

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

Traffic calming in Harbury!

The works to replace the gas main are not drawing to a close as they progress up towards the centre of the Village, but as our caption suggests, they do have one small benefit.

In Ladbroke they will benefit from a traffic calming measure – the introduction of a 50mph limit on the A423.

A number of organisations have benefited from the generosity of villagers through fundraising activities. Most notable was the PTA's sponsored walk which raised over £1900 and the Casino Night for the Myton Hospice raised £1300.

Opportunities for children continue; on the sports field the six rugger teams have had exciting matches, the junior section of the Tennis Club has been busy, and there is football every weekend. The Harbury Choir School recently acquitted themselves well when they sang in Birmingham Cathedral. The Scouts have recently been on an overnight camping trip. 

'We will remember them'

Every year at Remembrance time those famous, immortal words of Laurence Binyon always touch me very deeply;

'They shall not grow old, as we who are left grow old; age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning, we will remember them'.

The image of time standing still for those lost in war is a powerful one. An image we are reminded of every year as we rightly remember and give thanks to God to those who gave their lives in war for our freedom and liberty.

And what a great loss of life it was. In the Great War alone of 1914-18 the estimated loss of some ten to thirteen million young service men and women is unimaginable.

When I was growing up during the 70's, remembering those lost in war was something irrelevant to me. The world wars were simply distant events that I studied during my history lessons at school. I guess for many young people today the feeling is the same. Remembrance time, in my opinion, was really for the elderly and those who had been personally affected and certainly not for children!

But as I grew up I began to listen to stories. I listened as granddad told me of the D-Day landings on June 6th, 1944, as he recalled his fear, the danger and the enormity of the task in which he was involved in that day. A young man then, all of twenty-two who watched in horror as he hit Sword Beach running in fear for his life as he witnessed many of his friends being mowed down by gunfire and then of feeling guilty for being alive. As I heard the stories I began to understand that Remembrance time is just as much for me and for now as it is for him.

Stories are powerful things. They enable us to get in touch with the human and the real and we must listen to them for they change our lives and perspectives for without them we can so easily become anaesthetised to the experiences of others. Without stories life (and war) has the danger of simply becoming an academic exercise where we no longer see the human face or empathise with human pain.

So, as we remember again this November and give thanks to God for the sacrifice of so many for our freedom and future, let us be open to hear the stories of people's lives and allow them to touch, change and transform us, for then we begin to see the human face amidst the suffering.

This month we have heard of two different projects which bring rays of hope from very sad situations. At our afternoon meeting Su Groocock told us about 'Biblelands' who work in Gaza and the West Bank in Israel, Egypt and the Lebanon. Using the parable of the Good Samaritan, Su pointed out that everyone makes mistakes, there are faults on both sides, but that does not mean we can turn our backs on those who suffer as a result. Gaza is the most overcrowded place on earth, with 80% existing below the poverty line. There are power cuts, limited water, malnourished children and divided families. In Egypt there are some very rich people, but 60% live in poverty, disabled people are neglected, and there is ignorance of basic health and hygiene. In Lebanon there is increasing poverty caused by rising food and fuel prices.

Water suppliers are a particular concern as the Jordan water is taken for irrigation so boreholes which have been used for centuries are drying up.

We associate Bible Lands with the Christmas Carol Sheet, and the Bethlehem Hospital for blind babies, but its work spreads now to all these areas. They work still with health care, also education, rehabilitation and timing.

We Congratulate Su for her completion of the London Marathon to raise funds for this work; aren't we privileged to have her in our rectory?

The evening meeting was equally inspiring when Jeff Burgess spoke about Project Return.

Project Return has its roots back in the 1960's when Project Vietnam orphans (PVO) was formed to try to help children orphaned and abandoned during the Vietnam war. Up until 1975 some of these children were brought to England for adoption by Christian families.

In 1975 over 100 children were brought over in the Daily Mail air lift on the eve of the communist takeover of South Vietnam. In the late 1990's a group of these children, made a return trip to Vietnam to visit the orphanages from which they had been rescued, and attempted to trace their families. None of the children were successful but some were reunited with the nuns who had cared for them.

From this visit came a desire to provide help for the Roman Catholic nuns who are still allowed by the communist government to work amongst the minority ethnic groups and so Project Return was born.

Initially, Project Return operated as part of CORD, but it is now a registered charity in its own right. Project Return helps the nuns to find several projects including providing funds for the education of children as well as specialist education for handicapped children, deaf, blind, etc, also vocational workshops and vocational training schemes providing tools and start up capital to allow those who have completed these schemes to start up in business. The project also helps to fund clinics and kindergartens, as well as providing livestock, pig's rabbit's poultry fish, etc, for poor families.

We are as usual, running the toiletries stall at the Christmas Fayre on December 6th; contributions will be welcome.

The Advent Carol Service will be in the Cathedral at 11.00am on Monday December 1st, transport will be available.

Public Participation

Concern was expressed about the surface of what is left of Radbourne Lane in the village – next to the Village Hall. This surface is very uneven and worn away. There is also some subsidence on the main road near the layby.

Irenie Bennett is co-ordinating the issue of the concrete stands for the black rubbish bags. Please get in touch with Irenie if you wish to stand removed.

Police report: P.C Joy told us of an incident in Priors Marston. A neighbour took a photograph of a car thief taking his neighbour's car when he heard its alarm. A successful arrest was made.

P.C Joy wants us to be aware of opportunist thieves on winter mornings when we open up our cars, switch on the demister to defrost the car and warm it up; then pop back in to the house; an open invitation to steal the car.

A camera van is the most successful way of catching speeding motorbikes. It is very difficult to record their registration numbers – especially with a laser camera. Motorbikes also can decelerate much quicker than a car – when the driver sees the police van.

Matters arising: The extension to the existing notice board is "in hand", quotes are to obtained for a new notice board, this is to be discussed at the next meeting — the public grant for a new notice board has been approved.

Road gullies – Not all the gullies have been cleared. The council are concerned about this and the Highways Agency are to be contacted again. The Gullies were supposed to have been "jetted through" in January 08.

There are also some outstanding items of work regarding flooding and the brook – they need to be examined. There is still some blocking of the drain under the road when the water reaches a certain height.

The emergency plan has been completed and ready to go on the website.

The flood relief grant has been allocated to Ladbroke – The council are awaiting the cheque. The Public Community Grant has been applied for – the council will be notified in due cause whether it has been approved.

Planning – the extension to Quince Cottage has been granted, together with the felling of an ash tree. A meeting of the Parish Council and the Parish Plan Committee has been arranged.

Millennium Green – The committee is getting the suppliers of the new play area equipment to design the layout so that it will minimise intrusion on the new trail.

The Website – An extension of the website grant has been given for a further three months. If the council is not to lose the remainder of unused money they will have to come up with an investment plan to cover the remaining grant.

County Councils Report – A list of available grants has been sent to all parish clerks.

FORUMS e.g. P.A.C.T. are designed to get all communities together as a whole.

The 50MPH speed limit on the A423 has been approved; this comes into force next April. The police are monitoring this road more carefully since there have been two fatalities recently.

Cemex in Long Itchington – There is great concern about extra lorry traffic on the roads if this development comes to Long Itchington. Discussions are still at an early stage, work doesn't begin until 2015.

Talks are going on with Coventry Council about building a waste disposal incinerator. It would be very expensive. New signs will be erected at the bridge in Deppers now that the weight restrictions are permanent.

Wood Street car park – The parish clerk will be writing to the District Council about any car park changes. People living in Ladbroke who wish to use their free bus pass, will first have to pay to park their cars which defeats the point of the exercise.

Dog Fouling – this has become a problem once again. The bin in the Millennium Green is not always used even if fouling has taken place on the green itself. A replacement bin has been requested for the south end of the village.

Ladbroke Millennium Green AGM

After years of consideration, consultation, planning and fund raising, the big event of last year was the installation of the new cradle swings and see-saw in the extended children's play area. The Alibone Trust, Stratford District Council and Ladbroke Parish Council were thanked for their contribution towards the funding. The chairman, Kip Warr informed the meeting that the order for the swings for older children and a trail circuit is about to be placed and should be installed within the next 3 months. The paving slabs in the play area are also to be replaced in the near future.

The wildflower area is continuing to mature and the warm, wet summer provided for many species of plants; although it did make the timing of the cutting, which needs to be done at specific times, difficult. The top of this area is still troublesome where the ground was disturbed with the installation of the original play equipment but we are advised that with our continual weeding it will gradually settle down.

We are lucky that the Green is well respected by its users and only one small case of vandalism – the scrawling of felt tip on the new see-saw – and some dog fouling, spoils our perfect record.

As you are probably already aware, our Neighbourhood Watch Scheme has been in operation for quite a number of years. I took over as co-ordinator in 2007 and with the assistance of Peter Goldson and Derek Haden have been reorganising it.

The aim of Neighbourhood Watch is to encourage people of all ages and backgrounds to get involved in local crime and community issues. This usually begins with people sharing crime prevention advice and activities and keeping an eye on each other's property, improving home security and building two-way communication with the police.

Ladbroke's website www.ladbroke-pc.gov.uk has more information about our scheme which includes a link to the police website www.safer-neighbourhoods.co.uk The police website includes weekly crime reports and I have arranged that copies can be viewed at Southam library.

October's was a fairly speedy meeting with a fair amount of procedural work and as the Chairman Tim Lockley commented at one point - "bureaucracy".

They had to formally adopt a new model scheme on freedom of information, all the time watched over by the County Secretary of the Warwickshire Association of Local Councils (WALC). They agreed with some reluctance to pay an extra £15 per annum for their Southam Area Committee to employ a Secretary for their Area Meetings.

Cllr Jenny Patrick reported that the Speaker at the Area meeting, on the new "Youth Support System", was pressed on what funding was available to the villages, but his answers did not satisfied Councillors.

Cllr Janet Thornley would attend the WALC Training Seminar on new Planning legislation.

Councillors Corner

WCCllr Bob Stevens was pleased with the permanent Railway Bridge Weight Limit and hoped signage would be better. PCllr Ron Grey said the bus service could still not cross the bridge but this was being addressed.

Bob asked the District Cllrs to join him at the Area Committee in supporting Harbury's bid for £18,000 for the Village Improvement Scheme.

His comments about the leak of WCC plans to cut the Library's funding for books and the possibility of our Library being closed provoked strong reaction from the Parish Councillors who asked that they should be fully consulted.

District Cllr Patrick reported Stratford Planning Department was fully aware that Harbury was unhappy with the reduced time to comment on planning applications.

He believed most problems with the refuse collection had been ironed out but was awaiting details of how people could dispose of their concrete bin-bag stands.

He thought the District would be able to warn the Parish when street sweeping was planned so that residents could move their vehicles.

Planning

Stratford granted a single storey rear extension and garage at 15 Manor Road and refused permission for a boundary wall for Harbury House.

The Parish made no representation about:- extensions at 8 Pineham Avenue and Stapenhall Farm, Deppers Bridge; the addition of a porch at the proposed replacement for Harbury Croft on Chesterton Road or the removal of conifers and a laburnum at Temple Cottage, Temple End. They supported Village Hall Extension plans but registered their interest as owners of the land.

The County Council sent news of their approval of the Ufton Tip application for a material recycling facility and in-vessel composting.

Housing

Delays with the plans for the Bush Heath Lane development have put back the public consultation which will not now take place until the New Year.

Cllr Keith Thompson reported on the Rural Housing Event at Ettington where he was surprised to discover Harbury's Affordable Housing Scheme was the most ambitious in the District. Rural Housing Enabler, Charles Barlow explained sites in eleven villages had been identified and five schemes completed.

Amenities

Cllr Thornley was struggling to get even two quotes for the work on the BMX track, but she had identified possible grant aid towards the access path to the track. The Skatepark has now been repaired and the insurance renewed.

Moles have again disturbed the ground in the Children's Play Area, making the surface uneven. Money will be set aside next year to rectify the problem.

Work is complete on the Village Hall fence and has started on the Tennis Courts' fence. Cllr Thornley was the one to mention Bollards this month. She thought the Council had agreed to place them on the path between the Village Hall and the Children's Play Area to stop motor cycling youths riding onto the recreation ground, but Cllrs did not recall this.

In the Cemetery over sixty gravestones deemed unsafe have been staked and others laid flat. Cllr Thompson was impressed with the contractors and their thorough paperwork. The Parish is still trying to contact the owners of the graves which need remedial work.

Clir Hancock reported a resident of Chapel Street had asked for the Memorial Garden replacement bench to be sited elsewhere because it attracted noisy youths. But the bench has arrived and the Clirs thought positioning it elsewhere would only move the problem. They will try to ensure the site is policed and that alcohol is not supplied to underage children.

Cllr Darlison had been to see for himself the water supply to the Allotments and recommended more taps be installed. It was at least 50 metres in a straight line from the last tap to the furthest plot. He suggested plot holders secure a quotation from the contractor who installed the supply and pass it to the Parish Council for approval.

Lighting

The lights in the Playing Fields Car Park were not working. An additional light for Temple End Conservation Area, which should be of the Winsor type, was quoted at £2,700 to install, almost twice the previous price. The Clerk was investigating cheaper alternatives and researching the introduction of solar-powered lamps.

Recycling

The Parish Council had hoped to employ the official Wood-chipping service in the New Year for residents to recycle their Christmas Trees, but it is only available on Mondays and needs Cllrs to monitor it and residents to remove their own chippings. The Council decided to see if using a local contractor would be better.

Speeding

Cllr Darlison still wants to name and shame motorists who speed. There had been another death from a road traffic accident on Rabbit Hill.

Footways

DCIIr Patrick relayed a complaint about the uneven, sloping footway along Mill Street. He said the path outside the Co-op was collapsing. Cllr Hancock agreed Mill Street was very poor and suggested subsidence at the Co-op was due to thoughtless motorists who drew up on the pavement to use the cash machine.

Cllr Patrick would walk along these paths to investigate and CCllr Stevens would pass on the standard specification for footways.

Money

The District Clirs will try to see whether the PC should receive Small Business Rate Relief on the Parish Office.

Cllr Mancell wanted money moved from some elements of the budget to others to cover overspends and short-falls and his colleagues agreed this.

Maintenance of the Playing Fields had been higher than budgeted but new equipment spending had been less. All the street lighting money had been spent this year and improvements would wait for next year's precept. Last year's Election budget of £1,000 was not used so will "pass on to the Burial Grounds" – as lory Davies used to say.

There were several requests for funding. However, two of them were received less than a week before the meeting and were deferred until November to allow Councillors time to examine them fully.

The Junior Football Team's application for over a thousand pounds for goalposts, balls etc was sympathetically considered, especially as they had spent £600 purchasing a dry white-lining machine to mark out the pitches - as Cllr Mancell pointed out – a task that could be considered the Council's responsibility. They were awarded £450 for Goalposts.

GASS asked for money to soundproof their Scout Hut. Cilrs thought other Hut users could contribute. They agreed to give GASS £600 and suggested Wagstaffe Trust and Horticutural Society might also look favourably on an application for assistance.

They awarded the Rugby Festival £210 for printing and agreed to pay £75 to the British Legion for the Parish Council's wreath for Remembrance Day.

Finally

Clir Mancell was pleased to be able to reassure residents that the Council had no exposure to collapsed Icelandic Banks. The Parish Council keeps its money in a High Interest Account with HSBC and Clirs agreed to continue this practice.

In the past 3 months the Parish Council has:

- made grants to various village organisations
- helped to secure a permanent weight limit on the Station bridge in Deppers Bridge
- obtained a grant to restore the Memorial Garden in Chapel St.
- worked with WCC traffic engineers to submit a traffic calming plan to the area committee for funding
- worked with the Village Hall management committee to repair and improve the boundary between the Village Hall and the playing fields
- made repairs to the playing fields car-park
- planted 500 native species daffodils around the village.
- taken action to make safe any dangerous gravestones in the cemetery
- met with WCC lighting officers about possible additional streetlights.

N.B. Please note that requests for grants should be submitted to the clerk a week before a Parish Council meeting.

The question came up again of disposal of the old concrete refuse stands. If you have an old stand which you'd like taken away and you've not yet told the Parish Clerk, please ask Nicola Thompson (614646) to add you to her list.

One lady has been very unlucky in her request for assisted refuse collection, but finally we're glad to report that the Verdant crew have stopped ignoring her, and are now being very helpful.

A gentleman asked if he could have **smaller wheelie bins**, and we advised him to contact Stratford, who will add him to their list. (We understand that requests to exchange "normal" bins for smaller ones will be answered some time in 2009.)

A query about **street sweeping** has got us once again asking Stratford if they could please send a copy of the street-cleaning schedule for this part of the District.

Questions which have been passed on to County Highways for (we hope) urgent attention were:-

- When were the <u>drains</u> last sucked out?
- Could the pothole at the junction of <u>Sutcliffe Drive / Farm</u>
 <u>Street</u> please be mended and could "No Parking" markings be painted on the road opposite the junction?
- In 'Sutcliffe Pastures', when will the <u>white lines</u> be repainted (missing since resurfacing)?
- And one "Well Done" for the Highways team: The <u>kerb in Mill</u>
 <u>Street</u> outside Mr Trice's farm has been repaired. Thank you!

Concerns were raised about the <u>memorial garden</u> in Chapel Street. Apparently, things have been much more peaceful there since the bench was taken away for repair! We've passed these comments on to the Parish Council.

Another one for the PC – the fine <u>tree</u> in the cemetery that overlooks Chapel Street. It was trimmed back two years ago, but one resident fears it needs more attention, so the Properties Working Party will look into it.

And the lady who asked for <u>bike racks</u> outside the Post Office and the Co-op, has had her request passed on to the PC. (It's been discussed before, so there may be reasons why it can't be done.)

Aston Martins have been observed again, driving at high speed through and around Chesterton. If any resident has concerns, please contact us (or contact Aston Martin direct - we have found them to be very cooperative).

David Howe's talk "Remembering not to Forget" was very reassuring and very, very funny! He assured us that forgetting was usually not a memory fault, just a difficulty of recall and that we often got the problem out of perspective. He talked about slow learners just being "fast forgetters" and the improvements over the years in advice on exam techniques and revision which helped school-children do better in exams.

Previous generations learned what worked by trial and error. Some people remember by listening to facts on a tape; some by reading out loud. He discovered that if he re-wrote notes and précised them it helped his recall. He always writes down things he needs to remember and is amazed that others don't do that.

There are other aids. Mnemonics like "I" before "E"; "Richard of York Gave Battle in Vain" and "Dash In A Real Rush, Hurry Or Else Accidents" can help.

In Medieval times few people had access to books and so memory was valued – they had to know things for they could not look them up. Now we are happy for an "expert" to tell us where to find the information we need.

The mind takes in information whether you want it to or not, but with age there is more information to sift through, so just like a computer - things slow down when there is more stored in them.

In fact your memory may well be working better than the rest of you! Maybe you should learn to forget so that there is more room to remember!

Thanking Mr Howe for his wonderful entertainment, Alan Lord remarked that we had never had singing AND laughter at a meeting before, and everyone agreed with him that David Howe must make a return visit.

The speaker, Patt Stock, came to speak and demonstrate on the Bowen Technique. It was pioneered by Thomas Bowen who was born in Geelong, Australia. After working in miscellaneous labouring jobs as a young man, he developed a great interest in massage and body work and spent time observing football trainers and others involved in sports. By the time he was in his early 40's he had established a full practice in remedial therapy using the technique he had developed. When he was interviewed by a parliamentary committee looking into complementary medicine in 1978 he stated he had treated 280 patients per week with the help of an assistant, an incredible 13,000 patients a year, 88% of whom only required two or three treatments.

Patt had been a radiographer but after neck problems and operations decided to take up Bowen Technique. She described the treatment, which, consists of thumbs and fingers on the body to make rolling type moves, which aim to disturb the muscles, soft tissue and energy within the body to realign itself. Patt demonstrated her technique on Monica, a member, and made an impression on us. There were quite a few asking for her card afterwards. Monica is fine she says!

At the 287th session of the Folk Club on October 2nd, the theme was 'Heroes and Villains' and our performers used their imagination well to feature several of each in music and song.



Rugby St. Andrews 14 v Harbury 75



In order to help the children to understand that it is possible to communicate without words, they have been learning some new sign language, such as "sharing" and "friends" and are now beginning to use many signs within their everyday nursery rhymes and songs.

Staff Training: Gael and Lisa visited the Inspirational Learning Space in Nuneaton with our Advisory Teacher and again many ideas were brought back with them. The theme was "Look, Listen and Note" and will enable us to continue to progress within the new Early Years Foundation Stage curriculum.

Outdoor Play: The children have enjoyed plenty of time outdoors,



using the ride on vehicles to help their physical development co-ordination as they pedal and steer at the same time. Jessica is particularly expert and looks as though she might make a rally driver one day! They have also used our primary coloured plastic bricks to build some great structures and, towards the end of the month, the large wooden blocks were used for all sorts of building work. Nick's "Knight's including Castle".

AGM: The AGM was well attended and our chair, Jacqui Quinney, was able to report an excellent year for Harbury Pre-School. The parents and staff expressed their grateful thanks to outgoing Pre-School Committee members Jane Kempton, Julie Jennings, Melanie Parker, Angela Thompson and Lisa French, and to Alison Grundy, Fund Raising Group member, for their hard work and commitment. Finally, Jacqui welcomed all those who had volunteered to join the committee for the new Pre-School year.

Continuing with the theme of Ourselves, the children have been exploring their senses. Tasting a variety of multi-cultural foods, at snack time every day proved very popular and we produced a chart showing their likes and dislikes. These included noodles, rice, prawn crackers, naan bread, as well as mango, dates, and kiwi fruit, "I have big noodles with mummy with meat and peppers" - Sofia

Small groups of children went on a nature walk around the school grounds equipped with their clipboards and pencils to record all the things they could hear, ranging from a dog barking and an aeroplane, to the wind blowing the leaves. Some of the children extended the activity themselves by adding a fire engine and a train to the list of sounds they were listening for.





To explore their sense of touch the children took turns putting their hands in to a drawstring bag of different textured objects to try and describe to the others what the object felt like. As well as developing their language skills this activity also developed their personal, social and emotional skills by encouraging turn taking and sharing. The children really enjoyed this game so we followed this up with an activity which involved making their own personal feely book containing different textures to take home. This

prompted some fantastic vocabulary including spikey, bumpy, scratchy, crunchy, rough and sharp.

We have been discussing 'special things' with the children and why they mean a lot to them. Some of the children brought in a special box that they had decorated at home and filled with their treasures, which they had the opportunity to show to the other children at circle time. Keira's box contained her ballet shoes which she wore and proudly showed us some ballet steps. Rhys' box contained a teddy called Bluey that his brother had bought him when he was a baby.

Windmills strongly believe that children benefit from learning outside the classroom and this month we have had two woodland outdoor classroom sessions in the glorious autumn sunshine. These have been led by Dr. Amanda Randall, who has now almost completed her forest school training. Our next outdoor classroom session will be held on Wednesday 5th November, 2008

Tina and Marie continually strive to improve their provision to Windmills children and are constantly looking for new ways to improve the learning environment. They recently attended a training course run by Warwickshire Arts in Education, entitled Extending language through provocation and artefacts, which looked at ways to bring stories to life and encourage creative development. Five members of Windmills staff also attended the PLA conference held in Rugby on Saturday 11th October, which included workshops on storytelling and exploring treasure baskets.

On Wednesday, 22nd October, Windmills held their annual review meeting in the nursery classroom. This was very well attended, thank you to those parents who gave up their time to learn about what we have been doing at Windmills during the last year, and enjoy a glass of wine.

The children enjoyed their usual trip to the toddler service when they learned about how important it is to say thank you.

We have been putting the money raised from the recent fundraising events to good use. We have recently purchased some new craft supplies ready for Christmas, some puppets, and some new outdoor toys including a croquet set which are always popular with the children.

Garden Jottings from Bridge Nursery Christine Dakin

Your local Hardy Plant Specialists

Although the year is fast coming to an end, there are plenty of jobs to do in November. There can be many good weather days in winter which are ideal for getting out, enjoying the fresh air and having some exercise. You may be lucky enough to have a robin or two 'helping' you while you work. My diary for '06 and '07 shows that a considerable

amount was done during this month including:

- 1. Sweeping up leaves and adding to one compost heap
- 2. Turning another compost heap
- 3. Using compost as a mulch round plants
- 4. Pruning roses: climbing and shrub types
- 5. Cutting back some of the herbaceous plants
- 6. Removing old or weak plants and putting in new ones
- 7. Planting bare root trees and hedging
- 8. Sowing broad beans
- 9. Planting garlic and onions
- 10. And you thought gardening was a summer pastime??

The naming of plants (Part 2)

Rosa moyesii 'Geranium'
Cotoneaster dammeri 'Major'
Prunus laurocerasus 'Otto Luyken'
Potentilla fruticosa 'Elizabeth'

These four plants will hopefully show how and why plants have such seemingly long and complicated names. The first word Rosal Cotoneaster/ Prunus/ Potentilla is the "genus"; that is a group of plants having a wide range of broadly similar characteristics. The second part moyesii/ dammeri/ laurocerasus/ fruticosa indicates this is a "species". Species are often found naturally in the wild and can be less showy than the "cultivars" – see below. The species name is often shortened to the single first letter followed by a full stop e.g. Rosa m. 'Geranium'

The final part of the name is the "cultivar" and is specific to that plant only. Cultivars have been specially selected or raised as being superior in some way – hardiness, colour, length of flowering and so on – to the species.

What is perhaps strange is that all the four above (and many others!) all belong to the same Family with the family name Rosaceae. You and I may not see many similarities between say a Rose and a Laurel (Rosa and Prunus laurocerasus) but clever botanists and taxonomists have the ability to do so with microscopes and (now) with DNA.

Note the way the name is written; the **genus** always starts with a capital letter, the **species** with lower case and the **cultivar** starts with a capital letter and is within single inverted commas.

The plant name can be likened to an invoice:

We can define it thus:

It came from The Sooper Dooper Plant Co -- The Family

From the Accounts Dept --- The Genus

The Account 'Bridge Nursery' --- The Species

The Invoice number --- The Cultivar

Thus with three parts only to a name, every single one of over 70,000 different plants listed by the RHS can be uniquely identified. Pretty clever buh?

Autumn in Mackley Way

Caterpillars have been on the move October presumably looking for sites pupate and over winter. Down in Bath, the grandchildren were intrigued and so was I, when we found a very large brown caterpillar on their lawn. It waved its front portion around in a slightly menacing fashion and was 2.5inches (6.25cms) long. David Brown (author of the Larger Moths of Warwickshire published by Atropos) had no doubt, from my description, that it was the larva of the Elephant hawk moth (Deilephila elpenar). Its food plants include Rosebay Willowherb and Himalayan Balsam which supports the notion that some parts of any garden should be kept in a semi wild state.

On 2nd October, Sally Stringer called me over to see another exotic caterpillar. This was brightly coloured with green and white bands. It was extremely hairy and had a fierce looking group of red hairs sticking up near its tail. The photograph I took failed to register on the camera but luckily, about a week later, I found another specimen crawling across the surgery car park. The picture I sent to David Brown was unequivocally identified as the larva of the Pale Tussock Moth (Calliteara pudibunda). It feeds on many deciduous trees and shrubs including apple, oak, birch and alder. The moth is a rather insignificant brown colour.

On the 4th October, I woke to our first frost of the autumn. The U3A Naturalists' Group met at Snitterfield Bushes nature Reserve (GR SP .200603. OS map 151). This area was an airfield during World War 2 and the concrete runways and disintegrating bomb stores are still visible beneath the canopy of trees (predominately oak, ash, silver birch and field maple) and the sometimes dense understorey. We were led on a fungi foray by John Sells. After our wet summer, there was plenty of water in the ditches and pools. Moss covered large areas and was particularly luxuriant on fallen trees. Fungi, with such names as Smooth Inkcap, Blushing Bracket, Drooping Funnel and Snapping Bonnet were shown to John for identification and discussion. We questioned the ecological niche filled by the hundreds of fungi species in Warwickshire alone. They each have a particular habitat and break down organic matter (often dead) to enable chemicals to reenter the food chain. We were intrigued by the aptly named King Alfred's cake, a firm black fungus often with a central dimple which grew directly from a dead branch and had no stem. We found St John's Wort still in flower. This was the perforate variety which was proved by holding a leaf up to the light and seeing the tiny translucent dots. The perforations are glands which yield an aromatic smell to the foliage. We also found the seed head of broad leafed helieborine, (Epipactis helleborine), an orchid whose flowers in summer are a rather insignificant size and greenish yellow in colour, making it hard to find.

Trees are the landscape feature at the moment. While staying with Brian and Theo Wilne at a cottage near Fowey, Sharon and I were bowled over by the autumn colours. Beech in particular stood out. On the coastal footpath, we found violet, primrose, foxglove and strawberry having a second flowering phase.

Before returning home, we headed further west and visited the Lost Gardens of Helligan. Here, in the early 1990's, the decision was made to bring back to life the overgrown parkland estate of the Tremayne family and recreate from the ruins the magnificent walled northern enclaves, the fruit and vegetable garden and the flower garden to name but two. We've -promised ourselves another longer visit as there was so much to see.

Closer to home, I must just mention Coventry's London Road cemetery. Designed by Joseph Paxton and opened in 1847, it is a marvellous arboretum. The area was laid out over the hills and hollows of the sandstone quarries which had supplied stone to build the ancient city. As a result it is pleasantly rolling. Avenues of 'Candelabra'

Weeping Silver Limes are a major feature formed by the technique of grafting and providing in Paxton's words 'A flame of memory'. I was particularly struck by a Bhutan pine. This species has 12" long cones and instead of needles in pairs has them in groups of five producing a brush like effect. Cedars of various types, Wellingtonias and many other specimen trees are given space to thrive.

Now the local agricultural scene is of ploughed fields, many seeded and a few beginning to sprout with autumn sown wheat. The shorter daylight hours bring their own delights; dew on spider webs, berries of hawthorn, privet and dog rose. Next month's notes should have a rather different setting.

What library service are we entitled to expect?

The Public Libraries and Museums Act 1964 requires the first tier English local authorities (in Warwickshire the County Council) to provide "comprehensive and efficient public library services." The Secretary of state for Culture Media and Sport has a duty under the same Act to superintend the delivery of library services and to promote the improvement of public libraries.

The terms 'comprehensive and efficient' are not defined within the Act. However library authorities are required to provide, free of charge, "access for people who live, work or study in their area to borrow or refer to books, printed material and pictures in line with their requirements."

Will we face a 'Use it or loose it' situation?

"There are a number of indicators to measure library usage- including the number of books issued; visits to libraries and online usage." In Harbury we are fortunate the library has been upgraded in the last 5 years and we have had a series of very helpful librarians.
