

Editorial


The good news for both Harbury and Ladbroke is that there will be a resident Priest based in Harbury. We look forward to confirmation of an appointment in due course.

The afternoon meeting was addressed by Brenda Moss, talking about the season of Lent. The name simply comes from an Anglo-Saxon word meaning to lengthen – as the days draw out – but for Christians it is a time when we remember Jesus' time in the wilderness. In the early church, new converts spent the time in seclusion, learning and praying before public confession and baptism at Easter. Nowadays, many of us "give up" something as a symbol that our faith has freed us from dependency on fleeting comforts; we try to spend more time on prayer and Bible reading as we prepare to greet His resurrection at Easter.

The evening meeting had us battling with a quiz set by our speaker Julie Cartwright. It was her way of showing us some of the facets of her work as a chaplain at St Michaels Hospital, Warwick. I think we all realised how much more there is to her work than we knew. The first recorded hospitals were in monasteries, where they cared for ill and infirm people who came to shrines to pray for healing, so there has always been a sense in which faith has a major part to play in the total well being of a person. There are now 400 full-time Primary Care Trust chaplains in the whole country, obviously not nearly enough to go around, so there is a great dependency on local clergy who also go in.

Bishops Lake Bowl is going to be a hot topic for the rest of this year at least. The present issue is the owner's proposal for housing based, they say, on a shortage in this area. Ladbroke were urged to have a housing needs survey carried out (free of charge by Warwickshire Rural Community Council) to check whether this is the case. This would also tie in with the Parish Plan which moves slowly on; recommendations from the Plan survey and consultation are to be sent to Parish Councillors before their next meeting.

There is a fence across the village end of Windmill Lane and the land owner has agreed in principle that it can be removed if this can be done safely to allow horses and pedestrians to pass. There are other issues, such as maintenance and signage, to be resolved with the owner and County Council, but we may yet see the end of the lane re-opened.

Our plague of pot holes has been cured for the present by patching but the Parish Council are keen to get the road near the church repaired and are much encouraged by the county's increased budget for roads. Cllr Bob Stevens explained that the restriction of heavy traffic on the railway bridge near the Great Western is yet to be resolved. He also told us that there is to be a new speed management

policy for the roads covering every aspect of speeding. Meanwhile Southam Police have bought a speed gun – "good news for some, bad for others" as PC Hill succinctly put it.

We live in one of the least crime-affected wards in a low crime part of Britain, according to Cllr Chris Williams. Nonetheless, nearby Stockton was targeted recently by a professional gang from Birmingham and there have been more thefts from the vulnerable, so we should not be complacent and PC Hill warned us that most burglaries are carried out in the day time, not at night.

Planning applications have been granted for Newhouse Farm (felling trees) and for 7, Hedges Close (extension and porch). The appeal for development west of Kineton Road in Southam Industrial Estate has been allowed. The Parish Council accepted a new application for 'horsiculture' and associated buildings on agricultural land off the B4451 near Deppers Bridge but expressed concern lest there be a subsequent intention to develop this land for housing.

Cllr Jim Clews asked whether there was any danger of the district deciding to amalgamate smaller parishes such as Ladbroke, since he had received emails suggesting this. Cllr Williams assured him that Stratford had no power to do any such thing; if parishes wished to combine, then the district could provide the channels for them to do so.

Important news for those who are disabled or have special need and are unable to get to a bus route. Stratford District's Community Links transport scheme can provide specially adapted transport at £1 per trip for those who: have a genuine need for local transport, cannot access public transport because of mobility problems and live in a rural isolated location with no other form of transport available. Phone 01789 264491 for more details.

Finally, a summary of other issues. The parish may yet get a website — the Clerk has sent in the paperwork and we all hold our breath for a decision. The Millennium Green Committee have applied for planning permission for additional play equipment. The Parish Council will ask the district Dog Warden to speak to the owners of dogs that have been seen fouling the Millennium Green. The Village Hall Committee, still without a chairperson, is persevering with their development plans. They were helped along with a cheque from the Parish Council for capital expenditure; their Treasurer left the meeting with a cheque in her hand and a beam on her face.


mole underneath", adding "I am a lonely animal so there is no collective word."

A select band of seven Councillors rattled through the agenda, driven by Chairman Kevin Biddle's determination to beat the 9.27pm record achieved by Cllr Lockley. He made it by eight minutes!

There being no Police presence, it was down to Tim Lockley to report that there had been two vehicles taken and some stone garden ornaments stolen. Much of the properties report. consisted of repairs and cleaning up after vandalism. There is a worrying increase in youths smashing bottles round the Play Equipment and on the grass. The Parish Council's contractor spends a dood deal of time painstakingly picking up the glass.



Repaired verges in Vicarage Lane

There have been complaints about children breaking down the hedge on the eastern side of the Playing Fields. Residents will be asked to cut back hedges which are obstructing the footway.

The Clerk reported that holes and ruts in the Playing Fields had been filled in. Binswood End Green, the Pound and Vicarage Lane verges had been repaired. The water was now flowing along the ditch alongside the Playing Fields and the contractor had been paid.

£200,000 of Lottery money available for Children's Play - Stratford District Council at last announced it will consult Parish Councils on the distribution of this windfall and produce a Children's Play Strategy as it is obliged to do.

Southam College - Clerk Nicola Thompson reported the College had applied to be allowed an intake of 221 pupils per year but were refused. They will appeal as there are 276 applicants and the College has room for 240 of them.

Rail Bridge in Deppers - More meetings are taking place about the safety improvements to the bridge. The latest suggestion is for a narrowed bridge with pedestrian walkway but no traffic lights.

PLANNING - Stratford District granted permission with conditions for a rear extension at 14 Park Lane and 9 Farm Street and permission for tree works at 1 Crown Street, Denys Close, Temple End, and felling at 8 & 25 Farm Street and the removal of a hedgerow at the end of Burnside, Deppers Bridge.

The Parish Council made no representations on extensions at Meadow Bank, Hall Lane; 11a Constance Drive; 7 The Beeches and 9 Neales Close; treework at Pool Yard, Temple End, Harbury House, and 16 Farm Street, and change of use to residential at 2 Chapel Street.

The Parish made representations about the unsuitability of the B4451 for HGV's on an outline planning permission at the Kineton Industrial Estate, on the extension to West End Cottage; they expressed concerns about parking and asked the District to ensure that the listed Yew Tree was protected from damage. Stratford refused permission for a garage at 28 Binswood End.

Applications were withdrawn for a wind turbine at 10 Greenhill Farm, tree felling at Harbury House and for widening the access at the Rugby Club.

Follett Properties had amended the application at the Quarries to exclude road improvements to the east of the B4451.

The Enforcement Officer would be asked to look into possible planning breaches at Harbury Croft and Old Coopers.

Traffic Management - There is still no progress on this and the Parish Council is to look again at the idea of making Church Street One Way and will investigate the possibility with County Highways. They have received a grant from "Vision for Southam" to pay for the painting of the street "furniture".

Dog Fouling - Councillors complained this was as bad as ever. They reported a large number of repairs including potholes, some of which have been a problem for many months. Cllr Thompson suggested the Councillors should undertake another survey of the roads and paths.

County Councillor Bob Stevens promised that some of our streets were on the list for repair this year and that the County had voted money for Village Hall Energy Audit Grants.

Lottery Grant - Clir Mancell is still trying to use up the money for the Council's website before April 1st, as Stratford District has not provided the training and hardware promised. The Clerk will get some Accountancy Software and the means will be provided for Clir Thornley to go on line at last.

Chairman's Report was given by Ed Wilson because Chairman Alan Lord was away on business.

The aims of the Society remained to promote an interest in the history of the village, to monitor planning matters and educate members on planning and conservation as well as undertaking more practical

projects such as producing the Village Design Statement and Parish Review.

Linda Ridgley reminded members that the Society monitored planning applications and sought to mitigate any adverse impact on the community. The current proposal by Folletts for a massive development at the Quarries was a case in point.

Elections - There was spontaneous applause when Ed Wilson announced that John Hancock had agreed to be nominated as Chairman, replacing Alan Lord who was stepping down.

WELLESBOURNE'S CHEDHAM'S YARD PROJECT - BBC RESTORATION WINNER 2006

Wellesbourne's Councillor Close gave a professional and inspiring account of Chedham's Yard which, when the Council first saw it, it was overgrown with vegetation. It looked like the owner had gone out for lunch and never returned, which was more or less what had happened in the late 1960's when Bill Chedham, the seventh generation to work there, finally left the building - unlocked. The buildings had an earth floor, and all the tools from the Wheelwright's shop and the Smithy were still in place. Bill Chedham did not want it to fall to developers and agreed a sum of just £10,000 for the Parish Council to purchase this site in the middle of the village.

They set up a Working Party with a vision to preserve as far as practical the Yard's existing atmosphere. The Council hired consultants to help them organise and implement this vision and in six months produced a "Conservation Statement" giving an historical record of the Yard in 2002 so that even if it were lost there would be documentation for reference.

It was decided that the Yard's re-use for traditional crafts and as an educational resource would make it an active heritage centre and maintain its unique charm. They definitely wanted to keep the ramshackle nature of the Yard. But it needed money management and volunteers.

The Parish Council had already spent £60,000 on it and estimated it would cost a million pounds to achieve their aims. They considered mothballing the Yard until they had secured the money. However, in 2006 they spotted small advertisements from the BBC for restoration projects and so they applied and were accepted.

People were filmed and interviewed and at the regional heat in June they were amazed at the result of the TV voting. In September forty villagers went to Chichester for the Final.

As the teams were interviewed the Yard was running at about 3rd or 4th. Then they interviewed Iris who is in her eighties and talked so enthusiastically about her interest in the Yard that the votes rocketed.

The group now has to apply for a project grant of £50,000 to work up a bid for the £1,000,000 Heritage Lottery money! The BBC money has been used to help stop the building falling down!

We will also be holding what is now an annual intra-club tournament on Sunday May 20th and details of this will follow.



The March meeting was a great success. Christine Dakin and her partner Philip who own and run Bridge Nurseries in Napton gave us good advice on maintaining colour in our gardens up to October and even November in some instances.

First of all she recommended structure with a selection of evergreens and grasses which can then be added to throughout the season. The colours and combination of rudbeckias, heleniums, salvias and cosmos was spectacular as shown on slides of the gardens at the nursery. Tall miscanthus grasses add movement and look good throughout the whole year. Penstemons are also good value plants and blend well with artemesias and other silver leaved plants. Do visit the nursery which demonstrates 10 years of very hard work. The plants for sale are excellent value and of course if you are a member of our Society a 10% discount is a bonus.

I have already mentioned the Walkabout and issued a plea for new gardens. I haven't had a response from anyone yet but now that nights are getting lighter maybe someone will look at their garden and be tempted. Please consider it, no need to have a pristine garden. We have some very talented gardeners in our village and are so lucky that they share their gardens with us, so don't be shy, talk to either Daphne or myself.

We are linking up with the Church for all catering this year for the Walkabout. So, lots of changes this year, it just makes so much sense for us both to get together for lunches and teas, more about this at our next meeting.

Nature Notes

Last month I mentioned the sizeable flock of starlings I saw spiralling in the evening sky on 3rd February. Of course, after the article had gone to the editors, a television programme related that one flock seen in this country was reckoned to consist of over a million birds. Several people came up to me after the magazine was issued to tell me they had seen large flocks of birds themselves. The starlings would have been disturbed, when roosting, by a predator, probably a Sparrow hawk

As I write (Tuesday 13th March), the weather is superb for the time of year, with blue skies and high pressure. There's plenty of water about as well, so plants and animals, which have been largely dormant, are making their presence felt. Today, coming back up the Fosseway from Bath, we saw plenty of Primroses in flower, Bluebell leaves were prominent, and a hedgerow of Hawthorn beginning to show green

leaves here and there. A male Brimstone butterfly was on the wing near Moreton-in-the-Marsh. At lunchtime I watched two male Brimstones flying in the back garden. This butterfly can be seen in almost every month of the year, the summer brood feeding late into October on nectar-rich flowers, particularly those of purple colouration such as Buddleia, Teasel, and Thistle. They hibernate after a few weeks, often beneath evergreen leaves such as Ivy or Holly. Warm winter days tempt them out of hibernation, but it is not until now that mating occurs. Males are butter yellow, while females are much paler and can be mistaken for a Large White when in flight. Its distribution in the British Isles matches that of its caterpillar's food plants, Purging and Alder Buckthorn. These shrubs are confined to the southern half of our islands, and thus the Brimstone is absent from Scotland and scarce in Northern England. Purging Buckthorn (Rhamnus cathartica) was given its name by Gerard - he of the famous Herbal. Analysis of the latrine pits of the Benedictine Abbey of St Albans in the 1920's revealed great numbers of Buckthorn seeds mixed with the fragments of cloth the monks used as lavatory paper. I'm indebted to Richard Mabey's Flora Britannica for this fascinating insight into herbal medicine. Alder Buckthorn prefers acid soils. Its wood, when burnt, produces charcoal reckoned to be the finest for making gunpowder, and hence was cultivated in wartime.

On our trip to Bath, I was tempted to climb out of the village of Weston, where the family live, to look for a pond or wet place on the springline. Diverting from the Cotswold Way, I came across a Community Woodland on Primrose Hill. Here, about 20 acres had been planted with a variety of broad-leaved trees. They were already above head height and attracting an under storey of flowering plants including Violet, Primrose, and Celandine. I thought maybe Harbury could create something like this. It would form both a wildlife haven and soak up some of the excess Carbon Dioxide we are emitting from our homes and cars. Tell me what you think.

I found a rather untidy pond, but perhaps that's what we need to learn - wildlife doesn't thrive in ordered, well manicured, tracts of land. I balanced from tuft to tuft across the soggy ground until I spied a grey glutinous mass. It was the first frogspawn I've seen this year. The eggs were beginning to develop, not just round black dots, but something like immature tadpoles. I walked down the hillside as the sun set in golden splendour across the Severn plain. The next day, on National Cycle Route 4 (this follows the route of an abandoned railway line from Bath to Bristol, criss-crossing the River Avon) with my

grandson Harry, we found a clump of White Violets, Wood Anemones, Primroses galore, and Celandine. Closer to home, there is a similar patch of White Violets growing on the edge of a ditch within 800 metres of Harbury village centre.

Next month's article should be rather different. Sharon and I are visiting Australia. One of the highlights should be a trek in the Flinders Ranges in South Australia with two Australian friends. It will be autumn there and if I can master the technology, I'll try to give you a flavour of nature down under. Make sure you get out if you can and enjoy the full panoply of our unfurling spring.



Village Hall Update

Any mention of 'green'; the environment and a 'reduced carbon footprint' are IN at the moment, so the sustainability of Harbury's proposals may find some favour in the right quarters.

The A.G.M of the Village Hall committee is on April 16th at 7.30pm and it is hoped that some 'new blood' can be recruited to provide much needed help in all aspects of the maintenance of the community's property. This year will see the retirement of two stalwarts of the committee who have provided unstinting service over many years. Bill Middleton joined the committee in 1984 as the Parish Council representative, whilst wife Peggie joined shortly afterwards. Bill has been the Treasurer for 19 years and Peggie has been the Chair of the committee for the last three years. There are not too many days in the year when the husband and wife team have not called in to the Hall, as Bill has checked the heating, lighting and the drains – as well as

any damage to the property, whilst Peggie has ensured that all the cleaning, general organisation and kitchen facilities are in good order for all the many hirers who regularly use the Hall. After, over 40 years of service between them, they are entitled to a well-earned rest from their labours, but they will be a very hard act to follow. For this reason alone, there are two places waiting to be filled on the Management Committee, which requires the selfless commitment of people who carry out the voluntary work on which the whole community depends. If anyone feels they would like to join the volunteers, their presence at the AGM will be much appreciated, as the Committee seeks to put the Hall on an excellent footing for the 21st Century through its modernisation proposals.

Nile Charity Cycle Ride

On Saturday 17th February, Dave Shuttleworth and Doug Freeman flew out from Heathrow to Cairo to join a charity cycle ride along the banks of the Nile. We were raising funds for the Alzheimer's Society, and had been training hard for the last 6 months to ensure that we would not only complete the ride but enjoy it too.

After spending the Sunday sight seeing in Cairo, we flew down to Luxor to join the boat which would be our accommodation for the week. The cycle ride started Monday midday from Esna, south of Luxor, and over the next 5 days we completed 250 miles.



We were up most mornings before 6am and started cycling around 7am. The shortest day ride was 27 miles, and the longest 76 miles. There were 47 cyclists including our "celebrity" Coleen Nolan.

On the first two days we cycled south along the west bank of the Nile from Esna to Aswan, and this included a long and hilly stretch through the desert. The third day we cycled up to the Aswan High Dam which holds back the massive 550km long reservoir Lake Nasser. On the last two days we returned first along the east bank and then the west bank of the Nile, finishing on the final afternoon by cycling up into the Valley of the Kings and then a final downhill 5km to the finishing line on the west bank of the Nile at Luxor.

It was an experience of a lifetime; great friendships were made, wonderful scenery and history, fine organisation, and some pretty hot weather. We understand that this cycle ride should raise around £150,000 for the Alzheimer's Society. We have raised over £2,000 each, and would like to thank all those in Harbury who donated so generously.

If you would like we can also bake cakes and biscuits for staff rooms, offices, and other work places or just for yourself. Prices may vary.



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

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
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
