

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

Ladbroke Parish Council has at last been granted permission to have a website. Kipp Warr has agreed to set this up – much discussion ensued. What items would be put on the web? Some details of Parish Council business, news concerning the village i.e. events, crime etc, also where this information should be kept.

Our new Tree Warden – Tim Seden, notified the Parish Council that the District Council could supply parishes with free trees for planting. This will come up for discussion later – where to plant the trees? Thoughts on this would be welcomed by the council. The trees must be planted by public highways department on council or private land.

Pot holes in the village - Warwick Councillors reported that the road works in Harbury Road, Church Lane and School Lane have been assessed and will be undertaken this year! August was mentioned, we shall see!

Police Report – P.C. Katrina Taylor reported that an elderly lady's property had been ransacked by four youths on June 19th in her presence. They had smiled and waved to her through the window. She had got a chain on the door but she opened it and they just pushed past her. They only took some money, but left her very upset and shaken

Speed camera checks on the bypass are still to be carried out.

Councillor's travelling expenses to meetings and training sessions were discussed. Councillor's agreed that the mileage allowances should be paid.

Flooding in the village – During the severe heavy rains recently the main road was flooded at the Banbury end of the by-pass. This was mainly due to water flowing on to the road from higher ground. The work by the District Council on drainage of rain water worked well.

Smartwater – Everyone in the village received a letter about the benefits of marking their possessions with 'Smartwater'; our co-ordinator received only seven replies.

Parish Plan – The Parish Councillors have all read a draft of the plan and had many comments to make. A meeting of the councillors and the team working on the plan has been arranged.

Village Hall – An application to the Parish Council for a grant has been made for work to be done on the hall. The council are requesting information as to whether the equipment requested will be transferred to the future plans for the hall.

Millennium Green - An application for a Lottery Grant has been rejected. So everyone is hoping that "Toys for Boys" will be a great success, financially and weather wise.

County Councillors Report – Southam College is a great success. It has been granted room for 240 college students.

The Councillor talked about County and District Councils being assessed, and also about a White Paper. Giving councillors more partnership with government. He was rather doubtful about all of this in view of "changes at the top". No change really for Parish Councils.

He mentioned the medical Primary Care Plan and a partnership with Coventry University Hospital. This new hospital has the best facilities in the country, outside London.

The weight restrictions are in place on Deppers Bridge, 7.5 tonnes. Councils queried whether more notices were needed around the area.

Light Pollution – This is not so bad in the summer when there are leaves on the trees.

Alibone Charity – There is a vacancy on this trust and the Parish Council will recommend a nomination.

Notice Board – Do we need a larger notice board or does the existing board need de-cluttering? The clerk was of the opinion that an extra section should be added on and that the wooden framework was restricting visibility. A plane glass front would be better with one end sectioned off for council notices and a bigger area for mainly village notices.

Your usual correspondent Linda Ridgley being away, I was asked to try and fill her shoes. I was impressed with the speed and efficiency with which Chairman Tim Lockley got things moving and we were quickly through the first five items on the agenda. Mr and Mrs Harvey of 28, Binswood End came to explain why they wanted to put a kitchen in the converted barn which is an annexe to their house and to which the Parish Council had objected. They explained they were investigating the possibility of putting a clause in their deeds preventing sale as a separate dwelling. Councillors agreed to write to the District Council giving support to this if it proved to be possible.

The meeting then went into camera. When we, the public, returned, Deppers Bridge had a new councillor to replace Dutch Van Spall. Ron Grey has been co-opted and took up his post immediately. He was asked to join the working party looking at the master plan for the cement works site. He agreed and the fact that he is already on the Deppers Bridge Residents' Group was seen as a bonus.

Anita Reading, our Police Community Support Officer, reported that number plates were being targeted by thieves and she had packs to make plates more secure. The Southam Safer Neighbourhood Team can be contacted at Southam Police Station in person, by phone, e-mail or you can use the new web site. Councillor Patrick reported that more uptake of Smartwater was needed before notices could be posted to warn thieves. Contact Alison Abbot on 612939 to obtain a supply and protect your possessions.

The notice board at the Village Hall needs replacing. Councillor Grey said that he had made it about 25 years ago and it was getting a bit old and gnarled like him! The Properties Working Party will look for a suitable replacement.

Although a weight limit on the railway bridge at Deppers Bridge has been agreed, County Councillor Stevens reported it will have to be ratified by the Warwickshire 'Cabinet' and they do not meet until 19th July. I thought for a moment of Whitehall and power seeping down to a local level. The weight limit would preclude large lorries and buses

and it is still not known what arrangements for the latter, including school buses will be. District Councillor Patrick announced that for the first time there would be a Councillors' surgery at Deppers Bridge. On the 14th July councillors will be at the Great Western from 11.30-12.30.

Stratford District Council has granted extensions at 1, Deppers Bridge, and Kingston House, Mill Street. The PC made no representations on an extension to the garage block at Lower Westfields Farm, and on the demolition of the existing house at Stapenhall Farm and its replacement with a new house. The PC would prefer not to see a flat roof extension at 9, Knightlow Way.

Follett Properties have won their appeal for use of land at the old cement works for open storage. The council hopes local people will monitor use and report infringements. A letter proposing leisure use of the Bishops Bowl site drawn up by the relevant parish councils was approved and will be sent to Stratford District Council after the words 'for younger people' were struck out as it was thought 'ageist'.

The council had received a number of letters protesting at the proposed housing development in Bush Heath Lane. Replies will explain that as yet planning permission has not been sought and before it is, there will be public consultation. The first development would be of 17 houses, 7 for rent, 6 for shared ownership, and 4 for sale. Councillor Hancock pointed out that though there would be priority for applicants with a Harbury connection, those seeking a rented or shared ownership home must be on the housing waiting list held by Stratford District Council.

Dog bins figured prominently - both their location and their price. Tense juggling of figures followed and Councillor Mancell finally reckoned three could be afforded, to be sited in Mill Street, Vicarage Lane and Bull Ring Farm Road. Colin Sheasby has quoted for repairing the hedge at the playing fields alongside the path to the allotments and this was agreed. The County Council's footpath officer has advised against trying to block off the path to vehicles and the PC agreed to monitor the situation. A letter will be sent to the allotment holders asking them to ensure that their vehicles do no damage to path and hedge.

Councillor Lockley led discussion of the 'rave' that took place on the Playing Field after the Carnival. He pointed out that no permission had been sought or given for the event. There was considerable nuisance caused even after the police had closed down the event. The council will meet with the Carnival Committee to discuss post-carnival security such as closing the access from the car park. Fortunately, the good

weather at the time meant no damage was done by the numerous cars which were driven around the field.

New chairman of the environment working party, Councillor Ellis-Greenway stated that she had to get to grips with her new portfolio, particularly street lighting. Councillor Stevens asked if she was in the dark at the moment - laughter. There is to be bulb planting around the village, but to Linda Ridgley's relief native varieties will be used. The WI and the Horticultural Society will be asked if they would like to be involved.

One way traffic in Church Street has been explored and rejected. There is still no progress to report on traffic calming.

The PC has waited a year for the District Council to deliver the goods on a website into which it had intended to buy with its 'Awards to All' grant. As the money should have been spent by now, an exasperated Councillor Mancell recommended the PC advise the grant awarders that it would spend the money instead on upgrading its own technology and this was agreed.

The Council are investigating the possibility of having a Parish Office in the Village Hall committee room. The cost of doing this will be investigated but all agreed it would be beneficial.

Letters of thanks for grants had been received from, Harbury and Ladbroke News, the Girl Guides and Harbury Pre-school (it was noted that the Pre-school HAD thanked the Parish Council for their previous grant, contrary to last month's report). An application was received from the Steel Pan Academy for help with their trip to Spain. It was noted that the 9 Harbury teenagers involved had worked extremely hard both on their music and fund raising and it was agreed to award them £180.

The meeting closed at 10.10pm which saved your correspondent's wrist further punishment.



Harbury Parish Council Annual Report

Chairman's Report

I was elected as Chairman in May 2006 and I would like to thank both the previous Chair for her sound advice in my first few months and our Clerk Nicola Thompson for all the hard work that goes on behind the scenes.

Among the many activities this year some stand out; our constant lobbying of WCC about the state of our roads eventually resulted in the resurfacing of Middle Road from the Fosse to the entrance of the village; the council also advised the Village Hall Steering Group on proposals for the future for the VH; and we hosted a great evening to mark the retirement of Father Roy Brown.

Harbury Station Bridge at Deppers Bridge has been an ongoing saga for some time. Originally WCC intended to reduce the bridge to a single carriage way and install traffic lights: these proposals had been put in place with little or no consultation with the local residents. Once it was realised what was due to happen the residents, ably led by David Malin, formed an action group and together with ward member Dutch Van Spall they were able to persuade WCC to impose a temporary weight restriction while further surveys and other exploratory works are carried out.

I would like to pay tribute to Dutch Van Spall who resigned from the PC at the last meeting after ten years service. We wish him well in his new venture. I too have resigned from the Chairmanship due to an increased workload but stay a Parish Cllr. The Chair has been left in the safe hands of Cllr Lockley ably assisted by Cllr Thompson until next year's election. — Cllr. Kevin Biddle

Planning Report

Your Parish Council have again had a busy year looking carefully at applications mostly to do with extensions to houses and change of use of land. To extend our knowledge of the planning process Jenny Patrick attended a planning seminar in October 2006 hosted by WALC in Stratford. After hearing about Local and National planning rules, members were able to suggest ways that the planning department at Stratford could be more helpful to Parishes. One of our comments was lack of feedback to the Council when a plan goes ahead contrary to what we feel is suitable. Apparently we are not the only Parish to make critical comments of our planning department.

We have been working closely with the Warwickshire Rural Housing Enabling Officer, Chris Barlow about housing for local needs on a site along Bush Heath Lane. Rough plans have been circulated to the Parish Council and we have made comments which we hope will be taken into account when final plans are drawn. This will be a development in three phases as our housing needs change over many years. The first part of the development will contain bungalows and houses for our most urgent needs. When complete drawings and plans are available there will be a public meeting for everyone to come

and see them. Negotiations are still taking place so that we can guarantee these houses will always to be for the needs of local people.

We are still in consultation with SDC about an overall plan for the Bishop Bowl Quarries site. This process of discussion will hopefully be completed by the end of 2007.

Properties Report

The Properties Working Party deals with the village's assets which include the Playing Fields, the Cemetery, the village greens and the playing field at Deppers Bridge. The maintenance of these takes a large slice of the Parish Council budget.

The safety of the play equipment is a priority, and regular professional inspections are carried out and identified problems dealt with promptly. Work this year has included installing side barriers on the small swings, replacing a seat on the carousel, repainting equipment and reseeding under the aerial runway. There have also been repairs to the skate park and the barbeque. At Deppers Bridge, a dangerous piece of equipment has been removed, equipment painted, seats cleaned and a new bin installed. The netball court requires improvements to the perimeter surface which represents a hazard to players at present. The cost of this work will be met by the Sinking fund into which the Parish Council, Tennis Club and Netball Club make annual payments to cover maintenance. These payments have now been increased in order to rebuild funds.

Drainage of the field is a problem: the very wet winter resulted in several areas being under water. Work has been carried out on the ditch on the Constance Drive side with the cost being shared by the Parish Council and the adjacent landowner. Thoughtless parking on the verge in Vicarage Lane resulted in severe damage to the grass so the council has had posts installed to prevent parking and the area has been reseeded.

The Council contributed to the cost of new Christmas lights for the tree outside the Library which greatly enhanced the Christmas atmosphere.

Environment Report

Lights - The replacement of old concrete lamp-posts with either Windsor or metal posts was completed but an inspection by safety engineers has revealed potential problems with the newer concrete lamp-posts. We have now started a new replacement programme that will take 3-4 years to complete. We placed an additional light in

Pineham Avenue.

Traffic - There was a well-attended village meeting on traffic calming in October 2006. The proposals that came from that meeting included village 'gateways', temporary use of illuminated signs, and pinch points. Those ideas have been put to WCC's Environmental Design team, but nothing has been heard back. This will continue to be a matter of importance for the Environment Working Party in 2007-8.

Village Improvements - The bus shelter outside the supermarket was reinstated with a contemporary design. It seems to have been welcomed by passengers. More dropped kerbs were installed during the year. Using the comprehensive tree survey for trees on Parish Council land we commissioned last year we implemented a rolling programme of maintenance. — Cllr. Tim Lockley

Finance and General Purposes Working Party

The precept for the current year 2007/8 has been increased by £10,260 (21.8%) solely to cover the loss of revenue from Stratford District Council. These payments were for work traditionally carried out by the District Council, which the Parish took on but the funding from SDC has now been stopped.

This increase equates to less than £10 per year per band 'D' property, but allows us to continue with our planned spending on the following areas:

Village Hall – Support the Village Hall Committee on the proposed redevelopment, and contributions towards their professional costs.

Street Lighting - Embarked on a new phase of the street-lighting replacement, including replacements for the Manor Orchard Estate lights.

Tree Maintenance - Funding the rolling three year plan for the maintenance of our village trees, this has just started.

Tennis & Netball — The sinking or maintenance fund, increased to cover additional resurfacing costs. Current cost is £1100 from each party, 20% increase included this year to £1320.00.

S137 – The Parish Council has the legal power to spend up to £10,000 (approximately) on this area. This year we are again minded to spend this amount, targeting not just local groups, but specifically local youth groups.

Traffic Calming scheme – Funds will now be made available to continue the investigation and design of a Village Traffic Calming Scheme.

Cemetery Maintenance – An additional amount has been included to cover the cost of extending the path, along with the needed repairs to the Cemetery Chapel.

A summary of last years accounts are shown below, the year end deficit of £8,942.56 is due to the loss of funding from Stratford District Council along with the costs for the Bus Shelter.

Copies of the full accounts are in the Parish Council Annual Report in the library.

June has been a very busy month for our Society. On 7th June, in the evening, we visited Spetchley Park Gardens near Worcester. It had been a bit wet in the morning but it brightened up and we had good weather for the evening. I had organised a guided tour and Jenny our guide, who had only been there for two years was so enthusiastic and knowledgeable, it added to our enjoyment.

The gardens have gradually been restored to their former splendour and are a credit to the very small team there. The walled garden had an old twisted apple tree that was 160 years old and still going strong. Also there was a very rare double pomegranate tree, which has lovely red flowers in July, well worth a return visit. The huge herbaceous borders were overflowing with plants. Also in evidence were many self seeded Eryngiums, and Mrs Willmott's ghost. She was the present Mr Berkeley's grandmother's sister. She was well known for scattering these seeds on her travels to different gardens.

Many rare trees were seen in the woodland walk. The lake looked splendid flanked by the lovely old house. The Millennium Garden was a delight, part of it with tunnels of Cercis Canadensis, (the forest pansy) and Robinia. Also a sunken garden with a rill was well stocked with tender and semi-hardy plants.

The walled vegetable garden is a new venture and has had to be replanted several times due to the appetites of the local rabbit population! Thankfully it is now well on the way to being productive.

We all had a most enjoyable evening and the journey back through lovely villages with quaint sounding names just added to it all.

The day trip was on 20th June and once again the weather mainly behaved itself. Just one short sharp shower. We started off at Wilton House near Salisbury and passed Stonehenge on the way. The inside of the House is full of rare furniture and a fabulous collection of paintings including a huge room containing the biggest collection of Van Dyke's I have ever seen. As you can imagine I was in heaven! The stewards were all very friendly and willing to share their knowledge with us.

The 18th century gardens were very much in the Capability Brown style with majestic trees and large areas of parkland and herbaceous

borders. We were lucky enough to see three very young cygnets and parents on the river and then in the water garden there were some very tiny moorhen chicks with mom. An added bonus.

From there we went a short distance away to Heale Gardens. These gardens were an absolute delight with surprises around every corner. The walled garden was a super combination of vegetables, fruit and flowers. Everything seemed to be at least three weeks further forward than our own gardens. In two trees there were rambling roses going up to a height of at least 30 feet, a superb sight.

The borders were very colourful and as the brochure said it was like being transported into a magical and varied paradise of running streams and exuberant planting, it certainly did not disappoint. The plant centre too was well stocked with very healthy plants. There will be quite a few gardens in the village with Heuchera Obsidian and Spotlight. Thank goodness the coach had plenty of room for all our purchases. We were sad to leave here after enjoying a tasty tea.

We managed to avoid the congestion on the way back (as people were flocking to Stonehenge for the Summer Solstice) thanks to our coach driver, Stuart, who ably fitted into the shoes of Tony Sherman who had been our driver for the last 8 years. Sadly Tony died very suddenly a few weeks ago and will be greatly missed. When I sent a thank you card to Cheney Coaches, I also sent a card to Tony's family. I will only briefly mention the Walkabout as until our next committee meeting I will not know how we did financially. Obviously the weather deterred some visitors but those I spoke to throughout the weekend thoroughly enjoyed all of the gardens and remarked how impressed they were with the high standards achieved. As I have said before we are so lucky to have such talented gardeners in our village and I hope everyone enjoyed the weekend.

Thanks to everyone who contributed towards ensuring that our visitors were well looked after. As you know apart from some of the proceeds going towards the running costs of the Society we do give to various other Village activities.

The next big event is the Village Show in September, I do hope that you are watching the programme currently being shown on BBC on Sunday evenings it demonstrates that the Village Show still generates much interest and indeed friendly rivalry. Please consider exhibiting this year, so nurture those vegetable plants, they certainly are getting sufficient water at present.

Nature Notes

Now the roadside cow parsley has gone to seed and the lighter green foliage of early summer has taken on a darker hue. Soft fruit is ripening and soon hedgerow blackberries will be with us. June's deluge may bring an early flush of mushrooms if July returns summer to the land. There's a lot to look forward to.

Moths are having a much needed boost to their image. Most of us perceive them as rather unspectacular, trumped by their cousins the butterflies. But, take another look when next they land on your lighted window pane at night. In Warwickshire, butterflies number about 40 species whereas the larger (or macro) moths of Warwickshire run to about 600 species (see David Brown's excellent book, 'The Larger Moths of Warwickshire' published by Atropos. I have a copy if you would like to take a look). A large number of moths are day flying. A laminated folding guide to these can be obtained from the Field Studies Council (www.field-studies-council.org). Armed with this, David met his Open Studies Lepidoptera Class at the Bill Smilie Nature Reserve on the side of Prestbury Hill, over the border in Gloucestershire, looking down on Cheltenham Race Course. (OS sheet 163, Cheltenham and Cirencester, GR 994245). The 4th June was a rather breezy but generally sunny day and we were fortunate to find more than 14 species of moths including the nationally rare Lace Border (Scopula ornata). Butterflies were also found including Brown Argus and Small Blue. The wingspan of the latter varies between 16 and 25mms (0.6-1"). Bertha Kettle was confident she had seen one in her garden in late May and David Brown thought this was very likely as locally the butterfly can be found at Bishop's Hill and is one of the reasons why parts, at least, of the old cement works site would make an excellent nature reserve.

Sitting on the hillside, having a picnic, overlooking the broad Vale of Severn, I heard the cuckoo for only the second time this year. In last month's Harbury and Ladbroke News, I said that both males and females make the familiar cuckoo sound. In fact, it is the male which marks out its territory with this sound. The female note is described as burbling.

Only one Man Orchid (Aceras anthropophorum) could be found inside the wired off area at Ufton Fields. I saw it there on the 5th June. I searched for flowers of the Greater Butterfly Orchid (Plantanthera chlorantha), as last month I wrote that I had found its leaves and it has flowered there in the past. I searched in vain, but found the flower spikes of this lovely white orchid at Stockton Cutting Nature Reserve. (OS sheet 151. GR 438650) on June 8th. Close by, in moister ground, were the beautiful pink flowers of Ragged Robin and variously hued Common Spotted Orchids.

The following day was the Carnival with weather to match. Tony Thomas mentioned that he and Joan had found some interesting flowers growing on their lawn. When I visited, the plants proved to be three robust Common Twayblades (Listera ovata). Generally, we seem to be finding more wild orchids about the village, perhaps a sign of the decline in the liberal use of chemicals on the land. Down at the Rugby Club, near the cricket nets, John Jackson reported a group of Bee Orchids (Ophrys apifera) were in flower. When I visited on June 11th, one spike had 8 flowers on its stem. The colony of Common Spotted Orchids (Orchis fuschii) by the war memorial at Bascote Heath is enlarging. I counted 8 when I pedalled by recently.

In the middle of June, Sharon and I spent five days walking a section of the South West Peninsula Path from Braunton to Bude. Whilst most of the country was rather wet, we had generally fine conditions. The scenery was ever changing, from the flatter area around the Taw and Torridge estuaries to the beetling cliffs and contorted geology near Hartland Point. The Isle of Lundy seemed to keep pace with us as we walked, only to be left behind as we 'turned the corner' and approached Bude.

The path we followed was a paradise of wild flowers including Field Scabious, Sheeps Bit, Navelwort, Thrift, Sea Campion and many more. Down on the shingle, we found Sea Holly. This plant's spiky leaves are a pale frosty blue. This is due to the waxy cuticle, an evolutionary device to retain water in the dry salty conditions in which it lives. As we crossed into Cornwall, I saw two tiny butterflies. They were Green Hairstreaks (Callophrys rubi) and were flying over their caterpillars' commonest foodplant, Gorse. About 200 years ago, it was first recorded that the chrysalis of this butterfly produces audible squeaks which attract ants. They often tend the pupa in their nests, feeding from the sticky secretions which ooze from it. Harbury Spoilbank has a colony of Green Hairstreak, but as there is no gorse on the reserve, the foodplants are likely to be Bird's Foot Trefoil, Bramble or Dogwood.

Rex Humphreys told me about two unusual sightings. A weasel was seen along Mill Street and a Turtle Dove, a summer visitor, at Harbury Fields Farm. Let's hope for a drier July. Enjoy the summer when it comes back.

Village Hall Update

This month's update includes the good news, the hoped-for good news about the Village Hall and the not-so-good news.

The good news includes the response by three members of the village community to last month's request in the magazine for professionals who would be willing to give guidance to the Steering Group committee about the proposals to develop the premises. It was very heart-warming to find a project manager, a quantity surveyor and a surveyor all willing to offer advice about the current plans to those who have driven forward the ideas up to the present time. There was also a good morning's work carried out by members of the committee who turned up to create a 'working party', which carried out a 'summer clean' on the cupboards in the kitchen and the Wagstaffe room. As a result, there are several boxes of redundant china, which would be given free to a good home, if anyone had an imaginative use for odd cups, saucers and small plates. Maybe there is a group in the village which could use some of the surplus items, if only for a crockery smashing venture in aid of fund-raising?

The hoped-for good news will rest on the outcome to be provided about the current energy usage of the Hall based on a report to be provided by the Warwickshire Energy Efficiency Advice Centre. A representative from the Centre recently carried out an audit of the various methods of heating and lighting and feedback on the efficiency of the systems will be provided in the near future.

The not-so-good news involves the resignation of the present cleaner who travels in to the village to carry out her duties. She no longer feels able to fit the Village Hall into her schedule and notices have been placed around the village advertising for a local person to take over the responsibility. The cleaning takes approximately two half days per week and the hours and pay could be negotiated with the Management Committee. The other worrying news is the discovery during the recent heavy downpours that water is leaking into the youth room through the ceiling. There are also several 'causes for concern' in the walls of the building facing the playing fields where damp patches and rotten wood will need attention before too long.

For all of us who regularly use the Village Hall, it is generally regarded as an attractive venue with many excellent features. It is only when the

'surface is scratched' and the various areas are really scrutinised that some of the problems are noticed. At present, members of the 'committee' do what unsung villagers have done for many years, try to 'stem the tide' and keep the overall appearance as good as possible for as long as possible with the least expense. This often means a doit-yourself approach to repairs and again, it would be helpful to know if there are any willing volunteers who have some time on their hands, as well as expertise in DIY, who would be willing to 'lend a hand' if the call for practical assistance went out through the H&L NEWS. If there is anyone out there who 'fits the bill', and is interested in helping from time to time, please give Geoff a call on 613801.

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

Warwickshire's Musical Treasure

A few years ago, after seeing a small advertisement, I went for the first time to a concert at All Saints, Learnington Hastings, and I was enchanted. I have been going regularly ever since, and there is now a small group of Harbury devotees.

The concerts, now in their 36th season, began in a small way when enthusiast Ray Law organised an evening's music played by his music student daughter and her friends. Over the years they developed to attract musicians of international renown such as Evelyn Glennie, Emma Johnson, and John Lill. The acoustics in the church are fantastic and the atmosphere is very special. Many of the players have

commented what a wonderful, attentive and appreciative audience it is - even the dreaded concert-goer's cough is usually absent. In summer, there are usually strawberries in a local garden; in winter, a glass of wine in church.

Ray Law finally retired from organising the concerts two years ago, and deservedly received the M.B.E. for services to music. They are now ably organised by a committee and the Ray Law concerts are to become a registered charity. There have been changes - the car park field is now lit, as is the route to the church. There is now numbered and more comfortable seating so it is no longer necessary to arrive an hour early clutching torch and cushion. What hasn't changed is the quality of the music. There are still four concerts left in this season. The Yehudi Menuhin School Orchestra play on July 14th. This is always a highlight - brilliant young musicians from all over the world playing like angels. The pianist, Leon McCawley gives a recital of Schubert, Chopin, Beethoven and Rachmaninov on 22nd September. 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
