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## **From the Rector**

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As I am writing this we have just celebrated the Feast of St George. So I make no bones about heading this comment ST GEORGE OF ENGLAND.

The Irish have St Patrick; the Welsh have St David and the Scottish have St Andrew. England has St George, our patron Saint only since the 14<sup>th</sup> Century, whose name and reputation were brought to this country by returning Crusaders – although he was one of the most famous of the early martyrs, he is famed for his death and nothing is known of his life.

I suspect that many English people would struggle to remember that St George's Day is on April 23<sup>rd,</sup> as it attracts neither the religious attention nor the cultural celebration of the other patron saints of the British Isles.

One possible reason for this is that when the English Reformation put the church so firmly in its place, saints days fell victim to the general suspicion of all public religious celebrations. Secondly, St George, through no fault of his own, has no connection with England at all, except that he was brought here by armies of young men, bedecked in the red cross of St George, causing mayhem abroad, which perhaps has a certain contemporary resonance! Should we try to re-invent St George? If it gives us an excuse to take proper pride in what it means to be English – our famous tolerance, our deep belief in individual liberty, our willingness to use force as a last resort, then all well and good. If it becomes an excuse for xenophobic nationalism – wonderfully mocked, forty years ago by Flanders and Swan in "The English, the English, the English are the best, I wouldn't give tuppence for all the rest!" – then George should remain in obscurity. Instead we should celebrate such English icons as William Shakespeare, William Wordsworth and Rupert Brooke who all were born, or died, on April 23<sup>rd</sup>.

Yet the association of a saint with a country is somehow enriching and deepening. A saint connects us with our history and particularly with our Christian history. England may be the most unreligious country in Europe, but it is a land, which has been shaped by its Christian past, which gave it parish boundaries and graced the landscape with parish churches, abbeys and cathedrals. A triumphalist for Christianity fuelled the Industrial Revolution, while at the same time other Christians fought its worst excesses.

St George is venerated because he was a martyr; a man who must have understood that life is not fulfilled in timid saving, but in giving to others. We may know nothing of St George's life, but if the principles, which led to his martyrdom, inform our public life, and can inspire the citizens of the country under his saintly protection, then we should celebrate April 23<sup>rd</sup> not only for Shakespeare, but also for St George of England.

meditating on the coincidence of Lady Day with Good Friday, as happened this year. He saw it as a symbol of Mary's humility in the light of Jesus' glory.

Lorna led the meeting as we looked at the photographs of each other when younger. They varied from the elaborate frills and furbelows worn by toddlers (and that was just the boys!) to a view of the Jephson Gardens dug up to grow potatoes in wartime. They caused nostalgia and amusement.

At the evening meeting, Tony Stubbs described his voluntary work at Myton Hospice as a "Trolley Dolly", taking meals and drinks to the patients whilst being a sympathetic ear to them and their families. He filled in a lot of gaps in our knowledge of the Hospice movement, telling us that it is far from the depressing and frightening place we might have expected. The ethos is of caring for every need to improve the quality of life, and the higher staffing levels than are available in hospitals enhance this. He emphasised the vital role of voluntary fundraising, for which Harbury can rightly be proud.

## Harbury Parish Council

The room was packed for the April meeting - people turned out in protest at the potential development behind their homes.

However, the first speaker, John Woodward had another outrage on his mind. He alerted the Parish to Stratford's decision to cease Double Rating Relief. Stratford pays Harbury part of the costs of maintenance and improvements to recreational areas (because it is a dual responsibility and in theory the rate-payer pays twice for it).

The move means Harbury loses £10,000 a year and must increase the precept by 23%. But that was not what really incensed him. It was District Ratepayers still having to pay for Stratford's parks and recreation areas!

Philip Mayer, spokesman for the disgruntled property owners outlined what he believed was the planning situation, complaining that residents thought their "open-aspect" was guaranteed and asking the PC to keep total control over the development of the "pasture land" behind Wissett Lodge. Others complained of the "secrecy". They were adamant that development should only be for social housing and particularly for elderly people.

Chairman Jenny Patrick explained there were no concrete plans; the Parish had been investigating all possibilities for providing for the proven housing needs of the community. The land in question was owned by a private trust which might not want to release it just for social housing.

Linda Ridgley urged everyone to attend the Annual Parish Meeting where the Charity, "Planning Aid" would be present to help them understand the planning background and what rights and influence they had.

The rest of the meeting was fairly tame!

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**Planning** - Stratford granted, with conditions, extensions to Ladywell Cottage in Binswood End and extensions at 5 Hillside, 26 Manor Orchard; 3 Queens Close and 71 Mill Street; and tree work at Roallyn in Hall Lane. They refused a large extension to the Old New Inn and one at 30 Percival Drive.

The Parish Council made no comments on a loft conversion at 1 Constance Drive and an extension at 30 Manor Orchard but considered the proposed garage at 35 South Parade too high.

Pc Hill reported a quiet month on the crime front. The Depot Youth Workers were doing well and some new children had used their "bus", but there were still no volunteers for the Youth Club. Insurance for the proposed BMX track had been checked – all users must wear a safety helmet. Costs to repair the slide in the small children's play area were very high, but parts could only be obtained from the manufacturer. The choice was pay or take it out of use.

The Parish Council is to write to Southam College congratulating it on its excellent Ofsted report.

The Allotment Holders wanted a six-foot weld-mesh fence, potholes filled and their plots registered, but as the Parish rents the land from the County this is not possible. Sharon Hancock did not want a fence and Tony Mancell suggested the hedge should have the gaps filled in.



The Parking Enforcement Officer on Patrol

The Parish will write to County Highways complaining about the poor standard of work of their road maintenance contractors and pointing out that the pavement in front of Merevale House, in South Parade, is damaged and that the Ivy Lane sign has disappeared. They also want the Parking Enforcement Officer in Harbury more frequently and Kevin Biddle wanted the parking in Park Lane targeted.

The Council are investigating a strange request from a resident of Frances Road about the ownership of the parking in Drinkwater Close and another complaint that trees subject to Preservation Orders near Pirie Close may be about to be lopped. There is a substantial fine (£20K) for unauthorised work to protected trees.

Tim Lockley and others quizzed the District Councillors about their Double Rating Relief Policy complaining that the ruling party pushed it through and kept it quiet because of the proximity of the elections! Nevertheless Dutch Van Spall was determined to get the move publicised before 5th May.

## **Harbury Society**

A well-attended meeting heard Chairman, Alan Lord remind members that the Society aimed to educate them about planning, conservation and

history and to respond pro-actively to these matters and to initiate village projects, like the Village Design Statement and Parish Plan.

Treasurer, John Holden said the Society was in a good state financially and Secretary, Linda Ridgley outlined the programme for the next year and explained the potential housing and commercial development proposed for the Parish.

Speaker Susan Moore explained her interest in the rural schools in and around Fillongley. She began seeking out old School Log Books but it was twenty years before her third book, "I Remember Bare Bottoms and Stinging Nettles" was finally published. Over a hundred people contributed to the stories.

Transport has been the main driver of the changes in rural life. It took a whole day for Mrs Spencer, Fillongley's new teacher to get there from Learnington in 1911.

Ariey School children were so poor they had no clothes; shoes or food and the school struggled without basic necessities. Meriden was one of the better schools and employed the same teacher for 37 years.

At Corley, younger, cheaper women teachers replaced experienced teachers. Maxstoke School was poor and the young teacher could not control the unruly children. Astley School suffered continual complaints about the toilets making the children ill – some were dying, Little Packington was built next to the river and the health of teachers and pupils suffered.

Corley Open Air School took children from poor, unsanitary, homes in Coventry gave them good food, clean air and exercise to make them fit and healthy again, but the children hated it.

Shawbury Industrial School was for Birmingham boys, orphaned or convicted of crime. It gave them an education and training for a job with an 80% success rate yet despite this it was closed in the 1980's to save money.

There was always plenty of banter and laughter when they were around. It was great that Muriel attended the March meeting although she was far from well. A really "game girl".

Dorothy Turner had been a member of W.I for many years dating back to the 40's. She had been President and held different offices in her younger days and participated in many of the crafts and cooking that W.I offers. Dorothy had to give up the evening meetings but her daughter Pat kept her in touch. She was a lovely lady.

Members attended both funerals. We will miss them both and send our condolences to their families.

Members enjoyed their walk in the Bishop's Itchington area on a lovely Spring day followed by a pub lunch. We have entered the Carnival and have booked our usual cake stall (plenty of notice to members).

Jane Parker from Myton Hospice's Fund Raising Department came to talk on the running of Myton Hospice and the wonderful work done there. Myton Hamlet Hospice was opened in 1982 and is the only hospice providing extensive in-patient care for those with life limiting illness in the whole of Warwickshire and Coventry. Myton is multi religious and there are twenty-four beds to accommodate patients. Not many, but thankfully another hospice is being built in Coventry in the next few years that will have twenty beds, which will be a great help in caring for such a large area. Myton provides pain control, therapy and spiritual care for patients, relatives and friends. Children and pets are included and it has been known that even a horse and a sheep have visited too. Visitors are welcome to join patients for meals.

An excellent full-time staff runs Myton but volunteers are so important. Whether serving teas and meals, seeing to the flowers or, after training, helping the nursing staff with tasks, reading and talking to patients or helping with crafts or board games, their help is invaluable.

There are Day Hospices at Warwick and Rugby where they can take 15 patients for one or two days. They get reassurance and back up. They can bath, use the hairdresser, and have a massage and aromatherapy. Arts and crafts are available with games and jigsaws. Our own Muriel Coupe took advantage of the service. There is no doubt volunteers are important to the running and fundraising. Myton Hospice is always grateful to them whether it be as drivers, reception volunteers, serving in one of the eleven shops, buying Myton Hospice lottery tickets or running their annual fete.

Our own hardworking village team has raised a tremendous sum running the popular plant sales and coffee mornings.

Do you know Myton Hospice is a registered charity and depends on public donations? It costs £3.5 million a year to run and that's a lot of fundraising.

As Jane said, it is a happy place where the patients make the most of their life that remains.


#### **Children's Sponsored Cycle Ride**

Many of us were concerned to read in last month's Harbury News about the application to build 40 or so private homes on The Pasture Land behind Wissett Lodge and the perceived secrecy surrounding this potential development.

## **Our Understanding**

• This parcel of land is clearly designated as a Conservation Area (Approved by Stratford District Council Planning Committee 21 January 1998). We believe Stratford District Council will only support housing development in a Conservation Area if the location is a "Main Draw Centre".

- Harbury is not classed as a "Main Draw Centre" it's classed as a Local Centre Village and the Council will only support an application for development if there is a demonstrable local need for social housing.
- It is clear from Government Planning Guidance down to Stratford District Council's Local Plan that new "open-market" or private housing on Conservation Land in villages such as Harbury is unlikely to be permitted for the foreseeable future.
- The Office of the Deputy Prime Minister www.odpm.gov.uk in its guidance notes indicates that previously developed land in Conservation Areas (Brownfield) will be considered for further development whereas Pasture Land in Conservation Areas should not be developed.

## Effect on the General Environment and Value of our Respective Properties

Increased traffic in Vicarage Lane, Church Street and South Parade will be a great concern to many people living in the neighbourhood. These roads are not designed to take an additional 60/80 cars. People who live in the surrounding area to this Pasture Land will see the character of the village change and endure increased traffic with its associated pollution and noise.

Many homes adjacent to the Pasture Land will be seriously affected by any development on it. When each of us bought our properties we were assured the land to the rear of our respective plots was designated as a Conservation Area and I guess we paid a purchase premium knowing we would enjoy an "open aspect" at the bottom of our gardens.

#### **Suggested Action**

If you share these opinions may we suggest that you ask the County, District and Parish Councillors to vehemently oppose the application for 40 or so new houses on this land?

#### AND

To be extremely vigilant over an alternative application for SINGLE STOREY housing to meet local needs and offering:

- Sheltered Accommodation for the old and/or infirm 1.
- 2. Supported Living Accommodation for adults who prefer a degree of independent living with an element of supervision.

Let us ensure The Parish Council retains total control over the development of this Pasture Land and the allocation of any accommodation built on it to specific individuals now and into the foreseeable future

#### **Nature Notes**

The end of April is cool and wet, some of the rain being quite heavy. The ground could do with the water, but warmth is now needed for plant growth, and survival of young animals, be they farmed or in the wild. At Broadwell, a 'hidden' hamlet, 3 miles from Southam, just off the A426 to Rugby, I came across an eye-catching flock of sheep. The lambs were black with a startling white blaze on their faces. The ewes were grey in colour. A gentleman removing a sign advertising Broadwell's flower show from their small village hall gave me the name of the owners. I telephoned on my return and found out that the sheep were a Dutch breed called Zwartbles.

Closer to home, on the Thwaites Estate, I noticed a black cow with a wide white band totally circling the animal. I confirmed with Roy Lambert that this was a Belted Galloway. Have you seen any of these distinctive and somehow very appealing creatures?

Sticking with black and white fauna, my neighbour, Christopher Bristow, saw a badger attempting to cross Temple End. Has anyone seen one in the centre of the village? Perhaps if a particularly rare species could be encouraged to use the approach roads, traffic calming problems would be solved at a stroke.

Any blue butterfly seen as early as April must be a Holly Blue because the others don't appear until later. Anything which helps with the identification of species in this confusing group of six is to be welcomed. As its name suggests, Holly is one of the food plants of the Holly Blue caterpillar, and so is Ivy and I feel a carol's there somewhere! Other butterflies seen on the wing so far this year include Brimstone, Peacock, Speckled Wood, Small Tortoiseshell and Comma. They are about to be joined by many more - try a walk round Ufton Fields Nature Reserve on a sunny day in May.

So far (28th April), ash trees are not in leaf but the distinctive purple flowers are very prominent. Most of us are familiar with the old rhyme,

Oak before the Ash, we will have a splash Ash before the Oak, we will have a soak.

but I hadn't come across the Scottish version from Roxburgh.

Ash before Oak, the lady wears a cloak

Oak before Ash, the lady wears a sash.

I'm still waiting to see the cloaked woman as so far the Oak has beaten the Ash into leaf hands down. Cowslips adorn the verges,

bluebells fill the woods and in some are interspersed with Yellow Archangel and Wood Anemones, both excellent indicators of ancient woodland. For a fine show of these flowers, visit Hampton Wood, a small nature reserve just west of the River Avon between Sherbourne and Hampton Lucy. Closer to home, try Ufton Woods. On a rather wet day in Hampton Woods recently, I stood and listened to a Willow Warbler's piping call.

The Skylark is a bird that has definitely declined in recent years, but with the advent of 'set aside' farming schemes may be making a comeback. One place you are almost certain to hear it is the tract of flat, sometimes marshy, farming country between the A423 (Southam-Banbury road) and Priors Hardwick. Here, the line of the ancient Saltway is now a bridle path and heads out towards the line of hills and the Northamptonshire border, past the Decca radio mast and across the Oxford Canal. It's lonely country, but great for wildlife.

A highlight for me in April was a tour of the Leam Valley nature reserve with the warden. He showed me a well-hidden spot where the rare Snake's Head Fritillary was thriving. It is possible the flower has been introduced at this place, as it was not noted before 1970. In a previous article, I reported standing in the large meadows by the Thames near Cricklade and gazing out over the nodding heads of thousands of Fritillaries, a truly wondrous sight.

I've seen my first wild orchids in flower - five Early Purple Orchids on a road bank in one of the limestone regions on the island of Anglesey. A few Early Purple Orchids cling on at the Spoil Bank nature reserve, but for a more certain hit, visit Snitterfield Bushes reserve north of Stratford. Now for the cuckoo, and summer will have truly arrived.

#### **Gardening Notes**

We now hope for the beginning of summer, for the saying goes that Urban gives the summer, and St Urbans Day is the 25th May. What is more certain is the lengthening of the days and so the increase in plant growth. Ensure plants especially those grown from seed that are making lots of growth are kept well watered. Soak well not just to wet the surface for this encourages shallow rooting. Buy summer plants for borders and containers but still keep them in warmth and good light, gradually hardening them off. Thin out hardy annuals sown last month. This is easiest when the soil is damp, so water well the night before. Don't let them get too big before thinning: four healthy good leaves produce happy plants. Plant dormant dahlia tubers 4" deep in beds; by the time shoots appear above ground the danger from frost should have passed. Some shoots can be cut off at the base of the plants and potted up in sandy compost to produce new plants. Plant out sweet peas after putting in canes for their support. Pinch out tops to encourage bushy growth. Mulch well. Put in support for all tall perennials. Wage war on slugs and snails with beer traps, or use milk. In a test, 147 were caught in one evening using traps! Hoe the soil to expose their eggs to birds. Create a barrier round plants with gritty, hairy or very absorbent material. Cocoa shell works well at first, dog hair is good for a few weeks, eggshell and sand are also effective.

Carefully tidy spring blooming clematis once flowering has finished. To check over-vigorous growth on Montana varieties cut back hard, they will bloom again next year on the growth they put on during the coming months. Prunings can be easily rooted in sandy compost. Clip bay trees. Mulch rhododendrons and azaleas. This is the best time to plant evergreens and conifers, and to buy and plant shrubs which are tender when young, eg. Hydrangea, Choisya. Make a shallow reservoir around the plants to hold water, allowing it to soak in as shrubs put in now will need watering weekly until September.

Continue warming the soil with cloches or plastic sheets, and sow salad crops every 3 weeks to provide continuous cropping. Sow marrows, courgettes, cucumbers and melons inside in pots in early May. Sow the seeds on edge to prevent rot. Plant them out when they have a few leaves at the end of the month. Plants of these and sweet peppers and aubergines are available in garden centres this month. Sow runner and French beans in 3" pots at beginning of month in a greenhouse or outside at end of month. Plant out indoor tomato seedlings in Gro-bags or containers towards end of month. Remember to put in supports. Pot on any young plants grown from cuttings or seed. Feed over-wintered fuchsias and pelargonium with a weak high-nitrogen fertiliser, and pinch out the tops of new shoots to make bushy plants.

Sow biennials and perennials. Lavender, mullein, acanthus and rosemary are good in dry soils. Keep any surplus seed in air- tight jars in the fridge. Most seed, except parsnip, lettuce and onion will be viable for about 6 years. This is the best time to repot cacti and succulents. Use gritty compost. Remove offshoots and pot them up separately. Wrap newspaper round spiny ones to handle them. Pot on or repot foliage plants. Check for vine weevils in the top inch or two of compost. Wash leaves that may have collected dust during the

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winter. Pinch out straggly growth. Add liquid fertiliser to water once a week. When amaryllis leaves die down stop watering and allow the bulb to dry off in the pot. Store until next year, if you fed the bulb during the last couple of months it will bloom again.

The first Sunday in May is styled 'International Dawn Chorus Day'. Did you hear it, and has anyone heard the cuckoo?

#### Plant of the month - Silene

Late May can be a time when spring flowers are spent but early summer ones are only just beginning. The annuals and perennials of the Silene family could fill that gap. There are over 500 species worldwide but many of them do not have any garden value. The majority are native to the Mediterranean countries but we have seven native ones, commonly known as campions. The red campion is important for wildlife attracting many insects, so is useful in a wild garden. There is an attractive double version sold as



a border plant and Silene fimbriata, a white campion with unusual fringed white petals arising from a bladder-like base. It grows from a rhizome so will form a clump in time. Grow this one in part shade and dry soil. Two more to grow in sun are the pink S.pendula, an annual, commonly called catchfly and S.acaulis, cushion pink, both flowering in early summer. Sow the seed in situ in well-drained soil in September to flower in May.

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
