At a well attended April meeting, following Communion with Reverend Annie Goldthorp and a reading by Sue Boniface, we were pleased to welcome our Diocesan President Di Sliwinski who gave us an illustrated talk on her trip to Madagascar – "A Country of Contrasts".

With a population of 22.599.098 and to the south east of the African coast. this island boasts 35 different types of lemur. The capital city is modern and has wide main roads in complete contrast to the area where Di stayed, in an orphanage for children/youths aged 4 - 24. Dirt roads and very little infrastructure, basic toilet facilities. Television, mobile phones, iPods etc are not owned by many. The life is harsh with very few comforts. Rice is served for all meals with very little meat but fish of various types is abundant.

The Mothers' Union with 7,300 members has links with the area so Di was invited to share the 110 years celebrations of M.U. and women members and the Bishop welcomed her to Madagascar where she was impressed by the hand-embroidered blue and white clothes worn proudly by members. Badges sent over by the Diocese were passed on to the President of Antananarivo M.U. but the weight of these and other gifts caused Di to have an excess of baggage.

The photographs with which the talk was illustrated gave us a glimpse of a very happy people and M.U. members attended from all over the country.

Handmade products were on sale showing a variety of Madagascan skills. very colourful embroidered items were presented to the Diocese.

It is interesting to note that men attend Fathers' Union which runs alongside M.U. and have embroidered ties to wear.

A very informative afternoon and Di answered many questions for us.

Our next meeting is on Wednesday 4th June in the Tom Hauley Room. Communion at 2pm will be followed by the meeting at 2.30pm. Visitors are always welcome to either or both.

The theme for our April meeting was "cold and wet, hot and steamy" and was presented by Charles Baker, a Senior Project Manager with the Canals and Rivers Trust (CRT) formerly the Inland Waterways.

Charles went into some of the history of the canals starting from the first canal built in 1761 from Manchester to Worsley, which was 15 miles long and cost £168,000 (today £20m) and the life of "Navvies" who did the work and were paid 2s 6d (121/2p) for a 10 hour day. It took them three weeks to construct one mile of canal.

During the Industrial Revolution the canal network expanded but life on the canals was tough. Families living on board the boats did the loading, maintaining and sailing and the children had a "floating education" at wharfs along the canals. But with the advent of the railway, many canals became neglected and fell into disrepair.

These days the canals are enjoying a revival and are used in many different ways - day trips/holidays, walking, cycling, wild life havens - and the CRT is a charity responsible for maintaining over 2000 miles of waterways including 1583 locks, 2913 bridges, 337 aqueducts, 73 reservoirs and 55 tunnels. The charity receives £35m from the Government annually to do this but relies heavily on volunteers and donations to enable the 33,000 licensed boats and approximately 10 million visitors a year to continue to enjoy these wonderful waterway corridors across the country.

Charles then gave a brief insight into his other love - steam engines (the "hot and steamy" bit!) Charles showed some slides of these grand engines, which of course used to work alongside the canals, and he finished by telling us of his own steam traction engine which he is restoring to pass its road test. A task that has taken four years so far!

Charles is passionate about his job and his love of engineering and this came across at this, the final Harbury and Ladbroke Church Men's group meeting.

Footnote: The Beginning

The first meeting of the Harbury Church of England Men's Group was on Friday 13th November 1964. The Speaker was Rev. T Bland, Vicar of Stratford-on-Avon on "Living and Learning". The President was Rev. Mackley and Hon. Secretary L J Cockerham. The minutes were hand written in an exercise book costing 1 shilling.

Footnote 2: The End (Not quite.....)

It was with considerable disappointment that the April meeting was the last meeting for the Men's Group after 50 years of meetings, outings and dinners. During this time many members have come and gone and some lifelong friendships have been formed.

The Group will be formally closed, at our annual dinner on the 1st May, however, members have decided to meet for an informal lunch once a month – on the 1st Thursday of each month - to continue to enjoy the fellowship and comradeship that has been so much the foundation of the group over the years.

Extraordinary Meeting

The resolution that the Parish Council petition against the HS2 Hybrid Bill and to seek the best possible mitigation for Ladbroke was unanimously agreed at the Extraordinary Parish Council meeting held on 9th April.

Annual Village Meeting Report

Ladbroke Parish Council held the Annual Meeting for the village on 9th April, attended by 21 Ladbroke residents, as well as the Stratford District and Warwick County Councillors.

Neighbourhood Watch: On the evening of Friday 14th March 2014, a dwelling in Hedges Close was burgled and various items were stolen. Police investigations are continuing.

Local co-ordinator of the Neighbourhood Watch, David Halsall, subsequently received 20 Safety Packs from the Warwickshire County Council for local properties detailing information about the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme and Crime Prevention Booklets which he delivered to surrounding residences in Hedges Close. In his report, David reminded us that the Neighbourhood Watch is a popular way for people of all ages and backgrounds to get involved in local crime prevention and community issues, and urged local community residents to get involved. High Speed Rail Link: Ladbroke Action Group leader, Graham Long reported the following:

There were two announcements on April 9th by the Government:

 The summary of the responses to the Environmental Statement consultation was released. 21,833 responses were received, of which 211 were sent by residents of Ladbroke and Southam. Further details are on the Government website http:// www.parliament.uk/documents/commons-private-bill-office/2013-14/HS2-Independent-Assessor-report.pdf In addition, last week the Commons Environmental Audit committee issued a report calling on the Government to do so much more to protect the environment than is currently proposed by HS2 Ltd. The Government's response on these items is awaited.

2. The second announcement contained proposals for increased compensation for those affected by HS2. Again, further details are available on the website, however, the HS2AA remains very disappointed at the new proposals.

The second reading of the HS2 Hybrid Bill will take place on 28th April, and we will thereafter have three weeks in which to present our petition to be heard by the Commons HS2 Select Committee. The Parish Council is working closely with the Action Group, and Graham thanked WCC, who remain opposed to the HS2 proposals, for its support and advice.

Parish Council: Councillor Derek Batty, Chairman of the Parish Council, presented this report:

The council meets 7 times per year, generally on the third Wednesday in the month with additional Planning meetings as necessary. Derek thanked all in the village who support the Council. The precept received from Stratford for 2012/13 was £5,000 and the same amount was requested for 2014/2015.

Continual pressure has been made on flooding issues via Mike Green, WCC, after meetings held here in Ladbroke last year particularly following the recent flooding problems throughout the South West. Derek confirmed that the Environment Agency has awarded £50,000 for improvements here in Ladbroke. This will go towards creating a 'balancing pond' construction to regulate flow through the village. Derek has also been assured that there will be no protracted investigation, instead an 'Option Engineering Assessment' will be carried out so that work is carried out in this financial year.

The date for the final SDC Core Strategy document analysis and comments is now October 2014. Included are proposals to build 10500 new homes over the 15 year period, including 350 around Southam.

Two proposals for wind farms have been made affecting this area -Broadview Energy and EDF energy, both required input and comments. EDF have withdrawn their application. The Deppers Bridge installation of 45000 solar panels was rejected at the Planning Meeting of April 8th and is likely now to go to appeal. Local Planning Applications have increased significantly and included general tree maintenance/removal, change of use and conversion/extension applications.

The Bell Inn is now under new management since last summer. It is fully operational and doing very well.

Damage to the highways due mainly to severe weather conditions, pot holes etc have been reported and are constantly pursued. We had a meeting with Highways department on site and the issues are still being pursued.

County Council Annual Report – County Councillor Bob Stevens gave the following report:

- Budget WCC has a budget of about £380 million. Half of this
 is spent on adult and child care. £90 million of budget cuts
 need to be found in the next four years, there are plans for
 integration with neighbouring County Councils.
- Gypsies and Travellers the site at Napton is an emergency stopping point. It is under judicial review and going to the High Court in Birmingham in the next couple of months.
- Wind Farms the planning application for a Windfarm in Knightcote went to appeal. A discussion is expected to take place in May.
- Public Health management has moved back to the Local Authorities, which has control over the management of Doctors and the Health Trust. Continued emphasis is made on supporting older people in the community in their own homes and 70 new such homes are being built in Southam rather than going into care homes.
- Pot Holes the central Government has given WCC £1 million specifically to repair potholes.
- Schools we are well served in this area. Southam College recently underwent an Ofsted and was rated outstanding. The College is 70 students oversubscribed for the forthcoming academic year.
- Change in Boundaries the County Council is also looking at a plan to reduce the number of Councillors from 62 to 57. There will be a consultation later this year.

District Council: District Councillor Chris Williams gave the following report:

- Any councils planning to increase Council Tax in the coming financial year are required to hold a referendum if the increase equals or exceeds 2%, this includes other precepting bodies except Parish Councils. The Local Government Finance Report for 2014/15 puts Parish and Town Councils on notice that Council Tax referendum principles may be set for them in 2015/16. Chris will keep us updated on this issue.
- The District Council is undertaking further Public Consultation on changes to the core strategy regarding new home construction, as new technical evidence suggests there may be changes affecting how many and where they are built. The changes include the total number of new homes that need to be built, from 9,500 to 10,900, and alternative strategic

options may need to be considered including consideration of other locations at Long Marston, the south-east edge of Stratford and two locations north of Southam.

- At the District Council meeting of 24th February, it was agreed that the Council Tax would remain unchanged for the financial year.
- Stratford District Council is reducing the number of elected councillors from 53 to 36 from May 2015, resulting in councillors' areas being enlarged. Ladbroke remains within the existing ward, although in future it will be known as Napton and Fenny Compton Ward.
- Final recommendations for Electoral arrangements for Stratford-on-Avon District Council will be agreed at the Council Meeting on 14th April 2014. These recommendations include:
- There should be 36 councillors instead of 53.
- There should be electoral equality for voters
- Promoting effective and convenient local government.

Alibone Trust: Geoff Lane presented the accounts. There is a good balance in the non-ecclesiastical fund; if any organisation thinks they have a reasonable claim for funds, please contact Geoff.

Church of All Saints, Ladbroke: Sue Lord reported that the major work and redecoration of the inside of the church is now complete and the results are wonderful – the church looks clean, bright and welcoming. However, an inspection of the roof timbers revealed areas of significant decay, and fundraising will be required to support this. There are two events planned for this year – a Church "Fun Day" in September and a dinner event in November. Sue also mentioned that after the embarrassment of not having sufficient hymn books at larger services, the PCC has bought additional hymn books with the help of generous donations from many people. He explained that this type of dancing had started in the Appalachian Mountains in the East of America when workers in their boots would tap out the rhythm to accompany tunes.

The first dance used traditional steps and was called Cripple Creek. To a wonderfully toe tapping tune, five of the dancers executed an intricate pattern of steps and moves. You daren't take your eyes off them in case you missed anything it all went so quickly.

Other dances followed, many of which had been developed by this Harbury Group, one of which was called Wight School Door so named because of the need to know which direction they needed to face when practising!

One of the most impressive items used broom handles and - without music - intricate rhythms were tapped out using feet and the brooms, all in perfect time with each other. Hours of practice must have been put in to get it to this stage.

Just before their final dance the audience were given the opportunity to try some moves from their seats. Even though the moves demonstrated were fairly repetitive it was amazingly difficult to copy them accurately. We were at least told that we were very good at joining in!

Sue Dudley takes wonderful pictures of dogs and wildlife. As you can see from her photograph of Pip dashing through water, she traps the excitement of the moment with pin-point sharpness. In a similar way, she captures their personality (or should that be doganality?), often with their head cocked to one side as she catches their attention. Part of her success comes from getting 'down and dirty', lying flat on the ground with her elbows in the mud to picture the dogs at their own level, but the rest comes from her obvious love of the animals and immaculate photographic technique. After showing us these portraits Sue took us to the wider world of birds, insects and flowers. She showed us birds in flight, insects in almost microscopic detail (even to

April 2014

Planning continues to dominate proceedings at Parish Council Meetings not surprising considering the wholesale removal of most planning legislation. Large scale developments are proposed south of Warwick and along Harbury Lane including a Traveller Site at the football ground; 200 houses to go on the Quarry lands and our District's preferred Local Plan housing sites: first Gaydon (3,000 units), second Long Marston (3,500), third Stoneythorpe/ Southam (1,000), fourth dispersal to all settlements (no numbers indicated), 5th South East Stratford (2,750). The final decision will be made by Stratford District Councillors on 12th May.

Given all this pressure things were lively at the meeting. First up under Public Participation was the development of the Dovehouse Autos site where objectors spoke against the present proposal for three, two-storey houses.

The Secretary of the Harbury Society (me) quoted Village Design Statement guidelines claiming the houses were an ill designed overdevelopment which intruded into the Conservation Area. Ken Stephenson for the residents cited boundary issues, the height and bulk of the buildings; lack of up to date environmental survey; loss of parking spaces; and adverse impact on neighbours. Colin Sheasby explained the site's history and land ownership backed up by title deeds. He showed the planned houses did not respect the building line of modern development and were intrusive. In his professional opinion there was no room on the site for the trees shown and Mrs Cook's daughter said the trees would overshadow her mother's bungalow.

Richard Wright, the developer, explained the houses were less high and set back further than those recently dismissed at appeal and he had Land Registry documents showing his ownership.

Next the Traveller Site objectors had their say. Ken Stephenson praised the objection response from the Parish Council. Rob Darlison said petitioners were challenging Warwick's Local Plan and the three landowners of the site beyond Bendigo Mitchell Crossroads would not sell. As Eric Pickles has forbidden compulsory purchase, Warwick District Council could not use this to buy the football ground site against their wishes.

Then local residents expressed their opposition to removal of Planning Conditions designed to limit hours when the proposed Nursery play area (at the old Dog Inn) could be used. Margaret Blair said residents' enjoyment of their properties would be blighted by noise all day and into the evening in this densely built-up area.

Planning

The Parish Council objected to the shipping container and associated works at the Telephone Exchange off Mill Street on grounds of security and concerns about the narrow access to be used by articulated vehicles. They objected to the Harbury Lane Traveller Site which Warwick District Council had proposed. They finally agreed to object to the application to remove conditions on the time the play area at the Nursery could be used despite their Working Party recommending they made no representation.

They made no representation on alterations and extensions at 7 Ridgley Way (other than recommending that matching materials be used); on pruning work to yews and a group of conifers at Yew Trees, Bull Ring Farm Road; and finally, on the erection of three residential dwellings on Dovehouse Autos site. Their Working Party had recommended it for approval, praising it as good design, integrating well with the Conservation Area, using a derelict site and providing local market housing and additional parking space.

They approved of plans for 200 dwellings, an Extra Care Unit, Surgery, employment use and a "country park" on the Quarries site.

Harbury Parish Council formally resolved to undertake a Neighbourhood Development Plan and chose the whole parish as their Designated Area.

Stratford District Council had approved the demolition of a Victorian shed at Phoenix House, High Street; refused permission for the Deppers Bridge Solar Farm and passed plans for a single storey extension at 14 Hereburgh Way as Permitted Development.

Appeals - The Decision by the Secretary of State on the Knightcote Windfarm has been delayed until August. The appeal for the swimming pool link at Stapenhall Farm is to be by written representations.

There is a casual vacancy as Parish Councillor Jenny Patrick has retired.

Properties - The new zipwire for the Playing Fields has been ordered. Repairs to the section of the BMX Track dug up for reasons and by persons unknown will cost £500. Uncultivated allotments will be identified and plot holders warned of their obligations. Colin Sheasby, the Council's arboriculturalist, offered blowers to clear debris from the car park so lines could be re-painted.

Trees – Councillors queried why the memorial tree for the playing fields had not been planted. Mr Sheasby said he had asked for the wording for the plaque which was to go on the English Oak plinth, but had received no instructions. He offered to replace trees on the mound at the Fiveways Junction for the Parish Council.

World War I - Councillor Hancock is seeking grants for the Council's publication on men from Harbury who fought in the First World War. Together with the Chairman she is researching archives, war diaries and other material

and hopes to include details not only of the fallen recorded on the War Memorial but also the men who returned to the village after the War. This will take several years.

The Annual Parish Meeting will be held on Thursday 8th May at 7.30pm in the Village Hall with "Nibbles and Nigel Chapman as the guest speaker". The next Parish Council Meeting will be held on Thursday 22nd May at 7.30pm in the Tom Hauley Room.

Neighbourhood Plan Update

A formal application has been made to Stratford District Council for the whole parish to be the designated area for Harbury's Neighbourhood Plan. At their April meeting the NP working group looked at questions for residents and businesses that members had produced. It was also decided to have a stand at Harbury Carnival in June where maps and questions will be available as well as other information about the plan.

The next meeting is on Wednesday 14th May, 7.30pm at the Village Club where printed material will be examined/approved and arrangements for the Carnival finalised.

Core Strategy

The latest consultation on the District Council's Core Strategy has just closed and the focus now shifts to analysing the responses and preparing an updated version of the overall strategy. The intention is to seek full Council endorsement for the Core Strategy in May. If this is achieved the document then has to be placed on deposit for six weeks to enable representation to be made on its overall soundness and legal requirements.

The consultation will run through June and July. In September the District Council will consider the representation Reg. 19 and will decide whether the Strategy can be submitted for independent examination by the Planning Inspectorate. If all goes smoothly the Council should be in a position to adopt its new Core Strategy by April 2015.

District Council Local Elections

Due to the timing of the European Election, the Local District Council Election will be held on Thursday 22nd May.

Final Recommendation from the Local Government Boundary Commission

The new electoral arrangements for Stratford District Council mean all 36 District Council Wards will be single member wards. In Harbury Ward there are 2721 electors. The Ward will include the villages of Harbury, Chesterton and Kingston, Lighthorne Heath, Warwick Services and the surrounding rural areas.



Harbury Society

Since its foundation our Society has:

- Secured the designation of our two Conservation Areas in the village.
- Surveyed the village's important trees to provide them with the protection of Tree Preservation Orders.

- Produced a simple history of the village and a book of local footpath walks.
- Promoted and organised the production of our Village Design Statement and the research and community consultation for it and the Parish Review on which our Parish Plan is based.

The Society also seeks to educate and entertain our members about aspects of our village and its wider setting, history, landscape, buildings and personalities. Our recent highly successful talks on the Thornley Kelsey Brewery in Radford and Leamington's Percy Greatheed are examples of this.

However, recently the Society has objected to neighbouring Warwick District Council's choice of the site, west of the Bendigo Mitchell Crossroads as one of its preferred options for a Gypsy and Traveller Site. We were concerned about the proximity to the very dangerous junction and potential flooding of the site, but our main concern was for its impact on the views from Chesterton Windmill.

We also objected to the development of part of the former Dog Inn car park for a large house. However the whole application was passed and the housing plot was immediately put up for sale at £250,000, which shows just what increases in land value planning permission can confer.

More recently we have objected to the latest plans for development at Dovehouse Autos site because of its adverse impact on our Conservation Area.

We made these objections, not because we are opposed to developments as such, but because we want any developments to be beneficial, provide what our village needs and respect our history, heritage and landscape. We were happy to support the Hereburgh Way Estate which was well designed and also provides homes for local people.

Once the weather warms up we like to get out into the countryside, so on the morning of **Saturday 17th May** we have organised a guided walk from Claverdon.


Tumble Tots was a great success, children had good fun crawling through tunnels, balancing on number circles and sliding up and down.

Staff & Committee

With Easter coming late this year, we were only at Pre-School for two weeks of April before the holidays, but, nevertheless, the children managed to fit lots of activities into the short time available.



Role Play Hospital: At the beginning of April, we turned the role play area into a hospital, complete with beds, doctors' and nurses' uniforms and equipment. Staff and children became patients for those acting as doctors and nurses and legs and arms were bandaged, ears examined (Gael was found to have a snake in hers!) and stethoscopes used to check hearts.

Mark making and pre-writing: The children were keen to explore the new wooden letters and magnetic numbers, which, in turn, inspired lots of mark-making on large and small whiteboards, notebooks and paper. Shaving foam was introduced as another medium in which to make marks, and large paper was used for group mark-making and Write Dance activities. Outside they used hoops, bean bags and balls to help strengthen their muscles, and clipboards and pens, blackboard and chalks to practise the smaller movements, thus encouraging the children to develop their hand skills.

What are pre-writing skills? Hand skills refer to the strength and the dexterity (how well we can handle small objects) in our hands. Both depend on how we use the small muscles of our hands. Children will also need to develop the muscles in their forearm



and upper body to provide the strength and stability that will allow them to use their hands to manipulate and control writing instruments.









Write Dance is an exciting and innovative programme which uses music and movement to introduce handwriting to children through large motor movements, gradually reducing in size as the children's muscles develop more strength. Write Dance movements are designed to help children feel happy and comfortable with their bodies, improving their motor skills and providing a strong foundation for writing.

The Easter Story: We were very pleased to welcome the Reverend Annie, who came to tell us about the Easter story, and read the children a story about 3 trees. We all finished by sharing pieces of chocolate from an Easter egg. Thank you Annie.

Easter Nests: Working in small groups, the children crumbled shredded wheat, then broke squares of chocolate into a bowl and watched as it melted over hot water, before mixing the two together and pressing them into paper cases to make nests. They were especially delighted when they were able to choose chocolate eggs to put in them. We understand that some nests even made it home!

Horticultural Society

Another good attendance for our April meeting when Roger Umpelby paid a third visit and his talk was entitled all Bugs Bright and Beautiful. As a professional entomologist and horticulturist of many years his knowledge and excellent pictures kept us enthralled. Nothing at all creepy or scary!!!

Bugs were represented by a frog hopper which is probably better known for depositing cuckoo spit. Its bright colours of orange and red are a warning to other predators so it will not be eaten. We learnt that shield bugs are plant feeders. A very bright yellow spider was shown - this again is camouflage. We moved on to mayflies and dragonflies. Mayflies only live for one day. The larva survives in water for a year before it emerges in May. The dragonflies and damsel flies are much bigger and we saw some stunning pictures of all colours with diaphanous wings; what a spectacular sight they are and more common now in our gardens in Summer. The damsel flies shown were blue and red. The blue ones had long tails with a green body. There was a banded

variety and one with fan shaped wings. To see them at very close quarters was a revelation.

Beetles were the next creatures we saw. All kinds of chafer beetles in all colours and sizes. An asparagus beetle which, yes, does like asparagus!!!! Beetles of course settle in logs so it is a good idea to keep a log pile as a place of safety for them. The dreaded lily beetle only feeds on lilies, these are best picked off the plants and squashed.

Ladybirds are a lovely friend to have in your gardens as they hoover up all of those aphids. There are a wide variety ranging from 2 spot to 7 spot to 14 spot. We learned an interesting fact from Roger that they are not nice to eat so as they say; do not try this at home!!! They over-winter in clusters and when the weather warms up they soon appear, I have quite a few in my garden and there are many more at the allotments.

We saw hover flies, saw flies and wasps and hornets. These too are very welcome in our gardens, particularly the wasps as they will eat the larva of the lily beetle. Then we saw many types of moth, far too many to mention but again the diversity of colours and sizes was quite amazing. Lastly we saw butterflies. What not to like about these lovely creatures who bring us colour throughout the Spring, Summer and Autumn. There are 58 species of butterfly in the UK and some of these are making a welcome come back from almost being extinct. The more common ones such as tortoiseshell, red admiral and peacock were shown alongside lots of blues and yellows. When you think that these fragile things travel from as far away as Africa, it is truly wonderful. A lot of the common ones over-winter in our sheds or similar places of safety. It is not possible to fully describe the colours and the patience and enthusiasm of the photographer were much in evidence. After a lively question and answer session we had to let Roger enjoy his refreshments. I am sure that I will be able to persuade him back again.

A quick mention again about our two trips. The first on Wednesday 11th June to a lovely National Trust property, Dudmaston Estate near Bridgnorth then onto a nearby Arbortum, Bodenham for a short guided tour by the owner, then time to explore. Cost is £22. The second is on Wednesday 16th July for an all day trip to the famous Sir Harold Hillier gardens near Romsey. These gardens are celebrating the 50th anniversary of the creation of its Centenary Border this year. There is so much to see and enjoy and a vast collection of plants, trees and shrubs. The cost for this is £23. Both trips leave the Village Hall at 9.00am and I have places left so if you would like to come on either trip or both please give me a ring; it will be lovely to see some new faces.

The RHS Spring Festival is on at the Malvern showground from 8th to 11th May, for more details you can contact 0845 260 5000 or look at the website www.rhs.org.uk. It is a fabulous setting and a lovely day out. Here you can buy plants from specialist nurseries and there are many places to eat. There is a Spring vegetable Weekend at Barnsdale Gardens in Rutland on

17th and 18th May. This is not too far to go and you can see Geoff Hamilton's wonderful gardens too. For more details contact 01572 813200.

At Kingston Bagpuize House, Abingdon there will be a rare plant Fair on 25th May, for more details contact 01865 820259. This house has a fantastic garden and only just over an hour away.

Earlsdon in Coventry, CV5 6FS, is having an open gardens day on Monday 5th May, from 11.30am to 4.00pm and the admission is £3.50. There are a variety of gardens open from town gardens, small and formal gardens to mature gardens. For more information on all of the gardens open, look at www.ngs.org.uk. Also open under the NGS are the gardens at Broad Marston and Pebworth, on Sunday 25th and Monday 26th May from 2.00 to 6.00pm and the admission is £6. Two lovely villages with modern, old and thatched properties. This year there are new gardens to see, including the village school where the pupils have developed a garden.

As the weather warms up there is much to do in our gardens and allotments with the results of our labours to enjoy throughout the coming months. Whatever you do just enjoy our beautiful countryside and any garden visits that you make. I look forward to welcoming everyone at the last meeting of the season on 6th May. Helen Picton from Old Court Nurseries at Colwell, near Malvern will be making a first visit to us. They have a national collection of asters and her topic is called Daisy Days. She will be bringing plants to sell as well. See you there.



Garden Jottings from Bridge Nursery Christine Dakin

Is this everyone's favourite time of year? Gardens are fresh and green, there is the anticipation of harvesting fruit and vegetables later in the year and it is a joy to be outside getting fresh air while tending your plot. There is always a sense of trying to get ahead with some of the tasks in order to be able to sit and enjoy the results later in the year. So there is lots to be done before you can sit outside in the evenings with your Pimms!

- You should be able to put any tender plants out towards the end of the month when risk of frost is unlikely. So, plant up hanging baskets and containers with bedding plants.
- Prune spring flowering shrubs such as Spirea arguta and flowering currant when flowering has finished.
- Apply rose fertilizer to all your roses, they really do respond well and it can help reduce black spot.
- Plant out dahlias.

- Remove forget-me-nots after flowering otherwise you will have too many next year.
- Protect strawberries with netting to keep the birds from getting your fruit.
- Plant out tomatoes and courgettes towards the end of the month.
- Sow sweet corn, carrots, French beans, peas.
- As always, keep up with the weeding.

Some of the hardy geraniums will be starting to flower now, there are so many to choose from and there are some which flower continuously from May to October; they are one of the best plants for all gardens. Lastly, visit other gardens for ideas and some relaxation.

Nature Notes

John Hancock

On Monday 8th April it rained in the afternoon as I was gardening. Later the sky cleared and the clouds at sunset had a pink tinge heralding a finer day to follow. Sure enough, Tuesday was sunny and we drove to Chedworth to meet our daughter and three of our grandchildren. It was the beginning of their Easter holiday which was a week earlier than our local schools. After a good look at the mosaics of the Roman villa and a picnic, we took a walk through the woods and along the track of the disused Cirencester to Cheltenham Railway. A cutting through the oolitic limestone yielded abundant fossil shells. Bluebells were coming into flower and with a good number of lesser celandine, primroses, violets and wood anemones it was quite a show. Young larch foliage was the lightest of greens. Jane noticed a plant that I had missed pushing through the leaf litter and bare earth of a bank. Its flowers were ivory white and it had no leaves. I took a photograph in order to identify it at home. Consulting my copy of Richard Mabey's encyclopaedic 'Flora Britannica' our 'find' proved to be Toothwort (Lathraea squamaria), a member of the Broomrape family. It is a ghostly parasitic plant totally lacking in chlorophyll. It grows on the roots of trees and in Chedworth Woods it was living on Hazel. The wax-white stems are fringed with fleshy scales and the seed capsules. which form later, are even more tooth like. Its alternative name is corpseflower as in country areas it was thought to grow from buried bodies.

In last month's article, I mentioned a strange corrugated cocoon with grubs that Alan and Betty Barr gave me for identification. When I visited Stan Finch,

he leafed through one of his reference books and came up with the answer. It was the cocoon of the Bee-Moth (Aphomia socialis). As its name suggests this moth and its larvae prey on bee colonies and can cause significant damage.

On 14th April, my U3A Natural History Group met at Hampton Wood Nature Reserve. We saw plentiful wood anemones, primrose, and early bluebells. Three swans in echelon flew towards the River Avon. Pear and blackthorn were blooming, blackbirds were singing and we were shown a mistle thrush nest on an ivy clad branch. Male Brimstone, Peacock and Orange Tip butterflies were on the wing. On my way home, I stopped for a picnic at Sherbourne and saw my first swallows of the year in the farmyard.

Rooks are nesting in the trees overhanging the Fosseway, south of Harwoods House and along Hambridge Road beyond Holmes House.

In glorious spring weather, Sharon and I joined Hereburgh Morris for their annual Good Friday walk. It took place in the hill country just over the Oxfordshire border at the back of Edgehill. The starting point was the village of Shenington with its lovely green and the highly recommended Bell Inn. The underlying rock is Jurassic Limestone and the stone cottages, many thatched, are an orange brown in colour akin to the stone at Fenny Compton. The walk, ably led by Peter McDonald, took us to Epwell with its Millennium sundial. Push a stick into the slot to read off the time against the shadow. Buzzards were wheeling high in the sky towards Banbury as we came down to Alkerton with its delightful Brook Cottage garden. This used to be open to the public under its previous ownership. Nevertheless, as a public footpath traverses the garden we had a good viewing. A stream and pond lent more interest. The stream later becomes Sor Brook and flows through Broughton to join the Cherwell close to Aynho.

Now is the time to take a walk along the unofficial path on the south side of Ufton Woods and search for the early Purple Orchid. It's there but vastly outnumbered by a sea of bluebells.

Memories of the Dog Inn

Back in the 1950s and 60s when Charlie and Neeta Sheilds were landlord and landlady of the Dog Inn, it was owned by Ansell's brewery and was a very typical "Ansell's Public House". It was a very busy drinking pub even though no food was ever served, and most Saturday nights there was a good old sing along in the large back room which was always packed full with customers.

Being friends with the landlord's family, one thing I recall was on a Sunday lunchtime during the summer Charlie would call time at 2.00pm. He would

clear the premises and lock up at 2.15 when friends and family would retire to the garden to relax for the afternoon.

Where the car park is now (and fast disappearing) there was a large, beautiful and well kept garden, complete with an artificial stream with a bridge over it leading to a summer house. Afternoon tea would be served from the summerhouse which was well equipped for this purpose.

Harbury Heritage Room

Our next two open evenings are Tuesday 6th May and Tuesday 3rd June from 6.30 to 8.30pm. We are always open on the first

Tuesday of each month. Local organisations are welcome to book other times at their convenience. Featured at the moment is a magnificent collection of windmills and artwork created by the children of the school.

The Heritage Room is at Harbury Primary School, and contains hundreds of photos and documents relating to the village and its inhabitants. You might even be featured if you have been around here for some time! Entry is free, though we appreciate donations, as the Heritage Room is entirely self-funding.

This month we thought the article below would be relevant, as we head towards the centenary of the start of World War I.

Harbury remembered by a 12 year old (circa 1914) (Mrs Evelyn Lane, née Bloxham)

In August 1914 War broke out. We had a foretaste of it when the Army came on manoeuvres to Bunkers Hill. I remember well how the horses were tethered - in long lines and tents for the soldiers the same. The Army was not mechanised in those days. Trainloads of soldiers, horses, and guns would go by rail. We would go down to the Three Arch to see them go. I also saw a convoy going by road, soldiers walking and horses pulling the gun batteries; it

stretched from the Harbury turn to Bascote Heath, to the bottom of Ufton Hill. Can you imagine hundreds of soldiers, horses and gun carriages? After the war had been on for a bit, Army men would come round and commandeer horses leaving the farmers or carriers to struggle on as best they could. I don't remember about rationing, I think we in the country must have been alright as our fathers grew in the garden and the allotments all the vegetables we needed, plus keeping pigs and chickens. There was make do and mend but there was that anyway.

You gradually came to realise there was a war on when you started missing people you were used to seeing. On enquiring, you were told they had gone to war or on munitions. There was sadness too when some of them didn't come back.

We children helped out by collecting blackberries; we went out with large baskets which we filled, then we took them to school from where they were dispatched for making into jam for the soldiers.

We noticed that the railings around the tombs in the churchyard were being taken away and in fact any iron railings anywhere were removed and sent for making munitions.

There weren't any bombs dropped on Harbury, but a Zeppelin dropped a bomb on Whitley Common, Coventry.

News from Banana Moon Nursery

We wanted to get back in touch, to keep everyone up to speed on progress with the nursery. We are pleased to say that we are still on course to open in July. Significant work has been undertaken inside the building during the winter months. We now have our dedicated room for babies, twos and pre-school constructed, as well as the sleep room and kitchen. In addition, the rotten roof and flooring have been replaced, the asbestos removed and all of the electrics brought up to regulation standard. Harbury Energy Initiative

The Renewable Heat Initiative for domestic houses was launched by the Government on 9th April. This is an incentive scheme to sit alongside the Feed in Tariff (FiT), an encouragement to us all to install non-fossil fuel space and water heating systems to our houses.

Galvanised by the opportunity to prise some money out of Osborne's treasure chest, I followed a tangled trail to the Ofgem site to register our solar hot

water panel, installed in 2010. After cutting a path through the jungle of links, I found that I wasn't the first to arrive. By the time I got there the strain of people actually applying was already telling and the batteries on Ofgem's computer had faded. In addition, it had already suffered some lapses in memory and was, so the site told us, temporarily unable to match some essential information needed by us all for registration. I found out quite a lot about what I *might* get, more tantalising still. Over Easter someone must have been despatched to buy a couple of new AA batteries for the computer, because the site is now working. Maybe also some hypnotherapy might be arranged to recover the lost memory.

The RHI payments cover any new installation of water or space heating that uses renewables. That means solar hot water panels, ground source, water source and air source heat pumps, and biomass boilers. The payment rate varies according to the technology, with solar hot water receiving 19.2p per kWh generated down to 7.2p for air source heat pumps. Payments are quarterly and continue for 7 years. The aim is to stimulate homeowners to install these systems by making them more affordable but, if you have already installed them, you may still be, as we are, able to apply. It is quite likely that the next batch of 'we've noticed from our records that you haven't yet installed...' nuisance calls will be about this. Don't be put off but don't accept the first price that you are quoted. Have a look in the meantime at www.ofgem.gov.uk and find the Domestic RHI pages. Or contact me, if you prefer. These systems can all be financed under the Green Deal as well.

No scheme for the Wight School building which houses our library can be expected to run smoothly, it seems. I say this from grinding experience. Our plans for insulating the library ceiling proved just such another jinxed effort with complications multiplying as we progressed, or tried to. It all became too costly. To our delight, however, E.ON has allowed us to transfer funding to the Rugby Club, where we plan to save them about £340 a year by part funding the insulation of the clubhouse cavity walls and roof. We are now in a rush to get it done before the bid expires but, so far, the evil fairy hasn't followed us there.

In his constant search for technological innovation our steering group member Ted Dowdeswell has recently bought an electrically assisted bike. Cycling purists may disdain such sacrilegious new-fangled gadgetry but I've been on it and it goes effortlessly - and is fun. Ted is generously offering anyone interested a chance to try it out. Call him on 07836 320483 if you want a go. You can probably get to Southam and back before he notices.

Eat Well, Waste Less

In the UK we throw away 13 billion "five a day" portions from our homes every year and £111 million worth of rice and pasta. Part hate waste of keeping fit and well is to eat a balanced and healthy diet. However, research shows that the food we buy generally doesn't match official recommendations on the types and amounts of food which we need to maintain a healthy lifestyle.

Even after bringing all our shopping home, we end up throwing away the very foods we should be eating the most of – fruit, vegetables and wholegrain carbs.

Eating healthily doesn't have to be expensive. In fact, the average family could save up to £60 a month by only buying what we need and using what we buy. Love Food Hate Waste has some top tips to help us waste less, save money and feel great:

 Planning our meals so that we buy the right amounts of food and making a shopping list and sticking to it means that we don't end up buying lots of food that will go off before we get round to eating it. Lovefoodhatewaste.com has some free handy meal plans including recipes to get you started.

- Whilst many of us like having a large fruit bowl on display, the fridge
 is actually the ideal place to store most of your fruit where it lasts up
 to two weeks longer (except bananas and pineapples which should
 be kept cool but not refrigerated). Vegetables also last longer in the
 fridge especially if it's stored in the packaging it was purchased in
 (except potatoes and onions, they're better off in a cool dark place).
- Lovefoodhatewaste.com has a portion calculator to help you cook just the right amount of food.
- If potatoes are going a bit green and sprouty, give them a good peel, cook, mash and freeze for later.
- Green leafy vegetables and salads can be refreshed by popping them into a bowl of cold water with added ice cubes for 30 minutes.
- Broccoli trim a little off the stalk and place the broccoli in glass of water in the fridge and it will revive overnight.
- Watercress, spinach and rocket if you don't get through the bag of salad in time, try chopping and stirring it into mash, pasta or popping it onto a pizza during the last few minutes in the oven.
- Too much rice or pasta? Freeze it in portions for use later, and when you do reheat it, make sure it is piping hot.

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
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


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
