One of the things I most love about taking my dog Gus for a walk is watching the seasons change as we walk around Thwaites. The green turns to gold before the branches become bare and winter is upon us. But, then the miracle of new life appears in the spring as the trees bud and the crops grow.

I find this time of year awe inspiring as I watch the harvest and see our local farms preparing the fields for next year's crops. Creation is bountiful and with good stewardship of land and resources there's enough for everyone. But, sadly we all know that the human race isn't always as careful as we should be with all that we've been given. It's good to know however that Harbury does its best to be a good steward. The Harbury Energy Initiative, the wild flower garden at the library, the Electric Car Club, E-wheels and the eco friendly churchyard are just a few examples among many of how seriously this village takes looking after our environment.

Sadly it's not the same the world over and one of the places where the effects of climate change are most visible are at the North and South poles. The week for Action on Climate Change begins on the 8th of this month and we're fortunate to have the polar explorer Mark Wood coming to the Village Hall to speak on "My Life in a Freezer" describing his recent complex and cutting edge expedition to the North Pole. There are lots of other activities going on in and around the church this time of year so please do look out on the notice boards for more information.



September has been a time of hard work and pleasant surprises. It wasn't just a success financially but great fun too and I reckon if Rev Craig ever becomes an atheist he should apply to Sotherbys for a job as an auctioneer! Some promises were sold two or three times over, like the dog walking by Felix and Kip's DIY skills and the ukulele lesson was converted to a group event with 11 people paying to join in. The following weekend we had our Heritage Open Days, with over 50 people coming to find out about more Ladbroke School (or in the case of past pupils put names to faces on the photographs and for one family find the kneeler Grandma stitched 40 years ago). Others discovered more about the building and some of the characters buried in our graveyard including Rev AB Lloyd

who had been a well known missionary in Uganda and Jack Wall whose efforts helped us win the best kept churchyard back in the early 1970s and many people came to support the Music Marathon. Kate played quiet background music to start before being joined by Alice on sax and Rory on trumpet for the next hour. Hymns by request were planned for the following hour but proved so popular that they continued for twice this long until Kate and her *ad hoc* choir closed with the national anthem after four hours of nonstop music. I'm most grateful to Linda Doyle, our local historian, for putting the school exhibition together, with a little help from me and last year's year 6 pupils and staff at St James School, Southam, to Carol Lane for her display on Uncle Jack and to our musicians and all who came to listen to them and sponsored Kate.



During last month the work on the roof and rainwater goods reached practical completion and the workmen finally tidied up and left so now we are back to normal, except in one respect. III health has prevented Betty joining us at services - we send her our best wishes for a speedy recovery.

Home group is meeting alternate Mondays, see the Ladbroke Diary for exact dates. This term our theme is Discipleship and each meeting we listen to one of the sermons on the topic from our pulpit to start off our discussion. Ladbroke Parish Council

The following are key points from the meeting on 14th September. The formal minutes issued by the clerk will go on the notice board by the pub and the village website in due course.

Neighbourhood Watch: There were two burglaries within Ladbroke in late August. The police came to church during Heritage Open Days and left leaflets for people with reminders of how to improve home security. They also advised that if you see anything suspicious to report it on 101 as each piece of the jigsaw may help to stop crime; for any burglaries in progress ring 999. Although they could not be specific, the officers who came believed the action taken by their colleagues following a number burglaries around here had resulted in no break-ins during the previous seven days.

Removal of the Bus Service: There is a proposal to cease the service which stops on request on the by-pass, this had been financed for several years by development money from Tesco but with that funding at an end the level of use does not warrant continuing it. Of course if it had come through the village, rather than passengers from Ladbroke needing to dice with death crossing the bypass to use it, there might have been more uptake from Ladbroke residents!

Planning: The Parish Council were making no representations on the French windows, hardstanding and retaining wall at Flat 14 Ladbroke Hall nor on tree works in the spinney belonging to Woodlands and they had no comments regarding the resubmission for changes at Sarah's cottage, however their previous concerns still stand on the resubmission for a dwelling on the field "off" Windmill Lane. SDC had approved the extension at The Willows on Radbourne Lane. The application for a replacement front door and frame at Attwood Cottage had been withdrawn as approval was not forthcoming.

Highways & Footpaths: Councillors disagreed with SDC's view that crossing the bypass at the end of Windmill Lane was less safe than where the footpath officially comes out, they will send photos and offer to show it in person. To progress works on the drain near church requires hire of equipment and so SDC are waiting for it to be bundled it with other similar work. At least one drain cover is missing on the A423 and will be reported as this is a hazard for cyclists etc.

Flooding: The letter of complaint to WCC has resulted in a meeting about the study and next steps with our representatives being scheduled for mid September.

A gully sucker and camera had been seen investigating the section between the village hall car park to just upstream of the bridge and there were concerns that if this flows more freely but nothing changes downstream of the bridge it would increase the risk of flooding to some homes.

Village Hall, Millennium Green & Church Events: The church had held a successful auction of promises and Heritage Open Days including a music marathon. Ladbroke Matters is organising a quiz on 1st Oct and a film night on 11th Nov. There will be a supper and traditional race night on 18th Nov, jointly organised by the church and Ladbroke Matters which is being held in Harbury Village Hall, but car sharing to and from Ladbroke is being co-ordinated.

HS2: HS2 Ltd has a new team to improve community engagement and boundaries have changed, with Ladbroke now in a different area from Southam. The Select Committee is expected to finish by Christmas.

Broadband: After a number of conversations and sending photos and an annotated map to them, the Coventry & Warwickshire Rural Broadband Roll Out team now understand that Ladbroke was too far away to receive any benefits when Cabinet 10 (in Southam) was upgraded and is served by Cabinet 10/1 on the corner of School Lane and Banbury Road. They will update their records and make sure we are part of the roll out, though this could still be more than a year away.

WCC: Cllr Williams reported that politics as a whole seems to have gone to sleep until after the Government's autumn statement. WCC has to cut budgets by 20% so are considering cutting school transport of less than two miles for under 8's and less than 3 miles for those over 8 years old. Some parish councils are buying their own speed cameras, if they note registration numbers and pass them on, the police will write to the miscreants. The Fosse Way northbound will be closed by the Harbury bridge near the garage for several months - this might increase traffic through Ladbroke as people try to find alternative routes. J12 on the M40 should have been completed, the work on the dual carriage way is done but "gardening" seems to be ongoing. There are some old computers available free of charge to organisations but as the few groups in Ladbroke are run by volunteers those at the meeting could not think of anyone who would be interested in these.

Poppy Collection in Ladbroke: If anyone would like to volunteer to take British Legion poppies house to house within Ladbroke 29th Oct - 12th Nov please phone 814031. If no-one volunteers you'll be able to get your poppy and make a donation at church services, village events and at The Bell Inn.

Ladbroke & Deppers Bridge Women's Institute Carol Lane

Our September meeting was held on Thursday 1st in Ladbroke Village Hall. Georgia Hale kept us all spellbound in recounting her experiences of being shipwrecked in the Antarctic.

In 2001 her husband, Clive, was diagnosed with an incurable form of blood cancer and in periods of remission between treatments, he tried to cram as many things as possible into his remaining time.

When Clive suggested they should go on a Northern cruise Georgia happily accepted,



imagining cocktail frocks and a life of luxury. However she was slightly warned when the kit list included waterproofs and thermal underwear with no mention of any sort of frock!

Her doubts were confirmed when, between the luxury cruise ships in the East of Greenland where they started the cruise, there was a 'little red ship' and she joined 90 other passengers on what was not a cruise but an expedition. She spent 10 days in good company seeing marvellous sights and listening to well informed lecturers which gave her a taste for this sort of holiday which they repeated to the Arctic the following year.

In 2007 they set out for the ultimate in cold weather expeditions, the Antarctic, flying to the tip of Argentina and joining the 'little red ship' first to the Falkland Islands then to South Georgia where Clive, who also had a keen eye for photography took amazing pictures of the wildlife there.



They were due to land on the Antarctic Peninsula the following day and after a matey supper the 78 passengers all went on deck to watch a spectacular sunset.

When almost all the others went to their cabins Georgia remained on deck filming in the silence broken only by the ice breaker cutting through the ice floe. She felt nothing more than a judder but became aware of the behaviour of the captain and crew. In a short space of time the siren sounded and the Captain was saying 'This is serious. This is not a drill' and the passengers assembled in the lecture theatre in full cold weather gear and life jackets. The hull had been struck by underwater ice.

I'm not going to tell you anymore! If you can get Georgia to come and speak to any organisation I could not recommend her too highly and you will be able to hear the rest of the story.

Clive has since died and Georgia has started the Clive Hale Memorial Fund to raise money to help others with limited life expectancy to realise some of their dreams. Georgia can be contacted on 02476 502970 or at georgina.hale@tiscali.co.uk



In the new year we are expecting to be given information about a date for a referendum so that it can be adopted by the Parish. The Plan has to be approved and voted on by all residents.



The Society recently provided Warwickshire Local History Association with a History Walk round the village finishing with tea provided by the WI at the Tom Hauley Room. The Committee suggest that others might like to know what the tour told them – some of it mere conjecture. Here is the first part but you can learn more from our book Hungry Harbury.

Possible History and Growth of Harbury Part 1



The village lies just behind the scarp slope of the Lias ridge and was until recently not visible from the Fosse. Founded possibly in the Iron Age, by a noblewoman, Heber, it lies just within the Fosse defensive ditch that at one time marked the extent of Roman Britain.

The original settlement (Heber's Bury) was on the spring-line of the eastern dip slope where until late 1970's there was still a prominent tree-topped earthen bank east of Pound Green.

The pre-historic Lear Street runs north/south through the present village (marked on this map by the diamonds of the Centenary Way!)

The thirteenth century church lies between Lear Street and the old Bury. This and the Manor House are the oldest surviving buildings in the village.



Recent investigations revealed that the central section of the Manor House is an early twelfth century hall house. The right-hand wing is mid 16th Century, the left-hand 17th. It was sympathetically renovated in the 1990's by Peter White.

A few other timber-framed buildings remain in the village – The 16th Century Shakespeare Inn; Saddlers in Chapel Street; The Cottage High Street, the Stone House and parts of Wissett Lodge but many others were demolished in the late 1950's in an orgy of "improvement" by Southam Rural District Council.

Our next event is a talk on the Architectural Delights of Learnington Spa by Alan Mayes at 7.30pm on 25th October in the Tom Hauley Room. All are welcome.



100 years is a lot of history, even for a village WI, so in readiness for our Centenary in 2018 we're busy reviewing our archives, and hunting out stories and photos. The earliest years, naturally, are the most challenging; records are fewer, harder to find, or simply lost. But we've uncovered some fascinating material. Here's a splendidly assertive voice from 1924, castigating men on the council for their lack of 'enlightenment' and recommending that women take their place (and pretty sharpish too). Harbury WI was only six years old, but already a force to be reckoned with.

"Sir, May I, through your valuable paper, thank Mr E.P. Smith, a member of the Southam Rural District Council, for the honour he paid to old women, in his remarks last week, that "they ran the blessed society" (namely, the RSPCA). I congratulate these "old women".

I think that the sooner the Southam Rural District puts some women (old or young) in the place of the men who are hardened and ignorant as to what is cruelty, and who still wish the pole-axe to be used, the better it will be for the whole of the district. Men who have so little imagination and so little enlightenment as to what animals suffer when killed by the axe are not fit to represent the district. Scientists, who are not "old women", have proved that meat eaten after animals have suffered is detrimental to the nervous system.

Cruelty in any form is a disgrace to any British subject. A short time ago the members of the Harbury Women's Institute sent an urgent appeal to the Council begging for the use of the pole-axe to be made an offence. One can hardly realise that only two men - Dr Lattey and Mr Dunn - were in favour of the use of the humane killer being enforced in the district."

Letter signed "A Member of Harbury Women's Institute", published February 15th 1924 in the "Royal Learnington Spa Courier and Warwickshire Standard" (sourced via the British Newspaper Archive, online free, at the Library)

There was no time for history last month, one of our busiest ever Septembers. First up was a talk on hedgehogs, when Simon Thompson of Warwickshire Wildlife Trust shared conservation tips, and debunked fantasy after fantasy. Think Mr and Mrs Tiggywinkle live in your garden exclusively, grateful for their nightly pet food? Think again - in fact they have food sources and nests in several locations, and trot around all night from saucer to saucer, like guests at a prickly progressive dinner. They don't give your dog fleas, and milk is bad for them. Members reported their hedgehog sightings to Simon, doubling the number on his records. We posted his new map on our Facebook page the next day.

We did tea and cakes at the Village Show on the 10th; another tea on the 17th for 47 members of a visiting history society; our annual Harvest Supper on the 23rd; and our jam jar tombola at the fabulous Victorian Street Fayre on 1st October. Thanks to everyone who helped at these events, and to everyone who generously supported them.

Our next meeting is on 13th October, when Julia Fowler and Marie Stanley will talk about giving new life to furniture and household items with chalk paint. Marie is an artist, and the owner of Hillbilly's in Learnington Spa, where she sells paint and painted furniture. Marie will bring along samples of what can be achieved and we'll have paint available for people to try. We plan to offer a workshop with her soon.

Harbury WI meetings are usually at the Tom Hauley Room, 7.30 for 7.45pm, on the second Thursday of the month. 



Harbury - we have a problem! The Village Hall Committee has been endeavouring to source a suitable group/band or disco for the annual New Year Dance, but have drawn a blank so far. For several years, the Likely Lads played during the evening and then Phill King and the Royals took over more recently and fronted very enjoyable evenings.

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As we identified at a recent meeting the age profile (demographic??) of supporters at the dance has remained much the same for some time and we hoped to encourage a younger set of villagers to join us, but maybe the format wasn't attractive to villagers under the age of 60 years? As a result, we have a problem and would like to offer any group/organisation within the village the chance to organise a dance/evening event with a different format for 2017. If this sounds an attractive proposition, then please let any member of the committee know - see Harbury Parish Council website for officers' details or ring 613801 / 612305. For those who have been in the village for many years, recollections of the times when the Football Club organised the annual fancy dress dance never fail to bring back many happy memories. It was a time when the streets of Harbury were thronged with revellers in fancy dress who often visited the pubs before and after the dance. It may be a chance to revive this tradition if something different to a black tie event was organised?

A similar thought was raised in connection with the recent CAMRA Beer Festival. Whilst the small V.H. committee has been happy to join with G.A.S.S.to source and prepare the food for the event, it needs 'many hands to make light work' and the committee is mainly composed of retired people who are happy to ensure that the running of the hall proceeds on a daily basis, but sometimes have a struggle to find enough members to cover more demanding events. This year CAMRA celebrated its 25th anniversary in Harbury (postponed by one year due to the extension work last year) and it is thought that the organising group are anxious to continue the well-recognised event. We are looking forward to the 2016/17 new season and we start on Tuesday 4th October in the Tom Hauley room from 7.30pm onwards. Our first speaker is Linda Smith who is making a return visit to us. The Summer weather was very mixed, and some plants and vegetables performed better and some not so good but that is the joy of gardening with surprises and disappointments. Hanging baskets and troughs can last well into October if dead headed and Autumn is absolutely the best time to divide plants and establish new ones as the ground is still warm. You can have colour all year with a huge variety of plants. There are some lovely winter evergreen clematis and other climbers. Grasses look so elegant with their stately plumes in the Autumn and many herbs keep their scent and structure with just a light trim. The only thug that pops up in my garden is borage and it is very rampant! Ivy too is an absolute menace unless you restrict its growth by hard pruning.


There are some great places to visit in October to enjoy the changing colours of Autumn. In Warwick the Lord Leycester gardens, although large, are very well cared for and well worth a visit. Combine this with a trip to nearby Hill Close Gardens open daily from 11am to 5pm. We are so lucky to have these gems on our doorstep. Don't forget to go to Ryton Organic Gardens in Wolston open daily from 10am to 5.30pm, admission can vary but usually is £4.50. Very good food and a wealth of plants. Near Moreton in Marsh, Batsford Arboretum never fails to cheer us up. Open daily with some unusual trees and shrubs, a very good tea room and plant centre for the admission price of £6.95. The Mitford sisters lived in the large house - can you imagine what went on then!

A bit further away is Harcourt Arboretum near Nuneham Courtney, Oxford, post code OX44 99X. It is part of the Oxford Botanic Gardens, is open daily from 10am to 4pm and costs £3.50. No tea room but there are some truly amazing trees here. It was often featured in murder scenes in Morse and Lewis but perfectly safe now!

A few years ago on one of our day trips we went to Painswick Rococo Gardens, post code GL6 6TH just outside Malmesbury on the Stroud road. They are the only surviving pleasure gardens in the UK, dating from the 1740's. They had theatrical sets built with stunning backdrops and held many a decadent party! Their restoration work was started in the 1970's when it had become very overgrown and jungle like. It took many thousands of hours to bring it back to how you see it today. Luckily there were paintings made of the original gardens so there was a point of reference. It is now run by a trust. Today you see superb views of the countryside, fanciful garden buildings, woodland walk, maize and a huge vegetable garden, there is a restaurant here, it is open daily and entrance is £6.50. It is a magical place and well worth a visit.

We also paid a visit to Birmingham Botanical Gardens in Westbourne Road Edgbaston, post code B15 3TR a few years ago. There are some brilliant planting combinations here and a great glass house with lots of unusual succulents and much more. Somewhere to eat and a good shop with reasonably priced plants and other items. Open daily from 10am to 5.30pm and costs £5. Upton House and Gardens have some wonderful asters and autumn flowering plants, come and see us and see how near we are to beating the Guinness book of records for the longest bunting which will be displayed in November.

I do hope that you are able to sample at least one of the places as it is nice to go and experience something new or revisit to see what changes made. So much to look forward to in Autumn with the stunning leaf colours and various fungi and hedgerow fruit. I look forward to seeing everyone at the meetings.

Today (Monday 19th September), it's dreary and overcast with rain lingering and so there is doubt over a planned bat walk this evening. Tricia Scott of the Warwickshire Bat Group was going to take the U3A Natural History Group for a stroll through St Nicholas's Park near the river armed with bat monitors. These, tuned to differing frequencies, can pick up the sounds made by different species of bat as they use echo location to home in on their prey. Unfortunately if it's wet and cool the bats stay in their roosts so we are at the mercy of the British climate.

Several readers, including Alan Knowles, have reported sightings of large brownish caterpillars in their gardens. When alarmed, the creature can swell up impressively with bulging false eyes to ward off predators. They are harmless and if left alone will pupate and overwinter. Next June, a large moth with glorious pink coloration emerges to continue the life cycle of the Elephant Hawk Moth, so called because of the larva's trunk like proboscis. That's rather fanciful as an earlier name for it was 'Porcellus' - the little pig. The moth's pink colour is perfect camouflage on its host plant which is Rose Bay Willow Herb. This is now seeding along many country lanes. Another exquisite moth, seen by many this summer, is the Humming Bird Hawk moth which mimics its avian namesake as it hovers to feed on Buddleia, Valerian and Honeysuckle. It is native to Southern Europe and North Africa but has been a regular immigrant since the 1940's

On a narrow boat cruising the Oxford Canal, as August morphed into September, we were surprised not to see any herons. Usually they are quite common. There were plenty of swans with cygnets of adult proportions, coots galore and mallards with young ducklings in the waterside vegetation. On one occasion we spotted a grey squirrel clinging to the wall of a lock as our narrow boat 'Jenny' entered. It fell into the water and we assumed it would drown but then saw it swimming desperately for the wall on the other side as the lock filled up. It was unable to scale the wall but our friend Bob Wilkins came to the rescue with a branch from the hedge which the squirrel climbed up to lie exhausted in the sunshine. Later, rested and dried out, it ran off. Grey squirrels are viewed as a pest but in this case we changed the rules. There is 'nothing like messing about on the river' to steal words from Kenneth Graham's Wind in the Willows. At a slow pace, with good friends for company, it is thoroughly to be recommended. Sharon and I visited the village of Dumbleton vesterday. It was a glorious late summer day. The Cotswold outlier of Dumbleton Hill lies just a few miles south of its larger neighbour Bredon Hill near Evesham. As we approached the church of St Peter's, originally a Norman structure enlarged and improved by monks from Abingdon, a christening was just exiting through the churchyard leaving us to explore. Above the north door was an interesting ancient tympanum, a stone relief of a primitive nature showing an animal with foliage springing from its mouth, a fertility symbol we presumed. Several unusual tombstones led us to those we had come to see close to the lych-gate. They were the graves of Patrick and Joan Leigh-Fermor. Patrick was a Greek scholar, a war hero and a writer of renown. In 1933, age 18, he set out to walk from Rotterdam to Constantinople. Three books, starting with 'A Time of Gifts', trace his journey in prose as good as any I have read. While in Greece earlier this year we stayed on the Mani Peninsula and visited his home which is looked after by a Trust. The weather there was perfect with the Mediterranean glinting in the sun below the terrace. Now we had come on a pilgrimage to see the village where his wife was born and they made their English home. A sentence in Greek and a jar containing twigs from an olive tree graced both headstones. I hope to have a translation in next month's issue.

Now the arable fields have mostly been tilled and the landscape is a patchwork of green and brown. The first frost is perhaps not so far away. Until then the trees will hold their leaves.

(and why you will be pleasantly surprised if you did.)

1. There are only books (boring!)

No, there are also: board games, talking books, children's DVDs, free wi-fi, three open access computers, Ancestry (family history website), art displays, an online newspaper archive, OS maps, topical displays, information leaflets, a printer and laminator and, on four mornings each week, a café (Biblio's) serving hot and cold drinks and home baked cakes.

As for the books, as well as best-selling and prizewinning fiction, we have biographies of celebrities, sports personalities and politicians; cookery and travel books; poetry and foreign language texts; and popular science books, among many others. You can borrow up to 10, at no charge.

2. There are never any new books on the shelves

Harbury Village Library has a delivery of books from Warwickshire County Council (WCC) nearly every week, and we have over 3000 books in our own collection. We had a copy of J.K Rowling's new book on our shelf two days after publication last month! You can also reserve any book online or in person for delivery to the library.

3. I have a Kindle or other tablet so I don't need it

E books, magazines and newspapers are available to download for free – see http://www.warwickshire.gov.uk/ebooks - using your WCC ticket.

4. I haven't got a ticket

You can sign up online at: http://www.warwickshire.gov.uk/ j ointhelibrary. It takes only a few minutes and costs nothing. Or come into the Library and we'll help you.

5. It's never open when I want to use it.

Harbury Village Library is open five and a half days a week – 9am-5pm Monday – Friday, 10am-12 noon Saturday – longer than many libraries in big cities. You can renew and reserve books online at any time.

6. I will be fined if I'm late bringing back a book

You can avoid this by renewing on line or by phone and WCC will email you to remind you that your book is due for return. As you can usually renew the book twice, and have three weeks each time, that is nine weeks in which to finish your books.

7. Libraries are quiet, dull places

The old Wight School, which was in use as the village school until the late 1950s, is a light, warm building and, particularly when Biblio's is open, a buzzing social hub. Sometimes the library rings to the sound of children singing (Tunes and Tales on Thursday mornings) or older people (Connections dementia café, third Wednesday every month).

8. Librarians are traditionally strict

Harbury Village Library is run entirely by volunteers who are committed to keeping the library in Harbury open, after it would have been closed down by WCC four years ago. They always try to be welcoming and helpful, and we promise that at no time will a volunteer go 'Sshhhhhh!'

9. Libraries are for old people

There are shelves of books for young adults; a children's section, complete with Biblio the cat; a summer reading challenge each year; three computers and free wi-fi; a quiet-ish place to study after school or college from 4-5pm most afternoons - and books to help your studies. Charged Up

One of our keen electric car users has worked out that it is more economical for him to book one of our electric cars for a longer journey than to drive the family car. He has a tip to offer us all:

"We noticed yesterday that the distance you get per charge can vary quite considerably. On the outward trip we drove to the Telford Service station on the M54 for our first charge (distance of 66 miles) and still had 22 miles charge available (didn't have car in ECO mode*). On the way back we stopped at Telford Services again and charged up to 98% and so thought we'd be fine to do the 66 miles back to Harbury. However, there was a torrential rainstorm, so windscreen wipers, demister and lights were on and the road was very wet with lots of puddles. We were now driving in ECO mode, but charge was going down very quickly and GPS said that we would fail to get to Harbury by about six miles. At this point the weather improved so wipers and demisters went off and we drove more slowly, to the irritation of other drivers, but the available charge improved. When we got back to Harbury display was showing that we still had about 13 miles worth of charge left. The moral of the story, I suppose, is that by adjusting driving style you can extend the range of the cars by up to 20 miles."

* In ECO mode the car is restricted to 60 mph and use of power is confined to the essentials.

Users of the car club will have noticed, I hope, 'Ted's tidy', a clever way to keep the cables clear of the ground and neatly coiled. Ted is also responsible, by the way, for the nudge bumps on the ground that tell you when you are about to hit the wall or the other car. I think that he may have some more ideas to lighten our lives. We will see.

Lit Up

The school has its LED lighting, or some of it. You could say we have LED the way - but probably better not to. Thanks to Warwickshire County Council several rooms in the school, including the Heritage Room, kitchens and the main hall, have been fitted out with the new very low energy lighting. We are now working on the next phase that will complete the process. This might be by a share offer, by fundraising or it might be by an interest-free loan. The first stage is to assess what is left to do and find out the cost by inviting quotes to install the lights. It all means that the school has a brighter future.

LED lights have a very short payback time and a very long life expectancy. The payback time depends what kind of lighting you are replacing. An LED bulb that is equivalent to an old-fashioned 100W incandescent uses just 12.5W of electricity and gives a clear bright light instantly. I recently bought some of these from Tool Station in Learnington Spa and we can now actually see what we are cooking in the kitchen. A 12.5W low energy compact fluorescent delivers just 40W equivalent and takes time to warm up.

If you are replacing the old type of bulb you will recover your investment within one year. This sounds a little hard to believe, given that LED bulbs cost more but it is nevertheless true. It is truly worth gradually replacing all your bulbs with the new ultra-low energy type.

Please call the Surgery on 01926 612232 today to book an appointment for your Flu vaccination.

Flu is an unpredictable virus that can cause mild or unpleasant illness in most people. It can cause severe illness and even death among vulnerable groups including older people, pregnant women and people with an underlying health condition. Certain people are more likely to develop potentially serious complications of flu, such as bronchitis and pneumonia. These people are advised to have a flu jab each year. For otherwise healthy people, flu can be very unpleasant. Most people will recover from 'flu within a week or two

Who should have the Flu vaccine?

The injected flu vaccine is offered free of charge on the NHS to people who are at risk.

You are eligible to receive a free flu jab if you:

- Are 65 years of age or over
- Are pregnant
- Have certain medical conditions i.e. chronic (long-term) respiratory diseases, such as asthma (which requires an inhaler or tablet steroid treatment, or has led to hospital admission in the past), chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), or bronchitis, chronic heart disease, such as heart failure, chronic kidney disease, chronic liver disease, such as hepatitis, chronic neurological conditions, such as Parkinson's disease or motor neurone disease, diabetes, problems with your spleen - for example, sickle cell disease or if you have had your spleen removed, a weakened immune system as the result of conditions such as HIV and AIDS, or medication such as steroid tablets or chemotherapy
- Are very overweight with a BMI above 42
- Are living in a long-stay residential care home or other long-stay care facility
- Receive a carer's allowance, or you are the main carer for an elderly or disabled person whose welfare may be at risk if you fall ill
- Are a front-line health and social care worker. It is your employer's responsibility to arrange vaccination for you

Patients aged over 65 and at risk groups might also be due to have pneumococcal vaccination, please check with the receptionist to see if you can have a pneumococcal vaccination at the same time.

Bus Service Changes

This notice has been posted on the County Council Website.

The County Council has been advised by Stagecoach, who currently operate bus services 65/66, that they will no longer be able to continue running the services after Friday 17th December 2016 as they are not financially viable.

The Council have considered what effect this decision will have for residents living in the County and as a result are proposing to seek tenders from suitable operators to operate a contracted bus service from Napton to Learnington Spa via Southam, Bishops Itchington and Harbury. The planned timetable includes key peak journeys to access employment and education and daytime links to both Southam and Learnington for leisure. It will no longer be possible to provide the sections of service operating from Southam to Banbury or from Napton to Daventry as these sections of route fall outside the criteria for financial supported services. These extensions were provided through time limited developer funding secured from the Tesco development in Southam which has now expired and unfortunately numbers using the service fall short of a commercial proposition.

Stagecoach will continue to provide services 63/64 which are the main services linking Southam with Learnington Spa.

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

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

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
