

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
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
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A very lively presentation, based on the story of the Prodigal Son, engaged the congregation in laughter and thought. Thank you to all who took part.


Mrs Travis asked the group if they thought we could feed a football crowd using the five loaves and two fishes she had in her basket?


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#### Ladbroke Church News

Matters Arising – Following a letter sent by the Ladbroke Council to the Stratford District Council requesting regular updates on progress regarding Bishop Lake Bowls; it appears that plans are going forward in February regarding building development.

The Ladbroke Parish Council website should be granted soon. The repairs to the road from Old Barn Farm drive to the church are in the five-year plan.

Flooding at the corner by Garden Cottage was brought to the attention of the Council.

Work to clear the brook going through the village and Ladbroke Hall is almost complete, just another two days to finish. It was thought that the work already completed had prevented flooding (as of 1998) during the recent heavy rains.

Police Report – P.C Nigel Hill from Harbury deputising for P.C Joy had nothing to report.

Planning Applications – The work at Archer's Rest was being monitored by the District Council. A new access to the property has been agreed but the original opening must be closed.

Permission for private stabling on the Kineton Road below Deppers Bridge has been granted.

Traffic Lights at the railway bridge turning from Bishops Itchington and Deppers Bridge – following a heated debate at the meeting held in the Railway Inn in December, the issue has been deferred until another meeting in March. There is a possibility that the area committee will give the go ahead now – especially as the traffic in the winter is less than during the summer.

#### County Councillor's Report

The Budget 2007 – The council tax will rise by 4.8%. Warwick Council will debate the Budget on 4<sup>th</sup> February. There is no more money for the ageing population, but Warwickshire is coping. No closure of residential homes is anticipated in the next two years.

The Ambulance Service – is very "upbeat". Services will be maintained even though there has been some amalgamation.

Southam College has 240 pupils in the sixth form – glowing reports.

The footpath is to be extended in the village to include the entrance to the Millennium Green.


Rural areas are much better than urban areas at using their recycling bins and boxes. Although in some areas cardboard is collected separately – it still goes to land-fill sites.

The Warwickshire councillor's surgeries are a success. Help has been given with planning applications. Residential building in this area over the next five years will be 15,000 new homes, 3,500 a year. Most of these will be in the Rugby area. For every 100 houses built, 35 must be social housing – (consultation on this building is in 2009!)

The County and District councils are to discuss areas where they duplicate their work to cut costs.

Our precept for the coming year is unchanged from 2006.

Barn conversions will not be allowed unless they are part of a settlement or for workers cottages.

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
#### Ladbroke Millennium Green Quiz Night

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#### Harbury Parish Council

Councillor Biddle had obviously noted the size of the agenda, and started the meeting by saying 'Let's crack on'. They did, at a gallop, which had your correspondent, trying to take notes, somewhat sore in the wrist by 10.30pm.

Apologies were received from PC Nigel Hill, but he had sent along Police Community Support Officer Anita Reading.

Mike Bloxham used the public participation slot to voice his complaint that his gate post had been repeatedly damaged by a large tractor and trailer that was mounting the pavement. PCSO Reading offered to mediate between him and the owner.

Declarations of interest were expressed by nearly all Councillors. Councillor Lockley commented that the rules on declaration as they stood meant that any councillor, interested in the life of the village, would have to declare an interest. County Councillor Stevens, who was present along with District Councillors Patrick and Dally, declared that a common sense approach should apply. Unless there was a pecuniary interest, councillors should not absent themselves, but listen to the arguments, give a view, but not vote on an issue in which they were personally involved. Laughter erupted when Councillor Thornley said 'We all know that the law is an ass'. She apologised to the PCSO who graciously accepted.

Councillors were informed that we now have 2 PCSO's based at Southam. PCSO Reading reported a spate of thefts of satellite navigation systems from Harbury cars and that a suspect had been arrested. She stressed that this equipment should be removed when the vehicle is parked and that the police have cards to leave on the windscreen.

It was reported that Southam College has applied to raise its entry number in September and this received general support. The school was congratulated on its performance in the league tables.

Councillor Thornley reported on progress with plans to improve the Village Hall. Drawings would be ready for the Lottery grant application in March. An Eco-build construction would be the main plank of the bid.

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Matters arising led to a long discussion on plans for Harbury Station Bridge led by Councillor Van Spall. Strong opinions were voiced and Mr Malin represented the views of Deppers Bridge Residents' Group. They strongly oppose the County Council's plan to install traffic lights and want a weight restriction on vehicles using the B4451. Apparently, strengthening the bridge is not an option that is financially viable. Councillor Van Spall asked for financial support and access to the Clerk's time for the resident's group to campaign on this issue. Councillor Mancell pointed out this would blur the edges between the Council and an independent group. Councillor Hancock said 'We would be on thin ice'. It was agreed to form a sub-group of Councillors Van Spall, Biddle and Thornley to liaise with neighbouring parish councils to fight for the weight reduction option.

Another big topic was plans for Bishops Bowl lakes and the old cement works site. Follett properties have put in new plans for 21 'Leisure Lodges' - they already have permission for 21 'Fishing Lodges'. The difference is these are 3 bedroomed with all facilities. The plan includes widening the access on both sides of the road, rather than just to the lodges. The council will object on numerous grounds. It was pointed out that Follett properties were not entering into the spirit of things by failing to participate in discussions on a master plan for the site, though in their literature they say they are in dialogue with the public.

On behalf of the Properties working party, Councillor Hancock reported that the ruts made by traffic up the side of the playing field would be made good after the rains. Drainage work in the top field had caused more problems as there is now a water hazard caused by a ditch not draining properly. The contractors have been asked to look at the problem.

Parking in Vicarage Lane has ruined the verge. The Council will have the damage repaired and install wooden posts to prevent parking on the grass. PC Hill would be asked to see if vehicles parked close to the junction with Frances Road are committing an offence.

Councillor Van Spall said country roads are getting wider. Heavy vehicles were causing deep ruts on verges. These ruts were then filled with tarmac to prevent accidents. He knew of one local farmer who had been told to cut back trees which were only deemed to be overhanging because of this unofficial widening.

The concrete lamp posts on the Manor Orchard estate are deteriorating and will have to be replaced. This will take precedence over any lighting improvements. Councillor Lockley also voiced his frustration at still having no feedback from the County Council officer who visited in November to discuss traffic calming so no progress can be made. Harbury School will be asked if the children can make drawings to illustrate their ideas on traffic calming for the village.

It was noted that Middle Road will be closed for 2 weeks between the 5th March and the 27th April for much needed re-surfacing.

Councillor Mancell announced that the Finance Working Party recommended a precept for 2007/8 of £57,237. He pointed out that the considerable loss of income from the abolition of payments from the District Council under Section 136 was the major reason for the necessary increase. The budget was unanimously accepted. He also reported on a successful meeting with the Tennis and Netball Clubs to re-negotiate contributions to the Sinking Fund out of which the courts are maintained. These will rise by 20%, and work to improve the surrounds of the netball court will go ahead soon.

The Council agreed grants to Mini-Rugby and The Rainbows (and explained to Councillor Biddle who has sons that Rainbows come before Brownies!). They also decided to purchase projecting equipment with money remaining in the technology grant, which will make it much easier to look at plans.

Flicks in the Sticks' are coming - watch this space.

Your usual correspondent, Linda Ridgley was indisposed. Apologies if this report lacks its usual succinct no-nonsense tone!

#### Parish Council's Quarterly Report

In the last three months the Parish Council has:

- Continued to have numerous meetings about the masterplan process at Bishop Bowls
- Held meetings with WCC about traffic calming
- Agreed to extend the path in the cemetery
- Contributed funds to several village organisations (including the Christmas lights in the tree outside the Wight School)
- Held various meetings regarding the railway bridge at Deppers Bridge
- Continued to work with Neighbourhood Watch over the introduction of Smartwater
- Held a farewell gathering for Father Roy
- Agreed a precept which has been increased only to cover the cost of lost revenue from Stratford District Council.



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



This half term our topic is all about shapes and winter. We have been concentrating on a different shape each week and taking the children outside looking at shapes in nature and signs of winter.

We have discussed winter and created a group winter collage. Also on the theme of winter the children have made bird cake to take home to hang in their gardens. Morgan informed us that the birds have eaten all the bird-food he made at Nursery and Jared told us that a blue-tit came in his garden. Joe's mum, Lindsey, who is an artist, visited Windmills to work with the children on a winter shape collage, using snowflake templates and potato shape printers, plus copious amounts of white paint and a sprinkling of glitter! As if by magic, the next day there was a blanket of real snow covering everywhere. The children arrived at Windmills very excited, wrapped up in their coats, scarves, hats and gloves. We made the most of this spontaneous learning opportunity by taking them out onto the school field to explore and investigate. "The snow is really crunchy it makes footprints" Lily. "I played snowballs with Oliver. I put snow in the bucket and on the snowman" Holly. We brought some snow back inside to see what happened to it and how it changed. All these activities fulfilled all the areas of learning within the foundation stage.

The children have also created individual collages using lots of 2D shapes – "I made a rocket that goes up to the moon and stars and all over the planets like Saturn and Jupiter. I made it from shapes, like squares, triangles, and rectangles. I have made a windmill as well to guide the rocket."

Mrs Casement extended this activity by constructing a 3D robot from empty boxes and tubes. "The robot has a cube for a head" Morgan. "There are 2 arms and 2 legs that makes 4 – they are cylinders" Oliver.

The children have also enjoyed learning new shape songs to familiar tunes e.g. "See the circle shapes we found" to "London Bridge is falling down". They have then searched around the room for shapes, and also outside.

On Tuesday, 9<sup>th</sup> January, our first day back after the Christmas break we made our usual visit to the toddler service at church where the children listened to a story about Jesus sharing the 5 loaves of bread and 2 fish. Carol Massey our Early Years Advisor visited Windmills on Wednesday 24<sup>th</sup> January with ideas, suggestions and advice for a new room layout.

Marie and Tina attended a course at Manor Hall about promoting positive behaviour called "Catch them being good". This was a course run by DISCS, the SEN childcare service. Tina and Marie returned reassured that the strategies in place at Windmills are those adopted by these specialists.

The children came back to Pre-School after Christmas bursting with enthusiasm and all ready for the new term. Daisy, Harry, Jessica and Hattie have all joined us this month and have settled in extremely well.

OFSTED - Following up on the inspection just before Christmas, Gael and Lisa had their "Suitable Person Interview" to ensure that they have the qualities necessary for managing Pre-School. We were all delighted (though not in the least surprised) when they passed with flying colours.

Staff training has gathered pace, with our Advisory Teacher giving the whole staff in-service training on implementing the "Birth to Three Matters" strategies into our setting. In addition, Angie attended a course entitled "Not Just Playing" and went with Claire on a Child Protection course, while Bud attended a Behaviour Management course entitled "Catch them Being Good".

Winter Wonderland - Meanwhile, there has been no interruption to the fun had by the children in our Winter Wonderland at Pre-Early in January, the mild wet School. weather meant that plans for frosty pictures had to be substituted by 'puddle pictures'. The children also produced some wonderful paintings and collages using paint and materials in cold colours. We put ice into the water tray and encouraged the use of "slippery", "cold". such as language "freezing", and "icy". We added some lovely figures of polar bears, penguins, husky dogs and even Eskimos with a sledge, and the



children had a marvellous time creating their own scenes, with icebergs eventually turning into pools of very cold water. We then added to the scientific learning by putting some brightly coloured ducks into the tray and adding warm water which, to the delight of the children, caused the ducks gradually to change colour.

Just as we were giving up hope of any wintry weather, we woke up to a lovely layer of snow on the ground. As Sophie remarked, "When I walked outside my feet went crunch, crunch, crunch." The children had a great time with it before it melted and its appearance rounded off our winter theme very well.



Shopping – In preparation for transforming our role play area into a shop, the children were taken out, in pairs, to visit the local shops. Each child had a shopping list and a small amount of money and went to each of the shops to buy a variety of groceries and toiletries for Pre-School. In addition, they were encouraged to take note of what they saw as they went around the village, and to identify other specified items in the shops. We are very grateful to the managers of Muglestons, the Supermarket, the Co-op and the Chemist for allowing us to wander around their shops and take photographs.

During the last week in January, the children transferred the knowledge they had gained from their shopping trips to their role play shop set up in Pre-School. 

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

I'm writing this on January 19th, a day after the storm which caused much damage and loss of life throughout the country. Conditions at sea were diabolical and the rescue of 26 seamen whose ship was damaged off Cornwall was a feat of great skill by the crew of a Royal Navy helicopter. Today the weather is calm and it's very mild. I collected some tools at Brandon Marsh Nature Centre to be used by a work party this Sunday morning at Harbury Spoil Bank. The work will be mainly scrub clearance to enable the species-rich turf to flourish and provide a food source for a variety of invertebrates which include locally rare butterflies such as the Marbled White, Green Hairstreak, Holly Blue and Dingy and Grizzled Skipper. Without this management, the species would be lost and the area reverts to woodland.

Collecting the tools at Brandon, I took the opportunity to visit Clay Brookes Marsh. This reserve, jointly managed by Coventry City Council and the Wildlife Trust is at the site of the railhead of the old Binley Colliery which closed in 1963. It gets its name from two miners, Messrs Clay and Brookes, who were killed by a fall of stone in 1947. There is open access to this SSSI (Site of Special Scientific Interest) with parking in Grange Avenue. (OS sheet 140 Leicester and Coventry. GR 380769). The short boardwalk, built to preserve the fragile marshy ground, was flooded when I was there. Rather childishly perhaps, I took off my shoes and socks and waded across. Later, I saw Celandine fully open. We seem to be weeks ahead of ourselves this year but winter could still strike and nip lots of the new growth.

Earlier in the week, I visited Draycote Water using National Cycle Route 41 (Learnington to Rugby). From Harbury, the nearest point to join is the old railway line just above the descent into Long Itchington (Map ref 408646 OS sheet 151). After a round of the lake, I luxuriated in the excellent cafe at the visitor centre, with its panoramic view. I had seen a large group of perching Cormorants, several Great Crested Grebes and lots of ducks which I would have needed binoculars to identify. Needless to say, these were at home, so be warned. I had in fact been given a lesson in identification by Jack Watkins, until recently Warden at Learn Valley and Welches Meadow Nature Reserves. We were back at Brandon Marsh, with it's maze of paths, numerous pools and 6 bird hides. Stationary Cormorants had commandeered an area where tree stumps poking up through the shallow lake made perfect perching points. An immature Cormorant posed a problem of identification with its Heron like colouration. Duck included Mallard, Pochard, Teal, Wigeon and Shoveler. The latter seemed already to be paired off with what I took to be a courtship dance. Not so said Jack. They were in fact acting in pairs to swim in a circular fashion and perhaps confuse their invertebrate prey in the mud below before scooping them up with their shovel like beaks. The male has a distinctive bottle-green head.

On Sunday 14th January, Sharon and I, with two friends, took a walk above llkley [W. Yorks] and the valley of the River Wharfe. It was a bright day but the wind was cutting necessitating cagoules, gloves and despite the location, hats. We certainly did not want to end up feasted upon by worms. With the sun low on the horizon shadows were on a grand scale. A small reservoir above the town had sizeable waves. We came to the intriguing, so called Swastika Stone. [Grid ref. 095469. OS sheet 104. Leeds & Bradford.] It is protected by a metal fence. The carving may date back to the Bronze Age. Its nine cup-marks in a cross shape are surrounded by a curved swastika-shaped groove. Many more cup and ring rock carvings litter the moor but their function, as those in Northumberland, is unknown. There are many theories most to do with astronomy. After several miles walking into the wind, we left the gritstone, heather and bilberry moorland, descending across farmland to Addingham and the south bank of the Wharfe which was in spate. Now, with the stiff breeze behind us, progress back to likley was swift and as dusk fell we were having tea in a welcome hostelry.

I've seen no lambs yet though plenty of ewes in advanced pregnancy. Winter Aconites and Snowdrops are in bloom close to the south porch of the church around the Stobo memorial. The weather is predicted to be cooling in the coming week; perhaps we will get a taste of winter after all.

### **Harbury First Responders**


As the New Year begins, the village First Responder Group is celebrating! All nine Responders have recently undertaken further training to enable us to deliver oxygen therapy to patients, when we are called out by the Ambulance Service to incidents in the village.

Oxygen is a vital requirement to anyone suffering life-threatening conditions such as chest pain, heart attack or sudden collapse. Now First Responders will be able to administer oxygen therapy to such patients, before an ambulance arrives, thus drastically improving the efficacy of the treatment we are able to provide.

We would also like to take this opportunity to thank the Harbury Carnival Committee for their very kind recent donation to the Group. This will help towards the cost of further equipment we have purchased to enable us to carry and use oxygen.

Members of the First Responders Group were in attendance at the blood donor session on Thursday 28th December in the Village Hall, aiming to increase public awareness of our role in the village. As a result of this, several villagers expressed an interest in becoming First Responders, and we look forward to welcoming them to the Group when they have undertaken their training with the Ambulance Service. This is great news for the Group and the village, because it means we should be able to provide greater round-the-clock cover for villagers in an emergency situation.



### **Tasty Pastries**



If you want to book a stall or space on the field for Carnival Day, please call Mike McBride on 612421. It is not too early to do this; it does not have to be left until the last minute!



### Thoughts from Abroad?

It's that time of year when many people start pouring over travel brochures to choose a holiday destination. For some people, there is probably always a 'holiday of a lifetime' or challenge they would like to achieve before it's too late? From time to time, the H&L News has published articles from individuals who have set themselves a goal; often with the idea of achieving a personal ambition; whilst at the same time raising money for a worthwhile cause. This month's article – perhaps the first of many – features the achievements of two friends, who are far from the image of the 'wrinkly rockers' who might be expected to hanker after a ride along USA's Route 66 on a Harley Davidson. Dave Andrews planned his epic journey last year in aid of Breakthrough Breast Cancer and was accompanied by his Rugby Club friend, Ian Winchester. Their 'thoughts from abroad' follow the familiar lyrics of Route 66. "The Mother Road"

"If you ever plan to motor west: Travel my way Take the Highway that's the Best" Get your kicks on Route 66 "It winds from Chicago to L.A. More than 2000 miles all the way"





We headed south out of Chicago on the old Pontiac trail and roared through the corn belt of Illinois and following the lyrics of the Bobby Troup song went through,

"St.Louis, down to Missouri," and on to "Oklahoma City" which "looks mighty pretty".

Oklahoma is great for Route 66 riders, with more miles of The Old Highway than any other state. It was commissioned in 1926 and soon became the "Main Street of America". It's still possible to conjure up pictures of the dustbowl of the mid 1930's, when farmers were driven out and headed west on 66 to escape the hardship and find the promised land of California – the very story of John Steinbeck's "Grapes of Wrath".

We visited famous staging posts like The Stumble Inn and Ernie's Pig Hip restaurant; and the Meramec Caverns, the alleged hideout of Jesse James and his gang.

Then we were on to the panhandle of Texas, an endless expanse, which was once home to the buffalo, but is now bristling with the characteristic 'nodding donkeys' of the oil wells. We passed by Cadillac Ranch where a row of 10 Cadillacs, painted in psychedelic colours, have been methodically augured into the land by a wealthy cattle owner. We experienced all that is 'bigger and better' in the USA when we called in the Big Texas Ranchhouse, where the 72oz steak was free - if you can eat it all inside the hour!

We drove on westwards and passed through

"Amarillo,, Gallup, New Mexico, Flagstaff, Arizona",

and we didn't forget

"Winona, Kingman, Arizona, Barstow, San Bernadino"

In New Mexico, the Land of Enchantment, and home of the Comanche, we stopped at Santa Fe, which is older than any city in colonial America. On the way there, we climbed up onto the High Plains to an altitude of 7,000 feet and rode through a hailstorm coming down from the colder north of Colorado. Strange! One minute it was 90 degrees; the next it was zero! Santa Fe is unique and a great place to enjoy Spanish/Indian culture and food. They won't allow an airport to be built here – 'it would interfere with the sky' – the deep cobalt blue, which attracts so many artists to the area.

We headed south to Albequerque and crossed the Rio Grande into open country and the Navajo wilderness. At Gallup, an old railroad town and Indian stronghold, we visited the El Rancho Hotel, which was an 'on-location' home to Tracey and Hepburn, Bogart and Flynn – and we met up with a Navajo chief and his son who invited us to visit their pueblo. There was just time to buy some Indian jewellery for the 'girls back home'!

Just before Flagstaff, we stopped at Winslow

"stand on the corner and take it easy" - The Eagles, 1970 or thereabouts?

It was just as well that we took a break, as we knew the next stage wouldn't be so easy, as the Devils playground, the Mojave desert lay ahead! After Peach Springs (where the last unpaved section of Route 66 in Arizona remained until 1937) civilisation started to fade. As we rode deeper into the desert, it was possible to imagine travellers of 70 years ago listening more carefully to their engines and checking the gauges more regularly. Our Harley-Davidsons were ticking over nicely! We were disappointed not to see any' rattlers' along the way, but the combined roar of 12 Harleys probably had them heading for cover!



We 'holed up' in the wild-west town of Oatman, in the middle of the desert, where the wild burros, released by prospectors when they left, still roam. Nowadays local 'gunslingers' put on staged gunfights to liven up the place for visitors! The town once boomed and everyone cashed in except Jose Jerez. After discovering a new outcrop of gold he spent his small share, walked out of town, sat down and 'chugalugged' a bottle of rat poison! C'est la vie! Having crossed some of the most dramatic scenery imaginable, we hurtled on from the desert into the cool pines of the San Gabriel mountains and headed down into the Los Angeles smog. Fortunately we soon encountered the sea breezes as we hit the Santa Monica Boulevard, a wild beachfront at the end of a wild adventure – 2,570 miles.

"San Bernardino .... you get hip to this kind of trip

When you ..... make that Californian trip.

Get your kicks on Route 66"

We certainly got our kicks en route across America from East to West on the Mother Road and would like to thank everyone who sponsored us as we realised the dream of a lifetime.


# Southam & District Lions

In the meantime, the committee carries on organising the regular use of the Hall and ensuring that the building is maintained to a good standard for all users. Unfortunately in recent months, there have been several acts of vandalism, which have resulted in damage to a rear door and broken windows at the side and front of the property. The latter problems could have been caused by footballs kicked against the building, which should not have occurred, since a brick wall is provided on the recreation ground for 'ball sports' to encourage individuals to test their skills in an open space. Perhaps parents could reinforce this message, so that an unnecessary expense is not incurred replacing windows on the community's property?

The plans to refurbish areas of the building continue apace and the recent architect plans include most of the features requested by regular users of the Village Hall. Once the final plans are drawn up, there will be information in the H&L News indicating where the drawings might be viewed. The members of the Steering Group committee are continuing to research grants and 'funding opportunities', so that applications can be made, as soon as projected costs of the modernisation have been computed by a Quantity Surveyor.

The Village Hall has always been a community resource, which has been well supported over the years. The committee recognise, however, that considerable effort will be needed to ensure that the funding for the initial outlay is secured followed by on-going revenue in proportion to the maintenance costs. With this in mind, two members of the committee will be attending a Conference, which will provide 'tips and strategic solutions to owning, improving and maintaining a building for your community needs'.

The Village Hall is organised by a small team of dedicated volunteers, who appreciated all the efforts of those who contributed to the success of the recent dance. Many thanks to Andrew, Bill, Geoff, John and Stan for decorating the Hall; Alison, Gill, Janet, Jenny, Lyn, Midge, Pat and Peggy for preparing the buffet; Pam and Rosemary for organising the raffle; John and Roanne for 'manning' the bar and everyone who turned up the 'morning after the night before' to clear up. Thanks also to those who supported the event and made it a 'night to remember' for all the right reasons!

Sew Simple - Bowls in Fabric! - Thursday 8 February 10.00am - 12.30pm at Ufton Village Hall



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
