# Ladbroke Parish Council

**Items from the Minutes:** Fr. Craig had thanked the Council for their wreath and support at the Remembrance Day Service in Church. He was very pleased with all the support from a large congregation.

**Matters Arising:** There were complaints about the heap of cuttings, shrubbery etc building up from the caravan at the entrance to Ladbroke (North Side). These should have been burnt on the Bonfire.

The replacement gritting bin has been supplied; the clerk will contact the Highways Department about a grit supply.

**Parking Problems in Windmill Lane:** The Chairman distributed eleven questionnaires to residents asking for their concerns regarding parking in the lane – six households responded. A consensus view will be indicated. The only area of agreement was that no oak stumps are required and the need for the black and white posts were questioned. Several residents are quite happy to leave things as they are. The black and white posts are the responsibility of the Highways Department; they were put in place to stop parking on the verges and identify the roadway edges.

**Finances:** The monthly financial spreadsheet was approved and the various payments made. The Precept for 2010/11 was discussed and the Council agreed that it would remain unchanged for the next year.

**HS2:** Their fund raising target of £10,000 is almost reached. A request for a grant for the Action Group has been received, there was much discussion about this. Grants are usually only given for specific items, e.g. chairs for the Village Hall or play equipment for the Millennium Green. The Council are to give it their consideration.

**Planning Applications** have been made and approved mainly for the felling of trees.

**Parish Plan:** This has now been adopted by Stratford District Council with a recommendation of early updating. The Plan can be viewed on the SDC website, also on the Village Web site.

Discussion pursued the need for 'hard copies', therefore could all residents that would prefer a hard copy of the Ladbroke Parish Plan please advise the parish clerk preferably by email at clerk-ladbrokepc@tiscali.co.uk or by phone on 01926 613998.

**The Village Hall** held their AGM on Tuesday  $16^{th}$  November. A newsletter has been handed to the Council about extra funding for community buildings. Applications for grants of £100,000 to £500,000 can be made from December. It is Lottery money and, given the economic climate, the completion for grants is likely to be intense.

**Millennium Green:** Following the planting of a memorial tree in memory of Cllr Janice Berry, a plaque has been fitted to the tree. The Wine Tasting Evening held early in the month was well attended, and a happy time was had by all.

**Future Parish Council Meetings:** The Council is going to consider reducing the number of meetings annually from 10 per year to 8, especially as all planning applications are now 'online'. The next meeting is on January 19<sup>th</sup> 2011 at 7.45pm. There will be no meeting in December 2010 or February 2011.

The meeting closed at 9.15pm.

others on the Saturday evening, Sue and Kay studied a course on the architecture of Oxford, Lesley took part in a dancing experience and Ann experimented with silk painting.

The meeting on November 25<sup>th</sup> was the first to be chaired by our new president, Sue Moore who was to be particularly thanked for choosing to spend her birthday evening in this way.

Lawrence Washington introduced himself as the Lord of the Manor of Sulgrave and Stuchbury, the whole 2,500 acre estate, including 2 villages, having been bought from Henry VIII in 1539.

Prior to entertaining us with the festivities in Tudor times, Lawrence explained that a pagan winter festival preceded Christianity by thousands of years. The period of the 12 days starting on December 21<sup>st</sup> was called Saturnalia by the Romans and Yuletide by other Northern tribes. Their homes were decorated using holly and ivy, when it was thought that evil spirits lived in evergreens such as these. When the 12 days of festivities were over, the noise made by the burning of the greenery was thought to be the dying screams of the spirits and that the new year could then start without evil.

We were told that it was Pope Julius 1<sup>st</sup> who decided to link Christianity with the winter festival and named 25<sup>th</sup> December as a mass for the birth of Christ.


It was so interesting to learn the origins of some of the traditions still in use. The Yule log used to be cut and dragged through the village decorated with ribbons which brought good luck to those who touched it. This burned for all 12 days in the Manor House and bad luck befell on all if it was allowed to go out.

The mince pie was originally made of mutton with fruit and spices used as a preservative so that they would last throughout the winter.

The character in the red coat distributing presents was first seen in the Mummers' plays in 1380.

Oliver Cromwell briefly put a stop to the fun but Charles II on his return from France brought many new customs which, with additions from the Victorians, last to our modern day.

Our November meeting was on the topic "What makes a good picture and how can I improve mine?". We split up into small groups to review photos in books, magazines and some of our own efforts too, discovering that the best examples often followed the basic rules of composition, depth of field and exposure. For example landscapes had everything from foreground to distant features in sharp focus, while flowers and wildlife used a

shallow depth of field to blur the background and make the main subject stand out more clearly.

Our next meeting is on **Tuesday December 7th**, **starting at 7.30pm** on the topic **Shedding Some Light on Camera Settings.** After an introduction to the subject, the majority of the evening will be hands on, taking pictures on our own cameras to explore the effect of different lighting and flash settings. During the evening we will also have a **competition on the subject "Autumn"**. To enter, bring along up to 3 prints of photos you have taken on this theme recently or in previous years. The prints can be any size as we will have 2 categories - one for small prints, the other for larger ones / photos by the more experienced photographers amongst us. Everyone is welcome at our meetings from beginners to experts and there is no problem if you just want to come along to try us out or to a specific meeting because you are interested in that topic - just check with one of the regulars or send an email to jackieszone-photogclub@yahoo.co.uk for confirmation of the venue.



Trek China 2010 - September 18th - 27th



When my father died last year of Parkinson's Disease and I booked myself onto Trek China 2010 to raise money for Parkinson's UK: I didn't fully realise what I was letting myself in for, and anyway, I had ten months to prepare (so L told But reality is not myself)! always the dream and for me, the five day walk along the Great Wall of China in September proved to be the

biggest physical and mental challenge I've ever experienced! If I'd known what I was taking on I don't think I'd have done it, but having said that, to finish five days of walking averaging eight hours a day; in weather from torrential rain to blazing sunshine; in temperatures from 5 to 25C and as much up and down steps as on the level and even rock climbing ..... well, I still have to look at the photographs to believe I actually made it, but in the post today came my certificate of proof and an acknowledgement of the £3,146.50 I raised (which doesn't include the gift aid), just a small portion of nearly £70,000 the twenty of us raised together.

To see one of the world's amazing wonders was good enough in itself, but I feel I also the real saw China Chinese the . . . . people still living in their small houses in little hamlets in the isolated vallevs along the shadow of the Great Wall, living a day to day life of selfsufficiency from hand to mouth; the schools where the pupils walk an hour to school



and their only word outside Mandarin being "Hello" and yet where a mobile phone will ring between them and Beijing, four hours drive away, where maybe their only son or daughter has moved to gain an education and perhaps will never move back again. The old men and women still wore what we would consider traditional dress as they worked alongside each other in the fields, but the younger generations would have looked at home in the UK or USA, but then, think of where our clothes and fashions are coming from today! Materials were not necessarily cheap, but labour most certainly was and this seems to be what makes the difference.

So thank you to all of you who made donations. You not only made physical donations in money towards further research into Parkinson's Disease and for the provision of special nurses, but you also spiritually donated into my life for a week and I too have come away from this experience with treasures.

# October 2010

Young blood amidst the audience last month when Guv from the Post Office came along to see what it was all about.

It was unfortunately a long meeting, not helped by a closed session which forced the watchers to decamp to the entrance hall of the Tom Hauley Room.

**Public Participation** - A Constance Drive resident was concerned that some of the lights in the Playing Fields car park are on all night and the area attracted youths on noisy motor cycles. Cllr Pat Summers said the Fields had certainly been churned up by motor cycles and scooters. The Council hoped to install a new timer for the lights. They pointed out that two of the posts designed to stop cars entering the fields had been destroyed and Cllr Hancock reminded everyone of the difficulties an ambulance crew had had recently attending a casualty on the fields.

Although residents informed the police whenever there was a disturbance they were advised to attend the Community Forum and lobby for Harbury to be the focus of the police initiative on anti-social behaviour.

Both Cllrs Thompson and Ekins had been to the last Forum and pressed for action to address the problem of vandalism and youth anti-social behaviour.

**Village Hall** - Clirs Patrick and Thornley reported fund-raising for the Hall was going well and a bid had been made to Veolia Environmental Trust to repair the extension roof and insulate it preparatory to installing Photo-Voltaic panels.

**Spending Cuts** - Council Chairman Tim Lockley was pleased to announce that the freeze on rate increases did not apply to Parish Councils. (Remember that all that money is spent in the Parish for our benefit, not spread around the District or County).

District Councillor Beverley Mann reported Stratford had to make £419,000 of savings and was to reduce its Management Structure.

County Councillor Bob Stevens said their Budget Statement was anticipated to include a 26% reduction in services, but that the government would not ring-fence the money the County received, leaving them to decide where to cut.

Schools grants were not directly affected but County Council staff were being told six months in advance of potential job cuts of 1,000 out of 18,000 employees. He hoped that Harbury would still have a Library but it could be housed elsewhere and staffed by volunteers.

Coventry and Warwickshire had been chosen to be one of the Local Enterprise Partnerships. The PCT and Statutory Heath Authority functions would be handed over to three GP Consortia. The County Council would take on responsibility for Public Health. Cllr Hancock, a doctor herself, pointed out that currently there were no hip operations being done.

**Planning** - Stratford granted permission for a pitched roof at 19 Deppers Bridge, the relocation of stables at 11 The Beeches, and extensions at 65 Mill Street and 5 Ivy Lane.

The Parish Council made no representations on the retrospective application for a pond at 10 Greenhill, the reduction in the crown of the protected walnut tree at Walnut Court, Wagstaffe Close and the re-roofing of The Cottage, High Street. The Parish Council has suggested that the new Bush Heath Lane development road be named Hereburgh Way.

There followed a long discussion on the High Speed 2 Rail Link, but as the Chairman concluded, public consultation seemed pointless when the government had stated that the line was in the public interest and therefore the outcome seemed a foregone conclusion.

**Properties** - The BMX Track which was unusable at present would have the drainage improved at the end of the month. The young lad who was injured there was home and should make a full recovery, much to everyone's relief.

Cllrs inspections of the Play Areas would need to increase and Cllrs Knowles, Hancock and Ekins agreed to join the inspection team.

**Car Park** - Extra keys had been cut for the bollards and a notice ordered which would explain where they could be obtained in an emergency. A quote for five timer switches for the Car Park lighting of £350 had been received. The barrier is closed at 9pm.

**Dog Bins** - The Clerk reported that Stratford District had decided that dog waste could now be put in any of the bins and there followed long discussions over which bins would be redundant. Cllr Alan Knowles caused much hilarity when he commented that one of the dog bins was in any case not used, at least when he looked in it.

Moles - They are back in the top Field and Small Children's Play Area!

**Cemetery** - More relatives have been identified for some of the staked graves.

**Christmas Lights** - The Cllrs were pleased to agree to Gordon Bennett's initiative to raise money for the lights (with any surplus to youth projects) by setting up a Tree of Light scheme in memory of John Ridgley who had masterminded the lighting of the conifer at the Library. Money for repairs to the lights was agreed by the Council.

**Lighting** - Cllr Amanda Lewis had asked E-ON for quotes for the street lighting maintenance and the installation of LED lamps which should be 89% more efficient and reduce the power bill. She would seek other quotations too.

**Village Improvements** - The bollards for Binswood End were at last to be installed. The Speed Detector sign in Mill Street would be turned round. Cllr Patrick reported that the milk tanker still experienced difficulties accessing Trice's Farm because of parked cars. The Council had asked for an extension of the white lines indicating that the entrance should be kept clear but was told it was already at the maximum permitted.

They will look for some white paint of their own!

**Parish Plan** - The Chairman apologised for not being able to take forward the refreshing of the Parish Plan but Cllrs Thornley, Patrick and Summers volunteered to help him and Linda Ridgley promised to help too.

**Finance** - Cllrs were sad to hear that the Harbury branch of the British Legion was to close down due to the advancing age of its members. They agreed a donation to the Legions for the Remembrance Service.

At the end of the meeting Chairman Tim Lockley quipped that the Council could now do what it liked as government had abolished the Standards Board.

He was only joking! And Guv said he needed a pint!

# Harbury Parish Council – Quarterly Report

In the past six months the Parish Council has:

- Awarded grants to Moving Pictures to install a permanent screen in the Village Hall, to the Theatre Group and the Rugby Club.
- Continued to deal with vandalism as much as possible, including replacing damaged items and working with the police to apprehend culprits.
- Attended various briefing meetings about the Bush Heath Lane development and the proposed HS2 line.
- Continued to explore the option of moving to more energy efficient street lighting.

The PC would like to remind residents that it is crucially important to report any types of antisocial behaviour to the police. All calls are logged (please request an incident number) and the police will have to respond to large numbers of calls. Any obvious "hotspots" could also be used by the Parish Council to pressure the police for action. The next Community Forum meeting is on Dec 15th in Southam (venue to be arranged, please contact the Parish Clerk on 614646 for further details) where residents can bring matters to the attention of the police.

## Linda Ridgley

Mick Jeffs took us through the forces that made the Warwickshire Landscape: the geology and volcanic activity that formed the hard-rock ridge in the Nuneaton area, the Carboniferous rainforest of the Coal Measures, the desert sandstones of the Permian, the glaciations that created Lake Harrison which, when it drained away through Fenny Compton, caused the north-easterly flowing Avon to change course to join the Severn.

He described the impact of man; Bronze Age Barrows and the spooky Rollright Stones; the Roman Temple outside Coleshill and the Roman occupation at Alcester and Chesterton. (Finds from these sites are listed at www.timetrail.warwickshire.gov.uk). He covered medieval ploughing and the change to sheep farming which preserved some of the ridge and furrow and then moved on to historic buildings and the industrial age's impact; turnpikes, canals, railways, waterworks, coal-mining, factories, wartime airfields and artefacts.

Mick reminded us of the CPRE's successful campaign to curb the spread of "ribbon development"; of the loss of hedgerows, the Pylons and phone masts that will remain long after their use is past; housing encroaching on the countryside, and now our tranquillity threatened by High Speed 2!





our Forest School sessions by our Forest School leader Amanda Randall.



# Horticultural Society

Another month gone I can't believe it is nearly December. We had another super talk in November which was again very well attended. Derek Walker talked about his garden called Little Larford and opening it for the Yellow Book and much more. He began by showing us a montage of his wonderful garden just to give us a taster of what was to come! He used to own garden nurseries and sold these 9 years ago to the then Wyevale Group. You would have thought that he would want to wind down, not a bit of it. He and his wife Lin went to view Little Larford and fell in love with it, a thatched cottage with views and a garden to develop and nurture in their retirement.

The basic structure of the garden was already in place but they could see that massive improvements would be necessary in order to achieve a planting scheme. Thus the hard work began.... hundreds of tons of sand were removed, replaced with a good quality top soil and levels attained throughout. Hedging was planted along two boundaries to form a framework and then they set about the work of eliminating the huge rabbit population by erecting wire netting around the entire perimeter of the garden. Then came the hard landscaping, the struggling lawn was replaced with winding paths, gravelled areas, a patio and pergola. Also a cut flower and vegetable garden were formed. Next came the greenhouse and a traditional brick built potting shed. Then the exciting part - the planting stage. Hundreds of shrubs and perennials were planted including a wonderful bank of variegated rhododendrons at the side of the cottage.

As they wanted to open their garden, Lin and Derek then worked out a massive plan for Spring and Summer bulb planting and much more. They plant well over 20,000 tulips each year throughout the garden. The slides of all kinds of tulips were just breathtaking, all sizes and colours. Bedding is added including many different colours of both pansies and viola and, a new one to me, a Panola, a cross between the two. Zingy polyanthus feature too and bellis daisies, when these have finished they are replaced with summer bedding; not a spare inch of ground is left bare. The pergola is covered with a purple wisteria, what a sight that was. Words cannot describe the sheer magnitude of all these bulbs and flowers, the colours, textures and very clever mixing of permanent and seasonal plants just amazing (to borrow an expression from Craig!).

We were shown so many colourful slides and then the pots.... these are also a big feature, usually with a colourful cordyline in the centre surrounded by bulbs and bedding. The pots are all shapes and sizes and can then be moved around the garden where a gap appears. Some of the names of the tulips are just magical for instance....Yokohama, Blue Diamond, Tinkerbell, and so many more.

All of the tulip bulbs are lifted after flowering and disgarded. Unfortunately this year tulip fire has affected the bulbs and they will be unable to open their garden next year. However Derek is very optimistic that the problem can be solved and looks forward to reopening in 2012. Since opening in 2006 they have had thousands of visitors from mid April through to Summer and have given many thousands of pounds to the children's charity, The Acorns Hospice. Open days are run with almost military precision, from car parking in a neighbours field to teas and plant sales. Derek obviously takes great pleasure from these open days and has no plans yet to wind down!

As well as all of the wonderful bulbs, flowers, shrubs and perennials there is a 3 acre woodland walk, there are many large trees such as oaks and sweet chestnut, there are snowdrops, bluebells, primroses daffodils, foxgloves too; plus very many nesting boxes which attract a variety of birds including owls and there are bee hives throughout. Squirrels are evident as are foxes and the whole area has seating at all levels. Areas include the 39 steps and quirky rabbit statues with appropriate names. Great fun. What an achievement. New for last year is a Nature Centre which is regularly visited by local and not so local school children. It includes so much information about birds and wildlife, educational but fun too. All in all something for all the family to see and enjoy.

Derek finished by showing us a 5 minute disc of a plug plant production factory where 4 to 5 million plants are grown, potted on, boxed up and transported. It was a huge place which could easily accommodate Wembley stadium many times over. It made you realise what big business plug plants are now. I'm sure we will be seeing Derek again as he does have other talks. Also a visit to Little Larford is surely on the cards for 2012, can't wait.

So far then, 2 excellent talks this season and more for next year. No speaker in December as at our recent committee meeting which was attended by our new member Jean Clews (my thanks to Jean for volunteering) we decided to have our Flower Pot game again as this is always enjoyable and Jean will be putting together a quiz for each table, as an extra for you all to have a spot of fun with. Prizes for the game but not the quiz. The draw for the Bursary will also be held plus a bumper Raffle and of course the festive buffet. So it promises to another good night out; everyone is welcome including new members. Looking ahead to January don't forget that the meeting will be the second Tuesday the 11th, I will remind again, Bob Sherman will be talking about

the Work of Garden Organic. I really am spoiling you all with such good speakers!

There is a coffee morning for the Horticultural Society on 29th January in the Tom Hauley Room, again I will remind you nearer the time; cakes and raffle prizes will be gratefully accepted. After discussions with the Committee it has been decided to hold the Garden Walkabout every other year so there will not be one next year. This seems to work well as there is so much effort put in by all of the people who so willingly open up their gardens and a year off is a welcome break. We may consider changing the dates too but will obviously canvass everyone concerned before a decision is made, plus too it gives the committee a well earned break. I have received a lovely letter from a year 6 pupil at the school asking for a donation towards raised beds etc for the school gardens and we have agreed to this request. I shall be giving the cheque to the children at the school very shortly. It is so good that the children take such an interest in nature and their gardens, hopefully some of them will be future members of our Society.

I'm sure that you will all be very busy during December but if you do have time, do go along to Westonbirt Arboretum to see the floodlit trees etc, it is on until 19th December between 5.00 and 8.30pm. The Botanic Gardens in Birmingham are also very festive now with lots of traditional events. A lot of National Trust properties are staying open throughout most of December including of course Upton House and Gardens, come and see us, also Charlecote. Look in your membership book for opening hours etc. Even with the hard frost this week my begonias are still flowering away as is the yellow buddlia, pink heucheras and clematis "Freckles". The violas in pots and troughs just sulk at first after a frost but soon recover. It is amazing how hardy most of the plants are, a bit of fleece on some borderline ones always does the trick. I just bring indoors the succulents and banana plant and John manages somehow to bring in a huge pot with a Washington palm and tetrapanax too. My utility room looks a bit like Kew Gardens!

Don't forget to bring your seed orders to the next meeting; it is so exciting looking through the catalogues and planning next year's vegetables, plus we get a good discount too.

I look forward to seeing everyone at the meetings.

As I write, it is the evening of Monday 22nd November. Today has got colder as the air flow (there is little wind) swings round to the north-east. Thin cloud covered the full moon from view earlier but now, at 9.30pm, it is visible almost directly overhead. We are promised an arctic snap with temperatures dipping at night to -9C (16F) at the end of the week in some parts of the country.

Yesterday, I set out to find the Wild Service Tree (Sorbus torminalis), once thought to be related to the Hawthorn. With DNA testing it is now known to be related to the Mountain Ash. Sharon and I had spent the previous evening and night with friends in Bidford-on-Avon. I had been told by another friend, who works as a volunteer for the Woodland Trust, that I should try Pepper Wood near Bromsgrove. It seemed a good excuse for a bike ride through largely unfamiliar Worcestershire countryside. The county border was crossed 3 miles west of the bridge over the River Arrow after a gradual climb through Dunnington. The countryside was a patchwork of small woods in which Oak was dominant. The sun slanting through cloud at a low angle picked out the foliage which was chiefly a shade of orange. Here and there a canopy was still largely green. Other trees such as Ash and Beech were leafless. Stands of Larch were beginning to drop their needle-like leaves now a golden yellow. I was intrigued by an inn sign at Radford where I turned right for Inkberrow (Ambridge to Archers fans). This was called the 'Wheelbarrow and Castle'. As it wasn't yet opening time, I couldn't research the name over a pint but I've since found out a bit more. Leslie Dunkling and Gordon Wright's 'A Dictionary of Pub Names' published by Routledge and Kegan Paul says the name is probably due to an earlier landlord poking fun at a neighbour who had called his hostelry 'Castle in the Air'. Sadly, as is all

too common nowadays, the latter pub has been renamed 'Wheelies', perhaps by a motorcycling publican. Maybe I'm being a bit of a stick-inthe-mud and perhaps pub signs should evolve. Any thoughts?

I was now in an area which was once the ancient forest of Feckenham, recorded as a hunting ground of the Plantagenet kings. Many older houses were black and white, the black being the timber frame and the white plaster originally wattle and daub. Often now, brick has been used to fill the gaps between the beams and plastered over.

Crossing the Worcester and Birmingham canal several times as it wandered toward the Tardebigge flight, I entered Bromsgrove and ate a picnic lunch next to the statue of A.E. Houseman in the pedestrianised High Street. Keeping as much as possible to country lanes, I crossed the M5 near its junction with the M42 and climbed to a confused upland area dotted with woods, the most northerly of which was Pepper Wood. To the south west, the Malverns looked quite close and out west was the grey outline of Clee Hill in Houseman's beloved Shropshire.

'Far in a western brookland

That bred me long ago,

The poplars stand and tremble

By pools I used to know.'



An hour later, after a couple of circuits on muddy paths, I'd seen plenty of Holly, a large Crab Apple, Aspen and lots of Oak. A chap exercising his dog directed me to a hut where, luckily, a gentleman who knew all about trees was busy using a lathe. He offered to walk the half mile on a complicated path network and take me to the spot. When we arrived, the stand of young trees with smooth bark stood leafless in a glade. He explained they were suckers from a parent tree now just a low stump. I picked up a blackened leaf, thanked my guide and set about getting home.

Peter and Margaret McDonald will no doubt remember going with Sharon and I to look for a Wild Service Tree in the same area a few years ago. It was summer and we enjoyed a walk near Chaddesley Corbett but no tree was found. Steven Falk told me today that Cubbington Wood has some. According to Richard Mabey in Flora Britannica, a vernacular name is Chequer tree and the fruit is edible once it has been softened by frost. I had hoped to come back with some of those but the trees I saw were immature and had not fruited. The many inns called Chequers and presumably the Prime Minister's house in the Chilterns all refer to the fruit of the Wild Service. I have had two interesting and exciting sightings reported since the last issue. Colin Humphreys saw an otter, unfortunately a dead one, on the road from Shuckburgh to Staverton at the River Learn crossing by the county boundary. Even closer to home, Michael Thwaites saw a very alive otter on the farm road at Kingston Manor. More sightings please. Rex Humphreys told me of a wasp getting tangled up in a spider's web. When the spider rushed out of hiding to claim its prize, the wasp suddenly turned the tables, grabbed the spider and flew off.

On the 19<sup>th</sup> October, I had my first mountain walk for nearly 2 years, along with my friend David who lives in the village of Kelsall near Chester. Of course, the day we chose was windy, cold and wet, whereas the following day was bright and sunny. We climbed Snowdon from Rhyd-Ddu arriving too late to sample the fare at the rebuilt cafe on the summit which, in winter, closes at 2.30pm. On the ridge between Yr Aran and Snowdon's summit, shielded by an overhanging rock, I found the delicate flowers of Starry Saxifrage which made all the effort seem worthwhile. We ate our sandwiches crouching in the closed cafe entrance while the wind howled round the peak. On a calmer day you could search for fossil shells near the summit. These lived in a shallow sea in Ordovician times, some 350 million years ago. Now due to uplift they lie some 1000 metres above sea level.

# **Home Groups**

# Harbury Energy Initiative

The small but high voltage initial steering group of the Harbury Energy Initiative has been injected with new energy after two meetings at The Old New Inn, a response to the request for volunteers to join us in the August Harbury and Ladbroke News. This is really encouraging and has enabled us to create active task groups to work on different aspects of our plans. Whilst we talk of carbon footprints, FiTs, fandangles and fancy gizmos, what we truly want is to help Harbury residents to save money and energy en route to a sustainable future. Crucial to the delivery of all this good news is our Primary School. Two staff representatives of the school have been working with us on steady progress to a launch next year. First step will be a questionnaire to find out what villagers have already done and what residents think about the issues. Children from Harbury Primary have been quick to come up with possible questions for such a survey. We anticipate that the children will deliver these to households around half term in the spring term for analysing in the summer term.

All this is leading up to a major launch of new initiatives for Harbury on energy conservation and carbon next year. In the meantime, however, the Communications team is looking at opportunities to provide informative displays at village events. There is a mass of material available already but we currently have no means to set it up as a display. We need to be able to take an exhibition of facts and possibilities to events held outdoors, such as the carnival, or indoors, such as the Parish Council 'Save Money, Save Energy' event last May. We will work on that one.

**Tip of the month: Cut down on food waste.** Wasted food is wasted money and 'buy one get one free' can mean buy one waste one. In the UK, according to calculations by WRAP, the national waste reduction and resource efficiency agency, we throw away 8.3 million tonnes of edible food a year, the equivalent in carbon footprint of 1 in every 4 cars on our roads.
