



Our afternoon meeting followed the Ash Wednesday Service, which included the imposition of ashes to mark the start of Lent. We continued in a quiet mood with a meditation called "A Quartet of Candles". We saw how Peace, Faith and Love were extinguished by the carelessness of modern life, but if the flame of hope kept burning they would be re-lit and maintained.

The evening meeting was most encouraging, as John Guilford enthused about his work with "Business in the Community". Started after the inner city riots in the 80's and ably supported by Prince Charles as its President, this organisation aims to involve businesses with the communities around them. It meets all sorts of needs in deprived areas, and John described some of a vast range of projects. These included reading help in local schools, a walking bus in Kings Norton, renovating play areas, helping Headteachers and community groups with business plans and marketing strategies, mobility access, rehabilitation for homeless men and employment for ex-offenders. The businesses apparently find a very positive spin off for themselves as staff get really motivated by their contribution. It was most heartening to learn about such worthwhile activities, of which we hear so little, but which make such a difference.

# Ladbroke Parish Council - March Betty Winkfield

A maintenance reclaim payment of £1262.80 was made by Stratford District Council for the Millennium Green.

Planning Applications – There was much discussion on the extension plans for the bungalow, "Elgin", next to The Bell Inn. Concerns were expressed about the size and amount of the proposed extension and the change of access.

All other planning applications have been granted. The felling of trees belonging to Dovecote are still outstanding.

There was no police presence at the meeting. Concern about this was expressed, especially as Police forces will be amalgamated next year and there will be fewer fully trained Police Officers around.

**Highways and Drainage** – A ditch is to be dug along the bypass, (the furthest side of the road to the village), to prevent flooding across the road from the higher ground.

The Parish Plan – With 80%+ of all questionnaires returned, and the collation of information completed, the printing and presentation will be ready for the Parish Council AGM in May.

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
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

#### Law and Order

Cllr Tim Lockley reacted with admirable despatch to vandalism that followed a Young Farmers Event at the Rugby Club when cars and property were damaged. He talked to all the complainants, the Rugby Club, YF and the Police who had agreed to have a presence in Harbury during the next event.

Cllr Van Spall complained that when he disturbed two intruders at night there was no back up for Pc Hill to pursue them. This proved there was insufficient police coverage. He also questioned police policy on illegal immigrants around the M40 Service Station.

#### Consultation

Councillors attended meetings on Premier Freight Routes - intended to guide HGV drivers to preferred routes away from villages and on the Minerals and Waste Strategies. Dutch Van Spall volunteered to sit on the County Waste Forum and report back to the PC. Cllr Janet Thornley attended the regular Ufton Tip meeting with Biffa and was impressed that it received an excellent report from the Environment Agency.

Planning - The Council made no representation about: extensions to 4 Pineham Avenue; 9 Hillside; 5 Park Lane; 3 Percival Drive; 61 Deppers Bridge; 10 Margaret Close; Old Tom's Barn, Hall Lane and 12 Manor Road; an agricultural building at Middle Road Farm and a workshop within an existing building at Springfield Farm, Treens Hill and the raising of the crown of a willow at the Shakespeare Inn.

They supported the application for a café at Churchlands Farm, Bascote Road. After some agonising they agreed not to object to the Stands and Function Room planned for the "Brakes" Football Ground on Harbury Lane. However, they were opposed to the application to link the "home-office" built at the Lodge, Hall Lane. New access, required as a condition on the permission to create the "home-office", had not been discharged.

Clir Hancock was unhappy that officers at Stratford District had not followed up enforcement on the caravans stationed beyond the Three Arch Bridge. There were also on-going problems with the Bungalow in

Mill Street which was higher and had features not in the approved plans.

There were complaints about the unhelpful attitude of Development Control Officers at Stratford District from two Councillors and the Council agreed to put their concerns in writing.

Cllr Van Spall complained that Stratford District had not produced the promised list of email contacts for those involved in the Quarries Masterplan and urged the Parish to construct its own version. He expressed dissatisfaction with the whole Masterplan process claiming that it would enable Follett Properties to say local people approved of their developments.

**Deppers Bridge** - Traffic Calming Bollards had been damaged yet again, and it was hoped that Harbury Scouts would be able to refurbish the milestone in the hamlet.

#### **Recreation Grounds**

There was embarrassment that Councillors had not realised there were two Basketball Posts. One is currently damaged and out of use, so both will be refurbished. The Tennis Club was given permission to paint a net line on the kick wall. Permission was also given to close the field on 10th June for the Carnival.

"Some prankster" had gaffer-taped up the Car Park Barrier and there was considerable discussion on whether the Parish should pay someone to open and close it. Cllr Van Spall wanted to charge Village Hall hirers and Recreation organisations for the use of the Car Park.

"Village of the Year Award" Improvements - Cllr Lockley had made some progress discovering who owned which street furniture and had secured the agreement of Stratford District for all theirs to be painted black.

Neighbours had not responded to his letter asking their views on re-instating the Bus Shelter. Plans for a specially designed one will be drawn up.

Traffic Management - Clir Biddle reported being made aware that at least one resident had been issued with a parking ticket, but the Council was still not happy with the attendance of the Parking Attendant – who had issued 5 tickets since October 2004. His report listed about 200 visits but it turns out that each street patrolled is counted as a "visit".

#### **Environment**

Birse (working on the Railway) has agreed to repair the Pound Green and the Council will re-instate Binswood End Green and place temporary wooden posts there to stop a car driving over the newly seeded area. Cllr Van Spall wanted posts all round the Pound to stop cars driving over that..

Colin Sheasby reported on the state of the Parish's Trees. Five were dead and some young trees had been vandalised and would need replanting. There was a long list of remedial work which he would be asked to prioritise and undertake as the budget allowed.

Clir Hancock was angered that rail contractors had installed intrusive and brutal metal fencing on top of the Three Arch Bridge. It was insensitive and detracted from the historic and architecturally elegant bridge. The Council would protest but it is on railway property and does not appear to need permission


Harbury Eagles 3 - 1 Harbury Hawks


"My mum reads me a book. I love her and I give her a kiss" - Sophie.


"She tickles my tummy and plays with me and the dolls" - Grace.

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#### **Nature Notes**

First an apology - in February and March 'Nature Notes' I stated that atmospheric pressure remained high at 30.5 millibars. John Small pointed out that my units were wrong and this should have read 30.5 inches lover 1000 millibarsl, Sorry, As I write (20th March), we are stuck with high pressure from the continent and a cold, raw, north easterly wind. Spring is on hold. Mind you it takes some stopping. I saw my first butterfly of the year in flight on 6th March. It was a Peacock drawn out of hibernation by the sun's rays at 11.0am in a relatively warm south facing valley where the Cotswolds dip down into Bath. According to Dr. Jeremy Thomas, in his excellent book 'The Butterflies of Britain & Ireland' illustrated by Richard Lewington, a hollow tree is frequently chosen for hibernation. Large numbers of insects cling together and, as a defence measure, flutter their wings and produce a loud hissing sound like a snake if disturbed. On the same day as the butterfly, a bee was 'revving up' its 'engine' taking nectar from some handy flowering pot plants outside a florist.

Birds are making more noise in the morning and nest building is beginning to get into its stride. We've had a Robin going into the ivy at the back of the house with nesting material and a determined look in its eye. Friends report frogs on the move in and about their ponds. I saw a squashed one in Mill Street on Friday 10th March after our first significant rainfall for at least a month (8mms on 7th & 6mms on 8<sup>th</sup>). On Thursday 9th a rainbow arched over the village as I cycled up Middle Road.

Searching for frogspawn in the Warwickshire countryside can be rather dispiriting. Garden ponds are much the best place and probably are the amphibians' salvation. Visiting the family in Yorkshire over the weekend 11th/12th March we were delighted to wake on Sunday to a fall of snow. Not much, but enough for a snowball fight with my grandson Tom. Later I visited two tiny ponds in the top field of Megan's primary school. One was choked with grass and sticks and needed some clearing. A thin skim of ice partly covered the other pond but underneath was a mass of spawn though the eggs showed no sign of maturing.

Nearer home, garden flowers are always a bit further on than their wild cousins. The bulbs are well in the lead but primroses are in flower in a little north of our north facing garden. Two key flowers of spring

for me are Colt's Foot (Tussilago forfaro) and Violet (Viola rivinia - the dog violet - being the commonest). The mound at Fiveways looks an unpromising site but I'm glad to see Colt's Foot spreading on the village side. Some flowers were fully open on March 19th when Doug Freeman's cycling group stopped there on our way back into Harbury.

Today I set off to look for violets. One sure-fire site is close to the Grand Union Canal at Bascote top lock. The eye catching dark blue of just one flower glinted on the south facing bank of the cutting. The plants are being swamped by ground ivy and just hanging on in this spot. This poses a dilemma; should an area such as this be tended to favour the violets or should nature be left to itself? Opposite the old toll house is a copse. An unofficial car park is encroaching on one side of this small wood and rubbish is mounting up under the trees and shrubs. This has been an excellent place over many years to find white violets. Sure enough they're still to be found; one flower was fully open this morning and several others in bud. The solution is easier stop dumping rubbish at this site and limit vehicle access.

Finally, have you seen the Llamas in the field near the water tower site?

#### Vandalism in the Village

Following the vandalism that took place on the evening of Friday March 10th in the village I thought it might be helpful if I outlined the steps that are being taken to prevent it happening again. The problems were caused by drunken youths going to and then returning from a Young Farmers event at the Rugby Club. The Young Farmers and the Rugby Club had arranged for official door security and all those under 18 were issued with an armband indicating that they should not be served alcohol. There were also regular sweeps through the bar to catch those under 18's who had managed to persuade older youths to buy alcohol for them. Despite these measures, it was evident that some underage drinking had taken place, most likely on the way to and from the event with alcohol purchased elsewhere or taken from home, which probably contributed to the vandalism that followed. It is quite possible that those who later caused trouble had actually been ejected from the event by security. As the event was open to all local

youths only about a third of those attending were members of the local Young Farmers group.

At future events the Young Farmers will be limiting members to one guest only, and will be contacting local taxi firms and encouraging them to be there when the event closes so that youths do not have to come back into the village seeking public transport. Furthermore PC Nigel Hill has informed both the Rugby Club and the Young Farmers that he wants to be notified in advance of any future event and he has promised me that he will try to have a police presence in the village during most of that night.

Nobody, not the Young Farmers, not the Rugby Club, and certainly not the residents of Binswood End or Mill St, wants a repeat of what happened on March 10th. Hopefully these measures will help to achieve that end.

#### **Severn Trent**

Following up comments in our last issue of Focus, three officers from the Consumer Council for Water very kindly agreed to meet SDC Councillors Andrew Patrick (Harbury, Bishops Itchington & Chesterton) and Nigel Rock (Stockton & Napton) in Harbury on Wednesday 22nd February.

We covered a wide range of complaints, including the leak outside Bishops Itchington Post Office, and the long-running saga of the sewer leak in the Fosse Way (Chesterton).

They made one very practical suggestion:-

If you are reporting a fault to Severn Trent, do not use the number printed on the front of your water Bill.

(This takes you to Customer Services & Billing in Derby, who then have to transfer you to Operations in Finham – and the transfer between Derby & Finham can take ages!)

Instead, use the number on the back of the Bill 0800 783 4444.

This takes you straight to Operations in Finham, and should save you a lot of time and frustration.

And they made one very good offer as well:-

If you report a fault to Severn Trent, make a note of when they promise to fix it. If it isn't fixed in the time promised, please get in touch with the Consumer Council directly: - 08457 023953.

You should find that will get it sorted.

If you have occasion to make use of any of this advice, I'd be interested to know how you get on.

Meanwhile, Lee Newman (Regional Manager, Consumer Council for Water Midlands) has kindly sent the article that follows.

#### The Consumer Council for Water

The Consumer Council for Water (CCWater) is an independent national consumer organisation with a statutory duty to represent the interests of business and domestic water and sewerage customers in England and Wales. It was established on October 1 2005 and operates through nine regional committees in England. The local Midlands Office is based in the centre of Birmingham and deals with those issues affecting Warwickshire customers of Severn Trent.

CCWater monitors and influences the activities of Severn Trent in a number of ways:

Advising customers in all aspects of their water and sewerage service

Helping customers who have complaints

Carrying out snapshot audits of debt recovery, billing, complaints and new connections.

Raising issues with Severn Trent at public meetings throughout the Midlands.

CCWater speaks for water consumers putting forward their views and concerns about price, quality and value for money of water and sewerage services. It aims to help consumers drive debate in the water industry on wider issues such as sustainability and environmental quality. In particular it has a statutory duty to represent consumers with disabilities and chronic illnesses, those on low incomes, rural customers and pensioners.

Over the past twelve months we have secured £244,131 in compensation for consumers in the Midlands region. Recent success stories in the Warwickshire area include;

Severn Trent did not take a meter reading during two years occupancy and the current reading showed higher than normal consumption. Following pressure from this office to investigate, Severn Trent found the meter was serving a neighbouring property resulting in an amended bill and a rebate to the customer of £488.

A customer experienced a two month delay in receiving a new connection to property causing him to run behind schedule with other work needed. Following contact with our office, an appointment for connection was made. The work was further delayed due to a road work permit not being obtained as the department had forgotten to request it. The issue was raised at an audit of Severn Trent's new connections department and work began two days later. Severn Trent also refunded the connection fee totalling £795.

The room is available for members' private functions at a very modest fee of £30! A disco can be provided for a small extra charge. We also allow charities to use the room without charge, at the discretion of the Committee. A fully equipped bar, serving a range of drinks, at possibly the lowest prices in the village, complete these facilities. There is a permanent stage complete with spotlights, disco lights and a glitter ball. Equipment, including Short Mat Bowls mats, a pool table and a darts board are also available. The room is also used for the Friday night Bingo sessions, Line Dancing and Quiz Nights.

If your preference is a quiet drink in comfortable surroundings take a look at our newly redecorated lounge, recently fitted with velour seating and low level lighting. Off the lounge is a Television Room with a new large screen television so you can keep in touch with your favourite programmes or check up on the latest football results etc.

In recent times the entrance hall has been reconfigured and refurbished and we have installed a new ladies cloakroom, disabled facilities and gentlemen's toilet.

Off the entrance hall is a highly regarded Snooker Room with two well maintained full-sized tables.

Our licence allows us to serve drinks until midnight every night, except Sundays when it is 11.30pm with additional hours on Bank Holidays.

With all these facilities available you could be forgiven for thinking it would cost a small fortune to become a member. In fact it only costs £5 p.a. plus an initial 13p for your share in the Club.

The Club is owned and run by its members, all of them locals, and we would gladly welcome new members, particularly younger people — why don't you call in and see us sometime or telephone 612498 and speak to one of our friendly staff?

#### Art and Craft Exhibition at Napton

Well known artists from the area regularly display their artwork, which covers a complete range of styles from still-life, country scenes and coastal views to abstract forms and computer enhanced images. There is also a produce stall which sells jams, cakes and chutneys and there is a wide selection of cards (some based on the artwork on sale), as well as a major raffle. Refreshments are available throughout the day, so a visit to the exhibition makes for an interesting outing on the public holiday without having to drive a great distance and run the risk of getting caught in a traffic jam! The Napton Art Group is self-financing and invites artists from the local villages to join their weekly meetings, which offer demonstrations, quest speakers, art workshops, as well as trips to art shows and galleries. #### Harbury's Young Entrepreneurs

Enterprise and entrepreneurship were not included on the school curriculum when the two young entrepreneurs featured in this month's magazine completed their full time education. Nowadays, alongside the main subject areas, students are presented with the skills to help them build an understanding of the business world with lessons in understanding 'risk taking' and the importance of 'creativity and innovation'.

Both Harbury's young entrepreneurs went to Southam School (now a Technology College) and embarked on career pathways which have led each of them to set up their own business. Jeff will be 31 this year and 'Kipper' has just celebrated his 30<sup>th</sup> birthday.

#### **Harbury Landscaping and Groundworks**

Jeff Maule left school after taking his 'A' levels, which included Art and Design and went to work for the Dowdeswell Agricultural Engineering

Company, which is located in Stockton. He worked for 3 years in the machine shop before deciding he would prefer to work outdoors and took on his first job in the construction industry with Tony Hall from Cubbington. After a year he joined Rex Payne (builders) in Cubbington where he first learned the skills needed for groundwork when he was involved in the preparation of a site prior to building and in completion of a project, which required laying driveways and boundary walls. He stayed for 2 years before moving on to work for Cavendish Construction and then Sol, which was formerly the well known Learnington builders, Crosbee and Atkins. At this point, he was introduced to the skills which he now employs in his own business, as he was involved in ground work for English Heritage. He visited old properties in Alcester and Stratford-on-Avon where he was required to take up old paving and re-lay it to look as authentic as the original. He also worked on the boundary wall at Chesterton Church, which needed restoration after large sections had become damaged due to the effects of weathering. As Jeff comments, he learned his trade 'on the job' by working alongside skilled employees who taught him all the skills he needed to complete the work to a high standard.

Jeff set up his own business, Harbury Landscaping and Groundworks last July and he has been employed continuously as a 'one man band' carrying out a variety of projects in the local area. His distinctive pick-up truck, emblazoned with the company name, has been a familiar sight around the village as he has carried out work in the Beeches, Percival Drive and at the junction of Farm Street and Binswood End. He carries out all the typical groundwork projects, including block paving, slab work, stone work, turfing and decking, which are much in demand for householders who seek to improve the appearance of their



properties, but 'fight shy' of carrying out the work themselves.

If Jeff is the 'brawn' of the business, then the 'brain' who supports him and carries out the book-keeping required by any business is his partner, Tracey. She is a born and bred Harbury girl who embarked on



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several operations, including the removal of bone from his hip, which was used to reconstruct some of the damaged neck vertebrae. Whilst he was in hospital with 'time to think', he decided that he would set up his own boat building business when he was fully fit.

He eventually managed to find a sizeable farm building in Ladbroke, which the farmer was willing to loan and set to work building a narrowboat. In a short space of time, canal enthusiasts found their way to Bluewater Boats; admired the quality of the workmanship of the boat under construction and started to place orders. The workshop space at Old Barn Farm in Ladbroke allows David to produce canal boats in a variety of lengths and widths, so that a customer can specify their exact requirements. David is involved in all stages of the 'inhouse' boat-building package from preliminary designs, in partnership with the customer, to construction of the hull and 'fit-outs' of the interior. He builds narrowboats which can be up to 60 feet in length and Dutch barges, which can be 70 feet long — considerably longer than the average bus which negotiates the streets of Harbury!

From the early beginnings, 5 years ago, David has now built up a family run business with several employees, including his Dad, an uncle and a cousin, who have the necessary carpentry or welding skills needed to construct each craft to perfection. A visit to the boat-building premises is mind-blowing, as it is possible to see boats in various stages of construction from the skeleton hull; to the welded shell and the fully fitted and painted 'end product'. It is all the more amazing when it is realised that the outline 2D drawings for each boat will be converted into the enormous fabricated craft, which are created from nothing more than massive sheets of steel and wood, which are delivered regularly. Each narrowboat takes 5 months to complete, whilst the larger Dutch barge, which can be used to navigate waterways throughout Europe, takes approximately 9 months in construction.

David recently featured on I.T.V's Waterworld programme, which showed stages in the construction of a Dutch barge with its eventual launch in a canal in Worcestershire and he also attended the National Boat Show held in London in January. Most of David's trade comes from advertising in canal boat magazines, but he also receives recommendations from both private and trade customers as a result of the superb quality of his workmanship. He has been awarded with membership of the Guild of Master Craftsmen in recognition of the company's commitment to work with skill and integrity, which followed references from a number of satisfied customers.

During David's recovery period in hospital, apart from considering the start up of his own business, he also proposed to Sharon who he married in the following year. They now enjoy bringing up daughter, Jessica, aged 2 years, who knows all about Daddy's boats and loves to cruise on their show boat. As with Harbury's other young entrepreneur, Sharon is responsible for all the accounts and is involved in buying the raw materials and selling the finished product.

The adage, "behind every good man, there is an equally good woman", obviously applies to Tracey and Sharon as they provide the essential 'back up' by 'keeping the books' for their enterprising partners. Congratulations to the two young entrepreneurs — may the 'wind of change' they took in their careers, continue to blow in the right direction!
