

Public Participation – Concern was expressed about an occupied caravan in a field behind Ladbroke Farm and off the Ladbroke bypass. This has been reported to Stratford District Council.

Matters Arising – Regarding the Parish website, councillors are to attend a design meeting in Stratford.

Sandbags – Sandbags can be obtained free from Stratford District Council for storage in the village, and bins can also be provided for sand storage. These are for use in times of flooding.

Trees – The provision of the free trees hasn't had a very enthusiastic response except on Ladbroke Hill Farm. These are to be applied for.

Neighbourhood Watch – Volunteer co-ordinators are needed in various areas around the village eg Ladbroke Hall

Parish plan – A housing survey is to accompany the plan when it goes to the District Council. Affordable housing would be allowed in Ladbroke only if there is a need. Councillors would discuss this at a separate meeting.

Village Hall – A date for an AGM is to be announced soon. Members of the Village Hall Committee are each to have separate special duties with regard to the Hall.

Millennium Green - Race Night on 29th September raised £700.

The Parish newsletter - stimulated lots of interest, many email addresses have been received.

County Councillors Report

Bishops Bowl's masterplan is going forward – it looks good. The fire at Ufton landfill site – The area of the fire still cannot be used until the cause of the blaze has been established. Plans are being made for a recycling centre at Ufton.

"Tom-Toms" have been redesigned so that heavy lorries will not be directed down country lanes or side roads.

Ladbroke Road (Folly Lane) concern was expressed about heavy traffic using this lane, especially when Bishops Bowl has been developed, also now there are weight restrictions through Deppers Bridge. There apparently should be new roads for heavy vehicles in

the masterplan. The bridleways through Harbury and Ufton will be maintained. Concerns about disrupting these have been noted.

Meeting closed at 21.08, the next meeting is November 21st at 7.45pm.

A Summary of the Flood Meetings

The Conclusions -

The culvert capacity on the west side of Banbury Road has only half the water capacity it needs. The swale work (ditches) carried out on the by-pass to divert flood water are too shallow and should be longer.

The direction of the flow of water off the by-pass should be reviewed.

The ditches in Radbourne Lane need clearing urgently.

The brook to the east (past Sarah's Cottage) is heavily overgrown. Where tree roots are a problem, these and the trees can be removed.

Much of the work to alleviate the flooding of Bridge Cottage and Attwood Cottage can be carried out by the property owners (work will be done quicker than waiting for the authorities!) This was more or less suggested by the Flood Defence Officer.

To alter the capacity of the culvert under the Banbury Road Bridge would cost something like £20,000 per household in the village. Remedies need to be found urgently.



Ladbroke Millennium Green Trust AGM

Those present in the Village Hall heard Kip Warr, Chairman, give the report from the previous year. Apart from the general meetings, the Trustees had come together one Saturday morning as a work party to cut back overgrown vegetation - and if you look on the web site www.warkcom.net/ladbrokegreen you will see Paul, our esteemed Treasurer, wielding an old fashioned scythe.

Thanks were given to Malcolm Norgate, who arranged the felling of the poplar trees against the Southern boundary and the removal of the fallen branches. Two years ago Carole Loftus invited us to close our eyes and imagine the rustling of grasses, the smell of wild flowers and the wafting of butterflies on the wildflower meadow (at the time the meadow was more like a weed patch). Thanks to a year of intensive work we are much closer to Carole's vision; better (and more work) is yet to come.

Our major fund raising efforts, the Quiz (thanks to Peter and Janet Goldson), the Toys for the Boys event and the Race Night, had raised enough to pay for the routine annual maintenance and insurance of the Green. The Treasurer reported that net income was down from the previous year, and we are constantly looking for new activities.

A major consideration during recent AGMs has been the proposal to install more play equipment on the Green. During the past year we have finally achieved a necessary change to our trust deed through the Charity Commissioners – the first Millennium Green Trust to do so – and obtained planning permission from Stratford. Our major application for a grant from Lottery funds was refused, so we are looking at doing the development in two phases. The first phase is the addition of a toddlers' swing and other changes in the children's play area. The second is a swing for older children and a fitness trail.

The good news of the past week is that the Alibone Trust has generously given us a grant of £2,500 for the purchase and installation of toddlers' swings. We are now in the happy position of being able to place the order for the first phase. Fund raising continues and Derek Batty hopes to raise some money from a new Lottery fund administered by Stratford District Council.

We now have all the Trust's paperwork together in one place; it would be very helpful to form them into an archive with an index for reference and we should be very glad to hear of any volunteer who would be interested in doing this.

There is a vacancy on the committee to temporarily replace Andy Pittaway who will be away for at least a year. Please be aware - The latest email scam received by the Trading Standards Service falsely claims to come from HM Treasury.

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Recipients of the email are told that the Treasury has 'calculated your tax payments in the last two years in UK. The amount is £2,419.13'. They are then invited to claim a refund by clicking on a link entitled "HM Treasury" in the email. The link directs the recipient to a suspicious website.

Recipients are advised not to click on the link and to delete the email immediately. By clicking on the link recipients could expose themselves to malware and viruses, or may end up being asked to pay money in advance to receive their "refund'.

Maybe it was because the meeting only took one and a quarter hours, that dog fouling and bollards seem to dominate. There was good news as well as bad. Harbury got a Gold Award in the Best Kept Village Competition.

There continues to be damage done to the play facilities and the chain barring entry from the car park to the Playing Field is repeatedly vandalised. The Parish Councillors spent some time debating the merits of installing CCTV to help identify these culprits and also those who allow their dogs to foul the fields. It was reported that the junior football pitch has to be cleared of ordure before the children can safely play a match. CCTV would be several thousand pounds with additional on-going costs whereas bollards have a one off cost of about £700 but they of course don't identify the "dog foulers".

Then there was the problem of the new Dog Waste bins. Cllr Hancock expressed disbelief that three new bins could create so much protest. However the Councillors have decided to move the bins and to change the Mill Street one for a green coloured bin, and place it, appropriately, near the Sewage Pumping Station.

Planning

The BMX project now has proper plans drawn up and local residents will be invited to see them before they are submitted for Planning Permission.

Stratford District Council granted permission for a change of use for land next to the Ranch House on Chesterton Road; a conversion at Stapenhall Farm; Conservatories at 19 South Parade and 19 the Beeches, an extension at Meadow Bank Hall Lane, reconstruction of chimneys at Harbury House and tree works at Lorne Cottage and at the Crown with a new kitchen for the pub too.

The Parish Council had no comment to make on entrance signs at the Quarries, a conservatory at Westfields, Hall Lane or an extension at West End Cottage, Mill Street. They made comments on the Quarries Masterplan, supporting calls for a bridleway linked to the village and footpaths to the Ufton Nature Reserve. They made strong objections to plans to demolish the recently extended Harbury Croft and replace it with an even bigger mansion.

Several Councillors had attended the Biffa exhibition on plans to extend the Ufton Tip and create Materials Recycling and Composting Facilities. They were pleased that new traffic guidelines would take the vehicles away from Butt Lane.

It seems that Deppers Bridge resistance to the County's preferred option of traffic lights on the Railway Bridge has served up some unexpected consequences. In particular there were complaints that the 64 bus that serves the hamlet now turns off at Ladbroke Road and villagers have to walk from there. The school children will have to walk to the Great Western to catch their bus and the refuse lorry has to turn round to avoid going over the bridge. Cllrs were concerned about the hardship caused to individuals. Still this is a trial with the installation of lights the default if the community decides it doesn't like the experiment.

Chairman, Tim Lockley reported no progress on Traffic Calming and laid the blame on the County Council.

With the resignation of Kevin Biddle to add to that of Karena Ellis the Council is now short of two members. Unless there are enough nominations for an election the Parish will decide to co-opt to fill the places.





The term has been moving on at a great pace towards the half term break. We were very pleased to welcome Hana and Charlotte to Pre School during October and they have settled in very well.

The Bears theme continued throughout the month, linked to all the areas of learning, while the children used their imagination and ingenuity to bring to life through their own ideas the various stories that formed the basis for the theme. The Goldilocks story was reproduced in lots of different ways, using the puppet theatre as well as dressing up and role play, drawing, painting and making furry collages and the children enjoyed looking at a wide variety of books about bears.

The Tom Hauley Room was almost bursting for our first meeting of the new season. It was lovely to see everyone including many new members.

What a way to start too! Barry Locke gave a talk about the gardens of the Shakespeare Birthplace Trust to start with. The Trust is a registered charity and is dependant on revenue from visitors. Therefore all of the five gardens need to be in pristine condition, colourful and have the "wow" factor. This they certainly did have, in fact, Hall's Croft has won Strafford in Bloom many times and has been awarded a certificate of merit from The Heart of England.

It was not difficult to see how these awards had been won; the dedication of the small team of gardeners was obvious. The bedding plants are all grown at their own nurseries, Hill nurseries in Welcombe Road, which is open to the public.

The knot garden at Nash's House has 4000 plants surrounded by yew hedges. The colour combinations were a visual delight and the plants

are changed annually. Anne Hathaway's Cottage suffered from the flooding this year and the gardens were 3 feet deep in water for about four days. Once the waters had subsided all of the plants had to be hosed down but most of them survived. There are 23 acres here including a l6th Century vegetable garden. The orchard too has many old trees. There are two more gardens at Mary Arden's Cottage and obviously at Shakespeare's Birthplace. These too are beautifully planted so there is much to see.

If you are interested in visiting the Nurseries or the Gardens and would like more information, the telephone contact number is 01789 201826. There is also a website www.shakespeare.org.uk. I must admit that I didn't know about the Nurseries and I suspect that not too many of us did, so why not pay it a visit?

Barry then went on to talk about the preparation and eventual showing of the gardens at Gardeners World in 2005. The budget for all of it was £40,000 and growing 3000 plus plants was started at the nurseries in 2004. In order to replicate the flower meadow, seeds were sown in individual trays which were put together later. All of the plants remained in pots at the Show Garden but none of the pots were visible. A miniature thatched cottage was also built. The finished garden looked sensational and it did win a Gold medal and best in show. They had 14 days in which to construct the garden on site and in fact finished well within the allotted time. The garden had many famous visitors including Prince Charles who commented on the stocks in front of the cottage. He said that these were Granny's favourite plants! What a fantastic achievement at their very first attempt. I remember seeing the garden at Gardeners World and it was stunning.

Barry then finished off with a wonderful PowerPoint presentation which showed plants and music moving across the screen and was amazing.

Everyone enjoyed the evening and it did cheer us all up. I do hope that we get at least two more members on the Committee but I will write about the AGM in my next article. All of the committee work very hard to ensure that the society continues to expand and to provide our members with good speakers, trips, the Show, the Walkabout and discounts at various nurseries.

Do come along on the first Tuesday of each month until May next year. At the December meeting there will be a Quiz followed by a festive buffet with prizes to be won. Something for everyone I'm sure you agree. Look forward to seeing everyone.

Nature Notes

As I write (Sunday 21st October), the weather is dominated by high pressure with a south easterly airflow. There is little or no wind and clear skies at night mean frosty mornings. With the sun low in the sky at this time of year, it can be several hours before the temperature rises sufficiently to burn off the mist and dispose of frost. Yesterday, the frost hollow of the Salt Way, as it runs through Knightcote Bottoms, was particularly cool as I cycled along it at 9.00am. The narrow strip of tarmac is bordered on its northern side by a wide, unimproved verge, rich in grass and flower species, with a well maintained ditch and hedge.

Prior to the 18th century Enclosure Acts, the field patterns would have been largely those of medieval times. The track, as its name suggests, started as a route transporting salt from Droitwich (Roman Salinae) towards the eastern counties. Packhorses would have been used. Their use, rather than wheeled vehicles, might seem strange, but the roads were uneven, full of potholes, and often just mire. Until the coming of turnpikes, wheeled transport was slow, laborious and subject to frequent breakdown. The Enclosure Acts brought order to the scene but also cut down the area of free (common) grazing. Most roads were standardised at a width of 40 feet between boundaries which were formed of quick growing thorn in this area of the Midlands. The actual road surface was much narrower and formed of crushed stone in the days before tarmac.

The wide verges, ditches and hedges of roads like Bush Heath Lane are a relict of the ordering of the landscape. Now, we view it as quintessentially English but it's really less than 300 years old. In the Salt Way hedgerow, trees abound. A few Elm suckers had reached 25 feet before succumbing to Dutch elm disease. Once, Warwickshire lanes were shaded by giant Elms and their loss in the 1970's has denuded the countryside. Between Grange Farm and Holmes House on the back road into Bishops Itchington, a section of trunk from one of these giants of the recent past lies forlorn in the undergrowth. I measured it's circumference at 8.5 metres (28 feet).

To some extent, the Ash has taken over the Elm's hedgerow role. In the tornado blitz that hit the Midlands on September 24th, lots of Ash trees snapped halfway up their trunks, as, at the time, they had a full complement of leaves. Many of course survived and a similar wind

now would probably only strip the leaves which are falling in droves anyway. The reds and yellows of autumn leaves which are so attractive are due to a drop in the amount of chlorophyll, the green pigment essential for photosynthesis. This dominates throughout spring and summer as the tree produces sugar and grows. The other coloured chemicals are always there and come to the fore in autumn.

It's surprising how many old names have got a connection with wood and therefore trees. Ash itself is from the Anglo-Saxon 'aesc' which means spear. Just think of some common surnames like Turner, Carpenter, Wright, Sawyer, and Cooper. Then there are places-Oakenshaw, Thornthwaite, Ashfield, Yewsley, Maplehurst. I'm sure you can think of lots more. You've guessed it-I've been to Westonbirt Arboretum. Closer to home, the complex of Ryton and Wappenbury Woods near Princethorpe is crisscrossed with paths and worth exploring.

With the quarries so much in the news, it's good to report something positive and really special. Mavis and David Taylor watched spellbound in September as an Osprey dived in front of them. It would have been on its migration route south from Scotland or Scandinavia. Harbury Quarry and its lake provided a peaceful unpolluted fishing opportunity for this iconic bird.

Look out for Harlequin Ladybirds. They have arrived from Europe and are spreading north. Originally from Asia they were introduced to North America and Europe as a biological control agent. However, they are slightly larger and more voracious than our native ladybirds. They feed on the same insects, mostly aphids (Greenfly) and coccids (scale insects) as ours but will also eat our ladybird larvae and breed faster.

Jack Watkins, (the warden at Leam Valley Nature Reserve), showed some Harlequins to children at St Paul's Primary School. In no time at all, he was rewarded with specimens the children had found. For details, see the Field Studies Council publication on ladybirds. It has excellent enlarged colour pictures (www.field-studies-council.org). Ladybirds are in the order Coleoptera (beetles) and the family coccinellidae (clad in scarlet). Of course, they are not all red with black spots.

Warwickshire Wildlife Trust has just published their guide to local nature reserves.-'Discover Wild Warwickshire' at £12.99. A Christmas present perhaps?

Members of the committee went to Stratford to view the projection equipment and the screen and were impressed by the quality of the picture, the sound and by the size of the screen. All that is needed now is a good audience to make it a worthwhile venture.

However, we hope you think we did a good job and from the feedback we have had it is heartening to know everyone enjoyed themselves. Even the weather improved so that by mid-day it was fine and fairly warm. We were also lucky to obtain the services of Mr Hawkesworth and his Street Organ as there was an organ convention on the same day and we had difficulty finding anyone who could come to the Fayre. We must mention Indi Long who entertained us for ages with her dancing in front of the organ - it was something special and much appreciated.

Due to Health & Safety rules and regulations, we are no longer allowed to have the Pig Roast in the Street, which is a shame. However, we are able to site it in the Gamecock garden (many thanks) and Eddie did very well. Thanks to him also for his donation.

Stratford Volunteer Centre

The Volunteer Centre Stratford-on-Avon provides transport for people with a genuine need, to keep essential appointments with doctors, dentists, hospitals and day centres, etc.

Requests for help come from a variety of sources, such as, hospitals, voluntary groups and individuals. Requests may be regular or on a one-off basis. The transport is provided by volunteer drivers using their own cars and having their expenses reimbursed at a rate set by Warwickshire County Council. (Currently 40p per mile for authorised journeys.)

People wishing to use this service contact their nearest area offices situated in Alcester, Southam, Stratford and Shipston, giving at least 3 days notice of their requirements.

The Centres also transport people to day care centres on behalf of Social Services and the South Warwickshire Combined Care NHS Trust (Mental Health), Warwickshire Association of the Blind and others.

Clarissa Roberts, Volunteer Centre Manager, told us that in the last 12 months, they had provided transport for over 25,000 passengers, provided by a team of over 200 drivers. Now there is an urgent need to recruit more volunteer drivers in Alcester, Shipston, Southam, Stratford and the surrounding villages." We are looking for people who have the time, care and patience and with a genuine interest in helping others. Some of the volunteers drive on a regular basis whilst others choose to help on an occasional basis".


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
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Dear Editors
