Imagine love like that!

OK, it might have been a tad long but nonetheless I found Bishop Michael Curry's sermon at the Royal Wedding truly inspirational. It was incredible to witness such passion from a preacher especially in this particular context. Whilst there has been much debate in the media this week about Bishop Curry, it is important that we do not lose the message he delivered.

He began by quoting Martin Luther King who once said: "We must discover the power of love, the redemptive power of love. And when we do that, we will make of this old world a new world, for love is the only way." Who wouldn't say 'Amen' to that! This is the message Jesus came to live and die for and is at the heart of what Christians call the Gospel.

In talking about Jesus, Bishop Curry went on to say "He didn't die for anything he could get out of it. Jesus did not get an honorary doctorate for dying.. He gave up his life, he sacrificed his life, for the good of others, for the good of the other, for the wellbeing of the world... for us."

This is the message we all need to believe and live if our world is to be different from the selfish and self-centred place we have made it.

During the 60's, Martin Luther King preached of 'having a dream' that the world could be transformed through the power of love. Fifty years on and our world is as divided as ever. However, the Gospel (the Christian message) still gives us hope. Bishop Curry went on to say:

"Think and imagine a world where love is the way. Imagine our homes and families where love is the way. Imagine our communities where love is the way. Imagine governments and nations where love is the way. Imagine business and commerce where this love is the way.

Imagine this tired old world where love is the way. When love is the way, then no child will go to bed hungry in this world ever again. When love is the way, we will let justice roll down like a mighty stream and righteousness like an ever-flowing brook. When love is the way, poverty will become history. When love is the way, the earth will be a sanctuary. When love is the way, we will lay down our swords and shields, down by the riverside, to study war no more".

Archbishop Justin, in interview following the wedding, said of Bishop Curry's sermon that the message was 'raw God'. Indeed it was!

May God bless each of us in love.

Our communion service in May was led by Rev Ann, during which she suggested that we joined hands in love. Quite a moving illustration of our fellowship together.

We then had a most informative talk by Monique about the work of Save the Children Fund. It was founded as far back as 1919, working abroad, and set up work in the UK in 1926.

Snapshots from the past included an open-air nursery set up in Sunderland in 1935 for the children of working families who were left to play in the streets. As well as safety, it provided nutritious meals and a daytime rest.

In 1948 the "penny a week" appeal enabled all workers to contribute 1d from their wages – this continued until blocked by the unions in 1989.

During WWII, they withdrew from Europe but especially worked for evacuees and provided places for children who were playing on bomb sites.

Day nurseries and residential nurseries continued after the war, partly funded by the famous "Big Jumbly".

And nowadays? The sobering fact is that, in the UK, 4 million children live in poverty, which has devastating long term effects on language and literacy skills, leading to underachievement and unemployment. SCF works in partnership with many projects to address these problems, within homes and schools and in the community. There is also fast response help in emergencies such as the floods in 2007, as well as training for foster parents of unemployed asylum seekers.

It was particularly heartwarming to hear about all these wonderful projects as the big charities have been having severely adverse publicity about bad acts by a few people; Monique did not gloss over these but put them in the perspective of a very worthwhile organisation.

A reminder that our meeting on 6th June will be in Ladbroke, with communion at 2pm there in church, followed by tea at Betty Winkfield's. And on 4th July we are visiting Berkswell, starting with lunch at The Bear Inn followed by a

tour of the Norman church. This will be led by Christine Philp, whom members will remember for her talk about Maundy money.

Finally, I hope you have had a chance to admire and test the new pew cushions, bought with Alice Wilkins' gift to our branch. It is to be hoped that in time people might like to add to them, maybe to remember a loved one -a label can be attached. Details from Chris.

🖄 Ladbroke Church News



On the last Sunday in April (a while ago now but after the deadline for May's edition of Harbury & Ladbroke News) we finally received the feedback from the "8 Essential Qualities" questionnaire that was completed last October. Evidence maybe that the good old C of E does not move quickly, but the feedback had been planned for the beginning of March and had to be postponed due to the snow. The Rev Steve Hood, who is a "Healthy Church Mentor" for Coventry Diocese, spoke at our service and explained that the results indicated that Ladbroke Church's strongest areas are "loving relationships" and "holistic small groups". There are, of course, areas where we can improve and we shall be looking at ways we can make our worship more inspirational to encourage us in our own spirituality and how our concern for those outside of the church can be shown more effectively.

The 10 day period between Ascension Day and Pentecost (Whit Sunday) was designated as a special period of prayer on the theme "The Kingdom Come". So from $10^{th} - 20^{th}$ May the Church was open with a tremendously effective set of displays themed on the Lord's Prayer placed around the Church. Special thanks to Sue Wright for all her work setting these up. On the Monday evening of Whit Week a prayer vigil was held, which was well attended by members of both Ladbroke and Harbury congregations.

By now, most of us have probably heard enough of GDPR – the new General Data Protection Regulations – but they do apply to Ladbroke Church the same as to any other organisation. We have produced our own Privacy Notice as required; a copy of this is on the notice board in the Church porch. As part of our compliance with the new regulations, we are in the process of producing an up to date Directory of Church Members and Friends. Those on our old list should have received an email from Reverend Craig; if you would like to remain on our lists please return the form sent to you to either Craig or one of the Church Wardens (Sue Moore or Peter Rigby). If you have not received a form but would like to be included, please pick one up from the table just inside the main entrance to the church. May I emphasise that the Directory, when produced, will NOT be publicly available or given to any third party, circulation will be limited to those who wish to be included in the Directory, giving only such contact details as they choose to disclose.

Finally, we always welcome new volunteers to help share in the care of the Church. There are opportunities to help at Services (e.g. acting as verger, welcoming, reading, leading prayers, tea and coffee, bell ringing) or behind the scenes (cleaning, flowers, communications etc). We shall also be looking for a new Treasurer from the beginning of 2019 as Steve is wanting to stand down after many years carrying out this role. If anyone is interested in helping in any of these ways, please have a word with either Craig, Sue or Peter in the first instance.

The meeting on 9th May started with the council's AGM at which the only items of note were that Derek Batty remains Chairman, meetings will continue to be on the second Tuesday of alternate months, and for the curious, the list of the council's assets is: street lights, noticeboards, litter, dog and grit bins, telephone box (bought for £1), two benches, a water pump and the defibrillator.

The main parish council meeting then followed straight on.

Speeding within the village: There is always a slot for public participation and this month the issue of speeding drivers along Church Road by Farmyard Field was raised. Two low loaders were observed going at 40 to 50 mph by two villagers and such speeds are not an isolated incident with consequent concerns that a pedestrian or horse and rider will get hurt. Although there are 30mph repeater signs these are not very visible being small and extremely low down. Could they be improved, or perhaps a flashing "your speed is" sign? Since the police do not have resources for even a speed trap on the bypass at appropriate times, should we consider a community system (police-trained, three people at any time) as in Long Itchington?

Defibrillator: Awareness training will be run on a Saturday in late June or July by Heartbeat, the exact date to be confirmed.

SDC and WCC: Nothing to report, our representatives were at another meeting.

Planning: The parish council has objected to the proposed two houses behind The Bell Inn but made no representation on tree works on a cedar at Ladbroke Hall. SDC have approved the variation at the Lares, extension at Woodlands, retention of an existing mobile home for a rural worker at Brock Farm Stud and tree works at Hallsfield.

Highways and Footpaths: Windmill Lane residents say the new road surface on the bypass is quieter, they hear less road noise in the early morning. Potholes and the damaged bollard(s) are to be reported, a quote obtained for a new grit bin and flashing speed signs and a community camera

investigated. Could we discuss the last two with WCC / HS2 as part of traffic control during the construction phase?

Flooding: Cllrs Batty and Neal attended the meeting with WCC; the hydrology report has taken on villagers' observations on the rate of water level changes but this does not increase the number of properties affected, the recommended protection for those that are, nor did it show a benefit from a bund behind the Village Hall. The company doing the individual property protection has gone into liquidation, WCC had identified back-ups but progress will be slower as they want to do their own surveys.

Village Hall and Millennium Green: It is proving difficult to get three quotes for the work to be funded by the HS2 community grant as local builders are extremely busy. Further repairs have been done to the gate onto the Green thanks to the Norgates.

Broadband: We are still so near but so far from getting fibre to the home. The latest issue requires the road to be closed (we assume they mean the bypass), so no date can be given! Information so far has been second or third hand but representatives from the village will be attending one of the CSW/ Openreach meetings in June to give direct feedback and hopefully get more details.

Streetlights: WCC have quoted £376 to convert each head to LEDs, so to do all 15 by 2020 will cost around £4540. Members of the public are welcome to come to the next meeting to express their opinions before our councillors define the replacement plan.

Next meeting: Wednesday 11th July at 7.45pm.

The meeting was held on Thursday 3rd May in Ladbroke Village Hall starting at 7.30pm. The main topic of the meeting was the discussion and voting for this year's resolution. Ladbroke and Deppers Bridge WI - as do all WIs - get one vote, for or against, which will be taken to the Annual General Meeting in Cardiff in June.

The one resolution under discussion this year is as follows:

Mental health matters as much as physical health. The NFWI urges all WI members to recognise the importance of parity between mental health issues and physical health issues, and to lobby government for better support for mental illness.

We recognise that mental health is an increasing problem in this day and age with so many stresses on people's lives. The WI is well placed to welcome women in the community and make them feel valued. After discussions, the resolution was passed unanimously. As has become the tradition on Resolutions Night, the committee provided an excellent wine and cheese spread.

The coffee morning held in the Tom Hauley Room on 12th May was particularly well attended. We were lucky that the coffee morning we were hosting happened to coincide with the presentation of the Spirit of Harbury award which brought in an even larger and more generous crowd than usual!

We would like to give a donation to the Air Ambulance appeal as it is the charity chosen by WFWI to celebrate their centenary.

A Growing Family

Soon after I wrote last month's article the Missus started laying eggs. At a rate of one a day that uses up a lot of calcium so she had one of those food fads so frequent among expectant mothers - bits of snail shell to compensate. She also told me in no uncertain terms that our routine was to change as eggs are very heavy and very fragile. I was instructed not to come inside until further notice, though she didn't mind me bringing her the odd treat. She, however would be



in residence from early evening onwards, i.e. out during the daytime, when each new egg was starting to form and staying at home as the egg developed its hard, white shell with a few tiny terracotta coloured speckles; once this was laid in the early morning she would go out again. We are strong believers in family planning and wanted all our youngsters to be the same age so, even though my beloved laid an egg each day for a week, incubation didn't start until we had a full set. In the meantime, to keep our treasures safe she hid them in the nest lining, very effectively at first, not even our nosey neighbours realised they were there, but as the numbers increased they became impossible to hide. We decided to stop at seven, that's a bit on the low side for blue tits who usually lay 8 - 12 and sometimes up to 16, can you imagine coping with that number!

Where was I? Oh yes, seven eggs in our nest or perhaps I should refer to it as her's. I am told I am too clumsy to take part in the next stage of creating our family and that she will do the full 14 days incubation by herself. OK I know when I'm not wanted so I kept a low profile but a watchful eye on what was happening and there is a definite advantage, you don't need to develop that bald patch underneath for good heat transmission.

Mrs Bird writes...

Two weeks is a long time when the average adult only lives a couple of years but I kept myself busy reminiscing and contemplating the future and with housework: rearranging my eggs into different patterns and fine tuning the soft furnishings ready for the babies' arrival with only the odd excursion outside. I had hoped for more of the latter but I knew I had to keep things as warm as possible for an early hatching to coincide with the arrival of those delicious caterpillars which would no doubt be putting in an early appearance due to the hot weather.

Our first egg hatched at 6pm on 17th May, followed a few minutes later by the second one. Obviously it was down to me as the responsible adult to remove the debris - taking half of each eggshell out of the nest and, in the interests of health just gobbling up the other part before cleaning the sticky stuff off the newborn. It was also time to start sharing child rearing with my other half, but we had to start carefully - I asked him to bring food but hand it over to me to feed the little ones. By the



middle of next morning there were only three eggs remaining but there only seemed to be three ever-hungry beaks so I did a thorough check around and under the little ones and discovered a poor lifeless body, which I picked up in my beak and took well away from home. Mr Bird here again.....

I'm exhausted seeking out food for our growing family. I don't know why the Missus insists I pass the food to her, she isn't exactly gentle with our youngsters, always prodding and poking them and I think she has OCD the length of time she spends up-ended fussing around in the bottom of the nest! Still I know my place and don't arque though occasionally, if she's not at home when I arrive, I slip a morsel into the nearest beak!





I must admit our babies are pretty ugly at present. chickens Unlike and ducklings and other birds which have downv and leave the feathers nest as soon as they hatch, ours will be at home for 19 days or so. Consequently, when they were born ours were really only embryos with beaks and even now, a week later, they wouldn't have any chance in a bonnie baby contest looking as they do like tiny

"plucked chickens" with enormous heads. They are starting to fill the nest though and that's just three of them - we still have two eggs in there (which won't hatch now) and the youngest addition to the family just couldn't compete with siblings that were twice its age; though it had a bright yellow mouth like the others, its gape just wasn't big enough or in your face enough to get a fair share of the food. Unlike you humans we believe survival of the fittest is paramount and we are very proud of our three strong chicks. I expect they'll stay at home for another 12 days or so and by the time you read this we'll be watching them doing circuits with us around the locality to perfect their flying skills. Now, I must fly, beaks to feed and all that!

Annual Parish Meeting 2018

The evening began with a very interesting talk on the fight for Women's Suffrage by Dr Sarah Richardson, a Warwick University colleague of Chairman, Tim Lockley and it ended with wine and nibbles.

In between we heard how "Austerity" had impacted on the ability of the three layers of local government to provide what their electors needed and wanted. The national Government's policy was for us to have to take even more housing the Chairman said.

From the floor Ken Stevenson suggested our Parish Council should be more pro-active; working with neighbours who would be impacted by development plans, making more detailed objections and urging our MP to take an interest in the lack of affordable housing for local people. This last aim was endorsed by Sharon Hancock.

Commenting on Cllr Summers' Planning Working Party Report, Julie Marshall-Hardy urged her to ensure proper reinstatement of the Bush Heath Lane verges, which had been badly damaged by the developers. Ken Stephenson asked when there would be approval of the Neighbourhood Development Plan (which we were promised would give us more say in how the village developed). The answer was probably not until September.

Cllr Gibb's Environment Report highlighted the progress made to convert our street lighting to more energy efficient LED lamps. He had campaigned for traffic lights at the Bendigo-Mitchell crossroads to be installed before the Gaydon Lighthorne Heath development began because accidents were increasing there. Extra litter bins had been procured, details of village potholes had been placed on the "Fix My Street" website which he recommended villagers used. At the year end Harbury would be commemorating, along with Chesterton, the ending of WW1, with a beacon on Windmill Hill. He was congratulated on the efforts of his working party by Dr Hancock and by Mr Stephenson for the Blue Plaque Trail in memory of the Village Fallen of WW1.

Cllr Ekins for the Property Working Party praised the "Friends of Harbury Cemetery" bulb planting. There had been extra equipment installed on the playing fields this year, new notice boards for the village and changes to the allotments management. From the floor; Geoff Thorpe noted that the notice board on the Oakfields development faced the wrong way. Ken Stephenson said the allotment's hedge needed attention and Linda Ridgley asked the PC why the fencing contractor had compromised the future of the iconic copper beech at the Burial Grounds. The Chairman promised to look into these. County Councillor Bob Stevens said although still financially sound, WCC faced more cuts. They had increased the precept by an extra 2% to help fund Adult Care. Our Fire Service was now working to share administration with West Midlands Fire Service. The County's infrastructure was under pressure from development and HS2 would bring more disruption. Parish Cllr Gibb asked what the County was doing to secure monetary benefit for us from HS2 and Alison Hodge wanted the County to receive compensation for the damage to the Highways.

District Councillor Jacqui Harris said Austerity was having a similar effect on SDC. There had been a change of management leadership. She continued to monitor concerns about the Gaydon Lighthorne Heath development of 3,000 homes and has had a four-year battle to try to secure improved village infrastructure. The District was supposed to have agreements with the developers on the routing of the HGVs serving the sites, but congestion would continue. She would continue to help us fight off more development but would campaign for the social housing that local people needed.

After that we all became friends again and enjoyed the wine and nibbles.

Welcome Packs from the Parish Council

The Parish Council produced 100 welcome packs to be distributed to the new houses being built in Harbury. They were funded by private donations.

The directory from 2016 - 2018 was reprinted with permission from the Harbury and Ladbroke News. Thank you for allowing this.

The last few houses in Hawtin End and Overs Grove have not been occupied so welcome packs have been left at the Library where they can be collected by anyone moving into the village. Some are at the Parish Office and Kleinmans Estate Agents.

Salt 'n battery?

By 18th June we will know if the Postcode Local Trust, one of the Postcode Lottery funds, has awarded the village hall and HEI a grant to install a salt water battery. The tension is mounting but, don't worry, I can cope with it, so

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you don't have to. We will get the notice just before Community Energy Fortnight (23rd June to 8th July), so good news would be appropriate. The company we have worked with on this, Sure Power, will be familiar to those of you who came to the talk at the beginning of February. Don't forget that they are still offering a £500 discount to anyone in Harbury commissioning an installation of solar panels or battery or both. In much the same way as photovoltaic panels have come down significantly in price, so batteries are also dropping in cost and becoming more efficient. There is a role for home owners to play in the whole national energy production effort through this energy generation and saving - and it cuts your home running costs.

Good day, sunshine

Last month Ted Dowdeswell and I took one of the electric cars and visited the newest local community energy scheme, Heart of England Community Energy (HECE), which is off the A46 to the west of Stratford-on-Avon. Community energy projects allow local people to invest in and become part of local energy production and earn interest on their shares. The minimum investment in HECE is around £500 with interest paid annually at 6%. They will use a significant part of their profits to support local charities that are focused on alleviating fuel poverty, amongst other things.

The solar farm is huge. On the day we were there the 60,000 panels had generated 32MW of electricity for the grid, some of it stored in on site batteries. We had both been concerned about the potential noise pollution from large batteries, something often raised by opponents of large scale energy storage schemes. In fact, whilst inside the cabin there is a steady hum, no sound is audible from outside.

Carnival is coming

I did warn you last month that we would be at the Carnival again this year on 9th June but that's no reason not to go. The Carnival is a wonderful village event and we love being part of it. Come and see our stand, which this year we are sharing with Harbury e-Wheels. We (and, okay, some of the other stands) will have a game and a competition. All over the field there will be prizes to win and we have one for you just waiting to go to the smartest competitor. I know we can count on you. After all, everything we do is for the village.



In Spirit

I thought of writing a separate letter about this but have decided to thank Harbury through this column. On 12th May I was presented with the Spirit of Harbury Award by the Hunt family at the Saturday coffee morning. Since this award to me could only happen because of all the people who share in the things I do around the village, not least the other 22 volunteer members of Harbury e-Wheels, it seems appropriate to thank the village here for the considerable honour of having my name added to the shield. As I said at the

presentation, I am just having fun, so it is an added delightful bonus to discover that people in Harbury appreciate what I and the other friends who help to deliver this and other projects are doing. It's a great village.



In Funds

Some of the fun comes in the form of fundraising events. Those of you who came to our epic Race Night may like to know that as a result of your generosity - and poor betting choices - e-Wheels raised about £900 towards its operations after all costs had been deducted. These events take a great deal of effort to put together (it is amazing what the e-Wheels team members will volunteer to do!) and I would like to thank everyone who helped, as well as all those happy people who came. I reckon we will be doing it again. Please start saving for it!

In Request

The sobering fact is that this £900 is still only enough to keep us going for six weeks or so. We have already clocked up over 500 hours of free green transport this year. Each year we need to raise about £7,500. At the moment about a third of this comes from personal donations, the majority by regular monthly giving, and this can be boosted by Gift Aid. HERITAGE

HARBURY Harbury Heritage Room

The Heritage Room is at Harbury Primary School and contains hundreds of photos and documents relating to the village and its inhabitants. You might even be featured if you have been around here for some time!

Entry is free, though we appreciate donations, as the Heritage Room is entirely self-funding.

We are always open on the first Tuesday of each month. Our next two open evenings are Tuesday 5th June and Tuesday 3rd July from 6.30pm to 8.30pm. Local organisations are welcome to book other times at their convenience.

Are you interested in local history? If so, please put a note in your diary and make a point of supporting Harbury Library's Local History Week from 2nd - 7th July. You will also be able to borrow a Listed Buildings Trail around the village.

The following is the second part (the first part was in May's copy of HLN) of a document over 150 years old, outlining what was expected of children at the Wagstaffe School and the Wight School.

Rules of the Harbury Schools, 1852 - HM1366

Any complaints about the school must be made to the Vicar. And to secure the school from interruption no person will be allowed to visit it, without an order from the Vicar, who daily inspects the schools himself.

Parents must bear in mind that strict compliance with the above rules is necessary to ensure the efficiency of the school.

Parents are likewise earnestly requested, so to arrange their domestic affairs, that, except in very urgent cases, the children may never be kept from school. Let parents always bear in mind, that six months **regular** attendance will do more for their children than twelve months **irregular** attendance.

It is in contemplation to combine the industrial training with the intellectual course of instruction. To prepare the children for the duties of public and private life. To qualify some for the office of teachers and other employments, and some for domestic service. The first class girls will, three days in the week, be instructed at the Vicarage, by efficient servants, in household duties – and to such as may wish for situations, testimonials will be given after having acquitted themselves satisfactorily. To prevent any interruption of their school duties, the girls will attend at the Vicarage from eleven till two and dine at the Vicarage. By this arrangement only two hours in the week will be taken from school, as one of the days selected will be Saturday, when there is a holiday.

So soon as arrangements will permit of it, there will be a public examination on the first Monday of each month when parents and friends will be invited to inspect the schools, in order to ascertain the progress which the children are making.

Half yearly there will be a special examination, when prizes will be distributed to those children who have excelled in the different branches of instruction, in needle-work and in household duties.

There will be two holidays in the year. A short one at Christmas, a longer one in the summer, and likewise a weekly holiday on Saturdays.

Two of the labourers' children will, in rotation, have each evening to clean the schools, and to leave them prepared for the next day's duties.

Suitable dresses will be provided for the girls while thus employed.

Harbury School had an OFSTED inspection on 27th March, with the customary notice the previous day, and was judged to be "good". This was the first inspection since 2013, and follows a significant period of change, both at the school and in the national curriculum, support and objectives. The governors and staff are pleased with the outcome of the inspection.

The inspector took into account feedback from parents and staff: 121 written comments were made to him in addition to verbal comments on the day. He

highlighted a representative sample in his report, such as a pupil saying "I'm so happy here. Everyone really looks after you", and a parent writing "The teaching staff at the school are excellent and are exceptionally interested in the welfare and learning of the children". Addressing Head Teacher Kate Guymer he wrote "You lead the school with resolute and dedicated commitment to the achievement and welfare of your pupils", and he continued with "Your governors are a strength of the school. They are well informed and eager to be involved and challenge you and your staff effectively".

A very high priority is now placed on safeguarding the children, and the inspector found this to be "effective". He concluded that "Your safeguarding culture is meticulously planned and well informed by up-to-date training".

Looking to the future he had just one recommendation, to ensure that "the improvements in pupils' mathematics learning lead to consistently good outcomes". This objective is a key feature of the school's "learning improvement plan".

In conclusion the inspector writes that "pupils, parents and staff are proud to be part of the school community". As the governing body, we echo this, and are proud of the achievements of the staff and pupils outlined in the report. We will continue to challenge the school to maintain and improve on these results in future years.



Reminders of some jobs:

- Remember to remove faded rose flowers
- Trim back any shrubs which have finished flowering
- Feed tomatoes/cucumbers/melons

- Sow some salad leaves every two or three weeks
- Repot some house plants and take them out for the summer
- Plant out brassicas, leeks and sweet corn
- Pot up strawberry runners and pick strawberries
- There may still be a weed or two to remove

As I write on Sunday 20th May, it's a perfect late spring day with no wind to speak of and wall to wall sunshine. We are promised these conditions will prevail during the coming week with maybe the odd thundery outbreak. Plant growth is on maximum revs and mowers are much in evidence.

Hugh Tottle reported hearing a cuckoo at the end of April whilst tilling his allotment near the church. Others have reported hearing one also but so far Sharon and I have missed out. It is the male bird which makes that evocative sound of summer. The female's call is a much less distinctive bubbling note. The decline of the Cuckoo, at least in the southern half of the country is probably explained by loss of habitat and songbirds such as the Meadow Pipit, Reed Warbler and Dunnock whose nests are used by the Cuckoo to lay its own egg. Various hairy caterpillars are the birds' chief food and our use of insecticides may be partly responsible for the Cuckoo's decline.

I saw my first Early Purple Orchids at Snitterfield Bushes Nature Reserve on 7th May while visiting the site with David Brown's Butterfly and Moth Group. It's always an exciting moment to see the first wild orchid flowers of the year. I have often seen them among the bluebells in Ufton Wood but not this year. It is one of the most abundant and widespread of our native orchids with flowers that vary in colour from purple to pink. The rosette of leaves at the base of the flower stem is generally spotted to a greater or lesser extent. The species has been well known for many years for in 'Hamlet' we find the Queen saying in reference to Ophelia:-

"There with fantastic garlands did she come

Of crow-flowers, nettles, daisies and long purples

That liberal shepherds give a grosser name,

But our cold maids do dead men's fingers call them"

These are references to the flower spikes themselves and the bloated tubers underground. I am indebted for this information to my copy of V.S.Summerhaye's encyclopaedic book 'Wild Orchids of Britain' in Collins New Naturalist series.

In Ufton Fields Nature Reserve I counted nine flower spikes of the Man Orchid yesterday, each guarded from nibbling rabbits by a wire cage making them easier to find.

Back at Snitterfield Bushes, we saw plenty of Orange Tip, Brimstone and Large White butterflies together with some Holly Blues and a few Speckled Woods. One decent sized elm tree appears free of Dutch Elm disease. I have seen single mature elms in good health near Wellesbourne and Rowington so perhaps there is hope that this once common Warwickshire tree will make a comeback.

Geoff Thorpe has seen very few swifts so far this year and I concur. Usually by now we have had them screaming down Mill Street in pursuit of insects. Perhaps they are just late arriving.

Sarah and John Bennett reported an unusual sighting back in April. The field near them was crammed with foraging pigeons. There was a near tropical downpour and the birds all took up a position with one wing pointing skyward. Was it to lessen their exposure to the elements, a sort of umbrella effect, or, as Alan Barr surmised, an attempt to get a good wash and eliminate parasites. The jury is out.

I was invited to Ladbroke after following up Jackie West's article in May's Harbury & Ladbroke News. There I was able to sit in the comfort of Jackie and Simon's living room watching pictures taken on the webcam inside a nest box where a pair of blue tits were tending four progeny. It was fascinating.

Now every day seems to bring yet more wild flowers into bloom. Each walk is an adventure. I hope you enjoy the summer as it unfolds in all its stunning beauty.

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ORDER UNDER SECTION 21 OF THE TOWN POLICE CLAUSES ACT 1847 FOR THE PREVENTION OF OBSTRUCTION IN STREETS

ROAD CLOSURE ORDER NUMBER NO. 37 - 2018 HARBURY CARNIVAL - HARBURY Saturday 9th June 2018

During certain hours on Saturday 9th June 2018 Sutcliffe Drive, Farm Street, Manor Orchard, Temple End, Park Lane, Bush Heath Lane, Manor Road, South Parade, Chapel Street, Mill Street, High Street, Ivy Lane, Church Street, Church Terrace, Hall Lane, Crown Street, Dovehouse Lane, Frances Road, Vicarage Lane, Pineham Avenue, South Parade and Constance Drive, Harbury ("the Streets"), will be thronged or liable to be obstructed on the occasion of the Harbury Carnival.

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon it by Section 21 of the Town Police Clauses Act 1847, Stratford-on-Avon District Council of Elizabeth House, Church Street, Stratford-upon-Avon aforesaid do HEREBY ORDER AND DIRECT that for the purpose of preventing obstruction in the Streets on the said day the following Regulations shall be observed:-

- Save as provided in Regulations 2 and 3 of this Order, no person shall, except upon the direction or with the permission of a police constable in uniform, drive, ride or propel any vehicle, or cause or permit any vehicle to wait on or in the Streets between 12:30 hours and 14:00 hours (Rolling road closure between these times), on Saturday 9th June 2018.
- Nothing in the Regulation 1 of this Order shall apply to any vehicles being used for Police, Fire Brigade or Ambulance purposes in the exercise of statutory powers or duties.
- 3. Any person directed or permitted by a police constable in uniform to drive, ride or propel or to cause or permit a vehicle to wait on or in the Streets during the said hours on the said day shall comply with the direction of the police constable and of any other police constable in uniform.
- All persons present in the Streets during the said hours on the said day shall comply with the directions of any police constable in uniform.
- Willful breach of this Order is an offence and any person committing such an offence shall be liable to a fine not exceeding One Thousand pounds.

At the beginning of the year, I wrote an article in the Harbury and Ladbroke News thanking people for their generosity in giving to the Foodbank, but also pointing out that donations from Harbury had gone down over the previous twelve months, compared to the year before. Now, a few months on, I have made enquiries again to see if there has been an improvement in the amount of our contributions. Sadly, I'm afraid the amount we give is still on the downward trend. Many people in the surrounding villages as well as Harbury, need to depend occasionally on food aid. The reasons are varied, but all have to be referred from an agency like a school, a GP or a Citizens Advice centre. No one can just turn up and expect to be given food. Numbers needing help have risen and so donations from those who are able to provide something, even just a little, will help someone. Many people feel desperate before they are finally helped and from my own experience a large number are very embarrassed to be in that position at all. If you can manage to give something, there is no doubt that your gift of nonperishable food, or basic toiletries, will be very appreciated.

There is a lidded box, just to the left of the door of Harbury Church, where donations can be left. Every Monday the food is taken by E-Wheels to the warehouse in Kineton, where it is stored and sent out to the various local distribution centres as needed. No food is ever wasted, because any nearing a sell by date, is sent to the larger foodbanks in Learnington or Coventry. Please let us try to improve our village food donations back to the level they were during 2016. Thank you to all those who help, every little counts so much.

Swifts – Can you help us to survey these wonderful birds?

Swifts are quintessentially urban birds and a symbol of the British summer. Unfortunately, as you may well have witnessed yourselves, they're in serious decline: the UK breeding population has decreased by 51% from 1995 to 2015. This is largely due to a loss of suitable nest spaces as old buildings are renovated or demolished. New buildings often lack the crevices these charismatic birds use as homes.

The RSPB are putting plans together to at least half the decline if not bring about an improvement in their fortunes. They intend to increase public awareness and support for swifts by inspiring people to take practical action to help this iconic bird, including improving data on swift populations and nest locations. Hopefully this will lead on to increase availability of nest sites for swifts in new and existing buildings.

What can we do? Well, a survey is being conducted of the breeding swifts in the Coventry and Warwickshire area so that we have a base line on which to assess what happens in the future.

Harbury is fortunate, there is already a drift of around 7–8 swifts regularly screaming around Harbury village centre and it would be fantastic if we can identify exactly where they are nesting and any other groups of swifts in or around other local farms and villages – and if they are seen entering nest sites that would be a real bonus. They are usually very active on still, warm evenings so if you are out and about you may see them.



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
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
