

Christianity and politics - they don't mix!

As you read this, the Election will probably be over and we will have a new government in power.

I have heard the comment above many times as it's a view held by many in our land. Whilst some may feel there is a need for the Church to give a strong moral voice in society, they also feel that the Church shouldn't stray into areas that are of no concern to them, particularly politics. A few years ago Alistair Campbell, Tony Blair's former press secretary, when asked about the faith of the Prime Minister replied; 'We don't do God!' We all knew that the PM had a practising Christian faith but the two weren't to be seen together.

Compare this to the famous comment made by Archbishop Desmond Tutu when asked about politics and faith during Apartheid in South Africa; 'When people say to me that politics and Christianity don't go together, I wonder what Bible they read!'.

I believe that Christianity and politics do mix and are in fact intrinsically linked together.

Christianity believes fundamentally in what we call incarnation — it believes that God has become intricately involved with the world and its issues through the life of Jesus, the Son of God. Incarnation means, in other words, God is down to earth and we celebrate this particularly at Christmas.

We believe as Christians that this is 'Good News' because it's God's grace changing the world so that it might conform to God's reign of justice, peace, love and mercy.

The Church community therefore has the responsibility to work alongside that divine grace and so be in the forefront of the business of, as the Bible has it, "turning the world upside down" because of God's hopes and plans for it.

The Christian life of witness in the world and every community must therefore have this same mark, and engage the thorny issues and complex challenges of life together on this planet and turn it upside down – that is, the Christian life must be politically engaged.

Star American Performers for Harbury

Saturday 15 May sees the fourth concert promoted by Leamington Music at All Saints Church in Harbury in the series Concerts in Warwickshire Churches. The baroque group Florilegium and the Badke String Quartet were followed last year by Kosmos and percussionist Guy Schalom. This last concert attracted an enormous audience who thoroughly enjoyed some sensational playing of klezmer and gypsy music, plus some tangos.

This year there is more baroque music by Arne, Handel, Bach, Albinoni and Telemann and two well known American soloists are featured with the six instrumentalists of The Musical and Amicable Society. The concert starts at 7 30pm.

The soprano Emily van Evera, who will sing arias by Arne, Handel and Bach, is often called the American Emma Kirkby. She and the oboe soloist Gail Henessy have appeared with the Academy of Ancient Music, Les Arts Florissants, Hanover Band, Taverner Consort and other leading groups. The Musical and Amicable Society is a revival of the eighteenth century equivalent in Birmingham of London's Academy of Ancient Music.

Our afternoon meeting coincided with Father Craig's post Easter break so, instead of communion, Sue led us in a very thoughtful act of worship based on the life of Mary Magdalene.

We then heard Mr Porter tell us about Traidcraft. This is the commercial supplier of the Fair Trade goods which are sold at coffee time after every Family Service. He explained how they have achieved consistent standards of quality as well as a professional appearance which can stand its ground on a supermarket shelf. Producers are helped to set up projects and manage their businesses, so leading to greatly improved conditions for whole communities.

In the evening it was the turn of the Ecumenical Accompaniment Programme in Palestine and Israel. The Rev. Christopher Lamb explained how their peaceful presence at checkpoints reminds the Jewish authorities that the eyes of the world are on the violations of human rights which they, as the occupying power, should be upholding. As many Palestinians need to cross into occupied Jerusalem each day for work, they often have to leave home at 4.00am in order to get to work for 7.00am. They also need to cross for medical facilities, education or to work their land, but are all herded like cattle and treated as potential terrorists. E.A.P.P.I is staffed by Christian volunteers from many countries who, by their very presence, encourage peace activists from both sides of the divide. We were left with a strong feeling of injustice and helplessness, but hope that, in the end, right will prevail.

Thank you to everyone who supported the lunch on 17th April. We raised £194 for Church funds.

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

Ladbroke & Deppers Bridge W.I.

There had been quite a few events attended by members of the W.I. this month which we heard about at our meeting on April 22nd in the Village Hall.

At the end of March a group of 9 ladies enjoyed the production of Seven Brides for Seven Brothers at the Spa Centre.

Feedback on the Federation Meeting, also held at the Spa Centre in March was given by Raidun who made particular mention of the welcoming style of the Chairman Jan Wade, prior to telling us of the speakers for the day. These included James Prentice representing Taylor's Yorkshire Tea. This company is a long time supporter of WIs nationally and provide free tea bags for our meetings. The afternoon speaker was TV vet, Steve Leonard, who talked about his family – his father and brothers are also vets – and many of his experiences round the world.

Shirley Huxton had represented Ladbroke and Deppers Bridge WI at the meeting to discuss the resolution for this year.

The preferred option is to promote clearer labelling of beef, veal and fish and this will be discussed at a future meeting.

A short discussion was held during the business meeting on the HS2. Members voted unanimously to support the Ladbroke Action Group in their aims to prevent the high speed train coming through Ladbroke. Members also agreed that the money raised by the sale of teas at the Fete should be given to help defray the expenses of the Action Group.

The topic for the evening was 'Natural Health and Beauty' and Sheila Jones talked about and then demonstrated Forever Living products which are all based on the gel from the aloe vera plant. The beneficial effects of this plant have been known for hundreds of years. They

were supposedly used by Cleopatra - and Napoleon had a field of plants specifically to treat the wounds of his soldiers. Even though there have been no specific trials proving its efficacy, no adverse reaction to any product either applied or ingested has ever been reported. Ladbroke General Section

High Speed Rail Link

A lively and very constructive meeting was held in Ladbroke Village Hall on Tuesday 30 March to discuss the proposal for a High Speed Rail line (HS2) from London to Birmingham which will pass within 100

metres of houses in the village. The meeting was called by the Parish Council (PC) and chaired by Derek Batty, Chair of the PC. Derek explained that the purpose of the meeting was to inform residents in more detail than they may already possess about HS2 and to seek views and suggestions as to how we might ensure our voice is heard at national government level.

Graham Long gave a presentation with illustrative slides to help residents understand the scale and probable impact of the proposals. It was clear from many reactions and questions that there was no common level of understanding and that this informational presentation was welcomed by the assembled residents.

Subsequently an Action Group has been formed and many residents from Ladbroke and surrounding villages are now actively involved with fighting these proposals. Any resident who was unable to attend the PC meeting but wishes to get involved with the Action Group will be most welcome! Similarly we know that whilst a high proportion of residents have access to the internet and email not everybody is in this position, so please let neighbours and friends know what is happening.

The village HS2 website www.hs2-ladbroke.net is now up and running with links to the general village/Parish Council website and many other links to more detailed information; please visit regularly as it will be one of our main means of communication.

Liaison with other action groups is now well underway as is political lobbying and active pursuit of media coverage in all forms. These HS2 proposals will affect all residents in Ladbroke and surrounding villages to varying degrees through their visual impact - you can't ignore a 4,000 metre long viaduct which is up to 11 metres tall in places - and noise pollution as trains speed through at up to 400kmh (250mph). Property owners are already suffering from 'blight' and whatever compensation may be provided is many years away. In the meantime property values will have been substantially reduced. All this and the construction noise and pollution hasn't even started!!

Of immediate vital importance is that as many residents as possible lodge their views on the proposed Exceptional Hardship Scheme (EHS), where the final date for submissions is 20 May 2010. Janice Siddle, our delegate, gave an excellent report on the Annual Federation Meeting 2010 at the Spa Centre.

James Prentice from Taylor's Teas spoke of their 20 years' partnership with the W.I. Their aim continues to be to plant millions of trees in Peru and with Trees of Life. The family business supports ethical trading with growers and a social and environmental project with farmers.

The morning speaker was Emma Cunningham from Bramley Lite, Hampshire. She was the instigator of a breakaway group to form the new Bramley Lite W.I, opening up W.I to new generations. At the start, it did not meet with approval from the traditional Bramley W.I. Their meetings are formal and have a lot of socialising time which include dancing and life art classes. She said their male model was 60+. Their own calendar (wearing clothes) raised money for the local Children's Hospice. That got good and bad publicity. She was featured on the front page of the Telegraph with the headline, "Is this the Sexiest W.I in Britain?" and with generally much publicity which resulted in other W.I Lites around the country, the nearest being in Stratford on Avon. She won a national search to find the ultimate W.I member and became a W.Icon. Not only the original place of the Bramley apple but the Bramley Lite.

The afternoon speaker was Steve Leonard, "That Vet off the Telly". You will remember him and the other trainees at the Bristol Vet School on the T.V programmes in 1996. As he says, he has been on T.V ever since. He wanted to be a vet since age 5 so followed his three brothers and father who are also vets.

We were told of the many places he had been to and his experiences. How, in Ethiopia it was 50 degrees Centrigrade and he lost 25% of

body weight but how the camel was a fantastic animal. His orang-utan diaries worked to highlight issues of deforestation in Borneo. He has worked with spiders, scorpions, killer bees and said the box jellyfish is the most venomous creature on the planet. He visited polar bears in intense cold. He went up in a balloon to 16 thousand feet strapped to a tandem skydiver to look at the speed of a peregrine falcon – 200 miles an hour. There was also the story of a great whale which came up to a boat to be petted and mums bringing babies to be stroked: they are curious about us. Steve is dedicated to human/animal relationships. When told we missed seeing him in shorts, he appeared with his jeans rolled up, which went down well.

Our speaker at the April meeting, was Mary Davies on Get Ahead Hats, the milliners, who have branches all over the country. Mary has been a milliner for 10 years and certainly knows her job. She runs the business from her home in Clifton, Rugby and says the hats are taking over her home. The hat industry revolves around Luton. Quite a surprise when she said, "Why do you think the Luton Football Club is called The Hatters?"

The special straw has always been grown in the area and ordinary family homes always supplied the hat decorators. A lot of factories from Luton are now in China, but one can still get hat trimmings from a few houses.

Mary showed us how she makes hats and fascinators and the material she uses. One is called sinamay, which is a by-product of the banana industry. She is always very busy for Ascot etc and weddings. One can visit but she always advises clients to take their outfit with them. Everybody loved trying on the super hats. The good thing about Get Ahead Hats is that one can buy or rent a hat. An enjoyable talk.

The next folk club will be on May 6th, and will be hosted by Steve and Maureen Darby. With it also being General Election day, the theme will be Winners and Losers.


Hereburgh Morris


This left Harbury needing to win 2 sets in the final match against close

Horticultural Society

What a wonderful evening we all enjoyed in April. A return visit from Dr John Page, who spoke about Irish Gardens, and some breathtaking slides. Where to begin! We were shown all around the coast from North to South returning to Dublin. The coastline gardens benefit from the water draining inland to the bogs. The temperature due to the close proximity to the sea and the influence of the Gulf Stream is high in Winter and low in Summer. Obviously there is a large amount of rainfall too, 100 plus inches, hence The Emerald Isle.

Because of the climate there are many types and styles of gardens. In Belfast we were shown the alpine gardens designed by Harold McBride of huge size and content. We then saw more alpine beds at Brocklement House together with island beds, huge trees to give ground cover and lots of bulbs, a spectacular sight all through Summer.

There are many Wild Gardens which are actually cleverly managed to create colour throughout the Seasons. Wow! We then saw the magnificent gardens at Mount Stewart created by Lady Londonderry (a name familiar to us at Upton House and Gardens as she was a friend of Lady Bearstead). Over 90 acres with parterres, rose gardens, sunken gardens, many statues and great vistas. Fantastic.

Rowallane Gardens have a wonderful display of rhododendrons having the right conditions to grow these ericaceous loving plants. Huge plants, some well over 50 feet. The Victorian plant hunters who brought these to the British Isles would be amazed to see how well they have adapted to our climate. Some of the gardens we saw were very reminiscent of Cornish gardens, the tree ferns, gunners and dells etc. The Blue Mecanopsis Poppy thrives in Ireland in all shades of blue plus mauve and a newly introduced yellow variety.

There are also Japanese gardens which somehow survive the harsh frosts.

We then moved to The Burren Bay, a mecca for botanists. It is a huge limestone plateau with the most exquisite plants such as gentian growing in the cracks, a vast area unlike anywhere else. On to County Cork which is very regency in style with cottage style planting similar to English gardens. Also more wild gardens and a splendid house called Ames Grove. The owner bought the neighbouring stream and diverted it to his own garden and built huge bridges over it. It could only happen in Ireland!

The Ring of Kerry has many rare wild flowers which are carefully conserved. Bantry House has the most wonderful views over the Bay which complement the Victorian style. We also saw Italianate gardens at Garnish Island with the distant views of extinct volcanoes, very much like New Zealand. In Tippereray at Mount Congreve, there is a huge magnolia forest which stretches for a mile and a half, what a picture when these are all in bloom. Some South African plants do very well here too, particularly restios, together with geranium madarense from Spain and white and yellow bottle brush plants. The water gardens at Mount Usher were striking and beautifully planted.

To Dublin, in particular to Helen Dillons garden. I have seen many articles about this talented plants-woman who has completely changed her garden to a very modern style. It was stunning. I know not everyone's taste but what flair and imagination; I thought it was brilliant. A truly memorable evening, everyone thoroughly enjoyed it.

The last meeting of the current season is on Tuesday 4th May; the lovely Tim Miles who has been in charge at Lost gardens of Heligan will be talking about the delights of the Kitchen Garden and will be focusing on vegetables, again it promises to be a memorable night. Please come along and just enjoy.

Due to cancellations, I have 4 spaces left for Hestercombe and East Lambrook Gardens on our first day trip on 9th June. If you would like to join us please give me a ring; the cost is £18 (such good value includes entry to both gardens and coach fare). We will leave the Village Hall at 8.30am.

Just a few suggestions of visits etc in May. At Hall's Croft, one of the Shakespeare Houses, between 29th May and 6th June there will be potting up etc of herbs under the general topic called Herbs and Healing. A specialist plant fair is being held on 16th May at Renishaw Hall in Derbyshire from 10.30am to 4.00pm. At Pershore College three lectures in May, the first on 11th from 2.00 to 4.00pm from Carol Smith called Planting Interests throughout the Year, the second on 18th, same times, by Maggi Brown called Successful Composting, the third on 21st is from 10.00am to 4.00pm called Photographing Gardens and Plants and is by Graham Light. For details of all of these contact the College on 01386 554609.

Gardens open in the Yellow Book in Oxfordshire in May areon 9th Charlbury Gardens, from 2.00-6.00pm, on 16th Adderbury Gardens again 2.00-6.00pm, on 30th Salford Gardens once again 2.00-6.00pm. If you want more details just give me a call. I have seen all of these gardens and they are well worth a visit and not very far away. Nearby at Warmington on 23rd May there will be 7 gardens open from 1.00-6.00pm. All proceeds go to charity and you can usually get tea and cake.

Lastly why not make a day of it and visit the Malvern Spring Show. It is on from 6th to 9th May and with such a magnificent backdrop of the Malvern Hills and a lovely atmosphere plus you can buy all sorts of plants - it is not to be missed.

Whatever you do, enjoy and don't forget our own Garden Walkabout in June on 19th and 20th - more of that next month. Look forward to seeing everyone at the May meeting and on the trips.

Your local Hardy Plant Specialists. Also: Fresh cut flowers and bedding plants in season

After such a long wait for the spring to begin, suddenly it all seemed to happen in a frantic rush. A daily walk round the garden has been necessary to keep up with the rate of change of the buds and flowers erupting boisterously everywhere. Except, of course, for those sad, brown, dead plants which have succumbed to the winter frosts. There are plenty of ladybirds about to eat the inevitable green fly. Bumble bees are everywhere. I heard a cuckoo on 12th April — surely this is rather early? (Though for some reason Philip did not!). Skylarks soar up above the next door field.

The pressure is on to get all the planting and weeding done as well as mowing, sowing and even watering.

Reminders for the month:

- Plant up your hanging baskets and containers with summer bedding but don't forget there can be frosts until the end of May.
- Continue to sow carrots, beetroot, beans, peas etc etc.
- Earth up potatoes.
- Plant out your runner beans, courgettes and tomatoes at the end of May.
- Prune early spring flowering shrubs after they have finished flowering e.g. Forsythia, Spirea arguta, flowering Currants.
- Re-pot houseplants using fresh compost
- Weed and feed lawns

During a recent visit to a large local garden centre to exchange a suitcase of all things (what's this got to do with gardening??), I was rather shocked to notice the price of some of the plants. Yes, I know you can buy clothes and scented candles, handbags and books, even suitcases, but if it's plants you want, you could easily save yourself several ££'s per plant and get some advice thrown in free by buying from your local nursery. They might even tell you where the plant has come from!

Nature Notes

Writing this on the 19th April, we have had a prolonged spell of high pressure with often cold, frosty mornings warming up later to produce very pleasant outdoor conditions attracting butterflies and bumble bees out of hibernation. Sharon and I travelled to Suffolk over Easter to explore an area we had not visited before, do some family history and cycle the lanes where the extensive heaths come down to the North Sea. We stayed at an excellent inn at Westleton, a quiet village about 5kms inland. The church, dedicated to St. Peter, had a thatched roof and could have doubled as a barn. Dating to the 14th century it had been built by the monks of Sibton Abbey. We were close to the National Nature Reserve at Minsmere and I cycled over early on a couple of occasions. Behind its pebble ridge, the area is protected from the sea in all but the most adverse conditions of high tide and storm surge. The extensive mere is home to many birds considered rare. Bitterns are frequently seen and I had hoped to hear their distinctive booming call but was disappointed. I did see my first Marsh Harrier hovering over the reed beds. The bird, which in 1971 had been reduced to a single breeding pair due to pesticides, is now thriving. Many now overwinter so whether the one I saw had just flown in from Africa or had remained at Minsmere through the winter is questionable. The wing of a bird is a highly sophisticated piece of evolutionary equipment. Some feathers produce lift while the primaries produce propulsion. Many of the techniques used to achieve slow speed manoeuvrability in aircraft are paralleled by birds. The slots which delay stalling on a plane are catered for in birds by small quills attached to the 'thumb' - the so called 'bastard' wing. Of course aeroplanes have to use copious amounts of fuel to achieve the same effect.

At Minsmere, in a sandy hollow, I saw my first pair of Avocets. This black and white wader with a distinctive upturned bill has become a symbol of the R.S.P.B. Coastal and marsh drainage coupled with the collection of eggs as a food source had driven it to extinction in England during the 19th century. Wartime flooding in East Anglia as an anti-invasion move provided the right conditions of shallow coastal lagoons for breeding. Today, there are at least 650 pairs breeding along the east and south coasts of England. (I'm indebted to Mark Cocker and Richard Mabey's superb 'Birds Britannica' together with Tony Soper's book 'Birdwatch' for some of the above).


The gorse was coming into bloom and catkins of hazel and alder unfurling as we cycled down a lane to Dunwich. Above what remains of the place was a medieval friary. Here, a flint wall encloses several acres of rough pasture. One building from earlier times survived Henry VIIIth's depredations, becoming a farmhouse and now stands ruined in splendid isolation. The precursor of this friary disappeared into the North Sea along with much of Dunwich, once the third largest port in the kingdom. The harbour silted up and the sandy cliffs on which the town was built tumbled into the sea.

Now, the shades of light green foliage on hawthorn, elm (there are still some hedgerow specimens about), larch, hazel and horse chestnut, to name but a few, are simply stunning. Oak buds en masse give the trees a purplish hue; look across to the railway line from Middle Road to see the effect. Most Ash leaf buds are still firmly closed though the flowers are out. Coming home over the Thwaites Estate one morning a skylark rose high above the wheat field in full voice. I lost the bird against the sun but could still hear its melodious call.

In Derbyshire's limestone country last weekend, attending a wedding, we heard the Skylark again and the evocative bubbling note of the Curlew. The lanes were hilly, so a great way to travel on a bike is to use the track bed of the Ashbourne to Buxton railway, now the Tissington Trail. Primroses and Coltsfoot were blooming and we also came across Cowslips, Dog's Mercury and Wood Sorrel (Oxalis acetosella). The flowers of this last named are a delicate veined white. They usually appear between Easter and Whitsun and have trefoil (Shamrock –like) leaves.

Rex Humphreys reported seeing a house-martin on April 5th while Amanda Randall told me of a swallow seen on April 4th at Ufton Nature Reserve. These birds are not here in great numbers yet to thrill us with their aerial acrobatics, as they pursue insects, but perhaps by the time the Harbury and Ladbroke News is distributed, they will have arrived.

A small white butterfly seen on the Tissington Trail was probably a Small White [Pieris rapae] but could have been a female Orange Tip [Anthocharis cardamines]. I have had a fruitless search for frogspawn in Warwickshire so was delighted to find some on the National Trust's Longshaw Estate in Derbyshire. In fact, a small boy caught some in his fishing net to show us. Not only frog spawn but toad spawn which has an unmistakeable threadlike structure. Soon, I advise a trip to Draycote Meadows Nature Reserve to see the spectacular display of Green Veined Orchids (Anacamptis morio). Numbers vary but in the best years, it is a sight to savour.

We are very pleased to announce that the Community Centre has now been opened in the building that used to house the British Legion in Bishops Itchintgon.

Refurbishment has been undertaken using funding from the Lottery, Orbit Housing and our Parish Council.

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

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
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
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
