

I have just been reading a small but wonderful book by the Bishop of Reading called 'Do nothing to change your life'. It's about the joy of discovering what happens when you stop! Although the little book is primarily for Christians, everyone would benefit from reading it I am sure.

One of the chapters is entitled 'plumbing the depths of a single moment' and invites us to enjoy the 'moment' rather than dwelling on the past or worrying and fretting about the future. The moment, the here and now, is a gift from God. We can so easily be preoccupied with what we've got to do, the deadlines we have to meet, the people we need to see etc that we miss the moment for what it is. Someone at church the other week said to me that they long for silence and stillness in their lives and in worship too. The more I meet and talk with people the more I see this longing just simply to be and find this sense of stillness within.

We are introducing a new pattern for our first Sunday of the month evening services at Harbury from this August in an aim to provide people with the opportunity for a little more stillness, quietness and reflection within worship. Apologies were received from W.C Councillor Bob Stevens, Janice Berry, (who is making a good recovery after her operation) and the police.

Matters arising – Radbourne Lane was examined by the Highways Inspector, the road was "alright" but need tarring and gritting. The Inspector – Gez Romano – also inspected the gullies in the roads through the village.

The Noticeboard – A new noticeboard can be purchased using a Public Realm Grant and "matching Funds". The council discussed the possibility of buying a second noticeboard to be situated by the Millennium Green for public use. This will leave the existing board free for Council notices only.

Planning applications – Both the plans for Attwood Cottage and Dovecote have been approved.

The Police Report – (no police presence). An old green car (no make or number given) had driven up to a house in Ladbroke, the three occupants got out and went around the property, when they saw the householder they then got back in the car and left. Some discussion followed at the meeting about our Neighbourhood Watch coordinators. Are there any volunteers about please? Each area of the village should have a co-ordinator with someone they can report to.

Footpaths – These are always an item on the agenda but we never get an update on maintenance or any other report. The Footpaths "Inspector" is a voluntary job, but the appointment is through the County Council.

Parish Plan – The parish council have examined the parish plan and have made several comments which they wish to discuss with the steering group. A meeting is to be arranged with all parties concerned, including the District Councillor.

The Village Hall – no report given. The council were wondering if the Village Hall Committee were in a position to start applying for grants for the new building.

Millennium Green – A safety report on the new equipment has been passed. Phase two for upgrading the trail area is being considered. A grant is to be applied for this.

Website – There is more monies available until May 2009 for plan developments. Some are already initiated.

District Councillors Report – A 50 mph restriction is "on the agenda" at the District Council for the A423 from Southam to the county boundary (at Farnborough). Police will have to observe the control of the speeding.

The new refuse and recycling will start in Ladbroke on August 8th. There is a delay distributing the wheelie bins – they are in short supply – a German firm is making them. We are assured they will be distributed by August 8th. The new scheme will be going ahead. **Grey**

Lid Bins – rubbish – collected every week. Blue Lid Bins and Green Lid Bins collected fortnightly. Green Bins will not be emptied from November through to April. All of this information is in the council review magazine. The helpline telephone number is 01789 260925. The website is www.stratford.gov.uk

Telephone Box – Zero usage – as it is in a conservation area it is illegal to remove a "building" without permission. The general feeling is that we would like to keep the phone box. In which case we may have to pay BT to come and remove the telephone equipment there-in.

The car parking in the District is under review - I say no more!

There are 'Welcome Packs' available from the District Council for newcomers to the village, giving a history of the area and all useful information. It was agreed that our own history of Ladbroke booklet should be updated.

The next Parish Council meeting is on 17th September. This meeting closed at 9.32pm.

Parish Council

Public Participation - Mrs Janet Watts was present to inform the Council that she was taking on a unit at Bull Ring Business Centre and was applying for a change of use to run her "Fragrant Room" shop from there. She had already received permission from the Church for her customers to use the Wight School Car Park and have only a modest sign in her shop window.

Chairman Tim Lockley hoped the Council would support her as they wanted to see more businesses in the village.

Police Report - Pc Hill reported the village had suffered two burglaries; police had taken and passed on to Folletts the names of nine people trespassing at the Quarries. The theft of scrap metal was increasing. Two weeks ago there were nine vehicles involved in this area and two teams had been apprehended in the Shipston area recently. The police had stopped a lot of HGVs from using Deppers Bridge Railway Bridge although fewer lorries were now ignoring the weight limit.

The good news was that there had been no major trouble with youths after this year's Carnival. Southam Officers had confiscated alcohol and cleared the field by 9pm. Cllr Keith Thompson asked that the Council recorded its appreciation of the police action. The officers working with the young people had been outstanding. The Chairman said the installation of bollards had helped to keep sound systems off the fields

Councillors' Corner - Bev Mann and Andrew Patrick, District Councillors reported the on-going saga of the green waste disposal. The new waste collection system would start in August but green bins would be collected until September and then not until the new commercial composting facility was available.

Deppers Bridge - Residents were waiting for the outcome of the consultation on the lorry ban but were worried that a continuation of the HGV prohibition would mean that the bus could not pass over the bridge. This was causing considerable inconvenience.

Planning - The Parish Council asked Stratford District to refuse the application to fell a protected Sycamore at 9 Pirie Close after their arboriculturalist inspected it and reported no fungal growth. They

complained about the lack of evidence to support the application to fell another Sycamore at Harbury Library. They asked that dormer windows should only be permitted on the east side of the garage of the Old Orchard, Mill Street and that they should have obscure glazing.

Parish Properties - Quotes are being sought for the BMX track and the Councillors will meet the potential contractors.

Glass has been cleared from the Skateboard Park and the Clerk is arranging for someone to repair the damage caused by vandals who burned the bottom of the ramp.

The Chairman asked if the roundabout had been oiled as he noticed it was squeaking and was rebuked by Cllr Thornley who said he was too old to be playing on it!

A new fence will be erected at the rear of the Village Hall and wooden bollards installed to prevent motorcyclists from using the path.

Clirs were confused by the quotes for the Cemetery Risk Assessment. The Clerk was given authority to appoint a contractor, but Clir Thompson advised that their work should be monitored.

Cllr Hancock reported that the Horticultural Society was not able to replant the Memorial Garden but that she had found volunteers to plan the layout. The seat might be replaced by something more vandal-proof.

Four old lighting columns in Manor Orchard are to be replaced.

Village Improvements were now proceeding. WCC's Senior Traffic Engineer was to draw up plans for traffic calming measures and provide costings.

There was a Speed Review on the Fosse and 430 metres of carriageway between south of Harbury Lane would be resurfaced during July/August. Cllr Hancock complained that the Knotweed had not been sprayed off and that the vegetation by the drain railings at Middle Road/Fosseway was obscuring vision.

The Parish Council is asking all householders to ensure their hedges and trees do not obstruct the view of the highway. The absentee owner of the Spinney, was reported to have given permission for coppicing of the trees next to Hall Lane.

Finance - The Council has formally signed the lease on an Office at the Bull Ring and has reviewed the Clerk's hours in the light of her changed working schedule. Councillors agonised over whether they should make a donation to Southam College towards the provision of an all-weather sports pitch, which was promised for community as well as school use. However, they have not yet received a formal request!

Harbury Parish Council, Quarterly Report

In the past three months the Parish Council has:

- monitored the effectiveness of the weight restriction at Deppers Bridge
- met with a traffic engineer from WCC about traffic calming,
- opened a new parish office,
- worked with the Village Hall Committee on repairs to the boundary fencing,
- organised for repairs to the playground, skate park and memorial garden, all of which have been vandalised,
- continued to make progress on the BMX track.

Annual Report for 2007 - 2008

Members 2007-08: Cllrs Mancell (Chairman), Lockley, Hancock, Grey

The precept for the current year 2008/9 has been increased by 2.5% to £58,667; this gives an increase of £1.46 per year on a Band 'D' property.

While there was a small overspend last year, 2007/8, on certain budget lines, the F&GP working party recommended to the full Parish Council that a 2.5% increase in the Parish Precept, would enable the Parish to fully fund its plans for the year 2008/9.

This level of Precept will allow the additional planned spending in the following areas;

Tree Maintenance – We will continue funding the tree maintenance program, now in year 2 of 3, that follows on from the Tree survey. This is a rolling three year plan for maintaining our trees within the village and the cemetery.

Play areas – Funding the routine maintenance and inspection costs along with the resurfacing of the baseball court area.

Tennis/Netball Club – Continuing the part funding of the sinking fund, for the maintenance of the court areas and the surrounding fencing.

\$137 – We have set our budget at £5,000 for this year and the Council is minded to spend these funds by targeting not just local groups, but specifically the local youth groups.

Village Hall Development – We have set aside funds to directly support the development plans for the Village Hall, this amount is provisionally set at £5,000.

Parish Office – The Council is considering plans to set up a Parish Office. This is to provide a manned office for the Council and a point of contact for parishioners who wish to get in touch with the Parish Council.

Parish Website – The development of the Parish Council website is now complete. The intention is to expand the pages available to include more Parish Groups, so that this site grows into a Harbury community website.

BMX Track – Funds have been made available to cover the planning applications and the ground preparation for this youth project.

A summary of last years accounts are shown below. This is well inline with our planned budgetary control. Copies of the full accounts are included in the Parish Council Annual Report.

Properties Working Party

The Properties Working Party looks after the Playing Fields, Cemetery and Village Greens. We are fortunate in Harbury in having a large area for recreational use which for the most part is used responsibly.

The safety of the play equipment is a priority and it is regularly subject to professional inspection and we aim to deal with identified problems promptly. The chain preventing vehicular access to the field from the car park has been repeatedly vandalised and has now been replaced with two retractable bollards. The fence around the tennis courts is in need of attention and this will be undertaken jointly by the Parish Council and the Tennis Club. The Council is currently working with the Village Hall Committee to improve the boundary at the rear of the Hall and quotations for the work are currently being sought.

Providing a BMX track at the top of the field is an ongoing project largely taken on by Councillor Thornley. Planning permission has been obtained and shortly the excess soil which has accumulated around the sides of the cemetery will be moved to the field for the construction or which grant aid is being pursued.

The path in the cemetery has been extended which makes access to graves much easier. A risk assessment has been carried out on the gravestones, a number of which are very unstable. It is proving extremely difficult to contact relatives and the Council is currently considering how best to undertake the work of making the loose headstones safe.

Dog mess is still a problem around the village. The Council has installed three new dog bins in Vicarage Lane, Bull Ring Farm Road, and Mill Street.

The small garden in Chapel Street has sadly become a problem area. The bench (in memory of Mr Cecil Parkhurst) has been vandalised and has been removed for repair and probable re-siting. The garden will be renovated and we have asked for the Horticultural Society's help with this. A larger litter bin will be installed and we are considering whether to replace the bench with a more robust form of seating.

I would like to thank my fellow Working Party members-Councillors Thompson, Thornley, Winchester and Knowles for their hard work over the last year. My particular thanks to Councillor Winchester who has now retired from the Council and will be much missed.

Police Report 2008

2007 saw a drop in recorded crime in Warwickshire which I'm sure you will agree is good news.

The SNT (Safer Neighbourhood Team) at Southam continues to work hard and has enjoyed several good results over the last twelve months. The SNT website has been commended for its content and has been forwarded to Her Majesties Inspector of Constabulary as an example of a well run site, which is something that we are rightly proud of.

The Southam farm watch e-mail system also continues to recruit members and is a vital link between the Police and the rural community, where exchanges of information are conducted at the touch of a button. Again excellent information has been received and acted upon and good results have been forthcoming.

The PACT (Partners and Communities Together) process has now become firmly established with quarterly meetings attracting a greater number of people. This process brings together people from across the Southam area and issues of community concern are discussed. After a vote by the persons present, the three main concerns are then targeted by the Police, Council or relevant authority and duly acted upon. The three current issues attracting our attention are 1) Nuisance youths. 2) Traffic and 3) Response. I know that Harbury is represented at these meetings but I must stress that if you want your voice heard then attendance is a must.

I am pleased that Harbury remains a relatively low crime area. One particular concern that I have is the issue of youths causing a nuisance and committing minor acts of damage within the village. I would ask all parents to know where their children are, and be accountable for their actions.

Once again I thank the community for their support and help during the last year.

Our Guided Tour of St Mary's Hall in Coventry was ably organised by Chairman John Hancock who reports:-

Coventry in the 14th Century was the fourth largest city in the land. Its medieval walls, gateways and buildings surpassed those of York and Chester. Unfortunately the air raids of the Second World War destroyed many of the old buildings and today we must search to find what is left. There is still plenty to see however and those Society members who visited on Sunday 13th July, learnt a lot about the city at

the heart of our county. It was a favourite residence of King Henry VI. He reputedly felt safer in Coventry than in London.

The city's wealth rested on wool from the Cotswolds and its independence owed a lot to the Trinity Guild with its headquarters at St Mary's Guildhall. Before that, four monasteries had been founded, perhaps the most famous being the Priory with its Cathedral endowed by Lady Godiva and Earl Leofric in the 11th Century.

So, Coventry had three cathedrals. The first was destroyed by Henry VIII at the time of the Dissolution of the Monasteries. The second was firebombed by the Luftwaffe on November 14th 1940. The third, designed by Sir Basil Spence, was consecrated in 1962.

All this and lots more was recounted by our excellent guide Roger Bailey. We were intrigued by the superb 15th Century tapestry in the Great Hall of St Mary's which depicted Henry VI and Margaret his Queen together with their households. Guildhall Admission is free from Easter to the end of September - Sunday to Thurs 10am to 4pm.

The undercroft of the Priory Cathedral is another gem and of course there are the ruins of the old St Michael's and the awe inspiring new cathedral. I am sure all those who came on the trip will want to follow it up as there is so much more to see than they had imagined when the visit was organised.

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

And finally Have a great Summer holiday and we'll see most of the children again at the start of next term, Tuesday 2nd September 2008.



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
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Retirement

We were lucky to enjoy the best possible weather for our two outings in June and July. Our first trip on 25th June was to the RHS gardens at Wisley. This really is the jewel in the crown of the RHS.

The new Glasshouse which was opened by the Queen last June had something for everyone to enjoy and appreciate. The plants were spectacular especially the orchids and the educational aspect was of an equally high standard. The grounds are extensive and so much to see, including a magnificent rock garden, alpine houses, wild garden, huge mixed borders, fruit fields, trial gardens, roses, pinetum and some superb model gardens.

There are many places to eat and picnic areas and shops and an enormous plant centre very well stocked. We all came back exhausted but pleasantly so! If you get the chance to visit there, 50 members of our society can thoroughly recommend it. It only took about 1 hour and 50 minutes by coach.

Our second trip was on 16th July. We first visited Ashwood Nurseries at Kingswinford an hour and a quarter away. The nursery gardens are pristine, not a weed in sight. After a welcome tea or coffee we were treated to a tour of the owner's private garden. John Massey has created this 3 acre garden over the last 7 years. It borders on to the Staffordshire and Worcester canal, what a backdrop. There is a huge pond which has all year round colour, but is especially stunning in spring with primroses, bulbs, alpines, trilliums and hepaticas. There are fine collections of trees, shrubs and conifers offset by island beds. The colour throughout was vibrant, John admits that his style of planting has been greatly influenced by the late and much missed Christopher Lloyd. Each individual area had so much attention to detail and his knowledge and enthusiasm was in evidence. We all enjoyed this tour of the garden so much and I know that many of us will be returning on one of the several open days. The next one will be on Saturday September 27th and all proceeds go to a local charity which this year is the Renal Unit at New Cross Hospital, Wolverhampton.

The Nursery has won Gold Medals at Chelsea and other RHS Shows for exhibits of Hellebores, Hardy Cyclamens, Hepaticas, Lewisias and Hydrangeas, easy to see why. The plant centre is also pristine and has a superb selection of plants on offer. Some of us were tempted! The food in the restaurant was all local and freshly cooked and excellent value. I struggled to finish my pudding but I did manage it!

We left here at 1.30pm and a short drive away then visited Arley Arboretum and Gardens. Somewhere else I have never been to as I suspect most of our party hadn't either. Once again we were in for a treat, so many rare and unusual trees and shrubs in a wonderful setting overlooking the Severn Valley Railway which right on cue tooted and proceeded on its way puffing out clouds of smoke. Over the past few years there have been over 700 trees planted in a new part of the garden called Turner's Ride named after the late Mr Roger Turner whose charitable trust now manages the arboretum. In total there are about 600 of the original trees dating from when the Arboretum was first planted in 1820. Another gem almost on our doorstep which has something for everyone throughout the seasons. There is also an Italian Garden which is a lovely tranquil spot to sit and rest.

The tearooms didn't disappoint and we somehow found room for tea and cakes and ice cream. Another excellent day and as usual we had a good journey courtesy of Cheney Coaches. Thanks to everyone who came.

A mention now of the Show on 13th September, schedules now available from Mugglestones. Something for all, as well as fruit and vegetables, photography, art, cakes, children's section and much more. Make this year the one when you take the plunge and exhibit something, you never know you could be a winner. Best of luck to all who do so. Garden Jottings from Bridge Nursery

This is the time of year when many of you lucky people will be packing your buckets and spades, swimsuits and sun-tan oil and heading off for your summer holidays.

Before heading off, it might be wise to put all your house plants in a north-facing room with a little extra water to see them through. Your outdoor pots and containers will hopefully be tended and watered by a good neighbour, who, in turn, can gather any fruit and vegetables as a reward. If the neighbour is away at the same time, then you are in trouble! However there are some very good automatic watering systems available these days (but at a price sadly).

Jobs to be done this month are a little less urgent, a little more gentle:-

- Dead heading flowers
- Picking fruit and vegetables (your reward for all that hard work earlier)

- Feeding and watering pots and containers
- Lift onions, garlic, shallots and dry them off in a well ventilated shed or greenhouse
- Sow spring cabbage
- Take cuttings of tender plants such as pelargoniums and osteospernums

Then, reward yourself with your favourite drink and a book – sit back and enjoy the fruits of your labours

Beautiful flowers for August include: Rudbekia, sunflower, Eryngium (sea holly), Penstemon, Fuchsia, Helenium, Solidago, and many more.

Bridge Nursery is proud to have sponsored the floristry students from Morton Morrell College with their display at the Royal Show. Among the cut flowers we supplied were: Marigolds, Achilleas, Astrantia, Dianthus, and Artichoke heads. Although we were not able to attend the show and we understand that visitor numbers were down this year, there has been some very positive feed back. English grown cut flowers are suddenly the 'in' thing.



Nature Notes

Writing this on the 22nd July, the sun has put in an appearance at last and crops are ripening. There is no barley now on the Thwaites Estate with no dairy herd to feed through the winter. Fields of wheat and oil seed rape predominate and harvesting will be about a fortnight later this year thanks to the cold damp early summer. Mind you, I did taste the first blackberries of the year last week and hope to have many more. There are some fields of barley between Deppers Bridge and Southam and I'm told some was cut near Long Itchington a week ago.

I came across an intriguing name recently; perhaps many of you have seen it. Pudding Bag Lane in Bascote leads down towards Bascote Lodge Farm and the Grand Union Canal. I asked the locals about its origin and, so far, no one has come up with an answer but someone must know. Middle Road, Harbury is rather pedestrian by comparison. Place names have changed over the years before they were printed and put on maps. Ladbroke has mutated through Hlodbroc, Ladbroc, Laddebroke and Lydbrook. The Saxon word for stream being broc is the easy bit but the origin of the first part is still mysterious.

Perhaps my favourite is over the county border in Gloucestershire. Just to the west of the Fosse Way south of Stow is Cold Aston. Whilst transcribing the name into a medieval tax book, the clerk couldn't read Cold and rather than make an educated guess wrote down Aston Blank and thus it became for some years before being corrected. It sounds far fetched doesn't it but chat to the locals to get the full story and read about it in their pub.

Mary Cambray told me of a green Woodpecker with youngsters feeding on her lawn. They were probably looking for ants, their favourite food. Entering the Spoilbank Nature Reserve, it's quite common to hear the laughing cry of a Green Woodpecker as it flies off. Its country name, Yaffle is quite descriptive. In flight it has an undulating movement which aids identification. The Spoilbank is a superb hunting ground for the bird as anthills predominate in the unimproved grassland.

Gentians are a feature of the reserve. Autumn is the time to see these but after a tip off, I visited a fortnight ago and found a Gentian in flower. Global warming? No; I'm told this is probably the early gentian. They look alike superficially. It will take the county botanist, James Partridge to make the decision.

As I've said in previous articles, the caterpillar of the Cinnabar moth is one of the few insects that can feed on the toxic leaves of ragwort. The caterpillar is easy to find with alternating black and yellow bands which serve as a warning to birds not to feed on it. Ragwort at the Spoilbank now has these caterpillars in profusion though I've yet to see them elsewhere.

Yesterday, I enjoyed pond dipping with my U3A naturalists group at Ryton Pools. Equipment consisted of a stout, long handled net, collecting dish (white to show up the finds) and a magnifier as some creatures we found were tiny. We found water boatmen with their glistening white undersides; really the light reflecting off a bubble of air they carry down with them. Caddis fly larvae live in protective 'houses' which they laboriously make out of bits of this and that; fragments of shell, sand grains and vegetation. They can be hard to spot as they withdraw when disturbed but emerge, maggot like, to feed. Water fleas, fresh water shrimps and the aptly named whirligig beetle were also landed.

One of the members trawled up a dragonfly nymph from the muddy bottom. These are shaped rather like dragonflies minus the wings and do not have the adult's stunning colours. They are voracious feeders and go through many moults (instars), from 6-15, before climbing a handy reed and metamorphosing into an adult. Now is the time to see dragonflies at their best. The pools at Ufton Fields are a useful place to head for but any bit of inland or brackish coastal water will be rewarding. World wide there are 5,300 species; 120 occur in Europe whilst in Great Britain only 38 species breed. This includes damselflies which are superficially like their robust cousins but in a separate sub order Zygoptera of the insect order Odonata (meaning 'toothed jaws'). Damselflies generally rest with their wings held alongside the body. Dragonflies perch with their wings outstretched.

Carboniferous era dragonflies are found in the fossil record from 300 million years ago. Their wingspan could be 70cms (28"); the largest flying creatures of their time. It is thought that the greater concentration of oxygen in the atmosphere at that time enabled these giants to survive as insects breathe by means of diffusion. (This information was gleaned from Dragonflies and Damselflies of Great Britain and Ireland by Steve Brooks, illustrated by Richard Lewington.)

Next door the bees are prospering. John Stringer says fondant icing will be put in the hives in exchange for the honey to see the colonies through the winter. The queen bees are placed in a tiny cage and marked with paint for ease of checking. No queen, no colony. This year the paint will be red.



Village Hall Update

Last month, the Village Hall Chairman made a sterling effort to save unnecessary expense by clearing out the blocked drains at the front of the premises, this month he is researching as good a deal as he can get for the cost of supplying electricity to the property. If anyone in the village has any advice they can give for keeping costs as low as possible, it would be more than welcome, so please contact Geoff on 613801 if you feel you can offer assistance.

The spreadsheet shows the previous cost and the projected outlay required for the coming year. The previous treasurer 'locked' the Village Hall in to a very good deal for several years, but this is now almost at an end, hence the need to check out the prices with several suppliers.

Harbury Village Hall's electricity charges have been fixed since November 2005. This situation comes to an end in September 2008 and the following is a comparison of the existing and proposed charges.



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

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


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
