has been an able president for the past year has been re-elected. There is now a full committee too.

The group Carol Service will be held at Ladbroke Church on Sunday 7th December, commencing at 2.30pm.





Pino lacaruso

Former Royal chef and long-time Harbury resident, Pino lacaruso has more reason than usual to be celebrating Christmas this year.

Six months ago, Pino published his first book 'Flavours of Rosello', a delightfully nostalgic and highly evocative recollection of a calendar year in the life of the little Italian village where he grew up in the fifties and sixties.

The book has proved to be a runaway success, selling like hot cakes to friends, customers and people who visit the charity fairs where Pino and his wife Caroline sell the mouth-watering foodstuffs that they produce in the kitchens of their home in Penelope Close and from where they run their business Take Two Cooks.

During a long and colourful career as a chef, Pino has cooked for several members of the Royal Family, including the Queen, the late Princess Margaret, and Prince and Princess Michael of Kent. (It was Princess Michael, who has written an introduction to the book and who is one of Pino's favourite Royals, who was one of the first people to receive a copy of his book.)

Pino began writing the book, which contains some of his delightful watercolour paintings as well as dozens of delicious recipes from his childhood in the Abruzzo region of Italy, over 12 years ago.

Progress came to a halt when he was diagnosed with mouth cancer in 1995; he had major surgery the following year. As a mark of his gratitude to consultant cancer specialist Mr. John Watkinson of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Birmingham and the team of doctors and surgeons who helped to save his life, he will be donating part of the proceeds from the sale of 'Flavours of Rosello' to the 'Get A-Head' charity appeal for head and neck diseases, including cancer.

Trading Standards Advice -Knowing Your Rights When Buying Goods

Most people have bought things and when they have got them home changed their minds for one reason or another.

Many shops these days will let you have your money back if you wish to return something you have bought, even though there is nothing wrong with it. But what are you entitled to in law?

The law only requires a shop to take goods back and refund your money if the item is faulty or incorrectly described, or it does not do what it is supposed to do.

However, choose carefully, because if you have made the wrong choice, then they do not have to do anything, not even offer a credit note or exchange.

Our last talk? Mr Brian Cook took us through the rudimentary steps of pruning. Thank you Brian, it was a memorable evening, we all learned



Gardening Notes For December

It is hard to believe that we are at the end of the year, and what an exceptional one it has been, from the weather aspect and for gardeners. Summer flowers are still blooming along side winter jasmine and cyclamens as I write. It is now time to tidy up for winter, and then a period of relative inactivity in the garden through the next two or three months. Severe weather is rare in December so we hope there will be some days to get all the jobs out of the way.

Remove any dead or untidy growth from trees and shrubs, and any branches that may rub in the wind, as this gives a site where disease can enter. Roses should be planted now, and prune established bushes, cutting them back by about a third. Prune apple and pear trees and give them a winter wash to kill moss and over-wintering pests. Feed and mulch currant bushes and inspect blackcurrants for big bud. Cut out branches bearing these swollen buds and destroy them. Give a general tidy up to the borders ready for the bulbs to make their appearance.

In dry weather rake up leaves from lawns and paths. Compost them in a separate pile or in bags as they take at least a year to rot. The resulting leaf mould will be worth waiting for as an excellent organic addition to both flower and vegetable beds. Do think of growing a few vegetables next year, to feed the family with the organic crops so many people now seek. A small space in a border or a few pots will yield quite a worthwhile amount. Yes, it will entail some work but the pleasure of producing food for oneself is great, far better than trudging round shops. From July about eighty garden chemicals were withdrawn from the shops, and from the end of this month it will be illegal to use any you may have in the garden shed.

Check outdoor taps for leaks and lag pipes before we get frost. Take all pots to sheltered positions and lag those containing less hardy plants. Check greenhouse heaters and seal any draughts if you are over wintering plants there. Check bowls of bulbs and bring them into the light when the flower buds are 2" high. Keep them in cool conditions, only bringing them into warm rooms when the flowers are opening.

PLANT OF THE MONTH - SARCOCOCCA

The easier name this for evergreen small shrub Christmas Box or Sweet Box. which make it sound far more attractive. Although it has glossy foliage and grows into neat dark green mounds, it is



often unnoticed until winter; then the tiny flowers open giving out such a sweet fragrance, you stop to search for the source of the lovely honey scent - go to Warwick Castle gardens on a mild, moist day to experience it.

This shrub arrived here in the 19th century from their native China, and possibly found by the plant hunter Joseph Hooker, as a specie bears his name. These shrubs will fit into any garden, will do well in almost any soil, and are good in shade, even in dry, rooty places under trees. Sarcococca hookeriana will eventually reach 5ft x 6ft; Sarcococca humilis forms dense little shiny hummocks of about 1ft. A few other varieties are raised, all bearing small fragrant white flowers followed by black or red berries. Their awkward name comes from the Greek 'sarkos' meaning flesh and 'kokkos' meaning berry, but it is for their wonderful winter fragrance that I grow them.

There must be many people, like me, who are dismayed at the continuously spiralling level of our Council Tax. You will recall this year's massive 58% increase from Stratford District Council, which they attempted to mask by including the Parish Rate and then calling it

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
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38%. When added to the increases in the two previous years, we have all incurred a 79% increase since the turn of the millennium; and this only from Stratford District Council - also very large cash increases have been imposed by the County Council, in addition to a 38% increase in the Police Authority Precept.

For those of us living modestly on fixed incomes, the strain is now beginning to tell. When council tax becomes greater than all other fixed costs put together, ie, telephone, gas, electricity and water, there has to be something wrong. Yet, council tax is a monopoly, and you cannot "take your business elsewhere".

All indications are that rises of this magnitude are not about to stop. So what is to be done, and who is at fault? Is it our inefficient local authorities, or is it central government short changing them? Whomever you speak to there is a different reply.

Well, now there is an opportunity to find out, and make your voice heard. After considerable pressure from many people in the District, Stratford Council have belatedly called a Public Meeting at The Grange in Southam on Thursday 11th December to "test the water" on the level of council tax next year. Don't let this rare opportunity to interrogate your councillors and officers pass you by.

It's good news that these meetings are taking place, but disappointing that Warwickshire County Council and the Police Authority choose to call their own separate meetings. I think it is called 'Divide and rule – what price joined up government'?
