## From the Rector

Last Sunday was the first Sunday of Advent and the beginning of our preparations for Christ's coming at Christmas.

There are a few saints whose feast days fall in Advent. The saints are our older brothers and sisters in the spiritual life and always we find there are valuable lessons to be learned from them even when hundreds of years separate us. The saints of Advent are no exception and they prove an encouragement for all.

Probably the first saint we think of in Advent is St John the Baptist. He features in the readings at the Eucharist at this time and is the recognised herald of the coming of Christ. But unless some of us hear his message he remains "a voice crying in the wilderness". One who not only heard his voice but whose response brought St Peter to the Lord is the saint whose feast day we celebrated on the 30<sup>th</sup> November – St Andrew.

St Andrew could really be called the link-man. He moves the original Jewish Faith, through Baptism from St John the Baptist, to Jesus and the New Law, and on to the birth of the Church and the sharing of the faith with non-Jews.

We know from the gospels that St John the Baptist came to prepare

the way for the Lord. He was to announce to the world the coming of the Messiah and the need for men to repent and change. The baptism offered by John was not simply a ritualistic symbol of purification or renewal as practiced in many ancient faiths. It was a once only ceremony of complete moral desire to change and prepare for the coming of the Messiah and his new law. Those baptised were a "community in anticipation". St Andrew was a member of this baptised community. He had listened to the message, taken it to heart and was waiting for his Lord.

His hope was rewarded. One day, as he stood with John the Baptist, Jesus passed by. John recognised him and tells Andrew and his companion, "Look, there is the Lamb of God". The two men follow Jesus who asks, "What do you want?" They ask where he lives and are invited to come and see. Andrew recognises his Lord in the hours that follow and becomes the first disciple leaving all to follow Christ. But he could not keep it all to himself. What he had discovered was to be told to the whole world, and the first in line was his brother — Simon Peter. "We have found the Messiah", says Andrew and he takes Simon Peter to meet his Christ. We have to thank Andrew for St Peter, the rock, Prince of the Apostles, and the man who opened the Church to non-Jews when he admitted Cornelius.

Andrew stayed close to Christ throughout his life and after the crucifixion he helped with the establishment of the Church before being crucified himself for his faith. He is an ideal saint for the beginning of Advent because his life sums up so vividly what our response to the message of St John the Baptist, of Advent should be. He was open to the message recognising the shortcomings of our earthly existence whilst taking account of the traditional teaching of the Old Testament. He responded to the call for repentance, for change, so he was ready when Christ passed by – ready to follow him and to learn from him.

Andrew was no scholar, but the revealing power of the Lord convinced him in faith of what he had hoped for. The experience brings him joy, which in his love for his brothers he rushes to share with him and the fruit of that love must have exceeded his wildest dreams. May we have Andrew's openness as we go through the Advent season.

# **Ladbroke Parish Council**

Ladbroke Parish Council met on November 17<sup>th</sup> when once again one of the main discussions of the evening was the drainage and highways issue within the village. With winter approaching, it is essential that the brook has a clear passage through the middle of the village and once the leaves have all fallen, the council will be better able to see the flow of the brook under the A423 bypass to consider any longer term projects required.

The Southam Police and Neighbourhood Watch rarely have anything to report in Ladbroke, mainly because everyone is vigilant and sensible with precautions against burglary and vehicle crime. However, in recent weeks there has been the theft of an Ifor Williams horse trailer and a low-load trailer from Windmill Lane and trouble with disruptive youths within the village, as well as incidents of youths throwing things at vehicles travelling along the A423 bypass, resulting in damage to them. If anyone has any knowledge of these incidents, then PC Andy Went would be pleased to hear from you.

This is the time of year when the Parish Council decides the annual precept and after much discussion it was only raised by 1.5%.

A vacancy has arisen for a Parish Councillor and a nomination form is available from the Clerk for any interested applicant.

Finally we are still looking for a replacement Clerk to start next year and I will be pleased to chat to anyone about this paid position.

There is no meeting in December and the next Parish Council Meeting will be on Wednesday 19<sup>th</sup> January 2005 at 7.45pm in Ladbroke Village Hall. All welcome.

# Harbury Parish Council - November 2004

Official minutes can be viewed in the Library or obtained from the Parish Clerk.

There was a depleted Parish Council (it's the Pantomime Season) but plenty of interest from the public. Tony Alcock, from Manor Orchard, explained his hedge was causing subsidence and had to be taken back. Mrs Kempton had the full support of the PC in her attempts to "stop up the highway" at Helen Owen House to remove the anomaly of her front garden being designated as highway. Colin Mercer sought Parish Council approval for more Tennis Courts improvements and additional floodlighting to extend coaching for the Junior Section.

The School got permission to hold a County Cross Country event at the Playing Fields on 15th January. The Nursery School is fundraising to landscape round its new home in the Portakabin. Chairman Dutch Van Spall proudly announced the Parish Council was fourth in the Harbury School PTA Quiz and with a little more red wine would have won it!

Sharon Hancock explained that Southam School's Annual Meeting on 13th December would sound out parents' views on changing the school day to start and end earlier. She announced that following last month's public participation, PC Hill had dealt with the case of harassment and a Young People's Meeting facilitated by an outside consultant would be held on 2nd December, (7.30pm Village Hall)

There was a long discussion session on the Deppers Bridge Traffic Calming. The upshot was that the Council was prepared to wait for the police to refer safety concerns to the county and see what resulted, but Dutch Van Spall, in a personal capacity, would continue to pursue the matter with Warwickshire Police.

PLANNING - Permission was granted, with conditions, for a Glasshouse off the Fosseway. The Parish made no representations on a conservatory at 10 The Beeches or an extension at 30 Percival Drive but did comment that the latest application on The Bungalow, Mill Street was out of scale, conflicted with the Village Design Statement and was an over-development of the site. They had similar views on plans to extend 35 Deppers Bridge.

They responded to a letter from Warwickshire Rural Community Council's Housing Enabler on potential development at Hillside referring again to the Village Design Statement and recent Planning Exhibition and consultation on Local Housing Needs sites.

County Councillor David Booth reported the County could consider making the Allotments available for Local Needs Housing and asked the Council's views. Sharon Hancock explained that Allotment Holders would be opposed to this and there were other more appropriate sites to investigate. The Parish Plan Draft had been sent to Stratford District for comment and the Council hoped to publish it in the New Year.

Cllr Biddle is negotiating with WCC who want to charge an easement of £90 p.a. to allow the Tennis Club a connection to the mains water supply. His Properties Committee was in favour of the floodlighting proposals and Colin Mercer confirmed a concern about the previous scheme had proved unfounded – the light spillage was minimal. The scheme would cost about £8,000 and would require Planning Permission.

Graffiti had been cleaned from the Playing Fields wall. Remedial work to the Dragon's Teeth and Barrier were scheduled for the following week. A quote to repairs Burial Grounds buildings was accepted. Work will start in March.

Clir Ellis relayed complaints of overgrown paths and uneven pavements. Clir Lockley reported the Temple End light had still to be replaced. He had discussed the improvements to the village centre with the Post Master who suggested two ten minute parking spaces might be created in front of his garage to stop parking on the pavement in front of the supermarket.

The County had recently installed Speed Strips in the village and would report on traffic flows and speeds but any scheme to control traffic would be expensive. Tim Lockley reports on Parish Council activity for the Harbury News and his latest article would include Stratford District's Tree Warden initiative. Tony Mancell warned his fellow councillors that they would now need to decide on the budget to set for 2005-6.

There was a lively report on the Meeting with South Warwickshire Housing Association on its refusal to clear unkempt gardens for new tenants. The PC and residents might not have made much progress with SWHA but it did give Cllr Biddle a chance to air his views on its housing allocation policy.

It was explained that it is only possible to reserve homes for "local needs" at Hillside and the Bryant's estate where there is a special (Section 106) agreement. All other "social housing" is allocated on the basis of greatest need.

In the past three months the Parish Council has:

- Accepted a quote for essential repairs to the cemetery chapel.
- Forwarded comments on several controversial planning applications to Stratford District Council.
- Determined the exact location of a poorly defined boundary between a parishioner's garden and Parish Council land.
- Paid for the installation of a new barrier for the car park behind the village hall.
- Paid for repairs to vandalised Parish Council property.

- Listened to the concerns of residents about anti-social behaviour and started to think creatively about how the issue might be addressed on a community level with support from law enforcement bodies.
- Held further meetings with Warwickshire County Council about the traffic-calming needs of the village.
- Made significant advances towards the completion of the Parish Plan.
- Held an open surgery outside Harbury supermarket to listen to the concerns of parishioners.

We look forward to the New Years Party on 21<sup>st</sup> January, but more of that next month.



# **Harbury Tennis Club**

There was no coup d'etat at the Club's AGM so the Committee was reelected en bloc! In addition Jon Scothern was persuaded to fill one of the vacant positions. The assembled masses were advised that it had been another very successful year on all fronts. There was also discussion on how to celebrate the Club's 25th Anniversary in 2005 and as a result at some time next year you may well see a number of Bjorn Borg, John McEnroe, Chris Evert impersonations on the courts! We hope to compile a history of the Club so if anyone has any photos we could use please let me know.

The meeting agreed that there is now sufficient demand to install floodlights to a second court. One reason is that winter evening Club sessions are now well attended and with only one court lit there is a fair amount of waiting around. It is clear that with a second floodlit court more members would want to play. A second reason is that we would like to extend the activities for Juniors to run through the Winter. Our 2004 summer programme was our most successful with 128 Juniors attending the various sessions on offer and 70+ attending the summer camps held during 2 weeks of the school holidays. These were available to members and non-members. We had provisionally planned a winter programme comprising indoor sessions in the Village Hall for the very young ones with other indoor sessions at Southam College plus some after school sessions on the courts. There was a great deal of interest but we had to abandon most of them when our coach was offered a full time post at Esporta Coventry, a private club. However Linda Casement has run the Village Hall sessions for some of the youngest children. These have been very successful.

One of the problems we have, is getting LTA qualified coaches to come to Harbury. That's no reflection on the Club's facilities or organisation - we have an excellent reputation throughout the County on both! The problem is more one of economics and being able to offer a coach opportunities year round which would obviously be a

more attractive proposition. Two floodlit courts would give us a chance of competing with some of the other Clubs such as Learnington and Warwick in attracting coaches.

Because the facilities would continue to be available to the public they would be of great benefit to the community, particularly young people, which sits very comfortably with Government priorities on health, sustainable development and trying to address anti-social behaviour.

The outline proposals were discussed by the Parish Council's Properties sub-committee which recommended to the full Council meeting that approval in principle should be given. I'm delighted to say that was accepted and we will now prepare more details and explore funding before going back to the Parish Council in January.

The competitive element of the Club continues and pride of place this month goes to the Red Minis who completed their pre-Christmas programme with an honourable 5-5 draw against Beechwood, one of the larger Coventry Clubs. Sam Tutt, Henry Steele, Thomas Conway and Hallam Bullock all played really well to earn the draw. The match also saw Steve Conway making a successful debut as an umpire avoiding any "you cannot be serious" claims! Thanks Steve! Also thanks to Linda Casement for organising the training. She reports that it's going really well with definite improvements in all aspects as well as getting plenty of enjoyment. The emphasis after Christmas switches to the next age group, the "Orange".

In the Banbury Winter league, the "B" Team had a good month, unbeaten in 3 games. The first match was away at Byfield "C" who fielded a couple of their regular "B" team players. However, that couldn't stop Caroline Morland and Angie Dean winning the ladies' doubles but Colin Mercer and Richard Harding, making his debut, lost the men's. The mixed doubles were halved with both Caroline and Richard and Angie and Colin losing the first set but storming back in the second, both pairs winning it 6-1.

Another away match at Charibury followed. Caroline Morland and Angie Dean completed a comfortable win but Jon Scothern and Richard lost theirs but only after a very close second set. As in the Byfield match both mixed doubles were halved earning Harbury another point.

and Colin also won their match easily. The weather improved in the second half and Harbury wrapped up the match by winning both mixed doubles.



#### Book Week 15 - 18 November


Harbury School celebrated Book Week in all kinds of ways:



Ray Padbury, the current Standard Bearer for the Royal British Legion leads the procession round to the War Memorial where Geoff Goodman reads the 'names of the fallen' from each of the two World Wars. 33 men were lost in the Great War, including members of well-known Harbury families — Bird, Field, Gurden, Mann, Over, Overton and Padbury, whilst 10 names are recalled for the second World War including Biddle, Boynton, Ceney, Field, Gurden and Tanner. Two wreaths are laid at the Cross; the first by the Harbury's current President of the Royal British Legion, Sam Keeling and the second by the Parish Council; after which the Bugler sounds the 'Last Post' and the traditional two minutes silence is observed.

There is still a nucleus of village men who served in the World War II, including Dave Delin, Sam Keeling, 'Curly' Pratt, Doug Tanner and there are several ex-servicemen who enlisted for their National Service and were deployed in other regions of the World, including Korea, Kenya and the Middle East during the Suez crisis.

The 'British Legion' was formed in 1918 by Earl Haig to look after the interests of Army and Navy personnel, as ex-servicemen often found it difficult to secure employment on returning from active service and the War Office did not support them. The first meeting of the Harbury and District branch was held in the Old New Inn in 1930 and was chaired by Colonel Kitching, but after the first year, the group transferred to the 'HQ, namely the school' and Francis D. Farley took on the Chairmanship. All the minute books from over 70 years are still retained and they record the evolution of the activities and decisions, including the addition of a crown to the lapel badge when the Queen granted the assent for the organisation to become the Royal British Legion.

In the early days, the committee arranged days out to Ascot for members and their families; organised the poppy collection and the Remembrance service and also laid on a 'tea and party for the children' at Christmas. Eventually the Benevolent sub-committee was formed, which reviewed applications for assistance from Legion members and ex-servicemen within the village. This sometimes took the form of a donation, but occasionally payments were made directly to the Electricity Board or for coal to ensure that basic needs were met. At the time, the two main employers in the locality were Blue Circle Cement and Lockheed, both of whom had their own generous welfare programmes for their employees, so it was often those outside the protection afforded by the major companies who were given help from the 'Legion', especially at Christmas time.

At one time, after World War II, Bishop's Itchington was included with the Harbury organisation, as were Chesterton, Depper's Bridge and Ufton, but unlike Harbury, 'Bishop Itchington had its own silver band, which led parades throughout the local area.

Nowadays, the Royal British Legion committee meets every two months, at the Club under the Chairmanship of Ray Padbury. Other committee members include Dave Mann (Secretary), Mike Bishop, Ted Bowles, Pete Hagan and Brian Taylor and in the time-honoured tradition they discuss requests for assistance in the area, including applications for those who need to spend time in Galanos House, the newly developed RBL home on the outskirts of Southam.

As with many traditions, the Remembrance Service leads us to recall the past and the people who shaped our history. In the time honoured eulogy, 'at the going down of the sun and in the morning, we will remember' - our debt to all those went out to serve their country in times of conflict. Each year the village congregation pays its respects to the 43 men listed on the Harbury War Memorial and reflects on the inscription:

'They are not dead, but sleeping and their noble efforts will live for ever'.

#### **Nature Notes**

Over an inch of rain fell on Thursday November 18th followed by a snowfall, which gave us a seasonal frisson. I must mention an error in my last article. I implied that the elms, which used to make the lower end of Mill Street like a green tunnel in summer, were cut down when they contracted Dutch elm disease in the 70's. In fact they were felled in the course of road widening and housing development.

A new interpretation board has been installed at the Spoil Bank Nature Reserve, which lies close to the Great Western on Station Road, where scrub has been cleared by a Warwickshire Wildlife Trust working party. This will encourage grass and plants such as Centaury Yellow Wort and Hawkweeds to thrive and thereby increase the chances of Marbled White, Green Hairstreak and Grizzled Skipper butterflies breeding. Plenty of scrub in the form of Hawthorn and Privet bushes remain and the fruits will make winter food for the flocks of Starlings and Arctic Thrushes. The flesh of Hawthorn berries is quite tasty, a little like over ripe avocado pear or, more fancifully, a whey cheese. Local names for the fruit include Awes, Asogs and Aglets. Isolated Hawthorns are treated with respect and are the most frequent trees mentioned in Anglo-Saxon boundary charters. It was at a thorn tree near Hastings that King Harold's Saxon army met before the battle in 1066.

Carline thistle is found at the Spoil Bank. It is an everlasting flower, drying out and persisting through the winter. Close to the ground, the flower is surrounded by a fringe of long, shiny, yellow bracts, which make it quite distinctive. Near the railway, there is a display of Old Man's Beard, also known as Traveller's Joy, our native Clematis. Walking round the Reserve, I found two owl pellets on top of an anthill. When examined, these pellets, from the owl's crop, were made up of the indigestible remains of small rodents (that is bones and hair) together with insect wing cases.

I've been struck by the fact that many farms have at least one and sometimes a small stand of Scots Pine. It seems they may have been planted a hundred or so years ago, perhaps originally for a windbreak, but, more likely as a marker in inclement weather. Sometimes it seems Pines were planted in groups of three or four trees on high ground visible from the previous group. This would fit with those at the junction of Bush Heath Road and Station Road. Another clump lies at Greenhill towards Bishops Itchington. Farm Groups notably occur at Middle Road Farm and Westfields close to the railway line, and this gives rise to another name - Railway Pines. If anyone can shed light on these theories, I would be glad to hear. An excellent mapping exercise would be to plot all Scots Pines within a ten-mile radius of Harbury and Ladbroke. The result might show that the Pines were markers along ancient tracks

## **Gardening Notes**

As the days grow shorter, console yourself with the thought that before the end of the month the longer hours of daylight will herald the return of spring. Gardening is not central in our thoughts but good gardens start this month with planning and planting.

Do any deep digging and manuring and prepare any new borders and beds. After tidying the borders decide if winter plants are making a display or just a token effect. Garden centres have a reasonable selection of winter flowering plants, which could improve the show. Planting areas could be covered with clear polythene to warm the soil before anything is planted. Before cutting down all the old growths look around for anything to use as Christmas decorations. Hydrangea heads and other seed heads can be sprayed gold. Collect cones and berries before the birds get to them. About a week before Christmas bring in some forsythia stems and they should flower before the end of the month. Cut holly, ivy and evergreens for decorations as near to Christmas as possible. Stand them in deep water and keep in a cool place until arranging them. Plant bare rooted trees and shrubs. If they cannot be planted because of bad weather heel them into a rough trench, as a temporary measure. Prune out any dead, diseased or misplaced branches on deciduous trees and shrubs that are now fully dormant.

Be ready to give protection to containers and tender plants in a cold greenhouse. Wrap plants in fleece in a cold greenhouse if they need a temperature of more than 4C but remember to check them regularly. Move all outside pots to a sheltered spot. Imported china and terracotta pots can be frost damaged if wet compost freezes and expands inside them. Regularly check summer bulbs and tubers that are in store. Also check stored fruit and vegetables.

We are entering a difficult time for birds so regularly put out food and water. Hang a feeder in a fruit tree and whilst waiting their turn tits will eat over-wintering pests. Bread or apple on the lawn may encourage blackbirds and startings to forage for leather jackets. All birds love bacon rinds, so chop up a few of those too. Clean out nest boxes and they may be used as night roosts.

Repair fences, trellis, wire supports and walls whilst plants are dormant. Treat wooden structures with preservative. Clean cold frames to ensure maximum light. Check any outdoor taps for leaks and lag exposed pipes and taps.

Sow broadbeans for an early crop. Boxing Day is the traditional time to sow onion seed. I remember that my father-in-law always dug a bean trench and filled it with organic waste through winter, rather than opening up the compost box just to put in the kitchen vegetable waste. Dig in organic matter on pea, onion and salad beds but not where root crops will be grown. If the ground is very wet throw the compost on the surface and leave the worms to work in before next spring.

Bring forced hyacinths out when the buds are about 2" high and beginning to show colour, any earlier and they will produce too much foliage. Keep them in a cool place such as a porch until the flower stem grows. Keep all houseplants as cool as possible especially cyclamen and azaleas. Cyclamen do not like centrally heated rooms but to make them happier stand groups of foliage plants together with a flowering plant on a tray of damp gravel.

#### Plant of the month - Aucuba

It is at this time of year that evergreen shrubs come into their own, and none more than the Spotted or Variegated Laurel. This is truly a grow anywhere plant, accepting any dark, unpromising place, overhung by trees, as easily as an open site in the sun. Perhaps for this very reason it lost favour, and could not compete with more showy plants. Look again at the splendid glossy leaves and glistening red berries showing up so well in winter sunshine and appreciate what a valuable shrub this is.

Unusually, we still know the plant by its Japanese name, told to the plant hunters who brought it from there in 1783. Since the mid 19th century many selected forms have been bred with varying amounts of creamy yellow speckling on the long pointed green leaves. There are male and female forms, so to have the red berries that are freely borne through winter, you must plant at least one male bush to three females. Plant them now or in April to give a permanent green background or grow one in a pot and move it into prominence in winter.
