Ladbroke Parish Council

The formal minutes taken by the Parish Clerk will be displayed on the noticeboard by The Bell Inn in due course; these are the points I noted during the meeting on 17thSeptember.

Neighbourhood Watch: Jim Laider is our new NW co-ordinator.

St James School Playing Field: no progress.

Phone Box: this is bright red again thanks to Rickard Walker for providing the paint and Lara Kelly who spent many hours carefully applying it. Some villages e.g. Kineton and Priors Marston, use their redundant phone boxes to house a defibrillator; this will be looked into to see if it would be appropriate for ours.

Noticeboard: a volunteer carpenter to repair these is sought, the Parish Council will provide the materials.

Planning: The demolition of a farm building and erection of a single storey dwelling at Dovecot had been approved, also the extension at Quince Cottage. The change of use at 7 Hedges Close was refused on a technicality and this was incorporated into a further application for a proposed fence, gates and hard standing on which the Parish Council made no representations.

Highways, Footpaths and Drainage: The resurfacing of the main road through the village had gone well: it looks a good job and was done to schedule, apparently it cost £92,000. The Highways response to our concerns that resurfacing was premature and the drainage issues should have been resolved first, was that although the full drainage investigation report had not been studied in detail, nor made available to Ladbroke Parish Council yet, any remedial work could be done under the footways or related to poor drainage on private land, i.e. home owners responsibilities. Also full resurfacing rather than surface dressing and the reappearance of white lines (which has surprised local horses who are not keen to cross them) is **not** in preparation for more traffic when HS2 work starts - the conspiracy theory to this effect is just that - the council are not that organised! Each October the list of highways work for the coming year is assessed, so now is the time to remind them of issues, such as the edge of the road near the Deppers Bridge junction.

Progress towards the balancing pond on the far side of the bypass, to reduce the risk of the brook flooding its banks into village homes, is frustratingly slow; the current activity is resolving land ownership issues.

Village Hall and Millennium Green: Since the last meeting there have been maintenance activities and another well supported film night. The next fund raising activity is a quiz night on 11th October. The Village Hall constitution is being updated - when last done about 15 years ago, various village organisations, including the Parish Council, could nominate one of their members to the trustees/management committee. However in the intervening years all had ceased to do so, so it was proposed to delete this clause from the constitution unless any of them wished to nominate someone. The Parish Council decided that, as the Village Hall was governed by the rules of charities and had an AGM open to all, they would let their right to nominate someone lapse.

HS2: There is a consultation ongoing about compensation, with additional clauses relating to distances from the line, in rural areas.

- 1. Within 60m of the line properties will be purchased at the unblighted value
- 2. 60 120m there is a voluntary purchase scheme and if people are happy to stay some compensation will be paid
- 3. 120 300m there is a sliding scale of compensation (from £22,000 to £7,500).

Very few properties within Ladbroke Parish are less than 300m from the line and it is thought that any comments relating to compensation for homes beyond this distance will be ignored as they are not consulting on this. However the Parish Council agreed to submit a response, saying that we do not agree with a 300m cut off and, with regard to the 120 - 300m offer, the compensation should be the difference between the blighted and unblighted value + 10%.

The Select Committee are listening to petitions and will be visiting our area in early October. They may speak with one or two members of the public at the places they visit but will ignore any group approaches. It is estimated Ladbroke petitions will be heard in November.

WCC: Previous info was repeated such as cost savings are beginning to bite, boundary changes will cause a reduction from 62 to 57 areas, with one councillor for each and Fenny Compton joining the Feldon Area that includes Ladbroke. The Community Forum on 29th September will cover police and planning, including the community infrastructure levy. Southam now has a full member of the police force based there: PC Cramp. The Parish Council are urged to respond to the "rather woolly" Health and Wellbeing Strategy which is out for comment.

SDC: the Core Strategy has been adopted, sent to the inspector and is at the public inspection stage until the end of the year. SDC are about the 40th of 300 councils to have got this far and hopefully it will be approved in March 2015. Ron Ball, our Police and Crime Commissioner, will fund a Rural Crime Co-ordinator who, working through the neighbourhood watch scheme, will identify patterns of rural crime for the police to follow up on.

Ladbroke & Deppers Bridge Women's Institute Jackie West


The key notices and announcements at our September meeting included:

- members were thanked for raising £315 for the brain injury support unit and also for providing hot refreshments at the Hope 14 Picnic
- subscriptions are going up to £36 next year, anyone joining now will get the remainder of this year free
- next month is the AGM, do come and do consider standing for the committee, especially the essential roles of president, secretary and treasurer
- tickets are available for the WI Xmas shopping evening at Hatton (5th December, 5 - 9pm, 10% discount)

The main part of the evening was an illustrated talk on **The W.I. at War** by Jon Goodson and Vince Williams, two very proficient speakers. It was a fascinating story, especially some of the efforts and undertakings during the Second World War. Although the WI in Britain had started in 1915 with just 12 members, by the start of the Second World War one in three villages had a WI and by the end of that war there were 300,000 members of this rural organisation, 13% of the female population. The Government urged the WI to continue meeting during the war as it was both a very positive influence on the nation's nutrition and raised women's morale. The WI were given extra rations of sugar to make jam, with a 60% sugar / 40% fruit version going to shops, hospitals and canteens and a lower sugar content version to schools. WI members were obviously very trustworthy as there was only one WI member. Mrs Pratt, who abused the sugar supplies, diverting them to the Lady Denman emphasised that the WI was not involved Black Market. directly in the war or armaments and was no doubt proud that they raised funds to give an ambulance to the Red Cross in 1940. However the WI's neutral and pacifist ideals were interpreted broadly, for example unofficially the WI housed scientists and servicemen working on radar and they collected the small pieces of foil that German planes dropped to confuse radar systems to make button holes, with the money raised from the sale of these going to the war effort. The WI was great at organising collections, not just the obvious but also cooked bones which after processing helped stabilise nitroglycerin in bombs, and rabbit pelts which were made into fur coats for the Russians.

This presentation was only one of a wide range that Jon and Vince give; perhaps they'll make a return visit and tell us about women working on canals during WW2, trekking to K2 base camp or Mountain Rescue in the UK, another time. 




Mosque Doors & Windows by Jackie West

Thatching for Beginners



As anyone walking or driving along Church Road in Ladbroke in the past month will have observed, Church Cottage's new roof is slowly taking shape in the capable hands of Brandon Thatchers (website: **thatch.gb.com**). What is perhaps less well known is that the man in charge, Andy Crompton, lives in Ladbroke, so I took the opportunity to find out more from this master craftsman.

Thatching is a skill that requires many years of practice, Andy has put in 28 up to now. The first four years or so he worked as an apprentice to a

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Master Thatcher, then he spent some time as a Journeyman working for a number of different thatchers, before becoming his own boss and a Master Thatcher himself.

Church Cottage with its new extension is the largest domestic job that Andy has done. When I spoke with them on 22nd September, Andy and his two colleagues - Will, from Lighthorne, and Joe who travels in from Northamptonshire - had been working on this thatch for three weeks and they reckon they were still less than half way through. At the other end of the scale Andy has thatched summer houses, a bus shelter and even a village sign. Jobs don't come more local than Ladbroke and the furthest away from base he has worked is in the Scottish Highland and Islands and in Holland.



My next questions were technical – what does thatching involve? Most of Andy's roofs are made of Combed Wheat Straw or, like this one, of Water Reed. This can be obtained in small quantities from Norfolk but it is harvested commercially all over Europe and China. The roof of Church Cottage will use approx 4000 bundles of reed (13 tons), sourced from Hungary.

The two main parts of a thatched roof are the COAT and the RIDGE (think of an overcoat providing most of the protection and the ridge like the collar giving more at the top). A good thatched roof does not absorb the rain, instead each reed acts like a long thin tile, providing a surface for the water to run along. It only runs off the ends slowly though, which is why you see icicles hanging from thatched roofs in cold winters.

All the thatching work on Church Cottage so far has been on the coat and as they worked Andy and Will explained what they were doing. Starting at the bottom edge of the roof a few bundles of reed are laid on, cut edge downwards and the cord tying each bundle together is cut. The reed is initially held in place using a temporary SWAY (fixing) made from a few horizontal reeds held by metal hooks. The side edges of adjacent bundles are blended together by hand, the technical term is to FIRKLE (that's a good one for Scrabble) and then the cut ends are tapped into position using a metal tool or THE REED IS DRESSED USING A LEGGET if you speak thatching jargon. Finer detailing of the base of the reed, e.g. near dormer windows, is created using a narrower wooden bat called a DUTCHMAN. Once the reeds are in the correct position they are fixed permanently using a thin steel sway. That was about as much as I could take in during one lesson. I have promised to go back in a few weeks, when they are working on the ridge to find out about that stage of the process, so watch this space for the second part of this article.

In the meantime if you would like to see Master Thatchers at work, do go along and watch them in action; the best views of them now will probably be from Ladbroke Churchyard, until they start working on the ridge.

Harbury Parish Council Extraordinary Meeting – 15th September

Your Parish Council does not usually meet in August or December, but these are dangerous times. It seems that developers never sleep! So there was an extra meeting on 15th September to discuss three planning applications that came in during August. Two were for extensions that were probably only of concern to near neighbours and the Councillors very quickly decided that they had no objections to make, but the other was very contentious.

It is for an agricultural worker's dwelling on Treens Hill below The Beeches. It is a sensitive site and one the village agreed in its Design Statement should not be further developed. However agricultural workers' dwellings are permitted, if there is a viable business that needs a permanent worker present at all times. The application is for a dormer bungalow with a large upper storey which is labelled as providing storage and a farm office. However Councillors pointed out that in reality this was identical to a four bedroomed bungalow and could be easily converted. They were scathing about Stratford Council's Planning Enforcement Section's effectiveness in dealing with breaches of planning consent. The applicant had run an egg business on the site up to 2001 but the lack of security of a residential worker and other reasons had caused him to cease trading. This meant that he could not produce financial records to show three years profitable trading which is usually needed.

It was explained that a furniture storage business was already using the site for which there was apparently permission already granted and that business would continue after the house was built. However the planning application did not refer to this use and that would mean there would be more traffic movements out onto Treens Hill than the application indicated. As Ed Wilson pointed out, the storage was not an agricultural use.

The Chairman said the application had previously been refused on road safety grounds, and as there could eventually be 133 dozen eggs a day produced their transport would inevitably create lots of vehicle movement at an unsuitable access point.

This was one of a number of concerns from Councillors and neighbours. The economic sustainability was questioned as the costings for the business did not include staffing, marketing, maintenance or cost of running the generator, licences and other statutory checks on the business. There was no mention of how carcases or chicken litter were to be removed or how other nuisances such as smells and flies would be dealt with. Neighbours claimed that they had been troubled by this when the previous business was on that site and the prediction was the business would have 2,000 chickens on the site after three years.

The building would fundamentally change the western boundary of the village and overall they thought it would have an adverse impact, particularly on the immediate neighbours, and consequently these outweighed the benefits. It was not isolated from other housing and would extend the village envelope beyond the scarp which Councillor Summers said Neighbourhood Development Plan consultations wanted protected.

The Council were unanimous in their three objections:

- 1. It was on the village edge which Harbury did not want developed.
- 2. The business was not sustainable as there could be no guarantee it would be established or maintained for any length of time.
- 3. Access was dangerous.

They also demanded that there should be a condition to ensure the agricultural tie could not be removed.

The Spinney Paddock



We have lost the Spinney Paddock that gave such pleasure to villagers in all seasons of the year and maintained a green corridor which brought wildlife into the heart of our village.

Despite urgings from the Harbury Society and veteran Parish Councillor Sharon Hancock, your Parish Council chose not to object to a planning application for a cottage and double garage across the front of the Paddock. (If a

Parish Council makes "No Representation" they do not object and that means a District Council Officer makes the decision which is usually ratified by the District's Planning Committee. So however vociferously the public makes objections the plans are likely to be passed.)


As soon as the planning permission for the cottage was granted, another application was made to move the double garage behind the cottage, and plant a large brick four-bedroomed house behind the first and put a roadway alongside the spinney.

The agents acting for the Price Family Trust (*which* owns the spinney and its paddock, the Church paddock and pieces of land both sides of Bull Ring Lane) have pointed out that as the applications are for single dwellings, the Policy which would have made them provide affordable housing was "not relevant"!

It will now be very difficult to stop the Trust developing this second dwelling and indeed now the principle of development on the paddock has been won, there is nothing to stop them coming back time and again until they have completely filled in the meadow.

Our Parish Council has chosen to have a Planning Working Party which deliberates in private rather







than a Sub-Committee open to public scrutiny, so village objectors do not know what the PC's decision is likely to be until the full Council meeting.

As the public participation session is at the beginning of the Council meeting, once the Councillors start discussing an application the public are not permitted to speak on the matter!

This is very concerning at a time when planning rules have been so emasculated that we are bombarded with speculative applications that enrich developers but provide nothing for the village, add to pressure on our facilities and degrade our rural setting.



Back to our first meeting and routine, with many dates of events to participate in. We were pleased to see visitors too.

The Harbury Village Show must be mentioned and we thank the W.I. members for entering the classes which helped to make the Show a success. Also the refreshments and helpers were great and very busy.

Congratulations to all the winners, especially Pam Parton who won the General Horticulture Cup for Craft and the W.I. Cup for the member with the most points. Didn't she do well?

As usual this month we had another interesting speaker – Elizabeth Smithams on Victorian Lingerie.

Despite the title of her talk, Elizabeth brought a wide selection of articles, mainly cotton dating back to the 1900's, some even older. She had inherited some, but after many of her talks people often pass on their collections to her. There were aprons, pillowcases, toddlers' dresses, chemises, shirts, a christening robe and pillow to name some, but all had a story. Yes, there were Victorian bloomers!

The main thing is that most were hand stitched and the work was beautiful. The sewing machine was invented about 1850 and only the rich could afford them. Just think what lovely sewing and embroidery was done with no electric light to see their work clearly.

Village Hall Update

It's fingers crossed time again, as two members of the fund-raising committee have been burning the midnight oil recently in order to meet the deadline for applications for potential funding from landfill organisations. If either, or hopefully both, of these are successful, it is hoped that the final stage in the modernisation of the Hall can go ahead sometime next year.

As with everything achieved by the Village Hall committee members is concerned, a small band of dedicated supporters continually 'pull out all the stops', so that our Hall is recognised as providing excellent facilities at remarkably low cost. The couple who held the most recent wedding (with the marquee liner) had relatives from Leicestershire who had researched community buildings in a wide area and found that the price of hiring our building was far more economical than any other Hall, (even though hirers from outside the village pay an extra premium compared with the amount charged for local hirers). The prices will be adjusted in the New Year in line with inflation, but even so, the cost of hiring the whole building is considerably cheaper than anywhere else locally with a similar sized main Hall with 'superb kitchen and toilet facilities', as constantly remarked on, by hirers in their feedback after an event.

As has been mentioned in previous articles, the costs are kept as low as possible, as hirers are asked to leave the premises both inside and outside, as they found it. The most recent large-scale event was the CAMRA Beer Festival, which attracted many hundreds of knowledgeable beer drinkers for three sessions (Friday-Saturday). It involved members of GASS and the Village Hall cooking mountains of hot dogs and bacon rolls, whilst the CAMRA representatives dispensed quantities of special ales from around the country. At the end of the weekend, however, all those involved, had cleaned everywhere to perfection, including the continually used oven; checked all the fridges, dishwasher and freezer, so that the members of the committee who check the Hall daily were able to do only a cursory check to ensure that everything was back to normal. Certainly, the Horticultural Society who used the Hall for the recent Flower Show, also left everywhere in pristine condition, but this is not always the case. Sometimes hirers have not felt obliged to clear up completely after themselves and committee members then have to spend some time putting everything 'back to right'. It is not expected that the caretakers who work tirelessly for a few hours a week to keep everything up to scratch should be required to tidy up those areas of the premises which are clearly the responsibility of the hirers. The committees have occasionally toyed with the idea of asking for a deposit to cover additional cleaning needs after an event, but rejected it, as the majority of hirers do appreciate the behind-the-scenes work which is necessary to maintain the Hall and do not abuse the system by creating additional problems.

Another idea that has been floated from time to time at committee meetings is that there might be several people in the village who would be willing to include themselves on a '**Friends of the Village Hall**' list and could be called upon at times of need to help with various activities? Not everyone wants to commit themselves to attending regular committee meetings, which are essential for the decisions which underpin the management of the Hall, but he/she might be willing to be considered a **Friend** who could be called on from time to time?? If you read this article and think you may like to join us on a casual basis, please contact Geoff on 613801 or Celia on 612819.

The removal of the ORANGE phone mast from the Village Hall has meant the loss of reception for some mobile phone customers in the village. Unfortunately, the company was involved with a merger with EE and not only have phone users lost reception, but the Hall has lost a useful source of income – so in this respect there are no winners; we're losers all round.

Still a few gardens to visit in October....On 9th October about 22 miles away, Sulby Gardens post code NN6 6EZ will be open from 2.00pm to 5.00pm, cost £4. Over 12 acres of gardens with a working Victorian kitchen garden, ponds, streams and much more. You could visit there and still have time to go to Lord Leycester in the evening!!

On Sunday 19th October John Massey will open his garden at Ashwood Nursery near Kingswinford, post code DY6 0AE, only about 32 miles away. We went on a visit there a few years ago. The superb planting borders a canal and so many interesting things to see around every bend. Open from 10.00am to 4.00pm and cost is £5.

Abbotswood near Stow on the Wold will be open on Sunday 26th October from 12.30 to 4.00pm and cost is £5. These gardens were designed by Sir Edwin Lutyens with formal and informal areas. The first half of September has been glorious with warm sunny days but cool evenings. The garden is now extremely dry; there are deep cracks and some plants are looking stressed. It looks like one of my favourite slow growing conifers is dying. We don't water the garden, (we're on a water meter so it would cost too much) but most plants seem to survive. I recently completed a questionnaire for the Royal Horticultural Society which wanted to know which plants tolerated being water logged for a week or more and, at the other extreme, being in drought conditions. My list was surprisingly long.

Talking of dry plants, I have seen two examples of dead and dying plants for sale during the last couple of weeks. One was at a Tescos and the other at B&Q. The poor plants were so dry that they would need sinking in a bucket of water to re-hydrate. I do wonder who buys them. I also feel sorry for the growers, it must be soul destroying to know that the plants they've carefully grown are later not looked after. Years ago my brothers used to supply planted up hanging baskets to a pub chain in the whole of the south-east region. Some were well watered and dead-headed but if the landlord wasn't interested then they soon looked a real mess.

Jobs for the month

- Watch out for forecasts for frosts and protect tender plants.
- Pick tomatoes, the green ones will ripen on window-sills
- Plant garlic
- Lift dahlias after they have been frosted
- Start to plant bare-root trees and shrubs and hedging
- Dig up carrots and main crop potatoes
- Plant out spring cabbage plants
- It's a good time for planting, we still have lots of bargains, many plants are just £2.

Nature Notes

September has been a very dry month and writing this on Tuesday 23rd it looks set to continue that way. Many fields have been ploughed and some seed sown. The reddening leaves of a cherry stood out as I cycled along Knightcote Bottoms which now sports smart new road signs at each end. Let's hope they survive longer than those for Pudding Bag Lane in Bascote which mysteriously disappeared.

The double row of American Poplars on the Thwaites Estate leading up to Kingston Farm from the Manor have taken on a silvery look as the chlorophyll in their leaves has leached away into the trunk to be conserved and used again next year. Autumn is advancing with a noticeable drop in temperature and heavy dew at dawn whenever the sky is free of cloud.

On our annual canal trip with a group of friends we chose some perfect weather for boating. The Caen Hill flight of locks on the Kennet and Avon Canal was closed for many years. It had provided a broad waterway from Bristol to the Thames at Reading and thus on to London. Reopened in the after years of hard work by teams of 1980's volunteers, it traverses some of the best Wiltshire countryside. Wildlife highlights included a Small Copper butterfly and a Kingfisher. The former is in the family Lycaenidae which includes the Hairstreaks and Blues. Its food plant is Sorrel the leaves of which the caterpillar eats in a characteristic way giving a clue to its presence.



Sorrel is a Knotweed and therefore related to the rampant Japanese Knotweed which is proving so hard to eradicate. Perhaps an answer would be to use the young shoots as food as is done in its native land.

An attractive Compositae (Daisy family) growing beside the canal was a bit of puzzle. Consulting our botany books on returning home. а Margaret McDonald and I concluded it was Common Fleabane (Pulicaria dysenterica). As its name suggests, it was believed to repel fleas and bundles were hung in rooms or dried and burnt as a fumigant. It is a close relative of the species which supplies the insecticide pyrethrum so its ancient use is not quite as fanciful as one might think. (Thanks to the encyclopaedic Flora Britannica by Richard Mabey for this information.)

The Copper Beech in the front garden has been dropping nuts (known as beech mast) by the thousand for a good month now and there are plenty still to come. I've swept up barrow loads for the compost heap and thought a pig

would have had a field day. Looking up the derivation of mast, which includes acorns, I see it comes from a Germanic word meaning food.

Recently Warwick U3A Natural History Group was given a guided walk around part of Sutton Park. Originally a medieval deer park it is now administered by Birmingham City Council. It is a national nature reserve and is probably the nearest place to see a good variety of heathland plants such as heathers, gorse and bracken. Daniel, our guide, told us that the extensive holly woods were once managed by coppicing to produce cattle fodder. He pointed out the banks and ditches forming the boundaries of the hunting domain and a later horse racing track. I recommend going to the visitor centre which includes a museum and provides informative leaflets.

Sharon and I visited my mother's birthplace in South Wales recently. Maesteg in the Llynfi valley was one of the powerhouses of industry in the 19th and early 20th centuries. Now the blast furnaces and coal mines have all gone and nature has reclaimed many of the remnants. We walked round Garth Hill and found the footings of my great grandfather's farm. It was all very nostalgic.

Community Links Transport Scheme

A recent Transport News leaflet gave details about the Community Links Transport Scheme for residents in the Stratford District. The following information has been copied from the leaflet, so that residents in our area are made aware of the service and can access it when needed.

Community Links operates a small fleet of vehicles, each with full disability access, offering a 'door-to-door' service for people stuck for transport to get to and from the nearest town or village for shopping or visiting friends. The service is for people who have a genuine need for local transport and cannot access public transport because of mobility problems and/or they live in a rurally isolated location with no other transport available.

The Community Links service operates between about 9.30am and 2.30pm on weekdays in each part of the District three days a week. The fare system is a simple flat rate of £2 per single journey i.e. £4 for return 'door-to-door'.

If you need this service, or know someone who does, phone Community Links on 01789 264491 for more information. The Community Links social transport scheme works in close co-operation with the Volunteer Centre Medical Journey Scheme for doctor, dentist and medical related appointments. For this 'medical journey scheme', contact Clarissa Roberts on 01789 296344.'

It is possible that many people in Deppers Bridge, Harbury and Ladbroke have been unaware of these two valuable services designed to help anyone who needs transport, as they have not had much uptake in recent months. It's perhaps a good idea to copy down the numbers given above and leave them by the telephone in case you need transport for any one of a number of reasons.

The service is a partnership project provided by Warwickshire CC and Stratford-on-Avon Volunteer Centre.

Ufton. As in previous years, it is hoped that the majority of collectors who raised the magnificent sum of $\pounds3,100+$ from the house to house collections in our villages last year, will still be available this year. Each member of the team will be contacted in October to check on availability, but as always it is possible that additional helpers may be needed, as collectors from earlier years may be on holiday or unavailable for health reasons. If anyone in the above four areas would like to get involved this year, please could they phone Chris on 612305 as any additional help would be most welcome.

Harbury Energy Initiative

It all comes down to three things...for now. HEI has decided to focus on three projects for the moment and here they are:

- 1. Solar Panels for the school. We are going to work with Community Energy Warwickshire (CEW) on their plan to instal solar panels on as many Warwickshire school roofs as they can. We will only be looking at what help we can provide to make it happen here in Harbury. If the project is viable, it will be funded by a share offer, which means that we, the people of the village, will be able to invest in our own school and the educational opportunities offered by having renewable energy at the school. I meet with Kate Guymer and three board members of CEW on 3rd October.
- 2. The Electric Car Club. As I reported in last month's issue, we are in negotiation with E-Car to have an electric car available for hire in the village. This will help all those who can drive but have no vehicle or those without regular access to a car. If you are thinking of becoming a one car family, after having had two or more, this could save you considerable expenditure. We will be publicising this widely in the

village, if it goes ahead, and hope very much that people will see it as a valuable service and make use of it. The cars have no emissions in use, reducing the amount of pollution in the air and cutting carbon. At the moment I am waiting to hear whether the company have been able to source funding to enable it to launch here. There are quite a few clubs set up, our nearest being in Stratford-on-Avon, but none are yet in village locations. This poses a risk for the company, as they need adequate use to make it viable. Funding would take some of that risk away. By next month I should know if this scheme is happening and how it will work.

3. Community Energy Generation. Our aspiration is to have a suitable renewable energy generation project associated with the village. First, however, we need to find out just what, if anything, is possible. We plan to work on this with the Parish Council, applying to the Rural Communities Energy Fund for an initial grant for a scoping and feasibility study. In Germany there are over 600 such community energy projects, whereas in the UK there are less than 50.

One or two people have asked me about the calls they are getting about Green Deal Assessments. These are definitely nuisance calls and you do not need to respond to them. You need a Green Deal Assessment if you plan to reduce heat loss in your home by insulating it and need government finance, or if you are looking to instal solar panels or a renewable heat system and want to claim incentive payments. If you want an Assessment, HEI can arrange someone trustworthy to do it for you.

HARBURY SURGERY 2014 FLU VACCINATIONS Important Information

Flu vaccinations will be done by appointment only this year during October. Please phone to book yours on 612232.

This year the categories of patients who are eligible for flu vaccination has been extended as detailed below:

All children aged 2, 3 or 4 years of age on 1 September 2014 are eligible for nasal flu drops.

All children in **at risk categories**, up to the age of 18 are eligible for nasal flu drops.

For adults between the ages of 18 and 65 a flu vaccination by injection is available **only** if you are in an **at risk category**.

Everyone over the age of 65 is eligible for a flu vaccination by injection.

The At Risk Categories are:

- over 65 years old
- asthmatic or have a chronic respiratory disease
- chronic renal disease
- chronic liver disease
- chronic heart disease
- chronic cardiovascular disease, including stroke and transient ischaemic attack (TIA)
- Diabetes
- impaired immunity due to disease or treatment (immunocompromised)
- multiple sclerosis and related conditions or those with hereditary and degenerative diseases of the central nervous system
- pregnant
- carer

If you are housebound, you should telephone the Surgery on 612232 to be added to a list for home visit flu jabs. This will be carried out by the District Nurses if they already come to see you, or by the Surgery Nurses. 48

The following article is taken from a parish magazine of 1900. It reinforces the fact that we are well illuminated in the evening and night these days.

3rd March 1900

Each evening there is heard, beginning at the station end of the village a series of sounds like the trumpeting of wild elephants, accompanied by the rolling of wheels. This brings many people out of their houses and into the street, quite eagerly it seems. What does it all mean? Suddenly from out the darkness some youthful voices are heard calling out "Paper". Immediately several persons bawl "Here" and the boys carrying dimly discerned bundles go where they are summoned. And now (I have already alluded to the darkness) a considerable amount of fumbling takes place, the buyers feel for their paper and the boys for the halfpennies tendered to them (which of course they can't see). At last the sales are effected then the elephantine notes alluded to again rend the air; the juvenile shouts are renewed and the wheels roll onwards. Such is the way the evening news is circulated in Harbury. By what means the weird blasts of sound just referred to are produced I do not know. When there is a moon perhaps there will be a chance of finding out.

Warwickshire Southam Safer Neighbourhood Team

Scams are everywhere - how will you identify them?

Southam SNT would like to raise awareness of current scams. Victims receive text messages asking them to make contact urgently to another mobile number as the other person has run out of credit.

This is a scam. As soon as you ring the number back you are being charged a higher call charge.

Steps to avoid being a victim of this crime:

- If you receive a message from a number that is not one of your contacts delete it.
- Do not ring the number under any circumstances.
- Contact the Police on 101 and report it to us.

Southam SNT would also like to highlight other types of scam that have occurred throughout Warwickshire.

Police are reminding Warwickshire residents never to disclose details about their security, bank accounts or other personal information to 'cold callers' over the phone. The alert comes after reports were received from residents of North Warwickshire who had received cold telephone calls from people advising that they can offer a service to reduce Council Tax.

The telephone calls may appear genuine and they may know the address and phone number of the people they are targeting. They will also have access to Council Tax Band information and may know other personal details. The phone calls have been requesting for a representative to visit the targeted address to verify the householder.

To protect you from becoming a victim of fraud:

- Do not to give any personal details out on the phone or by email.
- Do not arrange any meetings or home visits on cold telephone calls.
- Do not open the door to any cold callers. You can always ask for callers to post through Identity Cards for you to see; call the police if you have any doubts.
- Do not pass any bank details or make any purchases on cold telephone calls.
- If there is any doubt, request a phone number from the person you are speaking with and hang up and contact the police for advice.
- Fraud and identity theft is one of the fastest growing areas of crime and occurs when your personal information is used by someone else without your knowledge.

To help prevent thefts from property and motor vehicles

Remember when leaving your house:

- When you go out, always close and lock the external doors and windows even if you are just going out for a short time.
- Don't leave spare keys outside or in a garage or shed; if possible leave them with a neighbour or nearby family member.
- Use timers for lights and radios if you need to be away from home overnight or when you are on holiday these can create the impression that someone is in.
- Visible burglar alarms and carefully directed security lighting can put burglars off. But make sure that the light doesn't disturb your neighbours and that alarms turn off after 20 minutes.

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- Window locks, especially on older windows, will help stop people getting in.
- Keep your keys out of sight, even in your house.

To help secure vehicles consider doing the following:

- Lock the doors and close the windows and the sun roof when you leave the car.
- Don't leave anything on display even a jacket can seem like an appealing target for a thief.
- Remove satellite navigation devices where possible, including the support cradle and suction pad. Remember to wipe away any suction pad marks left on the windscreen or dashboard.
