It has been lovely to get to know our new Curate, Nickki Moon over the past few weeks and many thanks to Carol and Geoff for hosting a lunch recently so that a number of church regulars could spend more time with her. A few of us also had the opportunity to catch up with Rev Annie, our previous curate, when she returned to conduct a wedding at the end of July.

We are still reeling from the shock of discovering that lead on the north aisle roof was stolen during the night of Monday 13th July. Things would have been even worse was it not for Mark Teverson getting tarpaulin up over the missing roof within a few hours and more importantly before it rained into the organ, so we wish to say a huge thank you to Mark for his prompt help. We are not alone in being targeted by thieves nor in the fact that, even though marked with Smartwater and signs to this effect displayed, the insurers will only pay a small amount towards replacement. We are investigating if an alternative material might be used (subject to cost, technical aspects and the necessary approvals for a Grade 1 listed church).

We are already fund raising for other essential work on the building and now the target we need to reach is even higher. As a well known supermarket says "Every Little Helps" and this month I'd like to tell you about a way you can help us raise funds at no direct cost to yourself. As part of their social responsibility, many companies will make a small donation to charity when goods or services are bought on-line, at no additional cost to the purchaser. A number of local people are already signed up with Easy Fundraising in support of Ladbroke Millennium Green or other charities but if you haven't heard about the scheme it works like this. You need to register, saying which charity you wish your donations to go to and then each time you buy something online go to the seller's website via Easy Fundraising's site. When your purchase has gone through a small % or fixed donation goes to your nominated Charity.

To register:

- go to easyfundraising.org.uk and click support a good cause,
- search for and select Ladbroke Church (if it is us you want to support)
- then enter your details etc.

Unless you want to be bombarded with emails several times a week I suggest you tick that you do **NOT** want the helpful tips, offers and info. However something worth considering when asked, is the Reminder Toolbar which does just that - it reminds you in time when you forget to go through the Easy Fundraising website. It's very simple and I haven't found a downside yet apart from it taking up a little space at the top of your screen, that's certainly less frustrating than discovering just after you have bought something or booked a holiday that you have missed a donation.

Obviously Easy Fundraising make some money out of this too and they will themselves give donations if you refer a friend, so once you've registered please tell others using the link on the website. Even if you do not buy things online yourself you can help Ladbroke Church raise funds by passing this information on to friends or relatives who do. Or, if you like the sound of this for another a good cause or charity that's not already listed and want to register that, please email ladbrokechurch89@btinternet.com or contact me first or because if a new cause registers from a link sent from our admin area Ladbroke Church could receive a significant donation.

Ladbroke Parish Council

Once again I could not be present at the meeting, so what follows are highlights from the draft of the official minutes and feedback from one of the councillors. The full minutes by the parish clerk will go on the noticeboard by the pub and the village website ladbroke-pc.org.uk in due course. Nine members of the public attended.

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Neighbourhood Watch - Approx 200 items were marked at the property marking session in Ladbroke on 6th July and signs to say that property in the village is marked have been placed alongside Neighbourhood Watch signs.

Defibrillator - British Heart Foundation offer a grant of £400 but only if the box is unlocked.

Neighbourhood Plan - Councillor Williams explained that a Neighbourhood Plan sets out the community's prospects for the future and has to be adopted by 50% of the residents. It denotes where development can take place in the village with the areas identified by holding a referendum. Although in some ways similar to a Parish Plan (our PP is dated 2010) a Neighbourhood Plan has to be driven by a diverse group of residents rather than the Parish Council, so if we want one it's down to us to get involved.

Planning - David Rose talked about his planning application for a house in the part of the spinney on the land south of School Lane, which has raised a lot of interest and a number of concerns from other residents. He stated that he wasn't going to fall out with people if it doesn't go ahead. There was considerable discussion between the councillors and David, with most members of the public in listening mode. The Parish Council will object on grounds that the application did not recognise two previous appeals and rejection of proposed development in the 1980s and that the flooding assessment had not evaluated the 2007 floods nor improvements to Ladbroke Hall drainage. Also mindful of comments already sent in by villagers, they will comment on it being "out of character" with other buildings within Ladbroke and the need for evergreen boundaries that maintain the openness and visual aspect of the spinney.

Regarding other planning matters, approval had been granted by SDC for the planned extension at Meadow View, the change of use of an agricultural building to residential dwelling at Rectory Farm, the changes to the planned extension at Bell View Cottage and the fence screening at 9 Hedges Close.

Highways & Footpaths - The hedge on Harbury Road from the Bishops Itchington turn to Deppers Bridge needs to cut back. Visibility is restricted on leaving the road to Bishops Itchington and cars heading to Deppers drive in the middle of the road to avoid damage to their vehicles. There is also a big rut on the other side of the road in this area.

To help keep footpaths clear the Ramblers Association has set a website "The Big Pathwatch" where blocked footpaths may be reported.

A flyer will be distributed to try to reduce speeding in the Hedges Close/ Windmill Lane/The Barns area.

Flooding - Five homes have had property level protection assessments, feedback is expected in September and then there will a further visit from a retail agent for a quote on how to improve things.

Village Hall and Millennium Green - Iolanthe had been very successful and the next event will be a film night on 4th September. Plans are underway to replace the main roof of the Village Hall and include a lot of insulation.


HS2 - The Select Committee is now hearing Buckinghamshire's petitions and then it will be the London Boroughs; they expect to finish around Christmas. Additional provisions and supplementary environmental statements, incorporating decisions to date, are being issued (*Editors' note:* documents for our area were issued 17th July and are open for consultation/petition until 28th August).

WCC - Local primary schools can meet the predicted demand based on planning applications granted to date but Southam College has been forced to admit 323 pupils this September when realistically it can only accept up to 270. Subject to a WCC cabinet decision on 16th July to grant another £1 million for improvement, extended facilities will be built during the summer holidays. It is an excellent school in danger of being spoilt by its own success. A consultation is taking place about paying for school transport for pupils who elect not to go to their closest school which may affect pupils gaining places at Grammar Schools in Rugby or Stratford.

The Government's devolution agenda will affect local government. The three options for Warwickshire are being discussed:

- 1. Join in with a greater Birmingham Authority and Coventry and Solihull; not a popular idea and possibly a last resort,
- 2. Form a separate authority with Coventry and possibly Solihull; this requires all districts to agree; Coventry want it,
- 3. Create a joined up agreement with surrounding shire authorities i.e. Worcestershire, Staffordshire, Oxfordshire, Buckinghamshire and Leicestershire. This would be a complex but workable solution, if all round agreement could be reached.



June 2015

A canny man is our Chairman Tim Lockley. He sees trouble coming and has the nous to deal with it. In this case deflecting criticism of the Parish Council's failure to comment on several recent contentious planning applications, by getting approval for all Councillors, rather than just the Planning Working Party, to be responsible for assessing plans. As Councillor Thornley pointed out, the public complained about the practice and it was more robust if the whole Council studied plans. Any Parish Council concerns trigger consideration by the District Planning Committee and this allows objectors to put their case in person.

Planning applications come in relentlessly – thirteen this month for the Parish Council to consider; plus four which Stratford District Council granted; one Appeal upheld and another in progress. Under their old system the Parish Council made "No Representation" on a Replacement Dwelling at Stapenhall Farm, Deppers Bridge; extensions at 11 Neales Close and Honiwell Close; removal of a Cypress at the Shakespeare and a Lawful Development Certificate (regularising tipping of commercial waste at Walworth Farm for which there was no previously permission). They added a comment to this on the need to prevent contamination of Bishop's Bowl Lakes.

There were also "No Representations" on internal works at Western House, Station Road; exterior insulation at 14, 16 and 17 Pineham Avenue and extensions at No 25. Plans as part of the transformation to two storeys of a Bungalow at 11 Constance Drive also got "No Representation" despite Councillor Summers aversion to them. The amendments to the Hillside Plans, which show the large open market sale houses reduced in height by 1 metre, seemed to meet with general approval but the three storey terrace townhouses at a reduction of only 45cms were still unacceptable so an objection was made.

The previously approved plans for 200 homes at the Cement Works has a S106 Agreement promising funding and a site for a new surgery for Bishops Itchington but the NHS failure to support this could mean the money going towards extension of facilities in Harbury! Parish Councillors were appalled at the lack of "joined up thinking" in the NHS.

The Parish Council is to have a Facebook page on which they can highlight current planning applications.

Councillor Summers gave colleagues an ambitious timetable for the Neighbourhood Plan; a meeting with the consultant in early July; community consultation in early autumn and the referendum in the New Year.

Bascote asked for support in their opposition to a solar farm planned between the railway and canal on the road to Long Itchington. Councillor Ekins, who looks after Deppers Bridge which successfully fought off similar plans, offered his help.

The new Chair of Bishops Parish Council was present to maintain links with Harbury now they no longer shared a District Councillor, although they do have the same Clerk!

Playing Fields

As no grant aid was forthcoming, money from the reserves would be committed to replacing the bark pit with a better safety surface, but the playing fields may have to be closed for safety reasons whilst the work is done. The ground is eroded under the zipwire, and in other places uneven due to moles! The dog fouling notices are in place. The car park lights are leaning. This year the Carnival and Fair caused less damage to the fields. The Chairman suggested giving the Carnival the fee the Fair paid for use of the fields. Councillor Summers was not in favour but colleagues explained that the Carnival gave grants to village organisations out of its profits, and this year had been very wet!

Cemetery and Maintenance

The new rules for the Cemetery were approved. There was long discussion on the merits of paying extra for a fire proof safe for the burial records books. Eventually this was agreed on condition that the books would fit inside it!

Pat Summers is setting up a friends of Harbury Cemetery to meet on the first Thursday in the month to clear brambles and overgrown graves. The Parish's contractor just mows the grass. Councillors Thompson and Mancell were investigating the practicalities of removing spoil from the perimeter to make more space for burials. Colin Sheasby has been asked to inspect the copper beech and to cut and lay the final length of the allotment hedge.

The Council's contractor will be asked to mow the verge on Bush Heath Lane alongside the new development.

Highways

In response to concerns about the congestion, safety problems and parking outside the School, the Chairman agreed to liaise with the Head and investigate potential funding from the County's Safer Routes to School initiative. The County and our MP seem to have shattered any hopes of safety improvements at the Bendigo/Mitchell Crossroads. Bishops Itchington asked Harbury Parish Council to lobby Jeremy Wright and Tim Lockley agreed to do this.

Centenary

New Parish Councillor Chris Gibb volunteered to look for funding for the cleaning of the War Memorial. There was no news of the grant application for erecting Blue Plaques to commemorate those villagers who fought in WW1.

Administration

The Council now has a Maladministration Policy. It spent a long time agonising over finances and insurance cover for Parish assets. Councillor Lewis's advice was that it was not worth insuring the street lights. As the Chairman remarked damage was a one in ten year event and the premium would be more than their value. In any case the last one was knocked down by the Biffa lorry and they paid for the damage caused. It was agreed instead to set aside the savings just in case an unidentified vehicle was involved next time.

July wasn't a bad month and we were able to enjoy some outside events.

We look forward to our Garden Party in the Farley Room, Village Hall on Monday 10^{th} August, 7-10pm.

The Group outing to Sudeley Castle is on Wednesday, 2nd September leaving the Bowling Green at 9.15am.

Then of course there is the Harbury Village Show on Saturday 12th September. We hope for support this year as there is a super committee who are are keeping the show going. We are hoping that lots of children enter this year. More next month.

The speaker this month was Annabel Jones, a hypnotherapist from Learnington Spa. She started out as a councillor, became disillusioned and so went into business for a while, then decided to train as a hypnotherapist. She went to a training school in Stratford and has been a practising hypnotherapist for four years.

She treats mostly anxiety problems and phobias and ended her talk by giving us relaxing exercises.



Village Hall Update

It is doubtful that anyone either driving or walking along South Parade recently has failed to notice that the extension roof is already part way there. The rafters have been fitted; the felt laid and by the time this magazine is delivered, it is likely that most of the tiles will have been put in place. Although it's easy to judge progress just by the external appearance of the extension, there has been an equally impressive development inside



the shell, which has the layout for the stage, separate changing rooms and separate facilities for visiting referees and officials already built.

After the roof has been completed, the 'first fix' electricity and plumbing will be installed, followed by some plastering. All of these stages will need to be completed before there is the breakthrough into the existing hall, which is anticipated to take place in mid September before the 'second fix' electrical and plumbing installations take place and the walls are finally skimmed and painted.



If the above account makes 'light work' of all the building processes which are needed, the reality is entirely different, as each stage presents its own challenge. It will all eventually come together and we will have a hall which will be 'fit for purpose' for the 21st Century; (something the committees identified was not the case when they started on the long road to obtaining all the necessary finance for the development).

Another significant improvement to the functioning of the hall is the addition of WiFi, which has been installed this week. All the regular hirers who might need access to this system will be provided with a changing code, so that it

will be an added benefit for those needing instant access during a meeting e.g. for the Parish Council meetings.

We do need help to satisfy the requirements of one of our major grant providers. They ask for a two minute video of the development. If anyone can help us with this we would be very grateful, either with expertise or equipment. Please ring Geoff Thorpe on 613801.



Our visit on 17th July to Trentham Gardens near Stoke on Trent was just magical. It only took I hour and 40 minutes to get there, thanks to our new driver Dave. 

There are some very good gardens open in August under NGS, here are just a few. On Sunday 9th, Bridges Stone Mill at Alfrick Pound, WR6 5HR near to Worcester will be open from 2.00 to 5.30pm. It is the home of Sir Michael and Lady Perry and is 2½ acres with trees, shrubs, mixed beds and borders, small lake and brook. It is bounded by a mill stream with its own weir, teas are available and cost is £5. On Saturday 15th and Sunday 16th August there will be three gardens open at Offenham near Evesham, WR11 8QD including that of Adrian James who has given us so many wonderful talks and is visiting us again in the new season. Admission to all three is £4 and open between 11.00 and 5.00pm. Park in Village Hall car park and teas are available. Adrian is such a talented speaker and it would be nice to see his own garden. Then on Sunday 30th August there will be two gardens open in Marlbrook near Bromsgrove, B60 1DY between 1.30 and 5.30 admission is £5. These are two unique and stunning gardens with art displays in both and much more plus of course teas. Closer to home don't forget what a treasure we have in Warwick at Hill Close Gardens which are open daily from 11.00 to 5.00pm. Entrance costs £3.50 per adult and there is always something to see and the wonderful views over the racecourse and beyond to enjoy. Ragley Hall near Alcester has some splendid gardens with again views over Warwickshire. Lots here to see and enjoy. For more information look at their website: www.ragley.co.uk. Also at Upton House and Gardens our gardens are looking just perfect at present with a 1940's theme of grow your in parts and of course the amazing borders. The bog garden as always is an adventure. We even have an Anderson shelter which echoes the theme for this year and next of The Country House Bank. Our volunteer gardeners are to be praised for their hard work as it is not easy gardening on such a steep slope. In August the house and gardens are open for seven days a week. I do hope that you can fit in a visit to any of these gardens; what better way to spend a Summer's day?

I will give more details of the Heritage Room being opened for us with lots of interesting information about the Horticultural Society and much more. I have arranged with Nigel for our visit to be in the evening of Tuesday 8th September.

Enjoy our lovely summer and I look forward to seeing some of you at Sulgrave Manor.

On Friday 3rd July I was privileged to see a British butterfly which was a new sighting for me. I met a friend who lives near Chester and we cycled through the quiet rolling countryside of North Shropshire. There were lots of trees and occasional sandstone bluffs above the woods. We made our way to Prees Heath, a flat tract of acidic common land which had been a Second World War aerodrome. Luckily this had preserved it from the plough and now a large part is a nature reserve. This is the only place in the Midlands to see the Silver Studded Blue butterfly (Plebejus argus). Unfortunately this butterfly declined steeply in the 20th century as its habitat (lowland heath) was destroyed. It is relatively common still in the Hampshire basin which includes the heath lands of the New Forest. Surprisingly two areas of limestone support colonies of this butterfly, the Isle of Portland in Dorset and Great Orme Head on the North Wales coast.

Egg laying occurs on young heather or gorse towards the end of the insect's flight period stretching from the late June until midway through August. The tiny caterpillar stays within the egg until the following March. Upon hatching the grub feeds on a range of plants (Birds Foot Trefoil and Rock Rose on limestone sites and young gorse and heather shoots on heath land). Black ants of the species, Lasius niger tend the caterpillars and feed on their sticky

secretions. This continues through pupation when the ants have carried their 'prize' into their nest. After undergoing metamorphosis, the adult butterfly leaves the nest and continues its life cycle. Observers have noted ants guarding the insect at this stage, before it has inflated its wings and is able to fly, as that is the time it is most vulnerable to predation. For those wishing to visit Prees Heath the grid reference is OS sheet Explorer 241. SJ557 363

Closer to home, as mentioned in last month's Harbury and Ladbroke News, I was on the lookout for Pyramidal Orchids on the verge of Treens Hill. I found two flowers at the end of June but they were scythed down by a mower set the task of improving vision splays on the corner. Perhaps a quiet word with the Council is required. While cycling down to Bath over three glorious summer days in June, Sharon and I found a fair number of these distinctive flowers growing on the quieter roadside verges of South Gloucestershire as we approached Bristol. Anacamptis pyramdalis as its name suggests is shaped like a pyramid especially in its early stages. Like many orchids it lives in symbiosis being fed by a fungus via its roots and does not have any green leaves until it is about five years old. This is the real difficulty when trying to get such species to recolonise a seemingly suitable tract of land. Without the fungus no seeds will progress from germination. It is a largely invisible underground partnership which takes years to develop, facts which are only now really understood.

Celia Neill showed me a film taken on her camera of a Humming Bird Hawk moth feeding on Valerian in her garden. This moth is a frequent visitor from Southern Europe and North Africa. It flies during daytime and is unmistakeable as it hovers, feeding from suitable pink flowers with its long proboscis. It has been regularly observed in Warwickshire from the 1940s and seems to be getting more common.

Lesley Jones tells me she has seen a Red Kite flying over the village and others have supported this sighting. I have yet to see any nearer than Oxfordshire but they seem to be spreading from their release site in the Chilterns. Alan and Betty Barr sent me a couple of wildlife photographs. One was a colourful green and yellow caterpillar with black markings. This proved to be a larva of the Rose Sawfly and therefore not a caterpillar at all. It is quite colourful being green and yellow with black markings. Take a look via Google and see for yourself. The insect is in the order Hymenoptera and related to bees, wasps and ants rather than butterflies and moths.

Now the country roads in many parts are bordered by Meadowsweet. I've tasted some local blackberries and there are a lot more ripening. It's high summer as we head towards harvest time.

Harbury Energy Initiative

A sunny story

Is anyone else in the village applying to the M&S Energy fund competition? Judging by the number of people sending me the link, many clearly thought I should...so I have. It has to be a renewables project that benefits the community, so HEI has lifted its eyes to the roof of the Wight School, sheltered under which the Library, Biblio's cafe and Pre-School nestle side by side drawing their energy from the grid. We would like to change this and see if we can't win the money to give them solar power for part at least of their needs and for the electric cars to be even greener in use.

This is a competition, which means tricky rounds to negotiate and, because Energyshare is involved, means online voting (they seem to like that). If we get through the initial selection, please don't desert us! We will need votes to prove that the community is supporting the proposal. Do let us know what you think about this idea either by email to me or on Facebook Harbury News group pages. HEI and the library team will let you know how and when to vote if we get through round one.

E-Cars

With this issue you will find a simple flyer reminding you about the Electric Car Club. Please do get in touch if you have any questions. People have been joining but there is plenty of capacity for yet more users. Some people have been hesitant about joining or have yet to use their free hours. To address this we held a demo/workshop on 23rd July, which was well attended. We discussed with E-Car staff one or two issues we felt were causing hesitancy or might be unclear to potential members. Just in case you have been thinking about joining but have some concerns or are part way through joining but haven't yet completed, here are some of the reassurances E-Car has given us:

The video instructions for first time users do not quite match the cars we have here.

E-Car: We will bring a video recorder to the workshop and will film a bespoke video.

What if I turn up and the car is damaged? Will the previous driver get the blame?

E-Car: Unless it's blatantly obvious that the accident was caused when the car was in motion, we would never come after a member for damage. We accept that car-park damage is entirely expectable. More to the point, our vehicles have shock sensors which timestamp collisions, so we know.

The insurance excess seems quite high and we weren't expecting to have to make it part of the Direct Debit mandate from reading the joining process.

E-Car: Once we switch over to Europcar's insurance (Europcar is now a major stakeholder in E-Car Club) we should be able to offer excess reduction. In the meantime, do you have any suggestions about how we can make this clearer?

If this latter point has been one that has concerned you, let us know any ideas you may have as to how to mitigate it as an issue. It is entirely normal to have an excess for insurance cover and E-Car don't charge users for anything they haven't incurred. They will always tell you what charges they are applying every month before drawing anything down. Nevertheless it may still be a concern for some. We would rather it wasn't!

Aspects of solar energy

South-facing roofs have for many years been thought to be the only really viable option for generating electricity from photovoltaic solar panels. A house with a pitched roof facing east and west, however, also has good potential. Such a roof may miss out on midday sun but the critical factors are light levels and temperature. A cold sunny day is best and east/west facing panels will generate almost as much electricity as a south-facing roof. Just thought you would like to know.

Harbury Heritage Room

HERITAGE It was suggested that it might be a good idea to do an article about pubs this month, as there are so many changes happening at the moment. Looking through the censuses (censi?) and the trade directories, it is surprising how stable the pubs have been over the past 150 years or so.

In the 1851 Census, there were five pubs, namely The Crown, The Dog, The New Inn (Gamecock), The Old New Inn and The Fox (long closed, but it was where Fox Close is now, off Chapel Street).

The Shakespeare doesn't appear until the mid-1880s. The building was originally a farmhouse, I seem to remember from somewhere.

In 1851 the landlord of The Crown was Joseph Batchelor along with his wife Martha and baby Mary Ann. They also had a lodger.

The Dog was owned by Edward and Mary Wilkins. He was an innkeeper and maltster (brewer). They had six children under 10, plus a servant.

Edward Wells of The New Inn was also described as innkeeper and maltster. His wife was Mary, and they had three children.

The Fox was owned by Thomas and Ann Smith. Their children were William, 24, Emma, 15, Ann, 9 and Jane, 7.

Thomas Palmer of the Old New Inn was a butcher and innkeeper. There is no record of his wife, though he had a 14 year old daughter and three servants.

In the 1871 Directory there is a listing for George and Henry Clifford as "bakers and beerhouse". Ten years later, Henry was living in Mill Street, but where the beerhouse was, I've no idea.

By 1874 James Murray was landlord of The Fox, according to the local Directory, which labels him as a victualler, which means that the inn provided food as well as ale. The same was true of The Old New Inn and The Dog. We have, somewhere, the story of James Murray adulterating the whisky and being fined! In the same Directory, Joseph Ivens of The Crown was a carrier and market gardener.

The Shakespeare must have become a public house sometime in the 1880s, as P. Rhodes is the landlord in 1888. By 1900 it runs under the name of Sollis – now there's a good local name!

If you can add to the above, the Heritage Group would be very grateful.

The Heritage Room will be open next on Tuesday 4th August and Tuesday 1st September from 6.30-8.30pm.

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
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
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
