

Our meeting in March began with an extraordinary Annual General Meeting at which Christine Rutherford was formerly elected as leader for the next three years. Christine will be commissioned during the morning service on 10th May at All Saints Harbury.

After the usual business announcements we had an interesting talk from Chris Cooke who is involved in the financial administration of Mothers' Union. Chris meets with seven other elected members from all parts of the UK three times each year at Mary Sumner House. The purpose of these meetings is to oversee and allocate all funds raised or donated to The Mothers' Union. Funds managed by the committee include the Relief fund, a UK fund, the General fund and the Overseas Fund. Any money raised or donated which is not specified for any particular purpose goes into the General Fund.

The Overseas Fund is used for literacy and finance training and facilitators are trained to train others with the aim that areas should become self-sufficient. These initiatives have had a marked impact on family life in various parts of the world, as women who have been enabled to read and manage finances can therefore support their families and help others in their communities. Monies for these initiatives are paid directly to the Mothers' Union Diocese in which the training is needed.

Mary Sumner House is the headquarters of Mothers' Union and is situated just behind Westminster Abbey. There are approximately forty paid employees, not all of whom are full time. Their salaries are mainly funded by income generated from letting the conference and meeting rooms in this lovely, centrally located building.

Our speaker on 6th May is Charles Catt who will be telling us about God's Wonderful Wildlife on the canals. As usual we begin with Communion in the THR at 2.00pm and we will welcome any guests who wish to join us. If you prefer not to come for Communion, plan to arrive at 2.30pm.

The formal minutes by the clerk will appear on the notice board by The Bell Inn in due course but here is my take on the meeting held on 11th March 2015.

Matters arising: Possible defibrillators have been investigated and councillors are looking into sources of funding.

Parish Council Elections: Nomination information will be communicated by enews* as completed forms must be passed to Derek Batty by Easter Sunday or individually delivered by hand to SDC by 9th April. Rather than have a contested election, several of our existing councillors would take the opportunity to stand down if there are more than five nominations.

Planning: There was no representation regarding Ladbroke Grove Bungalow (down the drive at the end of Ladbroke Hill Lane) which was erected many years ago without planning permission nor to removal of a yew at Woodlands or several trees at Bell View Cottage and the usual comment of "refer to SDC legal department" was sent in response to applications to change Manor Farm barn conversions from holiday use to permanent dwellings. The proposed large, two storey extension at Bell View Cottage was discussed but it was concluded that there was no planning reason to object to it. Permission had been granted for felling trees at Hallsfield and for the garden shed at 9 Hedges Close.

Councillors expressed their lack of faith in SDC planning department after what appeared to be a breach of procedure. Our councillors had lodged an objection to an application and prepared to attend the meeting at which it would be discussed but they were told the decision was being delegated and

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then the application was approved, prior to the date of the meeting, despite the objection not being withdrawn.

Highways, footpaths & drainage: The person at SDC responsible for organising the fixing of the drains in Banbury Road is seriously ill and as it's not an emergency, the work will not be done in this financial year and the money will be carried over. Individual property flood defences will be investigated.

Ladbroke Matters: The recent film night was sold out. The next event will be the supper and race night on 21st March.

HS2: Ladbroke Parish Council, Ladbroke Action Group and Steve Copley spoke to the Select Committee on 2nd February and were well received; no official reply has been sent yet. The Parish Council thanked all who attended, especially those preparing and giving the presentations. A final report from the Action Group is expected at the Annual Village Meeting on 15th April.

WCC: Not much to report as no-one is making any decisions that could possibly be reversed after the outcome of the General Election!

The budget for 2015-16 is 1.95% higher than last year. The government is helping to fund changing street lights to LED lamps. £30,000 has been identified for repairs to roads in the Feldon Divison - the issue with the haunching (ie edge of the tarmac) on the road between the Bishops Itchington turn and Deppers Bridge junction was raised.

Both Bishops Itchington and Bascote Heath have received plans for solar farms.

The WCC councillor was questioned whether the apparent burning of waste woodchip on a local farm was legal - yes if they have a permit and it was generated on site; no if it is imported waste.

Small community grants can be applied for during August and September, we might consider this for the defibrillator.

SDC: The interim report on the core strategy is due 20th March.

SDC will be receiving £1M less from the government but do not plan to increase council tax or reduce services.

The Rural Crime Officer, Lucy Lambert, is keen to come to events to visibly mark items to deter theft. As Ladbroke is not having a fete this year, perhaps this could be done in the Village Hall grounds one Saturday morning.

The Deppers Bridge solar farm appeal decision is not expected until June.

Next meetings: Annual Village Meeting - 15th April, Parish Council Meeting - 13th May.

Ladbroke & Deppers Bridge Women's Institute Carol Lane

I was bemused by the title of 'Police Dramas' for the talk on Thursday 26th March in the Village Hall. Paul Taberner explained that he had been the Head of Forensics and Crime Scene investigations based in Leek Wootton but working all over Warwickshire. As well as this very busy and varied job he advised on police dramas such as Dangerfield as to the authenticity of the plot and investigations. However the producers cannot always have taken notice of his advice as he disappointed the avid TV crime watchers explaining that the methods in fiction are often far from factual.

He described how the police protected the scene of the crime from cross contamination because 'every contact leaves a trace'. In fact if you were planning a life of crime you would have been put off by the police's ability to extract such detailed information from the place where a crime had taken place. It was interesting to hear about the characteristics of fire and its spread and what could be gleaned even from a site which had been burned to the ground.

He recounted very funny anecdotes about his wide ranging work which took in theft, suspicious deaths, armed robberies, murder, fire, forgery and drug growing and dealing. We only let him stop when time became too pressing.

each and can be obtained from Margie (817312). Places are limited – so book early! Doors open at 7pm. Bring your own drinks.



The Council approved the quote to install a better safety surface at the playing fields which would leave the present bark fill to be removed by volunteers for their own use. Two new cradle swing seats were also ordered. A sign will be erected at Deppers Bridge playing field to prohibit unauthorised parking.

Pat Summers reported complaints that the Burial Grounds were untidy but said leaves, moles and weather were to blame. The Chairman explained they aimed for it to be neat and tidy in a natural setting otherwise the costs would be exorbitant. Cllr Hancock would inspect the mole hills and the Parish arborist would be asked to prune the lime that overhung gardens.

There having been no official approach asking for an extra dog waste bin in Bush Heath Lane, the Council was loath to fork out the £500 or commit to the on-going costs of emptying it. They debated where to put the five "dog fouling posters", agreeing most could go on the playing fields where problems were worst with one on the footway from Percival Drive to South Parade.

Tim Lockley, having arranged for Network Rail to resurface the Wight School car park, did not think they could be persuaded to provide an extension to the one at the playing fields too.

Eon shocked them with a 50% rise for street lights' electricity so they will seek other quotes.

The Fun Fair's request to use the fields on the Tuesday before Carnival and operate from the Thursday to Saturday caused great soul searching due to the possible damage to the field but they agreed, subject to a fee of £250 with a similar returnable deposit to allow access.

A replacement for Mike McBride who is retiring from organising the Christmas lights would be sought via the Harbury & Ladbroke News.

The WW1 Centenary was an opportunity to refurbish the War Memorial and the Council agreed to accept the quote for £2,800 in the hope their Lottery grant application would be a success. A different Heritage Lottery application

will hopefully fund blue plaques on homes of the fallen, with trail information available at the Library.

Planning:- Stratford District Cllr Kettle said the Core Strategy has been bounced back for further work and consultation. The Inspector decided the housing totals were not sound. So that means another six months delay. However the good news is the allocation of houses for villages of our size was "probably correct" leaving us and Bishops to each find space for 112. We have nearly reached our quota, Bishops is already over theirs.

County Councillor Stevens confirmed this saying the appeal on 150 homes in Long Itchington Parish had been allowed but the Inspector said no more would be allowed there.

The PC made no representation on treeworks at 9 Pirie Close and Wissett Lodge, Church Street; a rear extension at 26 Binswood End; on the creation of a separate housing unit at Stapenhall Farm; or the variation on the proportion of homes built to "Lifetime" standards at Station Road, Bishops Itchington. They withdrew their objection to the retrospective application for a change of use to residential at Fosse Farm on the condition that it would be on a one year experimental basis only.

They did however support Bishops Itchington in objecting to a further proposal by Gladmans for 105 houses on the Knightcote Road on the grounds of its impact on transport, education and heath provision; that it was speculative, an over-supply and lacked community engagement.

They had news the Cement Works development would be marketing the residential site to builders soon but was still negotiating with Warwickshire Wildlife to provide the promised Country Park.

Pat Summers announced the Neighbourhood Planning group had appointed Kirkwells Consultants and Cllr Sam Allen had organised the topic groups and provided examples of existing plans.

Next Parish Council Meeting is **Thursday 23rd April** 7.30pm in the Village Hall.

We hope all local electors will take the opportunity to vote for Parish Councillors at the forthcoming election which will take place at the same time as the Parliamentary and District Council elections.

Parliamentary, Parish and District Council Elections 7th May 2015

The elections are for three different bodies. The first is for Parliament and the boundaries for the Kenilworth and Southam Parliamentary constituency remain unchanged from the last election.

The second set of elections are for Stratford District Council and here there are major changes: the number of councillors for the District Council has been significantly reduced and each ward is now a single member ward. These are changes introduced by the Boundaries Commission. Furthermore each Councillor will be elected for a four year period and the whole Council will be elected en bloc every four years, rather than one third of councillors every year. The new Harbury ward includes Deppers Bridge, Chesterton & Kingston, and (new) Lighthorne Heath. Bishops Itchington is now a ward on its own. As a result Harbury will have its own dedicated District Councillor following this election.

The third set of elections (assuming the seats are contested - more candidates standing than seats) are for the Parish Council and there are no changes here.

Printed overleaf are profiles submitted by candidates that have indicated that they will be standing in the District and Parish Elections. There may well be other candidates standing on Election Day.

Dear Residents,

As the elections are next month I am writing to say I shall not be standing this time as your District Councillor.

I have thoroughly enjoyed the challenging position as your District Councillor and have learnt so much during the last seven years in this position.

Many of the topics of concern from residents have mainly been with housing or lack of housing which unfortunately seems to be an ongoing problem of not enough houses available for rent at a reasonable rate.

Secondly, planning and, as our Core Strategy (local plan) is still in the hands of the Government Inspector for determination, we are unlikely to find out if this is recommended for adoption until after the elections.

This factor has allowed speculative planning applications by developers to be granted by our planning officers due to the twofold effect of no Core Strategy in place so carrying little weight and, secondly, the District Council not being able to demonstrate a five year land housing supply. These factors have made it difficult to resist planning applications and if they have been refused they are being overturned at appeal.

There have been positives however, with a freeze on our Council Tax and savings being realized with joint working with other local Councils.

Thank you all for giving me the opportunity to work as your local District representative and I wish the new candidates good luck in their campaigns.

Harbury Society AGM

Chairman John Hancock expressed his gratitude for the members' support, thanked the committee members and Secretary for helping him. A large part of their time has always been taken up with commenting on planning applications but this was more necessary now there was a cascade of plans.

Secretary Linda Ridgley highlighted the pressure for housing development: 48 homes already built; 90 homes with planning permission and 8 more pending. As well as environmental damage there were fears both the School and Surgery did not have space to accommodate the increase in population.

Treasurer John Holden presented the Accounts showing a decreased surplus but still a healthy balance sheet.

Tim Holland gave a presentation on the "Immortal" 29th Division and their Monument, the 39 foot high limestone obelisk now marooned on an island at the Fosse Way/A45 intersection - once the centre of an avenue of elms. The monument is the focus of commemoration of the men of the 29th who in 1915 mustered there in front of George V, before setting out on the Gallipoli Campaign which saw the greatest number of VCs awarded. By the end of the war the "Immortal" 29th had suffered 94,000 casualties having been sent later to the Western Front in January 1916.

Uniquely the Monument also celebrates their stay in Warwickshire as the Division was assembled from several different regiments which, prior to embarkation, were billeted all over Warwickshire, where they so endeared themselves that public money was raised in commemoration of them.

Locals welcomed the troops who brought economic benefits – with the extra income for locals from the billet money, and what the 17-18,000 men spent themselves. There were problems; some landladies protested that they were not paid; there was drinking and violence including a spectacular punch-up in Nuneaton that involved soldiers from three battalions.

As the time came to muster, the troops were centralised and on 12th September the 29th Division assembled on the A45 between Fosse Way and the Railway Station west of Dunchurch waiting for the King to review the thirteen thousand men who marched past the saluting point where the Monument now stands.

The Monument celebrates the efforts of the "Immortal 29th Division" in two ways; the fallen in its stone and the living in the avenue of trees that is still there today, but the only acknowledgement of its presence is the road sign on the Coventry side of the roundabout saying simply The War Memorial!

And he made no secret of the fact that he loved Harbury. In addition to his career as an editor of medical journals, he was a mountaineer, canoeist, cyclist and sailor. From 2001 to 2008 he was Maire of Samois. The church of Samois was packed for his funeral.

On a lighter note, Sue Boniface has kindly written this note about our St David's Day Quiz:-

"A most enjoyable event at the village club was attended by approximately seventy people. As it was the evening of St. David's Day, participating teams needed to have some knowledge of Welsh geography, traditions, literature, food and prominent Welsh men and women.

The March meeting was very well attended and it was nice to see some new faces. Our speaker was Adrian James who is a garden photographer. Before he gave his talk about Bodenham Arboretum through the seasons, he explained that he was asked in 1997 if he would take some photographs for

their brochure. He was living at that time close to the Arboretum at Wolverley near to Kidderminster. He did take photographs and has been doing so ever since.

For those of us who visited there last June on our first day trip, you will remember that it was started by the current owner's father in 1973, in a natural valley. It is over 156 acres with 4 miles of paths and 11 pools, over 3000 trees and shrubs and it is also a working farm. Adrian started with Winter when the big pool by the reception area was frozen over. The images of the bare trees and shrubs highlighted the structure of the areas seen in the stunning photographs. Amongst the black and white images, flashes of colour were occasionally seen and this added to the drama. At Christmas there is a live nativity with the farm animals coming into their own, especially the donkeys. There are set pieces too around the farm buildings which act as stables. We saw some very quirky cut outs of the various characters from the story. There is still scent from mahonias and the banks of the pools have colour from the bracken around the edges. The bark on the prunus trees also come into prominence at this time of the year. Frost on the hedges and reflections from the water add to the almost ghostly scene. The dead oak leaves in Ryland Grove which was planted in memory of the owner's brother reveal a sunset streaming through, just magical.

Spring came next with hundreds of daffodils under the beech hedges, very bold splashes of yellow. Daphnes and early loniceras give off a lovely fragrance. The gazebo is also surrounded by colour. Adrian said that he liked to take photographs of the farm animals but you do need a lot of patience. However we were then treated to an amazing sight of three lambs in a row walking along a path, sheer genius. Blossom from the various fruit trees with masses of white and pink clouds, a sure sign of Spring. The acers and beeches with colourful leaves forming added to the spectacle.

Onto summer when the absolute highlight was the laburnum tunnel a wonderful sight of billowing yellow flowers full of bees searching for pollen. Near to a Monet style bridge the azaleas and rhododendrons put on a show too. The ancient armillary sphere which was used by astronomers to study stars looks very much at home in front of the gazebo. On the giant island in the main pool huge gunneras appear. The acer glade by the laburnum tunnel begins to show off all colours from green to reds. Wild flowers add to the abundance of colours from the trees, flowers and shrubs.

Autumn next with the reflections around the various pools emphasizing the change in the colours of the leaves on the trees. Splashes of reds from the spindle bush, chokeberries and parrotas. Peeling bark from the silver birch trees and the beech trees are usually last to shed their leaves. The misty early mornings reflect the melancholy. Some leaves appear to be a bluey green. Too many trees to mention but Adrian managed to capture the moods of season and you could almost feel that you were scrunching through the dead leaves underfoot.

Adrian was asked which was his favourite season and time to visit etc and he said all of them. He is a brilliant ambassador for the Arborteum and his skill with a camera is awesome. We look forward to another visit from him next year.

With Spring definitely here, there are many gardens and events to enjoy. Here are a few suggestions. The annual specialist plant fair will be again held at Spetchley Park Gardens on the outskirts of Worcester on Sunday 26th April from 11.00am to 5.00pm, with demonstrations, plant talks, garden tours and refreshments. Admission is £5 on the day. Near to Moreton in Marsh the spring gardens at The Old Chequer, Draycott, post code GL56 9LB will be open on Sunday 12th April from 2.00 to 5.00pm. Cost not known.

Under the NGS.... Kiftsgate Court near to Hidcote Gardens will be open on 13th April from 2.00 to 6.00pm with refreshments, cost is £6. Nearby Upton Wold Gardens on the A44 near Chipping Campden post code GL56 9TR will be open in the afternoon. Another stunning garden with formal and surprises around each feature. I believe the cost to be £8. At Stretton on Fosse in Warwickshire there will be two gardens open in the centre of the village on Sunday 12th April. Court House, a four acre evolving garden with year round interest and Old Beams a few doors away, a walled cottage garden on a slope with lawn, rockery fruit cage and vegetable garden. Garden Jottings from Bridge Nursery Christine Dakin


Last month I was chuntering on about wildlife and I've since realised that I missed out a couple of things. We've had one or two warm days and this resulted in the ants making an appearance in the tunnel. It's becoming a real problem because they sometimes make nests in pots and they seem to be impossible to eradicate. The garden is swarming with ants in the summer (we also have them at home in and around the patio door), I hate it when they become flying ants. If anyone has a magic remedy for getting rid of them please let me know.

It won't be long before the lily beetle makes its unwelcome appearance. Luckily they are bright red so easily seen but equally easily lost if they get knocked off the leaves of lilies or fritillaries. They do a lot of damage but can be controlled by carefully catching them and squishing them ruthlessly.

I live in fear of the new greater spotted giant ladybird. Now we all think of the common ladybird as being the gardener's friend, it happily eats aphids so we don't have to use horrible sprays. But this new one, which was first discovered in Wisley gardens, is twice the size of our normal one, it is peacock blue with pink spots. It doesn't eat aphids but eats its smaller cousin. The news report suggested that it emerges on or around the 1st April. Watch out!!

Meanwhile there is plenty to do in the garden.....feed roses.....sow peas and carrots.....prune forsythia and flowering currant bushes when the flowers have finished......prune hardy fuchsias and buddleia.....plant out sweet peas and gladioli......plant potatoes.....sow lettuce, radish and spinach.....and, as ever, keep up with the weeding.

There was another crisp, frosty start today (25th March) but this will be the last for a while as a band of rain is due to speed in from the west tomorrow. Signs of spring are everywhere. A house sparrow was carrying some nest material in its beak as I walked up Mill Street to collect our newspaper. Yesterday, a magpie was carrying something more substantial and jackdaws were examining chimney pots. Down Hambridge Road past Holmes House, the rookery in the roadside ash trees was getting quite active and noisy as the birds repaired their nests. Soon, summer visitors such as swallows will be with us as the days lengthen and insects proliferate.

Yesterday I had a piece of luck. I had cycled over to Oakley Wood to search for the rare (in Warwickshire) False Morel. A wildlife specialist and photographer, Kay Reeve, had shown us a picture of the fungus at our U3A Natural History Group meeting in the Tom Hauley Room. Afterwards she gave me some instruction on how to find it. It is guite small and well camouflaged so despite a diligent search I failed and set off to ride home. On the way out of the wood, a man was walking towards me. I asked him if he knew the wood well and he turned out to be Dave Champion who had discovered the Morel in the first place. He took me to the site. I had walked past it as its camouflage in the leaf litter was perfect. Consult a text book or computer to get an understanding of these unusual looking fungi. Instead of the typical mushroom cap they have a conical fruiting body with a honeycomb network of ridges and pits giving it a large surface area. It attracts insects by its distinctive aroma and these in turn distribute its spores to new sites. Morels are much prized by mushroom hunters but must always be cooked rather than eaten raw. My advice would be to avoid them. As its name suggests the False Morel is more likely to be toxic.

Thanks to Geoff Thorpe I have seen my first frogspawn of the year. This was in a ditch running along the south-eastern boundary of Bascote Woods. There were several clumps with a frog on guard when I went on 19th March. Wood Anemone, Primrose and Violet were in flower but the glory of the woods, its bluebells will be best seen in a month's time.

I had a chat with Michael Thwaites when we met in the village recently. We had both seen our first Brimstone butterflies of the year. They were the butter yellow coloured males which always emerge from hibernation first. The female's upper wings are much paler than those of the male though the underwings in both are similar, a greenish yellow perfectly resembling a leaf. As resting or feeding Brimstones have their wings closed, this makes for good camouflage. The food plant of their caterpillar is Common or Alder Blackthorn. I have been shown the eggs of this species on these small trees close to the car park at Draycote Water. Later, typical feeding damage to the leaf can help to find the caterpillar in June.

When Kay Reeve came to talk to us at the Tom Hauley Room, I asked the group to enter on a list an interesting wildlife sighting made this year. Moya Waterman had seen a Tortoiseshell butterfly on 12th March and three of us had seen Brimstones on 20th March. One member from Lillington sent me a photograph of a Green Woodpecker feeding upon ants on her lawn. It was a male as it sported, what could be described as, a red moustache. Pam Reason from Bishops Itchington had seen two cock pheasants fighting over territory.

Tricia Harrison recently told me of a bird she and Brian had found on the patio to the rear of their house. When I went to take a look it was a perfectly preserved, exquisitely marked, medium-sized wader with a long bill. I took it home for identification and to photograph.

Subsequently I showed it to several villagers and we agreed it was a woodcock. Martin and Amanda Randall said years ago they could remember hearing a woodcock whilst visiting Harbury Spinney. Presumably this was so called 'roding', a mysterious territorial or courtship display over treetops with bowed wings whilst making a series of grunts and whistles. Perhaps our bird had become disorientated by the work on the cutting and flown into a window.

In the end, after deliberation with Chris and Stan Finch and after getting permission from Tricia and Brian I took it down to John Burton in Ebrington. He is a taxidermist and was happy to take the woodcock with its provenance provided. Stuffed animals aren't really my forte but it seemed a shame just to bury such a beautiful creature. It was worth going to Ebrington to see the Aladdin's cave of fauna John Burton has collected, preserved and displayed from ptarmigan to eagles and tarantulas to butterflies. If you want to visit look up "taxidermist" in Yellow Pages.

We had a look around the palace and were told of all the events that had taken place over the centuries, we were showed the room where Elizabeth I waited for news of the Spanish Armada!! So all done we set of for home.

This prestigious event, has for more than 100 years, encouraged and promoted the pursuit of excellence in craftsmanship and design amongst practitioners in the UK engaged in jewellery, silversmithing and allied crafts. Known affectionately as the 'Jewellery Oscars', they are fully sponsored by the industry and attract royal patronage.

Brian was extremely proud as Clive, his son and Harbury resident, was called to the presentation rostrum several times. He received the Gold Award for Technological Innovation; a commendation for 2D Design; the Senior Award for achieving the highest standard of craftsmanship across all other senior awards in the competition, as well as a shortlisting for a Premier Award.

Clive's award winning piece, made in his Birmingham workshop, is a striking and elegant, motorised executive LED desk lamp made from sterling silver, which is operated by non-contact proximity sensors or by using an app on a mobile phone or tablet.

It is the latest creation from Clive who specialises in designing and making functional objects incorporating traditional

technology. His desk lamp and the awards it has attracted are a culmination of a career that has focussed on precision, manufacturing and new technology.

Harbury landslip – The Work Continues

As you will have seen, Network Rail reopened the railway between Learnington Spa and Banbury on Friday 13th March - three weeks earlier than originally expected. Our teams worked round the clock to get the trains running again less than six weeks after the landslip.

Network Rail's Chief Executive, Mark Carne, said:

"I would like to thank the residents of Harbury for their ongoing patience. Harbury cutting has suffered from landslips for more than 150 years. We have secured the cutting and made it safe and will carry out long-term repairs which will significantly reduce the chances of similar incidents in the future."

So our work continues - mainly during davtime hours and overnight on weekends - to regrade the western slope. We are also repairing Bull Ring Farm Bridge. Watchmen are on site 24/7 to alert us of any sudden movements inside the cutting. We are monitoring survey stations. tilt sensors and boreholes. There were no significant movements of the earth this week.

- shifted 10,000 tonnes of soil and rock from the western end of the site
- took 7,000 tonnes from the site to Ufton landfill
- carried out core drilling and soil nailing into the cutting close to the tunnel portal



We hope to have finished removing the soil by the end of the year. We are looking into whether we can do this faster – but without vastly increasing the cost or causing too much more traffic through local villages.

We understand local people are keen to know what the cutting will eventually look like when we finally finish. We plan to "green" the affected area by hydroseeding it

with organic fast-growing grass. Hydroseeding is a planting process that uses a slurry of seed and mulch. The slurry is sprayed from a tank over prepared ground. But because the site is a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), we will need to get agreement from Natural England for any landscaping or hydroseeding. We think our exclusive use of the local tip and the sheer amount still to be transferred there will ultimately lead to the tip being closed. We hope that's welcome news.

Network Rail plans to resurface the library car park in late March/early April. We and our contractors, Murphy, are happy to give information presentations to local schools and organise site visits.

If you'd like to see a speeded-up video of the work we've done so far, we've put one up on our YouTube channel – search YouTube for Network Rail Harbury.



I would have liked to show you some of the other entries but they are mostly hand painted or in a format that cannot easily be transferred for this article.

Car Club update

You may have got the impression from last month's article that I am marginally not in complete control of the development of the car club. Everything is still on track ...but here's some information to confirm your suspicions. We are now back to Plan A and **will** after all have two cars at the library (in the gleaming newly upgraded car park), not one at each of two

locations, as I reported last month. I could explain why but I think you might possibly lose interest quite quickly.

The good news is that we have a signed agreement now and are waiting for the technician to come and set up the charging point. The cars have been ordered and I have been talking to the marketing person at E-Car Club about how we let everyone know what a brilliant scheme this is. In the meantime, with what is left of my muddled brain, I am collecting ideas for using the cars for social benefit. One of our aims is to find ways of making the cars useful to the less well off in the community. I have already been given some good suggestions relating to the local food bank. If you have any other ideas, do let me know.

Whilst the club will be set up so that all processes are on-line, we will still need a local presence to keep an eye on things and champion the cars. HEI is forming a small group to act in this role. If you would like to be part of that, do let me know. You'll be in very good company.

Community Energy

I think I mentioned the concept of patience last month, not a character trait with which I am very familiar personally. Things have not gone to plan with our idea to use the roofs of some local industrial buildings for solar generation. Undaunted we are starting again and have had a free desktop study done by a consultancy with some suggestions for what we might do. Many agreements are needed and much goodwill garnered to make this happen, so I'm going to have to be patient and go with the flow - or trickle.

Energy saving and money saving

The government has just recently announced the next phase of the Green Deal Home Improvement Fund (see http://gdorb.decc.gov.uk/installers/ green-deal-home-improvement-fund). The announcement says:

[•]Up to £5,600 will be available to households in England and Wales to help with the cost of installing energy saving measures such as solid wall insulation, double glazing, boilers, cavity wall and floor insulation.

The GDHIF third release offers a new incentive rate of up to £1250 for installing any two measure from an approved list of eleven energy saving measures, detailed below. The 25% increase in rate makes it even more appealing for thousands more householders throughout England and Wales to undertake multiple measure improvements and enjoy a warmer home for less.

With the GDHIF Third Release, domestic energy customers will be able to receive:

• up to £3750 for installing solid wall insulation;

- and/or up to £1250 for installing two measures from an approved list
- up to £100 refunded for their Green Deal Assessment if it recommends the measure(s) applied for;
- up to £500 more if applying within 12 months of buying a new home.

The approved list is for two measures from any of the following:

- 1. a condensing gas boiler on mains gas
- 2. double or triple glazing as a replacement for single glazing
- 3. secondary glazing
- 4. energy efficient replacement external doors
- 5. cavity wall insulation
- 6. floor insulation
- 7. flat-roof insulation
- 8. insulation for a room in the roof
- 9. a replacement warm air unit
- 10. fan-assisted storage heaters
- 11. a waste water heat recovery system

HEI plans to be at the carnival this year with the electric cars. We hope to see you there.

Next month: information on programmable radiator valves, a substantial improvement on regular thermostatic radiator valves that can save around 30% of heating costs on hot water radiators.
