Easter - the best news ever!

They had watched him die. Hanging from a cross, nails in hands and feet, gasping for air, they had heard him call out with the last bit of energy he could muster, *"It is finished!"* He was dead., really dead.

I have spent much time recalling the events of that first Easter morning because I want us all to grasp the wonder of the whole event, the message of the angel telling the disciples that the man they saw crucified is alive, the joy that filled the women who previously had been so sad, filled with so much disappointment, so confused and disillusioned. The words of the angel had instantly made a change in their lives; their whole outlook on who Jesus was and what he achieved was reversed; their fear of death had been changed to hope.

The resurrection is not something that just happened 2000 years ago. It has changed the way we look at life today. It has changed the way we look at the *future*.

The greatest threat we face in the future is death. The fear of death controls our life much more than we realize. This fear can dictate what we eat, what activities we engage in, where we live. The fear of death makes us attentive to every ache and pain in our body. But the resurrection of Jesus takes the 'teeth' out of death. Easter shows us that there is life beyond the grave. Death is no longer a giant ... it is a mere blip on the screen of eternity. Jesus' return from the grave allows us to face death with new confidence. We understand now that death is a passing from life in this world to life in eternity. Nothing more.

What will happen to Christians when they die is certain. Unlike a football game when the outcome is unknown even right up to the last minutes of the game. There may be some doubt as to what paths our life may take. We may even have to face many fearful things, but the end of the game of life is not in doubt. We know who will be the winners. The future is certain and sealed for us.

The resurrection is not something that just happened 2000 years ago. It has changed the way we look at the *past*.

Does your past haunt you? Do you worry that God knows what you are really like – that he knows your secret thoughts and desires and that one day he is going to ask you to explain? Are there some past deeds that you feel God would have a hard time forgiving? Do you fear that some of your past decisions will come back to get you? If so, you are not alone.

But Easter has good news for us all. Our Saviour is a *living* saviour. The risen Jesus has promised that he would walk with his disciples all of their days in this life. He will be with us in our fears. He gives us courage when our knees would buckle. He brings new life, rekindles hope, sustains us and recreates us in circumstances that would seem to be the most hopeless.

The women went to the tomb of Jesus on Easter morning, sad, depressed, confused, red-eyed and grieving. They ran back excited and joyful. Easter had changed them and it can change you!



One of the highlights of last month was our Lent Lunches. There was as we have come to expect a delicious selection of soup, breads and cheese and a real buzz as we chatted round the tables, many thanks to everyone who supported the lunches especially the hosts and cooks. Inside our church building we topped and tailed March with special services, starting by celebrating Mothering Sunday on 6th March with posies - thanks to Rose Allington, great music from Kate, Alice and Rory and a playdough challenge from Rev Nikki. She asked us to make something which symbolised love and family and there was a wonderful selection from hearts. rings and homes to a cup of tea, a bandage and even a rose chosen because "love makes us bloom". The end of the month it was Easter. As I write we are just at the start of Easter Week but by the time you read this, we will have been through the cycle of remembering Jesus as a celebrated leader on Palm Sunday, a humble man about to be betrayed at the Last Supper, a despised and suffering one on the cross on Good Friday and then alive again and offering everyone a new beginning on Easter Sunday. We thank Revs. Craig, Nikki and Ann for leading our Easter services; Bill, Kate and the choir for the special music on Good Friday and the flower arrangers for their wonderful displays - which were joined this year by Easter gardens made by some of the Year 2 pupils from St James School, Southam.

Homegroup continues to meet once a fortnight alternating each month between Wednesdays and Thursdays so that people with commitments on one of those evenings can join us on the other one - the actual dates are in the Ladbroke Diary just before this article. Our annual church meetings are on Wednesday 27th April. There is a short one when everyone in the parish, church goer or not, votes in the church wardens and then the main meeting at which the annual accounts are presented, the previous year reviewed, the PCC is elected plus any other business that those present wish to raise. Forms to join the church's electoral roll and nomination forms for churchwardens and the PCC are available on the table near the font but even if you do not wish to commit yourself in this way please, come along to the meetings and support those who help keep Ladbroke Church going.

Last year we had a soft start to a fund raising campaign, called All Saints For All Generations as that's what we want to ensure - this beautiful Grade 1 listed building standing for generations to come. And not just for those who come Sunday by Sunday but for everyone who sees it as a location for traditional events like the village carol service and weddings; special events like concerts and exhibitions; for those who appreciate it as a historical place to visit or just part of the view as they walk around Ladbroke. The repairs funded mainly by the grant we were awarded last year will be starting in a few weeks time so it's essential to step up raising money for the next phases, expected to cost a further £250,000. The PCC doesn't have the skills, contacts or time to fund-raise sums of this magnitude, therefore we are seeking people to form a specific All Saints For All Generations fund raising team. If you think you have the time and enthusiasm to be part of this group or even better, the talents and contacts to lead it or if you can suggest people we can approach, please speak with Rev Craig or contact Jackie by email: ladbrokechurch89@btinternet.com or phone 810331. These people do not need to be church goers or even live in Ladbroke, just to support the goal of having the church building here for the benefit of our own and future generations.



Here are the main points from the Parish Council meeting on 9th March. As usual, the formal minutes by the clerk will go up on the noticeboard by the pub and the village website, **www.ladbroke-pc.org.uk**

Neighbourhood Watch - our NW co-ordinator now has a pen for marking items with your postcode, so if you missed the session run by the police last year and want to mark bikes, garden equipment, tools etc please contact Jim Laidler.

Defibrillator - The equipment and the case are now here and will go on the wall of the Village Hall soon, together with additional external lighting.

Goods Vehicle Licence - the application for The Barn, Ladbroke Hill Lane had been approved with the condition that access/egress is via Radbourne Lane only.

Neighbourhood Plan - Following the well attended meeting about this, only one person had volunteered which is insufficient to take it forward.

Planning - There was no objection to a new agricultural building for cattle isolation pens and feed store at Folly Fields Farm. SDC had approved treeworks on sycamores at Ladbroke Hall and demolition of a conservatory and construction of the single storey extension at The Willows in Radbourne Lane.

Proposed development just south of Galanos House - Clir Neal had attended the exhibition on this which seemed to be testing the water of local opinion ahead of an application for outline planning permission for more than 200 new homes. You can view and feedback on the two options, one of which includes a burial ground, at http://www.framptons-planning.com/ portfolio/item/land-east-of-banbury-road-southam/ but formal comments can only be made when planning permission is sought.

Highways and Footpaths - Concerns had been raised again about large containers on the back of lorries being driven through the village and on the road to Deppers Bridge, damaging the roadside when large vehicles pass, and also about burning of waste on a local farm. Formal complaints about the latter need to be reported immediately to the SDC enforcement officer.

Flooding and Drainage - Flooding on the road near the church was raised around Christmas time and some remedial work was done. We are still awaiting the second stage to fix problems by the field entrance - thought to be due to tree roots - and once that is resolved any remaining problems in that area e.g. on the other side of the road, will be raised.

Following the exceptionally hard rain the night before the meeting, the A423 had flooded at Radbourne Lane and near the layby the road was impassable for a while. Our councillors wondered if the drainage here needed looking at further but were reminded the part near the layby will be rebuilt as part of HS2. The only local flooding inside properties (known to those present) was in the entrance and toilet area of the Village Hall but it had been a close thing for several homes near the brook. This emphasised the need to press on with property level protection now and not wait for some possible improved solution in the vague future as is being suggested by the authorities.

Village Hall and Millennium Green - The Village Hall trustees thanked the Parish Council for their grant of £1500 towards the new roof which proved very effective in keeping out rain the previous night. There will be a film night on Friday 15th April and a *Live and Local* music event on Saturday 7th May.

Broadband - a new cabinet has been installed in Southam so some householders may be able to get increased speed.

SDC - The SDC part of council tax will increase by 3.17% (allowed to be more than 2% without a referendum, as it is the first increase in five years and still very low compared to others). Senior management is being reorganised - the Chief Executive is being made redundant with his responsibilities being picked up by two people at lower level. However with

redundancy pay etc. this will cost more in the short term, though should save significant sums over five years.

WCC - The WCC part of council tax is expected to rise by 3.9% mainly due to the rising cost of adult and children's care due to increases in the minimum wage and changes in legislation. HS2 Ltd have reorganised their management structure and Ladbroke is now in the Southam sector; the third reading of the bill was before Easter.



Annual Village Meeting, Wednesday 13th April

The Parish Council hold an Annual Meeting each Spring to review and summarise events from the previous 12 months. As well as Council Reports there will be updates from a range of village organisations. This year's meeting will be on Wednesday 13th April, 7.30pm in the Village Hall.

After our AGM where the existing Committee was re-elected, we had a wonderfully enlightening talk by Archie Pitts on the £1.1m proposal to improve the Pump Room Gardens and refurbish the Bandstand.

Local Authorities now have no obligation or money to do this themselves.

The Gardens are 200 years old and showing their age. Learnington Society has worked with Warwick DC since 2008 to secure grants to fund improvements. Only $2\frac{1}{2}$ of the original 8 Linden Arches were left so these were the first task. Warwick DC put in £40K and the volunteers raised the rest - £80K and the Arches were finished in 2012.

The heyday of Bandstands was from the 1850's to WW11 (there were 1100 in the country and now about 600 are left). Our Bandstand is the focal point of the Gardens and the best of only four MacFarlane type remaining.

But it is crumbling, with parts broken, railings missing, additions made to improve stability and the basement storage area sealed off and the floor held up with Acroprops!

It is not just the Bandstand that the Society is going to fix with its £1M+ Lottery grant, but the whole gardens, which have quite severe drainage problems.

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The Gardens are underlain by nonporous clay giving a naturally high water table. The fall of the gardens is from the river to the Linden Walk. Excess rain or flood water has nowhere for to go – it can only evaporate. The solution will be to install a Swale in the "Rain Garden", to temporarily hold the water. The Clay soil will be broken up and decompacted and a porous drainage system will then also be installed.

Other works include new railings in a Late Victorian style which will be put



up to protect the grass and provide a barrier along the riverside as Health and Safety demands. The paths will be surfaced with bonded gravel and tarmac stabilised with a blue brick edging.

So by the Peace Festival in 2017, Learnington will have its Gardens improved and a splendid refurbished Bandstand. The public will benefit from the new activities and events held there. Warwick DC promises to maintain all of this for the next ten years and must gain Green Flag Status for the Gardens to boot.

Sleeping Beauty Review (5 stars)

I couldn't believe my luck when, out of the blue, I got a telephone call from the Producer Brian Wade asking me to do the critique for the Harbury Theatre Group's Pantomime! This was going to be their first production on the new stage and I couldn't wait to be in the first night audience to see it before my very eyes. When I arrived immediately my eyes were drawn to the stage area and the new blue curtains and pelmet. Then ahead of me I saw the sound and lighting desk awash with new technology. Everyone had a black t-shirt on with Harbury Theatre Group on it and the Village Hall had been transformed into a rather professional theatre! I was told by Gordon Robbins that all the main actors were wearing wireless microphones. Well that was me made up!

There is always a level of expectation before the curtains are drawn back, by the audience, to see what the set is going to look like. On this occasion we had Alan and Betty Barr sat upon their thrones as the King and Queen to get the ball rolling. Then on came the Fairies! And with that came the difficulty of writing my notes with tears dripping out of my eyes! I will never be able to look at a string vest and a tutu in the same way ever again! Emily Jackson's entrance as Poison Ivy was suitably evil with a laugh that made my spine shiver most horribly. Her cackle bounced off the back of the hall and the audience gave as much as they got.

Pantomime is a wonderful craft that blends both adult and child humour seamlessly and tonight made no exception. Onto the stage came the Harbury Theatre Group Juniors who sang and danced to 'Wake Up It's A Beautiful Morning.' They all had good strong vocals and harmonies as well.

Another part of pantomime is the Dame and Chris Barber as Marigold was wonderful. Playing the Dame is not an easy one. It can make or break a pantomime. All I can say is that some people are born to certain roles and Chris was brilliant. *Her* costumes were extraordinary and *her* way with the audience was superb. Then the audience joined in to 'Always Look On The Bright Side Of Life.' Chris Beaton, as Andy (Hi Andy!), came on to the stage with his Fruit Batmobile where the jokes came thick and fast.

Once more we were treated to the Fairies, with a fabulous rolled down back drop, and some very funny ad-libs too! Prince Rupert (Will Jones) came on with his servant Maurice (John Travis) with one of the funniest French accents I have heard since watching 'Allo 'Allo as a child! Baskerville, the Dog, played by Abigail Banbury was sensational. In acting the trick is be moving all of the time and she made Baskerville my Best in Show if we are talking Crufts here. Then we were treated to the HTG Juniors with a song all about celebrating good times. And one of them had the longest pony tails I have ever seen! One of the best lines was when the Dame arrived on stage with a new hair style and it was heard said, 'that looks like an explosion in a candy floss factory!'

Princess Snowdrop (Jo Banbury) was rather streetwise and spent her opening scenes busy on her smart phone which shows just how much this form of technology has taken over our lives. Operation Jam Tart was Sleeping Beauty's answer to the Great British Bake Off. This was where things got wonderfully messy and I had to hold myself back from joining in. After seeing that *show stopper* (or was it their *signature dish*?) we had the song 'Nine 'Til Five' to take us to the interval!

After a swift rub down with an oily rag and some refreshments I sat down ready for the second half. My face had only just stopped aching from part one. We had a new set with the chaise longue! It's over 50 years since there was a special celebration event in the Village Hall, so it's probably time that villagers should have the opportunity to witness the tremendous strides which have been made in the intervening time and especially in the last few years. The **Open Day** on 16th April promises to provide all visitors with a day to remember, especially since it has been confirmed that the Lord Lieutenant for Warwickshire will officially open the new extension with its stage and changing rooms. There will be displays in the hall showing aspects of the activities for which hirers use the hall and there will also be short demonstrations on the stage from groups which train youngsters and adults in various leisure pursuits, including the theatre and dance.

It promises to be an enjoyable experience with plenty to see and appreciate, including perhaps the bacon rolls / sausage baps / samosas which are on offer along with a hot drink for the princely sum of £1.50. It's hard to guess how many people will turn up to have a 'brunch', but members of the village hall committees and GASS will continue to provide the fare until supplies run out.

One of the lasting mementoes of the day will be the unveiling of the plaque by the Lord Lieutenant, which will sit between two display plaques, explaining a short history of the Village Hall. The text included below has been researched by using documents preserved in the Harbury Heritage Room, including all the old minute books and articles from newspapers covering the period from the late 1950's when the idea for a community hall was first proposed. The display plaques, which will be a permanent feature of the hall, show the increasing size of the building using coded layouts to show each of the main developments since 1962.

'The need for a Village Hall in Harbury was very apparent on the occasion of the celebrations in the village marking the Coronation of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth 11 on 2nd June 1953. Inclement weather made the planned outdoor function impracticable and the Wight School was found to be very inadequate.

A small group of people started the movement to raise funds for the building of a hall. In 1962 with the help of substantial grants from the Ministry of Education and Warwickshire County Council, the Village Hall was built and officially opened by Mr John Profumo M.P. O.B.E on 24th March 1962.

After the opening of the main hall with its pitched roof was opened, it wasn't long before the committee of the day started discussions in 1966 to extend the building at the south and west ends to provide the Farley, Windmill and Fosse rooms and an extended kitchen. As before, funds were sought from voluntary donations, a regular tote, as well as from the profits from bingo, tombola and the Harbury Fete, which was organised by the village hall committee. The first 'Buy a Brick' idea was introduced at the Fete (now the Carnival) in 1973 and a 200 Club started with 152 members from the village community.

The flat roofed extension, opened in 1974 was funded partly by the popular monthly dances and the on-going fund-raising involving many of the organisations which used the hall, whilst a personal guarantor covered the outstanding debt secured against the loan from the local council.

Within ten years, the committee decided to create a sloping roof to replace the flat roof on the extension, which was prone to leaking and the Parish Council offered to cover the balance of the costs incurred by the building work. In the eighties and nineties general maintenance was the watchword, before the storage heating system was installed and some improvements made to the existing ladies toilets.

Until the Millennium, no further modernisation was considered and the hall became very dated. Plans gradually evolved to improve the building, as grants from various sources were more forth-coming and after the second 'Buy a Brick' initiative was implemented, committee members successfully applied to the local council (SDC-Southam Vision) for the creation of a new toilet block. In 2010 a grant from Veolia Environmental Trust funded internal roof repairs and added effective insulation, whilst Ford Britain Trust financed new rear doors and CAMRA created the sliding doors between two of the meeting rooms to create the Veolia Suite in memory of John Ridgley. Almost each year between 2011 and 2014, the village hall was granted funding to purchase the solar panels (Awards for All), modernise the kitchen (WREN), develop new hatches (SDC) and finally to achieve the long hoped-for modern changing rooms (BiffaAward) and permanent stage in the new extension (Veolia Environmental Trust). Today the village hall has become 'fit for the 21st Century', which was an avowed aim of committee members who wished to continue the vision of a community building which would serve its residents for years to come'.

As with all matters in connection with the hall, nothing ever stays the same for long and a new fire alarm system has been fitted and the Health and Safety regulations updated on the village hall part of the Harbury Parish Council web -site. There has also been a recent stock-take of all the crockery, cutlery and kitchen utensils and whilst the majority of items still remain in the cupboards some appear to have gone 'walkabout' or been lost?? If, however, anyone finds any crockery which may have emanated from the hall, an amnesty is always in place for anything to be returned!!

As a final footnote about Harbury's **Celebration Day**, please look out for information on the village notice-boards about the timing of various parts of the day, as the Lord Lieutenant, as well as the Chair of Warwickshire County Council, will be visiting Biblio's first before being transported on to the village hall by the e-cars. As part of the recognition of all the community activities which Harbury does so well, it was felt that Biblio's, e-cars and the village hall improvements should all feature in the Celebration Day. It will be a day to remember, so put it in the diary and we look forward to seeing you.



Horticultural Society

Almost 40 of us enjoyed the last meeting in March when Adrian James made a very welcome return visit. His talk was entitled A Garden from Scratch. We charted his progress when he moved from Kidderminster to the lovely village of Offenham near Evesham. He and his wife Sheila, more of whom later, opened their garden in Kidderminster for the NGS but it became too cramped for the number of visitors they were receiving. So they began to look for a property with a blank canvass. They found a suitable property with almost an acre of garden at the side and back of the house. It had been agricultural land and the previous owner had trained dogs, hence no plants as it had never been a garden.

They moved 5 van loads of plants, pots, troughs, a greenhouse which had been dismantled, compost bags and much more. Adrian did a design to have fruit, vegetables, a rill and borders. There was a huge 40 foot conifer hedge at the edge of the property and this was the first thing to be tackled after getting permission to do so. They were all taken down and the roots dug out and the land instantly looked lighter and bigger. A lot of chippings were put to good use. A huge willow tree was also taken out with the help of the local tree surgeon. The trunk was dug out by hand by Sheila and a damson tree was revealed which has borne much fruit. The dry stone walls were in a bad state and again Sheila discovered a new skill and set about restoring these. They did have help initially from Adrian's stepson and daughter-in-law, but mostly it was the two of them who developed the garden. Adrian, who is a brilliant photographer also still works full-time, but it is a credit to both of them that the transformation was completed in about a year and a half.

In September 2009 the wooden greenhouse was erected, and the only damage suffered was just one pane of glass. In January of 2010 there was a lot of snow and work was halted for a while. Raised beds were put in place and a beech hedge planted. Then in April a polytunnel was put up and lots of seedlings brought on and much more. Paths were then started to be laid and work started on the rill which has lovely calm planting on either side. By August, Adrian started to build retaining walls with curves, nothing easy! The garden was by now starting to take shape and plants beginning to spread out. Fruit trees had been planted and these too now bear much fruit. By the next year in February there were banks of snowdrops and primroses and a seating area was made and some more paths put in place. Lots of scented plants are used and there are huge drifts of colourful combinations.

A huge platform was built so that you can see the garden from above and this too was done by Adrian. He has water butts all around the garden and at the last count he had 37, which are used to water plants most nights in the summer. There are some lovely pots at the side of the rill, climbers trailing over various arches and now there is a romantic border. It is still evolving with little rooms and colour all through the year. A local sculptor and glass worker has made some lovely installations which sit in the rill and are lit at night, very spectacular. The garden has been open for the NGS since 2014 and over 3 days they had over a thousand visitors. We saw a photo of a group of visitors on one of the open days and a very miserable lady in the background was so funny! The garden is amazing and will be open again in August this year. How they have achieved so much in a really short space of time is truly remarkable. In addition they had the house updated, gluttons for punishment! Adrian answered questions after the talk and everyone said how they enjoyed the evening.

No one spotted the deliberate mistake last month regarding dates for our day trips. The first one is on Thursday 16th June (and not 15th as stated) when we will visit Hanbury Hall and Gardens, near Droitwich, in the morning then on to Spetchley Park Gardens near Worcester in the afternoon. Both of these have superb gardens and well worth visiting. The cost is £25 and we leave the Village Hall at 9.30am and Spetchley at 6.00pm and will be back in about an hour. The second one is an all day trip to Sherborne Castle and Gardens where there is a Capability Brown exhibition to mark the 300 years since his birth. The gardens and the castle are amazing and the cost for this is only £26.50. Leave Village Hall at 8.30am and Sherborne at 5.00pm. If anyone wants a good day out, being driven there and back, and excellent value do please contact me as unfortunately the trips are not very well subscribed this year and it would be lovely to welcome some new faces, I look forward to hearing from you.

Here are a few suggestions for visits in April, all NGS so a very worthwhile cause. On Sunday 10th there are 2 gardens open in Stretton on Fosse not far from here, from 2.00 to 6.00pm and the cost is £6. Bridge Nursery near Napton is open each Thursday to Sunday from 14th April for the NGS scheme from 10.00am to 4.00pm and cost is only £2.50 plus tea. Don't forget that this is one of the nurseries who lets us have discount so please do go along and give your support. On Saturday 16th Bretforton Manor near Evesham post code WR 11 7JA will be open from 11.00am to 4.00pm and cost is £6. Lots to see and enjoy here; it has been recently redesigned and has many interesting features including stocks and a cider barn. Kiftsgate Court near Chipping Campden will open for NGS on Monday 11th April from 2.00 to 6.00pm and cost is £8. This garden is home to the famous Kiftsgate rose and is gardened entirely by lady gardeners of 3 generations. For something nostalgic the garden of the late Rosemary Verey at Barnsley House near Cirencester, post code GL7 5EE, will be open on Tuesday 12th April from 10.00am to 4.30pm and the cost is £5.50. Lastly (do I hear a sigh of relief!) there will be 10 gardens open in Blockley near Moreton in Marsh post code, GL56 9DB, on Sunday 24th from 2.00 to 6.00pm and cost is £6. Mill Dene garden which we visited a few years ago is one of the gardens featured. Blockley is a lovely village with a stream flowing through it. All of the gardens mentioned have teas too.

The next meeting is on Tuesday 5th April at the Tom Hauley room at 8.00pm when Roger Umpleby will be talking about weeds, useful, beautiful but unloved. Then the last meeting of this season will be on Tuesday 3rd May when Helen Picton who recently got married, will be visiting us again and this time her talk is entitled Old Court Nurseries, a potted History. It is her family's nursery and is of course well known for the collection of asters and she will be bringing along plants for sale. So a lot to look forward to and enjoy. I hope to see everyone at the meetings. Do come along if you are new to the village or have not been to a meeting before, we have an excellent talk followed by a brilliant raffle and refreshments. Enjoy the lighter evenings and dare I say warmer weather.




Garden Jottings from Bridge Nursery Christine Dakin

Have you noticed how much established native hedging has been removed recently? It seems that whenever I drive anywhere these days there are more and more hawthorn and blackthorn cut down to the ground. It used to be farmers who were accused of destroying hedges but now its all in the name of 'progress' for all the new housing estates being put up by developers. Certainly the birds will suffer; there will be fewer nesting sites for them. But these places also offer the right environment for many creatures. Okay, the developers will probably plant some new shrubs (or maybe they won't) but in the meantime what will happen to all this wildlife? This is where you can help....plant some evergreen shrubs of your own and think twice before removing trees and shrubs from your garden especially at this time of year.

Busy time of the year ahead.....

Weeds need removing....sow radish, spinach, and lettuce....sow runner beans, cucumber and courgettes in a greenhouse.....put stakes round some of the taller growing perrenials, if the soil has warmed up try using nematodes to control slugs, there are likely to be plenty this year....even the smallest garden can have some alpine plants and they are easy to grow.

On Monday 21st March the morning was clear and sunny as I walked up Mill Street for the daily paper. Squinting into the low sun, my cap tipped forward as a visor, I heard several jackdaws squabbling before I saw the birds. They were inspecting a chimney pot as a potential nest site. They are the smallest of our crows which are all part of the family Corvidae. The jackdaw's ash grey head makes it instantly recognisable.

With high pressure and continental weather due to give way to more traditional rain-bearing clouds from the west by the end of the week, the outdoors beckoned. However the U3A Natural History Group had booked the Tom Hauley Room and lined up Graham Robson to show us his latest DVD. This was entitled 'Wildlife around Marton 2015' and showed a cornucopia of species with excellent photography and commentary. Rarities included the Turtle Dove and Avocet but the main message was the stunning variety of wildlife that can be seen close to home. The DVD is available priced £10 from Graham - call 01926 632260. Income is donated to Myton Hospice. Since starting making films eight years ago Graham has raised £15,000.

Sharon and I have recently been privileged to have a holiday in Malta. With the temperature approaching 20C we saw butterflies on the wing including Painted Lady (Cynthia cardui). This insect can survive in frost free environments south of the Alps. We only see them here from May onwards when the population explodes in the Mediterranean basin.

We went by ferry to the smaller island of Gozo and visited the UNESCO World Heritage site at Dwjra. Here, the Tertiary era sedimentary rock on the coast has weathered into sea caves, tunnels, arches and stacks. These rocks were laid down some 24 million years ago and abound with fossil sea urchins and bivalves. Offshore is an island known as Fungus Rock. Here a strange plant can be found growing . It appears to be a fungus but is in fact a parasitic flowering plant. It has no chlorophyll and relies on its host such as Tamarisk for nutrients. It had a wide variety of uses in European, Arabic and Chinese herbal medicine. DNA suggests it is related to Stonecrops. Its Latin name is Cynomarium coccineus. Google will tell you more.

Cycling back from Southam today (Wednesday 23rd March) I stopped by Bascote Wood and took a short stroll along its southern edge. Plenty of Bluebell leaves but just two flowers. Soon it will be a glorious sea of blue. Dog's Mercury was in flower and plenty of Primroses. In the hedge were a fine group of Wood Anemones. Some hedgerow hawthorn is leafing up and sticky buds unfurling to reveal small, pale green Horse Chestnut leaves. With increasing daylight and some warmth, winter is in retreat.

Last year Trish and Brian Harrison found a perfect Woodcock on their patio. Possibly it had become disorientated by the work in Harbury cutting and flown into a window. After debate I took the dead bird to a taxidermist at Ebrington. The good news is that another Woodcock, very much alive, has been seen at Harbury Spoilbank Nature Reserve. More reports please.

The petition is an important part of the campaign to retain the community pharmacy network, particularly in rural areas, as many older patients would find it extremely difficult to travel to the nearest town in order to obtain a prescription.

The Pharmacy in Harbury has become a vital part of the village services and the two pharmacists who operate the prescription service are highly regarded for their efforts in ensuring that all patients have a speedy response to any request. Suresh and Manesh have become a by-word amongst villagers for their efficient service and the manner in which they attend to the concerns of anyone who needs further explanation about the medicines they are taking. Their concern for their customers is paramount and the friendly atmosphere engendered in the shop makes a visit there a pleasurable experience.

Getting to mental health clinics, doctors, dental & optician appointments really makes a difference. Living in rural parts of south Warwickshire transport is both costly and infrequent therefore e-Wheels has been a lifeline. Thank you for all you do and the difference you have made in lives."

Dear Chairman

Re Proposed Alteration to the Bus Route

I read with some concern the article published in the March edition of the Harbury and Ladbroke News concerning the alteration of the bus route in Harbury. I was led to believe that proper consultation would be conducted but understand that the only consultation appears to be the response to the article in the Harbury and Ladbroke News. Please note that not everybody reads this publication and many bus users who come to Harbury, come from outside the village and will, therefore, not be aware of the proposals at all.

I acknowledge, as someone who lives on Farm Street, that I'm open to a charge of "nimbyism"; however nothing could be further from the truth. My concerns are for the good of the village in general.

As to my reasons for the objection:

Firstly, I think it absolutely essential that the bus should pass through the centre of the village for the benefit of the shops and pubs situated in the

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middle of the village. It seems quite obvious to me that moving the bus stop to the cemetery would impact on all the shops. The finances of all village businesses are always difficult and if we were to lose any of them then Harbury would be so much the poorer. The current layby is solely dedicated to the use of the buses whereas the layby at the cemetery is often used by people tending graves and by funeral directors when conducting burials and interments.

Secondly, Park Lane is often used to park a large number of cars at the beginning and the end of the school day and throughout Saturday mornings for well over 150m making passage by car, and certainly by bus, difficult in the extreme. The cemetery layby is also very close to the sharp bend and visibility is not good at all.

Thirdly, Farm Street is far from ideal for the passage of buses. On-street parking during the day and particularly at the end of and beginning of each day and in the evenings is very prevalent. This is particularly so that the north end and on many occasions I have had to reverse to allow someone turning into Farm Street from Binswood End to proceed up the hill. At other times, cars have to wait half across Binswood End if more than one is trying to enter Farm Street. The terraced houses at this point have no alternative parking facilities. This hill is often icy in winter and the visibility there is very limited. During muck spreading and silage making, Farm Street is used by large tractors and trailers making two-way traffic difficult. The farmers would have no alternative route whereas the buses do.

I fully acknowledge that Chapel Street also suffers problems but it I cannot see, in the light of the issues set out above, that changing the route will not have any other effect but to just transfer the problems and, if anything, exacerbate them.

Having lived in the village for 33 years, I have only admiration for the way the Parish Council has conducted itself and I have every confidence that the councillors will approach this issue as they appear to have done so in the past. I would merely urge caution here and request that prior to any decision being made, if indeed that involves an element of change, proper consultation takes place and due consideration is given to the views of all those who respond.

Re proposed changes to the bus route

Vulnerable members of the community waiting for the bus at an isolated spot will not be able to access help as readily, as there is nowhere close for them to seek assistance. If there are any difficulties with regard to personal safety, Mill Street has shops open till late and there are pubs nearby, so there is a continuous public presence in the later hours.

I would not like my old mother or my young daughter to wait for the bus on a dark evening at an isolated spot where there would be few passers-by. The buses can be late and occasionally may not turn up, so it would not be good place to be waiting for a long time. The centre of the village is well lit and shop-keepers / publicans are on hand to provide assistance if needed.

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

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
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
