Remembering the lives that were taken

Remembrance Day is a time to remember not only those who died in the two World Wars, but also more recent conflicts and those who still suffer the effects of war.

For the weeks leading up to Remembrance Day, many people will wear a poppy as a sign of remembrance; the money raised from the poppy sales helps those who were wounded in war and their families. In churches and even in places like supermarkets, people will keep silent for two minutes at 11 o'clock on the 11th hour of the 11th day as a sign of respect. The poppy reminds us of the poppies that grew in the fields where much of the fighting in the First World War took place.

A Canadian doctor, John McCrae, wrote a poem, when caring for wounded soldiers which begins: "In Flanders' fields the poppies blow, between the crosses, row on row." After the war, in 1921, imitation poppies were first sold in Britain to help children in areas that had suffered from the fighting. Later, poppies were sold by the British Legion to help disabled ex-servicemen and their families.

Nowadays, the poppies are made at the British Legion's Poppy Factory at Richmond, Surrey. A team of more than sixty people, most of them disabled, work all year to make more than 34 million poppies, 750,000 remembrance crosses and nearly 100,000 wreaths, including those laid at the Cenotaph in London.

A young person was once talking to an old soldier. Hoping to please the old man, he said: "I suppose the poppies are to remember the soldiers who gave up their lives in the fighting." The old soldier replied: "No, nobody gave up anything. Their lives were taken in the crudest possible manner. That's what you shouldn't forget."

So, as we remember again this year, we give thanks to God for all that was taken from so many for our freedom and future.

Church Lychgate Notice Boards

As no doubt you'll have noticed(!) these boards have been oversubscribed in recent months with the result that some notices have flapped in the summer breeze and others have flown down Church Street, propelled by the summer gales! In view of this, it would be good now to review the use of this space and also to consider the following points:

- The policy has always been not to display commercial advertisements.
- In the past, it has been the practice to post Church notices on the right as you enter the Lychgate and all others on the left. There will be new reminders to this effect.

- In view of the limited space, we feel we need to give priority to users
 of the Tom Hauley Room and to events and activities directly related
 to village organisations.
- Latterly some regular users have posted notices using half A4 paper presented in landscape rather than portrait format. This condensed presentation has in no way detracted from impact and if more people were to adopt it, this would allow at once a more economical and a more generous use of available space.

We do have some requests:

- Please don't fix anything to the oak surrounds as this damages the wood.
- It would be very helpful if you would use your own drawing pins.
 (Plastic headed pins are unsuitable for outdoor use).
- If you use staples, we'd be very grateful if they were removed when fresh notices are posted. Staples left in do rust and are difficult to remove without snapping.
- Laminating permanent and semi permanent notices really helps.

Please don't see these points as unwelcoming, draconian, or pernickety. We simply want to make this space effective for and attractive to all. Any suggestions, queries, or problems, please contact Fliss Harris 612395.

A Tribute to Beryl Ross 1922 - 2012

We said a fond farewell to our dear friend at her funeral on 9th October at All Saints' Church, Ladbroke. The Church was full; it isn't often that a church is full (150 approximately) of so many people when someone dies aged 90 years. That is in itself a tribute to Beryl Ross.

To everyone who knew her, she was their friend. Everyone was welcomed at Field Farm with tea or coffee and a piece of Beryl's homemade cake (I'm afraid for the last year it's only been a biscuit – we still went anyway).

She was a farmer to the very end, having run Field Farm on her own since husband Jim died in 1971. Her daughter Mary and her husband Peter and

lately their son Ted have been managing the farm for many years now. That does not mean that Beryl "put her feet up". There was always a lunch ready for "the men" at lunch time; that was after she had been shepherding especially at lambing time and feeding orphaned lambs.

Beryl was a Church member and helped to keep it clean, a founder of Ladbroke and Deppers Bridge Women's Institute and a member of the Women's Fellowship until it ceased in 2006. An interesting meeting at which the Parish Council faced up to some dilemmas and side-stepped decisions on others.

Public Participation

The Windmills Nursery, based at the School petitioned for a grant to increase the size of their Outdoor School Canopy and the ladies were quizzed by Councillors on who owned the facility and how they would cover any funding shortfall. The PC had indicated to previous groups they had funded that they could come back at the end of the year for more money if there was any left in the pot and so did not want to spend all they had - yet. After agonising they agreed to give the Nursery £1K.

Tejay from WCC explained she had the (unenviable) task of trying to "engage" Parish Councils in the Localisation Agenda, but had only until March to make progress. It was not certain that the Councillors really appreciated what was involved but they are kind people and agreed to be party to this initiative. Good luck lass!

Library - Following an extra-ordinary meeting, the Parish Council has at last agreed to the Library lease conditions and hopes now to sub-let the premises to the Library Group.

Tim Lockey who is both Parish and Library Chairman reported the Library was doing well, generating £50-70 per session from the Café (enough to more than cover its costs, so the Parish's funding guarantee should not be needed this year). They intended to refurbish the kitchen and purchase new Café chairs

The facility was now open six days a week including Saturday. The Café will be closed on Thursday afternoon but open on Saturday morning. This caused some concern as it could be in direct competition with the long-standing fund- raising Coffee Morning in the Tom Hauley Room.

You can now experience "Coffee and Coppers" on 22nd November and 13th December as the local police will be in the Library for contact with residents.

Stratford District - Cllr Hamburger reported that the District had paid consultants for various reports for the Core Strategy and that the ecological elements were provided by WCC who would soon be digitising the details of the County's wildlife sites for public viewing.

He was asked whether the recent and pending housing developments in Harbury would count towards the total we would have to provide and was unable to give an answer; claiming, as is true, that Government had opened up the countryside to developers.

Deppers Bridge - Parish Councillor Ekins reported that a camera survey of the problem sewer had revealed it to be in such a very poor condition that jetting was not an option. Severn Trent was now deciding whether to adopt the system. Cllr Hamburger claimed that "now everything is moving".

Planning - The Parish Council made "no representation" on applications for extensions at 5 Vicarage Lane and 9 Wagstaffe Close; and a replacement garage and block paving at 13-15 Mill Street.

Stratford granted permission with conditions for conversion work to form four dwellings at Harbury Fields Farm; a timber garage at Orchard House, Hall Lane and alterations to create changing rooms and a stage at the Village Hall.

They refused an application for "mobile security accommodation" at an "equestrian training and horse sanctuary" at the bottom of Bull Ring Lane, which they name Bull Ring Farm Road. The site has a complicated history and the Parish Council found difficulty in determining what was allowed there.

There followed a long debate about the lack of time given by SDC for the PC to consider an application for a bungalow at the Old New Inn. They had but three weeks to determine their response and might therefore have to hold yet another extra meeting.

Alison Biddle, Clerk, carefully put to them the realities faced by SDC Planners who themselves only had eight weeks to determine an application and needed some time to "validate" it – ensure that all the paperwork was correct, and could not change their schedule to fit those of all their 120 Parish Councils.

Properties - Repairs After much debate, Cllrs agreed to accept the quote from DT Leisure for work on the BMX Track, once they were assured that it would not begin until the new financial year! Repairs to the multiplay equipment, rocking horse and skatepark were in train.

Goalposts were much more of a dilemma! Those used by the Junior Football Club were reported to be in a poor state and Cllrs were concerned they might be a danger to players. But the Club had applied for a grant to replace them and the PC did not want to spend our money if the Club was going to get its grant.

They discussed a variety of stop-gap measures from temporary repairs to taking the goalposts away. Sharon Hancock advocated raiding the reserves to replace the posts and to temporarily remove them. The Club would be warned of the concerns and asked if they could rearrange their fixtures whilst

the PC tries to determine if their grant application to WCC Cllr Bob Steven's fund will be successful.

Car Park - The parking spaces are to be re-marked (bet you didn't realise they were marked at all!). Colin Sheasby has recommended that the Memorial Oak sapling be added to the trees that line the east side of the car park and a plaque will be placed by the tree. The Council approved £2845 for Mr Sheasby to undertake essential tree work this year.

Key Holders - A sign is to be erected on the car park listing those who hold keys for the bollards at the top of the car park so that in an emergency they can be removed to allow access by the emergency services. So far so good.

But it was pointed out that those key holders do not have the key to the car park gate which is closed at night and not opened until 9am. Then there is the plate which goes over the dragon's teeth to allow wider vehicles into the fields. That appears to be held by Cllr Pat Summers.

After much debate the Council rejected the suggestion that users should have sets of keys, but did not really resolve the problem of how to make the fields easily accessible in emergency situations. The Chair said the Air Ambulance might have to be called!

Dog Fouling - Discussion of a resident's complaints about the amount of dog faeces on the playing fields was realistic about what could be achieved. As Tim Lockey pointed out — to have much impact would require lots of volunteers willing to police the fields, and that was unlikely to happen.

Allotments - Some repairs to the access track had been undertaken by the householder who was allegedly responsible for the damage. Cllr Ekins reported that more vehicles seemed to be using the track and the bad weather had exacerbated the problems – it was not so bad in the dry.

The Chairman agreed that the repairs had made the track better but there were still sizeable potholes and he thought the resident might be asked to do some more work, possibly with hardcore or road planings.

In response to a resident's complaints about the track the Chairman said it had never had a good surface and the Council could not expect it to be made perfect. It was agreed to await the outcome of Cllr Summers' discussions.

Lighting - Cllr Lewis' suggestions for improving the lighting in Bush Heath Lane were accepted by her fellow Councillors who also approved the siting of lights on the Hereburgh Way extension. The Council also endorsed her recommendation for the replacement over the next two years of the six remaining concrete lampposts.

Improvements - Harbury won't get a tourist sign for the Library Café as it does not meet the criteria but the PC might consider putting their own direction sign on the playing fields' car park where many walkers and visitors would see it.

A request for a litter bin on South Parade was discussed but the Cllrs favoured finding bigger, possibly recycling, bins for outside the Supermarket.

Surface Flooding - The County reported that extra gullies in Penelope Close would only increase the pressure on the sewer further down the estate and that no blockage had been found in the system in Margaret Close.

Traffic Calming - The County had agreed to paint "Crocodile Teeth" on the road surface in Bush Heath Lane to warn motorists of the 30mph limit. Cllrs agreed to spend £200 hiring the Speed Aware Sign for Butt Lane to try to cut speeds there.

Other items - One Way System - Cllrs reported that lorries were going the wrong way up Hall Lane. The Clerk pointed out the sign and road markings at the Crown Street/Hall Lane junction had faded.

Biffa - Cllr Patrick reported households were being urged **NOT** to wrap food placed in their green bins. Her colleagues protested that they had been previously told this must be done. But things have changed so don't do it now!

Next Meeting: 22nd November, 7.30pm, Venue to be arranged, but not in the Village Hall!

Harbury 62 - Keresley 12


Midlands 4 West (South)






Village Hall Update

Last month, an eagle-eyed villager enquired about the whereabouts of the wooden plaque, which used to be displayed in the main Hall immediately to the left of the internal double doors. The plaque was presented on the occasion of the official opening of the premises by John Profumo (Minister of War) and was taken down for safe-keeping during the development of the new toilet area. Since then it has been taken care of by Geoff, who is intent on getting it cleaned and fitted with new shatter-proof glass, as the original mount had been damaged at some time prior to commencement of the building work. There is also a framed photograph of Mr Profumo and his wife, actress Valerie Hobson, in the Fosse room, which is also in need of attention and hopefully it can be restored and placed in a more prominent place, so that more visitors can appreciate the history linked to the origins of the building.

Two other plaques are housed in the entrance hall and it is doubtful whether many people stop to read about the 'chestnut trees planted in the grounds in memory of Francis Dashwood Farley' or the 'activities of the Harbury Village Produce Association 1943-1956 in growing food for the village during the war years and its donation to the building fund of this Hall on its disbandment'.

As the Hall was opened officially 50 years ago, it has been decided that the theme for this year's New Year's Dance on Saturday December 29th will be

the Golden Ball, so all revellers will be encouraged to find something that does more than glitter (all that glitters----!?) e.g. dress, top, bow tie, socks, shirt,-- and of course, jewels, including cuff links and maybe even make-up?? Another milestone, which will be reached in November is the fifth anniversary of the Rural Cinema organised by Lana and her helpers and it was agreed to offer an extremely popular film as a special event, even though it has meant that Harbury is 'going it alone' by hiring The Best Most Exotic Marigold Hotel. at an increased cost. The film follows several retirees who are seeking to 'find themselves' as they leave for a holiday break with a difference in India. The cast includes many of the UK's most celebrated actors/actresses, including Bill Nighy, Ronald Pickup, Judi Dench, Celia Imrie and Maggie Smith and the action takes place in the hotel, as well as in the fascinating locality, which shows all the vibrancy of typical life in India. The film played to packed houses when it was shown in local cinemas and this evening will offer the chance for a viewing for anyone who missed it first time round. It will be possible to book a £10.00 ticket in advance from CANA, which will include bubbly on arrival and a fish and chip supper with optional curry sauce during the interval - see the advert elsewhere in the magazine, whilst anyone wishing to see the just the film can turn up on the night for £3.30 for a ticket. As always, CANA wines will be on hand to dispense alcoholic and soft drinks for all to purchase throughout the evening.

At the end of November, the Folk Club repeated the highly successful evening of traditional songs with members dressed in typical Old Tyme musical hall style led by the ever effervescent Debbie Ellis as the M.C. It was a thoroughly enjoyable evening, which raised £702.16 for the Village Hall's development funds.

In the past two weeks, it will not have been too difficult to spot the activities of a roofer removing the noticeably poor materials which covered the flat surface above the toilet block and kitchen – (no eagle eyes needed!). The straw strammit boards and tar covered 'wood wall' materials are being replaced by the more efficient 'three quarter inch ply' and felt, which should ensure that there are no leaks in the original extension of the building for several years. More recently, the architect charged with developing plans for the proposed new extension has been in discussion with members of the Theatre Group so the requirements for the longed-for stage are known, as well as improved shower facilities.

Horticultural Society

Our first meeting in October was very well attended and it was so nice to see everyone again. We welcomed back John and Kate Page, his topic this visit being "Tulips in the Wild and in Cultivation". We were transported to places where I wouldn't have considered tulips would grow. We were shown amazing scenery, colours and such an assortment of shapes and sizes.

John started his talk with a painting by Abel Grimmer dated 1600 which showed a Spring scene with tulip bulbs being unloaded from a boat. We have four Abel Grimmer paintings at Upton so this for me was an excellent start!!! If you remember, tulip mania in the 17th Century saw tulip bulbs selling for the equivalent in today's value of thousands of pounds. Fortunes were made and lost. Anna Pavord has written an excellent book on the subject.

Today we still have the Spalding Festival with floats made from tulips and some very clever designs. Lincolnshire is excellent for growing tulips as it replicates the conditions in Holland, with cool summers and warm winters (in theory anyway). At the Eden project in Cornwall where thousands of bulbs are planted each Autumn for a superb display, all of them are removed every year.

We were then transported to - wait for it..... Kazakhstan..... yes tulips do really grow here in the wild. The conditions too were quite hostile, slopes at the base of huge mountain ranges with lots of scree. The tulip leaves had crinkly edges almost like a cactus. The colours varied from reds, yellows and oranges as did the size and shapes. The centres of the flowers had wonderful blotches with huge corollas. Some were even star shaped. They have active growth due to the water from the snow melt and good drainage which is the key to success. John mentioned at this point that there are two and a half thousand cultivars - can you imagine that?

We then went to the foothills and the steppes which again were covered in brightly coloured tulips. This is a fantastic sight and the areas are just carpeted with vibrant displays. Again they have excellent drainage. We saw similar sights in Turkey and Greece. In Cyprus the tulips grow in meadows and in vineyards. In Crete too they survive very well in meadows. The slides were quite breathtaking.

John went on to say that there are 15 cultivars of tulips as listed in the RHS plant finder. I will not mention all of them. There are early ones, singles, doubles, lates, lily flowered and many more. The best advice for growing tulips in pots is, as mentioned before, good drainage. Place either crocks or similar in the base of the pots. To fill the pot you will need 50% coarse grit and 50% John Innes number 3 compost, mix well and add slow release fertiliser. Plant to a depth of about 6 inches. Make sure the pot is on pot feet

and off the ground. You can still plant tulips right up to the end of November. I was late one year and did not manage to plant until December and they were just as good the following year. If planting in the garden, again plant to a depth of 6 inches and space them about 10 to 15 inches apart. Sorry I am still in feet and inches!! Water well in active growth and use a high potash fertiliser such as Phostrogen. You can also grow tulips under cover as in an alpine house.

We were shown some lovely plantings of tulips starting off at Upton House and Gardens. Then to Hidcote, Waddesdon Manor, the Shakespeare Gardens, Bodnant gardens, Botanic gardens Oxford, Coughton Court and, one I had not heard of but will now visit, Ceney House near Cirencester. They were grown here in knot gardens. Also seen was the home of the "naked gardeners" Ian and Barbara Pollard at Abbey House in Malmesbury. Here they lift the bulbs every year but you can leave them in situ. If you do dig them up in Summer store them in cool conditions so that they do not rot. A paper bag is as good as anything to store them in. Repot in fresh soil in late Autumn. They can be affected by tulip fire Botrytis, as were Derek Walkers last year; the only solution is to dig them all up and cleanse the ground.

John is currently writing a book for the RHS on tulips and daffodils and we wish him great success.

With autumn now upon us it is a good time to visit Arboretums. Westonbirt is always a spectacular sight as is Arley which we visited a few years ago and saw the Severn Valley railway in the distance. Closer to home is Batsford which has a great tea room with great views over the surrounding area. If you have never visited Barnsdale Gardens started by the late great Geoff Hamilton and now run by his son and wife do try to go; it is quite near and at this time of the year the foliage, berries and seedheads make for a super display, plus there are home grown plants for sale and again an excellent tea room. The leaves are spectacular at present so our rotten Summer has redeemed itself.

Our next meeting is on 6th November when a new speaker Dr Tony Hughes, who is a keen amateur photographer with an interest in European native orchids, will talk to us about Flowers of the Dolomites. Promises to be another excellent evening. The December meeting is on 4th and we will again enjoy an evening of fun put together once more by Jean Clews. New members are very welcome and I look forward to seeing everyone.

After a three year break, we are planning to hold Open Gardens again next year. With improved publicity, the addition of a scarecrow hunt and, as the Sunday date coincides with the Carnival Games' Wheelbarrow Race, we are

Garden Jottings from Bridge Nursery Christine Dakin

Perhaps this month is one of the least likely to inspire the average gardener. It gets darker earlier, there can be frosts and grey skies and thoughts are geared up towards Christmas not gardening.

Having said negative things about this month it can sometimes be a good time to look more critically at the garden and begin to make plans for the coming year. When there are fewer flowers and leaves it is easier to see what needs changing. Don't be afraid to change things; there is no point keeping straggly plants or things that you simply don't really like. I believe that as time goes on one's opinion alters which gives an opportunity to remove some 'old' plants and add in some new ones. Gardens and plants are a bit like fashions in that there are new styles from time to time. Remember when everyone had conifers and heathers?

We had a query the other day regarding 'bitter pit', a disease in apples. Mind you, not many people had any fruit this year because of the weather. Anyway, this problem results in spotty brown bits all through the apple. It is caused by a lack of calcium in the soil and, believe or not, dryness. The ground was still dry at the time of the blossom stage so that would be why the apples got the disease.

Every autumn I try to bang home the idea that this is a good time for planting. Bare root trees and hedging can only be planted through the winter. Other pot grown plants will get their roots established before the spring. So get rid of second rate plants and replace with new and better ones this autumn.

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Nature Notes

John Hancock

Cool moist conditions predominate with regular low pressure weather systems trundling in from the Atlantic bringing heavy rain at times. Today, (18th October), the River Itchen as it passes under the Welsh Road was full and brown with its load of suspended soil. Later, cycling along the bridleway which leads from the Fosseway to Whitnash, I noted the ditch was brimming. Conditions must have been a lot drier on the 23rd October 1642 when the Battle of Edgehill took place, the first major engagement of the English Civil War. Surely no commander would have risked his cavalry in a charge across the waterlogged countryside we have now.

I received an interesting e-mail from a reader in Ladbroke. Her lawn has suddenly produced a 'crop' of impressive Shaggy Inkcap fungi. The photograph shows how a single specimen 7 inches high changed over 4 days! In the 2½ years they have lived there, they have never seen the like. Could the spores have been lying dormant for that length of time or has the ground been 'seeded' more recently. It's likely the fungus, as an underground network of fibres known as the mycelium, akin to a rooting system, has been present all the time. It's only during this moist, relatively warm late summer that the fruiting bodies have been produced.



Looking at last November's edition of Harbury and Ladbroke News, I see that drought conditions prevailed. Bill Russell reported all his ponds had virtually dried up and fish had died as a result. A fungal foray to Hampton Wood with John and Val Roberts had yielded only a few shrivelled specimens. We hope for a greater variety on 29th October when they are taking the U3A Natural History Group on a similar walk through Crackley Woods. John is an excellent wildlife photographer and on 10th December in the Tom Hauley Room,

between 10.00am and noon, he is giving an illustrated talk on the flowers of South Africa. You are welcome to come along. There will be a charge of £2.

Visiting our brothers in the North East recently, Sharon and I were struck by the fact that the autumn colours were further advanced than in the Midlands. With the sun shining on the foliage picking out the red and yellow tints of the leaves on the trees in the deep cleft of the Ouseburn, it was difficult to believe we were only a mile from the centre of Newcastle-on-Tyne.

I had a walk round Gosforth as dusk closed in to find a bit of industrial archaeology. A robin gave its tic tic alarm call from a hawthorn as I arrived close to the spot. A simple sandstone pillar recorded the fact that beneath was a geological fault. Miners in1828, hacking coal out of a productive seam, had come to solid rock. They cut through 349 yards of it before reaching coal again. The owners were so pleased at their efforts, they threw a party for them below ground. In such a way has the geology of our country been documented. The mine has long gone.

Back in Harbury on 14th October, the sharp eyes of our grandchildren found two intriguing specimens. One was a chrysalis of the Large White butterfly fixed to the brickwork of the 3-arched bridge. Then, in our front garden, on a leaf of the Copper Beech, they found a beautiful white hairy caterpillar with a tuft of red close to its head. It was the larva of the Pale Tussock Moth (Calliteara pudibunda), sometimes known as a 'hop-dog' by country people because it was common in hop yards.

On a walk in the Cotswolds recently, Sharon and I had our picnic lunch in a small public garden in Chipping Campden. Approached through a low arch from the main street, it is a memorial to 'China' Wilson, a 19th century botanist who discovered 'new' plants in the Orient and brought specimens back home. The garden contains many of these and is well worth a visit. Later, walking through Mickleton, we met Jean Rowe (widow of Tony, our Rector before Father Roy). She invited us into her home for a cup of tea and a chat, a lovely ending to our ramble.

Harbury and District Poppy Collection 2012

As a result, Bridget, Jackie and Thelma spent an afternoon constructing the poppy boxes, sorting the various items which need to be included and ensuring that the right box would go to the correct venue - lots of new children's wristbands, for example, in the boxes for the School and Windmills Nursery. Thanks to everyone who is helping with this year's collection and more importantly thanks to the village RBL members, who have done such a stirling job for so many years to raise the funds needed to support ex-servicemen in many ways – as vital now, as ever before.

Every Thursday at 10am term time the library is enjoyed by babies up to children just about to start school and their carers singing, dancing, playing instruments and listening to stories. It's been lovely to see so many faces become regulars and new people are also joining all the time so it's been great to see the little ones enjoying themselves and getting to know each other. Themes recently have been numbers, crocodiles and cats! Some of the links to songs have been tenuous to say the least (if you're happy and you know it snap your teeth for the crocodile one was fun!) We enjoy songs from the more modern to traditional and make lots of noise with the musical instruments.

If your children are grown now and you have some musical instruments (shakers, drums, etc.) that you would like to donate then please give them to the desk at the library. They need to be in good working order and able to be cleaned (wiped over). They would make a welcome addition to our collection.

We are developing motor skills: Playing instruments, dancing and doing action songs all help your child's physical development. It helps children increase their body awareness and balance, and as they become older you can encourage them to listen to the rhythm of the songs more closely and move in time. These gross motor (big movement) skills are essential to building muscle control and confidence walking, running and climbing, and control of these big movements is needed to lead onto controlling finer movements. Action songs help develop more fine motor (small movement) skills and will help your child develop the control needed for holding pencils properly and controlling them for drawing and writing. Dancing around at home to music you like with your child can be great exercise for you as well. It doesn't have to be children's songs - put on the radio and have a party at home with your little one; it is good for distracting from tantrums (who could resist watching Mummy/Daddy/Nanny/Grandma's crazy dance?) and can make you feel fitter and improve your mood. All this and it's fun, too!

If you haven't been before come and give us a try. If you and your little ones enjoy it, we ask for a £1 donation which goes directly to the library, and many stay on afterwards for a sociable chat with tea and cakes in the cafe.

Harbury Energy Initiative

Warning: it is definitely in your interest to act on the information in this article

In the last year we have made much noise about the Green Deal. This may have some shortcomings but is a real deal and not some complex government scam. Its purpose is to encourage house owners to look at ways to lower their energy bills by making their houses more efficient and installing new technology to generate heat and electricity. Since this is expensive, the Green Deal aims to make it possible by getting someone else, the energy company, to pay for the installation through the Green Investment Bank. The energy company is allowed to recover the investment through normal billing but can't charge more than you would have been paying and you still make the energy saving. To try to get early active interest the government is running a competition for local authorities to bid for three pots of money totalling £40 million to distribute to their local residents to beat the price rises in energy by making their houses more efficient.

The Green Deal process starts with an energy assessment by an approved assessor. This may be free but you need to check before you begin. Assessments can be done now. The assessor will advise you what improvements could be made, what you should expect to save and what qualifies for the Green Deal. Advice is available from the Energy Savings

Advice Service line on 0300 123 1234. With information from the assessor, from January, you will be able to go to a registered provider to arrange to have work done and agree terms for repayment through your energy billing. Approved assessors can be found on the government website: https://www.gov.uk/green-deal-energy-saving-measures/green-deal. Some grant funding may be available for replacing old inefficient boilers but not everyone will be eligible. There are also cashback deals available from government to kick things off.

HEI would really like to know from you what you would like us to do next. We have some ideas but would love an opportunity to talk to more of you. We will be holding a meeting at 7.30pm on the evening of 11th December, which will include our AGM. That won't take more than a few minutes, so don't let that put you off and we will be providing wine and nibbles. What happens next on energy in Harbury is up to you (well, okay, not entirely). Please join the discussion; energy bills will keep going up, you can be sure of that. We will announce the venue for this meeting in the December issue.

Please note that the current scheme for free home insulation will end before the new year and Warm Front only runs till the end of March.

We must have a fairly complete picture of PV installations in the village judging by the number of returned forms I have received. A few more have come in since September and I am very grateful to those people who have responded. It is not surprising, I suppose, to find that Harbury residents are happy to get involved and share the benefits of their experience. If you have by some slip of concentration, however, missed my requests for information about PV and have installed panels on your roof, please do let me know and we can get a form to you. The form is very short and does not require any personal information, if you don't want to give it.

We are also keen to extend our data to record any other low carbon energy generating measures people have commissioned. Not all houses are suitable for photovoltaic cells. Has anyone installed a solar hot water panel, ground or air source heat pump, biomass boiler or other technology? Would you be prepared to share this information with HEI? I haven't seen any 3MW wind turbines puncturing the skyline, so I am assuming that there is no wind-powered energy generation in Harbury.

We have had some donations into our LocalGiving.com account for which we are very grateful. This does not go into our steering group beer fund, however thirsty we get. The money allows us to work up more plans for the village, gives us the opportunity to investigate new benefits for the village, share knowledge from other communities who have greater experience and, if we raise enough, commission studies into whole village solutions. There is no doubt that along with food prices energy prices will continue to rise uncomfortably. We want to find ways for everyone to offset that by exploring opportunities to cut energy use and generate heat and electricity cheaply or at no cost.

Many of you have benefited from photovoltaic electricity production and may feel happy to share a tiny proportion of this good fortune with the village through HEI. If for this - or any other reason - you would like to make a small contribution to our fund, please go to www.localgiving.com/charity/hei and donate to Harbury Energy Initiative. At the moment every £10 donated attracts an automatic match contribution from the fund and is gift aided. There is still about £300,000 in the pot to allocate, so please do consider helping us grab some of that for the village.

News from BIFFA

At the regular meeting that the Parish Council have with the manager at the Ufton Landfill site we have been asked to pass on the following information. Some residents in some areas are putting

unwelcome things into the GREEN recycling bins. If this happens then a whole 20 ton of recycling may become unusable or the workmen have a lot to do to make it acceptable. Recently the site has been granted the Pass 100 accreditation which means from the New Year they will be able to sell their compost on the open market and anything wrong put into the green waste bins could mean that this standard could be withdrawn.

Please

- garden waste must be green (organic) no lumps of concrete, bricks, large stones or other non-green rubbish from the garden.
- DO NOT wrap food waste. Just put it in the bin with all the green stuff.
- **DO NOT put newspaper** into the green bin. This should go in the blue topped bin.
- NO plastic bags unless they are the biodegradable sort with the ISO logo made from starch which their process decomposes but which your composter may not do so well

The manager at Ufton would like to reward local residents by offering Mulox bags of compost FREE. If a group would like to make use of this offer now that Ufton have their accreditation, they should contact the manager Russ Parrett on 01926 614248 or mob. 07764 289532 to arrange this. Some local farmers are already using their compost and it is completely free of any dangerous bacteria. It is checked regularly and is completely safe. 700 tons have already gone out locally!

That Green Thing

Checking out at the store, the young cashier suggested to an older woman that she should bring her own shopping bags because plastic bags weren't good for the environment. The woman apologized and explained, "We didn't have this green thing back in my earlier days". The cashier responded, "That's our problem today. Your generation did not care enough to save our environment for future generations."

She was right -- our generation didn't have the "green thing" in its day. Back then, we returned milk bottles, pop bottles and beer bottles to the store. The store sent them back to the plant to be washed and sterilized and refilled, so it could use the same bottles over and over. So they really were recycled. We refilled writing pens with ink instead of buying a new pen, and we replaced the razor blades in a razor instead of throwing away the whole razor just because the blade got dull.

But we didn't have the green thing back in our day.

We walked up stairs, because we didn't have an escalator in every shop and office building. We walked to the grocery store and didn't climb into a 300 horsepower machine every time we had to go two blocks. But she was right. We didn't have the green thing in our day.

Back then, we washed the baby's nappies because we didn't have the throwaway kind. We dried clothes on a line, not in an energy gobbling machine burning up 220 volts -- wind and solar power really did dry our clothes back in our early days. Kids got hand-me-down clothes from their brothers or sisters, not always brand-new clothing. But that young lady is right. We didn't have the green thing back in our day.

Back then, we had one TV, or radio, in the house -- not a TV in every room. And the TV had a small screen the size of a handkerchief (remember them?), not a screen the size of the county of Yorkshire. In the kitchen, we blended and stirred by hand because we didn't have electric machines to do everything for us.

When we packaged a fragile item to send in the post, we used wadded up old newspapers to cushion it, not Styrofoam or plastic bubble wrap. Back then, we didn't fire up an engine and burn petrol just to cut the lawn. We used a push mower that ran on human power. We exercised by working so we didn't need to go to a health club to run on treadmills that operate on electricity. But she's right. We didn't have the green thing back then.

We drank water from a fountain or a tap when we were thirsty instead of demanding a plastic bottle flown in from another country. We accepted that a lot of food was seasonal and didn't expect that to be bucked by flying it thousands of air miles around the world. We actually cooked food that didn't come out of a packet, tin or plastic wrap and we could even wash our own vegetables and chop our own salad.

But we didn't have the green thing back then.

Back then, people took the tram or a bus, and kids rode their bikes to school or walked instead of turning their mothers into a 24-hour taxi service. We had one electrical outlet in a room, not an entire bank of sockets to power a dozen appliances. And we didn't need a computerized gadget to receive a signal beamed from satellites 2,000 miles out in space in order to find the nearest pizza joint. But isn't it sad the current generation laments how wasteful we old folks were just because we didn't have the green thing back then?

John Home's Book Benefits Kenyan Beekeepers

With a great deal of encouragement and assistance I find myself surprised to be the author of a book. This came about because firstly it would be of interest to know about someone who has been involved with beekeeping for some 50 years, with over 30 of them being the owner of Fosse Way Honey before selling on and "retiring"! The second driving force in producing the book was the desire to raise funds for the work of Bees Abroad in Kenya which now takes a great deal of my retirement time. It won't come as any

surprise that the book is called **Home & Away Adventures in Bee keeping** in the UK and Africa.

The entire profit from this venture will go towards the project work in Kenya. My family and I lived in Harbury for many years and now in Deppers Bridge, so much in the book has involved people and things around this locality. Country Fayre and Harbury Honey in Mill Street both have kindly offered to have the books available with the entire book price coming direct to Bees Abroad.

You may recall Marian Millington writing in the March Harbury News, about the work of Bees Abroad in Kenya and how, as local folk, we were able to use our skills to assist subsistence village groups often in remote areas. These groups would not normally receive help from larger charities and yet by encouragement and improving their beekeeping knowledge, they are also able to add value to raw hive products. They have been marketing these products and in doing so relieve poverty, which is the aim of the charity.

Marian mentioned in her article about Caroline, who in a recent email had told of how Bees Abroad had made a difference to their community.

Caroline wrote: "We have been able to gain skills on the sustainable and easy to manage beekeeping. This has empowered us as women since we can now own property in this manner. We have also been able to venture into "manufacturing" of body cream. This is a historic and big milestone achievement for rural pastoralist women. The proceeds we have collected from the sales of honey and body cream has enabled us to support our children in the payment of school fees. We also use it to support an early childhood centre which Sinyati established in 2002 to support the community's early childhood education.

We have also used portions of it to weed our bean project farm which we planted and then shared the crop harvest among the group members and other needy women. So that we all had bean seeds for the 2012 planting season. We did not have to buy seeds, which are expensive!"

Door knockers

We have had problems locally with two groups of people knocking on doors.

The first group are known as the "Nottingham door knockers" (as they come from Nottingham.) They knock at doors selling over priced and low quality housewares (dusters, ironing board covers etc) and more recently Christmas cards. They may claim to be reformed criminals, they are far from reformed and are used as scouts for house breaking accomplices. They often carry bogus pedlars' certificates. While it is not illegal to sell goods door to door police want to remind householders that anyone doing so must have a police issued Pedlars' Certificate which will indicate that the person has had some background checks made on them and that they are of good character. The certificate clearly shows the crest of the police force where it was issued, the name of the police officer who approved it and includes the name and address of the certificate holder and their photograph. Don't be afraid to ask for and check this. These people often carry bogus pedlars' certificates. If you are visited by one of this group, please inform the Police by ringing 101. If you are harassed or verbally abused by them then call 999 if you feel you need to.

The other group are charity collectors. Recent reports have been of people claiming to be collecting for the British Red Cross and for a breast cancer charity. They have been knocking on doors asking people to sign standing orders. This involves giving your bank details and your address giving the opportunity for fraud if the information falls into the wrong hands. The best thing to do is decline, close the door and give to charity through well recognised channels.

If you want any more information Trading Standards can help you. I do have a supply of stickers that you can put near your front door which inform callers that you do not buy from door-to-door callers, and has security advice on the back. Let me know if you would like one or get in touch with your street NHW co-ordinator.

A Message from Southam Police

POLICE Inconsiderate parking on pavements can stop disabled people from gaining access to services and can also

put them at great risk if having to resort to using roads. Parking on the pavement can be dangerous, putting pedestrians – especially those with disabilities or using pushchairs in danger. If a vehicle is blocking the pavement then people often have no choice but to walk in the road where they are at much greater risk of being involved in an accident.

You MUST NOT leave your vehicle or trailer in a dangerous position or where it causes any obstruction of the road (Laws: RTA 1988, Section 22 & CUR Reg. 103) YOU MUST NOT park partially or wholly on the pavement; unless signs permit it.

- Parking on the pavement can obstruct and seriously inconvenience pedestrians particularly people in wheel chairs or with visual impairment and people with prams and pushchairs. (Law: GL(GP)A Sec 15)
- Near a school entrance.
- Anywhere you would prevent emergency services from accessing.
- At or near a bus stop.
- Opposite or within 10 metres of a junction.
- Near or on a brow of a hill or hump bridge.
- Where the kerb has been lowered.
- In front of an entrance to a property.

On a bend YOU CAN BE FINED and we will be on patrol.

Don't Let Leaves go to Waste

Many of us are missing a trick if we don't compost falling leaves this autumn, according to the Warwickshire Waste Partnership.

'Leafmould' is a good soil improver, lawn conditioner and mulch. It can be used in seed and potting mixes too – and it is free.

All you need is a secluded corner of the garden and a simple container, to stop the leaves blowing away. Black plastic bags are ideal. Fill a black plastic bag with moist fallen leaves and make a few holes in the bag with a fork. Loosely tie the top and leave in a secluded corner of the garden. After about 12 months the leaves will have partially rotten down and can be used as a mulch around borders and the vegetable patch, they can also be dug in as a soil improver for sowing and planting or used as an autumn top dressing for lawns.

Well rotten leaf mould, two years old in most cases will be dark brown and crumbly with no real trace of the original leaves. It can be used as a seed sowing mix either on its own or mixed with equal parts sharp sand and garden compost. Alternatively, use as a potting compost by mixing equal parts of well rotted leafmould, sharp sand, loam and garden compost. One word of caution - do not disturb drifts of autumn leaves under hedges and other out of the way areas. They may be used as hibernating sites by hedgehogs and other creatures.

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

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
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
