

All types of people make real communities

The June elections are just a week away as I write this article and it seems to me that an unusual number of people this time round are unsure which way to vote. It's an interesting time for the country and Europe as we continue to live under the recession and the uncertainty of the future. The recent episode of MP's expenses has dominated the

media in the last few weeks culminating in the extraordinary resignation from office of the Speaker of the House of Commons. There is an increased sense of mistrust of those who serve us and politicians of all persuasions have a lot of work to do to regain that trust.

The Archbishops of Canterbury and York made a joint statement last week about the forthcoming elections. They said; "The temptation to stay away or register a protest vote in order to send a negative signal to the parties represented at Westminster will be strong. In our view, however, it would be tragic if the understandable sense of anger and disillusionment with some MPs over recent revelations led voters to shun the ballot box".

I am always mindful at elections that the democratic right to voice our opinions and exercise our vote is a great privilege that each of us should use. Many people around the world have lost their lives and continue to do so in the struggle for these basic rights.

However, for me there is a particularly concerning aspect to this coming election. The Archbishops go on to say; "There are those who would exploit the present situation to advance views that are the very opposite of the values of justice, compassion and human dignity that are rooted in our Christian heritage. This is not a moment for voting in favour of any political party whose core ideology is about sowing division in our communities and hostility on grounds of race, creed or colour; it is an opportunity for renewing the vision of a community united by mutual respect, high ethical standards and the pursuit of justice and peace. We hope that electors will use their vote to renew the vision of a community united by the common good, public service and the pursuit of justice." Comments of course in response to the rise of the BNP.

The Archbishops talk of our Christian heritage. This is a heritage based on Jesus who was love personified. He wasn't divisive, exclusive or prejudicial but valued all people irrespective of gender, class or background. Why? Because all people are made in the image of God and are equally loved by him. Our communities are stronger when all people, irrespective of colour, creed or ethnicity, feel they belong and can live side by side.

Mothers' Union

As usual, May had us listening to two interesting and varied speakers. Marion Millington called her talk 'The Soup' – which gave no clue to her

topic! She laid out various vegetables and fruits on a table, and this started her off on a series of reminiscences of her work abroad as a midwifery tutor. In Zanzibar, produce was piled up like that in the market, and woe betide you if you tried to feel it before paying! Woe betide you also if, as a woman, you sat on the wrong side of the church. She did! In Gaza there was a curfew for 4 days, with little to eat but lettuces. That's where the soup making came in handy. In Baluchistan babies were swaddled and almost suffocated under bedspreads. But there they had 99 beautiful names for Allah. What amazing experiences.

Our evening meeting listened to David Benskine, the assistant Chaplain at Rainsbrook Secure Training Centre for Youth Offenders. Whilst not minimising the seriousness of the offences which brought them there, he obviously felt great compassion for them as so often they had grown up with no effective parenting and their only family support was in the gang culture. In the unit they are housed in small groups and learn to respect each other and themselves, and live a structured life with schooling compulsory. Sadly many of them on release return to the same environment so that re-offending and 'graduating' to adult prisons are a frequent result. The social services are so under resourced that they are unable to provide adequate support for young people when released; in many cases not even accommodation.

I'm sure those members who went to the Big Picnic on Bank Holiday Monday enjoyed it. It was great to see so many families with young children – a total of 139 picnickers to join the bid for Guinness Book of Records. Thank you to Gill Guilford for organising it on behalf of Southam Deanery Mothers Union and as part of M.U commitment to national Family Week, a cause very much in line with our remit.

The Deanery Festival was a happy afternoon, with about 50 people and an opportunity to meet fellow members from Southam as well as some of the Diocesan Trustees. We welcomed our two new members Ros Baldwin and Mick Cooper. £103 from the collection was sent to the Literacy and Development Fund.

We are running the Tom Hauley Room Coffee Morning on Saturday 4th July and members are asked to support this on the day and with cakes, bric a brac and raffle prizes.

Mothers Union nationally are supporting a week of prayer for Parliament and Government. Whilst their public image is a bit murky at the moment they are elected by us to do very difficult and vital jobs and need our prayers and support. Sue Boniface has copies of a diary for prayer each day of the week beginning June 7th and there should be some in church.

Public Participation

A question was asked about the possibility of identifying the two ends of Windmill Lane. Delivery vans are often going up the "wrong end" and bigger vehicles have difficulty turning. WCC Councillor Stevens said that the Parish Council have the power to change the name of a road after consultation with the planning department. The parking on the verges in Windmill Lane (the village end) was still a problem, can anything be done?

Reference was made to the Village AGM. A question was asked about whether the Church, Millennium Green and the Village Hall could raise money jointly in their present financial situations. As they are separate Trusts the Parish Council have no say in their management, nor do they impinge on the local Council Tax.



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
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Matters Arising

The new notice board is now a fixture and the Chairman expressed his thanks to Cllr. Bennett for his work on this and that he would not be submitting an account. The new notice board which will be sited outside the Millennium Green should be installed by the end of the week. This has received a Public Realm Grant.

Public Communications Grand Scheme – Cllr Clews reported that the Welcome Booklet has been distributed to every household in the village. Three copies have been supplied to Southam Library and Warwickshire County Records Office has requested a copy. Thanks were expressed to Cllr Clews and Kip Warr for their work on this.

Parking in Windmill Lane – The parking on verges in Windmill Lane was discussed. The Highways Agency is trying to determine who owns the land on the right of the road. The Clerk is to contact Patch Bryne. One idea to prevent the grass being torn up was to place perforated rubber on the damaged area and cover it with grass seed and erect bollards behind that.

Best Kept Village Competition – Ladbroke has entered the competition on communications. The website, news, welcome booklet and notice boards have all been included in the submission.

Telephone Kiosk – It was agreed to remove the electricity supply and not to cover the kiosk with extra insurance. The Parish Council expressed their thanks to Malcolm Wray for his help in painting the kiosk and to Cllr Goldson for organising this.

Planning Applications:

The Barn, Windmill Lane - replacement barn - insufficient evidence for use.

Old Barn Farm - Retrospective change of use of land and buildings to allow boat building and associated development.

Woodcutters Cottage - Application for a one and a half rear extension.

Police Report – Warwickshire County Councillor Stevens reported that Sgt Mandy Crust has been transferred to another unit and at present Sgt Nigel Hill is in charge.

Highways and Drainage – There have been complaints about blockages in the brook. Photographs of the problem have been sent to David Tiley. Action urgently requested.

Cllr Bennett commended WCC for the excellent job they made on the resurfacing work on the roads in the village.

Parish Plan - This has now been sent to Stratford District Council for their comments.

Millennium Green - plans are ongoing for a Village Fete on June 20th.

County Councillor's Report:

Meetings are being held regarding the re-organisation of the Highways Department. It is hoped that Patch Bryne will continue to look after this area.

A new Head and Deputy Head have been appointed to Southam College. They will start work in September.

A Business Manager has been appointed to manage the £4 million budget.

Carers - About 80% of carers come from agencies. It is planned to 'outsource' the other 20%. Plans are afoot to give people their own budget for disabled facilities.

Tesco – will start their planning application again. Planning application for Cemex has been postponed. Cemex are required to give further information regarding this.

Next meeting - Wednesday June 17th at 7.45pm in the Village Hall.

Chairman's Report May 2009

The past year (2008-9) has been a relatively quiet one for Harbury Parish Council. We have continued with our normal tasks of routine maintenance of public areas, supporting village organisations, and making sure that the Parish's concerns are noted at District and County level. Much of this work goes on quietly, efficiently, and with minimal fuss. Broken things are repaired, areas are tidied up, services are paid for, and we should be extremely grateful that we have such an excellent Parish Clerk who actually makes these things happen. Nicola certainly makes my job much easier than it might be.

The next year, and perhaps the next few years, will be different as the community struggles through tough economic times. The Parish Council will face steep rises in some bills, (electricity for example,) and some new costs will have to be paid when the old mercury street-lights are phased out. The Parish Council was concerned that some village organisations might find themselves in difficult times in the coming months, and we have increased the amount set aside in the budget for grants. We have also recently undergone training on the new "Power of Well-Being" which means that we can spend money on a wider range of activities and act to preserve services in the village were necessary.

The proposed development at Bush Heath Lane has progressed slowly during the year. Parishioners will have their chance to comment on the plans at the open day on May 21st. With the help of our County Councillor, Bob Stevens, we were successful in securing money for traffic calming in the village, and we hope to have some plans for consultation shortly.

Aside from thanking the Clerk, my thanks also go to my fellow parish councillors who help to make the parish council run smoothly.

Deppers Bridge

Last year saw the campaign for a weight limit on Deppers rail bridge. Since then, the limit has been trialled and made permanent. The knock-on effects of this have been a welcome reduction in heavy goods through traffic and an unwelcome diversion of the no. 64 bus route around

Deppers, leaving those who are dependant on public transport without a practical and convenient link with Southam, Leamington or any of the nearby villages. Unfortunately they are the ones who, through age or infirmity, cannot manage to catch the bus from the Great Western. Efforts to restore the service by replacing the 50 seater buses with lighter 30 seat type vehicles which could cross the bridge, have been unsuccessful for various reasons, of which the credit crunch must be one. The coming year will see us working to establish a service to Southam, linking there to the 63 and 64 routes.

Last year also saw EMEB consulting on a plan to replace the existing 33000V grid line on pylons with a 132000V line on tall poles along new route passing through Deppers Bridge. Apparently it was meant to improve the supply to the East Midlands. No planning application was ever lodged with Stratford District Council so perhaps with demise of the eco-towns this application is unnecessary now. We continue to watch for any further activity, which we will continue to oppose unless the cable goes underground rather than on poles.

Environment Report 2008/09

Traffic calming - Significant progress has been made on traffic calming during 2008-9. We have got substantial funding from WCC for traffic calming in the village. Proposals for this spend include village gateways and carriageway alterations in Temple End. We hope to have plans to display in the village in the near future.

Streetlights - we are continuing to replace the concrete columns and are currently considering the options for the replacement of all mercury lights in the village by 2015. Because of these ongoing improvements the street lighting budget will be very stretched over the coming 5 years.

Refuse collection - SDC has introduced the new wheelie bins this year, although we are not responsible for this we have been an information point for the new arrangement and have tried to assist in any initial teething problems. The old concrete bin stands are due to collected from properties during May 2009

We planted 500 native daffodil bulbs in the autumn last year at various points around the village and propose that we do another 500 this year.

The other two ideas that will be investigated are painting the street furniture black and cycle racks in the village centre.

Planning Report 2008/9

As everyone is now able to access the planning applications through the SDC website reviewing applications and getting comments together is a much quicker process for the council. Several councillors have again taken advantage of the training in planning offered by SDC especially with regard to new regulations that came into force in October 2008. These allow for permitted development that does not require planning permission and means that officers from Stratford can decide without a full planning application coming to the Council. The Clerk has all planning applications and these can be viewed at the Parish Office for members of the public who wish to see the hard copies. Anyone can make a comment on a proposed plan but the comments that will be taken into consideration by the officers at Stratford will be to do with design, effect on the street scene and its appropriateness in development given the site it occupies, this applies especially in the Conservation Area. The County Council are concerned with any highways effects that a building or extension might have on traffic movement.

Some main plans this year have been for the Village Hall and the BMX track, more floodlights for the courts and offices at Bull Ring Garage. Cranford on Chesterton Road had many people making comments; this council took these objections to the area committee which then voted to allow the plans as they stood. We were asked to comment on the Tesco Store plans at Southam and while we were not keen for a large store we commented that it would provide job opportunities and cut down transport for people who would go to Leamington for their weekly shop. Another application at the cement works brought our severest criticism as we felt it did not take into account the plan set down by the authority for the area. This has still to be decided and may eventually in the current economic climate not now take place. This is an area that demands our careful vigilance. Currently a mast has appeared but this may be within permitted development and does not have anything to do with the owners we understand.

We would ask the public to always inform the clerk if they have concerns regarding any development and if they consider that planning permission has not been sought and is required. This is the only way we are able to protect our village and environment from unwelcome and unsympathetic development, you are our eyes and ears, we cannot know everything. Even removal of hedges and trees also require planning permission!

Thank you to all the team who help to monitor any planning applications that we receive.

Harbury Annual Parish Meeting

As Alison Hodge, Warwickshire Association of Local Councils' Secretary had to point out to the PC Chairman, this is the Annual Meeting of the Parish – NOT the Parish Council's Annual Meeting.

It is a time for the parishioners to hear what the Parish Council and other bodies have contributed to Harbury during the year. It was therefore sad that more people did not attend.

The invited speaker was Dr. Jacky Lawrence, Chair of Warwickshire County Council's Climate Change Partnership who explained that government targets and the County's Climate Change Strategy demand that we make an 80% reduction in Carbon Dioxide emissions by 2050. (At present here we produce 4.6 million tonnes a year)! We will each have to reduce our Carbon footprint by one tonne per person by 2011.

Capital investment to achieve this would cost £54,000,000 but as Jacky does not have this the only way forward is to support communities who want to make changes. She admitted when questioned that she has a revenue budget of only £9,000 for this year.

The Climate Change Partnership already has 326 people on its database and the website has 150 hits a month from people eager to learn more about Energy Efficiency and Generation, Transport, Communication and Education and Climate Change Adaptation (put Warwickshire Climate Change Partnership into Google to see the extent of the information available).

On the website there are links to community groups who are actively participating.

- Learnington is the County's first Transition Town looking at how to deal with Climate Change and Peak Oil (its fall in production and increase in price). They are focusing on community resilience; for instance, how will we feed ourselves?
- Kenilworth is working on Climate Change, Energy Efficiency and Fairtrade with the School Children.
- In Warwick Action 21 has a renewable energy club, has undertaken wind turbine trials and is looking into other sustainable methods of energy generation.
- Snitterfield Action on Climate Change is working towards being carbon neutral as a community and has been chosen to be one of ten villages in England to be showcased for the EU's "Villages without borders".
- Wolvey had turned its increasingly difficult to drain cricket field into a wetland habitat, so increasing biodiversity.

Jacky asked the Chairman if Harbury had a Parish Plan and what it was doing to mitigate the impacts of Climate Change. Tim explained that the Council was currently looking to make the street lighting more energy efficient.

Questioned closely by members of the public and Cllr Rob Darlison, who is part of a group working to refurbish the school swimming pool in an eco-friendly way, Jacky explained the research that she and members of the Partnership had already undertaken. She highlighted the extremely successful "Switch it off Campaign"; the initiative to create Community Champions and the Eco-schools project which has included 90% of Warwickshire's schools.

She believes that any lifestyle changes that people make help to raise awareness of the need for us all to make our lives and our communities more sustainable. There is an argument that some things are not as beneficial as they seem at first sight, but it is a learning process and taking the first step is important. The Climate Change Partnership is a way for everyone to learn from others and to energise their communities.

County Councillor Bob Stevens spoke of the Deppers Bridge weight limit; the County's 50 m.p.h. speed limits; the grant for traffic calming in Harbury and the reduction in the County's budget which is expected to continue for the next five years, causing a reduction in staff and services. Asked about the Library review he said there had to be savings but nothing was yet agreed.

District Councillor Andrew Patrick was concerned that some people who had recently moved into the Parish might have been left off the Electoral Roll, if they had tried to register on-line. He thought the introduction of the new refuse system had gone reasonably smoothly and he had helped to arrange for the old concrete stands to be collected. He publicised the Recycling Event and the Car Boot Sale to be put on whilst the Samois sur Seine visitors were in the village.

It was difficult for the public to quiz the Parish Councillors about their Annual Reports as the Chairman left little time for the audience to read them. However, David Winter asked about the boarding up of the Dog Inn and I asked if the Death Slide was to be resurrected and what would happen if at the promised public Consultation on Traffic Calming residents had objections to the plans.

Chris Finch, representing the Village Hall, agreed to the Chairman's insistence that there was no need to read Geoff Thorpe's report and then proceeded to paraphrase it at some length!

Alison Hodge suggested forcefully that the Annual Meeting of the Parish should contain reports from other venues, such as the Tom Hauley Room, and other groups such as GASS (the Scouts etc).

Everyone then partook of the Council's refreshments and kissed and made up!

Our April speaker cancelled and we were very fortunate to substitute with "An Evening with Elias Gruntfuttock" aka Nigel Chapman.

It started well with people reluctant to leave their examination of the photos, reports, press cuttings and estate agents details, Nigel brought from the School Archives. After a digression into Round the Horne and "I'm Sorry I haven't a clue" with Samantha's adventures in the gramophone archives, we learned now Nigel himself started to collect the amazing treasures now at the school. Some material was donated by residents; some he had conned the kids to collect; some he transcribed himself from old Newspaper reports such as:-

The 1888 fire at Knight's Store, Church Street. Started at 9pm. 10pm Southam Brigade arrived but emptied the shallow wells and did not have hoses long enough to reach the deep wells. 11pm telegraphed from Deppers Station to Leamington. Then six men hauled the manual engine as far the Oak Inn on Radford Road before horses caught them up. 12 midnight arrived in Harbury when the fire was burnt out!

Nigel warned that records could be misleading and then completely fabricated for us, the history of the Southam Pickle works including the dubious intelligence that Southam Recreation Ground was built by the Romans as an amphitheatre for galleon races!

For such a beautiful sunny day, the evening of our walk round Priory Park was bitterly cold, but we were warmed in spirit by the infectious enthusiasm of Steven Falk, Senior Keeper of Natural History at Warwickshire Museum. If you want to get a glimpse of the breadth of his knowledge download the latest Wildlife News which he produces – www.warwickshire.gov.uk/rings

The parkland had been associated with the 1109 Priory of St Sepulchre. The Priory building was dismantled amongst much controversy and shipped to America in 1925.

Steven showed us the native Common and the Swedish Whitebeam; the hybrid "London" Plane; the "Common" Lime; Grand Fir; Scots Pine; Weymouth, Maritime, Austrian and the Monterey Pine with huge cones which need fire to germinate.

He showed the difference between a Beech and a Hornbeam (more fluted bark); Sycamore, drooping flowers and Norway Maple with more upright panicles. We saw several Rowans and Maples; the Wych Elm with an asymmetric leaf base and points at the end and on the sides and the "English" Elm, introduced by the Romans.

We saw some rare and wonderful trees too. A gnarled old Robinia; a Gingko, the Maidenhair tree; a Tulip Tree; a fine Southern Beech, with small leaves on weeping branches and an amazing Paulonia — the Foxglove Tree - with intense violet foxglove flowers.

As well as exotics we were also treated to some very traditional and useful flora too. Priory Park has huge swathes of raspberries! There are Sweet Chestnuts and two types of Walnut. It has apple trees and several types of pear. It was a lovely introduction to the Park and we thoroughly enjoyed our very cold evening.

Our Carnival Stall on 13th June will be selling Bric-a-Brac and on 20th June there is a Guided Walk round Ryton Woods to see the Butterflies.



A Review of the Season

This season has been excellent with some outstanding rugby played at all levels from U7's –U12's, 1st and 2nd XV's.

Mini Rugby

I can recall watching the Minis and Midis at the HARBURY FESTIVAL at the beginning of October. They fared reasonably well but there was room for improvement.

Seven months later the U10's and U11's are age group winners in the prestigious Barker Butts Festival at the end of April. The Under 8's are runners up and the U9's and 12's record more wins than losses.

The transformation has been outstanding and owes a huge debt to the coaches, players and the Mini and Junior Committee. The lads and lasses have really enjoyed their respective tours and the Fund Raising Committee, which I attended, is enthusiastic and creative well done to all concerned.

We now have over 120 in the Mini Section with all age groups from U7-U12. Next season we will be aiming to put out all ages at Mini level and 15 side rugby at U13 and hopefully U 14. These form our players for the future.

1st XV

At the end of last season the 1st XV eventually won enough matches to remain in Midlands 5 West (South) it was tight but worth it and the final match at Manor Park saw a dramatic 13-12 win which saw us staying up and MP condemned to the drop (although subsequent re-structuring saw MP retaining their place.

This season involved absorbing the Colts players who have been with the club since the age of seven. Their progress has been guided during that

time by Sean Comerford and Steve Dunne and both were key in helping with a smooth transition between Colts and Senior Rugby. The contribution that these lads have made to both the 1st's and 2nd's has been immense. It is their enthusiasm and commitment that has been harnessed by Club Captain Matt Knight, 1st XV Captain Jeff Foster, Vice Captains Ricky and Steve Alford and 2nd XV Captain Adrian Exton and his v/c James Broomer.

After winning the pre-season Paddy Tournament the 1st XV won their opening match against Redditch 21-5. This began an impressive winning streak only to be de-railed with a very poor match at home to Manor Park who won 7-6. However, Harbury got back onto the winning trail immediately with a win the following week at Evesham.

Whilst this was going on Harbury were also notching successes in the EDF Junior Vase (a competition open to all clubs across England at our level and below over 500 in total). The eventual outcome, following an outstanding 22-13 victory over Redditch, was a quarter final place at home to Lowestoft and Yarmouth for a place in semi-finals.

Sadly a dream of a Twickenham visit was dashed by a comprehensive victory for our visitors. However, it was a huge plus and credit for such a small club to get this far.

The injury count had its toll as Harbury went back to the League programme and suffered a 15-5 reverse at Coventry Welsh — a day when we had the backs but lacked six forwards who had been injured the week before. Although a win at Dudley put us back on the track a rather muted display at Redditch saw the hosts record a 19-0 victory to overtake Harbury at the top of the table. The threat of Evesham, who had enjoyed a rich vein of form with an unbeaten run following their home defeat by Harbury, looked an awkward match. However, on a Vice President's Day at the beginning of April it was Harbury who ruled the day with a 25-8 win and some stunning defence to regain the lead at the top of the table. Three more victories saw the League season completed and it was all down to Redditch to win at Evesham to become Champions — which they did by a single point.

Midlands 5 West (South)

Harbury and Redditch are promoted to Midlands 4 West (South) which will be a far harder league. Opponents will include local rivals Old Learningtonians, Southam and Shipston with trips to unknown grounds at Ledbury and Pershore.

We will be actively recruiting over the summer to help meet the new challenge.



Season 2008-09 review

Presentation Evening - 9th May 2009

With over 100 players registered with the club between the ages of 6-13 it was quite a 'push' to be able to present everyone with their medals, the trophy winners with their awards and for the coaches to summarise the season in as few words as possible to ensure that all those who needed to be thanked and congratulated were. Some coaches managed it better than others but all of the children who were there enjoyed coming up on stage to receive their awards from Leamington Brakes FC Championship winning captain, Guy Sanders.

I'd like to thank all of the coaches, committee members, parent helpers and supporters, and players for the enthusiasm, effort and achievement for last season. In as few words as possible let me summarise the season by age group.

Under 13-14

For these guys it has been a challenging time as they were the defending league champions of the previous season and the league was not able to provide enough teams this year to make a competition viable. Inevitably, some players have either moved on to other clubs or simply decided not to play. However, we have retained a core group of players, several of whom have developed through the club from the ages of 6 and 7, who have continued to train, practise and play the odd friendly match through

the last 9 months. It's a credit to the coaches, Neil Murray and Andy Dickson, that so many boys have turned up each week to continue to learn and develop their skills. We hope that some of the boys will start to think about helping some of the younger players next year.

Under 12

As above, there was no U12 '3 Counties League' this season but in order to keep the team together coach Malcolm Tanner moved them into the Central Warwickshire, an FA accredited league we were allowed to enter only just on the basis of Harbury being the radial distance of 15 miles from the M40/M42 interchange! (Alex Ferguson never has these problems). The season has proved challenging with some long journeys to parts of Birmingham but we have re-entered the league for next season, retained a core group of players and will start a couple of divisions lower, which I'm sure will lead to better results, more confidence and more players wishing to join.

If you had looked in a copy of the Sunday People on Sunday 10th May this year you would have seen a photo of our team who were playing the 'People's' boys team of the week. Following our TV appearance on CBBC some three years ago we've now made it into the national press.

Under 11

Manchester United may be champions for the third season in a row but anything they can do this team has matched in becoming champions for the third season in succession. Congratulations to the team and to Coach Tony Chamberlain who, after 5 seasons in charge, is 'hanging up' his coaching boots. The team only lost one match all season and the league title came down to the final match of the season, with Harbury prevailing.

Under 10-11 girls

This season we entered an all girls team into a previously boys only league under the managerial tutelage of Judith Woodfield. The team has shown a massive improvement in the quality of their football, some of them never having played in an organised competition before this season. In the league 'end of season' tournament were they were runners-up in the Supplementary Cup final, playing the whole tournament with makeshift goalkeepers due to injury, they were a good match for many of the teams they came up against. One coach was heard to comment that his lads had never met a team that tackled so hard. Next season the team has received dispensation for the Year 7 girls to play in the U10-11 league so I'm sure they will post some impressive results as the team continues to develop.

Under 10-11 boys

Under Coach Carolyn Dorning, the boys' team won more matches than

they lost and competed well at the end of season tournament. They will be in the same league next season so should have a good chance to compete for the top places.

Under 8

This was the first season in a league format for all of these players, including 4 girls in a squad of 17 players. Coach Richard 'Woody' Woodhead, therefore, has addressed selection issues all season long but the team recorded some creditable wins and draws and improved against teams a year older in every game. Next season they will be one of the 'older' teams in their league and, after 'Woody' and assistant coach Marcus Riley have returned from investing a couple of weekends earning their FA Level 1 coaching badges, we expect them to push for further honours to go with their League Cup runner up trophy.

Under 7

We were delighted to welcome back Steve Darby this season, after a 3-year break from the club, to support Steve Burnell in developing our youngest squad members. Given the numbers of parents standing in the school grounds every Saturday morning these sessions have obviously proved popular and we're lucky to have two such dedicated coaches guiding our newest players. This is probably the most important age group as recruitment here helps to ensure continuity for the club with its most vital asset – players!

The coaches and committee - thank you

The beginning of the season saw Alan and Kathy Sampson step down as joint treasurers after 4 years in the financial 'hot seat'. We're also grateful to Kathy for preparing final accounts for previous seasons that has saved the club several hundred pounds each time. Lesley van Kesteren admirably stepped into the breach and has moved over all of the paperwork this season.

Also, a big thanks to Lynda Murray, who designed the logo for the club badges and typeset for the jackets and any 'club documentation'. Lynda also provided a great newsletter for a number of seasons and coordinated monthly articles like this one to keep people up to speed with what is happening at the club.

After 5 years I would like to step down as Chairman, having started out thinking I'd offer 1 evening a month as Secretary back in 2004; I've had a great run in helping to build and secure the finances, providing a secure storage area, ensuring continuity of age groups, getting coaches qualified to FA accredited levels and providing more and better kit and equipment.

It really is time for someone or a group to come in and to move the club on another level and in order for this to happen the existing people need to step aside. Bobbie also wants to stand down as Child Welfare Officer, although for next season we will remain registered with the FA on behalf of the club until a new team is ready.

Bobbie and I are very grateful to all who presented us with gifts at the recent Presentation evening.

From a satisfaction point of view there is a lot to be gained from 'driving' the club forward and working with a lot of talented people who coach and run the teams on a weekly basis.

Many of those mentioned above are moving on after a similar length of service and we all started with younger children and have seen them develop as people, as well as footballers, with the ethos of the club being about everyone taking part, no trials and a culture of 'all those who train will play' some part in matches. The joint Bishops Itchington and Harbury approach, with additional boys and girls from Warwick Gates and Leamington, has helped to ensure that the club has a good number of players, good finances and a good reputation in the leagues in which its teams compete. Anyone looking to help support and run the club will be taking on one with cash in the bank, decent training pitches thanks to the Parish Council and Harbury School, a good set of coaches and players at a young age that will carry the club for a few seasons. So all the indicators are good and someone who wants to help move the club forward will be coming in to a good structure with an opportunity to choose the direction.

Clock Face

You may have noticed that the Church tower has a new clock face mounted on it. When the clock mechanism was refurbished in 1994, the wooden boards of the face were painted and gold leaf numerals applied. It didn't take long, however, to begin to peel and relatively soon became unsightly. Rather than spend more money on more gold leaf it was decided



to take a different course of action. At the time there was opportunity to have the numerals screen printed in gold epoxy based paint onto a suitable surface, essentially for free, It was a bit of an experiment since it was not known exactly how long the paint would last in such an exposed condition. For the cost of a sheet of steel and black powder coat paint, the Church gained a new clock face. That face has lasted 'till now, however for the past couple of years it has been pretty much illegible. At the funeral of Harry Windsor the donations made were split between the Coventry Diocesan Guild of a Church Bellringers and Harbury Church. Joyce Windsor had expressed her desire at the time to see the money used to refurbish the clock face since Harry was heavily involved with the replacement of the old one and had a life long fascination in clocks and time keeping, amongst many other things. Yet another method of face construction was chosen this time, in an effort to find longevity. The dye used in anodising aluminium has long been recognised as having good colour fastness properties against light. This is essentially what did for the old face. As it turns out, black and gold are the best of the lot, fortunate for us. The new face therefore, is constructed from 5mm thick 5015 grade aluminium with a 25mm angle sub-frame. The wooden frame replaced 10 years ago is still in good condition so, with a little sprucing up from Tony Stubbs using exterior semi-gloss woodstain, it was re-used. In order for the numerals and minute markers to be gold whilst the background is black, it was necessary to have them separate. A water jet profile cutter in Coventry cut them out of another piece of the same aluminium material. They are attached using M3 stainless steel screws through from the rear of the face. This gives the face an embossed look and if the colours do fade over time then the numbers will still stand out thus avoiding the

situation we were in before. Anodising was carried out by a company in Walsall, who incidentally were responsible for anodising all of the silver domes covering the Selfridges building in The Bull Ring, Birmingham. Transport kindly provided by Mike Morris. Help erecting the scaffold tower, from Priory Tool Hire, and the face was provided by Jeff Bedford, John Moore, Brian Jones and John and David Peacock. Thus the Church has a new clock face made possible through donations to Harry. We are pleased that Joyce was able to see the face up on the wall before leaving the village. My thanks to all those who helped out.

He took a party of teenage students, very brave of him, to Venezuela and it was obvious from his slides that they enjoyed every minute. The scenery was so diverse, from vast rock formations, some of the oldest in the world through to The Andes and large Table Mountains to Rainforests and huge waterfalls. He did show us a slide of Angel Falls which looked absolutely amazing with rainbows bouncing off the cascade of water. Unfortunately there was no crock of gold at the end of the rainbows.

A lot of the journey was on foot and catering was quite basic and they spent evenings in tents. When they reached the top of one particular mountain they were in fact above the clouds and the landscape took on a different perspective. The plants some of which were familiar, such as orchids, were so vibrant and colourful. The Bromeliads that grow in hothouses here were just growing as wild flowers as were pitcher plants. In the Rainforests the mosses were hosts to cloud orchids the colours of

Now is the time to enjoy the fruits of all your hard work earlier in the year. Too many flowers to mention will be blooming now including the much-loved roses. We have some lovely old fashioned shrub roses in the garden at the Nursery; come and smell their wonderful scents.

All your tender plants can go outside now: e.g. bedding plants, tomatoes, courgettes, runner beans.

I hardly dare mention how dry it's been in the first part of May for fear that we shall have yet another soaking wet summer. If it remains dry, don't forget to water in any newly planted plants. Hanging baskets can dry out particularly quickly in windy weather.

The long term forecast is for a warmer than average summer, personally I think "they" don't know 2 days ahead, let alone months ahead! That news was probably put out to offset all the other gloomy news dominating the headlines.

On 6th May, Philip and I plus Pat Priest drove over to Bedford in a large hired van stuffed with plants for a special new garden outside the main entrance to Bedford Hospital. Bridge Nursery had been contracted to supply the plants for this and to do the planting work. Once there, we met up with the three other members of our team. Work started shortly after 8am and by 3.30pm all 750 plants had been laid out, planted and watered in. The design was created by Graham A Pavey and it represents a dry river bed - lots of gravel and cobbles together with lots of different ornamental grasses, some hostas, roses and three special silver Birch trees. The focal point is a sculpture of a pair of swans which appear to have just taken off. We were all pretty shattered by the end of the day but were also very pleased that the job had gone so smoothly, thanks mainly to the experience and efficiency of our helpers. We very much appreciated the hard work put in by Pat, Carol, Lizzie and Joe. The build up to the day had caused us a considerable amount of anxiety beforehand but in the end it was a satisfying experience.

Now – back to normal work......Mowing, Weeding, Deadheading, Trimming back shrubs which have finished flowering. And gosh! The hedges will need trimming soon!

Greenfly: - I tend either to squash them by hand or simply leave them – in time ladybird larvae, hoverflies or birds will eat them..........

Nature Notes

The weather over Spring Bank Holiday has been warm and generally sunny with the temperature on Sunday rising to 22°C (72°F). Now, we have every tree in leaf and can marvel at the variety of the colour green. The pale Oak green of May is totally different from the heavier, deeper green the leaves will become as summer reaches its zenith in July. Young leaves on certain species are not green at all. Poplar could be described as yellow and Walnut red. As green chlorophyll pigment is brought into the leaves via the tree's 'plumbing system', the varied spring colours turn to a more uniform green. The leaves of Copper Beech still contain chlorophyll needed for photosynthesis but the green colour is masked by other pigments notably anthocyanins and carotenoids. Look at a Copper Beech in shade and the leaves will be seen to be rather greener than those of a tree in a sunny position.

Earlier in May, I visited Draycote Meadows (GR SP 448706 OS Map 140, Leicester and Coventry). There, two large fields of ridge and furrow give a hint of what our pastures must have looked like before chemicals became

widely used to manipulate the vegetation and produce uniform fields of grass. Buttercups, Cowslips and Yellow Rattle were much in evidence but the real reason I had come was to get my annual 'fix' of hundreds of Green-Winged Orchids. In some years there are thousands and for a few weeks the ground, especially where it's sunny, seems to shimmer with the colour purple. Look more closely and you will find some albino specimens and every colour from there to deep purple; the pink variety being especially eye-catching. It's a short step along a bridleway and over a golf course to the village of Thurlaston. From there take a footpath onto the circular road around Draycote Reservoir and return to your starting point via Sustrans cycle route no 41 (Leamington to Rugby). Other rarities at Draycote Meadows are the enigmatically named Adders Tongue Fern and Moonwort.

Rex Humphreys reported seeing Swifts in the village on May 5th and now these aerial acrobats with their raucous call are making themselves at home. While on a walk in the Chilterns on April 28th, I missed the path and cut across a rough pasture to regain it. A hare came out of its form at my feet and while stopping to examine the spot, I caused a bird to fly up. It was a Skylark, and by good fortune, there was its nest with three small eggs within.

Back home recently we had a pair of Blackbirds building in a Clematis ten feet from the kitchen window. We looked forward to seeing the fledglings in due course. Unfortunately something has gone wrong and the nest is empty. Perhaps the female came to grief, cat or car being the most likely assassin. Now, a nest box in the apple tree halfway up the garden has a resident pair of Great Tits so perhaps they will raise a family. Our special bird of the month was a Hoopoe (Upupa epops). It was pecking at the lawn in a hotel garden near the Pyramids on the western edge of Cairo. A Hoopoe is about the size of a Great spotted Woodpecker. It has a sandy body with bold black and white wings and crest. It uses its long curving beak to find ants and other insects. These birds breed in Southern Europe having crossed the Sahara. They occasionally reach the British Isles. Once seen never forgotten.

Later, whilst sailing in a felucca, we had a grandstand view of Pied Kingfishers as they dived for food. With a population of nearly 80 million and a country which is 96% desert, Egypt relies on the Nile Valley, its delta and some fertile oases to produce the crops it needs. Building the Aswan High Dam (completed 1971) has proved a mixed blessing. Whilst curtailing the annual floods and providing half the country's energy needs, the silt, which once fertilised the land below Aswan, is now trapped. Farmers have to use chemical fertilisers and soil salinity is difficult to combat. With no silt deposits to replenish it, the Delta coastline is being eroded by the Mediterranean.

Back home, butterflies and moths are much in evidence. At Bishops Hill, the old cement works site with its vegetated spoil heap, the smallest British butterfly has one of its few Warwickshire strongholds. The Small Blue is nationally scarce as being so small it is easily overlooked. It requires areas where the thin soil is rather crumbly and the plant cover sparse and warm. Despite its name, there is little blue to see, the predominate colour at rest being black with a white fringe. In flight, the blue colour becomes more obvious. Without management, Bishops Hill will gradually become wooded and this will jeopardise the survival of this very attractive insect. I was shown the Small Blue (Cupido minimus) by David Brown who led a University of Warwick Open Studies group on Lepidoptera to the site on the 18th May. It was a rather unpropitious day with heavy showers and a stiff breeze. In fact, this enabled us to see the insects at rest as they sheltered in clumps of grass. Other butterflies seen were the moth like Grizzled and Dingy Skippers together with a single Painted Lady. On 23rd May, on a perfect early summer day, I returned with Margaret and Peter McDonald. Peter took some excellent photographs that I'm sure he will be willing to share with you.
