

From The Rector

At the beginning of Lent, we witnessed a performance of 'The Passion' by The Riding Lights Theatre Company. This was a very powerful and moving performance and I felt an excellent start to Lent.

We have followed our Lord's Passion in various ways during the first five weeks of Lent. Now we come to Palm Sunday, the beginning of Holy Week which gives us the opportunity, especially with the impact of the events enacted at the start of Lent, to follow Christ's final week on earth. The various services during this week are full of symbolism and should help to guide us through to Easter Sunday. Why not make a special effort to take part in the journey with Christ through Holy Week.

On Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday there will be a Communion Service followed by Stations of the Cross, with a procession to the Fourteen Stations, stopping at each one for prayer and meditation.

On Maundy Thursday, we commemorate the institution of Holy Communion at the Last Supper, when our Lord commanded us to "do this in remembrance of me", with Communion Services at Harbury and Ladbroke. After the 8.00pm Sung Eucharist at Harbury, a Watch will be kept at the Altar of Repose until midnight. Symbolising the garden of Gethsemane where the disciples fell asleep whilst their master prayed. Let us not. Why not spend a little time keeping watch.

Good Friday is a day to experience the sorrow of the crucifixion. There is a service for children and a devotional hour in both churches. At Ladbroke in the evening, there is a devotional service of music and readings.

Holy Saturday or Easter Eve is a day of preparation. In the evening at Harbury within a simple service of renewal, we bless and light the new Paschal Candles, signifying the Light of Christ and renew our baptismal vows. (This is followed by drinks and nibbles at the Rectory.) Lent is finished.

Having experienced the trial and agony of Christ during this week, we can then truly celebrate the joy of the risen Christ on Easter Day and say Christ is risen, he is risen indeed.

PRAYER FOR PASSIONTIDE

O God, the Father of all people, who loved the world so much that you gave your only Son to die for everyone's salvation: make us, who have been redeemed by his precious blood, to die with him in sin, to rise with him to righteousness, and to walk with him in newness of life; through he merits of the same Jesus Chris our Lord.

Amen.

FOR EASTER PEACE

Living Lord, conqueror of death, we remember with gladness how on the day of your resurrection you appear to your disciples in your risen power and said to them, "Peace be with you". Speak that word to our hearts today, O Lord. Lift us above all of our doubts and fears, and help us so to practise your presence and to rest upon your victory that your peace may be with us, now and for evermore. Amen.

Her work covers the six parishes of Long Itchington, Offchurch, Marton, Hunningham, Wappenbury and Weston under Wetherly; it needs great skill to coordinate all the services in the area. There is one Vicar plus the Rural Dean to take all the communion services, and one or two readers take some of the evening services.

Each month Mary must meet with the Vicar and Rural Dean to draw up a rota for the six churches. Christenings, weddings and funerals also have to be fitted in. One of her biggest headaches is finding organists to cover all the services. Rotas, lists of events, readings and hymn lists all have to be photocopied and distributed.

Toddlers' Service


At our March service, we sang "If I Were A Butterfly" (with actions) and "I Will Make You Fishes Of Men" (accompanied by the children on the instruments.

Harbury Parish Council, March 2004

Councillors have really taken to the idea of seeking "Quality" status and somewhat creakingly are beginning to jump through the hoops to achieve this.

There is a website <u>www.harbury-parish.co.uk</u> giving basic details about your council, councillors and their meetings. They are considering producing a newsletter and have interested two new candidates in standing for election this June. This will only give us one extra person to vote for, as John Drinkwater, who has served Harbury for forty years will not be standing again. If you would like to seek election, contact the Parish Clerk, Nicola Thompson on 614646.

Suddenly there is more urgency to complete the consultations on the Parish Review. Using it to produce a full "Parish Plan", gives the Council still more "brownie points" towards the coveted Quality Status.

Councillor Kevin Biddle outlined what was still to be done. There would be more consultations with young people; the Youth Club would produce a video and the schoolchildren would undertake a survey. The Parish Council would take advice from Stratford District and Warwickshire Rural Community Council's Parish Plans Officers and Housing Enabler to investigate thoroughly how to complete a Housing Needs Survey and produce a Parish Plan which was capable of adoption by the Planners. A further public consultation would be arranged to determine which, if any, sites in Harbury would be suitable and acceptable for providing for the local needs, in housing, recreation and employment that were revealed by the Parish Review.

(Your Councillors recently attended a Parish Plans event organised by Warwickshire Rural Community Council in the village Hall where they had the opportunity to meet not only experts but also local parishes engaged in producing Parish Plans.)

Councillors were sympathetic to the predicament outlined by Mr French of Harbury Fields Cottages, whose house has been flooded during heavy rain. It was agreed that the Divisional Engineer should examine the roadside ditches and culverts; County Councillor Booth took a great interest in the problem.

PLANNING

Stratford District Council granted permission for extensions at 18 Farley Avenue and 31 Manor Orchard; two signs at the Cement Works and workshops at Churchlands Farm, Bascote Road; change of use from shop to living accommodation at 2 Chapel Street. The Tree Preservation Order at the Cement Works has been confirmed, and the sign at the Dog Inn was refused.

The Parish Council made no representation on the extension at 1 Deppers Bridge, or the porch and four letting hotel bedrooms at the Great Western Hotel. They did comment that the rear extension at 18 Francis Road should be granted; that there should be improved access and vehicle turning space for the proposed bungalow at 1 The Pound; they had concerns that the Conference Room at Sharmer Fields Farm could be adapted later to living accommodation.

Councillor Van Spall complained Harbury had not been told that Follet Properties were objecting to the Local Plan. (A list of objections was published.)

Everyone was perturbed that Biffa wanted to extend the hours the Tip is open for business to include Saturdays and Bank Holidays. (Waste Planning is a County matter, please contact them on 01926 410410 if you are concerned).

Unlike Planning where it is permitted to apply retrospectively, with grant-making bodies this is usually not allowed. Therefore, it was difficult for the Parish Council to accede to the request from the Village Hall for a substantial sum towards the cost of the new cooker that had been bought. Only after making it clear that it was only because of the unique position of the Village Hall as an important public meeting place and making a record in the Parish Council minutes to ensure that a precedent could not be created, the Councillors finally agreed to donate £500.

PC Hill warned that the speed check for Temple End was imminent and that he was on the trail of the daffodil damager. There had been a burglary in The Beeches, a "drugs bust" in Harbury and 95 "incidents" on his patch this month; but things were looking up as WPC Nibblet would be taking over the villains at the M40 Service Area.

Councillor Winchester will spend £4,782 on behalf of the parish on

three new Windsor lamps and £1,698 on one to replace the light outside the Surgery. In addition, the Parish Council has to find the money for two new lamps on the Manor Orchard estate where the concrete columns are cracking. It was agreed to replace these with the model used at Hillside. There was consternation when some Councillors thought this was the infamous Binswood End Bollard.

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
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Harbury Tennis Club




Dance Spectacular


nigher decibels! It has proved so popular that Jack will doubtless eturn after Easter to check up on the growth of the beanstalks.

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


reaping the benefits of life in Pre-School and we wish Jane, Luke and their girls all the very best for the future.

Car Servicing

A recent undercover operation by Trading Standards revealed that four out of the seven garages tested performed poorly. So how can you make sure you are getting a good service? Here are some tips:

- Compare garages beforehand or get recommendations.
- Make sure you know exactly what the service includes and costs.
- Get a written guote.
- Agree a firm date and time when the work will be completed.
- If any remedial work is required, make sure the garage agrees it with you first, and in writing.

 Make sure the garage explains why replacement parts are needed and inspect any replaced parts.

I.R.A.T.E.

Many readers of the Harbury and Ladbroke News will recall my letter in November urging everyone to have their say on the level of Council Tax for the forthcoming financial year 2004/5.

I am sure by now, everyone will have plucked up the courage to open his or her latest demand and have hopefully been pleasantly surprised not to be confronted by the massive increase we have endured in the past. However, this moderation in increase is not the result of a change of heart by our elected local Councillors or the Government in Westminster, but due entirely to the pressure and protest of active groups and individuals.

Nevertheless, this 6% is still more than 3 times the rate of inflation and of course, is cumulative to the 12% increase foisted on us last year; and still Stratford District Council insists on understating its own increase by taking advantage of the prudence of the Parish Council.

Anyone who thinks this welcome downward trend is a model for the future is likely to be sadly mistaken. Already, our representatives are busy conjuring up other reasons to justify significant increases; mostly for schemes we neither need nor want. In addition, a stinging increase in public contributions to local authority pension funds next year is almost a certainty.

Many people will be aware of the national organisation *Isitfair*, which has been campaigning to control increases in council tax and for the introduction of a fairer way of funding our essential "Local Services". I.R.A.T.E. (Irate Ratepayers Against Tax Excess) is a newly formed group reflecting the principles of *Isitfair* in the Stratford District Council area. The group is positively non-political. The constitution and principle aims are, to:

- 1. Contain council tax at no more than the rate of inflation.
- 2. Replace present political District and County Councillors with nonpolitical Councillors.

3. Campaign for efficiency gains and the elimination of waste in Local Authorities.

It is largely thanks to the efforts of this group that our council tax has been contained this year ... but it is still not low enough. The current membership of the group is around 100 and growing fast. It encompasses people of all ages, incomes and abilities throughout the District, not just Stratford.

With a property revaluation in the next three years and smart money being on a big hit for detached properties, nobody can be complacent. January with Hellebores, then on through the year dealing with flowering periods, etc., showed many slides, answered questions and then ended with January Snowdrops, also known as the Lantern Lily. Mr Turner thought Euphorbia was good for winter, with a long flowering period and some varieties very good for small gardens. He seemed particularly keen on Geranium "Rozanne" which, although expensive, has a long flowering season.

It is now officially spring and the hour has gone on; all we need is for the weather to match. At the time of writing - mid March - conditions are reasonable, the snow did not last and the birds are singing well. However, I see our soft fruit bushes are in no particular hurry to show their leaves; let us hope there are no late frosts.

Garden Notes For April

As I write, March is really going out like a lion, with lashing rain, hail and snow in some places, but also some warmth is coming into the sun. Small wonder that we find our weather a topic of conversation. With the lengthening days will come more growth, but we still have to get through the blackthorn winter!

In the garden when the weather allows, deadhead daffodils regularly, but leave the foliage for at least 6 weeks after flowering finishes. Label any clumps with poor flowering for division later. Give a liquid feed or a sprinkle of general fertiliser. Deadhead pansies and polyanthus too, to prolong their show. Harden off sweetpeas and plant them out. Sprinkle sand, grit or crumbled eggshell around the new shoots of plants, which are particular favourites of slugs and snails. Alternatively cut 4" collars from plastic bottles and push these into the soil around plants as they emerge. Divide crowded snowdrops and plant small clumps fairly deep. Add some manure and bone meal to the soil. 'Plants in the green' establish better then dry bulbs planted in September. Plant out dahlia tubers towards the end of the month.

Plant up alpine troughs whilst the many colourful plants are in the garden centres. Gravel mulch these and refresh the gravel around any plants that like dry conditions. Plant evergreen shrubs and conifers but give them a screen of windbreak netting. Spray with water as well as giving it at the roots, especially in dry spells. Prune established early flowering shrubs, e.g., winter jasmine, as soon as flowering finishes allowing new growth to mature to carry the flowers for next year. Late flowering shrubs, grown for their decorative winter stems e.g., willows and dogwoods, should also be cut back hard. Trim winter flowering heathers with shears, and lightly trim lavenders. Tidy the grey leaved plants such as senecio, which will have been damaged by the winter weather. Feed and mulch all shrubs after pruning, and remember to mulch hedges. Evergreen ones can be trimmed at the end of the month to restore shape.

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THE GARAGE

LADBNOISE SOUTHAM, WARWECKSHITRE CV47 28T

Sow beetroot, carrots, summer cabbage, kohl rabi, leeks, peas, spinach and turnips. Under glass and in warmth, sow aubergines, cucumbers, French beans, marrow, melon, outdoor tomatoes and at the end of the month, sweetcorn. Sow short rows of salad vegetables every 3-4 weeks. Lettuce, radish and spring onions can all be grown in a flower border. Plant out onion sets and seedlings. Heat-treated sets are less likely to 'bolt'. Sets must go in by the end of the month at latest, to give them the maximum growing time. Finish planting first early potatoes at the beginning of the month; second earlies, main crop and salad varieties go in from mid month.

Tidy and feed over wintered tender perennials. Take cuttings from the new growth. Pinch out tips on new growth on fuchsias to form bushy plants. Begin hardening off plants sown in trays. Plant up hanging baskets and tubs to put out at end of May. Line terracotta pots with plastic before planting them up to prevent them drying out too rapidly. In the house spring clean plants. Re-pot if roots are visible at bottom of pot. Begin weekly feed and regular water as new growth begins. Gradually withhold water from cyclamen. When they dry, store them in their pots on their sides, in a cool place. Remove flower heads from amaryllis as they fade. Feed and water them through the summer until the leaves die down.

This is a good month to re-seed bare patches in the lawn, or to sow a new one. If sowing seed, cover with clear plastic or fleece to keep birds off until germination. For tough wearing, include some rye grass. Clean algae and dirt off paving and steps. When using any garden chemicals read labels carefully and wear gloves and mask, but try to use natural alternatives or disease resistant plants where possible.

PLANT OF THE MONTH - PARSLEY

Traditionally this well-known herb is sown on Lady Day, March 25th, so buy a packet of seeds now, but remember that the seeds are reputed to go down to the Devil seven times before they germinate! Certainly, they will not emerge for six to eight weeks after sowing, even with the treatment of warm water along the sowing drill. Native to north and central Europe and particularly Sardinia where it may have originated on stony ground, it takes its name from the Greek word for a rock. For culinary purposes, it needs good rich soil and grows well with roses and tomatoes, where it could be beneficial in combating disease in these plants.

Venerated by the Greeks and Romans who rewarded athletes and poets with a chapiet of parsley and a garland was hung on their graves. Used since ancient times as a flavouring and a vegetable, it was introduced to England in 1539, the leaves being used in cooking and the seeds by herbalists. Concoctions were used for freckles, eyewash and for urinary problems. A hot poultice soaked in parsley tea is still used against stings and insect bites and it is being researched as a preventive herb against cancer.

Nature Notes

Monday 15th and Tuesday 16th of March were warm and spring-like. I hoped to see my first butterfly of the year on the wing but was disappointed - a bumblebee and another insect (a large fly, I think) were some compensation. Then thoughts turned to frogspawn. Having seen an occasional frog, usually squashed, in the wetter parts of the month, movement seemed to have stopped in our mini winter days when snowmen fleetingly appeared. But inexorably, the seasons are changing, most obviously by the lengthening hours of daylight.

On a very windy 19th March, I decided the bicycle was not a safe option and headed over the fields to Southam on foot. The water tower had just been demolished and there seemed to be a gap in the scenery as an old friend had disappeared, but we will no doubt get used to life without our landmark. I searched the newly created pools, which trap water leaving the landfill site at Ufton, but no frogspawn could be spied. At last, I found one clump in a backwater of the Itchen just this side of the A425 road bridge at Stoneythorpe. A return trip is planned around Easter to see how the eggs are developing and to make a search for the flowers of marsh marigold (kingcup), whose leaves I found in the boggy copse by the water meadow. Both the frogspawn and the flowers are markers of the state of the environment. The fact that they are now so scarce locally is, I fear, a sign of pollution. Steps are thankfully being taken to reverse the trend so all is not lost.

On the 22nd March, the wind had dropped sufficiently to get the bike out again. On my way home, I paid a visit to the tiny graveyard at Bascote Heath. It is a real gem; beautifully kept and hidden away opposite the main part of Bascote woods. The large gravestones mark the resting places of the Chamberlayne family who owned Stoneythorpe House in the 19th and 20th century. Small wooden crosses with triangular caps bear testimony to the humbler folk, perhaps servants and estate workers. One stone grave caught my eye and it turned out to be that of Thomas Arthur Markham, a private soldier of the First World War. He died in hospital of wounds received in France on 5th June 1918. His name is also amongst those on the nearby War Memorial to the men of Bascote Heath and Storie Attacks.

Mr Markham's family in Ufton told me when I enquired that he rad looked after Bascote Woods in the years before the Great War. Opposite, the wood he must have known so well, was springing into life with a carpet of bluebell leaves and the hedge beginning to break into leaf. On a sheltered bank, celandine, primrose and violet were in bloom. In drier parts, the intriguingly named "dogs' mercury" was coming into flower. The male and female flowers are on separate plants, green in colour and rather inconspicuous. It is poisonous; perhaps this is responsible for its name.


