In the last week of April we had our annual meetings and started a renewed focus on our *All Saints for all generations* campaign. Finally, if you want to get any photogenic pictures of the church in the next few months please take them by 22nd May before the repairs, supported by the Government's Roof Repair Fund grant, start. Whilst these are happening there may be limited access to the inside of the church during the week, but services will not be affected.

Ladbroke Annual Village Meeting

Welcoming approximately 20 villagers to the meeting, Derek Batty, Chairman of Ladbroke Parish Council reminded us that it was the 120th anniversary of Ladbroke Parish Council, it having first met in 1896. He thanked Jane Cove for being the parish clerk for the last 8 years and introduced Kirsty Buttle our

new clerk. We have four Parish Councillors, that is Derek plus Val Copley, Martin Neal and Phil Maffey and if anyone is interested in joining them we are allowed five so one more person could be co-opted.

Neighbourhood Watch - It had been a quiet year crime-wise, the marking session in the pub car park had marked over 400 items and if anyone had further items to be marked and wished to borrow the marking set they should contact Jim Laidler.

HS2 Action Group - as planned, the Ladbroke Action Group had formally finished and its funds distributed to the Alibone Trust, Village Hall and Millennium Green.

Parish Council - Our precept is £5,000 and the expenses were mainly for the clerk, street lights, insurance and grants to the village hall. The cost of the defibrillator was met by a grant. The ongoing saga and frustration regarding flood prevention had continued; £50,000 was allocated to Ladbroke but the balancing pond is not being progressed. Property level assessments were conducted last year and eventually reported but are considered "hardly worth the paper they were written on" and it was ironic that the only place that flooded a few weeks ago - the village hall - was not assessed! The council are seeking full details of the suggested new culvert that we are told will remove all but three properties from flood risk for £65,000. WCC Councillor, Bob Stevens is also asking for accurate costs and identification of a source for the additional £15,000, hopefully we will get the infomation by the May meeting of the Parish Council.

There had been a meeting about having a Neighbourhood Plan but as only one volunteer came forward this is not being progressed. The last housing needs survey was in 2008 so another is due but not being progressed at present. Over the last year the council considered a number of planning applications for trees, new homes, conversions and extensions within the parish and for major developments beyond our boundaries. The defibrillator was obtained. The Parish Council have been involved with HS2 activities, particularly since the local action group finished and Derek has five memory sticks with the content of the Hybrid Bill updates (five pallets of paper documents were refused!). The Bill is expected to go through the House of Lords by Christmas and work to start in 2017.

WCC - Bob Stevens has been our councillor since 1992 and last year was the chairman so had additional civic duties including citizenship ceremonies. He reported that local government is changing, with more responsibilities but less money. Some changes such as Harbury Library being run by volunteers have been a success but there is a limit to how far council and volunteer resources can stretch. Bob was also concerned about proposals for a West Midland Unitary Authority as this does nothing for rural districts and he consistently votes against it. The SDC Core Strategy had been agreed with the inspector, so future housing developments not included in it are less likely.

SDC - see points on previous page.

Alibone Charity - this distributes funds from renting out two fields off Radbourne Lane. Half of the money goes to the church and the non-ecclesiastical trustees gave grants to the Village Hall towards the AV system and new roof. After many years as the clerk, Geoff Lane retired and Mike Todman took up the role.

Church - Rev Craig started by saying that the church was not just for those that attend but for the whole community. Highlights last year included the Garden Party at The Old Rectory, the Clearance Sale at Sarah's Cottage, Heritage Open Days and Beer and Carols. The lowlight was having part of the roof stolen, though prompt detection by Betty and a tarp organised by Mark Teverson prevented the organ below being damaged. Craig thinks ours is a cracking church (in the best sense of the word), though it does need £250,000 for repairs too, so is looking to access and tap into people who can help - big hitters and big ideas, as well as the smaller ones. Craig finished his report by thanking us for being the people and village we are.

Village Hall and Millennium Green - Although two separate charities they have the same three trustees and one team - Ladbroke Matters - that maintains both and organises fund raising events. New members on the team are always welcome.

The HS2 action group, Alibone Trust, Parish Council, Tracy Lochhead and Allan Ballard were thanked for their support towards the new roof and improving the facilities at the Village Hall which hosts regular film nights (with great food thanks to the cooks), table tennis (more members welcome) and is hired by other groups and for parties etc as well as one off fund raising events like the Race Night, Quiz and Christmas Party (thanks to Clive and Angie Coleman).

On the Millennium Green the hedge had been laid, slabs in the play area relaid, the trim trail uprights stabilised and there was a new gate to make it more accessible (supplied by WCC but requiring a lot of hard work by volunteers to install). The labyrinth will be recut this year and when the fruit trees start yielding fruit in future this can be picked by villagers. The next Millennium Green working party will be on 14th May - all welcome.

WI - This is buoyant with 27 members and although the meeting day has changed to the first Thursday of the month, they enjoy the same varied programme of speakers, craft evenings and visits plus opportunities to join in activities and trips organised at area, county and national level.

Photography Club - this meets monthly, usually the first Tuesday. In the last year it has enjoyed talks, competitions, trips, meals and seeing new equipment. The club encourages visitors and guests and new members at every skill level. If you need further incentive, delicious cake is provided by one of the members.

Whist - Last year there were 36 whist drives with over six tables each time. Popularity has increased now the Village Hall is warmer and six new members from Banbury have decreased the average age.

Bell Ringers - It has been a good year. Mike Rigby the trainer from Lighthorne attends and the seven regulars are grateful to Don Darkes who steps in if they are short. The team are always looking to recruit more members. This year there were repairs on the 3rd bell, the cost of which was kept down by the ringers assisting.



Ladbroke & Deppers Bridge Women's Institute Carol Lane

At our April meeting on Thursday 7th Ruth Smith involved us in her knowledge and expertise about life as a housekeeper in a Victorian household.

Her interest in this topic came as a result of talking to her grandmother who held that position from an early age, from a book which was in the possession of her husband's mother and from her own experience of family recollections.

Lizzie, her grandmother, started her working life as a maid and quickly gained experience and, when the opportunity arose, was promoted to housekeeper. Even at a young age, she must have been highly thought of, as she was loaned to the household of a bank manager as that family, having 7 children under the age of 9, were not coping. The older among us could almost smell the 'Napisan' buckets which would have been in great evidence with so many young children.

Ruth referred to the cookery books which were used at that time and we were amazed that anyone should bother to catch, pluck and remove the insides of 12 sparrows and larks (should you be able to find that many larks these days) to make a pie. We chose not to hear the recipe for cod's heads as none of us thought we would need it!

In the days before refrigeration, charcoal powder would be dusted over meat and poultry which had already 'gone off' to draw out the toxins before it was cooked and eaten.

When the household had no more need of the housekeeper, Lizzie was offered an apprenticeship in anything she chose, so she became a dressmaker.

Because there was so much more labour needed to run a house then, for example the endless stream of coal buckets needed to be taken to upstairs bedrooms, many fairly modest establishments employed servants. Although it was hard work, the life of a servant could be quite acceptable with the right employer.

The speakers were very good, especially Heather Jacks who won the Great Sewing Bee and Steve Brookes from CWR who gave us some excellent gardening tips (Dianne now has a tip to keep cats from misusing your garden if you ask her!)



- Avoid food waste, address food poverty. The WI calls on all supermarkets to sign up to a voluntary agreement to avoid food waste, thereby passing surplus food on to charities thus helping to address the issue of increasing food poverty in the UK.

We had a real taste of the work of a professional photographer at our April meeting. Russell Griffiths has 32 years' experience, first as a part-time trainee wedding photographer, then a full-time employee and studio manager. He and his wife, Donna, set up Prestige Photography in Shirley in 1989 and they now specialise in portrait, wedding and commercial photography with a large studio for portraits and pets. His images of families just made you want to smile, but the seemingly informal - even haphazard - groups were actually carefully arranged (technical tip: try to arrange them to make triangular shapes). Weddings have been a staple of the business and they have now covered some five thousand ceremonies. The move to digital cameras has had a liberating

effect. In the days of film cameras they would take about fifty photographs at a wedding, mainly of groups. Now they can take hundreds of shots so

there is scope, not only for groups, but also for still life subjects, action shots and other ways to catch the romance and fun of the occasion (tip: be quick, don't let people get bored).

Their commercial photography covers a variety of subjects: business events, new conferences, food, sporting events and others. He showed how to get good shots of large groups (take from a high angle with a long lens - no-one can Food photography is popular amongst the photographers because they can eat the dish after the shoot, though it has usually gone cold by then! (Use mashed potato instead of ice cream - it doesn't melt). He was official photographer for the Ryder Cup at the Belfry and was given the genuine gold cup to photograph; he kept it by his bed overnight to keep it safe (shiny metal is a difficult subject).

During the question and answer session it became clear just how much planning goes into professional photography: golf courses look best in the early hours; locations must be selected carefully for informal wedding shots; standing someone next to dark vegetation can improve modelling in a portrait; watch out for unwanted shadows if the sun comes out. We are very grateful to Russell for his excellent talk and many suggestions for improving our techniques; time will tell whether we are able to implement them.

In May we shall be selecting pictures for this year's exhibition and in June we shall have another professional photographer speaking. Visitors and guests are always welcome to our meetings. March 2016

The Chairman reported the existing Library Committee had been re-elected and that he and Bob Sherman were chasing the County Council for the Section 106 monies promised for the Library from the Plough Lane and Station Road developments. He was confident that the S106 contribution for the Bush Heath Lane development would also be forthcoming.

Councillor Gibb attended the Harbury School Governors' meeting where the predicted intake for September was expected to be around 24, which would mean substantially less funding. He then drew Councillors' attention to the

two recent accidents at the Bendigo Mitchell (Fosse) Crossroads, one of which resulted in a two hour closure. Councillor Ekins said a number of near-misses had been reported where impatient drivers had cut across vehicles turning right off the Fosse.

Planning: No representation was made by the Parish Council to a further application for three garage spaces at Stapenhall Farm; for tree felling at Temple Cottage and 8 Farm Street; demolition of an outhouse and building of a single storey rear extension at 3 Church Terrace and re-modelling Eastfields Farm, Deppers Bridge.

Stratford District had given permission for a loft conversion at The Bungalow, Chapel Street; demolition of outbuildings and erection of a side extension at Old Timbers, 28 lvy Lane.

Properties: The playing field's junior swing seats will be replaced. The car park drainage channel and the jammed bollards have been repaired. Plans continue for the "Walking Route" round the playing fields which will be set up during the summer. The western side of the fields which was damaged by the Bonfire vehicles will cost £170 to restore and the Council hopes to find a solution that will prevent similar damage in the future.

The Hillside development has paid the £6,663 S106 monies and the Parish has six years in which to spend it on youth and adult recreational facilities. A climbing wall was suggested.

Councillor Summers reported that several people had congratulated her and the volunteers for their work tidying the Burial Grounds. There had been a good response to her appeal for bulbs, seeds and garden plants but these could not be planted until the ivy had been "got rid of". She had a quote of £475 for work on the "Wonky Burial Grounds Hedge". She wanted to have 35 metres pulled up initially, and Ascot fencing erected, to which the rest could be roped. However, Councillor Gibb wanted her to postpone this until after the bus route consultation.

Treasurer Tony Mancell reminded Councillor Summers that the PC was already committed to £2,250 for tree work and maintenance there this year. Colin Sheasby was due to do the next tree survey soon and would advise the Council whether trees needed replacing. A number of the large trees would be "finished" in the next 5-10 years and would need replacing so she wanted to save some of her funding for that.

There was discussion about the plans for the disposal of excess soil from the Burial Grounds which could be done by using the driveway to the west of the area, cutting through the hedge to drive a tractor and trailer into the area. Councillor Summers thought only one grave was likely to be affected as there were no other headstones but colleagues pointed out not all graves are marked. She would need to identify which graves would be impacted, put up notices and advise the relatives of her intentions.

The allotments still had some vacant plots which needed to be cleared of weeds and Michael Mann would be asked to quote for this work.

Environment: One of the Manor Road lights needed to be realigned.

Councillor Gibb reported a good response to the consultation on changing the route of buses through the village. This consultation closed on 15th April and he would present a paper on it at the next meeting when a decision on whether to implement the plan would be made.

Finance and General Purposes: Councillors dutifully noted and approved the Financial Report, the Bank Standing Orders and Direct Debit; the Internal Audit, the Risk Management Report, and their own Standing Orders Review.

They agreed a grant of £186 for the hire of the Village Hall for the Harbury Show and £1131 for a new screen for the Village Cinema. A request for £1,000 to pay for entertainment at the Victorian Street Fayre would be referred back to the Council when the organisation could show it was a properly constituted entity.

Centenary Project: The research was done and designs for the plaques to go on the homes of the 34 WW1 fallen had to be arranged and ordered.

Any other Business: Councillors Thompson and Allen agreed to examine the Emergency Plan and update its contents if necessary. They would have to include the railway cutting as a potential danger.

A local business had asked to be included on the PC Website. The Chairman suggested there could be a local business section.

Councillors' Corner would be held on 30th April 10am-Noon and the PCSO would be invited.

Our Speaker for April, Nigel Briggs, said there were over 70 bridges in Leamington and here are just some of the ones he showed us.

This virtual tour started with Victoria Bridge at the Pump Rooms which is on the site of a 17th Century crossing of the Leam. By 1783 the river was bridged but only for northbound traffic, southbound carriages had to use the ford. The bridge was widened in 1840 and 1847 in Gothic style with three arches. The balustrade was replaced in 1984 and the parapet repaired in 2015.



The 1903 De Normanville "Suspension Bridge" (it has no chains or cables and is supported by wrought iron rods) replaced a smaller 1847 bridge. This innovative and striking structure incorporated a water pumping turbine and boat pass, and is adjacent to the Elephant Wash.

This was once a major route from the original Leamington Priors to Lillington but when the Jephson Gardens were established, the right of way was preserved by creating an underpass (with several bridges over) in 1830.

Willes Road Bridge was opened in 1827 and along with Newbold Bridge was paid for by Mr Willes. Mr Briggs was told that in earlier times the Police used the river to dispose of arms handed in during an amnesty and more recently divers discovered some still in the river!

The historic photos included one of a steam engine which had fallen into the canal and one of Clapham Terrace where there was once a bridge between the two old Barracks opposite. The crossing of the canal by Flavels is achieved by the 1880's "Ladder" bridge – with precipitous brick steps up to the bridge itself; this being the route from Lillington to Whitnash. The crossing was restored in 1988 with Landfill Tax Grants.

The Napton Canal road bridge of the 1800s, in Clemens Street, was in the posh part of Leamington that included the Raleigh Gardens. Nealson and Althorpe Streets, off High Street, have railway bridges of the 1850s with 41 arches, some of which are used by local businesses.

The High Street was once crossed by two railway bridges; the first for the Leamington to Rugby Railway (now demolished) and the second for the Great Western. There were photos too of the Lower Avenue Bridge and the Railway Station itself, rebuilt in 1939 in Art Deco style with its subway and the old footbridge.

Looking back over 2015, what a year it has been! It will certainly stand out in the annals of the Group as it was the year a permanent stage was built in the Village Hall.

On 25th February 2016 Harbury Theatre Group's production of "Sleeping Beauty" opened to a delighted audience in a packed Village Hall fifty six years after the group was officially formed. It was the Group's first ever performance on the permanent stage. And what a performance it was! Under the direction of Keith Hayes, the team performed with "pace and passion" and the audiences loved it.

I was privileged to lead a small team that has sifted through the Group's stock of photos, press cuttings, programmes, costumes etc. to compile a display for the official opening of the new stage by the Lord Lieutenant of Warwickshire on 16th April. This material reveals an incredible tradition of community theatre in Harbury that has involved a huge number of people in acting, dancing, singing, making costumes, sets and props, painting scenery, writing plays, designing ingenious sound and lighting effects, catering for working parties and so many other tasks that bring people together and develop skills. I think Mrs Mabel Aitcheson, the vicar's wife, who in 1949 first assembled a group of Harbury thespians, would be well pleased to see how we are getting on today. I think she would have loved our pantomime and been particularly impressed to know that three dedicated ladies hold junior theatre sessions attracting about forty children every Tuesday evening. She might also have been pleased to hear about the many other things we've done this year:

- "Stage Struck" by John and Yvonne Edleston played to full houses on 14th, 15th and 16th May and achieved great feedback from our audiences. Jo Banbury, Celia Stockdale and Chris Beaton rose to the challenge of the three biggest parts and they were well supported by some great performances from Sue Lawrence, Keith Hayes, John Travis, Will Jones, Ali Hodge and Janet Thornley (in some very interesting costumes!)
- On 13th June our Carnival float with the theme of "There ain't nothing like a dame" was very colourful and would have won if there had been a prize for the loudest float. We got third prize again and had a lot of fun. Well organized again Chris Beaton.
- There was no November production in 2015 as the stage was still
 under construction and we spent a lot of time working to make sure we
 were ready to move our essential theatrical stuff into the new area.
 There were working parties to clear out the barn at Chesterton Fields

Farm, to install new lighting and sound equipment, to move our costumes and equipment into the mezzanine area when it was ready, to adapt the old staging so that it could be stored under the new stage and to adapt existing scenery flats and drops so that they could be used on the new stage. At the centre of all this work was Brian Wade who helped with HTG work but also acted as project manager for the development and the main link between the architect and the Village Hall committee.

- Meanwhile the Junior Group performed "Christmas Creepy Crawlies" in the School Hall. Emily, Joy and Katie the leaders, managed to give every child a speaking part.
- And then we were into the pantomime! There have been plenty of great reviews and it was clearly a huge success both in the quality of our performance and in the numbers who came to see it. I won't repeat the many great comments but I'll just highlight a couple of things: I thought it was brilliant that so many children took part. The idea of having a different team for each performance was inspired. It presented some big challenges to ensure that each team was well rehearsed and could fit in with the rest of the cast but it worked a treat. Well done everyone who made that happen. I was also delighted that Chris Barber came back after a long gap and played the part of Marigold, the Dame brilliantly.
- During the year we also managed to enjoy ourselves with a skittles evening, poetry reading and a summer garden party.

So we are now well into the rehearsals for "Bags of Laughter" (to be performed on 19th, 20th and 21st May see full page advert for details.) It's a new challenge for most of us because it consists of 17 short sketches played to an audience seated in cabaret fashion with action taking place around them as well as on the stage. Each sketch is very funny in itself but the trick will be to hold it together with slick transition between the sketches. If anyone can do it, Harbury Theatre Group can. The 377th session of Harbury Folk Club on 7th May had the theme of 'Roots' which, as usual, was interpreted in all sorts of ingenious ways by the performers. And what a line-up of performers – I had to fit in 18 separate acts, comprising 27 individuals! It was an MC's nightmare but it's a nice problem to have.

I started the evening with 'Don't Slay that Potato' – an anti-vegetarian song – then I handed over to Rik who sang 'Wild Goose' (a story of a 'were-goose'?)

and 'Hole in the Window'. Newcomer to Harbury, Ian Pittaway, impressed us with the traditional 'The Trees They Do Grow High', accompanied on medieval harp, and then surprised us by leading us in an unusual round, an ancient setting of 'Three Blind Mice'. Ray and Anne were up next with 'Shenandoah' and 'Valley of Strathmore' and then Martin gave us the Sting song, 'Dead Man's Boots' and a Les Barker poem about never-ending 'Garden Waste'. The Harvesters finished the first half for us with their own 'A Cut Above' followed by an Appalachian murder ballad, 'Down in the Willow Garden'.

The Folk Club Choir filled the 'stage' as we started the second half with a Jamaican song, 'Plant de Leta' (which might or might not have anything to do with the theme), followed by our first performance of the Sydney Carter song, 'John Ball', about an English priest who took a prominent part in the Peasants' Revolt of 1381 and was hung, drawn and quartered for his trouble. I decided to adopt a 'hair' slant on the theme with Sid Kipper's clever song 'Combing the Main', about the hairdressing ships (Clippers) which used to ply the oceans. Sue Crum sang 'My Little Garden', where we all had to count her potatoes, before she was joined by Ted on 'Farmer's Toast' whose rousing chorus ends with the words, "Long life and success to the Farmer". Then along came Debbie with two poems - one of her own and one by Pam Ayres, 'My Little Footsies' - followed by Peter Mason with two of his favourite songs - 'Kilkelly' and Ralph McTell's 'The Setting'. Des was next with two great chorus songs - an ode to 'Glorious Ale' (a.k.a. his 'Bacon song') and the sea shanty 'Shallow Brown' - before we welcomed another newcomer to Harbury, John Zetterstrom, who sang 'I've got a song' and 'Mermaid'. To finish off a longer-than-usual second half, Ted joined up with Jem and Phil, as The Somerville Gentlemen, to bring us a lovely version of the Everly Brothers' classic 'So Sad', and in complete contrast, a music hall song called 'Love, Love, Love' from the repertoire of former Midlands duo, Cosmotheka.

As we started the third half, it was clear that we were heading for a late finish but many of the audience decided to stay, sensing that there was plenty of good music still to go. Robin, from Warwick Folk Club, sang Ralph McTell's 'England' and followed it with the self-penned 'Much Maligned', a song about Judge Jefferies to whom he is a distant relation. Bob chose very well with the beautiful 'Town I loved so Well' and then the hilarious monologue 'The Charabanc Trip' which he delivered immaculately and with great humour. Mick Bisiker sang Steve Knightley's 'Roots' (good choice, Mick!) and 'The Rose of Allandale' leaving Jem and Phil to finish the evening with a very skilful and dramatic version of another Cosmotheka music hall song, 'Timothy, let's have a look at it'. Brilliant stuff!

The raffle raised a worthy £75 for Cancer Research. The next Folk Club will be on 5th May, hosted by Des and Debbie, with the theme of 'Colours'. As always, we meet on the first Thursday of every month at 8pm in the comfort of the Village Club – an evening of free acoustic music – what's not to like?

Preschool have been learning about people who help us and we have had a whole host of visitors including doctors, the army, firemen, Zoey the Guide dog and the police. Village Hall Update

It rained in the early part of the morning and there was even some sleet, but by the time the Lord Lieutenant of Warwickshire accompanied by his wife arrived at the Village Hall at the same time as Bob Stevens (chair of W.C.C.), there was no hint of rain (frozen or otherwise). It would, however, by all accounts, have been difficult to dampen the spirits of Harbury villagers who turned out in force to join in the celebrations at the Harbury Community Library and Biblio's, followed by the official opening of the hall extension, including the stage and changing room area. The day had been billed as a chance for everyone to see the magnificent addition to the Village Hall and to 'go behind the scenes' and there was a constant procession of people anxious to take advantage of the invitation.



In the backstage area, Harbury Theatre group had mounted an impressive display covering the history of the group from its early beginnings, whilst members dressed as the Tin Man, the Sultan from Aladdin and a cowgirl welcomed visitors in style! There were also stands mounted by CAMRA and the Harbury Junior Football Club, which were displays in addition to those around the hall, representing the various groups who are regular hirers of the hall.

The Lord Lieutenant engaged with each representative on the displays before joining V.H. chairman Geoff Thorpe on the stage to acknowledge the work of those involved in the building, as well as committee members who had applied for grants from several major Landfill Trusts, (including BiffaAward, Veolia and WREN). A member of the Harbury Junior Theatre Group, Mia Morrill, presented a posy to the Lord Lieutenant's wife, after which Geoff paid tribute to all villagers who had contributed to the Buy-a-Brick fund-raising schemes - for the original initiative in 1973 and then for the most recent request in 2013. As has been mentioned several times in Village Hall updates, both the management committee and the fund-raising committee were keen to record the contributions of all villagers who have supported the requests for financial support over the years. As a result, the information panels on either side of the plague, unveiled by the Lord Lieutenant, document the evolution of the hall through its four main development stages (including ALL the sources of funding) as well as the names of all those who have contributed to the two Buy-a-Brick schemes.

Apart from the display stands in the hall, there were demonstrations from three groups who use the hall each week, including Inspire Dance, The Harbury Junior Theatre Group and Zumba - (ladies activity session). Each of these presentations took to the stage, whilst the invited guests were offered canapes and prosecco wine - sourced from local businesses — Wendy's Catering and Cana Wines. There was also a continuous production of bacon baps/hot dogs and samosas from the kitchen and fortunately, the guesstimate of how many should be catered for, proved about right.

After the excitement of the celebration day had died down following the event, the Village Hall committees met for the AGM, at which the existing members of the management committee were voted in 'en bloc', whilst the fund-raising committee decided to wind up their group and so transferred any remaining monies into the V.H.'s general maintenance fund.

If it was thought that now the major push is over, it will mean that the main committee will cease to have any goals in the coming years, nothing could be further from the truth - an improvement to the heating system is long overdue, as also modifications to the lighting system. Although the P.V.s contribute significantly to offsetting the electricity costs, there are plans to improve the insulation of the hall, so that it becomes even more cost effective and 'greener'. We hope everyone enjoyed being part of the celebration day and we thank all those who joined us in making the day an avowed success.



Horticultural Society

Who would have thought that our talk in April about weeds, useful, beautiful but unloved, would have been so interesting and entertaining. Roger Umpleby gave us, in just over an hour, so much information together with the most exquisite pictures.

He started by saying that, as per the Oxford dictionary, a weed is a plant growing where it is not wanted. Under the heading "not wanted" it is 1) an alien 2) poisonous 3) competitive 4) spreading or getting too big 5) damaging and lastly harbours pests and diseases, such as whitefly.

We saw some lovely scenic photos featuring gorse which of course is an alien. Moving on to the dreaded Japanese knot weed which left unchecked can cause damage to buildings; it was introduced by the Victorians - they have a lot to answer for! Himalayan balsam also gets too big and is poisonous. The Spanish bluebell is also an alien and is slowly taking over from our lovely native bluebell.

Amongst poisonous plants, henbane flowers were once recommended by Anthony Worrall Thompson as tasty added to salads; hopefully he didn't eat these as he would have been quite poorly! You really need to prevent seeds setting on some weeds and never compost weeds with ripe or semi ripe seeds. Farmyard manure can often contain seeds too. Also plants bought in pots from some nurseries can contain that awful yellow sorrel/bittercress and these weeds need to be removed prior to planting out.

Hygiene is most important and regular hoeing and weeding will eliminate almost all of these unwanted species. The only herbicide recommended is glyphosate but I see that the dreaded EU is now saying that it should be banned. Used wisely as with everything else, it is a useful thing to have.

Useful weeds...medicinal, edible, beneficial to other plants, food for animals and ornamental came next. I will not name all of the ones Roger described but narrow it down to a few. Edible plants such as the roots of horseradish grated with wild parsnip and evening primrose are tasty. Who knew that ground elder, a menace to most gardeners, can be eaten like spinach? As the young leaves emerge it is also a mild sedative and an anti inflammatory. You can also make a ground elder pesto, don't all rush at once for the recipe!

Nettles of course should be encouraged for the ladybirds and caterpillars which feed on them. The caterpillars then turn into stunning butterflies. We saw superb photos of red admiral and tortoiseshell butterflies. Nettles can also be turned into soup and again used in pesto and polenta. They also produce a yellow dye, yes really! Dandelions are the very devil to eradicate, you only have to leave a tiny bit of root in the ground and up they pop. These too have medicinal uses as a diuretic and are a source of vitamin A, B, C, D, and K. Not forgetting dandelion wine. The celandine, which incidentally was Wordsworth's favourite plant and not the daffodil, has another altogether different medicinal use for treating ringworm and piles!!

Yarrow and achillea can be used in salads and if chewed can relieve toothache, to cleanse skin and to stop the flow of blood. Two of my favourite wild flowers, cowslips and violets are a great food source for the fritillary butterfly. Cuckoo pint or Lords and Ladies, which has poisonous berries, has tubers which can be used for ringworm. There must have been a lot of ringworm in mediaeval times.

Agricultural weeds such as eye bright, scarlet pimpernel, poppies, scabious, wild pansy and many more are so needed for food for birds and butterflies. At this point Roger showed us the most amazing photo, the only one which he didn't take, of a rainbow with storm clouds in the background, a bolt of lightning over a field of poppies. We finished off talking about that thug ivy. It is poisonous, but extract from ivy is used in cough medicine. The berries are a great food source for birds and it provides shelter in the winter for birds and bugs. I didn't like to mention to Roger that I am waging war on ivy in my garden - but I have left some as, at present, there are two blackbird families busy nesting. Roger ended by saying that weeds are edible as well as medicinal and useful and are also free. He answered many questions and we all agreed that it had been another super talk.

Do watch the very best gardening programme on the TV, The Beechgrove Garden which is on BBC2 on a Sunday morning usually about 8.45am. It is full of useful and practical advice - plus the lovely Chris Beardshaw. It covers more in half an hour than you get from other similar programmes and the presenters are very knowledgeable and all have very many years of training.

Don't forget our two day trips, the first on Thursday 16th June to Hanbury Hall and Gardens near Droitwich. If you saw the Antiques Roadshow last Sunday (17th April), it was filmed there and hopefully it has given you a taste for this lovely house and garden. We then go nearby to Spetchley Park Gardens. Cost is only £25, we leave Village Hall at 9.30am and Spetchley at 6.00pm, arriving home by 7.00pm. The second trip is on Thursday 7th July when we will spend all day at Sherborne Castle and Gardens, the home of Sir Walter Raleigh, with a Capability Brown garden and landscape. Cost is a mere £26.50, we leave Village Hall at 8.30am and Sherborne at 5.00pm. Please phone me if you would like to come; I can promise you two brilliant days out. I look forward to hearing from you.

Lastly here a few suggestions for garden visits in May, all NGS, so teas will be available. On Monday 2nd go to White Cottage and Nursery at Stock Green near Inkberrow, post code B96 6SZ. A two acre garden with herbaceous plantings, shrubs, stream, bog garden and a meadow full of fritillaries. Open 11.30am to 4.30pm and cost is £3. For something completely different, as they say, Hewell Grange near Tardebigge, post code, B97 6QS will be open on Saturday 7th and Sunday 8th between 10.00am and 3.30pm at a cost of £5. I used to play hockey in these grounds when I was at the High School at Redditch nearby but it is now a prison. Don't be put off by this, it has a Capability Brown park and lake plus rhododendrons, azalias, formal garden, bluebell wood and much more. Pre-booking is essential as there will be escorted groups taken around and sensible footwear is essential too. Contact 01527 783017 or email roy.jones@hmps.gsi.gov.uk. The tours last over 60 minutes and if you find any hockey balls they probably belong to my old school!

On Sunday 15th Packington Hall at Meriden, post code CV7 7HF will be open from 2.00 to 5.00pm and cost is £5. Another Capability Brown landscape with 100 acres of parkland lake and very many more features.

On Sunday 22nd Harrells Hardy plants and Nurseries, Rudge Road, Evesham, post code WR11 4JR will be open from 2.00 to 5.00pm and cost is £3. A lovely naturalistic style garden with perennials and grasses and plants for sale.

On Monday 23rd Holland House Main Street, Cropthorne, post code WR10 3NB will be open from 10.00am to 4.00pm and cost is £4. Formal gardens here laid out by Lutyens in 1904, in a riverside setting with a sunken garden, vegetable garden and much more.

Lastly on Sunday 29th there will be two gardens open at Marlbrook near Bromsgrove, post code B69 1DY. They will be open from 1.30 to 5.30pm and cost is £5. Two individual gardens, an exotic garden with a Mediterranean feel, and the other a plants woman's cottage garden.

Our last meeting of the season will be on Tuesday 3rd May at 8.00pm in the Tom Hauley Room and we will be welcoming back Helen Picton from Old Court Nurseries, Colwell near Malvern and she will be talking about a potted history of the nursery which has three generations of the same family running it very successfully. It is famous for its asters and there will be an opportunity to buy plants too. Do come along for a lovely relaxing evening with refreshments after the talk and a super raffle. We only charge £2 for visitors as it is not worth joining at this stage, but if you like what we do you can join when our talks start again in October and we only charge £10 for the whole season and you get discounts at local nurseries too. I look forward to seeing everyone.



Garden Jottings from Bridge Nursery Christine Dakin

It might seem strange to talk about snowdrops at this time of year but I've just had a delivery of another nine different named varieties of these wonderful bulbs from a lady from Northampton. She is a real collector and has over 200 different varieties and I'm lucky enough to be given some each year for the last few years. The differences are subtle; it might be the shape of the flower or the markings on the petals. So, I shall be looking forward to seeing what they look like next year.

I guess that is what gardening is all about, looking ahead and being optimistic and patient.

In case you didn't know, we have a good range of alpine and rockery plants which are ideal for small gardens or for those of you who like to grow easy-to-look-after plants. They are suitable for growing in sinks, on walls,

in containers or for the edges of borders. Gardening on a miniature scale can be very rewarding.

Obviously this time of year can be very busy so here are a few 'to do' ideas.

- Put in stakes for taller growing perennials (this is a job I'm not good at doing).
- Use feed and weed on lawns.
- Plant cabbage plants.
- · Towards the end of the month you can remove old daffodil leaves.
- Lots of seeds to sow, including sweet corn, peas and mangetout, carrots, French beans, runner beans and lettuce. This year for the first time I'm trying carrots in a large pot, they will be in the polytunnel so I should get them earlier than usual.

Fingers crossed for some decent weather for the next few weeks.

Nature Notes

Leam Valley Local Nature Reserve will forever be associated for me with the name of Jack Watkins. He was the warden there for many years and organised work parties to clear scrub and rank vegetation which threatened to overwhelm some of the special habitats. I remember one summer helping with some mowing when he found a harvest mouse's nest, a small domed structure woven from grasses. He later used this as a teaching aid when discussing wildlife and its preservation with a group of schoolchildren. Jack showed me the small seasonally flooded area close to the river where the Snake's-head Fritillary (Fritillaria meleagris) could be found in April and May. This plant of the Lily family grows from a corm (an organ of vegetable reproduction distinct from a bulb) as does the crocus. I have seen the flower there but failed to find it this year - perhaps I went too early in the season.

The bird hide overlooking the lake at the far end of the reserve is named the Jack Watkins Hide. The lake, extended in 2000 when Andy Tasker was Chairman of Warwickshire Wildlife Trust, is fringed with vegetation now. Here I have seen a kingfisher in the past and on one memorable occasion, a hobby overhead. This bird is our smallest falcon being only slightly larger than a swift. Its Latin name is Falco subbuteo. If the second part of the name sounds familiar, it is worth digressing to explain. Peter Adolph was demobbed in 1945 and to supplement his earnings from a natural history business, he invented a football game and called it 'The Hobby' after his favourite bird of prey. The Patent Registrar refused the name so Adolph substituted the bird's Latin

name Subbuteo. I am indebted to that mine of information 'Birds Britannica' by Mark Cocker and Richard Mabey for these facts.

One of our U3A Natural History Group members, Pat Poulson, suggested we visit Cricklade this April to see the display of fritillaries in North Meadow close to the infant Thames. This is a National Nature Reserve and a traditional hay meadow. It is common land where for hundreds of years the people of Cricklade have had the right to graze livestock from 12th August to 12th February. A Court Leet, forerunner of local government, administers the grazing and upkeep of the meadow. The hay crop is cut after 1st July when the wild flowers have set seed and it has to be removed by 12th August to allow grazing. This regime and frequent flooding ensures the growth of many plants and maintains the great variety of species. Traditional, unimproved hay meadows have disappeared at an alarming rate. Warwickshire's remnant is Draycote Meadows (os sheet 140; SP 448 706). Take a look in early summer and go back in time.

When we visited Cricklade on 18th April, the meadow was closed due to flooding but luckily a nearby Wiltshire Wildlife Trust Reserve at Lower Moor Farm was open and we were able to see hundreds if not thousands of fritillaries in bloom mixed with cowslip and a variety of grasses in early stages of their growth with names like Crested Dog's Tail and Quaking Grass. In the ditches were patches of marsh marigold and the sward revealed the distinctive spotted leaves of early purple orchids. We were told that the species-rich flood meadows were the lowland equivalent of chalk downland in terms of variety.

Today, 19th April, the temperature in the afternoon approached 16C. This brought out a number of butterflies including Small Tortoiseshell, Peacock and Orange Tip, all seen in the garden. Later, whilst paying a visit to the Cubbington Pear tree, I saw my first Comma of the year. The pear blossom was out in part but there is a lot more bud to open yet. It is sad to think that with HS2 coming, this could be its last year.

Now shades of green delight the eye from the pale green of tiny, fresh oak leaves to the deepening green of already quite mature horse chestnut leaves. Venture into our local woods, such as at Bascote, to see the carpet of bluebells and wood anemones.

Harbury Village Library - Fourth Anniversary

In 2010 it became clear that Harbury Village Library (HVL), housed in the old school building in the centre of the village, was under threat of closure due to cuts to council funds. A substantial group of villagers was determined not to let this happen, and with the aid of various grants and a lot of hard work the library re-opened in May 2012, after having been closed for several months for refurbishment, as a volunteer run Community Library and Cafe.

If you haven't visited in the last few years, you will probably be surprised by the bright, welcoming atmosphere and the choices on offer in our library. Anyone with a Warwickshire library card (which can be obtained online at http://www.warwickshire.gov.uk/libraries if you haven't already got one) can borrow up to 10 books including best-selling fiction, cookery books, biographies, travel guides etc., as well as selecting adult and children's board games, large print, audio books and children's DVDs (for the last two of which there is a small charge); using Wi-Fi or researching your ancestry on one of three open access computers; using printing and laminating facilities; viewing and maybe purchasing from the display of original artwork by local artists, while enjoying a delicious coffee, or other drink, and home-made cake or choose from a selection of other baked goods.

A noticeable feature of the newly constituted HVL is the 3,000 or so books which have been donated by villagers or purchased through our *Buy a Book* scheme since 2012, in addition to the rotating stock supplied by Warwickshire County Library Service. This has added not only to the quantity of books, but also to the quality, with many prizewinning bestsellers appearing on our shelves very quickly. Over 800 people have joined the separate internal library, the Blue Label Collection, which, as this figure represents almost a third of the total population of the village, suggests that the library is generally well-used and much appreciated. The stock of foreign language books, begun previously by donations from our twinned town of Samois-sur-Seine, has also

been added to. There are shelves devoted to local authors and to family history, the latter of which supplements the *Ancestry* software for those wishing to research their own forbears on the library's computers free of charge. Recently, a scheme to allow donated board games to be borrowed from or played in the library has also been introduced and is proving popular.

An important development instituted by HVL has been the attempt to encourage usage by local children of our wide ranging stock of children's and young adults' books. Regular visits from school children from the local primary school have been arranged to help with their project topics, and the Head Teacher is very supportive of these and other initiatives to familiarise the children with what is on offer at HVL. Apart from the country-wide Holiday Book Schemes, a regular session of 'Tunes and Tales' run by a volunteer brings in babies and toddlers (and attendant adults) who hopefully will continue to use the library as they grow up. This popular session now runs from 10am on Thursdays for about half an hour.

The re-vamped facilities have also been attractive for several groups in the village to hire for their regular meetings, such as a book group and a writing group, but the space has also been used as a comfortable setting for talks by local authors; art exhibitions; a tea party and antique valuation sessions (another one of these is due to be held on 24th May). In addition, the building has been useful as a setting for displays of local interest such as information about the recent land slip in the railway cutting, and a model of the proposed memorial garden in the Church. Two new regular activities begun in late 2015 are a monthly café for people with a diagnosis of dementia and their carers called Connections, and weekly sewing classes.

A new and popular innovation which was designed to help fund this project was a café, christened Biblio's, on the premises. Apart from its value to older members of the community who can meet regularly with friends, and for young parents who can chat elsewhere than on a chilly street corner after dropping their children off at school, visitors from other villages, passing cyclists, walkers and holiday makers have all taken advantage of this venue. The coffee is freshly ground and brewed – no instant granules here - and the cakes are home baked by a committed group of bakers who use fair trade and organic ingredients wherever possible and give their expertise as well as use of their home kitchens as a contribution to the success of HVL. The quality of this enterprise was recognised by the award of Highly Commended in the 2014 Countryside Alliance Award start up category.

Volunteers are crucial to the successful operation of HVL: there are currently about 50 regular volunteers for the issue desk and other library-related tasks, and 40 or so bakers and counter staff for the café, which is open in the mornings from Wednesday to Saturday throughout the year. The Library itself is now open for five full weekdays and a half day on Saturday, as opposed to the two part days when Council run. It also has its own website,

Facebook page and Twitter account, so it is generally far more accessible than previously.

HVL has also acted as an important role-model and learning resource for other communities experiencing similar changes to their library services, and there have been visits and enquiries from places like Leicestershire, Birmingham, Staffordshire, Shropshire, and even further afield, including Essex and Lancashire.

Finally it must be acknowledged that all of this could not have been achieved over the last four years without the hard work of the original steering committee, and all the volunteers, plus the support of the Parish Council, which underwrote the first three years of operation, Harbury Church PCC. Warwickshire County Council and the people of Harbury, who we trust will carry on borrowing and donating books and consuming the coffee and cakes so that HVL can continue to thrive. We hope that in future, even more villagers will become regular visitors, to volunteer or to partake of this valuable community service.

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
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


