Advent

The word "Advent" is derived from the Latin word adventus, meaning "coming", where Christians not only think about Christ's coming at Christmas, but also about his coming again at the end of time. During the 4th and 5th centuries, Advent was a season of preparation for those who were to be baptised early in the New Year. The season is given as a time of reflection where (if possible) we slow down a little and take some time to contemplate what the Christmas message means for us.

The Advent season lasts for four Sundays leading up to Christmas. The new Christian year begins on Advent Sunday (29th November) and leads up to the

twelve-day celebration of Christmas itself, which lasts from Christmas Eve until the 'Epiphany' season that begins on January 6th.

Advent traditionally has been a season of the year where we take a step back and reflect on what God's coming to us in the baby of Bethlehem really means. Sure, during this season all of us are preparing for the great festival of Christmas - buying and wrapping the presents, decorating the house, writing Christmas cards and even arranging those wonderful family visits!

But Advent should be about so much more than this. It invites all of us to take some time out to think about Jesus' coming to us, not just as an event in history, but his coming to each of us every day of the week.

Do try and make some time this Advent to slow down a bit, to stop, think and reflect. You might like to use some time during this season to pray for the many situations in our world that need our prayers. You might like to go onto the Just Pray website which has been developed to help people start praying (www.justpray.uk).

Enjoy the season of Advent for what it's meant to be and then be truly prepared to celebrate the greatest event the world has ever known with real joy.

Well it was about a year ago that All Saints embarked on a plan to look at ways in which we could do things better, both within the church and with the wider village community. We won't go into detail here about the changes we have made but will be producing a full report in the New Year which we will post on the website. Suffice it to say that we have found the experience of taking a long hard look at ourselves to be an interesting and rewarding one, and are confident that the changes will help us all become stronger disciples in the community.



We held a beautiful and poignant Remembrance Service on Sunday 8th November when the war dead, to whom we owe so much, were honoured. Rev Craig reminded us in his sermon of the need not only to remember these heroes on one special day, but to continuously thank them all year round for the sacrifice they made for us to be able to have the freedom we enjoy today. Our Saints Alive theme for October was focused around learning that when we let Jesus into our lives, irrespective of who we are, what talents we have and what we look like, He can help us blossom into what He wants us to be. As usual, at this time of year we are taking a break from Saints Alive for December and instead the Christingle service will take place on Sunday 20th. During the year we made several improvements and changes to the church building and the grounds, which included the installation of a new sound system and the sprucing up of the churchyard. And last, but not least, we are very pleased to announce that the plans for the new Memorial Garden have now been recommended by the Coventry Diocese Advisory Committee and we are hopeful that it will shortly be signed off by the Chancellor. The next step will then be to remove the Spruce tree from the garden area to make way for the Garden itself. A big thank you to everyone who has helped with all aspects of church and churchyard maintenance over the past year.

We were delighted to fill **51** boxes (more than twice last year's number) and celebrated as is customary...... with coffee and cake!!



They complain about the lack of co-ordination and strategic oversight. Each developer presents his plans as needed, acceptable and having minimal effect on the area. No-one now takes a view of the cumulative effects or considers how the extra people and their needs can be assimilated.

This month Councillors had a pre-meeting presentation from David Wilson Homes about their plans for the western side of Bush Heath Lane; already given planning permission for 75 dwellings. In the meeting proper we heard that developers at the Quarries intend to build a new Surgery for Bishops Itchington in return for being allowed to build even more houses there. There were applications for the Henry's site for landscaping and accommodation in the roofs of three of the five bungalows; an application for 2,000 houses at the New Village; the Warwickshire Minerals Plan and the Gypsy and Traveller Site consultations from both Warwick District Council and Stratford District Council (Ken Stephenson was much exercised by the poor awareness and response to the Gypsy Site Consultation) and a Design Guide for the Warwick/Leamington "Urban Extension" much of which spreads down Harbury Lane to the Tachbrook Crossroads and beyond.

All this was in addition to smaller developer and householder applications which were considered: a live-work unit at Deppers and yet more work at Stapenhall Farm; extensions at Tresco Barn, Vicarage Lane; the felling of the storm-damaged cedar at Montgomery House; considerable expansion of The Lodge, Hall Lane and different plans for 1 Dovehouse Lane, formerly part of Lullington Lodge garden. This last attracted opposition from the usual suspects, Ken Stephenson and Harbury Society. The PC made no objections to any of these plans and mostly made "No Representation" but supported the Live-Work Unit at Deppers Bridge.

The Minerals Plan did not extract any sand or gravel in our Parish so Councillors made No Response. On the WDC Urban Design Guide they had concerns about the traffic and bottleneck at the Fosse Crossroads which were also relevant to the Gaydon New Village proposals. They sought further information on the "transport mitigation" and demanded an independent Transport Assessment as they feared the surrounding villages would be overwhelmed with commuter traffic. Councillors patted themselves on the back for reaching the Draft Stage of our Neighbourhood Plan and voted it through to the next stage. Villagers will then have a chance to view the Draft in the Library before it is assessed by SDC prior to going to a Parish Referendum.

After a secret ballot Chris Christou was co-opted onto the Parish Council.

Other organisations - Reports were received about possible replacement trees for the Library, a replacement ramp and lowering and repositioning of the many noticeboards. Twinning had sent condolences to France in the wake of the killings in Paris and the Tricolore had been flown at half-mast at the Village Hall. The Village Hall extension work was almost finished; the curtains would be hung and Rural Cinema restarts with "Mr Holmes". The Chairman and Clerk were assessors for the Local Council Awards Scheme and as a result of their experience were convinced Harbury could achieve a high rating next time if it applied for it.

Properties - Chairman Councillor Ekins reported that the closing device for the gate at the small children's play area needed to be eased as it closed too quickly and some items there needed painting. There was considerable debate about how damage to the playing fields, caused when the bonfire was built, could be made good. There was talk of creating a paved footpath from Hereburgh Way down the side of the fields but this did not seem financially viable. Councillor Mancell said there had to be budget provision for "managing" the cost of repairs after Bonfire Night.

Councillor Ekins pressed his colleagues to consider beginning the search for further burial space as he thought there might only be five more years' space in the present facility. The PC was legally the Burial Authority and had to provide space for burials. He reported the old pew was still in the Burial Grounds waiting for anyone who wanted to take it away; there was no-one on the waiting list for an allotment; and the Councillors agreed to pay the cost of installing a donated bench outside the Village Hall.

Finance - Councillors agreed to enrol their clerk in the Local Government Pension Scheme. They had been through the process to increase the Councillors' allowance to £350 with £700 for the Chairman's expenses. They approved the costs of cleaning the tennis courts and congratulated Councillor Gibb on the progress of the WWI Commemoration Project. They deferred consideration of a grant application from the Energy Initiative to check if it was a formally constituted body.

Environment - There was little progress on improving the safety in Church Street where vehicles were forced to mount the footway. Councillors preferred putting crab apple trees on the little green in Manor Orchard Close. They pledged to re-invigorate the Parish Paths Partnership. There was considerable discussion about the benefits of installing solar powered LED lit bollards on Deppers Bridge chicane. Councillor Gibb explained his discussions with Stagecoach and the County on his initiative to have the bus route changed through the village so that it did not go through Chapel Street but along South Parade, Park Lane and Farm Street. He would like to have the bus shelter moved from outside the Post Office to alongside the School in Park Lane. The public would be consulted on the option.

The Consultation Draft was approved by the Parish Council at their meeting on 26th November which now means that it can be viewed by parishioners for six weeks starting on 7th December 2015 until 15th January 2016. There will also be printed copies for you to read in the Library and in the pubs (just the thing to look at over a glass of beer!)

I used a picture of Dickens to illustrate posters for Trevor Humphries' talk on the author and Io, Trevor turned up looking just like Dickens himself! The talk was about Learnington and Dickens, and to be honest Dickens wasn't here much and Learnington barely appears in any of his stories except *Dombey and Son*, but that didn't really matter as

the talk was more about Dickens' amazingly frenetic life and energy than the Spa Town. He often worked on two or three books at the same time thriving on the pressure.

In *Dombey & Son* Dickens gives credible descriptions of Learnington, probably cribbed from guide books of the time. He was here three times: $29^{th} - 30^{th}$ October 1838, 2-3 November 1858, and $1^{st} - 2^{nd}$ January 1862, with just overnight stays. In 1838 when there was a huge mania for recently

published *Pickwick* and *Oliver Twist*, he came here from London with Fizz his illustrator to research *Hard Times*. After a 10 hour coach journey they put up at Royal Copps' Hotel with "roaring fire, elegant dinner, snug room and capital beds". Next morning they went to Warwick, Stratford and Kenilworth which most impressed the novelist.

Twenty years later Dickens stayed at the Regent Hotel (his signature is in the Visitor's Book). He gave readings of his works at the Royal Music Hall (Parthenon) in Bath Street to huge crowds. There were two sessions of two hours at prices from 4/- to 1/- He put such energy into the readings that people fainted at his description of the death of Nancy and roared at the tales of drunken midwife Mrs Gamp.

In 1861 at the age of 50 he stayed at the Regent Hotel and made his third visit to the Royal Music Hall where he read all of *David Copperfield* and six chapters of *Nicholas Nickleby* and the *Trial of Pickwick*! He wrote to his Business Manager they "roared and roared in Learnington that must have shaken the air in Warwickshire."

Lively discussion followed on all things Dickens from which we learned he was a Parliamentary sketch writer and might have based Mr Macawber on his own father. Trevor extolled the delights of Learnington Literary Society and several of its coming talks: The Real Jeeves; Literature and the Lucys of Charlecote; John Clear Poet of Northants; and Joseph Ashby of Tysoe. For all of which we thanked him and presented him with a Dickens' Dictionary.

It was not until about 11:20 before the evening came to end, and I was surprised at the significant number of brave folk who stayed right to the end.



What have we done! What next?

Coronation Day in 1953 was a wash out, celebrations, street parties were a mess and Harbury had no indoor venue other than a tin hut where the club is now. This was the catalyst for a group of villagers to start to plan for a Village Hall, despite the inevitable doubters. "What do we need a hall for? It will "never get used"! Their tremendous efforts finally led to the hall opening in 1962. The £12,000 cost all from fund raising efforts in the village, no Lottery then, and a £4,000 loan. One regret at the time was that a stage was not part

of the plan. In later years the Farley Room was added and the kitchen extended.

Sadly the hall was "just maintained" for many years and by the Millennium was barely fit for purpose. The toilets, kitchen, and changing rooms were dreadful and the rear pitched roof, added in the 1980s to solve problems with the original flat roof, had begun to collapse. An open day and various meetings were held to ascertain what the village wanted. The top priorities were soon identified. New toilets and disabled facilities, a modernised kitchen, new changing rooms, a stage, new heating and insulation, a "greener building". Apart from these requests the roof had to be made safe and chairs, tables and curtains all needed replacing. A daunting task!

The fundraising committee have been magnificent. In rough figures and to give you an idea of their achievement: The new toilets cost £35,000, the modernised kitchen £55,000, the work on the Farley Room and roof repair £40,000, the PV panels on the roof £22,000, the new changing rooms and stage £200,000. In addition we have some new tables and chairs, new curtains, the Farley Room partition and the cinema projector and screen.

Where has all this money come from? Again in rough figures. Landfill Communities Fund £200,000. Thanks here to The Veolia Environmental Trust, Biffa Award and WREN. The Big Lottery £10,000, various local authority grants £50,000 including the Parish Council. The Village Hall Cinema £12,000. The remainder of the money has come from fundraising events and of course the generosity of the local residents. The Buy a Brick campaign £33,500, the Promises Auction £4,000 and the many village groups who have organised events to support the hall. It is not possible to name them all here.

The building work is now finished. A big thank you to John Warner and his team.

What Next?

An "Honours Display" to acknowledge the many contributors to include, where possible, the original fundraising from the 1950s and 1960s.

A new, "green" heating system for the main hall and Farley Room, additional insulation for the main hall and a new entrance porch.

The support the Committee has had from many residents has been wonderful, not only financially but the generous gift of expertise, particularly in project management, accounting and Health and Safety.

As with the original plan to build the hall, there have been some doubts. What do we need a stage for? The temporary stage, used for so long, has been very good but once in position precludes the use of the hall for other functions, notably badminton. It is also a nightmare for rehearsal and set building which has to be condensed into a very restrictive one week. The theatre group, junior theatre group and dance classes are all very keen to use the new stage, it will be a great asset for such things as the junior football

awards presentation and in effect to enlarge the hall for dances and parties by allowing groups or discos to play from the stage.

I think the rainy and windy weather deterred some of our members from the last meeting in November. However those of us who braved the elements had a brilliant evening. Our speaker was Rob Cole, ably assisted by his wife Diane. We visited his garden and nursery in June which was very enjoyable.

The talk was "Some Dublin Gardens" and we started off via Aer Lingus and landed in Dublin. Rob explained that they go on an organised tour of nine gardens with a tour guide. The first garden we saw was in Wicklow and belongs to an ex-broadcaster Carmel Douignan, rectangular in shape but definitely a plants woman's garden. Lawns and coastal planting with textures shapes and colours. Huge tetrapanax, a favourite of mine which you can grow here in Harbury, angel's fishing rods dangling their fragile flowers and many more including a type of sweet pea called polygola myrtifolia.

Then onto Corke Lodge which belongs to an architect, a regency villa. Lots of shrubs, lawns, woodland glade in just under an acre of garden. A lovely example of the cork oak dated back to 1820, stately tree ferns, lots of quirky statues and garden features all from garden salvage depots. Plus some wonderful topiary, my kind of garden.

The main garden visited was in Dublin and that of Helen Dillon, a very well respected gardener and speaker. I have seen it featured on many gardening programmes but in the "flesh" it is much smaller than you imagine. Again a Georgian house with tree ferns, her trade mark rill in the centre with huge borders either side. The colours were very well mixed together in the style of the late Christopher Lloyd. Huge begonias everywhere and a lovely melianthus major. She uses a lot of purple coloured lead buckets throughout

the garden which she can move around to fill in any gaps. A bit garish but a good idea to borrow.

We then moved on to a nearby botanic garden, Glasnevin. Lots of greenhouses a bit like a small version of the RHS gardens at Wisley. Herbaceous borders crammed with seasonal flowers and nice wide paths to meander through to the water garden. Lots of conifers and some regal grasses. Plenty of ideas to copy here.

Then Rob's presentation came to an abrupt finish. He said that he thought he had copied over all of the talk but apparently not! However we got a second talk then as he went on to show an edited version of a talk called "Look at That". I have never heard so much laughter from our members - all will become clear. As well as quirky garden images we saw road signs etc. Dull in Scotland is twinned with Boring in Oregon, USA. We saw light bulbs planted in bowls instead of the real ones! A visit to a local farm shop showed some funny spellings.ie suaages (sausages), chops, joints (is that legal). Lots of spelling mistakes on plants too, hosta halcyon (halcyon) anememore (anemone) and many more but to see these was really funny.

A sign outside toilets in Jersey read...Ladies nappy changing is there something we should know? A road sign in China read..wong way instead of wrong way. In the USA (where else), a sign read street not through instead of no through road. We then saw a plant fair in southern Paris suburbs which resembled Glastonbury as it was just a sea of mud with some very tiny plants in the middle of the mud! A picture by artist David John was supposed to be a self portrait but it looked just like Bill Wyman. A rock garden in Yorkshire was in fact a heap of stones in the middle of a lawn. A nearby shed had the most exquisite net curtains but not at all practical. In Madeira there was a viewing platform next to a huge viaduct with a sheer drop of about 1000 feet but not a lot to see as there was also a huge tunnel nearby which blocked the view, so not worth the climb!

Again some food wrongly named, butterball chicken, contains no butter! A crap apple tree for sale - no explanation needed. A sign advertising building workers called Have a go Builders! Genuine fake watches was another. A car number plate, RU4God.

We then saw some fantastic colour combinations in gardens, hence "Look at That". Huge masses of dahlia, delphiniums, aquilegia, astrantia with clematis weaving its way through, wonderful. Asters in all shapes and colours combined with sunflowers. Fields full of snowdrops, a sight to make you feel that in the depth of winter, spring is on its way. Rob then showed us some bees on poppies and some colourful butterflies, too many to mention. You really had to be there to enjoy and laugh at Rob's eclectic mixture of miss spelling etc. As I said earlier the Tom Hauley Room was full of the sound of laughter and anyone passing by must have wondered what was going on. All credit to Rob for saving the evening, I have no doubt that we shall be having another of his talks soon.

I expect that you will be busy in December but there are still some places to go to for a meal, a winter walk etc. Hill Close Gardens in Warwick will be open from Monday to Friday from 11.00am to 4.00pm, the views over the racecourse are stunning. Ryton Organic Gardens are open daily from 10.00am to 4.00pm and the food there is very good. Batsford Arboretum near Moreton in Marsh too is open daily with the Christmas carvery available from 1st to 18th December at the cost of £14.50. They only close on Christmas day so an excellent place to visit to walk off too much food! Don't forget to visit us at Upton House and Gardens, the Christmas Fayre is on Saturday 5th and Sunday 6th December from 11.00am with a wartime theme. The House will also be decorated with a 1940's theme and promises to be amazing, everyone has been working so hard making the decorations.

If you are going to London, Kew Gardens are having their annual lighting spectacle after dark. Do look at their website for more information as Kew is such a magical place in both daylight and in the dark.

Our December meeting will have taken place by the time that you read this so I will report back on that and the outcome of the AGM in my next article in January. Don't forget; no meeting in January; the next will be on 2nd February in Tom Hauley room at 8.00pm and the speaker is Dr John Page, more of that next month. Thank you to everyone for your support and help at our meetings. I would like to wish you all a very Happy Christmas and a peaceful and healthy New Year.

I finished last month's article by saying "cold frosty mornings are surely coming" - well, we had a taste of winter this weekend (21st/22nd November), waking on Saturday to our first snow this end of the year. It was not very much and no doubt the village children hope for more. Frosts soften fruit of all sorts from Hawthorn to Rowan and sloes. This makes them more palatable. Birds and small animals gorge themselves, laying down fat to withstand the rigours of winter. I watched a blackbird in the upper branches of one of our hedgerow damson trees delicately pluck the fruit. It reminded me of those scenes beloved of medieval artists. Usually the bird seems almost incidental to the painting or tapestry but in fact we are being told it is autumn and winter's coming.

November 12th proved to be perhaps our last taste of summer. The temperature rose to 16C. Sharon and I were sitting outside the new cafe, which is part of the library complex in Southam, with a group of cyclists. We had come from Learnington starting on Sustrans National Route 41 which takes in the Grand Union Canal towpath and Offchurch Greenway. We turned right where the trail met Welsh Road and headed for our coffee stop. Later, while having lunch at home we saw a butterfly on the wing in the back garden taking nectar from a Fatsia japonica. It proved to be a Red Admiral

(Vanessa atalanta). They can, rarely, overwinter here but their instinct is to head south. Some may cross to the continent but many perish in the attempt. Nettles are the caterpillars' food plant so gardens should not be ruthlessly tamed. Leave a significant area truly wild to allow wildlife to thrive. (Sharon says that is my excuse for not doing the garden).

David Brown came to speak to the U3A Natural History Group on November 16th. His subject was 'Discoveries of Butterflies and Moths in the British Isles over the last 20 years.' I will cite an example to give you a flavour of his talk. The Chequered Skipper was once to be found in the Midlands flying along woodland rides in early summer. Its last reported sighting in England was in 1976. Although always considered a rarity, its disappearance here came as a severe jolt to conservationists for in the 1960s there had been fine colonies on at least four East Midland Nature Reserves. (I am indebted to Jeremy Thomas and Richard Lewington's book "The Butterflies of Britain and Ireland" published by Dorling Kindersley for some of this information). David told us that all is not lost. Rather amazingly, a Chequered Skipper colony had been found 400 miles to the north in 1942. This was in the locality of Fort William discovered by Lt-Col Madworth-Praed. So, at the height of the Second World War, our military could still find time to pursue their hobbies. There could be a film in the making I would think. Argyll is the place to head for if you wish to see this insect next summer. The Skippers are the most moth-like and primitive of the families of butterflies. They are known as the Hesperidae. (The Hesperides were nymphs in Greek mythology, daughters of Hesperus. They kept watch with a dragon over the Garden of the Golden Apples in the Islands of the Blessed).

On 19th November, I was a guest of John Stringer and Gordon Robbins at a meeting of beekeepers in their HQ at Stoneleigh. Gemma Foster, a researcher from Coventry University, gave a most interesting talk on bumblebees. She dealt with their life cycle, colonies, foraging, pollination and their decline. We were given a lesson in how to distinguish bumblebees from some hoverflies which can superficially look the same. The latter have shorter antennae. Bumblebees evolved in the mountains of Asia so, having the equivalent of a fur coat, they are able to forage in relatively cold weather and steal a march on other insects so to speak.

Unfortunately, due to changes in agriculture, we have lost wild flowers and hedgerows. Two species of bumblebee have become extinct and seven species are priorities for conservation. Gemma told us, as gardeners, to plant flowers and avoid pesticides. Many examples of good practice can be seen locally. One that you will know is the wide, wild flower strips which are by courtesy of Squab Hall Farm. The farm is owned by Les Evans and his farm manager is Rob Fox. They are on either side of the track leading to Chesterton Windmill. In addition the mill is lit up at night now.

In closing I would like to wish all readers a Happy Christmas with many exciting wildlife discoveries in the year ahead. Do let me know what you find.

Bloxham HM94

Samuel and Ellen Bloxham with their seven children lived at Homelands in Vicarage Lane. After serving a spell in the army in India and Afghanistan, Samuel came home to Ufton and married Ellen Webb. They moved to Harbury where he got a job at the lime works, and she brought up their seven children. Early in the 1900's Ellen decided that as there was no newspaper shop in the village, she would set up a business from home. This she did, and sold the papers to order from a window overlooking the street, and also they were delivered by the Bloxham children in Harbury and Ufton.

The children walked down the Station Road every evening to fetch the nightly paper The Birmingham Mail, and on Friday evenings, the weekly papers were also collected from the station, in a wooden truck. After collecting the papers, sometimes in the dark, no street lights, the children delivered them the same evening. Only the weekly papers were delivered on Saturdays. The Bloxhams wouldn't sell Sunday papers, this was a day of rest, and nothing must be done except to attend church. For the older ones this meant as many as three times a day. Among the papers and magazines and comics sold were John Bull, Farmers Weekly, Courier, Chips, Lot of Fun, Butterfly, Magnet, Comic Cuts and Boys Own. The Christian Herald was also delivered by the Bloxhams, but the Parish Magazine was the responsibility of the Misses Bishop.

Ellen Bloxham sold the Courier from about 1905-1955 approximately, latterly from Old Timbers in Ivy Lane.

Loose talk

I've done quite a lot of talking lately. People foolishly ask me to do it. Don't blame me.

On 3rd November I travelled down to Bristol to talk at the Carplus annual conference. They did ask me beforehand; I didn't just go to be annoying. To my amazement I found the delegate packs were full of references to Harbury and our little electric car scheme alongside the heavyweights from Norfolk, Nottingham and the North-East. They were especially interested in our

e-Wheels project and the social benefits we hope to bring to our community. Slipped in between the jargon-rich reports on Marketing, Contexts, Community Engagement, EVs and EAPCs were also two sheets telling the story in his own words of the journey in one of the electric cars by our member from Ladbroke, Adrian Davis, to Sheffield and back.

Back at home, Kenilworth group All Together Greener recklessly asked me to tell them all about HEI. I somehow managed to keep it to well under three hours (45 minutes actually) and travelled there in one of the cars for them to see. The very next day David Bristow and I showed the cars to an eager group of Scouts, taking them out on short trips round the village to experience an electrifying car ride. They asked a lot of questions.

In the News

In the last month we have appeared on several national websites and enewsletters publicising our e-Wheels scheme, including Carplus, E-Car Club and Big60Million. E-Car Club members will have seen us featured at some length in their latest newsletter. They tell me that e-Wheels is a project they are keen to shout about proudly. On Monday 23rd November I appeared on the Coventry and Warwickshire Radio afternoon show (actually I didn't 'appear'; I was heard, of course) talking about e-Wheels and the car club. The hard part was choosing two songs for them to play. Out of all the music you like, how do you choose just two?! They want us back, this time to be in a competitive quiz. I fully expect to know none of the answers but I am allowed to take another HEI person with me. They haven't rushed to volunteer.

So far the local print media have not responded to my wheedling efforts to get similar notice. Journalism isn't quite what it used to be, however, as now you have to provide copy and pictures and be your own reporter.

Charged Up

As I submit copy e-Wheels has already clocked up some 30 hours of free transport to local residents referred to us. Private use of the cars is also growing, in part thanks to intrepid explorers such as Lyndon Thomas, who is now a free-ranging enthusiast for the cars. Although e-Wheels is now regularly booking out vehicles, there is still plenty of capacity for private bookings. Don't miss out!

Those concerned about re-charging on longer journeys will be pleased to know that we are to be provided with two POLAR cards giving access to the largest provider of charging points off the motorways. Use of these posts will be free. Our existing Source East cards will work with any Plugged-in Midlands posts already. There are many of these in Birmingham.

Following our item in last month's issue, and as promised, here is an update. *Carrier of Hope's* aim this year is to bring Christmas cheer to 200 families in just 7 weeks' time! They'll do this in two ways:

Firstly, they intend to provide Christmas–in-a-bag. Some of you may remember this from previous years, but to remind you what it's all about, they would like to invite you to join them in doing something to let our asylum seeker, refugee and EU migrant families know that people really care about their plight. We can bring some love and hope to them this Christmas by providing them with a Christmas-Dinner-in-a Bag between Tuesday 22nd - Thursday 24th December.

Over these three days bags will be distributed to the people, containing the makings of a Christmas celebration. The average cost of a bag is $\pounds 25$ and will contain:

- A £10 voucher to buy a large chicken and fresh fruit and vegetables;
- A box of crackers;
- A cake
- A pudding of some kind
- Biscuits
- Sweets
- A Christmas card from you with a personal message of support

There are various ways you can help (if you wish to do this, more information can be obtained from Sue Sampson – contact details below):

- 1. You can have your own family make up a bag.
- 2. You can take a made up bag to the address below.
- 3. You can send money towards the cost of making up a bag. (Cheques made payable to Carriers of Hope)
- 4. You can buy items from the shopping list and take to Sue Sampson.

Secondly, on Wednesday 23rd December, three Father Christmases will be giving out presents to 400 people at their Christmas party. So, they need toys for children of all ages, and gifts for women suitable for their grand Father Christmas give-away. For the women, they like to give nice toiletries, scarves, gloves, handbags, make-up etc, etc. They are anticipating that they will be giving away over 400 bagged-up presents and so they need to start receiving items as soon as possible so that the "elves" have things to put into *Carriers*

of Hope Christmas carrier bags each Tuesday afternoon between now and Christmas. Probably the best thing would be to deliver Christmas gifts to the Sampsons' by arrangement (see contact below). Please do **not** wrap the presents.


May I through the Harbury & Ladbroke News, give this example of poor behaviour by a driver?

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



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
