



Our autumn programme is now underway and all members should now have received their copy — thanks to Chris Rutherford for the attractive presentation.



Ladbroke Parish Council

At the opening of the meeting, the Chairman announced one minutes silence in memory of Janice Berry. Janice had been a Ladbroke Parish Councillor from 2002 until she died recently in 2010.

Public Participation – Complaints were made once again about the transportation of boats through the village. (This was a stated condition that boat building could only continue provided that the boats were not brought through the village. The complainant had times and dates and could also provide photographs).

A second villager – this time the racing of motorbikes along the bypass. The police were aware of the motorbikes and further enforcements were to be implemented soon. Also – the policy on verge cutting along the bypass was requested. It was indicated that this is the responsibility of the Highways Department.

Matters Arising – Change of road name – residents along Windmill Lane will be contacted with "name change" proposals.

An enforcement order is to be issued to the caravan dweller behind Ladbroke Farm; apparently two container "sheds" have now appeared. Formal complaints have been made and the situation is in the hands of the District Council.

Parking on the verges in Windmill Lane (lower end) is "still on the agenda".

Dog Waste – Complaints were made about dog faeces on graves in the churchyard and also by the telephone kiosk. The mess is on the increase due to many dogs in Ladbroke, also irresponsible owners.

Planning – The Council had no objection to the removal or pruning of trees in Bridge Lane, several of which overhang the roadway.

New Village Hall – Stratford District Council has not had the reapplication for planning permission from the Village Hall architect. The District Council wanted several amendments made. More consultation was needed with the architect.

Tesco's is still pending. The next meeting is in mid-October.

Policing – Due to the new policing areas, they are very busy. The Council was considering the possibility of the police attending meetings on a quarterly basis.

Flooding – The road junction by Deppers Bridge Farm and Kineton Road was discussed.

Footpath – The overgrown hedge in School Lane should have been cut back. The District Council will take responsibility and charge the owner.

The "discharge" in the drains at Ladbroke Hall was mentioned; will this become a problem again in the winter?

Parish Plan – Is this now becoming a historic document? The Chairman is keen to get the whole thing finalised.

Village Hall - The AGM date will be arranged in October/November.

Millennium Green – All the new equipment and safety matting is in place. A safety inspection by the District Council will take place in October.

Warwickshire County Councillor's Report – We have four austere years ahead. We shall not notice much until after the General Election! There will need to be something like a £20 million reduction. Social Services and children have priority; more and more children are going into care. The Fire Service is to become more efficient with all firemen having proper training. The libraries are a problem; Southam is safe because it is fully utilised but people are not borrowing books like they used to and so libraries will close. No Council staff are to be made redundant but vacancies will not be filled.

Ufton - Recycling of green waste will now have begun.

District Councillor's Report – This was much the same as the County report – shortage of money. There is talk of 6 wind turbines being built between Bishops Itchington and Knighcote.

Swine 'Flu has been exaggerated. If it comes back, the worry is lack of support staff if they are off sick.

Items for Discussion – The Village Hall Committee has asked the Parish Council for a contribution towards the cost of some replacement chairs.

The travellers have gone from their usual camping site at the entrance to the village. They have left tree cuttings from another site in the hedge. It was suggested that people doing Community Service would clear it up.

Vacancy on the Parish Council - This is to be advertised.

At the September meeting in the Village Hall we were treated to a fascinating account of 'The Baron of Packwood'. Speaker Mike Miles had painstakingly researched the life of the Graham Baron Ash and his obvious deep involvement in his subject kept us spellbound.

At the age of 15, Baron, the only son of Alfred Ash of Ash and Lacey Galvanised Iron Works, persuaded his father to buy Packwood House. For the next 35 years Baron repaired, restored and added to the building, removing all traces of 18th and 19th century décor and turning it

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into 'a perfect Elizabethan gentleman's house'. In 1940 he gave the Deeds of Packwood House, most of its contents, 113 acres of surrounding land and a £30,000 endowment for the upkeep, to the National Trust.

Baron spent the rest of his life in Suffolk, restoring Wingfield Castle.

His ashes were returned to the family grave at St Giles Church in Packwood and can be recognised by a stone plinth and tall column on the North side of the churchyard. Also to be seen in St Giles Church is the stained glass window depicting a pre-Raphaelite figure with the word 'Charity' beneath. Baron commissioned this in memory of his mother, Emily.

During the business meeting Lesley Jeffries, president, passed round the events book for members to select the trips they wished to attend including a tour of the new Myton Hospice in Coventry, tickets to the Spa Opera musical, a day school on Macbeth and a Christmas pantomime. The next meeting will be the Annual Meeting on 22nd October at 7.30. May I give advance information that, in a change to the usual format, the speaker for the November meeting on 26th, John Church speaking on Wartime Memories, will precede the business meeting.

Planning loomed large at this long meeting where the majority of the time was taken up with discussions on the proposed sewerage system for the Bush Heath Lane development, but also on a presentation from Paul Quinney on the Playschool's plans to improve the Wight School.

Security, toilets and the kitchen were to be upgraded and the old toilet block demolished to widen the driveway to the east. The group had applied for an Early Years grant of £95,000 and needed a further \pounds 75,000 to complete the project. The council indicated that it was broadly in favour of the scheme.

Then Karena Ellis and Tony Stubbs for Village with a Vision asked for start -up funds for their negotiations to secure residential "care" for the elderly in the village. They have identified suitable plots of land and interested developers in their scheme which they believe would prevent those needing care from having to leave friends and family in Harbury. The Council approved a grant of £100.

A petition from thirty two local residents opposed to the **Bush Heath** Lane scheme was presented. There were suggestions that there had been insufficient consultation, which the Parish Council refuted. Chairman Tim Lockley also explained that the sewerage easement was not a planning matter but for the Council to decide. Their Standing Orders allowed them to rescind their previous decision and eventually they approved a motion to allow the easement across the Playing Fields, having been reassured that they would have no liability should repairs be needed.

But much discussion took place and many technical questions were posed and answered. The sewerage pumping station had storage capacity should both pumps fail and as there was no surface water involved, flooding was unlikely. The system would be needed wherever the effluent was subsequently sent, but ST had insisted it fed into the Constance Drive sewer and thence to Deppers Bridge as the Mill Street Pumping Station did not have extra capacity.

Both Cllr Hancock and Jenny Patrick made it clear that they wanted the development to go ahead to provide much needed homes for local people and Cllr Grey said he now understood the excessive cost and disruption that would result if the sewer had to go down Bush Heath Lane.

In response to Mr Patrick Tanner's plea for the developers to release technical details so that he could employ an independent consultant Tim Lockley pointed out that these would be available once a planning application was lodged, although he acknowledged there was limited time to respond to it.

Further Planning Matters Stratford District granted extensions at 3 Sutcliffe Drive and Northcote, Deppers Bridge, a porch at New House,

Bull Ring Lane, demolition of existing houses at Leycester House, Chesterton Road and Eastfields Farm, Deppers Bridge and the construction of new dwellings, a boundary wall for Harbury House, a replacement of industrial building with a garage and carport at The Lodge; Hall Lane and retrospective permissions for a flue at The Byre, 6 Greenhill Farm and a new access at the Rugby Club.

The Parish Council had no comments on extensions planned at 15 The Beeches, 11 Penelope Close or 5 Pirie Close, nor on the proposed treeworks at the Quarries.

Co-option: The Parish Council chose to co-opt Amanda Lewis (who brought her six week old son along to the meeting and stayed until the end at 9.45pm.) After that, Chairman Tim Lockley rattled through the agenda.

Councillors' Corner: Stratford Cllr Beverley Mann explained that approval for two years had been given to Broadview for a mast as part of their investigations into the feasibility of siting a Windfarm at Starbold.

County Cllr Bob Stevens again urged the Council to bid for roadworks before the WCC budget was set. The County faced budget cuts of £20m for the next four years. The Fire Station Review was underway. WCC's annual grants round started on 1st October with £10k available for Community Involvement projects. The results of the Library Review would be ready in October.

The Parish Council accepted a quote of £110 from Cllr Grey to build fitted shelving for Harbury Library to hold the **Book Exchange** volumes that the Chairman was organising. The Library was welcome to take whatever it wanted into its own stock.

Deppers Bridge: The Council agreed to "sponsor" the Deppers Bridge Telephone Box which had been declared redundant to save it as an historic artefact. Ladbroke used theirs as a Village Noticeboard. Ron Grey claimed it was the class dividing line for Deppers. The houses uphill were built for SALE to quarryworkers; those downhill were merely for RENT!

Properties: Janet Thornley was still seeking grants for a BMX track. Clirs would help their contractor to lay flat dangerous memorials in the Burial Grounds. Inspections of the Play Equipment would be reduced to fortnightly outside holiday periods but continue weekly during school holidays. The Scouts were to plant more daffodils round the village.

Trees: It was agreed to ask Colin Sheasby to remove some branches from the Copper Beech in the Burial Grounds which were overhanging an adjacent garden. The Council agreed to seek volunteer help to plant a copse on the south-eastern extremity of the Playing Fields as part of the BBC's Tree o'clock initiative on 5th December.

Roads: The Harbury sign was still missing at the Fosse/Middle Road junction and someone has removed the Stratford DC sign at Bendigo Mitchell crossroads.

The patches on the road at Temple End and Chapel Street/Park Lane corner are breaking up. Cllr Knowles reported that the Mill St leak has been found to be from a householders supply and that Severn Trent would deal with it. The Chairman complained about a "boggy patch" on the field footpath by the Mill Street pumping station.

AOB:Letters of thanks for Parish Council grants were received from the Heritage Group and the Duke of Edinburgh Award Team. Cllr Mancell thanked the Clerk for her work in presenting the books for Audit. Cllrs would work with the Clerk on completing the Emergency Plan, renewing their Quality Parish Status and they would also revisit Harbury's Parish Plan.

Harbury Theatre Group's Next Production: Thurs 26, Fri 27 and Sat 28 November -" Tons of Money"


We're planning special effects for the audience's delight: an explosion on stage, and near nudity by a male after swimming in the lake!


You also get to visit some of the most beautiful spots (and pubs) in the



Creative: As well as painting and making pictures of their bears, the children have made their own playdough and investigated the different textures and effects of dry




and wet cornflour and dry and wet powder paints. Rosie found that the dry powder paint made some lovely hand prints and this led to more of the children experimenting with the different colours.


During the holidays, staff have reorganised the room and created a new book corner and role-play area.







Curiouser and curiouser? Some months ago the Village Hall 'lost' several newly purchased water jugs and most of its trays; now it has been discovered that an electric kettle has gone missing and over 90 white china cups, saucers and teaspoons. Whilst the kettle might be an oversight by someone who borrowed it with the intention of returning it, the disappearance of the cups seems a more deliberate removal of equipment, especially since some white pyrex cups stored in the Wagstaffe Room were transferred to plug what would otherwise have been a gaping hole in the crockery cupboard. As a result, members of the committee will be carrying out another detailed audit this month in an effort to check the amount of cutlery and other items which are made available for all hirers to use.

It's a case of some we lose as a result of persons unknown and fortunately some we win from our own efforts. The committee has recently heard that we have received £1,983.75 from a Community Sustainable Energy Grant (part of the Lottery), which has to be spent on gaining advice about the energy provision in the Hall so that it can be improved with current guidelines. In addition, by working alongside GASS to provide the food at the Beer Festival, a share of the £1,500 profit was gained last month. We have also received a very generous donation of £500 from the Carnival committee, so that combined with other monies raised from various fund-raising activities, it is hoped that work will start on the modernisation of the toilets in January. Whilst this is in process, the Hall should still be available for use, as there are toilets situated in the changing rooms at the far end of the Hall, which can be used in the interim period whilst building work is in progress.

At the most recent committee meeting, Geoff Thorpe (Chairman) welcomed two new members who have agreed to take over the important roles of Booking Secretary (Celia Neill) and Treasurer (Martin Randall). We came back from 9 days away in glorious Devon last weekend to a very dry garden. I have spent ages watering etc. The courgettes have turned into marrows in my allotment, I had a glut of runner beans, sweet com, broccoli and some very nice pears and much more. We shall certainly be eating fresh vegetables for many more weeks to come, worth all that digging and planting.

I hope that some of you managed to get to the Village Show which Janice will be covering. Our new season starts on Tuesday 6th October with a talk from Judy Berrow about her own garden called "starting from scratch", I look forward to seeing you all there. As mentioned before. Still a few lovely places to visit in the next few weeks, here are some suggestions.

Picton Gardens are closing this year but will be open until 18th October; they are at Colwall near Malvern. As well as the glorious views of the Malverns it is home to a National Collection of Michaelmas Daisies and has other late season colour with perennials, shrubs and bamboos. They open from Wednesday to Sunday from 2.0pm to 5pm. If you feel like going a little further I can recommend Bluebell Arboretum and Nursery at Smisby near Ashby de la Zouch. A fabulous collection of trees in the woodland garden with so much colour at this time of year. The liquidambers are quite a feature here. Open daily for more information go to www.bluebellnursery.com.

Also not too far away, Westbury Court Garden near to Gloucester is one of the rarest examples of a formal Dutch style water garden. It has been extensively restored by the National Trust and now has pristine parterres of hedges and topiary filled with flowers of the period when it was built between 1696 and 1705. There are vegetables an elegant summerhouse with vistas down the long canal. Look in your National Trust book for details of opening etc or phone 01452 760461 or look at the website of the Trust. Hidcote is also looking good this year, why not combine a visit here with Kiftsgate, two great gardens with much to appreciate and enjoy.

An Apple Day is being held at Pershore College on 17th October, for more details contact 01386 554609. There will be an Apple and Pumpkin Day at Garden Organic Ryton on 4th October. Also they are holding 2 interesting talks, one on 8th October from 1.30 to 4.30 entitled Grow Healthy Plants, and the second on 29th called Seed Saving also from 1.30 to 4.30. Don't forget that we have 2 tickets for Ryton which members are very welcome to borrow; Daphne currently holds these but now she has stepped down as Secretary I will hold these for the time being.



I hope that you will find something of interest to you but wherever you go just enjoy these last few weeks of lovely Autumnal days. We are so lucky to live in this part of Warwickshire with so much to see and appreciate so make the most of it.

The nights are drawing in and there's a nip in the air in the mornings.



Frosts are a definite possibility, so be prepared to protect any tender plants. If you have a greenhouse, conservatory or porch and plenty of horticultural fleece, you should be able to over-winter those non-hardy plants.

As I write this in mid-September, there are early signs of autumn. Leaves are beginning to fall and there is a hint of autumn colour in some trees. This is really the best time to take the opportunity to visit Westonbirt or Batsford Arboretum. I would also suggest a trip to Bluebell Nursery near Ashby de la Zouch – it's a fascinating place with many rare and unusual trees which have brilliant coloured leaves and wonderful bark: well worth a visit.

At Bridge Nursery we have been cutting plants back, weeding and generally trying to keep everything fairly tidy (but not too tidy – we need to encourage wildlife). Philip has had to mow every week since early spring – a noisy and repetitive job to my mind but he seems to enjoy it. I'm always envious that mowing produces instantly noticeable results whereas weeding is only noticed if it isn't done!



I'm writing this on the first day of autumn, Tuesday 22nd September. It's been a notably dry month and now the ground is really hard making digging in the garden quite a chore. Modern ploughs make light work of turning the soil and the view over farmland hereabouts is dun coloured in the main interspersed with flashes of green. Some rain is forecast for today though I doubt the amount will do more than lay the dust. Leaves have long lost their light green shades and the heavier greens of summer are fading as valuable chlorophyll is reabsorbed by the trees. Now certain Maples are a vivid red and some Horse Chestnut leaves a golden brown, often with large black fungal blotches. Conkers are raining down and are still a popular collectors' item for many a child.

Old industrial sites can be just right for wildlife. Whilst negotiating the Anderton boat lift in Cheshire, the crew of our hired narrow boat 'Roberta' were told by the lift manager to look at the upper part of a crumbling chemical works across the River Weaver. We could just make out two birds perched on a ledge. They proved to be Peregrine Falcons and had made their nest on a suitable ledge with a superb view of the surrounding countryside. Field glasses gave us a better view, a first for me. It's said to be one of the great sights to be seen in the natural landscape of Britain-a Peregrine as it tracks its prey, often a pigeon, and suddenly dives or 'stoops' as it is known. The bird can reach a speed of over 150mph and kills its victim by impact breaking the neck. Peregrine numbers plummeted in the mid part of the 20th century. Many were shot as it was thought they would kill carrier pigeons bringing news of U-Boat sightings from spotter planes in the Western Approaches (radio silence being essential). Later, the use of powerful pesticides hit the Hawk and Falcon families of birds in particular. They were at the apex of a food chain and suffered depredations by gamekeepers. Now from a low of 68 breeding pairs in 1962, the Peregrine has staged a remarkable recovery and there are close to 2000 breeding pairs.

Roberta's cruise took us through country altered by salt extraction. Large meres are encountered around Northwich, Winsford and Middlewich. Sometimes the Trent and Mersey canal itself entered a lake, the result of subsidence. Some houses in Northwich are wooden and have a system whereby they can be jacked up to keep them level and avoid collapse, the fate of many earlier stone and brick structures. I recommend a visit, if you are in the vicinity, there's an excellent museum devoted to the salt industry. The curator welcomed us and after an introductory film we toured the exhibits which are housed in the former workhouse.

State of the art salt extraction still goes on in the area though it avoids causing collapse of the terrain by the use of echo sounding apparatus and removing only about 20% of available salt with bulwarks between each chamber. Hot water is pumped underground to dissolve the salt which is then brought to the surface as brine. The rock salt used to grit our roads comes from a single mine at Winsford. Public access to this is possible by arrangement; another visit beckons. The salt in the Cheshire/Shropshire basin was formed during the Triassic Period (about 248-200 million years ago). The environment at that time was similar to that in the Persian Gulf or the deserts of the south-west USA today. Shallow seas covered the area from time to time. As they evaporated, the salt was laid down.

On another visit to Cheshire to visit friends, who had just moved and needed some help with the overgrown garden, I visited an intriguing spot. We needed a break after removing a Sycamore stump so cycled down some lanes close to Kelsall, a village some 8 miles east of Chester. I was taken to see the packhorse bridges crossing the River Gowy. There are three in a line linked with a paved causeway. The site is known as Hockenhull Platts. I was interested in the name. Although the bridges are in England, they are not far from the Welsh border and it's likely that their name is derived from a combination of English and Welsh roots. Platt is an Old English name for bridge (hence plank). Hock may come from the Welsh 'hocan' meaning to peddle. 'Hen' is Welsh for old and 'hoel' means a paved way. This gives us, with a bit of creativity, 'the bridges on the old pedlars' way'phew.

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
8 Church Terrace, Harbury



I've been given first hand reports of several dramatic wildlife finds in the area. On 29th August, on a lawn in Southam, a large moth was found by the family of Jill and Rod Smith. Unfortunately it was not alive. I identified it as a Hawk Moth. John Stringer thought it was probably a Privet Hawk Moth. It was generally brown in colour but had some pink markings on its body. I showed it to David Brown, the author of 'Larger Moths of Warwickshire'. He was delighted as it was a rather scarce moth, an immigrant from Southern Europe/north Africathe Convolvulus Hawk Moth. It was last reported in Harbury in 1972 and there are no listed modern Southam sightings.

Moira Lamont found and photographed a large brown caterpillar in her garden. It was about the size of an adult's middle finger. I'd seen one of these before; John Stringer and I were confident to identify it as the larva of the Elephant Hawk Moth. The Hawk Moth family has the Latin name Sphingidae as the caterpillar can rear up, sphinx like, to deter predators.

Down close to the footpath, beside the railway line, Lisa Irons and her daughter Lydia saw something very special. They disturbed a Grass Snake in the act of swallowing a toad. All they could see of the victim was half its body, its hind legs flailing, as the reptile attempted to ingest its prey. The disturbance proved good news for the toad as it was spat out and the snake made its escape. Down at the Spoil Bank Nature Reserve you will find a fresh blue bloom amongst the withered vegetation of the rabbit nibbled turf. It's the Autumn Gentian, a harbinger of colder times to come.



Origins of the Recreation Ground

The earliest owner mentioned in the original deeds relating to the playing fields is William Atkins who owned it in 1748. The land was then part of 'The open and common fields and commonable places of Harbury.' The land passed to Atkins's daughter, Anna, and by the time of enclosure in 1780 it was owned by William Bayes. In 1784 the land was sold to William Lagoe, a surgeon living in Harbury, for £590 (c.£65,000 in today's money). Ten years later it was sold to Samuel Smith, a blacksmith, and in 1806 it was bought by John Linnell, a yeoman farmer, for £680 (c.£46,000). Although Linnell sold the land in

1813 to John Flecknoe, the land was thereafter known as Linnell's Closes. In 1856 the land was purchased by Joseph Plummer a grazier of Ladbroke for £883.12.4 (c.£71,000) and for the first time the land was defined as being 10 acres, 2 roods and 35 perches in size. The land was owned by Plummer's grandson's widow, Mary Meddoms Griffin in 1936.

In January 1936 Parish Councillor Mole approached the tenant farmer of Linnell's Closes, Mr W. Boiles, when he heard that he wished to give up the tenancy and was told that the land was available for purchase for £450 (c.£24,000). The Parish Council was aware of the 'urgent need of a recreation ground' and voted unanimously to take advantage of this 'excellent opportunity.' For the next eight months the Parish Council worked to raise the money needed, borrowing £650 from Warwickshire County Council, and accepting a donation of £50 from the Warwickshire Playing Fields Association which dispensed grants from the King George V Jubilee Fund. The formal conveyance was signed on August 13, 1936.

Even before the purchase had been completed the Parish Council was employing labourers to level the field to make it suitable for recreation. The uses of the recreation ground were varied from the start, with village sporting clubs using the fields, the children's play area being laid out and for several years the top field was rented out for grazing to a local farmer.

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
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CONCERT & EXHIBITION

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Dance Workshop French and Breton Dance at Harbury Village Hall




Sunday 8th & Sunday 15th November 2009
