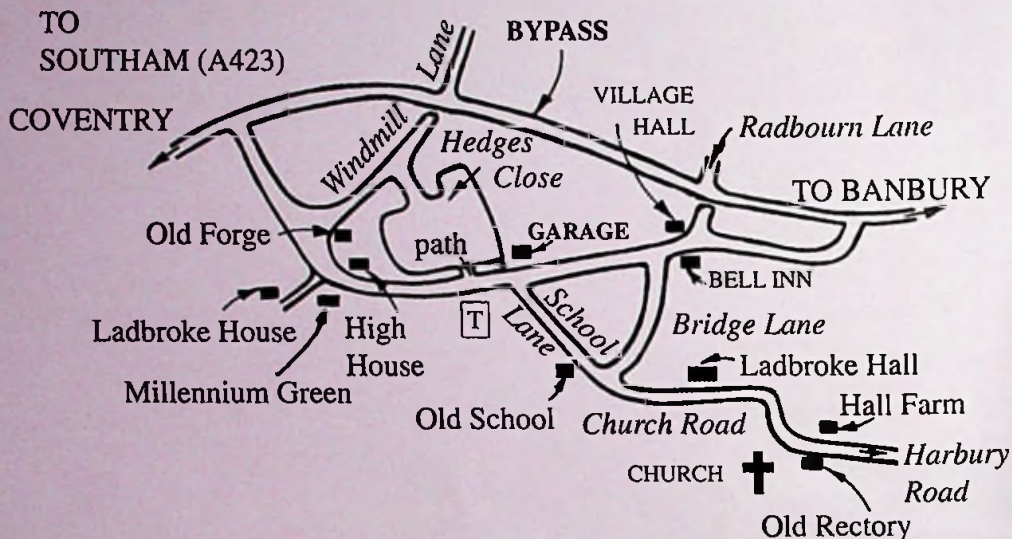

From the Rector

Another question I'm asked frequently is "Why me?" A question I have been asking myself. In answer to this I reproduce the following from Abba Imma – a miscellany of pieces for the Parish magazine – by Norman Goodacre.

Why me?

A very familiar Cri de Coeur when we become victims of evil in the form of serious illness or of some dastardly deed, is to cry out, 'why me?' Implying of course that we feel that although our lives are not perfect, yet we have done reasonably well. Is God perhaps displeased with us for some reason? Is the accident, the infection, or the cancer, something God is visiting upon us for a reason we cannot discern? When we find it impossible to obtain a job on leaving school, or we suddenly lose our job in our thirties, do we not feel frustrated, unwanted and redundant – thrown on the heap? 'Why me?'

There is no easy answer to this problem of evil. You will remember the case of the man born blind, in St John's Gospel, who is brought to Jesus with the question: 'Why was this man born blind? Who sinned, this man or his parents?' Jesus, before answering turned the attention of the enquirers away from the problem itself and made a somewhat startling comment. 'He was born blind so that God's power might be displayed in curing him.' The healing power of God so wonderfully shown in the life and ministry of Jesus Christ was sufficient explanation.

In a word it is not what happens to us that is important, but what we do about it. Jesus went to his own death in his early thirties. He did it for us. As Mrs Alexander says, in her wonderful hymn:

*There is no other good enough
To pay the price of sin.
He could unlock the gate
Of Heaven and let us in.*

It is the saving death of Jesus himself that makes possible the redemption of the world from sin and pain and death. Jesus did not say, 'Why me?' He said, 'Father forgive them.' St Stephen did not show self pity: he simply said, 'Lord by not this sin to their charge'. In the final act for us all is not 'Why me?', but 'allow me to offer myself to you.' 'Use me, Lord, in this that has happened to me? Use me for your Glory.'

This certainly helped me with my problem!

This year I celebrate the 25th Anniversary of my ordination to the Priesthood, and on Saturday 1st July there will be a Thanksgiving Eucharist at 1pm at All Saints Harbury.

I do hope as many people as possible will join with me on this occasion.

Following the service there will be a Bring and Share Lunch.

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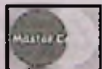
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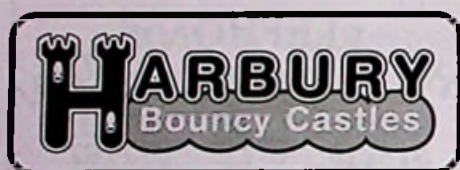
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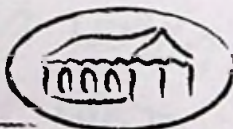
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From the Churchwardens

Mothers' Union

The month gave members several opportunities to view the work of Mothers' Union in a wider context than our own parish. First, at our afternoon meeting, Mrs Janet Jenkins described how she was involved with her branch at Knowle (near Solihull) in making a new M.U. banner for their linked branch in Papua, New Guinea. She then solved the problem of its safe transport by undertaking the trip herself, and with the help of slides described her experience. We were particularly struck by the cheerful enthusiasm of all the ladies out there, many in their 'uniform' of blue and white.

Then Mary and Gillian went to St Mark's in Leamington, to hear Reg Bailey, the M.U. Chief Executive. If that makes us sound like a big business, well in a way we are, with 3.6 million members in 77 countries worldwide. In an exceptionally well structured talk, he used his subject of 'Answering God's Call' to relate the characteristics of various biblical characters to the work which M.U. does today. Such projects as help for asylum seekers, literacy and development in Africa, health educations, family holidays and prison contact centres, all supported by prayer, made us feel proud to be part of such a great organisation.

The third opportunity saw a group of us sharing in a deanery service in Southam. The speaker was Mrs Tina Lamb, wife of the vicar of the Warmington group of churches; her subject again was God's Call. A convivial time of tea and chat followed.

Our evening meeting heard about work which ties in well with our aim of supporting family life. Mrs Julie Wakefield, of Warwickshire Family Learning Programme, explained how they can help parents who missed out on a good school experience themselves, develop good literacy and numeracy skills alongside their children. This gave them more confidence in their relationships with their children. Julie emphasised the importance of the home environment; children only actually spend 15% of their waking hours in school.

Our next service is on Tuesday 13th June at 2pm in Church. Young children and babies, accompanied by an adult, are very welcome to join us.

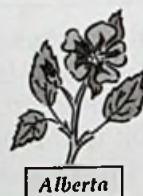

Harbury Parish Council

This was the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council, not to be confused with the Annual Parish Meeting held earlier in the month, which was an opportunity for parishioners to quiz Councillors.

This meeting thrashed out the representation on various committees and saw a change of Chair – Jenny Patrick standing down and Vice-Chairman Kevin Biddle assuming the Chain of Office.

Jenny Patrick was not present but sent a statement thanking all her fellow Councillors for their support and hoping that the “friendly relations” with Bishops Itchington would continue.

There were no members of the public bringing problems to the attention of the Councillors. No report from the Police or from the Parish Representatives at Harbury or Southam School, although County Councillor Bob Stevens who is Chair of the Governors at Southam explained theirs had been a short meeting as it clashed with the important Arsenal match!

However things livened up a bit when Janet Thornley reported that a Village Hall Development Steering Group had set itself up and was seeking a grant of £500 for administrative expenses from the Parish Council. They were exploring possible improvements to the existing hall and more grandiose plans for sports provision and energy efficiency.

Tony Mancell, Chair of Finance, tried to tease out the relationship of this group to the Village Hall Management Committee and was not satisfied that the VHDSG was yet properly constituted. Cllrs Thornley and Lockley argued that the VHDSG did not want to be directly associated with the Village Hall Management Committee but it was explained that as they had no Bank Account or Constitution they could not be considered at present for a grant.

Deppers Bridge representative Dutch van Spall was still battling to get Weight Restrictions on the road through the hamlet, complaining that the Quality Freight Routes brokered by the County with the Haulage Companies were not working. He was frustrated that the County would not survey the problem. Dutch asked the Parish to investigate the growing of rape in fields used for the GM trials (Defra said there should be a seven year break to ensure no cross pollination

from "volunteers" from the trails). And the traffic calming bollards need repairing again! "They are neither use nor ornament" asserted new Chairman Kevin Biddle.

PLANNING - Stratford District refused the demolition of old workshops and their replacement with new units on land off Ufton Road. They approved a Conservatory at 25 Farm Street; extensions to No 1 and 61 Deppers Bridge; and the stationing of caravans for storage and accommodation on a casual basis at Bridge End Farm, Bull Ring Lane.

Harbury Council made no representation on the porch planned at 19 South Parade or the cottage at West Field Farm but asked that neighbours views be sought on plans for an extension at 23 Manor Orchard and tarmacing over of the lawn for car parking; they objected strongly to the third application to extend 30 Percival Drive and pointed out that Pinewood House, Bush Heath Lane was not a farm and asked that the District satisfy itself "as to the use" that the "agricultural building" would be put. They noted the letter received from John Smith protesting at the permission granted at Springfield Farm where it is claimed unauthorised use is being made of an agricultural barn.

They were incandescent with rage that the District had dismissed their objections to the plans at The Lodge hall Lane and have demanded that the Chief of Enforcement attend the next meeting to explain what his department is doing.

Cllr Lockley reported on the progress towards a Masterplan for the Quarries. The last meeting had been to discuss the Ecological Report and whilst there were no objections to survey done by the Consultants the group had reservations about the language used and the assumption throughout the report that development on particular parts of the site would go ahead.

The next meeting would look at the transport impacts on our area and Cllr Stevens read out a briefing paper from the County on the likelihood of a freight station materialising in the short to medium term.

Street Improvements - Tim Lockley is still trying to get approval for the Parish to standardise the painting of the "street furniture." Quotes are being sort for the replacement bus shelter and the welcome news was received that several village streets will be "top dressed" in the first week in June. Cllr Stevens was pleased to announce that the County had put an extra £2 million in the budget this year for road repairs and £40,000 for small but exceptional works.

Cllr Lockley wants the Parish to undertake a survey of the storm drains to try to alleviate the persistent flooding in certain parts of the village.

Concessionary Travel would continue to be funded this year by the Parish but as A & M Cars has stopped its taxi service and there is now Countywide Free Travel for OAPs and qualifying disabled persons there will be a review.

Car Park - The Alligator Teeth sign has disappeared and Cllr Kevin suggested its replacement might have to be "wired up to the mains" to prevent its theft!

Agenda For The Next Four Years

Thank you for re-electing me as your District Councillor on 4th May. While I was canvassing I was encouraged by the friendly reception everywhere on the doorstep. But to stop me getting carried away, I recognise that 58% of a low turnout actually represents only a quarter of the electorate. I hope that everything I am able to do in the next 4 years will be with all residents in mind. In the run-up to the Election I visited every home in the 4 villages. If you were out at the time, and if I didn't manage to call back, I'm sorry. If there was something you wanted to discuss with me, you still can:- please use the contact details below.

On the doorstep there were clearly five big issues, which I hope will be our agenda in the next four years: -

1 - Development of the Bishops Bowl Lakes site (or "the Harbury Estate")

The Masterplan consultation process is going ahead, slowly perhaps but along sound guidelines. The Parish Councils of Bishops Itchington and Harbury are well represented in the process, and there is an impressive degree of co-operation between them. I am hopeful that a result of lasting benefit to the local community can be achieved.

2 - The B4451

It's clear that the communities of Bishops Itchington and Deppers Bridge already suffer levels of heavy goods traffic that are close to

intolerable. Most of it need not and should not be there, but what can we do about it? Your comments will be welcome!

3 - Housing

We must create more opportunities for people with local connections to live in our villages. Again, I would welcome your suggestions. At the same time I shall be giving my full support to the SDC review of Housing List allocation points, and to community efforts such as Harbury's initiative to release local land for local housing needs.

4 - Planning/Enforcement

Sadly, some recent decisions have caused deep disappointment for the residents and/or Parish Council, almost resulting in a feeling of 'Them and Us'. I want to work to restore the much-needed mutual respect between the SDC Planning / Enforcement departments and the residents, but it won't be easy. Again, any suggestions will be welcome!

5 - Young People

We all agree we must try to create more activities for our young people, but how? It probably means all of us being prepared to consider giving something of our resources and/or time. I shall give my full support to any local efforts that have our young people at heart.

That will be my agenda. I hope it's yours, too?

In the new Council, two of the Committees I shall be on are:

Environmental Sustainability (What is the environmental impact of everything that we do at SDC and in the District? What can we do to lessen it?) and **Area Offices Scrutiny** (How do the SDC Area Offices in eg. Southam serve their communities? Can it be improved?)

Again, if you have comments and/or suggestions on these topics I'll be glad to hear them.

But in my month-long "walkabout", the biggest thing I learned (as if I didn't know it already) was the lovely people I have the privilege to represent! Concessionary Travel Scheme 2006

For the past 10 years, the Parish Council has run a concessionary travel scheme that issued £15 of tokens to all residents aged 60+. This scheme has now been largely superseded by the Government backed plans to issue bus passes to all those of retirement age (60+). The Parish tokens have previously also been valid for taxi journeys on A & M Cars but this service has now been discontinued. Because of this the Parish Council is currently researching ways in which the scheme could possibly be continued or adapted and hopes to publish the results of this shortly. In the meantime, there will be no concessionary travel forms issued in June as usual. Any residents who have particular issues of disability and/or difficulty in accessing transport may be interested to find out more about the **"Community Links"** scheme run

by Stratford District Council. This enables people to be picked up from their door and travel to set destinations between 9am and 3pm weekdays for a small charge. To find out more please contact Chris Mitchell on 01789-260108. Two other schemes which may be of interest are:

The Volunteer Centre Medical Journey Scheme for doctor, dentist, day centre and hospital related appointments. Contact Clarissa Roberts on 01789-296344.

The Back & 4th Transport scheme which hires out a multi-purpose vehicle with wheelchair access and minibuses with drivers to social and community groups or individuals. Contact: 01789 471595.

Housing Needs Survey

The Housing Needs Survey that some people have received has indeed been sent out by consultants for Follett Property Holdings who are seeking to develop the quarries area for industry, distribution, recreation, a rail station and housing.

The survey was not sanctioned by Stratford District or by the Parish Council who were as surprised as you were to receive it. Harbury has already undertaken a robust Housing Needs Survey which received a good response rate and the Parish Council has been working towards securing land suitable for providing the homes the village needs. You will remember that the Review Group held a public exhibition where people were able to indicate the most suitable sites.

Masterplan

Work is ongoing to produce a Masterplan for the Quarries site that would mitigate the worst effects of the potential development there. It is a huge scheme and would have a devastating impact on the village, the surrounding roads and the local wildlife, but the site is deemed capable of development.

Outing To Fairford

On a more pleasant note, we had a lovely trip to Fairford with our leader John Hancock who organised a guided tour of the church and then struck out into the countryside with the more intrepid and appropriately dressed party members.

Fairford Church has miraculously preserved and conserved Mediaeval stained and painted glass in glorious glowing colours. There are bible stories and the east window depicting the last judgement where souls are saved or sent to hell. Hell, I have to say looked much more interesting than heaven!

Last reminder for the bulb orders as they have to be in soon.



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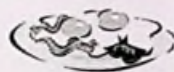

One of the highlights this month was taking our children to see the Reception Class assembly which was all about water. It was lovely to see how last year's nursery children had grown in confidence proudly acting out the story of Noah's Ark. Thank you to Miss Maher for inviting us along.

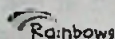
numbers will be drawn out, each winning £50. The draws will be held at each end of term assembly, the Summer Fayre and one other event to be decided annually.

Writing this on May 23rd, the weather is cool after heavy rain and

more is forecast. Perhaps we will have a warmer June and an explosion of insect life as it's been a slow start to summer. Those who have visited Draycote Meadows (OS sheet 140 Ref 449706) as mentioned in last month's article will have seen the profusion of Green-veined Orchids. (The older name of Green Winged Orchid seems more apt.) Now, they are past their best, overtaken by the taller grasses. Cowslips have given way to Buttercups. All three common species of the latter can be seen at the Draycote Reserve with the descriptive names, Meadow, Bulbous and Creeping. They require different environments in which to thrive, which goes to show how the terrain can vary in just two meadows. Looking from certain directions, the Orchids appear to run in stripes. This is because they prefer the slightly drier conditions along the top of the ridge and furrow. I went on the morning of a rare cloudless May Day. The sun showed up the colours to perfection and male Orange Tip butterflies were on the wing.

This week (22nd May), I returned with my U3A Naturalists' Group, to be led round the Reserve and shown some of the less visible resident species. There are several patches of Adder's Tongue Fern. The initial single frond divides to form an oval 'leaf' encasing a tongue-like spike which carries the spores. Once, this appearance made people believe the plant was a cure for snake-bite. We were also shown the strange looking Moonwort, which here is at the southern edge of its range. I find it difficult to describe this plant, but to save me the effort; it is

featured in a drawing on the board at the entrance to the Reserve.

The sun was not in evidence on this last visit and we trudged round in heavy rain, swathed in appropriate gear, with umbrellas sprouting from our 'crocodile'. We were lucky enough to see two butterflies - an Orange Tip and a Green-Veined White, sheltering with wings tightly closed, clinging to the stem of a Lady's Smock plant. On the wing, the male Orange Tip is easily seen by predators, but the colour is a warning that the insect is distasteful. (It contains large amounts of bitter mustard oils accumulated from food plants during the caterpillar stage.) At rest, the insect relies on camouflage; with its wings closed the surfaces appear delicately mossed with green, although this is an illusion created by an intricate mixture of black and yellow scales. We were shown the orange egg of the butterfly attached to the underside of a Lady's Smock flower. Only one egg is laid per plant. If two are present, they have come from separate females. The first caterpillar to hatch has no qualms about gobbling up its cousin when it hatches in turn.

The highlight of my month was a trip organised by Brian Hewins. His friend of many years is an expert at finding bird's nests. Brian and I together with Ken Eaves drove over to Stratford to meet John Brook, the birdman, and go on a journey of discovery. He took us to a wood south of Aston Cantlow where he has put up nesting boxes, fifty or more, and has been monitoring them for many years. We stopped en route to be shown a Red-legged Partridge nest on the edge of another wood. This contained thirteen perfectly camouflaged eggs of a brownish speckled hue. Near Billesley, we were shown the yellow flowers of Wild Tulip growing in the roadside verge - a first for me. The 4th of May was glorious and, at the wood itself, we had a magical time. Many of the boxes checked contained Great Tits. These would flatten themselves on the nest with wings spread out and some gave out a warning sound. I would best describe this as like a snake hissing. John was used to this but it made the rest of us start when taking a peek; quite a good survival strategy. One Great Tit had a nest partly constructed of purple wool, really psychedelic. Box 311 (they are all meticulously numbered,) contained a nest with ten Blue Tit's eggs. We were also given a lesson in observation; stand still and be prepared to wait and watch. A bird would fly in and out, but cunningly move along its bush or bramble before emerging. With patience, a nest location would be revealed. In this way, we were shown a Chiff-Chaff's nest with seven cream coloured eggs, a Dunnock (Hedge Sparrow) nest, with three brilliant blue eggs, in a bramble bush, and a Wren's nest.

There were many more. The wood was a medley of spring flowers with Wood Anemone, Primrose, Violet and Early Purple Orchid. A pond held hundreds of tadpoles, while several bird boxes had been taken over by wasps. Their empty nests were removed to make way for more birds. As wasps make a new nest each year, this was not the dilemma it might seem. One tree had as many as six Woodpeckers' nesting holes. They laboriously hack out a new hole every year. Look at the base of the tree for new chippings to see if there is a resident. Outside the wood, in a roadside Blackthorn thicket, we were shown several Long-tailed Tit nests. Then, it was off to the King's Head at Aston Cantlow for a pint and a sandwich. Many thanks to John for a great day out.

It was back to rain on our annual narrow boat weekend with a group of friends. It was great fun, but we missed the sun. Swans nesting, lines of fluffy ducklings following Mum, and Herons patrolling their patch of canal bank were to be seen. We found a tall white flower with thick leaves growing in a marshy place and eventually identified it as Large Bittercress. The deciding factor was its peppery taste confirmed by one member of the party. Have a good summer with plenty of notable natural moments.

Spirit of Harbury Award – 2006

When Joyce Windsor was presented with the Spirit of Harbury shield by Andrew Hunt at a recent coffee morning in the Tom Hauley room, she modestly confessed that she felt extremely humble in accepting the award, as many of the achievements cited in recommendations for her award had involved the efforts of many public spirited Harbury residents in 'following up' some of her fund-raising ideas. Over the years, however, Joyce has been more than just the 'brain-child' of the most successful events which feature in the annual calendar in our village, as she has continued to support many events in her own unassuming way. It would be difficult to estimate the amount of money which has been raised by various organisations, but a conservative estimate would put the figure in several hundred thousand pounds – an incredible feat for a community of approximately 3,000.

It will probably come as no surprise to those who know them, to learn that Joyce and Harry met in a church tower when Joyce was learning the challenging art of campanology and Harry, a member of the Guild of Ringers, turned up to give the benefit of his experience. They are both Warwickshire 'born and bred', as Joyce hails from Shrewley, whilst Harry was born in Long Itchington. After their meeting 'on high', they married in 1961 and for the first 4 years they lived in Wolvey, North Warwickshire where both of their children, Christopher (1962) and Ann (1964) were born. Harry had trained at B.T.H. (British Thompson Houston) in Rugby, but was transferred to Leicestershire, so at the start of their married life, they found a property in their home County, as close to Harry's workplace, as possible. When B.T.H. became part of G.E.C. they eventually moved into Park Lane, Harbury in 1967 after a brief stay in Burton Hastings for 2 years. Both of their children went to Harbury School and subsequently Christopher went to Warwick School, whilst Ann went to Kingsley school in Leamington. Christopher went on to Sheffield Polytechnic where he took a degree in Business Studies and he has stayed on in the City, whilst daughter Ann, moved to Huntingdon after her marriage. There are 5 'Windsor' grandchildren, as Christopher has a son and a daughter, whilst Ann has 3 boys.

Ever since their arrival in the village they have had a close association with Harbury church, as both joined the Parochial Church Council and Harry took on the role of Tower Captain in charge of the bell-ringing team. Soon after joining the P.C.C., it was suggested that a social event was needed to which all residents of the village could be invited. Joyce's suggestion to the small social committee, which was all female, apart from Valentine DuBuisson, led to the first ever Bonfire Party. They conservatively expected that about 100 people would attend to see the fireworks and enjoy the hot dogs, soup, crisps and a drink, but the numbers swelled beyond their expectations. The Bonfire Party is still one of the main 'get-togethers' for village families and over 700 people regularly attend the spectacular display followed by the welcoming hot food in the Village Hall.

In 1976, the P.C.C. identified that additional funds were needed for repairs to the Church and Joyce, together with Pam Clarke conceived the idea of a Garden Walkabout. If there were many villages which had offered this attraction before this time, they hadn't generated quite as much interest as the Harbury walkabout, which was widely reported in local and regional papers and drew interest for its innovative approach to fund-raising on B.B.C. Midlands Radio. From the

beginning, the Walkabout was an immediate success, as 20 homeowners opened their gardens for inspection and admiration from visitors across the region. Just to add the final touches to the money spinning venture, Pam and Joyce produced a village recipe book, entitled 'What shall we eat today', which sold over 1,000 copies. Joyce still retains a much-used copy and marvels at the accomplishment of the task in the days before computers and photocopiers, as the book went to press using an ancient typewriter and a hand-turned printing machine. There were one or two addenda, including a note that a Queen's Pudding only required 2 eggs, not the 22 as shown in the recipe! In 1978 when the next Walkabout was offered, a celebrated visitor was Norman Painting of 'The Archers', who joined the throngs wandering round the village on a sunny afternoon. By now, the Walkabout was such an overwhelming success that it needed more than two very hard-working church committee members and at this point, the Horticultural Society took on the task of organising the well-established event.

Since Joyce had already come up with two good ideas to raise funds for the Church, it didn't take too long for her to be asked to think up another scheme, which would add to the social life of the village, as well as raising much needed money for 'Church facilities'. In the first instance, the need for toilets and a space for social events was identified and Joyce started the first of the Coffee Mornings in the Wight School with a few members of the Church committee. For two years, they provided the teas/ coffees/cakes and home-made jams and chutneys, which are still a familiar part of the offerings at a typical morning's social gathering. In the midst of all this fund-raising activity, the well known 'keeper of the clock', Tom Hauley left a significant bequest to the Church which enabled the construction of the attractive facility behind the Church, which bears his name. As with the previous two ventures Joyce had 'dreamed up', the scheme she started, is still a weekly contributor to fund-raising, but nowadays, it is used to generate cash for many organisations within the village, as well as one or two local charities in Southam.

Nowadays, there is a rota of over 60 groups who have willing helpers anxious to provide a service to the community on a weekly basis, as well as generating money for their individual good causes. When it is considered that the average profit / week varies between £100 and £200+, it doesn't take a mathematical genius to work out that for this initiative alone, Joyce's brainwave has generated in the region of £150K - £300K (a calculator helps though!)

Just when you think that 3 bright ideas are probably a very special contribution to the life of the Church and the village, Joyce mentions the instigation of the ROC Fund for the Roof, Organ and Clock and again a small group of committed workers produce a lunch time feast once a month in the Tom Hauley room with a choice of soup, main course and dessert – all for a very modest sum. The aim was to raise £20K for much needed R.O.C. repairs in 12 months but Joyce also mentions that a recent church request to the community for help raised a considerable sum in support of All Saints Church and for other diocesan needs. Whilst many parishes struggle to find the upkeep for their church buildings, Harbury is fortunate to have a thriving church community and many people willing to contribute to the continued success of the church as a vital focus for village life.

Whilst the Spirit of Harbury award has been presented to Joyce, Harry's contribution to church life has not been overlooked and in 1994, they were invited to Buckingham Palace with their son and daughter when Harry was awarded an M.B.E. for his services to the Guild of Bellringers for over 5 decades. If Joyce wanted to learn the art of bell-ringing, which brought the couple together in the first place, then Harry has turned his interest into an unbelievably scientific and technical study of the effects of 'pulling the ropes' and 'vibrating the bells'. He has already had one treatise on the subject published, written jointly with Don Robinson, a former lecturer at the Lanchester

Polytechnic (now Coventry University) who used to live in Southam. The book includes incredibly complex mathematical formulae, graphs and diagrams and one brief paragraph from the book demonstrates the depth of understanding, which Harry has developed as a result of his engineering experience. "The behaviour of the tower may be modelled by using an electrical analogue. Bearing in mind that the

tower can be deflected by applying a static force, an approximate electrical representation may comprise a series tuned circuit. In line with this, the bell is a generator, which must have a high imaginary output impedance to correspond with the absence of static deflection when the bell is not rotating – i.e. a zero frequency no matter where the bell is halted." I got the definite feeling that if the resonance of a bell was greater than the surrounding structures could support, then a tower may start to sway with the vibrations, which could cause a problem!! It may be pertinent to consider that we have a renowned expert in the village next time you hear the church bells ringing, so we should be saved from any damage to Harbury's Church Tower. Harry has his own range of equipment, so that if he is asked to undertake a study of resonance in towers, he can record all the necessary information with the help of William Jones, a young mechanical engineer from the village. He has just undertaken his second project, again with Don, his mathematical collaborator and the 'copy' is ready to go to press in the very near future.

In case any reader thinks that Joyce and Harry haven't between them committed a huge amount of time to the Church and its needs, Joyce mentions that they were both part of a group willing volunteers who decorated the entire Vicarage after Father Mackley left and before Canon Rowe took office. Although Joyce has passed on many of her original ideas for others to pursue, she still helps with the Saturday lunches and sings with the Augmented Choir, which combines members from the two churches in the parish – Harbury and Ladbroke. She enjoys cooking and gardening and is still a 'regular' on the Harbury Garden Walkabout programme. As she says, both she and Harry are country people at heart and they enjoy country pursuits – in between supporting the church in their own inimitable ways. Who could ever imagine that the 'everyday happenings of village folk' with which we are all familiar, could be attributable to two such public spirited members of our community.

The spirit of Harbury award presented by Andrew in memory of his father, John Hunt, a former chairman of Harbury's Parish Council is richly deserved by Joyce, the fourth recipient of the shield, who has created so much pleasure for many people in the village through her vision and imagination.

Congratulations to Joyce for the recognition she so richly deserves.

Folk Music on your doorstep

Whether you've lived in Warwickshire for a couple of years or for most of your life, it is most likely that around this time of year you've heard about Warwick Folk Festival. Warwick is a nationally renowned traditional and contemporary folk music and dance festival which is guaranteed to bring folk music fans from all over the country.

This year, the 27th festival is being held between the 21st and 23rd of July, and during that time the town will be home to many major artists such as the Leamington chart-toppers Nizlopi, and the much-loved

Scottish artists, the Battlefield Band and Dougie Maclean. There will also be a wide selection of local artists and groups, like Harbury's own Hereburgh Morris and folk singers DananSooz (otherwise known as Dan and Suzie Bones).

Having attended this festival since I was a child, I can say that there is no chance you will spend the weekend bored. There is constant entertainment for both adults and children, whether it is staying in the marquee on the campsite located at Warwick Boys School, or going to one of the free music or song sessions in the town centre of Warwick. Even if the whole weekend doesn't appeal to you, day tickets and some single events tickets are available at the box office.

The organisation of the Festival is already well supported by Harbury Folk Club and Hereburgh Morris. Two committee members are local residents and a number of Harbury residents help out during the weekend by performing stewarding duties. Even the festival box office is run from Harbury.

This year, as a pre-festival treat, on the 20th of July, Warwick Boys School and Warwick Folk Festival will be host to Joe O'Donnell's 'Gaodhal's Vision', the World Premiere performance of this recently re-released cult folk music work. The concert will feature The Celtic Vision Orchestra - the musical talents of Warwick Boys School - under the direction of Director of Music, Mr. Trevor G. Barr.

Another excellent reason to support the Festival is that in recent years it has grown large enough to apply for significant funding to promote and develop Folk Music and Performance within the local community. The Festival has already run successful education programmes in primary and secondary schools as a result of grants from organisations like Warwick School's King Henry VIII trust. But these programmes aren't just for children. This year, pre-festival workshops such as Clog Dancing, English Traditional Songs, and a 'Singing Safari' are being held for anyone interested in having a go, and no experience is required, so it's a good time to start and have a good time learning something new.

Memories of Elm Trees

Apparently my recent note about the crow did not ring with approval. Raised in the rural way of life, I would hope that I know a crow from a rook. If not I've probably been rooked!

The poor old carrion is being pursued and has suffered enough; the few that are still around should be left in peace. You never miss it till it's gone!

How many villagers remember a row of fine large Elm trees, which used to grow within the boundary hedge in Mill Street, where the houses are now? Beyond the hedge was pasture land and a buttercup meadow where cattle and horses grazed. There was a central hedge, which separated the two fields and elms grew along that hedgerow as well. Dark Lane also had elms growing along it, hence the name.

Of course today, the land is a housing estate shared with Harbury Combined C of E Primary School. At the lower end of Mill Street was an orchard. The row of mature large Elms was felled in 1946 against the landowner's wishes to help with the re-construction after the war. Children, myself included, came to watch the event take place over a period of days, we felt sad at this. The felling began like this; a steel cable was attached to the tree at a height of almost twenty feet, this in turn was fitted to a winch on a special caterpillar tractor for the purpose of tree felling. A man with an axe worked first at the tree trunk. Then two men took over using a two handle cross cut saw. It was hard graft no chain saw in those times. They sawed through tree trunk for some time and when they judged they had sawn enough they shouted 'stand clear'. The tractor's winch began to wind the cable in and the tractor's rear forks dug into ground to take the strain. Suddenly, a crack rang out then a whump as tree hit the ground; a cheer was heard from the children.

Only the trunk of Elm was used for timber. The timber very good wood with a lovely grain to it, a pleasure to work with. Some tradesmen thought it was superior to top Oak for certain jobs. It could withstand damp conditions, idea for canal lock gates or for coffins.

Serving as an apprentice in the fifty's, I spent some time in an old fashioned carpenters shop. Together with one other apprentice, we both assisted a skilled carpenter; he was an excellent teacher.

Working in the shop, it could take around twenty hours work to make and complete a coffin, with a nice polished outer surface. The shoulders on a coffin could be tricky and required careful handling in forming the angles without the wood surface being cracked or broken. If a coffin was intended for burial the inside joints would usually be sealed with molten pitch.

The sawn Elm boards were roughly 7/8" thick x 9 3/4" wide and just over 6' in length. They were stored with Oak, in open sheds with space between each board, for air circulation.

There was nothing quite like the smell from freshly sawn or hand planed timber. For me it knocks modern chipboard into a 'cocked hat' in my opinion.
