What do you really think about Jesus?

I wonder, if you were really pushed, what you'd say about Jesus Christ. Was he real? Did he really walk the earth, die on a cross and rise again? Or would you put him in the same category as the tooth fairy?

A joint study from major Christian organisations has found while 57% of people in England call themselves Christians, two in five think Jesus wasn't a real person.

The research of 3,000 people, conducted by the Church of England found more than a third of people (39%) thought Jesus was a mythical figure, rather than actually existing in history. So did he exist?

Well, it wasn't just his closest friends, many others wrote about Jesus who weren't Christians.

Josephus was a **Jewish** historian who provided us with the most comprehensive primary source on Jewish history - he wrote about Jesus.

Tacitus was a **Roman** senator under Emperor Vespasian, and famous for his analysis and examination of historical documents, he is one of the most trusted ancient historians of the day - he wrote about Jesus.

Lucian was a **Greek** satirist who spoke sarcastically of Jesus and his followers. But, in doing so, he confirms that Jesus taught about faith and God and that Jesus' teachings were quickly adopted by his disciples – he wrote about Jesus.

Beyond the wide variety of non-Christian sources that explicitly mention Jesus, let's not forget one key event: the rise of Christianity itself. If Jesus really hadn't existed, it would have been simple for those most opposed to Christianity (of whom there were many) to expose him as a figment of the early Christians' imagination. That would have been the end of Christianity, yet it didn't happen.

Jesus existed and we have much historical evidence that shows this. But the exciting thing is that he has never remained just a figure in history. Faith, belief and trust in Jesus bring new life, new hope and real transformation. Jesus said. 'I have come that you may have life and have it abundantly'. More people follow this one man today than anyone else who has walked the earth. He's not a mythical figure in history but a game-changer and life giver so; don't stick him with the tooth fairy!

The response has been overwhelming and has certainly kept Nikki busy over the past few weeks working alongside the Carriers of Hope in Coventry.

We have recently heard from the Coventry Diocese Advisory Committee that our plans for the creation of the new memorial garden at the back of the church have now been approved. Notification of this proposal is currently being displayed in and outside church and subject to no objections, work should commence later this year.

Alongside our usual services this month, the Remembrance Day Service will take place on Sunday 8th November at 10.15am, with the usual gathering at the memorial for 11 o'clock.

And finally - a plea from the Churchwardens. Some of you will be aware that we have a small army of what we call Street Reps (who do a wonderful job), who very kindly distribute information (mainly Easter and Christmas) to every household in Harbury, so that details of our services at these special times are received by as many as possible. This is a rather late summary of the meeting on 16th September, which I have taken from the draft minutes displayed on the noticeboard by the pub as I was not there in person. I find it hard to make some of these meetings so if anyone would like to share the task of reporting these meetings in this magazine with me, please let me know.

Neighbourhood Plan - In accordance with local government allocations, Ladbroke will have future housing development. A neighbourhood plan would give residents control by denoting when and how many houses will be built in what areas. It is a statutory document written by a steering group (members of the community and a representative from the Parish Council). The first stage is to get area designation and the main issues are housing, environment and biodiversity. Several consultations take place with the community and by SDC before it is examined by an independent body which advises it is recommended, modified or not suitable. After a final referendum by the community, when at least 50% of voters should be in favour, it is referred back to SDC and adopted as part of the local framework.

It was agreed to initiate a neighbourhood plan and judge the reaction of villagers at an open public meeting.

Defibrillator - The Lottery Fund has awarded Ladbroke 100% of the grant requested; the Alibone Trust will be approached for a grant too. Neighbours have agreed for electricity to be routed to the phone box and the Parish Council will pay for the electrical work required. Once installed there will be a Defibrillator Awareness session.

Planning - The application for a house in the woodland south of School Lane/ Church Road was withdrawn and tree works in the grounds of Ladbroke Hall approved. There would be no representation regarding pruning the yew tree outside 7 Hedges Close.

Flooding - Some property level protection (PLP) surveys were done in July and others are imminent; the installation of PLP measures is expected to be in early 2016. Some funding for the measures will be from WCC but homeowners may need to contribute, this will be confirmed when full costs are known. There will be a public consultation event attended by WCC, the consultants and the contractor (once appointed) to discuss the report, meet contractors, see the type of products available under the scheme, address issues of Listed Building consent and identify next steps.

Village Hall & Millennium Green - A grant of £500 towards equipment was approved. A new insulated and watertight roof is needed; planning permission will be required as it will increase the height by a few inches.

HS2 - Councillor Batty will attend the meeting in Shire Hall on 6th October. There is also a public event at Grange Hall, Southam on 13th October.

WCC - The budget is getting ever tighter. Only mandatory things will be paid including child and other care requirements. WCC have rejected the idea of a combined authority with Greater Birmingham.

SDC - Unlike WCC, who have rejected the idea of joining a Greater Birmingham authority (which will have its own mayor and be responsible for planning policy, finance, care of the aged, education etc), SDC have agreed to take up a position of Shadow Board Member on the Combined Authority as an interim decision. They will have to make up their minds in February 2016.

Clerk's Vacancy - someone has been interviewed but before making an offer of employment, a vacancy notice will be issued to see if any local residents are interested.

The next meeting of the parish council has changed to Wednesday 9th December.



October 2015

We started with a continuation of a presentation which the Councillors but not the audience had viewed. It appears from what was discussed that there may be a proposal to put bungalows on a site north of the Churchlands Industrial Estate. This was not well received by Councillors who want this area as purely for employment needs. The emerging Neighbourhood Plan sees the railway cutting as a barrier and Councillors did not wish housing to extend beyond it as it would be isolated, with no footway and too far from the village centre. Chairman, Tim Lockley, outlined the problems as the council saw it: no proven need; agricultural land not brownfield; preference for industrial use; isolated location cut off from the village beyond the railway and industrial estate, so better suited to light industrial use.

The amendment to the Henry's development on Bush Heath Lane came next, putting rooms into the roof space of three of the five approved homes. The representative said there was demand for these additional rooms. The council had no objection.

Discussed next was an amendment to the Quarries development where more houses will take the place of the Care Home. However the developer would provide a surgery off Ladbroke Road and was in negotiations with the local health authority. The surgery would be funded by a reduction in "affordable" homes, down from 35% of the total housing to a possible 15% which might be for sale not rent.

The Council made 'No objection' to:- felling of trees at the Old Bakery Chapel Street and at 3 Farm Close; a two storey extension at 53 Deppers Bridge;

erection of an “agricultural” building at Stapenhall Farm, Deppers Bridge. There was concern about the state of the Dovehouse Autos site which Stratford DC had deemed to be safe.

Initially, plans for the Gaydon/Lighthorne Heath “New Village” provided traffic lights on the Fosse Crossroads in the planning agreement but surprise, the Developer’s Traffic Assessment shows no impact on Harbury and a decision must come before the County’s own assessment is available.

There was further concern that the “Infrastructure Levy”, intended to give us money from developers to mitigate other problems, was being reduced. The Clerk will investigate as this would have ramifications for the emerging Neighbourhood Plan.

Ken Stephenson kept Councillors on their toes on the search for Gypsy Sites. Warwick wants to use the Football Ground. Stratford is still consulting on theirs and Ken did not believe their Consultation was sufficiently well advertised. He said we could have sites for both authorities close by and our overstretched Doctors and School would be overwhelmed. Chairman Tim Lockley reported that SDC have said if the football ground goes ahead there will be no other sites near Harbury and also pointed out the sites would be on top of the huge increase in housing already approved.

District Councillor Jacqui Harris said changes to the M40 J12 were causing severe delays. The Core Strategy was progressing. She warned that although SDC thought this meant they could reject unsuitable applications, as they had approved more homes than their target, the Planning Inspectorate disagreed. It was not clear developers’ promised improvements were enforceable.

Bob Stevens (WCC) said it seemed more likely Warwickshire would join with Coventry as a Combined Authority. WCC was waiting for details of the next round of cuts and could not see how they could achieve any more. County Highways was aware of the level of development planned in our area and its impact on our roads and were beginning to ask for amendments.

Updates - The Library Cypress trees have been felled. Harbury Energy Initiative has launched its E-Wheels Project. There has been no progress by the police on stopping HGVs using the weight limited railway bridge at Deppers.

Properties - A replacement bench was ordered for the playing fields in Tim Percival’s memory. The Hereburgh Way access to the fields will be closed for safety reasons whilst the firework display takes place. Complaints continue that owners do not clear up after their dogs foul the playing fields.

The Chairman praised the scrub clearance work of the Cemetery Group. Michael Mann would clear the excess soil from the Burial Grounds and Cllr Ekins urged the Council to think about finding a new site for burials.

County Highways will be asked to look into reasons for the spate of accidents at the Station Road bend leading to the B4451 near to Highfield Terrace.

There was a plea for an extra light in Deppers Bridge to illuminate the bollards. The Council will request that WCC looks for ways to increase the visibility of the bollards. They want to meet WCC to discuss damage in Church Street caused by HGVs having to mount the pavement to pass parked cars. The footpath was being damaged and Council also wanted to protect the Church Paddock wall as well.

The next Councillors' Corner is 10.00am on Saturday 21st November and the next PC Meeting is Thursday 26th November, 7.30pm in the Village Hall.

We had a great two-handed talk on the Lights of Leamington. Margaret Rushton did the presentation with Alan Griffin organising the slides and adding other details.

The Lights of Leamington, a response to the success of the Festival of Britain, ran from

1951-61. When they first opened in 1951 in the Jephson Gardens they attracted 30,000 visitors.


There was a tavern, café and continuous theatre costing 6d (2½) and you could stay for hours. Events in the glass “Music Box” Pavilion included the London Philharmonic and the Hallé. Maps of the site, the route and parking for the coaches were produced and over the decade more than two million people attended.

The lake fountains, the centrepiece of the event, were modelled on Hampton Court's. Lights were everywhere especially in the magnificent cedar next to Willes Road. Birdcage Walk was lit with lanterns. More modest tableaux such as the Saga of Cock Robin or Sleeping Beauty's Fayre Castle, were to be discovered in the shrubberies.



But the highlights were the much missed Floral Clock and Guinness Clock which, on the quarters, half and full hour sprang to life with mechanical models. People would wait to see the performances on the quarter, half and full hours.

Different models decorated the lake and boating area:- a Mill and cottage; the Houses of Parliament; a Venetian waterfront; the Queen Mary; and once a Chinese pavilion with



musicians. The organist on the lake was also popular. On each of the last nights there were fireworks.

But all good things come to an end and the event eventually became too expensive to stage. The lights themselves were sold on to Walsall for its Arboretum.

Having recently celebrated our 1st birthday we wanted to give something back to the community. We wanted something that could potentially benefit everyone and so have decided to buy a heart defibrillator for the village.

What is an Automated External Defibrillator?

Following a cardiac arrest the chance of survival decreases by 23% per minute. Being in the rural setting that the village is realistically means that medical help is at least 10 minutes away which in many cases would simply be too late. The quicker the intervention after a sudden cardiac arrest, the better the outcome. Medical help really needs to be present at the patient within 4-5 minutes.

An AED is a portable electronic device that automatically diagnoses the potentially life threatening cardiac problem in a patient and is able to treat it through defibrillation. The fantastic thing about these particular devices is that you do not need to be trained to use them. The device talks the user

through the process, diagnosing the heart rhythm and determining whether a shock is needed.

The AED is stored in a secure box (999 will provide you with the code to open it) in a public place. We will need to finalise the best position for it but it will be attached to the outside of our building for the village to access in an emergency.

Thank you to the Parish Council who have kindly provided us with a grant towards this and Inside Homes who have completed a bicycle ride to help fund raise.

It will take a couple of months to get it in place but once it is available we will provide more information on how it can be used.



The Bear Hunt Story – Continuing with the theme of bears, started at the beginning of the term, the children went on a bear hunt in the Jackson's orchard. Ted, the Pre-School bear wrote a letter to the children, letting them know that he was lost. They followed the paw prints past the library, the chemist and the Co-op, checking in each to make sure he had not been seen, before turning into Mill Lane. When they reached the orchard, they

found "thick oozy mud", "swishy swashy grass", a tunnel, a snow storm and a slippery wooden bridge over a "river", all leading to a den where the hapless Ted sat awaiting his rescue. After picking apples for their snack, the children carefully took Ted back to the safety of Pre-School. We are very grateful to Bud and Tony Jackson for letting us use the orchard and for their part in providing and setting up the props.



On their return to Pre-School, the children told their own Bear Hunt story, using paint and collage materials to make "swishy swashy grass" and "thick oozy mud".

Healthy Eating – After all the excitement of the bears, we turned our attention to fruit and vegetables and healthy eating. The role play area became a green grocer's shop, with lots of different fruit and veg for sale.



Then the children chopped a variety of fruits to eat at snack time and, in the creative area, halved apples, peppers and potatoes took the place of paintbrushes as the children used them for printing.



Horticultural Society

What a start we enjoyed at our first meeting of 2015/16. Forty plus members sat enthralled through the talk that Howard Drury gave entitled the Great Plant Hunters. Not a dreary boring topic at all, it showed what a debt we owe to these intrepid men who braved all sorts of conditions to bring back thousands of plant species which we all are able to enjoy today. The legacy

of these men mean that even today in the Himalayas 22 new species each year are still being discovered.

We were shown details of 20 plant hunters but I will just mention a few of them. Where better to start that with the Tradescants, father and son. John the father, 1570 to 1638, worked for Sir Robert Cecil. He also worked for Lady Salisbury at Hatfield House and ultimately at the gardens of Saint Mary of Lambeth which is now the Garden History Museum and well worth a visit. He witnessed great changes in the political climate but quietly and methodically transformed the gardens at Hatfield House into knot gardens introducing many new varieties of roses and trees for which he had scoured the world. He was the first person to cultivate the horse chestnut, many varieties of fruit and flowers, even larches from Russia. His son too was a great explorer introducing the tulip tree and plane tree amongst other plants. They were responsible for the creation of that wonderful museum the Ashmoleum at Oxford. Do go there if you have never been, go on the park and ride and have coffee in The Randolph opposite in the Morse Bar, I can highly recommend this experience. I go there every 2 or 3 months to meet up with ex colleagues from Oxford where I used to work and there is always something to see and savour. There is a very good book by Phillipa Gregory called *Earthly Joys* about the Tradescants.

Next we come to Sir Joseph Banks, 1733 to 1820. He joined Captain Cook on a voyage to Tahiti in 1768 and is immortalised in a stained glass window in Lincoln Cathedral. A lot of his discoveries have the name *Banksia* including a lovely yellow rose, *pittosporum* and *pseudopanax*. I have a really lovely variegated *pseudopanax* bought from Hardy Exotics at Penzance and it is a super plant and fairly hardy so I shall think of Joseph Banks when I am tidying up around it.

Archibald Menzies, 1754 to 1842 came from Wem and he was firstly a naval surgeon but often sneaked off the ship and hunted for new plants. He introduced, amongst other plants, the monkey puzzle tree, ribes, arbutus unedo also known as the strawberry tree. I have a huge specimen of the strawberry tree in my front garden and it is at its best now, full of lovely pink and white flowers and small red strawberries. Even today, 27th October, there are bees and butterflies hovering on the flowers and fruits. How lovely to know who discovered this evergreen tree and how long ago. He also wrote about monkey puzzle trees, exporting many seeds and seedling plants to Chile. Howard showed us a super picture of rows of these trees along the Hagley road in Birmingham, a long way from Chile!

David Douglas, 1799 to 1834 was born in Scotland. He worked for the Earl of Mansfield as well as at Kew. He went to the Americas and collected conifer cones. As the trees were so tall he used a rifle to shoot at the cones and they then fell to the ground....ingenious. Of course we all know the Douglas fir so now we know how it got here. He went to Australia and discovered *garrya's* the famous one is James Root and has long silky pink catkins.

He also introduced lupins including tree lupins, the Monterey pine, cornus alba and many more species. He died in Hawaii when he was caught in a pit trap and his money was stolen. Just think of the number of species he could have introduced if he had lived much longer.

Sir Joseph Hooker, 1873 to 1932 was also born in Scotland and was a chemist. He panned in the gold fields and then set off for China. He was responsible for bringing back many of the plants at Ness Botanical Gardens including abies, acer, hypericum, camellia and osmanthus. So when you see Hookeri after a plant name think of him and his travels.

Reginald Farrer 1890 to 1946 introduced the dahlia, buddleia and many species of clematis to this country. Look for geranium and viburnum Farreri and the scent on both of these is very powerful.

The Veitch family dating back for seven generations from the 1770's had nurseries in London on the Kings Road where all the boutiques are now. Their most famous discoveries are many species of geranium.

I will finish with Ernest Wilson 1876 to 1930. He worked at Birmingham Botanical Gardens. He was also known as Chinese Wilson for his many trips to that country. There is a garden dedicated to him in Chipping Norton and I will find out just where this is and let you know. The lovely acer griseum which sheds its bark was one of his introductions also clematis armandii, clematis montana, davidii the paper handkerchief tree and many many more.

Just a word of caution as some of the plants introduced have become very invasive especially the Japanese knotweed but this was of course not known when planted here.

Howard finished his talk with another of his musical finales, this time a montage of some of the most spectacular plant introductions to the singing of What a Wonderful World by a lovely young lady called Jackie Ivanko. What a wonderful way to end the presentation. On the Thursday after this Barbara and I went to the Lord Leycester in Warwick to hear another brilliant talk by a modern day plant hunter Roy Lancaster and he mentioned some of the plant hunters of the past that Howard had spoken about so my head is now full of all this knowledge!

I look forward to welcoming Howard back for another of his special talks next year. I suspect that by the time you read this we will have had our November meeting on 3rd when Rob and Diane Cole will be paying a return visit and the topic is Dublin Gardens so I will report back on that in the December issue of the magazine. The December meeting is very early this year on Tuesday 1st at Tom Hauley room at 8.00pm. We will be having our usual festive fun with quizzes and games and the famous festive buffet, bumper raffle preceded by a very short AGM.

In the meantime why not visit an arboretum near you! The colours of the leaves this year are spectacular. The arboretum we visited two years ago,

Bodenham post code DY11 5TB will be open from 11.00am to 5.00pm daily excluding Mondays. I have looked on their website and it is looking spectacular. Batsford too is showing off its colours at their peak. A little further afield but again an excellent day out is Westonbirt just outside Tetbury, post code GL8 8QS. Look on the forestry website, www.forestry.gov.uk/westonbirt for more details. It is open from 9.00am to 5.00pm daily and has Autumn trails. I do hope that you are able to savour November, this last month of Autumn with its colours and smells.

I look forward to seeing everyone in November and December and new members are always welcome.



Garden Jottings from Bridge Nursery

I thought this month I might let you all know about the money we have raised this year for charity.

As many of you know, we maintain a two acre garden at Bridge Nursery. It has been judged of sufficient standard to be open under the National Gardens Scheme (NGS).

The NGS 'standard' is that the garden can 'hold the interest for 45 minutes'. We sometimes feel that some people are not that interested in that they come back out of the garden after two or three minutes! But there is a lot to see and explore and a mown path round the holding which is good for walking off a good lunch.

The NGS raises money, primarily for cancer charities, in particular Macmillan and Marie Curie Cancer Care with smaller amounts going to some less well known charities such as the Gardeners' Benevolent Fund. Our visitors are good enough to donate as they enter. The suggested amount is £2.50 but we don't police it!

This year we have raised and passed to the county treasurer £965 and the total raised over the last five years is £4772.50 which we are pleased with. I wonder who has not been affected by cancer, either directly or indirectly. It seems so prevalent these days and Macmillan do a wonderful job (as I well know as my Mum ended her days in one of their hospices). Pity - the cakes were fantastic and really very cheap) we just managed to beat last year's amount. We raised £212 albeit with fewer people.

I got up to see the total lunar eclipse on 28th September but trying not to wake Sharon, I misread my watch and got down into the garden two hours before time. My next effort was just right and I must say it was worth it. Viewed through the Earth's shadow, the moon was a strange coppery colour. Near perfect conditions also meant the arc of the Milky Way overhead with its millions of stars could be clearly seen, unusual with the degree of light pollution we experience in these parts.

On 19th October, the U3A Natural History Group had a splendid autumnal morning at Kenilworth Common searching for fungi. We were led by John and Val Roberts. With drifts of fallen beech leaves to walk through, some of the steeper re-entrants needed a glissading technique. Despite its small size and the fact that it is bisected by a railway line, the Common is a quiet sanctuary for wildlife. It's sandstone country so acidic with Bilberry, Bracken and Silver Birch. Some of the latter were dying with the fruiting bodies of bracket fungi studding their trunks. Many fungi have English names, especially the larger ones, but many are tiny and go by their Latin names alone. Birch Bracket is also known as the Razor Strop fungus because in times past it was used to sharpen cut throat razors. Stinkhorns spread their spores by attracting flies to their sticky secretions. As John told us, the fruiting bodies (mushrooms and the like) represent only about 10% by weight of the fungus as some 90% is hidden underground (the mycelium). These are spreading filaments akin to roots through which the fungus takes in nutrition. Small black spots on sycamore leaves proved to be the fungus Tar Spot. John pointed out that without fungi much dead matter would not be broken down and nutrients recycled. Fungi inoculate roots providing nutrients to plants which themselves gain sugars in a symbiotic, (mutually advantageous), relationship. With DNA studies it has been shown that some fungi are extremely large. One studied in Oregon was found to be 4 miles in diameter.

Towards the end of our foray someone found some Earthballs. Similar to Puffballs to some extent, they look like dirty potatoes on the outside. When cut in half the interior is a mass of spores giving a marbled effect. In all we saw about 30 different species. Now is the time to do your search in our local countryside and I would be interested to know what you find.

On a bike ride recently, my group rode into the complicated lane system around Beausale, a few miles west of Kenilworth. We left Leek Wootton by Woodcote Lane which led in turn to Rouncil Lane. I thought this might be a corruption of Round Hill but it seems, according to Anthony Poulton-Smith in his book 'Warwickshire Place Names', that the name dates back to the Domesday Book and the Saxon manor of Rincele. Now Rouncil Lane marks the boundary of Kenilworth Castle's deer park originally known as Park Pale.

(Pale is from the 14th century Old French 'pal' which derives from the Latin word 'palus' meaning a stake.)

In our garden shed I found the forewing of a butterfly. I thought it was probably part of a Green-Veined White. The wings of butterflies and moths are formed of scales which are modified hairs. The word Lepidoptera is from the Greek meaning 'scale wing'. The scales provide the insect with its colour and in females release pheromones to attract a mate. The tiny scales overlap rather like the tiles on a roof but to see them properly requires a microscope as they are the size of dust particles.

Now most arable fields have been ploughed, tilled and sown. After recent rain, seeds have begun to sprout and the dun coloured earth is showing green in places. Cold frosty mornings are surely coming but each season has its wildlife delights.



Harbury WW1 Memorial Project Update

In September the Parish Council was successful with an application for a Heritage Lottery Fund First World War Centenary Project grant of £10,000. A further £3,000 has been donated to the project by Harbury firm CLGR Limited, which is owned by Cllr Chris Gibb and his wife Cathy.

The project is called the “**Harbury WW1 Memorial Trail**”. The first task is to learn more about the 33 village men who gave their lives in WW1, who they were, and how and where they lived in the village. Their stories will then be written up and preserved for present and future generations, in print in the Village Library and Heritage Room, and on the Parish Council website. Finally we plan to commemorate their former homes (with the current home owner’s consent, of course), with blue plaques, connected together to form a trail around the village. We hope to conclude this by July 2016, the centenary of the Battle of the Somme.

The project will be overseen by a Management Board consisting of Cllr Tim Lockley (representing the Parish Council and Library), Sharon Hancock (representing the Harbury Society) and Nigel Chapman (representing Harbury Heritage and Harbury Primary School). Cllr Chris Gibb has volunteered to be the Project Leader.

The first steps will be to build on the extensive research by Sharon Hancock, and conduct new searches by all available means, such as the Heritage Room, County Records Office, military records, press reports, museums and the internet. A team of volunteers from the village is now undertaking research into the lives of the 33 men named on the war memorial. The men

lived in all the older parts of the village, including Temple End, Mill Street, Park Lane Terrace, Binswood End and Deppers Bridge, and came from a range of different backgrounds. Some we know quite a lot about, some nothing at all, and some of their addresses, such as Springfield Terrace, no longer exist. If you have any information about any of the 33 men, or pictures, or are related to them, the research team are eager to hear from you. Following a successful and well attended first workshop on 24th September, when the Imperial War Museum's Peter Hart spoke to us, the **next workshop will be on Thursday, 12th November, between 5.30pm and 7pm at Harbury Village Hall**. This workshop will focus on how best to conduct research, with a talk by Dr Pierre Purseigle of Warwick University, an expert on the comparative history of WW1, about what life was like in Harbury in 1914. All villagers are welcome, whether or not you are a researcher.

Chris will collect together the information gathered in February 2016, and it will then be written up in a consistent way by Exeter University English undergraduate Alice Woodhouse, who lives in Harbury and went to Harbury Primary School. The content will be reviewed by Dr Pierre Purseigle and Peter Hart, and the finished work will be professionally presented on the Parish Council website by our website designers.

Once we have established the houses where the men lived, or the location of where the houses stood if they no longer exist, Chris will consult with property owners about the blue plaques. These represent most of the cost of the project, and a competitive tender exercise will be undertaken by the Management Board to choose a company to make the plaques.

We hope the finished Harbury WW1 Memorial Trail, with about thirty plaques around the village, will keep alive the memory of the men and events of WW1 for the current and future generations of villagers, and add to the character of the village. The trail will be designed for all ages; for example we know it will be used by our Primary School to teach one class each year about WW1, life in the village at the time and the villagers' involvement in it.

Separately to the above project, the Parish Council has recently approved funds for the professional restoration of the village war memorial, which we hope to be able to undertake in the next few months.

Holiday at Home 'Away Day' - 2nd Wednesday of the month in the Tom Hauley Room, 10am – 4pm

Following the success of the holiday at home, we decided to offer an 'away day', once a month during the winter. The first of these was on Wednesday

Help for Refugees

Following the recent appeal, the response from both villages has, as usual, been wonderful with many of the requested items being brought to the church

for onward transmission – some for the benefit of refugees and asylum seekers already in this country and the rest for those in Calais.

We took the goods destined for refugees already here to *Carriers of Hope* in Coventry on 6th October and thought you'd like to know what happens to the goods you've donated. This organisation (www.carriersofhope.org.uk) was formed in 2009 and has been operating out of Hillfields Evangelical Baptist Church since 2012. We were immediately surprised by the size of the operation and the extent to which help is provided for the families. On arrival, people go to reception to register and are given a raffle ticket. With this, they can go to the various small meeting rooms that surround the main church auditorium to obtain food (although they only have a small amount) and clothing and other essentials. They can also go to a desk where they can request larger items such as fridges, washing machines, furniture – these are stored elsewhere and will be delivered later if available. Then they are given breakfast – coffee/tea, toast and jam, cakes and whatever else has been donated or been made in the kitchen on the day. There is also a crèche. At the end of the session, a raffle is held using the tickets they were given on arrival with the aim of giving everyone a prize.

It would take a long article to describe everything we saw but the main points that struck us were:

- The large number of people being helped – there are some 600 members, with new ones added each week (we believe that 6 new families were registered that day).
- Those who receive help often become volunteers themselves, this leads to people feeling valued and building confidence along with having work experience for CVs etc.
- In addition to providing material needs, the atmosphere is designed to encourage people to form friendships.
- There are other agencies in Coventry who provide help, and they all work together, along with a number of churches of all denominations, each with its own speciality, so people are referred accordingly – for instance *Coventry Refugee and Migrant Centre* deal with paperwork and legal matters and provide English language tuition, whilst *Carriers of Hope* deal with more material needs. Also, *Coffee Tots* (www.coffeetots.co.uk), a community café in City Arcade, provide two members of staff to run the creche
- The current need is for furniture, bedding, kitchenware, baby equipment - for big items please contact Alvaro Grana: (grana.alvaro@googlemail.com or 07557 049755) or Godfrey (07958 499333) to arrange delivery or collection.

- We had a specific request for baby bags to be made, similar to the blessings bags at *Bumps and Bundles* but bigger and including a lot more practical items for new mums. Is this something we could provide as a community?
- The storage facility is a disused church that the diocese has loaned to *Carriers of Hope* at no cost, and this is where the large items are kept.

All the items for Calais (tents, sleeping bags, men's clothes, coats, shoes and socks, toiletries) have been sent to *Calaid* or *Emmaus* in Oxford. Our final items for Calais will be delivered to St Mary Magdalen church in Chapelfields, Coventry, on 15th October for transportation to Calais on 2nd November.

The work is ongoing, so look out for further appeals (or contact John Eld, 613340 if you need further details).


Harbury Village Library

e-Wheels Goes Live

As of Monday 26th October e-Wheels, HEI's social transport scheme using the electric cars, became a reality. We have everything in place to make transport available to those for whom getting anywhere by public transport is physically or financially difficult. We have worked on this with Transforming Communities, a Harbury church-based group working on national, global and local issues. Starting with advice from the food banks we have approached 9 different agencies, including AgeUK, child centres, some surgeries and housing association tenant support. And we have our first booking. We envisage our scheme covering many possibilities, such as:

- taking those in need of support, but too far away to reach it easily, to the food bank
- taking people to hospital and surgery appointments when bus travel is inconvenient, physically difficult or unaffordable
- travel to day care or child centres for those that find it difficult to get there
- delivering food to the food banks from the supermarket collections
- taking people to job interviews or the job centre when local transport is inconvenient or unaffordable
- providing transport for the elderly or disabled living in more isolated communities where there is no public transport link.

If you know of people who might benefit from our help, please remember that e-Wheels is there, a clean, green social transport scheme (and it rhymes). We are not able to take direct requests from the public but will respond to any appropriate agency.

And if you work for any such agency that doesn't know about us, please pass this on.

Lighten Up

I know that I take all this much too seriously but that isn't what this headline means. HEI Steering group member Ted Dowdeswell has arranged for LED lighting surveys for the school, library, village hall and rugby club. The village hall and rugby club have to wait their turn in a few weeks time, as the school required a longer survey than expected. The library, it seems, is equipped with fairly economical and efficient lighting already and the lighting engineer felt that he could not cost effectively improve on what is there now. LEDs would be marginally cheaper to run but the installation would not cut running costs sufficiently for a reasonable payback time.

By mid November we should know what can be done in the school. After that HEI will try to find the funds to enable these energy saving and cost reduction measures to lighten up the school's load.

Electric Car Club Evaluation

Over the next month or two Greenwatt, a local consultancy, has been commissioned by E-Car Club to have a look at the performance of our electric car club and its future potential and produce an end of grant report. This will mean some consultation with members with their permission. This report will be of great importance to us and could have national significance, so we hope users of the cars will be happy to respond and offer opinions and experiences, good or bad.

Switching Off and On

There has been quite a lot of encouragement to us all to compare prices and switch energy provider, if appropriate. It is relatively quick and easy these days. Despite all the persuasive efforts of government and others comparatively few households have done it. According to the Department for Energy and Climate Change collectively there are potential savings of £2.2 billion possible. 

Harbury - Then and Now

Then (in the 70s) there were no facilities in the village for anyone to play tennis, now there is a thriving tennis club, which offers the chance for all ages to enjoy playing the sport, either as a recreational activity or in a competitive league. A document recently unearthed by the family



of the late Frank Bunting sheds light on the initial ideas about proposals to develop courts on the playing fields and the role Frank played in coordinating the fund-raising activities. As the Financial Director (and later Managing Director) of the Coventry Telegraph, Frank already had experience of setting up schemes to raise money for worthwhile causes before he and Liz moved into Harbury. In November 1972, there had been a public meeting of the Recreation Ground Advisory Committee to discuss ways of improving facilities at the recreation ground, where it had been decided that the next major effort would be to provide two tennis courts. In January 1973, Valentine duBuisson (who was also involved in setting up the village magazine - then just the Harbury News), set up a committee of volunteers, including Gladys H, Gerry P, Keith T, Sally G and Sheila S with Frank at the helm as the person who would be leading the fund-raising activities. The document he produced, which was delivered to all houses in the village, was cleverly set with a series of headings using 'tennis jargon', encouraging villagers to support the idea of 'SERVICE FOR HARBURY'. The following information is taken directly from the flyer created by Frank who used a play on words linked to the game of tennis to create an interest in the project.

'PLAY that is what our villagers want to do. They don't want to waste a minute. Nor do the members of a sub-committee formed to raise money to

construct the courts and administer them. So with the approval of the Parish Council, it has been decided that the courts should be built this year.

'ADVANTAGE that is what can be gained if we go ahead now. Costs seem to rise every year; young people should not be deprived of a season's chance to play the game. We are confident that the money will be forthcoming in time, but we need the courts now and are sure they can be achieved. Instead of waiting, we are appealing for finance through gifts and loans.


'LET us make the effort. Donations, however small, will be used, if sent to the Committee member for your area but if you don't feel you can spare a gift, why not consider a SPORTING chance?

'DOUBLE your money. That is the prospect for those who lend money to the fund in return for Harbury Tennis bonds. These will be in units of £10 and, while they attract no interest, they will earn a chance to win prizes

'NET result? A facility for you and everyone in the village, a chance to double your money and at the very least the knowledge that it is being banked in a good cause.

'PLAY your part, please. We know it's a DEUCE of a good idea. Don't let it fall out of COURT but help us to make it a SMASH HIT. Committee members will visit as many homes as possible to discuss the project, but you need not wait on the SIDELINES. Give us a call. Make it GAME, SET and MATCH to Harbury this year.'

As a consequence of this impressive document and with additional finance from fish and chip suppers and jumble sales, the money was raised in time for work to commence in August. The total cost was £2,882, submitted by DUROLAS which was significantly helped by Chris McGowan and John King who arranged for contractors to do the excavation and most of the drainage for free, so that only a minimal amount (£150) provided by the Parish Council was spent on pipework. As the records show, the tennis courts were completed by October 1973 and opened by John Drinkwater who was Chairman of the Parish Council on November 4th 1973. All of this history makes fascinating reading for those who may not be aware of erstwhile efforts to improve facilities in the village for the future. This document SET out the hopes of the small sub-committee, which were realised in a very short space of time and the tennis club is now flourishing over 40 years after the original suggestions were made. For anyone interested in finding out more about Harbury's past, it's always possible to visit the Harbury Heritage Room in the school on the first Tuesday of each month from 6.30 - 8.30pm or by arrangement with Nigel Chapman Tel: 813765.

Harbury Club – 100 and Counting – Misconceptions and Memories

I am still surprised at how many people think that Harbury Club is a working men's club. In the year 2019 it will have been privately owned by its members for a hundred years. Yes, we are affiliated to the CIU, however, this does not mean being a member. The club has been in existence for a hundred years already and in that time has seen some great changes. Where the snooker room is now, Edgar Hamer had a garage, you can still see the RSJ that was over the door on the end wall by the car park.

The main door that had been the access from Crown Street was bricked over and now access is on the side of the building. The old steward's cottage which, when I first became a member, was occupied by the Poveys, is now rented out. One of their ground floor rooms is now a TV and darts room. Ladies' and gents' toilets have been moved around and the only purpose built disabled toilet in any of the pubs was added. We have two bars and have held christenings, weddings and funeral wakes here and the people who hire it get to decorate it to their style. I know that the Village Hall is a good venue (after all my uncle George Marshall built it), but for value for money you cannot beat the Club. The concert room now has a stage on the Crown Street wall. This would have been useful when Paula and the Sunshine Band plus other groups played there in my teens.

Bingo is still played every night, plus dominoes and snooker. Crib has taken over from the darts teams – I used to be in the ladies darts team that was captained by my mother Isabella Marshall. At one stage the team consisted of three families, the Marshalls, Caswells and the Freemans, travelling all over the local district.

I also remember as a young child watching whist being played in a hut or tent on the Club site, plus going to beetle drives there. Somebody must remember how you got to put the legs etc on the beetle so that you won. I have many other memories and would love people to let me know what theirs are.

The Club has been part of the village for so long and it is a shame that people do not think of using it automatically for parties.

Hedgehogs in November

Hedgehogs will still be building up their weights for hibernation. When will they actually hibernate? The best answer to this question is - when they are ready. Some may even be in hibernation now, others not until next month.

November seems to be the time when many will decide to hibernate.

I am sure you will remember from previous years' publicity to take care when piling up leaves and garden waste ready for a bonfire – be it for Bonfire Night or just a general burn. It is always best to move the pile on the day it is to be burnt, unless you have a special bonfire cage or bin that hedgehogs cannot access.

If you still have any small hedgehogs regularly visiting your garden you could catch them and check their weights. Mark each one with a spot of nail varnish

or quick drying paint on a few of their prickles (different hedgehogs can be marked in different places). Then 4-5 nights later catch again and weigh – it must be putting on weight, if not it will need to be rescued. Small hedgehogs will need help to get up to a hibernation weight. However the help can range from just continuing to feed and monitor weights in your garden to being taken indoors and cared for.

At the time of writing this I don't know whether we are going to have an early cold winter or a mild one so it is difficult to give advice now on which hedgehogs need to be taken into care. Obviously those out in the day are in trouble and need help. For any other hedgehogs the best advice is to call a local hedgehog rehabilitator, they know the local conditions, but please, if possible, weigh the hedgehog before contacting a rescue centre as the weight helps them give the best advice.

It is not just the cold that is a problem for hedgehogs at this time of year but also the wet. They need a dry place to make their nests and dry bedding with which to make the nest. Providing dry bedding eg leaves – perhaps in a compost bag – will help them make a cosy nest. Also protecting their food with a feeding station means they can feed in the dry.

If you need advice or find a sick or injured hedgehog your local contact from Warwickshire Hedgehog Rescue is Christina Sherman (612277). 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
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
