
Winners of the raffle were Pauline Brailsford and Christine Baker.

Your Council is shuffling responsibilities. Kevin Biddle's resignation as Chairman means Tim Lockley is now Chair with Keith Thompson as Vice Chairman. Tim will resign as chair of the Environment Committee and has press-ganged Karena Ellis into replacing him. (Good job too -

as he wanted to suburbanise the verges at Temple End & Binswood End with spring bulbs!) Karena in turn would have to be replaced as the FC rep on the School Governors. Dutch Van Spall is also resigning as Deppers Councillor.

It was a meeting positively packed with parishioners perhaps as PACT had been publicised (the Police and Communities Together initiative). Unfortunately the Police arrived after the complainants from Pineham Avenue had left and ClIrs had to pass on their concerns about youths damaging hedges, causing noise very late at night and breaking glass on the fields. Pineham residents had not been given Incident Numbers and the Parish Council took this omission up with Sergeant Crust who promised that she or Pc Hill would attend the Annual Parish Meeting on 10th May.

Village Hall - A grant towards the fees incurred in presenting a bid for Lottery Funding had previously been agreed and this was ratified.

Deppers Bridge - representative Dutch Van Spall asked County Councillor Stevens for his view on progress on plans to make the Railway Bridge safe. A resident made clear that Deppers Bridge did not want traffic lights but a weight limit. Greenhill residents feared they would have to queue at the junction.

Planning Matters - Stratford granted extensions at Meadow Bank, Hall Lane, 1 Bush Heath Lane, 9 Neales Close; extension and conservatory at 4 Fox Close; conservatories at 7 the Beeches and 11a Constance Drive.

They allowed a two storey Care Home building at Sharmer Fields Farm; Wind Turbine at 10 Greenhill; change to residential use of the former Hairdressers at 2 Chapel Street and the antennae on the Telephone exchange.

At the Quarries, the Fisherman's (sic) Clubhouse was approved but applications by Folletts for 21 Lodges and a Watersports building were refused. Folletts' appeal against refusal for a Distribution Depot is pending.

A two storey extension for West End Cottage, Mill Street was refused and that for 1 Heber Drive and the replacement dwelling at Stapenhall Farm were withdrawn.

The Parish Council had no representation on the extensions to the Crown Inn but objected to the plans for a large stable block at the Ranch House because of its prominent position on the ridge, the new access at the junction with Beggars Lane and concerns that it was not intended for just family use as stated.

JUNE EAVES ITEC MAR Experienced qualified therapist HARBURY (01926) 612006 **Playing Fields** - The small see-saw has been removed as it was dangerous and the Clerk asked Cllrs to consider what could replace it. There is graffiti on the Play Wall and there was no consensus on whether this should be cleaned, covered with anti-vandal paint, or if young people should be encouraged to create a piece of art-work on it. The Drop-in Group will be consulted on this.

The District has now consulted the Parish Councils' Association on a Play Strategy and promises to let Parishes comment upon it.

Someone has uprooted a Dog Fouling sign and the Clerk asked if Cllrs could rescue it before it disappeared from outside the Library. Tim Lockley thought more Dog Bins were needed but budget cuts at SDS could mean they might not be emptied. They agreed to chain off the fields to prevent 4x4's churning them into mud.

Lighting - New lamps have replaced the decayed ones in Wagstaffe Close but there are potentially another 20 still to be done on the estate. The Clerk asked residents to cut back vegetation that obscured lights and most have done so.

The Chair suggested weed-killer for plants which obstruct the footway but was advised that the Council should approach the householders before they did this. He also wants action on the invasion of Japanese Knotweed on Bull Ring Lane, fearing it will eventually appear through the Village Hall floor!

Roads - Tim complained that the Traffic Management Officer was still unavailable. This matter has dragged on for many months. There has been no response from the Divisional Engineer on the proposed One Way System but the Clerk reported that she would put forward Bull Ring Farm Road and Penelope Close for consideration for the small scheme improvements on offer. Broken paths, potholes and dangerous damage to the carriageway had been brought to the attention of the County but nothing had yet been done.

Finance - The First Responders thanked the Council for agreeing to underwrite the purchase of their defibrillator should it be stolen or damaged. Tony Mancell had received his colleagues' bids for computer equipment and software and has at last been contacted by SDC about the use of the grant awarded for a PC website (we already have one <u>www.harbury-parish.co.uk</u>)

Cllr Janet Thornley announced that Tony would soon "be in my bedroom" helping connect her to the internet, the PC having donated their old computer.




Harbury Parish Council—Quarterly Report April 2007

Our recent Coffee Morning raised £130 and the Committee intends to donate some of this money to a village cause. Thanks to all who contributed.


Our next event is the **Guided Pub Walk** from the Admiral Nelson, Braunston starting at **10.30am on Saturday 12th May**. The Pub wanted us to minimise the number of cars we take. Ed Wilson (612345) is in charge, so let him know if you want to join the walk. I have been asked to remind members to bring stout shoes if it is wet.

We will go from Braunston to the shrunken village of Wolfhamcote where there are two deserted medieval settlements, a redundant Church, two disused railway lines and the remains of the Oxford Contour Canal, amongst other things to see.

For our **Carnival Stall on 9th June** we will have a game and a display for you to try out. In September Charles Barlow from Warwickshire Rural Community Council will give a presentation about our Social Housing Needs and the potential Bush Heath Lane site.

The Masterplan meetings on Follet Properties' plans to develop the Quarries site proceeds slowly. They have presented Housing, Leisure, and Transport Papers - none of which we consider to be satisfactory.

One of our members has asked me to pass on concerns from Network Rail about trespass on the Cutting between the Three Arch Bridge and Tunnel. The handrails from the emergency steps have been vandalised. They are there to facilitate the evacuation of passengers in the event of an accident on the line. Would parents please ensure young people realise their importance.



We thought we were having a bonus with Ed's walk plus a coffee morning mentioned. It had been put on W.I.'s April report but was nothing to do with us. However, our recent walk around Learnington was enjoyable ending with lunch. Hilary Scott gave a super report of the Spring Council Meeting. The meeting supported the construction of a sensory garden at Myton Hospice, to celebrate the W.I.'s 90th birthday.

The morning speaker was Cecil Thomas, a past chairman of Warwickshire's N.F.U. who outlined the main points of "The Great Milk Debate". When the government abolished the Milk Marketing Board in the late 1980's, market forces started to prevail. Farmers get less for their milk than in 1996. Dairy Farming counts for 90% of farming in this country and that should be enough without importing milk from abroad. Dairy farms are closing at the rate of 3 a day.

The afternoon speaker was Paul Whittaker, who is profoundly deaf but runs a charity, "Music for the Deaf". A very amusing and entertaining speaker, who even spoke in different accents, sung and played the piano brilliantly. He attended Wadham College in Oxford to get his degree in music, and then completed a post graduate course.

Beautiful kneelers made for a competition from flowers and leaves were displayed. Bertha Kettle and Diana Buck's entry was lovely but surprisingly not in the winning three.

The Autumn Council Meeting is on 17th October and the guest speaker will be Anne Widdecombe. The Group Meeting is on Tuesday 8th May at 7.30pm in the Village Hall.

So nice to hear that many canals are being repaired and bridges mended which will enable people to enjoy travelling along them once more.

For the 269th Folk Club in April, the night was kept theme-free. Whilst some performers found this gave them a vast choice of material, others voiced the opinion that a theme normally helped focus the mind a little more. Either way, no theme and no obvious planning did mean that nothing could go wrong. Interestingly, some of the performers seemed to want to carry on the previous month's theme of "Wales / whales / wails". Presumably their songs had not been ready for the March club?

The Harvesters opened the night with the cliché-ridden "Tell It Like It Is", followed by "Hearts And Flowers". One singer asked to go on as soon as possible as she had a lot of words to remember. Her zither and voice did justice to "The Clear Dales Air" and she followed this with a Tom Lewis song, "The Tale of a Whale". Janny and Maureen followed with "April Morn", perfectly judged for the time of year. Peter McDonald had "Another Train" to catch, before bidding us "Farewell to the Gold", two popular and well-performed songs. Pete and Liz then told of lambs on green hills and a Cuckoo, to herald spring and perhaps net them a job with Bill Oddie? Ron brought the first half to a stirring conclusion with his song written for the Morris Ring and then the patriotic "St George". He was even more popular when he offered the audience free cassettes of his own songs, recorded in the early 1990's.

The second half opened with most of the room's seats empty as the Band Of Folk all came to the front to play together two medleys, the first in waltz time and the second a couple of Morris jig tunes. Some of Hereburgh Morris will have danced jigs at the West Coast Ale in California by the time you read this. Up next was Ric, who had also planned to sing "Farewell to the Gold", but instead contented himself with "Little Jimmy Brown" and "The Loving of the Game". Peter Mason was in a more reflective mood this month with a song about the Troubles in Northern Ireland, followed by a song about emigration. Jane was next, singing powerfully and unaccompanied "The Loveliest of Trees" and "My Bitter-Sweet Bed", a song by Chris While. It is always good to see a performer marking their Harbury debut in style and Pete Stanner created quite an impact with his confident and charming presentation. He started with a song about sausages and then followed with a Jake Thackeray classic: "The Lodger". Great stuff. Des completed the second half with the popular shanty "Shallow Brown" and the powerful "Band Played Waltzing Matilda".

After a brief refuelling break at the bar, the third half got under way with Debbie Ellis' brother Darren making his debut. Although he apologised for not being a "folk" singer, his choice of "Leaving on a Jet Plane" and Neil Young's "Heart of Gold" were obviously ideal choices for the Harbury audience, who sang along enthusiastically. 
In the second game Jacob's early goal proved to be the match winner in an evenly fought contest with Jack covering well in defence.





This half term we have been talking about different types of transport and journeys. Mrs Casement has been putting her Engineering degree to good use by beginning a project with the children to construct a model of an airport this month complete with train links, terminal buildings, a runway, helicopter pad and car park, not forgetting the disabled space suggested by Lily. This is an ongoing project to run for the half term during which the children will also be constructing their own model aeroplanes. Our roleplay corner has been transformed into a travel agency



New Term - With the Easter holidays behind them, the children returned to Pre-School full of enthusiasm for the new term. We are delighted to welcome Hattie who has already settled in with her new friends.

We have begun the term by looking at more shapes, including triangles and ovals, identifying different shapes in our environment and incorporating them into drawings, paintings and collages.

Science - During the first week, our scientific experiment involved the use of cornflour, both dry and after water had been added. The children enjoyed picking up the mixture as a lump in their hands and were fascinated by the way it liquefied and ran out through their fingers.

Summer Theme - With our summertime theme involving farms and gardens, the sand



tray gave way to a tray of compost in which the children could dig with their trowels, filling pots and planting flowers. 

We all enjoyed the talk and slides shown by our speaker at the last meeting on April 3rd. Judy Berrow is the county organiser for Worcestershire Gardens included in the famous Yellow Book for The National Gardens Scheme. The Scheme was founded in 1927, when 600 gardens were open to the public to raise money for nurses of the Queen's Nursing Institute. In 1948 a Liverpool philanthropist William Rathbone was responsible for starting the District Nursing Service. We were shown some lovely old slides of past District Nurses on all forms of transport.

Last year over 3500 gardens were open and a staggering sum of two million pounds was raised, all of which went to various charities mainly Macmillan and Marie Curie Cancer Care nurses plus other nursing organisations. The NGS also sponsors 15 trainee gardeners for the National Trust.


Worcestershire gardens contributed £65,000.00 in 2006 which was an amazing amount when you consider that the weather wasn't always kind to visitors.

Judy has recently been involved in filming for a new series of Open Gardens, as she said it's not always easy doing your job assessing gardens etc with a TV crew following you everywhere. They spend all day filming and then at the end of it only a few minutes are actually shown on TV. Once a garden is accepted and opening dates agreed there is still a lot of work to do. Posters need to be displayed, then on the open days ticket sellers are needed plus any extra help with plant sales and refreshments. Gardens of all sizes are included from tiny back gardens to large ones. Some gardens open as early as February when the snowdrops start to make an appearance. We were shown some excellent slides of some of the Worcestershire Gardens starting with Dial Park at Chaddesley Corbett where there are over 300 different types of snowdrops to see. A glorious white garden at Birtsmorton Court near Malvern was seen plus newly planted potager. Luggers Hall in Broadway was a stunning garden with numerous roses, parterre, walled garden and many other features. We also saw some slides of Spetchley Gardens which we are visiting in June; it has been undergoing a major overhaul so there will be much to see. Astley Town House at Stourport on Severn looks to be a fascinating garden to visit it boasts a revolving classical summerhouse. There were more slides of lovely gardens and I'm sure many of us will be visiting some of these this year. We also were shown slides of a garden not now included in the Scheme where herons had been raiding the pond. The lady of the house actually caught the heron as she was so annoyed with it! When you consider the size of a heron; it was no mean feat.

We were given copies of Worcestershire gardens booklets and I also have some copies of the Warwickshire gardens booklets which I will bring to the next meeting on 1 May. Just a quick mention about the Bursary which was won by Jill Brazil at the December meeting. She and her friend Pat spent a very pleasant day at Ryton Gardens last month learning the art of Willow Weaving. Nice to know that the Bursary has been used and enjoyed.

Thank you to everyone who contacted me about the day trip and the Garden Walkabout. Only 3 spaces left on the coach which I'm confident I will be able to fill. I will know more about numbers etc for the Walkabout after our next committee meeting and will write more in my next article. Looking forward to our last meeting of the season on 1st May when David Edmonds will be giving a talk about getting ready for Chelsea. I will be making my usual pilgrimage to the Chelsea Flower Show in May so it will be nice to get some inside information.

As promised in last month's article this will be from 'abroad'. Australia has the advantage, for English speakers, of being an easy place to get around when asking for directions although, in terms of terrain, it can often be harsh. Sharon has many cousins 'down under' and we are indebted to them and our friends Graham & Gay McLean from Sydney for getting us to some places off the beaten track.

Flying into Cairns it's all blue ocean stretching to the Great Barrier Reef and steep, tropical, forested mountains rising from the narrow, coastal beit to the Atherton Tableland at over 1000mts. I enjoyed a quava from a tree growing at the side of the road, while out on cousin Graham's bike and we were entranced by Kookaburras sitting on the overhead wires by a creek. This large kingfisher is not colourful like ours, having the appearance of wearing a dun coloured fur coat. It is a ferocious hunter, particularly of snakes and amphibians. With the latter in mind, the story of the Cane Toad could be a metaphor for what has happened to Australia during the last 200 years. In the 1930's, the sugar cane growers of North Queensland were menaced by a beetle which could reduce yields in a bad year by 90%. Someone came up with the idea of introducing Cane Toads. Unfortunately, this had little effect on the beetle or its grub, but ate indigenous species, and has now become a plague, with these huge toads spreading to all parts of the country except the West. Feral (introduced) species, particularly rabbits and cats, have put great pressure on the native fauna and flora; and it does not end there. Great parts of the country looked fertile and ready for arable and pastoral farming-just clear the Bush and plough it up. However, the rainfall in great swathes of the country is low and long droughts frequent. Overgrazing and deforestation have depleted the thin soil. Now, a lot of land is past repair, and farming is retreating to irrigated zones and the coastal strip. Schemes such as the Snowy Mountain Dam built in the 1950's have backfired and rising salt levels in the Murray-Darling Basin are proving hard to combat.


Enough moaning; on to the wildlife. We visited limestone caves at Chillagoe, 200K west of Cairns. A cheerful Ranger named Bob was our guide. As well as impressive stalactites, we saw Swiftlets nesting in the caves, which can find their way in and out by echo-location. We were told about, but didn't see, a snake which lives down there. It feeds on bats as they roost and uses a heat sensor to locate its prey. The rocks around Chillagoe are rich in minerals as in Carboniferous times; a line of volcanoes bordered the continental shelf. Chillagoe had a copper smelter served by a railway line from 1904-1943. Now the population is under 300.

We spent 4 days in Sydney with friends who live on the North Shore. We kayaked in some of the harbour creeks where pelicans were a common sight. I was intrigued by the mangrove's method of seed dispersal. The pod is a weighty lance about 20cms long. This plummets to earth when ripe and finds its home in the tidal mud beneath it's parent. Roots soon anchor it in and leaves sprout to extend the grove. From Sydney, we visited another cousin in Dubbo 400kms to the west. Our highlights there were the mobs of Kangaroos moving rapidly across country. The physiology of their muscles is similar to a coiled spring. Compression releases energy for the next bound. Although we never saw an Echidna (one of only 2 monotremes in the world - the other is the Duck-Billed Platypus); we saw its shiny black sausage shaped faecal pellet. The colour reflects its diet of beetles and ants. Talking of the latter, the large green ants of the tropics are difficult to avoid. Brush against some vegetation and they will climb aboard. They cling on and deliver a nip which is quite painful.

At Canowindra, south of Dubbo is a fossil fish museum. There, in 1956, many new species of late Devonian era (360 million years ago) armoured fish were found in a state of excellent preservation when slabs of rock were levered up to widen the road.

Travelling on to South Australia, we camped and trekked in the Flinders Ranges. Here the Cambrian rock strata (600million years old) was first pushed into a crumpled dome by earth movements. Through aeons of weathering all that remains of the once lofty mountains are the resistant sides of the dome where the strata are vertical, like a set of teeth. Here we went through a gorge and traversed 100 million years from late Precambrian with primitive algal colonial fossils known as Stromatolites to Cambrian with now extinct fossil sponges known as Archaecyathans. Since being recognised as fossils, living Stromatolites have been found on the sea floor at several places round the world.

Yes, Australia, having been isolated since the break up of Gondwanaland some 100 million years ago, is a fascinating place with its unique flora and fauna.



The A.G.M. of the Village Hall Management Committee held in April was chaired by Peggie Middleton and attended by all members of the committee apart from Gill Gurden who gave her apologies. Ann Winchester and David Johnson attended as members of the public, but by the end of the meeting David had been elected to hold the important position of Treasurer. Keith Thompson who was unable to be present at the meeting had indicated that he would be willing to serve on the committee and he was duly elected in his absence.



The meeting was a momentous occasion for the Village Hall Committee, as both Peggie and Bill, who had acted as treasurer for 19 vears. announced that they wished to retire after their long service looking after the affairs of the Geoff Thorpe, Vice Hall. Chairman took over the role as Chairman and expressed welldeserved thanks to Bill and Peggie in appreciation of their tireless commitment to the maintenance of the Hall. The the committee presented couple with two stone rose planters with container roses, a

garden voucher and an arrangement of flowers prepared by Muglestons, in recognition of their unstinting efforts over the years.

In her final report, Peggie stated that there had been increased hiring of the Hall during the past year, as well as a pleasing drop in vandalism to the property. She reported that the Harbury Tapestry, made by the W.I. had been hung on one of the end walls and it was a welcome addition to the appearance of the Main Hall. She referred to the regular use of the premises by the Badminton teams, the Drop in club for young people and the use of the changing facilities, (which were well past their 'sell-by' date), by the junior and senior football teams. Bill reported that from the time he had taken over as Treasurer, there had been an increase in the cash flow, which had allowed improvements to parts of the heating and ventilation systems, whilst grants and donations had been used for the purchase of the temporary staging.

Geoff Thorpe, as Chairman of the Steering Group presented a report to the committee on the significant developments, which had resulted in the formation of a sub-group of the Management Committee during last year. A meeting involving all the principal Hall users had identified the need to upgrade various areas of the premises and this had led to proposals to modernise and extend the property. The main ideas involved preserving the main Hall, but demolishing the flat-roofed extensions, which will require significant maintenance in future years. The main improvements had been identified as upgraded changing/ shower rooms, new toilet facilities with special provision for the disabled and for baby changing, a permanent stage, as well as a specific bar area and additional flexible function rooms.

All of these proposals have been reported in the H&L News in recent months and have been translated into architect's plans. The application to the Big Lottery, which has exercised members of the Steering Group for several months, has been sent in to meet the end of April deadline. The outcome in several months time will be awaited with bated breath. In the meantime, several other sources of funding are being researched and the modernisation of the Hall will be dependent on the level of financial support made available. It will be a case of 'cut our cloth' according to the money raised, but there will be no 'quick fix', as deliberation on all grant requests takes many months to come to fruition.



company secretary at Building and Plumbing Supplies in Learnington and they chose a property in Neales Close for their first home. Almost on arrival, in the village, Peggie joined the W.I. and became one of a group of volunteers who manned the coffee bar once a month at Hatton Hospital, outside Warwick. Both Bill and Peggie joined the Harbury School PTA and they assisted with the Swimming Pool development, which was a major project for the village at the start of the 70's.

Whilst the children were attending the local schools, Peggie did some 'temping' and then became the receptionist/telephonist at Learnington Town Hall, which capitalised on the skills she had developed as one of the GPO's 'Hello Girls' when she worked in the main city office in Sheffield. Both Bill and Peggie still retained the interest in badminton which had brought them together and they eventually joined a club which played regularly in the Memorial Hall at Bishops' Itchington at a time when Harbury's club was over-subscribed. Eventually Peggie decided to form a Ladies Badminton Club and in the early days there were 20 ladies who met each Monday in the company of Joe Bamford (the well-remembered Harbury artist) who persuaded Peggie that he would be an asset to the Club.

In 1983, Bill was elected on to the Parish Council and he served for a total of 16 years, acting as the Chairman for 4 years. In the year immediately following his election, Bill joined the Village Hall committee as the Parish Council representative and Peggie joined the committee shortly afterwards as the W.I. representative. They have served on the committee since that time and have worked with many stalwarts of the village, including Brian Ingram, Gill Gurden, Midge Keen, and Ethel Sollis, who have worked hard to maintain the Hall in its present condition.

As a result of their commitment, the Hall has been regularly serviced and checked and several improvements have been made to the heating, the kitchen fittings and temporary stage was purchased.

Bill and Peggie have been involved in other village activities jointly, including assisting with Meals on Wheels, attending the Harbury Society meetings and the Saturday Coffee Mornings in the Tom Hauley room. For the past 5 years, they have also opened their delightful garden in Penelope Close for the Horticultural Society's Garden Walkabout. Peggie is a member of the Harbury Friends group, which enjoys a series of outings and get-togethers during the year. She is now secretary of the W.I. and is on the WRVS team, formed two years ago, which responds to any emergency in the immediate area. Within a month of joining the team, Peggie was called on to respond to the 'siege of Harbury' when 50 policemen descended on the village to deal with a domestic argument, which had spiralled out of control. On this occasion, tea and biscuits were provided for members of the Warwickshire Constabulary when they held their debriefing session in the Village Hall, after the successful conclusion of their raid involving a resident brandishing a firearm.

Peggie has recently taken on the organisation of the Thursday Club, which provides an opportunity for a social get-together during the afternoon for Senior Citizens. The Club was formerly known as the Golden Age Club and has been run for many years by Beryl Checkley. Peggie is helped in this latest endeavour by Midge Keen and Pam Parton and over 20 Senior Citizens are currently attending the tea and biscuit socials in the Village Hall. In addition to this contribution, Peggie has been a committed member of the W.I.'s Drama section and for more years than she wishes to recall, has been part of the walking tableaux, which involve many members of the organisation in producing spectacular costumes for the annual Harbury Carnival. Each year the ladies dazzle the crowds with their impressive 'get-ups'. which are all hand-made following a decision about the theme for group's contribution. According to Peggie this is a time when she is briefly disowned by Bill, since for many of their current activities, they are very supportive of each other's roles and enjoy similar challenges.

Scout Hut Progress!

The new roof has now been put in place, replacing the <u>1940</u> vintage roof sheets! The level of insulation is now right up to modern building and environmental standards. The kitchen has been re-wired and, shortly, the new gas heating system will be plumbed in and connected. This complements the very major refurbishment and new Toilet Block undertaken by SHAK in 1998 (which excluded the roof).

Finally, in early May, the kitchen will be newly fitted out, including proper ovens and hobs. This will enable the groups to work on cookery badges and other community members to learn cooking. Costs have escalated since we applied for funds so we need to raise a further £5,000 or so in order to complete the work as we have planned. The first events towards this target will be the food for the Beer Festival and a Retro Disco Night, both in September.

It will be wonderful to re-open the improved Scout Hut in the year that Scouting celebrates its 100th anniversary; we will announce some opening day celebrations in a coming issue. We were also delighted to hear recently that a new Guide group will be starting in Harbury, after a gap of at least six years. There will then be about 150 youngsters using the Scout Hut every week, something about which the village should be very pleased.

As well as our own funds raised over more than 5 years from village events, we have benefited from grants from the following bodies: Harbury Parish Council, Stratford District Council Community Fund, County Council Youth Opportunities Fund and the Local Network Fund.

Personally speaking, it has been heart-warming to see how strongly the village has got behind us: from the Parish Council whose grant 'kicked off' the grant application phase, the village Carnival and other societies who have made donations to GASS, the Wight School Trustees who have supported us, through to the lady (who shall remain nameless) who stopped me in the street to make a small cash donation two weeks ago. Thank you all.

Please remember that GASS still needs to raise funds once the building work is over! It costs over £1,500 per year just to keep the building heated, insured and clean. So you'll still be seeing GASS events for many years to come.

Footpath Volunteers



The Harbury Parish Paths Team has been busy over the winter We dealt with several trees blown across our public footpaths by the gales early in the year and spread eight tonnes of stone on the path that runs across Chesterton House Farm and along the top of the railway cutting. This path suffers popular particularly from the wet weather. Almost all the team were involved plus welcome volunteers from the doa walking community. Thanks to Mr Trice and his team for help in shifting the stone and to Network Rail. There's one stretch left to do in the Autumn.

You may have noticed that stone has also been spread along the path linking The Beeches to Binswood End Green. This was done by volunteers from The Beeches. For some reason the path is not listed as an official public right of way. We are looking into this.

You may have also noticed that a number of stiles towards Chesterton have been replaced by galvanised gates. Most of the new gates are on County Council land. It is the County Council's policy to replace stiles with these gates whenever the opportunity arises. They are great for the less agile and dog walkers and require no maintenance, but I know some walkers prefer the traditional timber stiles.

Next month we start our Spring clearance programme, cutting back new growth from the paths to keep them open and useable. If you want to join us or you see a particular obstruction that needs dealing with please give me a ring on 612792.

Pipped by Cumbria

Warwickshire and the Midlands clocked off as the nation sprung into British Summer Time at 1.00am on March 25th. The hour forward switchover was co-ordinated by two caesium atomic clocks housed in BT antennae at Rugby Radio Station, which has been the source for the British Time Signal since 1927 and helped keep the pips, heard on BBC Radio Services, accurate. From next year the time change will be marshalled by a different telecommunications company called VT Communications, who will transmit from the Ministry of Defence site at Anthorn in Cumbria.

BT lost the contract to transmit the time signal, which is accurate to within one thousandth of a second of universal time. When Summer Time commenced six days later, the British Time Signal sounded pip, pip and goodbye from Rugby after 80 years when the two controlled atomic clocks stopped at midnight Saturday March 31st. The new company stepped in one hour later 1.00am GMT to sound the first pips for April. Rugby Radio Station goes back to the 1920's; it was unique to this country. The originator of the station was the GPO who, incidently, built an early computer.



I thought it might be an idea to visit the famous station before it disappeared from view. I did this a short while later on Good Friday Bank Holiday. On arrival at the large BT antennae, I heard local residents say that the ten very high masts had been felled (after a 'hiccup' caused

by rabbits), by explosives at 4 o'clock one morning last year. I looked at the station name board and walked up the drive to the entrance. From there I was able to see the mast responsible for transmitting this last signal just a few days earlier. Glancing around, most of the remaining masts were small in height in comparison to the other ones dotted about. There were too many to count. What a sad end, the station gates were locked and the place deserted. This site at Hillmorton has been earmarked for a residential development of around 900 dwellings even though a local survey favours a more green solution.

How many people can remember that the GPO once had their own film unit called the Brown Film unit. The Brown logo and signature tune was trademark. During the war effort days and afterwards, they produced short films for the Ministry of Information. These films were mainly of a propaganda nature, usually screened before the feature film in cinemas, where, when wet, people queued outside with umbrellas.
