

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

## Ladbroke Parish Council

Ladbroke Parish Council met on Wednesday 20<sup>th</sup> August at the village hall; the July meeting having been postponed due to the absence of three of the five Parish Councillors.

The pole under Macklin Bridge still remains in-situ, but as the Parish Plan had now been granted funding, the Quiet Lanes initiative that Councillor Janice Berry has been promoting can now go ahead under this medium. The Council are also pleased to announce that Richard Walker has kindly taken on the job of chairmanship over the working party for the Parish Plan, and we look forward to involving everyone in this venture to facilitate improvements throughout all areas of the village.

Councillors were advised that a copy of the crime survey prepared by Councillor Peter Baker had been handed to the Police.

Meanwhile, Councillor Tim Seden and the Clerk have been looking at a new notice board and consider placing it in a more accessible part of the village. The Clerk will be pleased to receive all ideas on its new location and this will also enable the Council to display the Minutes in a more easily read format.

Councillor Richard Bennett had walked the village and listed the numerous requirements for the cleanliness and repair of the roads, kerbs, footpaths, verges and signs throughout the village, in preparation for a visit from the Divisional Engineers.

Mike Boden-Pritchett handed out copies of the new Blue Lias Rings Walk No.3 "Ladbroke And The Lost Villages". Copies are available at the Bell Inn, and if anyone wants more information on the lost villages, contact Linda Doyle for history booklets about Ladbroke.

Thanks were expressed to Jim Laidler for his assistance in preparing the Internal Audit.

Stratford District Council have refused permission to New Farm Stables, Ladbroke Lane, for change of use to cover B1(c) and B8, due to the impact of vehicles on the approaching Class C and D roads. The stables at Newlands, Windmill Lane and the garage roof alteration at Whiteways, Bridge Lane have both been granted and the Councillors acknowledged that to the best of their knowledge Fitrite Wardrobes have been using the land and buildings at Ladbroke Farm in accordance with their business. Councillors had no objections to an application at Cherry Trees, School Lane for a side extension and at 14 Ladbroke Hall for bedroom alterations. Finally, the mobile food van operating in the lay-by is under observation by Stratford District Council, and Severn Trent has at last cut the grass on their site in Bridge Lane.

#### Ladbroke Neighbourhood Watch

Warwickshire Police has now launched a new website at www.warwickshire.police.uk and it will include the weekly Southam Crime Summary. (It can be found by going to the Southam police station pages.) The crime summary is a look at the crimes of public interest that occurred on the Southam policing area over the last seven days. The police do not as normal practice include crimes of shoplifting, bilking, domestic violence, fraud, or offences occurring on the Barnhill M40 service areas.

A number of calls have been received about bogus household collections. Residents in the Southam and Rugby area have been leafleted with a request for bric-a-brac in aid of needy children. However, the requests do not appear to come from a registered charity and it is therefore possible that any donations will be sold to profit the collectors.

Residents across the county have been receiving unsolicited phone calls from an energy supplier offering both gas and electricity. Householders have complained that they have either declined the offer or have asked for further information and then received notification of their "verbal agreement" to change their supplier. These cases of energy mis-selling have been taken up with Energy Watch. Please report any rogue traders via the website or telephone 01926 414000.

#### **Harbury Review**

The results of the Review have now been published along with a Draft Action Plan (copies from Linda Ridgley on 612792). The Parish Council is now using this information to devise its Parish Plan, which will seek to solve the problems exposed by the survey. Below, we give a flavour of what came out of the Review process.

# WHAT YOU SAID!

THE HOUSEHOLD SECTION was intended to give us baseline details about the people who live here. The typical family lives in Harbury in an owner-occupied detached house. Over ninety percent of homes have mains electricity, water, sewerage, central heating and inside WC, but only two thirds have a computer, and only half are connected to the internet. Sixty-nine children could enter

Forty-seven percent of Harbury School in the next four years. respondents reported no one from their household had been forced However, there were away to find suitable/affordable housing. seventy-nine individuals who had done so. (In the personal section, thirty-one people said they needed separate accommodation.)

The survey showed that there is little existing "social" housing or homes available for rent within the parish.



## HOUSING NEEDS SURVEY

Details of the Housing Needs Survey must remain confidential, but there were thirty-six respondents, of whom five wanted a single person flat. Eleven needed a two-bedroomed house; five families required a three-bedroomed home; eight wanted a bungalow and there were five requests for sheltered accommodation (two people did not specify what they wanted).

The majority of households needed rented homes, eight would like shared equity dwellings, seven could buy on the open market. Seven were unspecified.



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
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responsible are unable to press charges without witnesses. It will cost  $\pounds700$  to repair the lights.



#### **The Post Office**

Harbury Post Office is due to move to the supermarket on 12<sup>th</sup> September. This painless transfer is due in large part to the loyalty and public spirit shown by the Taylor family, who have kept the business running whilst the long drawn out process of setting up the new office took place. The village will show its appreciation for this dedication at a 'get together' in the Tom Hauley Room on 12<sup>th</sup> September.

Many people do not realise that sub-postmasters (and mistresses) are independent contractors who shoulder the responsibilities of financing and organising the delivery of the post office functions in our villages. They are not Post Office employees but entrepreneurs who provide a service for a fee.

Each transaction made in a post office has a certain value, and the use a community makes of its own post office has an impact on its viability. The Government says it is committed to maintaining a rural network of sub-post offices and has recently put a direct subsidy into the Post Office to back this up; but they still need to make a profit and many do not. Every year, four or five more are lost in this County alone.

For us in rural Warwickshire, it is very much a case of "use it or lose it"!

#### "Time Out" For The Taylors!

The closure of the Post Office at the present premises in Church Street will mean more than the end of an era for postmaster Brian Taylor and his wife, Josie. It will bring an opportunity for Brian to take 'time out' from a twelve hour working day, which has seen him open up at 6.00am for sorting the village post and close after 6.00pm after completing the myriad of forms demanded by the current system. It has been part of his life for over fifty years, which is a tremendous achievement by any standard, but 'all good things have to come to an end sometime', and for Brian and Josie the doors will finally close on the family business this month.

A.W. Taylor and Son was opened by Brian's father, Archie, in 1947 when he took on the lease of Harbury General and Wine Store. Archie had been introduced to shop-keeping by one of his brothers who ran a

bakery store in Warwick; although he had started out in the family electro-plating firm in Birmingham with his father, followed by a spell spent driving around Wales for a paper company. For those who remember Archie driving orders around the local villages until well into his eighties, it is interesting to reflect on the fact that he had never been required to take a driving test! Archie and Madge lived 'above the shop' and Brian went to Campion School in Learnington when it occupied its former premises in Leicester Street. On completing his education, Brian went to work for G Orange (Estate Agents) in Learnington, as his father had decreed that he 'could not work for him until he had worked for another boss'. In the early days, Brian recalls that many items in the store were rationed, including sweets and there was a notice which stated that some products were for 'regular customers only'.

The Post Office was introduced into Taylor's in 1948; Brian joined the family firm in 1950 as a counter clerk. As a teenager growing up in the village, he played snooker at the Club (which let in young people 'provided they drank no alcohol') and spent time visiting family in Cromer on the East Coast. There were the heady delights of driving around the roads in the company of a car enthusiast when there were relatively few cars about. Although he does not consider himself to be a sportsman, Brian played football for the village when the Harbury Junior team captained by Mick Bishop 'needed players', and he also took his turn at the crease in similar circumstances! In 1952, Brian was posted to Düsseldorf to do his National Service in the Royal Artillery BAOR (British Army On the Rhine), but even on his two Christmas leaves from the Army, he spent time 'back behind the counter'. On his 'demob' two years later, he returned to assist with delivering the orders as well as keeping the books.

Josie's family was originally from Coventry, but they came to live in Harbury in 1941 when their house suffered a direct hit during the Blitz. They lived in one of the row of cottages which were adjacent to the vicarage in Vicarage Lane, and her parents were friendly with George Marshall, who was already established in the village as a well known builder. Josie went to Learnington Secretarial College in Holly Walk to learn shorthand and typing, and started work for Car Bodies in Coventry when the family returned to their house after it had been rebuilt. Eventually, she took a job as George Marshall's book-keeper for seven years, during which she gradually got to know Brian when she went to the Post Office to buy the National Insurance stamps for the company's employees.



Brian and Josie married in Wyken Parish Church, Coventry and came to live in the 'back half' of the accommodation above the shop until they bought their current home in Margaret Close. By now, Brian had passed his driving test and was allowed to help out delivering the orders to over one hundred customers in Ashorne, Deppers Bridge, Ladbroke and Ufton, as well as Harbury, and he was expected to provide the same level of service as his father, Archie. If this meant chatting to the customers, helping to put away the products he was delivering, then it was 'all in a day's work'. He could not compete with Archie in the customer service department, however, as his father had been known to go out on his rounds at 9am and only returned 'back to base' around 2pm. On one celebrated occasion at Christmas, Archie only returned home to the ever patient Madge at midnight, having assisted with numerous requests for help on his rounds!

In the sixties, Josie was mainly a housewife bringing up their three sons (Ian, Clive and Keith), although she was allowed to bag up the money collected from the local telephone boxes in Chesterton, the Banbury Road and Harbury. In those days, Brian recalls people queuing to use the boxes, which needed 1d, 6d or 1 shilling coins, and as the old pennies were rather large, the £20 bags of coins taken to the main GPO in Learnington were a considerable weight. As time went on, Brian took over ordering all the grocery stock, originally from Laxon's of Coventry (the VG wholesalers), but eventually he collected the orders from Nurdin and Peacock in Nuneaton. The shop still involved several family members, with Josie helping out in the shop on the occasional weekday and on Saturday; but Brian recognises the tremendous support and commitment he has received from many helpers in both the Post Office (Mary Ceney, Mrs Drinkwater, Gill Carter, and more recently Dave Cooke) and in the shop (Nora Bastock, Mary Newbold and Pat Weeks), as well as many others over the years. It was an extended family with each person offering the same level of cheerful, helpful service that had been the watchword from the time Archie first established the General Store. Behind the scenes, the Post Office sorters and deliverers have also worked impressively to maintain a level of service, which would be the envy of many towns and villages around the country (Tony Ceney, Leonie Keyte (daughter of long-serving post-lady Ethel Sollis), Barbara Southam, Margaret Warner and John Woodward, with Lesley Jones and Martin Perry acting as the relief 'posties').

The weeks ahead will provide Brian and Josie with the 'time out' they deserve for themselves after such long and faithful service to the village, and the chance to enjoy a well earned break. For Brian, there is gardening to look forward to and for Josie, her impressive cross-stitched samplers, which are a work of art. There will also be time to catch up with their sons and lan's two children, Emily (10) and Alexander (3). Ian is a senior manager for HSBC in Southampton, Clive works as a software engineer for a machine tool company in Rugby, and Keith is the IT manager with Dictaphone in Hammersmith. It could mean a bit more time to go out on the road in pursuit of their own interests, instead of being tied to a job, which has provided the village with an impressively consistent service for over five decades.

A.W. Taylor and Son may no longer have a shop-keeping presence in the village, but the name will always be synonymous with all that is best in local shops – friendliness, efficiency, and caring, personal service.

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

### **From Yesteryear**

Apologies for the lack of items from the school's Local Collection recently, but there have been one or two minor distractions stopping me getting round to digging them out.

The following extracts are from the Parish Magazine towards the close of the 19th Century. The first is a wonderful example of a piece of creative writing which ran away with its writer, starting off as it does with a pure statement of fact, but quickly degenerating into a hysterical tirade, threatening eternal damnation to the fire-raiser.



Incendiary Fires: We have only space to note the sad occurrence of five incendiary fires on Saturday night June 21st and Sunday morning in Harbury and Chesterton, where no incendiary fires have been known within living memory. At present, no definite evidence can be obtained,

nor has anything transpired to put the crime on anyone and all must guard against hasty suspicions and rash judgements, but although such wickedness may for a time be undiscovered, yet assuredly it shall not go unpunished for God saw it; and these things are noted in His book. That wickedness of Man should be so great as to destroy in God's sight, God's own gifts, and corn that sustains the life of Man.

The same writer must have been involved with the following cheerless "Thou shalt not" event.

The prospects for the Jubilee celebrations at Harbury seem very bright. About £80 has been subscribed, and a representative and very energetic committee is hard at work. A house to house census has been taken, and about 720 dinner tickets and 330 tea tickets issued,

and the issue has finally closed. The Dinner will be held in the Parks by kind permission of Mr Carpenter. One pint of beer (or lemonade) will be the allowance for males, with half a pint for females. It will be interesting to watch for the Signal Rockets on Malvern at 10.00pm, and the answering bonfires on other hills. To carry out this programme, much voluntary assistance will be



required in carving, cooking and waiting. All we hope will unite to make the day happy and harmonious. No disorderly conduct will be permitted on the Ground. There will be a refreshment tent for the supply of tea, coffee and mineral waters.

The next two are rather touching accounts of accidents.

We are glad to record an act showing great presence of mind on the part of a little boy, Walter Griffin, 7 years old at the North Cottages. His younger brother, 2 years old, fell over a fender, December 14th, and his clothes caught fire. He dragged him out of the smoke, undressed him, and carried him to bed. When asked why he did not call for help to his only neighbour, he calmly said, "Oh! I thought she would have been frightened". The little sufferer was removed to Harbury, and although severely burnt, is under the care of Mr Rice, progressing favourably. A sad accident happened at the Lime Works to John Hickson. He was wheeling a barrow of stone, from which one fell under the wheel, and the sudden stop caused him to over-balance himself and he fell 20 feet onto a wagon of stone, fracturing his skull. He was promptly and carefully removed to the Warneford Hospital. He is somewhat better, but still in a critical condition.



.... and one for animal lovers. I wonder how they got the animal out through the folding doors?

You will all be pleased to hear that the poor old white horse has been redeemed by Miss Hodges from the Southam bus and returned to its old home.

Finally, a rather confused report by the school overseers, who seem to think "the school is going well" but ....

# **Musings From A Country Garden (14)**

New Development For Ladbroke - no planning permission necessary!

Bell View Garden has been confusing blue tits for years .... soon after we moved, one of Stan's woodworking friends made us a freestanding letter box which was 'a bird box look-alike' with the exception that there was no hole for the birds to go through. It had 'LETTER BOX ' in large letters printed on it, and a door with a knob which the postman lifted to push the letters through. This box is situated outside the dining room window, so one could watch our perplexed feathered friends frequently as they tried to get inside. After many years of trying, some birds learnt that they could push the knob with their beaks and the door would open, but fortunately for them it did not remain open long enough for the bird to enter.

This year because of not being able to get to the letter box very easily, another friend has made it into a "semi-detached 'des-res" for blue

tits, - with a hole in the front and another in the rear and a partition down the middle. I shall watch with interest to see what happens when nesting time comes round again. In actual fact, only hours after David had finished the transformation, a great tit inspected it very closely and almost disappeared through the hole in the front. He changed his mind and came back out again pretty smartish. A tortoiseshell butterfly was the next interested party - he went in and came out again a little later on.

### **Original Front Door - Toad In The Hole!**

Another innovation has been an attachment for the inside of the front door which keeps out wildlife and draughts. It has fine bristles which close up the quite wide gap. This was brought about by a nocturnal visit of a small BLACK creature that I thought from my view point at the top of the stairs might be a I-a-r-g-e spider. I telephoned my "emergency" friend who came over and discovered it was a baby toad. I like toads; we have assorted sizes all over the place. This little chap was off course and not very happy inspecting my stair lift. Of course, all types of wildlife find their way under the door.... frogs, toads, mice, beetles and my bête noire - spiders! However, since this 'bristle excluder' has been fitted, nothing untoward has been able to get in. What joy!

### **Butterflies, Bumble Bees And Dragonflies**

I have had several opportunities to watch the activity around the four Buddleia trees. It has been fascinating. I don't think I have ever seen so many of these three species before. I had to give up counting the butterflies there were so many. I have also had to tread very carefully over the shale with my walker as the large butterflies have been stretched out flat over the surface. I have never seen this before - I am still searching for a reason.

### Ginger - et al ....

Ginger the feral cat has established a behavioural pattern this last month - he pays very regular visits once every third day. A black and white cat has also appeared and seems to be living on the top of my compost heap. I talk to both of them but cannot get near to either, so this addition must also be a feral cat. How do I attract them I wonder? It's not food, as I have not fed the black and white cat and Ginger only eats inside my kitchen. Have you noticed? At 5.00am when I get up, the smell of Autumn is now obvious. The hips and haws are already red, the elderberry is covered with fruit, and the crab apple tree is loaded. One thinks immediately of Christmas puddings that used to be made at the end of September. Where does the time go?

### **Gardening Notes For September**

Michaelmas, one of the four Quarter days, falls this month, so we begin to think of autumn after this exceptionally hot month of August. Everywhere looks so dried up and tired, the colours of ripening berries and tinted leaves will be a welcome change.

Continue deadheading to prevent plants setting seed (unless, of course, that is what you want) for propagation or decoration. Give all plants a general tidy up. The conservationists tell us that we are being too tidy in our gardens, so do your bit for wildlife by leaving a few hollow stems and dried up plants as winter quarters for insects. Hedgehogs, small rodents and toads will find shelter amongst leaves and twigs. If the soil becomes moist and whilst it is still warm, perennials that have become overcrowded or reluctant to bloom, can be divided. Lift the clump and take off the outer, younger pieces of

root, each with a few healthy shoots. Plant these and throw away the older centre part. Fleshy rooted ones like hostas and red-hot pokers resent root disturbance so are best left as large clumps. When these have to be divided, dig them up carefully then cut the thick roots with a sharp knife making sure that each section has stem growth and replant immediately. This may leave space for spring bedding or bulbs which can be put in this month.

Some lilies must be planted this month, in pots or in well-drained soil. Read the plant labels for the correct planting time as it does vary. Plant up bowls of treated hyacinth bulbs and paper narcissus, allowing eight-ten weeks to flowering time. Cover them and keep in a dark place for several weeks. I have found several vine weevils during the summer so I know they will have laid eggs, especially in pots. Before taking these into the greenhouse or house water them with vine weevil control.

If we get wet weather at the end of the month, plant evergreen hedges, roses and shrubs especially evergreen types and conifers. In dry weather, water at the roots and spray the foliage. It is also a good time to move any of these plants. This is a good time to tackle lawn problems. Perhaps stepping stones through areas that have become worn and compacted would help.

Continue sowing of radish, the variety China rose will go on into the winter. Sow an autumn carrot for Christmas cropping. Sow winter hardy spinach. Buy and plant-out spring cabbage, and it is not too late to raise some from seed and put out the young plants in October. Tie grease bands around apple trees trunks to catch the wingless female winter moths before they can crawl up to lay eggs on the bark. Spray against canker in stone fruits with a Bordeaux mixture in mid-September. Pick and store apples and pears. Scientists have worked out that in the 180 days from pollination to the mature apple a total of twenty four hours of sun energy is needed. The leaves must convert this solar energy into apple tissue to give us the fruit we love. The abundance of sunshine this year should mean we can look forward to a bumper crop. Fumigate the greenhouse after clearing the summer crops, to prevent pests over wintering. Take down any shading, and remember to close all vents as nights become cooler.

Bring in azaleas for winter flowering. Give a feed of Miracid. Begin to water cyclamen, sparingly at first then increasing as growth takes off. Replace some of the compost every three or four years. Bring back into the house any other plants which have been outside for the

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
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

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summer. The majority of our houseplants will survive in a winter temperature of 10°C so do not put them near a radiator or on a very sunny window sill.

Plant Of The Month - Cimicifuga

**Cimicifuga simplex** 

This tall, autumn flowering perennial is not widely used, but is graceful and trouble free. The name comes from the Latin 'cimex' meaning a bug and 'fugo' to drive away. So, a common name for the type native to Europe and northern Asia is bugbane after its use as an insect repellent and for warding off bedbugs. This type C foetida does have an unusual, slightly unpleasant smell.

Cimicifuga racemosa, coming from North America is known as snakeroot because of the form and shape of the root. The Doctrine of Signatures of the 16th Century stated that on all living things is a signature for the guidance of Man, so this plant was regarded as useful in cases

of snakebite. It will grow to four or five feet tall with fern-like leaves and bottlebrush-like spikes of white flowers.

The species native to China and Japan is cimicifuga simplex, and this can grow to eight feet, although the ones grown now are four to six feet in height. Their purple stems carry a mass of glossy ferny foliage and elegant sprays of small white flowers, making a rather more unusual addition to the late border. Plant them from October to March in any humus rich soil in light shade.

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
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
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


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
